

Resurrecting the Ohio Statehouse

Over the years, the beauty, integrity, and functionality of Ohio's uniquely American statehouse had been battered and bruised almost beyond recognition. An eight-year, \$112-million overhaul has put the house in Columbus back in order.

No need to mention any names, but many state capitol buildings are simply discount knock-offs of the nation's capitol. The citizens of Ohio are blessed with one of the nicest exceptions. The Ohio Statehouse is textbook American Greek Revival — an architectural declaration of independence from the Renaissance models revered by the nation-builders during the height of Jeffersonian classicism.

However interesting in its origins, the important story of the Ohio Statehouse is a more recent one: how Ohioans found themselves with a pretty disgusting mess in the late 1980s and proceeded, against daunting political odds, to turn the capitol around. After eight years of study, restoration, and new construction, Capitol Square — encompassing the Statehouse, Senate Building, and Capitol Atrium — has more than regained its antebellum exuberance.

At the center of the project were Schooley Caldwell Associates as lead architects and Sen. Richard Finan, as leader of the bipartisan political consensus that kept the project alive. Schooley Caldwell Associates, a Columbus firm, evolved from Sims Cornelius and Schooley, a partnership founded in 1944. Well established in public and institutional work inside and outside the state, Schooley Caldwell is now officially serving as "Architect of the Capitol." The firm is multidisciplinary, with a staff of 55 architects, planners, engineers, interior designers, and landscape architects. John Schooley, president and CEO, has special ties to the Capitol project. His father, John Schooley, Sr., worked on the Capitol in the 1930s during his tenure as State Architect.

Birth of a Statehouse

The Ohio Statehouse was 23 years in the making: 1838-1861. Belying its spare appearance, it was the most expensive state capitol built in the 19th century. A competition was held in 1838, with three architects winning "premiums." First



premium went to Henry Walter of Cincinnati, second to Martin Thompson of New York City, and third to Thomas Cole of Catskill, New York, the well-known Hudson River School landscape painter. All three designs were undeniably Greek Revival and quite similar.

The daringly spare classical forms of the American Greek Revival seen in the designs discarded the British and French intermediation championed by the founding fathers and favored by the architects of the early republic. With the passing of the revolutionary generation, architects of the Greek Revival felt free to borrow with a more archaeological directness. The impressively scaled, clean-lined forms of Greek antiquity

were appropriated as popular, visual embodiments of the Athenian "cradle of democracy."

In the end, Alexander Jackson Davis, a well-established Greek Revivalist from the East, was hired by the commissioners to prepare a composite design based on the three prize-winning submissions. Davis' design relied heavily on Cole's proposal, notably its Greek Doric colonnade set flush with the wall plane rather than forward in a pedimented portico as proposed by Walter and Thompson. Interestingly, all four designs included domes.

Over the next 23 years, six more architects were hired and fired (as well as numerous commissioners). There was a ten-year work stoppage, a cholera epidemic, and a fourfold increase in the budget. During this upheaval, the proposed dome was replaced with a low, conical-shaped copper roof, and a strangely hovering pediment was added to the west and east facades. Finally, in 1857, the legislative chambers opened. The rotunda and balance of the Statehouse were not completed for another four years.

In 1901, the Judiciary Building (now the Senate Building) was constructed directly east of the Statehouse to ease overcrowding. Samuel Hannaford & Sons, a Cincinnati firm, designed the Neoclassical annex, which surprisingly meets even contemporary criteria for sympathetic additions to historic properties.

The grand stair hall of the Judiciary (now Senate) Building, completed in 1901, was remarkably intact considering the building had been abandoned for more than 20 years prior to the recent renovation.

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

Make Way For Exotics

The aesthetic advantages, performance characteristics, and environmental friendliness of naturally durable hardwoods over other manufactured materials are leading to increased usage by designers, specifiers, and engineers.

There is a growing "back-to-wood" rediscovery trend among designers, engineers, landscape architects, and architectural specifiers serving the exterior commercial construction industry because a growing number of the designers and specifiers within this community are becoming familiar with the availability and near-indestructibility of naturally durable hardwoods. And, more importantly, these woods are providing the aesthetic advantages of warmth and environmental friendliness that manufactured materials simply cannot provide.

The names of these hardwoods sound exotic, especially next to familiar names like "cedar" and "redwood." Ipe, Ekki, Jarrah, Cumaru, Macaranduba, Dinizia, and Bangkarai are some of the widely available hardwoods offered under the Iron Woods trademark owned by Timber Holdings, Ltd. All of these woods are selectively harvested and/or farmed-managed to be available to future generations.

Physical Attraction

The attraction for specifiers and end users is these species' incredible strength, hardness, and natural resistance to chemicals, rot, termites, marine borers — and their resistance to splintering. These outdoor hardwoods feature a 25-year-plus durability rating. The density of the woods makes them impenetrable: They weigh as much as 69 lb. per cubic foot, compared to domestic woods like Southern Pine (35 lbs.) and Redwood (28 lbs.). They carry Class A-1 fire ratings — the same as steel or concrete.

These exotic woods are maintenance free, devoid of chemical preservatives, and don't require water-repellent sealers. Furthermore, the long-wearing woods retain their pristine, original qualities throughout their entire life.

Hardwoods, unlike more inflexible building materials, also provide designers enormous flexibility. The grade availability of these woods is superior; clear all-heart is common, not the exception. That makes shaping and turning the wood for maintenance-free trim, moldings, columns, one-of-a kind furnishings, porch and entryway floors not only possible, but flawless; no knots or sapwood to work around.


Loves the Water

These naturally durable hardwood species are now commonly used in waterfront sites, such as boardwalks, piers, docks, bridges (pedestrian, vehicular, and covered), boat houses, retaining and sea walls, dune walkways; landscape applications include site furnishings (benches, planters, waste receptacles), noise-barrier walls, fencing, columns, paving bricks, pergolas, and trellises. Used for three decades in applications like Atlantic City and other municipal boardwalks, as well as zoos, aquariums, marinas, and other high-traffic commercial projects, use of naturally durable hardwoods is also exploding in residential applications like decking, arbors, raised garden beds, and fencing.

Life-Cycle Analysis Shows Dramatic Payback

A growing number of commercial architects and engineers report that, when using life-cycle analysis, naturally durable hardwoods are less expensive than other materials — and they retain their value throughout their useful life.





Ekki was selected for the walkways and structure at Ellis Island, N.Y. This naturally durable hardwood can withstand the millions of visitors that disembark here all year long.

Installation on a per-square-foot basis of these woods is less expensive than of similar grades of redwood or cedar; long-term maintenance costs are nil, and there's virtually no issue of clients claiming product-performance failure or making callbacks.

This cost-savings-beyond-installation benefit (critical to calculating the real life-cycle cost equation) deserves emphasis and becomes especially clear when hardwoods are compared to other woods in real-life applications. Consider the following illustration, a comprehensive report by George Savistano, city engineer of Ocean City, N.J., regarding the performance of Ipe hardwood in a boardwalk installation at Ocean City:

"The wood utilized for decking the First to Second Street project was Ipe hardwood (botanical name Tabeuia Spp). This is the same as the wood decking placed between 20th and 23rd Streets in 1989-1990.

"To provide a comparison for performance of the Ipe hardwood to the southern yellow pine predominantly in place on the boardwalk, consider that in a three-week period from mid-April of this year [1996] to the first week of May, city forces expended approximately 100 man-hours in isolated boardwalk decking repairs and replacements. We estimate that in the three-month period from June through August, over 700 man-hours will be expended on boardwalk repairs and replacements. These repairs and replacements will be necessary due to deterioration resulting in unacceptable and/or unsafe conditions, or failure of the pine decking. The above labor expenditures are related to the pine decking alone. For the hardwood deck from 20th to 23rd Street, city forces have expended approximately eight man-hours in the past six years for repairs and replacements.

"Structurally, and from a durability standpoint, the Ipe hardwood is unparalleled. As a boardwalk decking, Ipe was chosen by the National Audubon Society for use in construction of their Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary boardwalk walkway, a 2-1/2-mile-long structure completed in the summer of 1995.

"Ipe is highly recommended for use in boardwalk decking applications by the International Wood Products Association and is recommended by the city's engineering consultant for the 8th Street to Moorlyn Terrace project, Lamont Czar, P.E.

Iron Woods decking has lasted over 25 years on the Atlantic City, N.J., boardwalk under the wear of high-heeled pedestrians, daredevil cyclists, speeding maintenance vehicles, dogs in need of a pedicure, angular sand, vicious winter storms, and moist, salty air. "In addition to its maintenance-free characteristics, Ipe has proven to be a material that does not warp or splinter. This is significant, considering the instances of trip and fall occurrences on the boardwalk, as well as the undoubtedly many cases of splinters in bare feet on the boardwalk. From a safety standpoint, based on structural integrity and durability, Ipe is an outstanding material choice."

Additionally, there are no long-term disposal costs or problems associated with these woods, as they contain no preserving chemicals; they can be recycled and used again, for decades. We anticipate the mounting concerns of environmentalists and government agencies concerning the use and disposal of toxic wood preservatives will continue to fuel the growing specification of hardwoods.

Each of the previously mentioned species of hardwoods has different properties and performance characteristics, as well as limitations in availability and size. It is important for specifiers to understand these limitations and avoid confusing customers and suppliers with specifications that cannot be met.

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

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
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

A reputable stocking importer, distributor and/or fabricator handling a deep assortment of such selectively harvested species can be invaluable in helping specifiers and designers become more familiar with these hardwoods. Successful engineering for fabrication or virtually any installation, for example, relies on understanding their properties/ size/ grades. The importer/distributor should have experience and know what the particular characteristics and availability of each species is and, therefore, what is and is not possible when using a given hardwood.

Grade specification deserves particular attention; understanding it can literally save hundreds of hours trying to find something that may or may not exist. Most of the producing countries of these naturally durable hardwoods do not have or enforce standardized grading rules like those we employ in the United States. It is for this reason that our company years ago developed a trademark as an umbrella under which specific species can be identified; the all-heart grading rules created under the umbrella can be applied year-in and year-out so the supply to users can be consistent.

This grading process actually occurs at the point of origin where the species are harvested. On-site professionals (in this case retained by Timber Holdings) inspect and grade all timber purchased to ensure consistent grade, milling quality, packagand conformance ing, to environmental regulations during production. In addition to guaranteeing specific grades for specific species, this point-of-origin commitment keeps all the revenue generated from processing the timber in the countries from which the timber is purchased.

Matching Species to Project

The appropriate species specification for any given application pays dividends to both the specifier/designer and end user. As an example, consider the 12-ft. x 110-ft. clear-span, through-truss bridge designed and built recently by Timber Holdings for the city of Batavia, N.Y. Ekki was used for the structural members because of its strength and availability in large sectional sizes. Jarrah was selected for the rails, balusters, decking, and light fixtures because of its lower tendency to check. The result was a bridge both beautiful and functional, capable of withstanding the wear and tear of rigorous use for years and years.

The back-to-wood trend is gaining momentum as all of these forces - the need for strong, natural materials, durability, wearability, low environmental impact, and aesthetics without any surface treatments come into play in the marketplace. Our experience illustrates that softwoods and familiarity with steel and stone did not replace naturally durable hardwoods; rather, the hardwoods were overlooked inadvertently. Look for the reversal of that oversight to continue.





This Old Gate: The Traditional Gate Meets New Technology

Integrating a beautiful entry gate and its electronic entry system requires the know-how of both a gate designer and a gate-operator specialist.

In medieval times, the mighty weight of the portcullis, or iron grating, hung suspended by chains, ready to drop into grooves in the masonry of the fortified town or castle walls. During the Middle Ages, it was common to dimple or hollow out a stone embedded into the ground, and in the depression mount a gate stile capable of supporting enormous swinging weight. Engineering overhead gates and drawbridges honed our knowledge of levers and pulleys. As technologies and our knowledge of physics, mechanics, and hydraulics have evolved, so have different methods of mounting and controlling gates.

At the close of the twentieth century, we are able to completely hide closing mechanisms and safety devices so as not to interfere with the aesthetics or antiquity of entrance gates. At sites where it is important to preserve the period setting, the entire gate-operating system can be hidden below ground level. There are several choices of gate opening: the familiar single- or double-swing gate, the slide gate, the vertical lift, and the barrier parking gate. Each of these has an application, but the swing gate offers the most in terms of aesthetics and full security. It is also one of the safest gates to automate. For most traditional sites or estate settings, the swing gate is the only appropriate style, and it is the one we will discuss.

The swing gate announces the separation of public and private space, and that lovely gate is very often automated. What is less obvious from the street is that the combination of gate design and electronic design is an exact science. The architect, landscape planner, or builder who plans for an automated gate should rely on the gate-operator specialist to specify a safe, reliable accesscontrol system.

When Safety is Reliability: The Right System for the Gate

Gate operators for swing gates come in four types: the swing arm, the hydraulic unit, the mechanical operator, and the electronic-hydraulic unit. Each operator system has its capabilities and limitations, and each gate design has its specific conditions, requiring the trained electronics technician and the professional gate fabricator to design the gates and the operators as a unit.

Safety is the primary necessity for the gate-system designer who has respect for the power of the swinging gate. For the consumer, on the other hand, reliability is what matters; the gate has to open — without fail — in all types of weather, in all circumstances. Fortunately for both, what goes into a safe system design also produces reliability. Reliability comes from matching the proper gate-operating system with the proper gate design, and the gate professional will look at a whole series of criteria to make the proper match.

Height and weight of the gate are major considerations in choosing the best operator. The swinging weight and the torque of the gate in motion have to match the motor r.p.m., the thrust and traction force of the system, and the maximum weight the operator was meant to move. If the gate exceeds the weight the electronic unit was designed to handle, not only will the gate not open and close properly, but internal components will be stressed and require maintenance. Specific gate design also figures into the operator selection; a short, massive gate with top-heavy construction requires different operator specifications than a long bottom-heavy gate leaf.

Along with determining the actual distance from the gate to the power supply, there is a correlation between gate traffic, motor size, primary voltage, and duty cycle. The duty cycle of the operator refers to how frequently the gate will be opened and closed within a given time period. A gate that is to experience a heavy volume of traffic must be able to open and close repetitively without any delay in time for recycling. A motor will only open and close so many times before it slows down and needs to recharge in order to open the gate again. Heavily traveled routes should use an industrial-rated 220-volt system, which is capable of almost unlimited repetitions. It is better to overbuild a gate system in anticipation of unexpected use than to find oneself dealing with a gate malfunction in unusually heavy traffic conditions. Spacing and placement of both gate and operator help to determine which system is best for the job. Mechanical operator arms need to operate from a precise angle of leverage and therefore require exact positioning on the gate leaf.

Does the operator have internal hydraulic-locking positions in both the open and closed phases?

Does the operating system have provisions for anti-crushing, so that when an obstacle is encountered, the unit reverses the movement if the gate is opening, and halts movement if the gate is closing?

Is there a manual override in the event of a power failure? (This is usually referred to as a "keyed manual release.")

Can the main control panel be outfitted with telephone entry systems as well as magnetic keypads, digicards, and radio transmitters? It is important to choose a main control panel with the ability to incorporate extra external safety features.

Does the operator require external positive stops in the open and closed positions? What are the aesthetics? Is it preferable to completely hide the operator in-ground or to mount the operator directly to the gate leaf behind a decorative design element?

The future gate owner may be relieved to think that the technical decisions are finally made, but there is more: Pier, post, and column construction need to be planned to properly house the electrical conduit for lighting, control panels, intercom systems, safety devices, access control mechanisms, and even cameras

While the technician is counting all these gremlins dancing on electronic pinheads, the property owner often has two simple and direct questions: Will it do what I want it to do? and What will it look like? From the homeowner's perspective, the technicalities are bothersome but soluble, but the aesthetics of the operator system are what matter. Fortunately, with their powerful compact forms, today's sleek operators can also satisfy aesthetic sensibilities. "It is a misconception to assume that a bigger operator is necessarily a more powerful unit," says Janice Mucera of Northeast Gate Operator Supply. Europeans understand this better than Americans, who still have a tendency to equate bigger with better.

The Right Gate for the Electronics

Proper gate construction has to be complementary to the operating system right from the beginning. Regardless of the operator chosen, a properly constructed gate will not flex or deflect under the force generated by either the opening system or by its closing mechanism. It is critical that the gates be mounted plumb and within the tolerances specified by the manufacturer of the gateopening system to ensure that the ram assemblies and seals wear evenly. Close tolerances in mounting the opening system and strong structural bracing directly relate to the life span of the opener itself.

The gate-hinge system has to be sturdy enough to support the weight of the gate to eliminate sag and to perform bind-free. Permanent lubrication or specially installed grease fittings maintain ease of hinge operation.

Some gate-operator manufacturers supply internal opening and closing stops with their units. Other manufacturers require the addition of external positive-opening stops, and the gate continues to close until the gate leaves meet the gate stop — usually a piece of flat steel that overlays one side of the center gate frame to prevent the gate leaf from going past a closed position. In some gate systems, the gate needs a positive stop on the opening, as well. In each case, the gate must be constructed accordingly so as to absorb the specific points of torque and strain given by the operator system. These requirements apply to all gates, whether constructed of iron, aluminum, or wood.

Clarifying the Particulars

Following are some points of clarification essential in specifying a gate-operating system:

Leaf swing is the degree of opening capability. Operators are capable of opening from 90 to 180 degrees.

How long does it take the gate to open? Opening time varies from system to system; some gates are capable of opening in seventeen seconds; others can accomplish the same line of travel in six seconds.

Mr. Babbitt's Gadgets

There is enough new gate gadgetry to support another Sinclair Lewis novel, in which we can assume that Mr. Babbitt would own it all. Electronic sensibilities and snobberies of all possible types await Mr. Babbitt's choice, replete with potential for intrigue, access denial, and social faux pas, all recorded in the computer printout of who accessed the system, and when.

How, for example, is access through the gate controlled? Perhaps most common is the telephone-entry system, whereby someone drives to the gate and pushes a call button, which interfaces with the telephone unit in the home. From inside the home - or, through the magic of call-forwarding, from a telephone anywhere in the world — the owner can punch in a code to activate the gate. By punching in a different code number, the owner can instruct the gate to stay in the open position, a convenient option during construction work or a social event. The telephone-entry system can also be controlled simply by punching in private control codes at the gate.


A second access-control system is the digital keypad, with prearranged access codes, whereby the visitor punches in a code at the gate to activate the operator. The gate owner can assign different access codes to different users, continued on following page

and can add or eliminate codes at will. A third system, useful in a multifamily unit, is the *program card*, which reads access from a magnetic strip. The fourth is a *radio control*, a hand-held or visor-attached radio-beam device operated by radio signal. The fifth is a *timer*, which can either be manually controlled at the gate, or set from the home to open and close the gate at certain intervals. The final one is a *computer system*, interfacing with other high-tech security features of lighting and surveillance.

There are other features to consider in fully outfitting a gate-operator system. Systems dependent on electricity for their operation should have either a backup power supply or a manual-control option. A siren-sensitive operator will open the gate to the fire department and other emergency vehicles. It is possible to have tie-ins with burglar and fire alarms. A drive alert rings inside the house when a car enters, or a closed-circuit TV will show the vehicle's entry. Surge protectors are sometimes a wise addition to the wiring system. Swing gates can be provided with electromagnetic-locking systems, which prevent the gate from being deflected by wind or pried open.

Safety devices are normally installed under or within the sweep of the gate



Gate Safety and Liability Issues

The Underwriters Laboratories is currently developing new standards to enhance gate operator safety, including certification requirements.

The Standards Committee of the National Ornamental and Miscellaneous Metals Association (NOMMA, 804 Main St., Suite E, Forest Park, GA 30050-1476) has appointed a Gate Operator Safety Task Force. Brent Nichols of Picasso Gates is leading the representation of NOMMA from the perspective of gate fabricators and operator installers.

Also representing the industry is Door and Access Systems Manufacturers Association International. (DASMAI, 1300 Sumner Ave., Cleveland, OH 44115-2851.)

to prevent the gate from closing on a stalled car or on a child. These safety devices can either be in-ground magnetic loops or photocell units. The magnetic loops are generally installed in the ground and hard-wired to a control panel, and photocell and photoelectric probes are beam-oriented and above-ground. All driveway surfaces — asphalt, concrete, gravel, or dirt — can be adapted to these safety devices, which should be considered an essential element of the installation.

It is also advisable to consider the addition of a reversing edge, which reverses the direction of gate motion when it encounters an object. The purpose of the safety feature, whether magnetic loop, photocell, or the reversing edge, is for the gate to immediately stop and/or reverse when it observes an object of a preset density.

Automated Antiques: Is it Possible?

Automating an older gate is not always possible or advisable. Older gates built with mortise-and-tenon joints or other mechanical fastening methods can be destroyed in short order with automation. The reason for this is that each hard stop, as the gate operator completes an opening cycle, exerts considerable wrack on the gate structure, loosening the joints. Another consideration is the structural integrity of the gate; a gate meant for swinging open gently by hand may not have sufficient cross bracing to withstand the torque of the operator.

Jim Wallace, of the National Ornamental Metal Museum of Memphis, Tennessee, ran into this problem with gates that were not even that old, when the museum was asked to restore the gates at Graceland. In taking the gates down, the museum staff discovered that a pair of gate operators, slapped on after the gates were built, had created a great deal of wrack in the gates. The museum protested the idea of putting the gates back up for more torque torture, and Graceland's gates are now braced up through the center to support operator thrust.

Antique gates or restoration pieces that were originally designed for manual opening and closing must be carefully evaluated for structural integrity before adding automated-closure systems in order to ensure that the gate does not fail. Critical points of inspection are the hinging system, the joinery, and the strength of the bracing. It is possible in some cases to internally restructure these critical areas to account for the excess torque generated by the opening system, but the work should be done by a design professional whose knowledge of operator systems is equal to his or her respect for the traditional lines of the gate.


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
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PLANTERS & URNS

Finding the Ideal Planter

Finding the ideal planter, urn, or vase for a building entrance, terrace, garden, urban plaza, or park requires a basic understanding of the characteristic advantages and disadvantages of planter materials. A landscape architect reviews the glossary of what's available today.

Planter materials include metals, wood, carved stone, cast stone, terra cotta, and fiberglass. Each material has a distinctive history and aesthetic, as well as more pragmatic qualities relating to durability, maintenance, weight, and cost. What follows are some of the properties of commonly available materials; understanding them will help you select the ideal planter.

=Metals=

CAST IRON: Since the early 1800s, cast iron has been a popular material for garden planters and ornament because it was cheap to produce. Cast iron, a ferrous metal containing between 2 and 4% carbon, is an environmentally resourceful material because it includes recycled scrap metals, such as used engine and auto parts. Although cast iron is both brittle and strong (in terms of compressive strength), the appearance, strength, and workability of iron is affected by the characteristics of the iron ore, the percentage of carbon, the addition of other elements, and the process of smelting and cooling.

Typically, cast-iron manufacturers, such as Robinson Iron Corp. or Florentine Craftmen, use a sand-casting system in which the molten iron is poured into "flasks" of sand supported within a box. The surface of the cast should be smooth and relatively free of holes or pits; parting lines should be clean. Because it is such a hard metal, it is difficult to remove blemishes caused by casting. Depending on the complexity of the shape, a planter is comprised of many cast pieces that must be assembled and welded with cast-iron or nickel rods, then ground smooth and finished. For instance, Florentine Craftsmen's French Topiary Box is comprised of sixteen separate pieces. Welding the separate cast pieces is a relatively new practice. Antique cast-iron urns were typically bolted rather than welded. Florentine Craftmen often repairs old cast-iron pieces that have corroded around these steel fastening bolts and pins.

Cast iron is typically primed with epoxy or zinc and finished with polyurethane to provide important protection from the otherwise inevitable corrosion of this metal from oxidation. Robinson Iron uses a zinc-rich urethane primer followed by an acrylic polyurethane enamel. Although oxidation creates a protective layer of "rust," Skip Brown of Florentine Craftsmen has seen antique cast-iron pieces which have literally "rotted away" due in part to contact with soil acids. Finishes typically need to be touched up every three to five years in order to maintain a high-gloss surface, and planters will need to be completely refinished every six to eight years. To refinish, the planter is usually stripped down to bare metal. Robinson Iron provides useful guidelines for the general maintenance, cleaning, and refinishing of their cast-iron work.

Cast iron is strong, heavy, and well suited for the inner stress of the volumes of soil associated with large planters. Due to its density, a cast-iron planter is difficult to move or steal. This is an important advantage in public spaces. However, being brittle poses a problem. If a cast-iron urn is dropped or hit hard, it will probably crack. The abundance of iron in the earth's crust and the availability of scrap metals make cast iron the least expensive of all the metal planters.

ALUMINUM: The value of aluminum has changed drastically over the past century. Don A. Watson writes in his book, *Construction Materials and Processes*, "Napoleon III reserved table settings made of this precious metal for honored guests, his other guests had to be content with solid gold or silver utensils." Aluminum has become popular within the last century for planters (and more available than silver or gold planters), because it is adaptable to many forming methods; is made strong and durable by the addition of alloying agents, such as nickel or zinc; and is an abundant natural resource. Like cast iron, aluminum is typically sand-cast. The quality and cost of aluminum varies tremendously. Very low-quality aluminum will have many pits and holes and will need to be filled with body putty. (These repairs may be hidden to the consumer by paint.)

conditions. Baked-on, powder-coat finishes are protective yet problematic to maintain. Corrosion may travel under cracks that are difficult to seal because paint will not adhere to the hard finish. To refinish a powder-coat surface, all of the old finish must be removed.

Aluminum's resistance to corrosion by salts or pollutants makes it ideal for planters. Unlike cast iron or copper, it will not stain the surfaces beneath it while weathering. And aluminum planters are the lightest of all the metal planters rendering them particularly suitable for rooftops. Although aluminum may cost more per pound than bronze, its overall lightness makes it less expensive per piece.

LEAD: Lead has been popular for use in garden ornament and planters since the late 1600s because it was cheaper to acquire than bronze, stone, or marble and could be cast at much lower heating levels than other metals. In fact, one can melt lead on a stove top or fire. To cast a lead planter, molten lead is poured into molds. The lead components are then soldered together, and the details chased by hand. Unlike other harder metals, lead is still malleable when cooled; therefore, fine details may be more easily chased into this metal than others.

Most antique lead urns were painted to resemble stone, brass, or bronze. When left natural (more common these days), lead turns an ashen gray. Florentine Craftmen applies an acid wash to the shiny silver surface of a new lead piece to speed up the patination process. Butcher's wax or oils may be used to maintain a darker finish.

Lead makes a great planter because it is malleable, pliable, easily cast into intricate shapes, resistant to corrosion, and very dense. Its density makes it a poor choice for places where weight is a concern, such as rooftops. A lead urn will weigh approximately five times more than a comparably sized aluminum urn. Its weight can also stress the socles of a top-heavy vase because it is unable to support its own weight. Therefore, there are certain shapes and designs that make more sense for this material. In order to protect plant roots from the toxicity of lead, lead planters should be lined with a protective coating. Kenneth Lynch, for example, paints a fiberglass coating on the inside of their urns.

BRONZE: Although bronze planters have been made since the 1700s, particularly in France and Italy, the use of bronze has always been limited due to the expense of the raw material. In fact, less expensive materials, such as lead, cast iron, stone, and artificial stone can all be finished to look like bronze. Historically, bronze was reserved for important public statues. Like cast iron, bronze may be sand cast or cast by the more elaborate and expensive lost-wax process, a process that allows more intricate detailing.

Bronze is strong — and less brittle than iron and zinc. Its beautiful luster, maintained by frequent cleaning and waxing, and natural green patinas make it a desirable choice for fancy and limited situations. Bronze continues to be one of the most expensive metals for planters. A bronze urn will be about three times the cost of a cast-iron urn, comparably sized.


COPPER: Copper is an extremely flexible metal that, according to Watson, may be "rolled, drawn, extruded, spun, formed, hammered, welded, brazed, and soldered." Unlike cast iron, lead, or bronze, it is often fabricated instead of cast, which means that one-of-a-kind shapes may be more economically made. This is important when exact sizes for planters are needed in such places as a small step or oddly shaped terrace corner. Copper Sculptures, Brandon, Miss., uses sheets of "half soft copper," which are 98% copper, to fabricate planters welded with copper. Copper Sculptures' Bill Shook warns of using lead welds on copper pieces. Because these metals have different rates of thermal expansion, he has repaired many copper planters, broken at the seam of a lead weld. Copper is extremely durable, relatively soft, and beautiful. Copper will naturally develop a green patina over a period of five to ten years. It takes a lot of buffing to keep the "new penny" look. Some acid washes may be used to speed up the patination of copper, which is important if staining is an issue. Copper Sculptures offers various patina solutions to create blues, burgundies, and green - patinas Shook likens to terra-cotta glazes. According to Shook, copper planters need to be lined to protect the plant roots. Copper sulfate is a commonly used herbicide. Although some recommend the use of bone meals in the soil to neutralize the sulfate, it is safer and requires much less maintenance to simply line the planters. Copper Sculptures uses a swimming-pool paint on the inside of its planters. Copper planters make sense in less traditional landscapes where original designs are desired. This metal is cheaper than bronze, stainless steel, or lead but more expensive than aluminum and cast iron.

Although exposure to weather causes surface oxidation, which dulls and slightly pits the surface, a protective powdery white coat forms — ultimately slowing the rate of oxidation. Longwood Garden keeps unfinished aluminum furniture cast by Florentine Craftmen which has turned a chalky white. Most of the weathering occurs in the first few years.

Various mechanical and chemical processes provide a range of surface textures for aluminum planters, such as "bright-buffed," scratch-brushed, satin, sandblasted, frosted, polished, or enameled. At Duncan-Lakkes, a small Midwestern shop specializing in cast aluminum, the aluminum is coated with a zinc-chromate primer that helps paint adhere to the aluminum and inhibits corrosion. Although aluminum planters may last for a hundred years, the paint finish will need to be refinished every 5 to 10 years, depending on weather

WOOD: For the sake of durability, wooden planters should be constructed from rot-resistant woods with natural oils, such as cedar, pine, teak, and mahogany. In order to reduce demand on over-harvested trees, it is important to seek out new varieties of woods. In *Your Natural Home*, Janet Marinelli and Paul Bierman-Lytle list lesser-known, rot-resistant woods, both tropical (such as Billy Webb, Chontaquiro, Narra, Malas, Shihuahuaco) and domestic (such as Aromatic Cedar, Cherry, Osage Orange, and Sassafras). The Rainforest Alliance's Smart Wood Program, the world's largest forestry certification program, independently evaluates "forest management practices, forest products, timber sources, and companies, enabling the public to identify products and practices that do not destroy forests."

Although softwoods (e.g., cedar or pine) are easier to work with than hardwoods (e.g., mahogany or teak), softness is a disadvantage if the planter is placed in a high-traffic area. Marine plywood will outlast "exterior plywood" due to the quality of the lamination; however, according to Jeff Mills, of Mills & Co., even marine plywood will, over time, check and warp.

The quality of hardware and sealant also affects the durability of a wooden planter. Weather-resistant hardware like copper, bronze, or stainless steel should be used, and polysulfide clear marine caulks are ideal for moist conditions. The way the wood is joined also affects durability. For instance, miter joints may open up over time in response to the swelling and contraction associated with a moist environment, while a more integrated mortise-andtenon joint will be more apt to stay together. Drainage holes, covered with soil filter fabric and feet that lift the bottom of the planter off the ground, will also add to the planter's longevity.

Rot-resistant woods reduce the need for toxic preservatives. Cedar, for instance, requires no preservative, due to its inherent oils. However, stains and paints provide variations in aesthetic qualities. In general, multiple and thin coats of stains or finishes, which allow each layer to thoroughly penetrate, are preferable to thick coats. Sanding in between coats will also improve adhesion and durability of the finish. Penetrating stains will require less refinishing maintenance than paint, which will chip and peel. Metal, rubber, or plastic liners provide critical additional protection of the wood from the moist soil of the planter.

Recycled plastic lumber, manufactured from commingled thermoplastics, such as milk jugs, pop bottles, and bubble wrap, may be substituted for real wood. Although plastic lumber does not have the textural, visual, or structural qualities of wood, it is an environmentally responsible material. It can be fastened with stainless steel and colored with dyes.

One of the most significant advantages of wood is that it is easily fabricated into custom sizes. Often the standard-sized, prefabricated wooden planters do not fit specific locations or planting needs. Although less durable than stone or metal, wood is the most economical of all the planter materials for custom-designed large planters. Obviously, the availability and workability of the wood will affect cost. For instance, a custom-built teak planter costs about thirty percent more than a cedar planter, due to both the cost of the wood and the increased skill required to work with a hardwood.

Stone

CARVED STONE: Stone is probably the earliest and oldest material used for planters. Its use has been recorded as early as the late 1600s, but by the end of the 19th century, the output of stone garden urns had seriously declined due to the skill and expense required for carving. Today, however, in a few places with a strong local craft tradition and plentiful quantities of appropriate stone, planters are still being hand carved in Portland stone, Vicenza stone, Bath stone, and various marbles.

Although stone may appear strong, weather and humidity weakens this material over time. According to John Davis, in his book Antique Garden Ornament, very few of the early antique stone urns have survived the English climate, and most stones will show signs of decay within 100 years. The chief causes of decay are chemical (atmospheric pollution and soluble salts), physical (frost and thermal stresses), and biological (algae, fungi, lichens, mosses). Air pollution causes a buildup of calcium sulfates in reaction to airborne sulfur acids. Cleaning and waxing will provide some protection. Depending on the porosity of the particular stone, alternate freezing and thawing cycles and thermal stress, caused by hot days and cool nights, may create fissures that weaken the structure of the stone. Although algae, lichen, and mosses are attractive, they will increase water retention in the planter, which will eventually contribute to structural breakdown. Stone's durability, strength, and beauty are ideal planter qualities. Although its weight makes it difficult to steal, this heavy material may cause problems on decks or rooftops. Its high cost, compared to the many cast-stone planters on the market, limits the use of stone planters to special situations. CAST STONE & CAST CONCRETE: Cast stone has been a popular material for garden planters since the late-18th century. One of the earliest and most famous fired cast-stone planters was made by the English company, Coade Works. At first, cast stone was considered unacceptable because it was "artificial" and "imitative," but today this material is considered to be an economical and pleasing substitute for more costly hand-carved stone. The distinction between cast stone and cast concrete is not universally agreed upon. Haddonstone distinguishes its cast stone from cast concrete by a lower waterto-cement ratio and the dry-mix process. Others distinguish cast concrete from cast stone by the larger size of coarse aggregate used in concrete mixes. Both cast stone and cast concrete contain a mix of cement, sand, water, and aggregates, solidified by chemical action. Various "limey" stones are used in the aggregate mix. For instance, Haddonstone uses an Oolitic limestone dust while

Florentine Craftsmen and Kenneth Lynch use marble chips and sands. Each company's proprietary mix creates different textures, colors, and porosity. It is important that the mix not be too coarse, since larger chunks and pebbles will eventually be exposed by weathering. On the other hand, a very good quality weathered cast-stone piece will be indistinguishable from smooth limestone.

Cast stone may be made by either a "wet-mix" or "dry-mix" process. In the "dry-mix" process, a damp mix is pounded by hand into a mold. Haddonstone observes that the dry-casting process, although more labor-intensive, eliminates the bubbles associated with wet casting. Also, in dry-casting, it is possible to pick up a lot of undercutting detail so that the planter has more of the appearance of carved stone. At Haddonstone, after one day in the mold, the casting is released and then placed in a curing shed for three days where constant, fine misting ensures that the cementitious stone will harden consistently. After the moist curing, pieces are cured for 14 more days in the environmentally controlled stockyard. In the wet process, a stone slurry is poured into a mold. Florentine Craftsmen asserts that the wet process reduces the porosity of the final piece. They also apply a slurry coat after the first casting to fill in any "blow holes" left by air bubbles.

Lunaform makes cement-based planters that are completely frost-proof. The cement is first formed around a mold, then reinforced with a steel mesh covered with more cement mix and finally turned on a wheel. Although strong, these planters are also slightly heavier than other cast-stone planters. For instance, a 25-in.-dia. x 19-in.-high Lunaform Roman pot will weigh about ten percent more than a comparable Haddonstone pot, making it more suitable for a garden than a rooftop.

Stable pigments and stone dust may be added to cast stone and concrete mixes to achieve the appearance of particular stones. For instance, Haddonstone offers Portland, Bath, Cotswold, and terra-cotta finishes, as well as an organic formulation called "New Stoneage," which encourages the development of algae and lichen. Lunaform planters are available in a wide range of finishes, including Tuscan Red, Terra-Cotta, Roman Red, Bluestone, Limestone, Fieldstone, and Basalt.

Cast stone has other advantages besides being easy to produce. It weathers well in Northern climates and requires no maintenance. The integral color of cast stone will change with weathering, creating a desirable variation in color. This "antiquing" may be also simulated by the addition of grey dyes. Although cast stone withstands the expansion and contraction of soil during freezing and thawing, it is important that drainage is maintained to reduce the pressure caused by ice. (Clay-based cast stone is considered more weatherproof than cement-based, because clay-based stone is fired.) However, in New York City's climate, it is rare for a thick cast-stone piece to crack from freezing weather. On the other hand, cast stone is susceptible to abrasion and chipping. Hairline cracking may also occur if a cast-stone planter is watered during the heat of the day, due to the stress caused by a differential temperature gradient. (It is not advisable to water plants in the heat of a summer day anyway.)

The cost of cast stone and cast concrete varies according to the composition of the piece and the complexity of the casting and curing process. Although the cost of making the first piece, which entails making a mold, may be comparable to carving stone, the cost per piece goes down with each reproduction, making cast stone less expensive than carved stone (or any of the metal planters), but more expensive than terra cotta.

STerra Cotta


TERRA COTTA: In Latin, terra cotta means "earth baked." Clays are combined with water to create a "slip," which is next passed through a sieve to remove impurities, then pumped under pressure into a "filter press." The clay is either hand formed, hand wheeled, or machine wheeled and then fired in a kiln or partially baked by the sun. Many suppliers buy from Greek, Italian, or Mexican potters, each with their distinct clays and pottery traditions. For instance, Architectural Pottery's Italian planters are hand packed (many terra-cotta pots on the market are machine packed) in chalk molds and high fired at 2000 degrees for four days. The Italian clay is green in the earth, as opposed to the red clay found in North America. According to Grace Shaver, of Architectural Pottery, their hand-formed planters contain the marks of the master potters' fingerprints.

Seibert and Rice's pottery is made in Impruneta, Italy, a town where potters have passed their artistry skills and techniques through the generations of four centuries. The local clay dries a distinctive pink with chalky markings, rather than the more common orange terra cotta. These planters are very durable, due to a combination of the porosity of the clay and the high-firing techniques. Original Impruneta planters, made as early as the 1600s, can still be found in European gardens.

Architectural Pottery's Greek planters have an intentionally rougher or

pitted surface that makes them look antique. Some of the pitting is created by placing in the kiln ground olive pits that pop against the pots during firing. After the Greek pots are fired, they are filled with cold water, thereby leaching out salts and impurities, which also creates a beautiful chalky finish. In contrast to both Greek and Italian traditions, many of the terra-cotta pots made in the U.S. are kiln-dried for a much shorter duration and at much lower temperatures and then partially dried in the sun.

Besides the quality of the clay and the craftsmanship of forming the shape, the process of firing greatly affects the quality of the planter. Firing a large piece takes several days. Because clay contains water, quick increases in heat levels can blow a pot apart as the water expands and changes to steam. Therefore, heat levels must be raised slowly. According to Jim Keeling's book, *The New Terra Cotta Gardener*, it may take 12 hours to reach 752 degrees F and 14 more hours to reach 1832 degrees F. Planters must also be cooled slowly; a large one may take up to three days to cool. If under-fired, the planter will not be as frostproof because it is too porous; if over-fired, it may slump or melt out of shape. Terra cotta typically cracks with freeze/thaw cycles and generally should be emptied of plants and soil before freezing weather. The planters, if kept dry or *continued on page 61*



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
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
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

easily repaired by resin/glue mixes. Paul Sciabbarrasi describes the molding process of fiberglass: "We lay the fiberglass, which is like shreds of spaghetti, into the resin, then add more resin, then more fiberglass, and again more resin. The fiberglass cures at room temperature within a half hour, then the loose ends are removed, ground down, and washed with acetone, which cleans off the wax residue from the mold." Any imperfections are filled with resin by hand and finish sanded. It may take nearly a day for one person to finish a pot. The finishes may be integrated into the fiberglass mix or applied. An integrated color dye will wear better over time and require less maintenance. Available finishes include various colors, some of which imitate stone or terra cotta.

Although the price of fiberglass planters varies tremendously with the quality, in general fiberglass planters are among the least expensive. They are durable and, though untraditional, can very convincingly replicate historical materials and shapes.

SFollowing Fashion

Although century-old traditions continue - like the carving of Portland Stone or the hand forming of Impruneta terra cotta - planters continue to evolve with






the development of new materials, mixes, and finishes. These improvements strive for durability, aesthetic variations, less maintenance, and lower cost. Fashions also change. A lead planter, which once imitated bronze, today will typically be finished naturally. Cast iron was once considered crude and cast stone, artificial; now they are both seen as desirable materials. Perhaps fiberglass will one day be considered traditional and finished to look like itself.

SPECIFYING ARCHITECTURAL TERRA COTTA

Terra cotta was one of the most common building materials at the turn of the century. But many of today's designers are not familiar with the fine points of specifying architectural terra cotta. Here are some guidelines from one of the country's leading manufacturers.


Terra cotta is one of the most prevalent construction materials in the urban centers of our nation's older cities. One of terra cotta's most attractive characteristics is its ability to replicate a wide range of natural stones. Ironically, this ability to simulate stone prevents many people from recognizing that they are looking at this versatile manufactured building material rather than quarried stone. As a result, terra cotta may not receive the recognition it deserves as a historically significant architectural building material.

Unfortunately, many of today's specifiers are more familiar with some of the newer substitute materials, such as GFRC, FRP, precast concrete, or cast stone. Consequently, the use of replacement terra cotta on restoration projects may never receive adequate consideration., so on terra-cotta restoration projects the use of true terra cotta may never receive serious consideration. When given sufficient lead time, and the specifier's willingness to work with the terra-cotta manufacturer early in the design process, use of "the real thing" is more practical and affordable than many realize.

To assist designers and specifiers in the use of architectural terra cotta, our company has issued a revised version of the specifications originally contained in *Architectural Terra Cotta - Standard Construction*, published in 1914 and 1927 by the National Terra Cotta Society. The changes made in our revision are the result of extended experience in manufacturing and in modern building methods, plus careful study of the behavior and weathering properties of exterior building materials.

Proper Installation

No matter how well terra cotta is manufactured, if it is not correctly installed, the job will not be satisfactory. For this reason, four pages of our eight-page guide specification are devoted to installation details. In the box below, you'll

SAMPLE TERRA-COTTA SPECIFICATION

A. GENERAL INFORMATION — DRAWINGS & SCHEDULES

1. The architect shall provide necessary drawings, details, and other information required for the production of architectural Terra Cotta, including drawings for all classes of work with which the Terra Cotta engages.

2. Wherever Terra Cotta is required to match in contour, color, finish, and surface treatment, existing Terra Cotta, as for example in connection with alterations or additions to existing work, the Terra Cotta manufacturer shall be furnish with the required profiles and samples of the original work, and other needed information.

3. Shop drawings showing details of construction and jointing of architectural Terra Cotta shall be submitted by the Manufacturer to the Contractor (if such submittal is specified in the contract specifications and/or contract drawings) for approval by both the Architect and the Contractor prior to the production of any material. Shop drawings shall show sections, dimensions, and the connection with other work. (If anchored, the placement of typical and special anchors, grooves, etc., shall be shown.) These drawings must conform as nearly as possible to the architect's drawings, but shall be in accordance with good Terra Cotta structural practice. 4. All pieces of Terra Cotta shall be numbered. The Terra Cotta manufacturer shall provide two copies of the complete set of scale shop drawings to be used for setting and showing the piece numbering of the Terra Cotta, and the size of the joints to be used for setting the various portions of the work clearly indicated. These drawings shall be designated as the setting drawings.

B. MATERIAL

5. The architectural Terra Cotta shall be a fired clay product of the best quality as manufactured by [name of manufacturer] or of approved equal quality. All architectural Terra Cotta shall be in accordance with the architect's drawings and details, or shop drawings produced by (manufacturer) and approved by Architect and Contractor. All products shall meet or exceed Part II Table I of standard Specifications for Ceramic Veneer in the "Public works Specifications - CERAMIC VE-NEER" of the Architectural Terra Cotta Institute, October 1961, A.I.A. File No. 9. 6. All ornament shall be artistically modeled by the Terra Cotta manufacturer's staff artists. (Or, models made to Terra Cotta shrinkage scale will be furnished to Terra Cotta manufacturer, without cost to him, securely crated for shipment f.o.b. modeler's studio at [location of studio]). 7. Terra Cotta manufacturer will submit 6-in. x 6-in. tiles (unless otherwise specified) in a range of color(s) and texture(s) as samples of clay body, ceramic finish, and texture to the Architect for approval. Upon acceptance of a tile sample, a full-size prototype will be provided (if specified), covered on all exposed surfaces with the ceramic finish, for final approval. All materials shall conform to the approved samples within the range, subject to normal ceramic variation.

8. The surface finish, ceramic finish, and color of all exposed surfaces of Terra Cotta shall be as indicated by the Architect's drawings or as specified for surface and ceramic treatments.

C. DESIGN & STRUCTURE OF TERRA COTTA UNITS

9. Walls shall not be less than one inch thick and partitions shall be of such thickness and so spaced as to perform their proper functions with regard to form and structure. Each piece of Terra Cotta shall be provided with the necessary anchor holes and hand holes and shall be so formed as to properly engage the structure. Beds generally shall be not less than 4-in. deep. 10. In concrete or steel frame buildings, the veneer or facing material should be fully and continuously supported, at each floor level on shelf supports, of adequate strength and stiffness, rigidly connected to the structural frame. Steel shelf angles or supports, in all cases, should be located in mortar joints. The strength of the Terra Cotta should not be unnecessarily reduced by cutting the webs to receive the steel.

11. Properly constructed flashing should be provided to cover the top of large projecting horizontal courses, the backs and tops of parapet walls, wide-exposed sill courses, etc., and all projecting features should have drips.

12. Reglets shall be provided to receive gutter linings and flashings when the joints cannot be used for the purpose. Raggles shall be not less than 1/4-in. deep, unless otherwise specified.

13. The volume changes incident to the setting and hardening of concrete and the variations in volume of concrete due to humidity and temperature conditions, require provisions to allow free movement of the supporting frame and make it undesirable to completely fill a facing applied to a concrete structure.

14. All joints shall be straight and true and of an approximate uniform width of 1/4 in. All Terra Cotta shall be laid out at the factory to test it for uniformity of joint widths and over-all dimensions. Where necessary to secure accurate dimensions and uniform joint widths, the material shall be sized straight and true. 15. Proper provision should be made for expansion joints, at shelf supports, over columns caps, etc., to prevent the development of disruptive stresses caused by deflection, wind pressure, temperature changes, settlement, and like forces.

The complete sample specification contains additional sections on the transportation and proper installation of architectural Terra Cotta.

TERRA-COTTA REPLACEMENT: Molded Substitute Materials

When faced with replacing or replicating terra cotta, many specifiers automatically assume it will be far more economical to use one of the modern thin-shell composites. Here, a fabricator experienced in using all the contemporary materials, shows that it's not that simple.

or better or worse, the decision to use a substitute material as a terra-cotta replacement is frequently made at the moment that an owner and/or the architect see side-by-side examples of an exact reproduction next to an original part. "And the replica is cheaper, available next week, and only weighs a fraction of the real stuff."

Certainly the ability to create a strong visual replica is compelling, but with many modern materials, the technology of molding and finishing the material can be the easy part. The tougher part begins as you expose the system to the trades that integrate it with the various other structural and cladding components, seal it up, and stand back and let mother nature go to work.

Our learning curves with building materials are usually long-term propositions. Take, for example, terra cotta itself, which came on the market about a century ago as a substitute material for carved stone (which, of course, was too expensive, took too long to obtain, and weighed too much). Many early installations of architectural terra cotta were fraught with difficulties ranging from glaze problems to major structural failures as the industry learned how the material worked over time in a building facade. But, with time and experience, the understanding of this complex material has evolved.

This evolution is significant in a number of ways. The technology of terra cotta is a body of knowledge and standards ranging from production to its installation detailing and interface with other materials. There are divisions of responsibility regarding such areas as engineering design and trade jurisdictions for erection. The availability of comprehensive specifications and bid documents is imperative in achieving a quality finished product, especially with competitively bid contracts that are common with major public and institutional buildings where terra cotta is often found.

So what does this mean about the alphabet soup of replacement material options, many of which are relatively new or have limited histories in architectural applications? The answer, I think, is that we must be very cautious and observant and ask the right questions (which frequently stem from past failures). And remember, there ain't no such thing as a free lunch; there are almost always trade-offs and compromises as we assess the options.

Over the last 20 years our company has employed most all of the moldable options as substitutes for terra cotta with varying degrees of success. Sometimes we tend to ignore some of the easiest and least expensive options like painted wood, stucco and even sheet metal, but in the interest of visual accuracy, we're usually looking for solutions that reproduce the complex shapes and joints typical of hand-pressed terra cotta.

Pros & Cons of Substitute Materials

Many of the claimed advantages of today's substitute materials do have merit. They can be cheaper, sometimes substantially so, if, for example, molds can be obtained from existing original parts. Most molded reproduction materials undergo only slight dimensional changes in their production, unlike terra cotta, which shrinks as much as an inch per foot during firing. Whereas small size variations in replicas made from substitute materials can be absorbed in the grout joints, the manufacture of terra-cotta replacements needs to start over with costly new models that are oversized to accommodate clay shrinkage.

Much of the individual variety and visual character of terra-cotta pieces results from dimensional changes that occur during its firing. Molded parts can be too precise and consistent unless the producer takes the time to replicate the variations, which may then require the construction of additional molds so as not to see the same variations repeating from part to part.

Actual production costs can vary widely with various producers and alternate materials, but it's probably a safe assumption that most substitutes do not have the added costs of the high scrap rate that larger, complex terra cotta pieces are subject to, nor the energy cost of firing parts for several days. It's not unusual for true terra cotta to be less expensive than substitute materials when parts, such as trims and copings, are small and the quantities allow the costs of relatively simple models to be spread over more units. Don't forget that part costs are only a portion of the total replacement budget. Especially where access is a factor, installation costs can exceed the part cost, and any cost comparison should include long-term maintenance considerations. Production lead times are a frequently mentioned rationale for looking to substitute materials. Compared to terra-cotta producers, whose capacities are limited by the throughput of their kilns, the reproduction molder might more easily expand by making a few more molds and adding a person or two as the schedule demands. However, the sad reality is that all of the replacement options, including terra cotta, are very labor-intensive and time-consuming processes that can create scheduling problems when they're not planned for. And of course it's true that many reproductions, especially thin-shell glass-fiber reinforced composites, can offer a great savings in weight over terra cotta parts. The term glass-fiber (as opposed to fiberglass) is used to describe the reinforcement material which is combined with various matrix systems ranging from polymers to cement, gypsum, and, in some cases, combinations of several of the above. The lines can get fuzzy regarding what some of the

hybrid systems really are, not to mention what CSI specification section they may fall under.

FRP Replacements

The term fiberglass (or FRP — Fiber-Reinforced Plastic) is usually applied to the combination of a polymer resin (most often polyester) and glass fiber. If there is a single material that comes to mind when substitute materials are mentioned, it would likely be fiberglass. To its detriment, FRP is often described in a way similar to terms used for terra cotta in the last century: waterproof, virtually maintenance-free, and, of course, it's cheap. Will we ever learn? FRP (and its latter-day thin-shelled variants) can and have been used successfully as durable, long-term replacements for terra cotta. Unfortunately, when these materials are appropriately designed, produced, and installed, they are seldom cheap, nor are they maintenance-free.

When considering the use of substitute materials for a terra cotta project, it's important to look first at the why and where of the holes to be filled before spending much time on the material and technique options. Is the original material missing or damaged because someone in the 1950s thought a sleek, flat storefront looked better than those old-fashioned ornamental pilasters? Or, did it fall off from a basic design flaw, or, more likely, from a lack of anything faintly resembling maintenance? Difficult access to some areas may mean that the replacement work may not see much future maintenance either.

This is the science-intensive part of the process; the art comes a bit later. On some of the most successful jobs, much of the analysis is completed and a restoration plan is developed well before the project is put out to bid. Architectural/Engineering specialists perform exploratory and test work both at the jobsite and in the laboratory to identify the likely cause and effect of the existing problems. They define the properties and status of the original terra cotta, grouts, anchors, and underlying structure. Tests of alternative materials and assemblies and grout or sealant options are often performed at this time. Thermal-expansion coefficients, moisture absorption and expansion rates, and relative abilities to accept or transfer loads are reviewed with respect to how various components can coexist in a durable manner.

Integrating a few missing pieces into a load-bearing masonry wall normally involves different methodology than the total replacement of a discrete group of elements such as a cornice that can be isolated from adjacent construction. An assembly of solid precast concrete blocks in a column that rests on grade and supports terra cotta above may work well, but reversing the arrangement and placing the heavier precast on top could invite failure.

The first step in narrowing the materials options is usually the selection of thin-shell or solid-block approaches. In some cases, the shape of a part may influence the selection. Balusters, for example, are usually much easier (albeit heavier) to produce with a mass castable process than to attempt to mold them as a thin-shell, which involves having access to the backside of the part to laminate the layers of glass fiber and matrix material.

Individual block production can be the simplest of methods, especially where molds are taken directly from originals and the parts can be load bearing. Shop drawings can be very minimal and minor dimensional variations can be adjusted with block-to-block spacing.

Sometimes, weight-sensitive situations demand use of the lightest possible option, which would indicate a thin-shell material. The lighter weight of glass-fiber composites may enable the consolidation of multiple blocks in larger, one-piece moldings with false joints, or even assemblies of multiple pieces over subframes. Although this type of construction usually requires more design and engineering effort, if the quantities, shapes, and field conditions lend themselves to it, panelization of this sort can save in the costs of both production and installation.

Some thin-shell composites can be subject to local code restrictions regard-

ing their use for certain types of applications due to their combustible components. Many cementitious systems are noncombustible and most other systems can achieve a UBC Class I flamespread rating, which is suitable for most installations. Compared to most solid materials, thin-shell moldings as a group have higher thermal-expansion coefficients, which must be accommodated in their connections to other materials. Not only do they move more with thermal changes, but their thin sections also heat and cool faster than the larger masses that they may abut or surround.

By sorting through the requirements of a particular project, the decision upon a specific material usually becomes clear. (See accompanying table for descriptions of the most common substitute materials, page 66.)

The best answer to the material question may come down to who's available; finding producers and installers that are experienced, competent, and comfortable with a system may ultimately be more important than the advantages of one material option over another. Forcing an unfamiliar technology upon a construction team may not yield the desired results.

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
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Surface Coatings

Although there are varying opinions on the matter, many thin-shell moldings utilize paint coatings or clear sealers to match typical terra-cotta glazes. Applied coatings can be subtly varied to achieve the color and texture ranges that are usually evident in the original terra-cotta parts. Some FRP producers contend that paints are undesirable and prefer to provide a molded-in gel-coat surface that is pigmented to match the adjacent glazed terra-cotta elements. However, few coatings, whether applied or integral, will continue to match the colorfastness and gloss of vitreous glazes when subjected to years of UV and freeze-thaw exposure. We tend to assume that coatings are an eventual necessity and prefer to do a proper job of the initial preparation and application in our plant. At the least, we're providing a sacrificial layer of additional protection.

Most molding processes involve the use of mold releases or form oils that can interfere with the adhesion of subsequent finishes (as well as caulk and grout) and care must be taken to remove them. The use of highly polished mold surfaces, which is common in the FRP industry, can create problems for paint adhesion, although simply sanding will provide a good tooth to which paint can bond.

It's not uncommon on a restoration project to find several types of coatings applied to various materials that are all intended to match the abutting glazed terra cotta. Some of the more durable coatings such as catalyzed urethanes might be used to finish an FRP part where vapor transmission is not an issue. Next to it is an original terra cotta block with a large cementitious patch which has a specialized masonry coating over the patch and a breathable acrylic finish over both surfaces. All of this might be coordinated during a restoration project, but it may create problems some years later as the building manager tries to carry out a maintenance program. Sometimes the maintenance issues with substitute materials are not so much cost differences as it is the complexity that they involve; e.g., caulking vs. grouting, or repainting rather than simply cleaning.

The technology of substitute materials is constantly changing and developing. The changes aren't always improvements, as evidenced by the (hopefully short-term) decline in some of the properties of paint coatings with the reformulations that have been required to achieve lower VOC emissions. Today both the FRP and GFRC industries have available manuals of recommended practice for architectural products. The GFRC manual is in its third edition, reflecting the lessons of past projects. Even though these publications aren't tailored specifically toward terra-cotta reproductions, they are a good start in defining standard specifications and the evolution of industry methods.

Occasionally, the best solution to these problems may be a combination of materials or techniques. All of these materials (including true terra cotta) can fail with astonishing speed if they are poorly produced and/or installed. Any of these materials can succeed as long-term solutions if they are carefully conceived, executed, and maintained.







MATCHING EXISTING **MASONRY CONSTRUCTION**

Brick color matching is a complicated but not impossible process. Here, an architect and vice president of a Duluth-based architecture/engineering firm unravels the mystery.

Nearly one third of all construction in the United States last year was renovation or reconstruction (from Building Design & Construction, July 1996, p. 8). With much of this nation's wealth in existing facilities and an emphasis on adaptive reuse and historic preservation, brick distributors, contractors, and design professionals are often faced with matching or blending brick to fit existing conditions. Dick Whitney, consultant for Brock White/Standard Brick in Duluth, Minn., reported that 80 percent of their brick units sold in the past year were for matching existing construction or renovation.

Matching existing masonry construction need not be difficult or disappointing. It can be challenging, but it is not impossible. Achieving the correct result involves an understanding of how color is viewed, proper specifying of the review process, and follow-through of the specified process by contractors and design professionals.

People who work with color will tell you that humans view groups of colors as a collage rather than as individual colors. It is the reflection of light off surfaces or objects that we "interpret," rather than seeing the color for itself. Brick construction often involves several colors or more being viewed at once. Given the variation in color and texture in masonry units, combined with the effect mortar has on a group of brick, it is easy to understand how the process of matching and blending can get complicated.

The first step in deciding whether to match or complement existing masonry is to check availability of the existing masonry product with your local or regional masonry supplier or distributor. Most brick suppliers have small (16-x-24 inch) panels of brick for initial selection. These work well to narrow the field of choices quickly. More often than not these are not suitable for making your final selection alone. Assuming there is a product that is relatively close in color and texture, you now have an opportunity to get into the process of proper selection.

The next step involves obtaining actual full-size brick of each of the options selected earlier. I recommend a minimum of 24 brick units for each sample. These can be dry stacked or set with spacers of gray fiberboard to determine the proper percentages of each color represented in the blend. It is important to recognize here the effect mortar has on the final appearance of a wall. For specifiers, I recommend language be included in the specification repeating the above process, if nothing else, simply because the designer cannot control who the supplier will be, particularly when public funds are involved.

Next, it is important for the design professional to not only specify the brick chosen and the blend percentages, but also to specify the final selection process as well as the project goals. It should be clear to prospective bidders whether the goal of the project is to match the existing masonry, or complement it, or even contrast it. The specified process should include the panel or dry stack method noted earlier for review and an actual field sample from an actual shipment for verification. It is this step that sometimes gets overlooked and can

CHOOSING A MORTAR COLOR

Choosing a mortar color to complement the wide range of colors found in clay brick is a sure way to enhance the appeal of a masonry structure. Individual bricks contain thousands of hues which change throughout the day as the reflection of light is altered by brightness and angle. The same is true with mortar color. Mortar color should be utilized as a design tool which can create a totally different look depending upon the color shade selected. Remember, mortar joints make up 18 to 20% of the wall surface. A mortar-color shade will dramatically affect the overall appearance of the wall.

The following criteria should be considered when selecting a mortar color: Mortar Mix Design; Color Pigments; and, Cleaning Procedures.

come extremely dark mortar mixes. Red and black colors are relatively high in tint value and can more easily overcome strong gray portland cements.

If the brick selected is a pastel or light color, the use of a white portland or masonry cement may be necessary to achieve the desired mortar-color shade. It is much easier to address the mortar color shade effects during the design and selection process than to wait for the mason contractor to build multiple mock-up panels without success. Rely on the expertise of the mortar color and cement manufacturers to assist with match work and mix design.

Color Pigments

Eighteen to 20% of the visual surface of the brick wall is mortar. A stable, high-quality color pigment should be utilized to assure a long-lasting mortar-color shade. Color pigments with the longest history of proven longevity in masonry are made from natural and synthetic iron oxides (red, black and vellow), cobalt (blue), titanium oxide (white), and chromium oxide (green). Blends of these pigments will produce brown, tan, copper, orange, chocolate and other colors needed to complement the vast colors found in brick. These pigments exceed the requirements set forth by ASTM-C979, "Pigments for Integrally Colored Concrete." The pigments

are "water-wettable," lightfast, alkali resistant, stable under curing, and will not adversely affect the strength of cement when added at less than 10% of the weight of cementitious ingredients

Pigments made of carbon black have a high-tint strength value and are listed under ASTM-C979, but are generally not accepted by pigment manufacturers who supply pigments to the masonry industry. Exterior masonry mortars colored with carbon black have a history of losing color from the surface of the mortar joint within six months from installation. Carbon black does not blend well with cement. It eventually disappears through weather exposure, leaving the mortar gray or the color of the remaining iron oxide pigments The tint strength of pigments used to color mortar is high. It's best to use a minimum of 1% color based on the total amount of cementitious material to minimize the potential for color variations. Normally the amount of color used in a mortar mix falls between 1% and 7% of the cementitious material weight. Use of color above the 7% dosage will not noticeably improve the intensity of the mortar-color shade.

materials that are too strong can destroy the cement-sand-color bond. Strong acid or high-pressure cleaning devices often wash the cement out of the joint, exposing sand particles and completely changing the color of the joint.

Allow 7 days of curing before cleaning new masonry. Always pre-soak the wall before cleaning to prevent the joint from absorbing the cleaning agent. Failure to pre-wet the wall can make the joints porous and subject to moisture penetration. Keeping the masonry-unit surfaces as clean as possible during placement will make the cleaning process much easier.

It's best to use only cleaners recommended for cleaning colored masonry, and always follow the manufacturer's directions. If you mix your own cleaning solution, make the concentration of muriatic acid no more than 2%. Mortar color has been used successfully for many years and knowledge has accumulated regarding its application. Rely on your supplier to assist you when any questions arise. The proper selection and application of mortar color to your projects can be very rewarding!

Mortar Mix Design

The darkness of the natural gray masonry cement and sand will directly influence the shade of mortar which can be achieved by the addition of color pigments. Some cements are dark, which can limit how clean and bright the mortar color will be. When using portland cement and lime mixtures, keep in mind that a type M base mix is the darkest, with type S and type N becoming lighter. Buff colors have the lowest tint value and require more color to over-



create the wrong results and some hard feelings. When masonry is selected based on dry stacked samples, it is usually from a limited shipment from the distributor and is not from the actual brick produced for your project. As most masons and brick distributors know, the variations in the same type of brick, much less the same run of brick, can vary dramatically. This is primarily due to the clay coming from the earth varying in trace mineral elements, which, when fired, imparts varying hues to the brick. Given this, it is critical to review a brick sample from an actual project shipment. If the 100-brick, mortar-laid sample does not appear correct, several steps can be taken. One is to adjust the mortar color. As stated earlier, this can have a dramatic effect on the way the wall appears. The next obvious step would be to re-adjust the blend of masonry percentages. Lastly, one may need to consider a different brick altogether. This is certainly a last resort at this stage, but one that may need some consideration. It will never be easier and less painless to change the brick than before it is in place.

Submittals

Verification Samples: Submit mock-up panels comprised of the following actual materials, and include no fewer than twenty-four masonry unit samples displaying extremes of color and texture variation to be anticipated in the completed construction: 1) Facing brick. 2) Decorative concrete masonry units. 3) Metal accessories painted to match adjacent masonry materials. 4) Include mortar samples as part of submittal.

I recommend reviewing the accepted wall construction once again as the project proceeds to the 10, 20, and 30% complete stages. This is an opportunity to follow through on the verification of the success of the selection.

For design professionals, this process can be very useful in communication with their client. Brick distributors and masonry contractors certainly have a lot to gain by being proactive in involving others in the selection and verification process. Communication is the key in this process. After all, it is only through communication that structures that meet the expectation of the owner can be built, and that is an objective we all strive to achieve.

Quality Assurance

Mock-up: As soon as possible after the face brick for this project has been tested and physical properties found proper, the General Contractor shall proceed to lay up a sample wall at the project site. Face brick shall be from the actual firing for this project and shall match the appearance of the mounted panel which was used for initial approval of brick appearance. Mortar in sample wall shall comply with specification requirements for exterior masonry. Sample wall shall be 15 courses high and at least 7 brick long. Start no brick work until a dry, minimum 7-day old, sample wall of brick work has been viewed and approved for overall appearance by all parties to the contract. The approved sample wall shall serve as the standard for brick appearance comparison and shall remain on the job site until brick work is accepted. Remove sample wall and all evidence thereof from site upon acceptance of masonry work, unless directed otherwise by the architect/engineer.

PORCH PARTS & TURNINGS

Porch Parts & Turnings

For construction of wood porches (and their parts), it's critical to specify a wood species that will withstand all weather conditions, such as redwood and cedar — materials that have been time-tested. On page 12, Brian Lotz of Timber Holdings, Ltd., describes new developments in exterior-use exotic woods for decks, outbuildings, porches, and other outdoor applications.

Wood, of course, is not the only material in which to construct porch elements. Molded polymer, FRP, and metal are all viable options (vinyl lattice, although not traditional, is also a durable material for porch aprons; unlike wood, it doesn't need repainting). The companies on the *SourceList for Porch Parts & Turnings*, pp. 96-102, sell porch parts in all of these materials.

Epoxies (liquids to consolidate rotted wood and pastes to fill in holes) allow for the repair of pieces that are either mildly damaged or, for some reason, can't be duplicated or replaced. After repair with an epoxy, the piece can be sanded, planed, and painted.

Forty-six suppliers of wood and polymer components and epoxies are shown on the *SourceList*, compiled from the responses from a total of 120 companies the Editors surveyed. Those selected represent a good cross-section of companies that will sell replacement parts or parts for new construction to a professional audience.


⇒ A CEILING & WALL DREAM PROJECT ⇒

In the Renaissance, building interiors were designed by artists and sculptors. A Pennsylvania guild of classically trained artists continues that tradition by creating a richly decorated poolhouse that closely resembles a Roman bath.

(3) Pool-edge mosaic: Create scale drawings of a wave-pattern mosaic for the pool's edge. (4) Color plan: Provide a written paint plan specifying colors for all interior paintable surfaces. Provide renderings of the proposed color scheme. Select appropriate marbles for the interior.

MURALS: (1) Design, execute, and install a mural cycle, comprised of three major and nine minor sections, depicting antique mythological subjects. Major murals will be painted in oil on canvas at the Brushworks studio and installed at the site. Minor murals will be painted in grisaille directly on the soffit walls, and then antiqued. (2) Design and execute an inscription and decorative border in gold leaf or trompe l'oeil carved lettering for the lower section of the upper rotunda walls. (3) Design and execute a faux-fresco mural for the rotunda ceiling dome, to be painted in acrylic directly on the precast dome. Mural will depict a classical sky, with balusters, urns, cherubs flying a kite and throwing paper airplanes, etc. The clients, dressed as Roman senators, will also be part of the composition. (4) Design and execute a faux-fresco mural, depicting a ruined garden with antique statuary for the sitting-area of the lounge. Mural will be painted on site in acrylic, and will cover the wall areas. (5) Design and execute a faux-fresco mural for the wall behind the bar. Mural will be stylistically consistent with the sitting area mural and will also be painted on site in acrylic.

SCULPTURE: (1) Design, execute, cast, and patinate full-relief bronze sculptures for the sitting-area fireplace. Sculptures will consist of two female caryatids, with hands joined in the center, supporting the marble mantelpiece above. Brushworks will also redesign the marble fireplace to accommodate the sculpture. (2) Design, execute, cast, and patinate two full-relief bronze "mer-men" for the spa area. (3) Design, execute, cast, and patinate a full-relief bronze figure, depicting Venus with an attendant cherub, for the spa area. (4) Design, execute, cast, and patinate nine classical bas-relief "artifacts," subject to be determined, for the lounge soffit facade. Artifacts will be interspersed within mythological mural cycle. Reliefs to be cast in hydro-cal plaster, sealed, and antiqued. (5) Design and execute bronze dolphins, to function as handrails for the spa and pool stairs. (6) Design an exterior fountain, with a bronze statue of a faun, for the portico outside the front door of the building. Execute, cast, and patinate faun sculpture. (7) Design and execute a bas-relief frieze, approximately 4 ft. x 120 ft., to decorate the exterior soffit along two sides of the building. Frieze will depict an allegory of life through the stages of a wine harvest.

For the sitting area off the lounge, two bronze caryatids will support the marble mantel that surrounds a gas fireplace.


The team that is Brushworks, Inc. — Corinne Lalin, John Schmidtberger, and Mark Pettegrow — are former classmates at the University of Pennsylvania who started their business seven years ago. Custom stenciling quickly evolved into whole-room design; Pettegrow describes what they do as "visual design rather than interior design." That, and their other skills, allowed them to be called in on projects and win the confidence of the interior designers and architects. "Rather than being the artisans who just fabricated someone else's ideas," continues Pettegrow, "we were brought in earlier in the process, and the architects or designers eventually started to say, 'This is what I'm thinking; let's talk about what we can do together.'"

When Brushworks met with project manager/designer Jeff Fitzroy and softgoods designer Audrey Harrington on the Buck's County poolhouse in







January, 1996, they had that very discussion. A budget was not discussed, nor were limits set on the project. Rough ideas were laid out, furniture and fabrics were looked over, and a first set of blueprints were reviewed. Brushworks was asked to make some suggestions, present a list of ideas, and submit a preliminary proposal. Pencil sketches were faxed back and forth, and changes were made until the client and the manager/designer were satisfied. Then, the architect's computer-generated drawings had to be reviewed to make sure they were properly interpreted. Notes Lalin, "Looking back at pencil sketches always brings it back to an artistic level." Final drawings and execution didn't really get going until April. Concept refinements brought more intricate designs and an even greater amount of detail. During this phase, Brushworks had extensive discussions with the clients, project manager, architect, contractor, and softgoods designer - all of which helped pull the project into focus.

Brushworks was eventually asked to aesthetically guide the project by supervising and collaborating with artisans, like the marble supplier who helped specify stone for the mosaics, floor tiles, columns, and pool copings. The etched glass in the rotunda was executed by a regional artisan who could interpret the Brushworks drawings precisely.

The project scope grew in size — and cost because, as the process developed, "everything in the project was becoming *real* rather than faux," says Pettegrow. For example, specs originally called for Corinthian, faux-finished FRP columns. After a marble floor was agreed upon, marble Doric-style columns seemed more appropriate. "Material and its integrity became foremost. For instance, a cast-aluminum handrail going into the pool suddenly didn't work anymore, so we designed and cast a bronze dolphin that will serve the function of a handrail," Pettegrow adds.

Once the inside was designed, Pettegrow, Lalin, and Schmidtberger were asked to upgrade

the exterior plan in kind. So a plain and square soffit, for example, was detailed with classically styled extruded trim elements and a Doric frieze including 15 bas-reliefs, metopes, and triglyphs. One glass wall will overlook formal, classical gardens with the poolhouse at one of its axes and a vista ranging 20 to 30 miles.

The rotunda, originally planned with a dome above the first story and a closed campanile of clerestory windows, was redesigned. The faux-



fresco dome was raised above the clerestory windows and the exposed inner walls of the campanile were trimmed out with panels in a classical manner. What was an exterior decorative element became a dramatic sunlit interior space, as well.

Pettegrow appreciated both the guidance and freedom allowed by the clients, project manager, and architect: "This project was requested *not* to look new. The client didn't know some of these techniques were even possible, yet they didn't want it to look like a glitter palace. They used phrases like 'sexy with a sense of humor' and 'warm.'" As the decorative motif continued to evolve; mythological themes, sometimes whimsical, began filling the interior space: Venus and Adonis, the annual wine harvest, Poseidon and Amphitrite, among others. The faux-fresco dome features putti flying kites and paper airplanes, and the mosaic floor below actually has a "fallen" paper airplane blended into its otherwise classical design.

"Any project, however magical and unique, is not without its headaches," says Schmidtberger. "Sometimes it seems there is an emergency a day because, of course, when things go up, they're different built than as drawn. Every aspect seems to have become a custom design." But the poolhouse is coming into its own. "On entering," Schmidtberger continues, "your first impression is opulence of materials and a certain formality. Then you begin to take in some of the humorous elements that we've integrated and the rich, warm, inviting colors. The formality is softened, and you can relax. This is a case where structure has become subservient to aesthetics." Many project budgets don't reach the scale of the Bucks County Roman-bath poolhouse, and those that do sometimes opt to buck tradition for its own sake by making a "statement." What's notable - and commendable - about this project is that the clients allowed those who know how to cultivate and elaborate upon classical precedents, which is the essence of the classical tradition, to hold the brush. — Judith Siegel Lief

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

MAILBOXES

DELIVERING THE MALLBOX Specifying mail receptacles is not only a matter of aesthetics but entails

compliance with United States Postal Service requirements, as well.

During the last decades of the century, with new technologies sweeping the United States, buildings became "smarter" with the installation of devices that enhanced interpersonal communication. But the century was the nineteenth and the devices were mail chutes, lobby collection boxes, and their smaller cousins, delivery boxes. In this case, legislation was the mother of invention.


In the 1850s, Congress obliged the United States Post Office Department to provide an array of public services even if the services didn't pay for themselves automatically through revenue from fees and stamp sales. City free delivery was established the next decade, followed by rural free delivery about 30 years later. The result was a perpetually debt-ridden postal service and a tremendous increase in the volume of mail. The first problem wouldn't be corrected until the government mandated self-sustaining postal services in 1970; Cutler Manufacturing began simplifying mail collection much sooner. In 1893, the firm received the first of a series of patents for its chutes. (Indeed, in one of its incarnations, the company called itself Cutler Mail Chute of Rochester, N.Y.)

Essentially, the chutes were small vertical passageways running from the top floor of a building to the lobby. Letters could be introduced into the system through narrow drop slots located on the hallway of each floor. Then, with gravity's help, the mail dropped into one or more collection boxes built into the vestibule. Finally, mailmen would empty the boxes, taking the contents back to the post office for sorting and cancellation.

Cutler's lobby products — and those of its rivals — were handsome, as well as efficient. Typically made of cast bronze, they borrowed decorative themes from the buildings that housed them. Patriotic eagles are common in civic installations, such as the Cutler collection box in Borough Hall in Brooklyn,

N.Y., but they also surface in commercial sites: Striking Art Deco versions of the predatory birds guard the unlabeled boxes in Manhattan's Chrysler Building. Today those eagles, like their real-life counterparts, are relatively endangered. "We're not a true custom house anymore," says Hal Holder, Jr., president of Cutler Manufacturing, now based in Lakeland, Fla. "We still make chutes on a request basis. We also make collection boxes, but they're not usually tied to chutes." The company's more traditional line of boxes ranges from standing floor






units to semi-recessed wall mounts. In keeping with its past, Cutler still works mostly in bronze, with "a few other capabilities, and a range of finishes," Holder concludes.

For true custom work, including the restoration of classic Cutler pieces, consider Historical Arts & Casting, in West Jordan, Utah. The firm designs, builds, and replicates all kinds of historic cast-metal ornaments. "We can build anything the client wants," promises Robert Baird, the firm's vice president of

operations. In its biggest, grandest mailbox project to date, Historical Arts used photographs to recreate Cutler collection boxes for the Monadnock Building, a turn-of-the-century Chicago landmark. In New York City, Historical Arts' efforts can be admired at the Sheraton-St. Regis Hotel and the post office at 90 Church Street. There is more to this type of restoration than meets the eye. Due to interior remodeling, "The chutes may be inoperative," Baird points out. Repairing them may be too costly and, in a building with a modern mailroom, redundant. In this case, the collection box may retain its value as a decorative element. But if the box is going to be operative, it will be necessary to re-engineer certain parts, such as the hinges and the latching, in accordance with current United States Postal Service standards. "The post office won't use the boxes if they don't meet the standards," Baird continues. His final word of warning: "The approval process is tedious." For those in the market for new collection units with old-fashioned appeal, Historical Arts & Casting already has a variety of designs available in both bronze and aluminum.


remain in use at many of the nation's older post offices, although the original combination latch has probably been replaced by an ordinary lock-and-key.

And plenty of pre-war apartment buildings boast vertical brass boxes, their hinge-top doors embellished with slits or cutouts that reveal whether letters have arrived. Many people, even some in the business, believe these boxes aren't being made anymore. That's not exactly true. Salsbury Industries, in Los Angeles, devotes two pages of its catalog to horizontal brass boxes that wouldn't look out of place in a bank built in 1910. Several of the models even have windows. Meanwhile, eagles are taking wing on the gold-finish door of a die-cast aluminum product sold by Security Manufacturing, in Grapevine, Texas. But these boxes can only be installed in places where the mail is neither retrieved nor distributed by U.S. Postal Service employees: universities, hospitals, corporate mailrooms, private postal centers, among others. At other locations, where a lot of people live and work, the salient box question is, "horizontal or vertical?" That's because the minimum interior length of an approved mailbox is 15 inches, to accommodate the newspapers and magazines that, in an earlier era, were simply placed in open racks nearby. The horizontal takes up less wall space, more depth. Both front- and rear-loading styles are prevalent, with a standard choice of brass or aluminum finish. No windows, no cutouts, no ten-pointed stars surrounding the lock. For a more distinctive statement, Janzer Architectural Products, in Hulmeville, Penn., makes the "Parthenon," a decidedly upscale mailbox that can be incorporated into a column or mounted in the wall for walk-up letter delivery through a 9-3/8-in. slot. The Parthenon is finished in either polished brass or polished aluminum and comes in two sizes. Since this is not a U.S.P.S.-approved style, Tom Janzer, president of the company that bears his name, urges buyers to check with their local post office before installation.

Residential Delivery

For mail delivery, traditional options are more limited. At homes and offices, letters were commonly delivered through front-door mail slots. These tend to be too small for contemporary purposes, since we get more — and larger — packages than our ancestors did. Historical Arts & Casting has several slot prototypes crafted to 1990s dimensions. What about those quaint horizontal brass mailboxes, their doors equipped with small glass view windows? They







CONSERVATORIES, SUN ROOMS & GREENHOUSES

A Specifier's Guide to Glass Houses

From conservatories to winter gardens to patio rooms to solariums, the glass house is back in vogue - and thriving.

by James R. Marshall

lass houses - we all know what we're not supposed to do in them. But, if we can control our missile-throwing impulses, there is a whole host of very satisfying things we can do in them. And there is also available to today's architect and builder a host of designs and structures that incorporate glass as an integral component and that serve a wide range of residential applications both aesthetically pleasing and practical.

Structures incorporating glass are hardly new; the Phoenician glass blowers in the First Century A.D. found they could blow hollow cylinders of glass, slit them, and flatten them into sheets for windows. But the modern glass house really started with the Crystal Palace that Prince Albert and the architect Sir Joseph Paxton put together for the Great Exhibition of 1851 in London. This huge structure, with its great arched "herringbones" of glass set into cast-iron frames, was completed in just a few months, using unprecedented modular fabrication and assembly methods, in good time for the May 1, 1851 opening. It so fascinated Londoners that before the opening they came in great numbers (for a fee) to watch the glazing and painting crews at work.

The British maintain their interest in glass houses to this day; almost every English person seems to have a glass structure attached to his house, no matter how modest, for raising plants and flowers. Each year, British conservatory manufacturers vie to see who can design and build the most fanciful structures Gothic or Victorian in style - for Royal Horticultural Society shows at Chelsea and Hampton Court. Winners receive RHS cups and medals.

Conservatory mania has not yet reached this level in the United States. Richard Magner, Director of Oak Leaf Conservatories, Ltd., Atlanta, GA, which brings in custom, or "bespoke" conservatories from its workshops in York, England, says, "We are still at the beginning of the curve in the U.S. for residential conservatories. With new clients we often must first answer the questions 'What is a conservatory?' and then 'Well, what would we do with one?"

Oak Leaf is one of a small number of companies that specialize in custom built conservatories and other structures, mainly for residential applications. Others include Tanglewood Conservatories, of Silver Spring, MD, which designs and builds its conservatories in the U.S., and Winter Garden, of Chicago, another company that builds in England. These units will never reach much beyond a fairly small and specialized market, according to Alan Stein of Tanglewood. "They won't take over from the conventional sunroom," he adds, because they are expensive and appeal mainly to upscale owners.


However, there are less expensive ways to commune with the great outdoors from within the comfort of one's own glass enclosure. Many other companies produce and install glass structures ranging from simple sunrooms built on an existing porch to elaborate pool enclosures, not to mention the wide range of solutions available for commercial and institutional applications of glass structures.

There are some important points to consider before embarking on construction of a glass house. First, do your homework. Know the difference between a solarium and a conservatory, between a winter garden and a patio room. A conservatory, for example, is typically a freestanding structure that may or may not have direct access to the main residence. A winter garden is a skylit area within a house where seasonal plants may be grown and displayed. A patio room is an unheated, enclosed, glazed addition to a house built on a patio-type deck. A solarium, or sun room, is a heated and insulated glazed structure



attached to the main structure and available for four-season use. Also becoming more common in residential applications are glazed pool enclosures. Don't buy a backyard greenhouse when you really want a solarium.

Secondly, if you're faced with a badly deteriorated existing glass structure - Don't tear it down! Jim Smith, Vice President of Rough (rhymes with how) Brothers, Inc., says it's almost always feasible to restore such a structure at a surprisingly low cost, and, if it has historic significance, you'll end up with something of "infinitely higher value" than a new replacement.

Lord and Burnham, the granddaddy of all U.S. greenhouse builders, started business in the 1840s along the Hudson River. They went on to build not only greenhouses, but also conservatories on the grand scale, such as the one at the Bronx Botanical Gardens. Rough's Conservatory Restoration Division in Cincinnati inherited the business and engineering drawings of Lord and Burnham, enabling them to restore the Bronx Conservatory to its original Victorian splendor. Rough also constructs new conservatories, such as the one for Grand Rapids Botanical Gardens, as well as glass houses on a more modest scale for residential purposes. It can produce custom-designed Victorian-replica conservatories using Lord and Burnham patterns, as well as a wide range of other structures, such as commercial greenhouses. They also have much experience in restoration projects.

Once you've decided what type of structure you want and whether it's to be new, a restoration, or a replica, here are the factors that must be considered when selecting, designing, and specifying glass structures for residential applications. They include style, custom or standard modular construction, size, materials, and accessories.

Style

Basically, the choice boils down to Victorian Gothic or Georgian versus contemporary styling. Most of the custom, or bespoke manufacturers specialize in replicating (or restoring) designs that became popular in the 19th-century heyday of conservatories. Many of them are affiliated with European designers and fabricators. The Victorians liked to grow huge plants in their conservatories; hence height was a major consideration, and roof lanterns or domes are a common feature of these designs. Freestanding units are often octagonal; designs feature molded cornices, pilastered columns, dentil moldings, or hipped roofs. Most manufacturers of modular or standard units feature a contemporary look, usually with a curved-eave or straight-eave profile. Some modular units are available in more classic traditional designs that include such detail as ridge cresting, finials, dentil molding, etched glass, and French doors. Eave heights are more limited than with the custom units, although they can be increased by use of knee walls. Custom vs. Standard It's difficult to compare pricing between custom and modular, or domestic and imported units. Many factors contribute to pricing: type and style of structure, build quality, archi-

tectural detailing, and size of the project. In terms of price comparison between a U.S.-built piece and an import, "Air fares and shipping costs are minor factors in the smallest projects and of virtually no significance in larger projects," says Oak Leaf's Magner. Units fabricated in the U.S. cost perhaps half as much as an imported unit, according to Jim Smith of Rough Brothers; be sure, however, that if the price seems much less, one is comparing apples to apples.

Custom companies offer design capability, either through the architect as part of the design team, or directly to the owner. They also offer

a construction-management presence or install the units directly themselves. The major advantage to a custom unit is the ability to produce a unique design, tailored to a specific residence.

Among the companies offering these custom designs are Oak Leaf Conservatories of Atlanta, which imports units and their craftsman/installers from England; Wintergarden, Ltd., of Chicago, which also imports from England (from Town & Country Conservatories of Norfolk); Tanglewood Conservatories of Silver Spring, MD, which builds its units in the U.S.; Rough Brothers Conservatory Restoration Division, of Cincinnati, which uses original Lord and Burnham designs and builds its units in the U.S.; and Glass House of Far Hills, N.J., which also manufactures in the U.S.

Modular units are, of course, less


expensive than custom, and can be delivered and erected in a shorter period of time. Companies that supply them typically also work on largerscale commercial structures as well. These companies include Skytech Systems of Bloomsburg, PA; Four Seasons Sunrooms of Holbrook, N.Y.; Sunbilt Solar Products of Jamaica, N.Y.; and Under Glass Mfg. of Lake

Katrine, N.Y. The dividing line between custom and standard companies is not hard and fast. Many of the modular suppliers will work with architects to adapt their standard units to a more custom installation. And some of the

custom companies also have a line of standard units available. According to Alan Stein, standard models account for 15 to 20 percent of Tanglewood's business. Wintergarden, for example, has a selection of standard Gothic and Pavilion designs. These units range from about \$30,000 for the smallest Gothic style (9 ft. 10 in. wide x 7 ft. 3 in. long) to about \$90,000 for the largest (25 ft. x 21 in.), not including base wall.

Size

A large range of sizes is available in both custom and standard designs, from a small lean-to sunroom to a full-size dining room or pool enclosure. The smallest straight eave module on Skytech's spec sheet, for example, is about 3 ft. deep x 3 ft. wide x 6 ft. high at the building.

Materials

The main decisions to be made are which glazing material and system and material for the structural members to employ. Less critical choices are foundations, floors, and knee walls, if necessary.

There is a wide range of glazing available, and the factors that dictate choice include climate (location), function of the structure, appearance, and cost. Parameters of the glazing system include reflectivity, light transmission, UV transmission, heat gain, U value, and R value. Most modular systems include 7/8-in. or 1-in. dual-insulated clear tempered glass as standard; bronze tint is usually available. For sloped or roof areas, 7/8-in. tempered-overlaminated safety glass is used as protection against falling tree limbs and the like. For more extreme climate conditions, Low E, Heat Mirror, and Argon or Krypton Filled can be specified. Insulated glass should be factory-sealed on all four sides, if possible, to keep out condensation; internal weep systems are sometimes offered. Some companies offer additional glass choices at extra cost. Four Seasons Sunrooms, for example, offer premium double- or triple-glazed multi-coated (metallic) glass to increase energy efficiency and durability. Gaskets are often extruded keyed rubber, with an additional silicone seal.

Structural members are metal (usually aluminum), hardwood, or aluminum-clad wood. Lower-end units are sometimes available with PVC members (commonly used in Britain, according to Oak Leaf's Magner). At the custom-built high end, Oak Leaf, for example, offers a range of hardwoods, with a stress on mahogany, along with aluminum embellishments cast from molds of original Victorian cast-iron pieces. Tanglewood offers primarily Douglas fir structural members, with a choice of others for windows and doors, as well as aluminum-clad Douglas fir, with the wood visible inside. Rough Brothers replicates the old Lord and Burnham shapes in aluminum or supplies wood members.

Standard or modular units usually use all-aluminum tubes or extrusions with baked-on finishes, integral gutters, and weep holes, with polyurethane thermal breaking a quality feature. Some companies offer standard units with structural wood; Four Seasons, for example, offers a slowgrowth white-pine interior member with an aluminum glazing system mounted on the outside.

Accessories

The ventilation system, which can have manual or motor-driven ex-

haust fans and roof vents with remote switching, is most important. These systems can be automated using designs developed for commercial greenhouses, which have ventilating sash controlled thermostatically, as well as by rain sensors. Other accessories include roof blinds, shades, screens, specialized flooring, and even furniture specially designed for the Victorian conservatory look (offered by Oak Leaf).

It's apparent that the specifier has a wide range of choices available for glass houses. How to choose? In the words of Lori Welliver, Marketing Manager for Skytech Systems, "The bitterness of poor quality lingers long after the sweetness of lower price." Words to live by.

125 Years of Adulteration

The Statehouse lived a hard life as the state government continually outgrew its spaces; new engineering systems were brought on line, and everyone and his uncle tinkered with interior (and even exterior) design. Very little was sacred. Someone was always trying to add a dome. The 1894 proposal was proof positive that the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago did not go unnoticed in Columbus.


Robert Loversidge, Jr., vice president of Schooley Caldwell and principal-in-charge on the Capitol project, speaks with a hint of his own disbelief about the misdeeds inflicted on both buildings. Having thoroughly studied the existing conditions while preparing the 1989 Master Plan, he speaks the facts plainly with no need to exaggerate. The disorderly state of things can be partly explained by the lack of central, coordinated building

management for over a century. Each branch of government controlled its own portion of the buildings - little fief-doms of politicians and their superintendents. Loversidge recalls that when Schooley Caldwell started investigative work, simply finding a key to a room could be a full day's work.

Mechanical Disarray

Every mechanical and electrical system introduced since the Civil War had its heyday in the Statehouse. The building was retrofit for gas and electric lighting, not to mention air conditioners, elevators, telephones, and computers. Loversidge's list of existing HVAC systems at the time of renovation is mind-boggling. Decentralized building management resulted in such absurd situations as window air-conditioning units venting to inside corridors or rooms most likely in someone else's "fiefdom" - prompting installation of new units to offset the heat generated by the first. The most evident legacy of the fiefdoms was the slice-and-dice of interior spaces in both buildings. As more space was needed, existing spaces were divided — and not just in plan. Areas that once had three floors ended up with as many as seven. The Statehouse's original 53 rooms mushroomed to 317. Dropped ceilings were the favored solution regardless of groin vaulting, windows, doors, or skylights. The number of unsafe conditions multiplied as modifications were made; dead-end corridors, exposed wiring, locked doors, unenclosed stairways, and bricked windows all existed in buildings without a fire-sprinkler system.

To Loversidge, one of the great tragedies of this reworking was that a building once fully functional with only natural light had nary a space that was not fully dependent during daylight hours on artificial light. The Statehouse's four huge light courts had been honeycombed with warren offices, the oculus of the rotunda filled in, and light from exterior win-



dows blocked by partitioning.

Spared Detail

There was one positive aspect of the found conditions that Loversidge points out. Aside from the removal of the Supreme Court's double-height space (1901) and the state library (1930s), there had been very little wholesale destruction of original material. (Here's a situation in which one can be at least temporarily thankful for the efficiencies of the dropped ceiling, exposed ductwork, and lightduty partition wall construction.)

Embarking on a Restoration

The restoration and rehabilitation work began in 1990, guided by the Schooley Caldwell Master Plan. The document carefully detailed existing conditions in every part of the Statehouse and Senate Building, and categorized each space into one of five

Even with good guidelines on papreservation plan. The plan acts as a per, Loversidge notes that there were always two interests competing for the architects' attention: "Make it nice" and "Make it work." "Nice" meant: Bring back the dignity, beauty and detail of the historic fabric. "Work" meant: Mind the sprinklers, ADA, HVAC, and 21st-century gadgetry. In other words, the Senators wanted their gilded eagle restored and an Ethernet connection, too. All in all, Schooley Caldwell and their consultants have done a tremendous job of hiding the new mechanical systems and state-of-the-art communications and security systems while restoring the important historic fabric to an impressive level of finish. The restoration might more aptly be called a reduction. About 250



mini-zoning code for the buildings. A space zoned "1A," for example, is of primary significance and would be restored to museum quality for the same use as originally designed, with minimum level of modern systems present, and if present, completely invisible. Zone "1C" is also considered of primary significance, but adaptation to a new use is allowed and modern systems can be installed in an unobtrusive manner while maintaining the overall historic appearance as much as possible. Zone "5," on the other hand, represents areas where additions and new construction can occur as long as they are sensitive to the scale, materials, and historical significance of the original space.

than one wants to count have been purged from the Statehouse alone. The natural light has returned, the colors are restored, and the room layout is much closer to the original plan. The Statehouse now has approximately 95 rooms.

The New Capitol Atrium

The complex is truly a working capitol. One of the ways the Schooley Caldwell plan made the capitol work better is through the design of a smart connecting building to bridge the 60ft. gap between the Statehouse and Senate Building. The 59,000-sq.ft. structure is virtually freestanding. A sliver of glazed infill set back from the facade is the only connection to the historic buildings. The new building is predominantly limestone and decidedly modern, with no attempt to backdate itself — only blend peacefully.

The role of architect requires an extra level of patience and persistence when large civic architecture is at stake. Designing the capitol atrium was an extremely public process and thus fraught with debate and strong opinions. When the Schooley Caldwell design team had a new proposal, it was presented "to the immediate world," in the words of Loversidge, who has at last count made his slide presentation of the project 47 times. Here, public input in the hands of capable, creative architects produced a new public space that has received almost universal approval and a handful of awards. The stone used for the atrium is Columbus limestone of the same bluish-white color used for the Statehouse. Because Columbus limestone, a veined and fossil-laden stone from the Scioto River valley, is significantly harder than nearby Indiana limestone, it is used primarily for gravel. Schooley Caldwell was able to secure a section of an old quarryturned-gravel pit and hire a contractor to extract large blocks, which were trucked two-to-a-semitrailer to Indiana where they were gang sawed to veneer thickness. The slabs were returned to Columbus to be cut to size and finished for the new construction, as well as used for repair on the historic buildings. The 40-foot Doric columns were turned from solid blocks using computer-assisted equipment.

Functionally, the atrium provides an all-weather link at three levels of the capitol complex. The main floor is a double-height skylighted public assembly space with an alluring, none-too-humble luster. Below, the basement provides visitor services and extends beyond the building footprint to house the central mechanical plant, a secure entry, maintenance shops, and loading dock.

Long-Term Gain


One of the most welcome and encouraging aspects of this project is that the citizens who paid for the overhaul have good reason to believe they will be enjoying the results for the long term. To prevent another spiral into balkanized dilapidation, the capitol complex has been given a new management structure under the Capitol Square Review and Advisory Board.

The board was formed in Spring of 1993 as part of legislation signed into law by the Governor. As a bipartisan entity, the board will provide central oversight of day-to-day operations and maintenance and will regulate any and all changes proposed for the buildings. Gone are the fiefdoms of the past. The Board is staffed by people with suitable clout, including Senator Finan, its current chair. As Architects of the Capitol, Schooley Caldwell serves as advisor to the Board; members include senate and house majority and minority leaders, Ohio Building Authority, Ohio Arts Council, Ohio Historical Society, and the "public at large." Schooley Caldwell successfully lobbied to have a mandate for quality incorporated into the enabling legislation, which now specifies that all work on the landmarked structures must be carried out to meet the Secretary of the Interior's standards for historic buildings.

Time must pass before we judge the viability of the board. Whether or not it can forever prevent a tower

there, an office chopping here, or a bad paint job anywhere remains to be seen. Given the history of the complex, it is probably a good thing that the Governor decided, on a sudden inspiration, to chisel the state motto into the granite plaza of the Statehouse: "With God, all things are possible." The public will also play a watchdog role. Ohioans who once went spelunking down dark corridors now rove in delightful natural light. They will surely work to keep it that way. Unlike the critic who recently labeled the Statehouse "a chunk of classical severity," Ohioans know that their new capitol not only works, it's splendid. The machined crispness and geometric simplicity of its Greek Revival forms distinguish the Statehouse from older buildings of more ordinary Neoclassicism; its solidity and order easily outwit the newer, taller buildings that have circled around the square for a good view.



All four light courts in the Statehouse were returned to their original function of providing daylight to interior spaces. The glass-enclosed elevator at the rear provides modern vertical circulation while allowing light to filter in.

In addition to providing a great public space for events, the new atrium makes a walk from the Statehouse rotunda to the central stair hall of the Senate Building a grand procession.

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
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
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
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


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
