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
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Above, a Gazebo using Tuscan columns.

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
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




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
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
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A BIG ARCHITECTURE FIRM PICKS UP PRESERVATION

In 1996 George Skarmeas, AIA, joined The Hillier Group as Director of Historic Preservation, where he is now integrating preservation practice into the culture and structure of the country's third largest architecture firm.

George Skarmeas drives a fast red car. This may or may not have bearing on the rapidity with which he is leading The Hillier Group Architects to prominence in preservation architecture. He also smokes a pipe and adores books, and while these facts tell us little about his architecture, they are as much a part of his character as the intensity he focuses on his work. Skarmeas's mission: to develop within Hillier a preservation studio synonymous with excellence and professionalism, which both draws upon and contributes to the firm's depth and diversity.

The Hillier Group is one of the few large architecture firms offering preservation planning and architecture as part of its own services, rather than a sideline handed over to consultant firms. With nearly 400 employees in six offices, and divisions for architecture, interior design, planning, landscape architecture, construction management, and graphic design, it is unlikely there is a project Hillier cannot handle. A 3.1-million-sq.ft. campus for Sprint in Kansas City; SmithKline Beecham's \$500-million complex outside of London; and the \$800-million Sydney Harbor Casino are the largest to date, but along with these super jumbo commissions Hillier counts a wide array of projects of all sizes and shapes — about 3,000 over its 31 years. According to Skarmeas there are over 70,000 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places and close to 500,000 on the state and local registers. These enticing estimates no doubt influenced the decision to bring historic preservation in house. Whether in use or available for reuse, this is business waiting to happen.

A Portrait of the Architect

Twenty years ago George Skarmeas left Greece for the U.S. He had an architecture degree from the National Technical University in Athens, a handful of design awards, and no serious thoughts about practicing preservation-focused architecture. His first stop was Ohio State University for Master of Architecture

and Master of City and Regional Planning degrees. He continued his academic work at the University of Pennsylvania, completing a Doctor of Philosophy (Architecture) in 1983, and at Ball State University in Indiana as assistant professor of architecture (1983-1986). In 1986, Skarmeas switched to full-time professional practice, returning to Philadelphia to work with The Vitetta Group. The move may have been based on more than straight professional merits. Skarmeas considers Philadelphia "one of the most fascinating cities in the world" and is delighted to call it home. His tenure at Vitetta included such large, high-profile projects as The Bellevue Hotel in downtown Philadelphia, the buildings of Independence Square, the Reading Terminal Train Shed at the Philadelphia Convention Center, the Pennsylvania

State Capitol, and Philadelphia City Hall.

Between G. Skarmeas, young architect, and Dr. George Skarmeas, AIA, AICP, ASID, IIDA, Ph.D., there was some bending of direction. Skarmeas credits a handful of people with influencing his career at important forks in the road. Thucydides Valentis, a well known Greek modern designer and mentor, made sure he could draw, "I mean really draw, down to each stone," says Skarmeas. Dionysios Zivas, a professor instrumental in saving The Plaka, or old section of Athens, introduced Skarmeas to preservation in practice. At Ohio State University, Bill Sims started Skarmeas thinking about and questioning some of his preconceptions, so that by the time he met James Marston Fitch at the University of Pennsylvania, he was quickly and deeply drawn to historic preservation. At Vitetta, Skarmeas is thankful to have translated ideas into practice collaborating with Hy Myers, whose work always showed that the highest standards are the only standards worth considering.

Building a Studio

After ten years at Vitetta, Skarmeas was ready for a new venture. The idea of building a preservation practice from the ground up, assembling what he likes to call "the dream team," was enticing. Hillier was looking to build diversity by adding to the firm's specialized studios. While the firm had worked on a handful of preservation projects prior to Skarmeas's arrival — Frank Lloyd Wright's Wingspread in Racine, Wisc., is probably the most notable — this was a move to formalize and expand Hillier's presence in the field. Skarmeas has followed an aggressive, though carefully calculated, approach to crafting the preservation studio. Centered in Hillier's Philadelphia office, the studio currently has six preservation architects working with four to five direct technical staff from Hillier's core staff. The strategy appears to be working. Hillier landed some significant preservation commissions at the close of the year: The College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Dumbarton Oaks, Oldfields at the Indianapolis Museum of Art, and the Grand Bay Hotel in downtown Philadelphia.

Skarmeas's structuring of the preservation studio follows his own fundamental tenets. A good preservation architect must first be a good architect, and second, really understand buildings. "If you want the best and brightest solutions," says Skarmeas, "you need the knowledge and experience to understand the issues and intellectually challenge the experts — whether colleagues or consultants. With today's technology we can generate an enormous amount of information about a building. How you evaluate this information is what counts, and this requires an extraordinary understanding of how a building works." And, good preservation work requires a very good partner in design — a designer with sensibility and sensitivity; with respect for context and history. Skarmeas qualifies this point with the caveat "and a well-managed architectural ego," and credits Alan Chimacoff, Hillier's director of design, with forging a natural partnership between preservation and design at Hillier.

As the Undine boathouse underwent restoration, its "Furnessque" features gradually returned to life, once again adding architectural interest to Boathouse Row. When a balcony roof addition was removed, the architects found the framework for a canvas awning seen in historical photos. The awning will return in time for this spring's racing season.

Main Street on the Schuylkill

Philadelphia's Boathouse Row is the original Main Street of U.S. rowing. The 11 boathouses lining the northern shore of the Schuylkill River in the shadow of the Philadelphia Art Museum are one of the city's most endearing and enduring features — part of its history and the history of rowing in the U.S. Five of the 11 are under renovation, including Undine Barge Club, a Hillier project. *continued on page 12*


The Undine house was designed in 1882 by Frank Furness, Philadelphia's most fearless architect. Furness's designs departed from historic precedent and classical models and even in their day were refreshingly unorthodox. They provoked comment and defied labels. Furness used bold shapes and scale for decorative emphasis and sculpted the massing of his buildings to express function. At Undine, the ground floor is a cavernous space with barn-like doors at each end, literally a decorated shed for rowing shells. The main stairway is grafted to this mass in a bay turret leading to second-floor club rooms, expressed by a large viewing porch; and the third-floor locker room, denoted by a stained-glass clerestory under the eaves.


Hillier's work will build on a preliminary preservation report by George Thomas, a University of Pennsylvania faculty member and expert on Furness's architecture. Fortunately, the building has survived its 100-plus years quite well. Skarmeas attributes this to the fact that the structure was never heated and that members never expanded the facility to anything other than its original function — a pleasant place to launch a boat and row. "For almost everything we had to replace, we found an original piece to copy," another fortunate circumstance relayed by Jim Garrison, preservation architect on the project. "The exception was the roof cresting. We used a macro lens to capture this detail from a historical photo." After pulling three layers of asphalt from the roof they found one piece of slate to use as a match. The roof is now Vermont mottled gray/black slate with terne-coated stainless steel for flashing, gutter linings and cresting. "We designed a 100-year roof," says Garrison. "If they clean the gutters once in a while it will last 100 years."

Furness was also a master colorist. The boathouse's masonry is a purplishtan sandstone worked with orange mortar. The window frames are painted red-orange and the decorative exterior wood work — a fabulous mix of geo-

metric flat members that work their way into the complex turned elements are dark green and olive brown. Frank Welsh did paint analysis for the project. "The green matched an off-the-shelf PPG, the red was pretty easy, but the other color defied naming, mixing and matching," reports Garrison. "It looks olive green on the building, but chocolate brown on a chip in your hand." After three tries they mastered the color and repainting is now complete. This spring the sandstone will be cleaned and repointed to bring back its warm purple color and web-like orange mortar joints. Both wet-cleaning methods (misting and/or mild detergents) and dry methods (*gommage*) are being tested for effectiveness and environmental appropriateness, given the sensitive location at river's edge.

Main Street, Philadelphia

South Broad Street, newly named Avenue of the Arts, is undergoing a \$350-million revitalization that will combine Philadelphia's theater and gallery district with new hotels, restaurants, and retail venues. One of the largest projects in the preservation studio these days is The Grand Bay Hotel on South Broad opposite City Hall, which will be a gateway to this cultural Main Street. The \$70-million project, slated for completion in 1999, involves conversion of two linked, landmark buildings to a five-star hotel. The buildings — a domed banking Hall (1908) and a 30-story office tower (1930) — were designed by McKim Mead & White with Furness Evans & Co., originally for Girard Bank. Exterior cladding on both the bank and the tower is a white Georgia marble, something you are not likely to see on a hotel of new construction. Hillier's preservation team will oversee restoration of the building exteriors, as well as some stunning interior spaces, working with the whole of the Philadelphia office, led by principal Steve DeRochi.

Farther Afield

Skarmeas and his team recently completed a feasibility study for redeveloping the B&O Railroad locomotive roundhouse and sheds in Martinsburg, W. Va., as a civic center. The 1870 roundhouse is a remarkable example of early modular construction and creative structural engineering. Its cast-iron frame, recalling Viollet-le-Duc's great halls, is made of components manufactured in Baltimore and shipped to the site in crates. Local brick, timber, and sheetmetal were used to complete the structure. The airy expanses lend themselves to reuse as large public spaces with minimum need for internal modifications. As to its next phase, the \$12-million project awaits review by the City of Martinsburg and the private developer. Oldfields, one of Skarmeas's newest projects, is a fine specimen from the days of the great American country house. The estate is now part of the Indianapolis Museum of Art, which uses it as a decorative arts gallery. Oldfields's construction - reinforced concrete with terra-cotta structural tile infill for walls and a cementitious exterior coating - is particularly challenging. The upgrade from a residential-use HVAC system to a museum-quality environment quickly brought on serious condensation problems. Skarmeas is working with Bill Rose, a building scientist specializing in moisture issues, and Ernie Conrad, an expert on HVAC in old buildings. Through careful monitoring of temperature and relative humidity, and their response to specific internal and external conditions, Skarmeas and team hope to define the limitations of the building envelope. These results will then be used to strike a balance between the range of artifacts chosen for display and the long-term health of the building. The Oldfields restoration will utilize the studio's conditions-assessment continued on page 14

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
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


expertise in the preparation of a comprehensive preservation plan. Thanks to boroscopes, x-rays, infrared, ultrasound, radar, and other high-tech tools, unforeseen conditions are no longer the bane they once were. "I don't believe there is such a thing," says Skarmeas of unforeseen conditions. "We have the technology to get into the fabric in a non-destructive way. We can understand the nature of a problem, the extent of the problem, and know its location. You will always have some contingency, but rather than tack 20-25% contingencies onto our contracts, we need to educate clients to the fact that budgeting for predesign activities moves a fixed cost to the front of the contract, greatly reducing cost escalation arising from the unforeseen. Learning the details of a building's condition alcyclical nature of historic preservation. "This type of project," notes Skarmeas, "is a prime venue for researching how we define cycles of intervention and the long-term effect our 'investments of energy' have on a building's life cycle when balanced against the 'trauma' associated with every intervention."

A Practical Match

For someone who came to the States with no concrete plans for a career in preservation architecture, Skarmeas has traveled rather rapidly to his position at The Hillier Group. He believes, correctly it appears, that Hillier is a perfect place for preservation architecture. The firm's thirty years of practice have generated a tremendous depth of knowledge that preservation can only broaden. "The preservation studio creates a link between what we do today as practicing architects and what we have learned about the performance of buildings as preservationists," says Skarmeas. This kind of critical thinking, coupled with his singular intensity, is part of the reason historic preservation is at Hillier. Not just in theory, but on the letterhead.

lows both owner and architect to fully understand the risks that exist and assign a dollar value to them." Skarmeas further points out that huge contingencies are a practice people point to and say, "See, preservation is expensive," before the true dimension of the numbers is demonstrated.

The Genessee Country Village and Museum in Mumford, N.Y., is an assemblage of approximately 60 historic buildings recreating a 19th-century village. The Livingston-Backus house (1830-38) is the most prominent structure on the village's main street. This house was reassembled on the site in the 1970s after being dismantled in Rochester, N.Y., and placed in storage 20 years earlier. In December of 1996, a fire destroyed a kitchen wing addition and severely damaged the historic portion. Skarmeas has been working with museum directors over the past year on reconstruction and restoration plans. Work will begin this Spring, and Skarmeas is hoping that areas of the house can be open during construction and conservation for educational and interpretative activities.

Revisiting a building with a history of interventions — whether previous restorations or extreme events such as the fire — is a particularly appealing aspect of preservation for Skarmeas, who has thought long and hard on the

The College of William and Mary's main building was begun in 1692 as part of Williamsburg, in Virginia Colony. Its design is attributed to the English architect Sir Christopher Wren and is often called Wren-Baroque, referring to Wren's distillation of English Renaissance architectural forms. Known as the "Wren Building," this structure is one of the oldest academic buildings in America still in use as originally conceived. The Wren Building was also the first structure to be restored by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., as part of the Colonial Williamsburg restoration in 1929. Over three hundred years of historical record and a hoard of philosophical issues will be among the challenges facing Hillier's preservation team as they revisit this celebrated site in the history of modern preservation. Addressing moisture phenomena and dealing with environmental issues are two critical areas that the team will investigate. The building is not a museum, but an integral part of the daily life of the College. Finding the right balance between preservation, user needs, and the appropriate restoration technology will be a major determinate in the success of the project. Main Street, Civitas, and the Urban Renaissance

On the following 136 pages, you'll find a major SPECIAL REPORT on the amazing revival that's taking place in older towns and cities across the U.S. There are examples of successful restoration and new construction projects – plus extensive listings of products and craftspeople appropriate for any Main Street restoration program.

A cross the U.S. for the better part of four decades, the blind forces of technology and economics have ravaged both town centers and the countryside alike. The downtown hearts of many cities large and small have been drained of much of their commercial and civic life by mega-mall developments that ring the centers of most of the older communities in the nation. Simultaneously, random residential development based on the "every house on its own acre" principle has devoured an alarming amount of farmland and wooded countryside. Up to this point, this country's techno-economic juggernaut has not left room for more subtle, non-numeric value systems, such as the desire for humane, civilized qualities in our everyday surroundings.

However, there's a growing consensus that this type of mindless development cannot continue. Not only is suburban sprawl an inefficient use of natural resources, but isolating people in their own little islands has decreased the sense of *civitas* in our nation.

Fortunately, there's more than hand-wringing going on regarding these pernicious trends; two practical activities have evolved in parallel.

The first is the Main Street restoration movement, which started with a small project in downtown Corning, N.Y., more than two decades ago.

There are now Main Street revitalization projects under way in every state in the Union . . . some as offshoots of national, state, and city programs, and others as local bootstrap operations. (See "A Virtual Stroll" on page 30.) The second major trend is the so-called "New Urbanism" movement, which focuses primarily on new developments. Among the tenets of The New Urbanism are streetscapes with human-scale buildings, pedestrianfriendly streets, provisions for public transit, retention of traditional block patterns, and the ordering of residential neighborhoods around well-defined central civic spaces. The U.S. Dept. of Housing & Urban Development, which built high-rise, super-block-style projects in the 1960s, is now banking heavily on new urbanist principles in its 1990s public-housing plans.


These two movements are working toward a similar goal from opposite poles. In essence, many of the New Urbanist principles go back to the type of planning and development that characterized America's 19th-century cities and towns — the very same cities and towns that the Main Street movement is attempting to revitalize. The goal of both is the same: Humane town centers with ordered spaces for commercial and civic activities, with nearby residential clusters that encourage civilized interaction among citizens.

In this major Special Report, the Editors review some promising developments in Civic Architecture and Main Street Restoration in cities large and small. These projects demonstrate that growing numbers of architects and clients are coming to the realization that Vitruvius's injunction to create buildings that embody firmness, commodity, and delight applies just as much to Main Street USA as it did to Augustan Rome.

■ The Romanesque-style Monroe County Courthouse, built in 1896, had its slate roof replaced with asbestos shingles in 1929, at which time its original gutter was also covered over. More than 60 years later, the asbestos had deteriorated and lichen was covering much of the roof. Weak flashing, a dearth of gutters, and decades of freeze-thaw cycles had caused water damage to the sandstone walls.

Architecture Network, Inc., removed the asbestos shingles and the roof flare that covered the original built-in gutter. The roof was then covered with contin-

uous ice guard and waterproofing, a new slate roof was installed, and the gutter was lined with copper. The metal flashing was replaced and ice-dam flashing was installed along all valleys and roof edges. Specially for-

mulated paint, matching the sandstone, was used to give parts of the ornamental sheetmetal the originally intended stone-like appearance; the rest was painted in appropriate accent colors. Over 40 badly deteriorated arched and rectangular windows in the attic were replicated and replaced. Rare matching sandstone was obtained from a closed quarry, and replacement column capitals, window sills, and face stone were hand carved and installed. Indiana limestone was used to replace four deteriorated sandstone capitals on the entry portico, as well as its wood balustrade, which had been removed 50 years earlier. •



■ To meld effectively with the Victorian-era architecture of Cape May's streetscape, the new branch of the Sturdy Savings Bank was designed by S.J. Fenwick Associates after the style of a bracketed villa: a single rectangular box with a hipped roof, cupola, and porch. The bank was sited to permit drive-thru lanes and parking while still maintaining a street presence with a single entrance for both driving and walk-in customers; the glazed porch serves as a vestibule that orients to both the street and the parking lot.

To insure an appropriate look to the bank, wood exterior cladding was used; the exterior trim work is plycem, Fypon, or foam, and the roof is metal with a standingseam profile. The interior boasts a two-story lobby with a dropped-beam ceiling and traditional pendant lighting fixtures, porcelain-tile flooring, and even an antique banking table. •

■ The DeMartini Winery, a three-story stone structure built in 1885, produced wine until 1920, when Prohibition (and a grape blight) ended its oenological enterprises. A residential building from 1940 until 1979, the City of Clayton purchased the winery in 1988 to convert it into a City Hall and Police Department.


The first task facing VBN Architects was to protect the building against earthquake damage. To stabilize the subterranean stone walls, a waterproof membrane was placed against the interior stone surface, to prevent the intrusion of groundwater, and then reinforced concrete was sprayed over the walls. The primary facade was stabilized by drilling six-in. cores vertically into the



stone wall, into which reinforcing steel was grouted. New steel connectors were added to the existing wood framing to assure stability, and wood beams and supports were used to cope with the greater floorloading requirements of the adaptation. In redesigning the interior, the winery's original openness was maintained: Enclosed spaces were avoided and glass sidelights added to partitions wherever possible. A new central staircase provided code-required egress and connected the interior floor levels. A suspended soffit was designed, which loops around the perimeter office spaces and conceals mechanical and electrical equipment while preserving the openness of the exposed-wood-truss roof structure. •

space.) After assessing the masonry, terra cotta, and mortar on the south facade, Watson & Henry Associates began its first phase of the project by concentrating on that part of the building.

Water damage had severely deteriorated the brick and terra-cotta parapet, cornice, and

entablature assemblies, as well as the balcony and the embedded support steel. The balcony and other assemblies were taken apart and reassembled, using salvaged and replacement terra-cotta units and brick, and incorporating expansion/contraction joints and thru-wall flashing. The embedded support steel was also removed, including cornice outriggers, architrave beams, and balcony framing and hangers/clips. New metal support beams, hangers, and fasteners (either hot-dipped steel or non-corrosive metals) were installed. Built-in roof gutters and flashings were reconstructed behind parapets to bypass the undersized embedded drains, and deck and flashings were reassembled behind the balcony parapet. Deteriorated and missing mortar was repointed using a compatible mortar mix, the masonry was cleaned, and damaged terra-cotta glazes were repaired with a vapor-permeable coating. The building's north, east, and west facades are expected to be completed before the end of this year.

The buildings at 42-44 and 46-50 Wooster Street, built in 1883 and 1895, respectively, had both been vacant since the late 1970s. Now their roofs were collapsing, their street-level facades had been vandalized, and their foundations had fallen so badly that the floors were up to 20 in. off-level over 70 linear feet. Demolition had actually begun when three investor-developers persuaded the City to let them submit a plan to salvage the buildings. Bogdanow Partners was brought in to renovate the buildings and convert them into apartment dwellings. The dangerous condition of the neglected buildings required extreme action. One structure had its cornice and portions of its rear and interior immediately demolished; the other had a 30-x-40-ft. section removed down to the first floor, permitting the firm to introduce a five-story



atrium within the building. Having removed so much stress-inducing weight, the firm used lightweight steel framing when designing additional new penthouse spaces for that building. Although the renovation included some free redesigns of the structures, the masonry, mortar, terra cotta, cast iron, and sheetmetal of the original facades were repaired and restored using conventional materials and procedures. Today, the buildings are completed and units have been purchased on all floors of both.



■ The design and construction of a new three-story commercial building in downtown Saratoga Springs demanded careful consideration, as the site was a vacant parcel in an otherwise intact block of historic structures. Frost Architecture designed a brick masonry building with elements such as arches and recessed bay openings, which reflected the streetscape's context of 19th-century Greek Revival and Romanesque-style buildings. Traditional-size brick and a variety of decorative bond patterns were employed, along with corbelling at the cornice to provide additional visual interest and texture. Limestone was used for the window sills and lintels and the pediment cap; cast concrete for the inset, embossed panels at street level. •

This careful five-year renovation project had to be conducted while the building remained in use, thus creating additional considerations to compensate for safety, egress, noise, dust, and temporary office locations. Unforeseen structural concerns also had to be addressed with the excavation of the building's central basement area; once completed, however, the excavated space resulted in updated, well planned offices and storage, and introduced a comfortable and safe circulation plan for all departments and the public. •

The village, remade

from a mill town to a bustling tobacco-growing center in the years from 1896 to 1911, had adopted mostly Classical Revival architecture, typified by square to vertical massing and gabled or pedimented facades. The new library designed by Holmes King Kallquist & Associates is a 20,000-sq.ft. masonry building, with a long facade articulated into elements of traditional proportions, as are the windows. That fenestration, however, employs ultraviolet-absorbing green-tinted glazing, thus sparing the building the musty, closed-off atmosphere that is the general rule for most libraries. The interior is a good deal more innovative, employing an open plan organized by a cross-axial ceiling coffer centering on a translucent skylight — which thus provides the desired flexibility to meet future developments in usage patterns and library science. Similarly, traditional library furniture was eschewed as heavy and uncomfortable; office and educational furniture were carefully combined to create a distinctly modern-day interior. •



This industrial space, built in 1864 as a printing house, underwent numerous changes over the decades, some less fortunate than others. The

addition of two bays, tripling its original size, was sympathetic and constructive; but by 1940, the building was shorn of its elaborate roof cornice, and many of its arched windows had been bricked or boarded over.

After restoring the original Quinn brick, Evans/ Architects installed new woodframe windows with arched tops, and painted the brick in a complementary two-color scheme. Even more comprehensive was the interior renovation, as the structure was being adapted to a new life as an office building. Extensive structural repairs of the wood required. floors was Continuous glass transoms were introduced to permit natural light into the newly partitioned office spaces. And of course, phone, lighting, and computer lines all had to be added unobtrusively. .

A VIRTUAL STROLL THROUGH MAIN STREET

Main Street organizations, development corporations, BIDs, and chambers of commerce—from one-horse towns to mid-size cities—can be found on the Worldwide Web. The Editors visited many of these sites to see how towns and small cities are revitalizing their downtown districts, and how they are marketing themselves. We also found a number of sites with useful information for downtown restoration groups that are just getting a program under way.

These community websites allow organizations to disseminate information to their own communities — and to the world. They promote local tourism and tout local businesses to the "virtual tourist." The sites are also used to publicly acknowledge the donors, supporters, planning boards, civic groups, and residents who helped make the work possible, and to act as a vehicle to stir up further support. They also discuss topics of concern to downtowns, like downtown parking problems and the invasion of the mega-chain stores.

HELP FOR MAIN STREETS

Government and preservation-related sites on the web are an excellent place to look for Main Street information. Browsers can even download documents and forms, like the National Register of Historic Places registration form or National Park Service Preservation Briefs.

Historic preservation, cultural and heritage tourism, and natural resource conservation are some of the issues addressed by the National Center for Heritage Development (www.nchd.org), a fairly young organization devoted to networking and assistance opportunities for community-based heritage groups.

In addition to providing information on their members and membership, the American Association of Museums (www.aam-us.org) provides information on what's involved in starting a museum, ADA and universal design for museums, and has a list of books and an internet bookshop of titles relating to museum management. The National Assembly for State Arts Agencies (www.nasaaarts.org) offers information resources and representation for state and regional arts programs.

SOME NOTABLE COMMUNITY SITES

The Local Government Commission and the California AIA sponsored a conference and awards program for "Community Livability" and posted their results on the web. (www.lgc.org/clc/workshops/feet/ahwawards.html)

One example is the Denver Dry Goods Building, which won an award for mixed-use development. (The 100-year-old store closed in 1987 and new owners threatened to demolish the landmark and replace it with a parking lot. The local Affordable Housing Development Corporation created a model for the area by renovating the building into retail/office/low-income/market-rate housing. 





FOUNTAINS FOR PUBLIC SPACES

The ancient Romans understood the power of fountains to endow civic settings with magic and majesty. With the revived interest in traditional town planning, the fountain is once again being given a major role in dramatizing public spaces.

Though modern Rome no longer needs its public fountains as a source of water for drinking and bathing, it still cherishes and maintains the sculptural fountains that adorn the city at every turn, enlivening it with the sounds, coolness, and mystery of water in motion. With their power to delight the senses, public fountains draw people like iron filings to a magnet, whether in an ancient European city or a small Midwestern U.S. town.

The best fountain designers combine the artistic skills of a sculptor with the technical skills of a hydraulic engineer. They not only coordinate and visualize the relationship between water and the stone or metal fountain, but also configure the location of spouts, drains, internal plumbing, and the flow of the water for both aesthetics and efficient operation.

Fountain designers also have to understand the effects of water on different materials over time and in different climates. The issue of potential vandalism and safety in center cities also needs to be addressed, so that climbing areas or fragile sections on fountains are kept to a minimum.

Replications

Because of their importance as civic focal points, many historic public fountains are being replicated

and/or restored today, and new designs are being commissioned for town plazas and city centers. For example, town resident Leona Cotterill recently donated \$65,000 to replicate the 1894 cast-iron fountain which originally stood in the village green of Dryden, in upstate New York, but which had been demolished for scrap metal during W.W. II.

Robinson Iron, a cast-iron foundry in Alexander City, Ala., recreated the Dryden fountain by using existing cast-iron patterns close to the original design. Robinson Iron uses its large collection of 19th- and early-20th-century patterns to create historic cast-iron statuary, urns, and fountains. They also have a large model and pattern shop that can create new molds for custom work.

"We used our own patterns to match the size, scale, and type of ornamentation," says Scott Howell, V. P. at Robinson Iron. "The result was a two-tiered fountain with a series of statues adorning it: A woman leans over from the top of a small bowl, beneath are four children around a larger bowl and three women grace the pedestal in the center of a granite-edged pool."

After Robinson Iron completed the casting, they assembled the fountain bowls in their shop with stainless-steel fasteners and welded appropriate joints. The iron was painted with epoxy primers, followed by finish coats that created an antiqued appearance. The sculptural units were then disassembled into a few major pieces, and all components were trucked to Dryden. A sophisticated pumping system using standard off-the-shelf components was configured for the fountain installation.

In another fountain replication project, Kenneth Lynch & Sons in Wilton, Conn., recently reproduced a fountain for the front of the historic West Baden Springs Hotel. (This Indiana resort at one time sported what they claimed was the country's largest dome.) The proportions of the original fountain — a squat and bulky pedestal with abstract patterns, topped with a floral basin — were matched in overall appearance from Lynch's inventory of stock patterns. The new cast-stone pedestal was topped with a bronze bowl that had originally been part of another fountain.

how high it should be."

In a new fountain for the Charleston Race Track in North Carolina, Lynch & Sons created a decorative cast-stone fountain with a large bowl balanced on four supports on top of which three legs support a smaller top bowl. The cast-stone units, created with a marble-chip aggregate, were formed in stock molds, some of which Lynch has used for 40 years, and then combined to complete the fountain assembly. They built the housing for the internal plumbing, and then it was installed and plumbed on site. "One of the biggest challenges," says Lynch's Grace Weitman, "is to take stock components and assemble them in a new way so that the fountain functions as smoothly as a unit that was designed as a 100% custom job."

Restoration

In fountain restoration, the project can be a straight rehabilitation or a combination of new and restored pieces. A zinc fountain made by J.W. Fiske circa 1880 for the town of Menominee, Wis., had been vandalized and broken into dozens of pieces. So Florentine Craftsmen, an 80-year-old New York company that still does a lot of custom metalsmithing, built an internal bronze armature and soldered the original pieces back together.

"It was like a jigsaw puzzle," says Skip Brown, Florentine's president. "The town sent us a box of pieces and we sent back an intact fountain. We lined up the folds in the drapery of the sculpted woman's dress, stripped down the paint, and resoldered and repainted it." They also re-plumbed the old lead pipe for the water which comes out of an urn over the woman's head. She sits on a big cast-iron bowl with three graces around the bottom. The actual repair work took only a couple of weeks to do and cost the town \$4,000.

Rejuvenating the existing 19th-century Egbert Memorial Fountain in Franklin, Pa., was a combination of restoration and replication. Robinson Iron used the original fountain to create patterns for new castings, combined with some salvageable original components. A statue of Helen of Troy stands atop the fountain, with cherubs dancing around the pedestal. The sculptures were originally made of a zinc alloy commonly called "pot metal." The zinc reacted galvanically with the lead solder used to assemble the sculptural components, causing catastrophic failure.

New Fountains

New traditional fountains are also being built across the country. The William T. Kemper Foundation donated funds to design and build a classical bronze fountain for the downtown Kansas City Transit Plaza, which will be installed this Summer. The Kemper Foundation hired architect Lorie Doolittle of Theis Doolittle Associates, winners of the Municipal Arts Commission's 1991 Urban Design Award for their fountain at Garment District Place. Doolittle, working with noted classical architect Alvin Holm of Philadelphia, designed the Transit Plaza fountain, drawing inspiration from various architectural motifs of buildings around downtown Kansas City.

Decorative brackets and floral details were incorporated into the threetiered fountain design, which is being fabricated by Historical Arts & Casting, in West Jordan, Utah. Historical Arts & Casting also designed the water flow, central piping, and drainage. Larkin Associates, mechanical engineers, devised the pump system and the valves beneath the floor of the pool. The total cost for fountain fabrication and installation will be around \$650,000.

Doolittle says that "in fountain design you have to consider who is going to be viewing it and from where. It makes a difference if you are driving by versus sitting looking at it. This one is on a sloping site, so we took into consideration how it is approached from cars and by foot — which influences After completing the new castings, Robinson Iron re-engineered the origi-

nal gravity-based water flow. The piping goes up to Helen at the top, water flows out of a pipe in the urn, and then falls into the bowl with a balanced flow-control system of pipes and valves.

They applied a three-step protective coating: a zinc-chromate primer, an epoxy primer, and an acrylic/urethane finish coat that was then highlighted with an antique glaze. Robinson also developed a recommended set of maintenance procedures for the town.



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

In an impressive restoration effort, the Highland Park Community Club of Pittsburgh, and board member Debbie DeAngelis are working with the city to restore a large-scale 1890s fountain at the entrance to the park. The original fountain, with its long fountain wall, rectilinear pool basin with shelves above, grottos, and a central tiered bowl, had been totally altered. The original central fountain unit is missing, the basin was turned into a planter, and ginkgo trees were planted around it.

Thomas Podnar of McKay Lodge Fine Arts Conservation, Oberlin, Ohio, proposed a reconstruction plan that would remove the fountain wall, excavate and create a new fountain pool, and then reinstall the original wall as a facade. To recycle the pool water, a new pump pit will be installed. Still unresolved: to go for a custom duplication of the historic original (cost: around \$700,000) or an adaptive interpretation from available components (cost: around \$250,000).

Condition surveys are often essential for a town's cohesive fountain-resto-

ration master plan. For example, Podnar completed condition assessments and treatment recommendations for 11 fountains in Savannah, Ga., evaluating the plumbing and pumping systems, levels of maintenance, and available funding. Because Savannah's fountains each had a different piping and pumping system, the report recommended that the city standardize the mechanisms as they are replaced, so that they can be more easily maintained.


Podnar says that fountain conservation is extremely challenging because "you are taking different types of metal and stone, putting them in an aquatic environment, and asking them to perform in a way they don't normally. The environment is corrosive, and you see materials fail in every possible way. So the system should be designed in the most simple, straightforward way, anticipating the need for future maintenance and repairs."

Podnar notes that the main problem in fountain conservation is a lack of maintenance. Craftspeople with a good working knowledge of fountains are few and far between. In addition to the problem of deferred maintenance, during the past few decades many cash-strapped municipalities either turned off civic fountains, or demolished them completely. However, with the renewed interest in downtown public spaces, there are hopeful signs that fountains are being restored to their historic role as important — and delightful — symbols of *civitas*.

IT'S ABOUT TIME

Street and tower clocks can add a "timeless" look to Main Street. From post clocks in landmark districts to large faces mounted on a Gothic tower, clocks exist to suit any commercial redevelopment project.

We surveyed 21 companies who still make these timekeepers, popular with Main Street and streetscape projects, churches, and college campuses around the country. We present twelve of them here, and most will provide customized clocks, with options that specifiers can choose from their catalogs.

For example, standard clock-face options from Canterbury International include translucent "skeleton dials," a number of different clock hands, and several styles of Arabic or Roman numeral dials. The two-dial Howard post clock from Electric Time features an ornamental crown that can be customized and cast with a name on it, and translucent dials back-lit with high-output florescent illumination.

Strictly standard options include Blake Industries' illuminated Main Street

model, a two-face clock available in 12-ft. or 16-ft. sizes. Tooterville, specializing in streetscape nostalgia, carries an elegant four-sided clock with Roman numerals. Though most of their work is custom, the Historical Arts & Casting catalog includes an elegant two-face post clock, model #CL01.

Highly customized clocks illustrated in Elderhorst's catalogs include mechanical moving clocks with figurines or with ingenious working mechanisms. Verdin's specialty, illustrated on their website (www.verdin.com), is the "Singing Tower Clock," which reproduces bell-chime sounds when the clock strikes.







THE CUSTOM KIOSK

Along a Main Street, in the park, or on the town green, gazebos and kiosks are an invitation to community activity.

While there may not be many brass bands left to take center stage on the town's bandstand gazebo, there's still something about these structures that evokes a sense of civic pride. Scholar S. Frederick Starr calls them "bright and whimsical pieces of urban sculpture." But gazebos and kiosks are also extremely useful and, we found, being newly commissioned by Main Street and civic organizations.

One example is the park kiosk shown at right. Campbell Thomas & Co., architects in Philadelphia, commissioned Oak Leaf Conservatories to build a guard house for surveillance of one of Philadelphia's city parks. The design was based on drawings and photos of a Philadelphia park guard-



house built in the nineteenth century. The new Carpenter Gothic house is made of mahogany, with a lead roof and glass and wood sides. The parks department has its own surveillance equipment inside the structure.







DEGREES OF CAST STONE CUSTOMIZATION

Improvements in the availability and economy of cast stone can often be achieved when the specifier balances the needs of a project with the degree of custom shapes required for the cast stone installation.

The indirect labor costs of design, layout, supervision, coordination, and moldmaking needed for a "full custom" project can greatly exceed the actual direct cost of just casting and delivering a basic or standard product to the jobsite. This causes wide variances in the price of cast stone and places a premium on the product, which is not always necessary.

With the foregoing in mind, cast stone projects will generally fit into one of the following categories: Standard, Semi-Custom, or Custom.

Standard Cast Stone

These items are purchased according to a manufacturer's catalog, shop drawing, or inventory of molds. They may be ready-made items or made to order. The units are usually priced individually. The architect or contractor determines the quantities and location of each unit on the structure, as well as the method of anchoring to the structure, if required. The cast stone manufacturer provides no layout drawings. Cutting of units in the field is usually required.

Semi-Custom

Cast stone items are purchased according to unit shapes shown on contract documents or according to shop tickets specially prepared to define the scope of the work. They are usually made to order either from custom or inventoried molds. The units may be priced either individually or as a lump-sum contract for the project. The cast stone manufacturer prepares shop tickets for approval, which show the quantities, cross section, reinforcement, finished faces, anchoring provisions, and a schedule of lengths to be provided. The architect or contractor confirms the quantities, sizes and location of each unit on the structure, as well as the method of anchoring to the structure, if required. The cast stone manufacturer provides no layout drawings. Some cutting of units in the field may be required.

call for the location of every joint on the building facade to be precisely located, while others desire standard products and consider custom products to be cost prohibitive. Methods are available for controlling joint locations when using semi-custom typical lengths and standard products as described herein, and they should be used whenever possible.

Where jointing layouts are not clearly shown on contract documents or where shop-drawing requirements are not clearly spelled out in the project specifications, misunderstandings and disappointment can develop between the architect and cast stone manufacturer, unless the parties first agree that the job will be fully custom in nature.

In custom cast stone work, allowances must be made at bid time for unknown conditions; shapes may need to be developed through coordination efforts and 30-60% of total production cost can easily be expended detailing special shapes and making molds for them, unless a fair amount of repetition is inherent in the design. If there are too many one-of-a-kind pieces, the masonry contractor may need to assemble a "puzzle of shapes" at the jobsite, causing extra handling and confusion.

When the architect implements a standard or semi-custom design, which commits to a certain number of shapes and sizes, the approval process is significantly streamlined, and delivery times are shortened. The masonry contractor may choose to receive a neat pallet of modular units, which can easily be cut to fit the exact as-built dimensions at the jobsite.

For most installations, typical lengths will be the common unit, with 4-ft.

Custom Cast Stone

These items are purchased strictly according to contract documents and according to shop drawings specially prepared to confirm the scope of the work. They are usually made to order from custom molds. The units are usually priced as a lump-sum contract for the project, according to plans and specifications. The cast stone manufacturer prepares shop drawings for approval, which show the details of stones, arrangement of joints, quantities, cross section, reinforcement, finished faces, anchoring methods, anchors, and the location of the units on the structure. The architect and contractor approve the shop drawings to confirm the cast stone manufacturer's interpretation of the contract documents, quantities, sizes, location of each unit on the structure, method of anchoring to the structure, and coordinate the interface of the cast stone with other trades. The cast stone manufacturer normally provides layout drawings. Cutting of units in the field is usually not required.

In many specifications today, architects are requiring layout drawings that

0-in. modules (3 ft. - 11-5/8 in.) as the most popular size. Longer lengths are available but should generally not exceed 15 times the minimum cross-section thickness. Control-joint spacing should divide evenly by the size of the typical unit. Special corner and end units should be cast to suit the end-of-wall condition, and intermediate units may be cut with a standard abrasive-blade masonry saw.

A typical fitting specification should include the following: 1) Follow architect's jointing pattern as shown on contract drawings. 2) Cut units to suit in-place wall dimensions.

3) All window and door surrounds shall consist of evenly sized units.4) Apply zinc primer to all exposed reinforcement before setting stone.


Window sills should be sized to fit the masonry opening or mullion spacing, with allowance for 3/8-in. joints. The height of all cast stone, which is built into masonry walls, should match the brick coursing. Profiles should be designed with the Cast Stone Institute Value Engineering suggestions at hand. Standard cast stone jobs are best suited for designs that call for basic and

popular items, such as band courses and wall-cap coping, pier caps, keystones, quoins, and window-sill units sized to replace brick. Semi-custom projects can include almost any application where the designer is willing to dimension the stone units on the contract documents.

Custom cast stone designs represent the majority of buildings under construction today. Layout drawings are needed for projects that have many different profiles running through changing wall sections or one-of-a-kind installations such as entrances, porticos, and signs. Base courses of stone at changing grade elevations, radius walls, and applications suspended from structural concrete or steel are other good applications for custom cast stone.

In order to achieve continued widespread use, semi-custom products need to become more popular. The demand for high-quality timetested ornamental building materials has been in existence for as long as the need for enduring architecture. The tendency for owners to expect more building in less time for fewer dollars is, of course, stripping ornament from modern architecture designs with familiar frequency. Only when architects work together with manufacturers to do more in less time







SPECIAL REPORT TERRA-COTTA RESTORATION

TERRA COTTA IN THE CENTER RING

The Roaring 20s Era Ca' d'Zan, Ringling's palazzo-style mansion, is a grand terra-cotta restoration project.

Ca' d'Zan, located on Florida's Gulf Coast, is the 1929 terra-cotta residence built by circus producer John Ringling, which has been open to the public since 1947. Both the interior and exterior have suffered the wear and tear of age.


John and Mable Ringling used the Venetian Gothic-inspired mansion both as a showcase for their collection of furniture and art, and as a glamorous spot for entertaining celebrities and potential investors. The interior collections were acquired during their travels in Europe and highlight a grand, booming decade in Florida's development. Ca' d'Zan is also an example of the work of Dwight James Baum, a prominent domestic architect of the era.

On the exterior, polychromed terra cotta was used on ogee window surrounds, balustrades, balconies, and other elements, and decorated with quatrefoil, flora, and fauna motifs. Delightful winged lions are one of many shapes replicated in terra cotta.


A preservation team consisting of architects Ann Beha Associates, Boston, Mass.; conservators Building Conservation Associates, Inc. (BCA), and engineers Robert Silman Assoc. of New York, have completed one part of

a \$4.5 million restoration plan. While other areas were also in need of conservation, including roof-replacement work and work on the leaded-glass windows, the failing terra cotta was considered the single-most significant threat to the building and to passersby.

In the 1920s when the building was constructed, glazed architectural terra cotta was thought to be a waterproof material. Flashing, weep holes, and other protective elements were not included in the construction. This has led to serious water-related deterioration problems, including extensive corrosion of metal fasteners and the terra cotta attached to them.

The delicate terra-cotta work, particularly the seaside areas, suffered from exposure to the sea spray and gulf winds. The door and window surrounds, tracery, balconies, railings, cornice, and finials are all made of terra cotta. The exterior stucco is also applied to terra-cotta structural tiles. These terra-cotta elements were either built into the structural walls or supported by a variety of metal angles and clips. Photos from 1994, in the first phases of the project, show exterior areas with missing and deteriorated balustrade elements and broken roof tiles.

According to a report in the design phase of the project from Ann Beha Associates, prepared in consultation with BCA and RSA, the failure of metal anchorages caused deterioration in the form of delamination, spalling, and glaze discoloration in 40 percent of the structurally stable terra-cotta units. These units required replacement and repairs such as filling cracks and composite patching repairs to build up profiles, followed by the application of polymer-modified coatings to replace damaged areas of polychromed glazes. Silman Associates and BCA investigated all areas of the building including the balcony soffits, where they discovered significant deterioration. Corroded reinforcing and support steel fasteners on the balconies were replaced with stainless steel, and the balconies were waterproofed.



(Photo: Ann Beha Associates) Terra cotta can require a six-month to one-year lead-time to manufacture, so every unit was catalogued in a comprehensive survey by BCA. The conservators developed a computerized database, with each terra-cotta piece documented and numbered. This information could then be tied in with computerized cost-estimating and CAD documentation.

In an early phase of the 1990s restoration, during an early project-site visit, about 60 percent of the balusters were found to be damaged. Some terra cotta, including elements of the balusters, had been replaced in a 1950s restoration. Both the original pieces from the '20s and the replacements of the '50s were manufactured by O.W. Ketchum.

Extra terra-cotta units were fabricated in the 1957 restoration, in the event that future breakage should occur. These extra units were stored in the basement, randomly stacked, one on top of the other. BCA oversaw categorizing and classifying these pieces to determine if they were in usable condition and placed them on raised pallets to prevent further damage. The overall quality of the extra 1957 replacement units lacked the crispness of the details and colors of the original units.

BCA determined that many of the damaged units needed to be replaced with new terra-cotta units made using new molds. In the end, this amounted to more than 1000 units that were fabricated by the Boston Valley Terra Cotta Co. everything from soffits, ornamental fascia units, and many elements of the corroded balustrades. New units manufactured by Boston Valley were scrutinized by the design team, with a lot of back and forth between Geoffrey Preston at Kvaerner Construction, the construction manager and masonry contractor, and the manufacturers.

In keeping with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation, this state historical landmark was treated with the least degree of intervention. This meant patching, piecing-in, splicing, reinforcing, or consolidating the elements in situ when possible. The recommendation was made to replace terra-cotta elements with terra cotta, and not a substitute material. Polychromed glazes like those found on Ca' d'Zan are very difficult to replace and maintain using substitute materials.

Pamela Hawkes, principal architect of the project from Ann Beha's office, says that matching both the body and decorative glazes was one of the biggest challenges. The body has a speckled engobe finish, with a grain and pigment and a wonderful character. The tops have a hand-painterly coloring achieved using breathable coatings manufactured by Edison Coatings of Danbury, Conn. Many custom colors were created. Trying to get that variety took a long time.


Another residual problem that was created with the work done in the 1950s was the use of aluminum-copper alloy rods in some of the columns, balustrades, and other units. The metals were unsuitable to be in contact with the mortar or the seaside location. The barstock had corroded to a flaky consistency. It flaked like a pastry, says Ricardo Viera, Associate Director for BCA. In cases where the terra cotta was in good shape and the bars were corroded, the team cored out the old metal and inserted new stainless-steel pins and fasteners.

Terra-cotta work still remaining includes the terrace and the balustrades that lead to the dock, says Viera. This work is part of phase two of the project. The terrace at the west side of the building is close to the water, and has suffered extensive deterioration. Work in the second phase includes documenting these conditions and doing the necessary repairs and restoration work. Since the deterioration on many of these units is so serious, it will require the fabrication of more units of terra cotta.

Construction work for the second phase is set to begin this summer. Other design work for the second phase includes restoration of interior spaces and conservation and museum-related issues including climate control, fire protection, lighting, and electrical systems. — *Laura R. Allen*





THE COLOR OF MASONRY

Nothing shouts out "BAD RESTORATION!" louder than new repointing or new brickwork that does not match the color of the original. Two companies now offer products/techniques that can blend new with old.

Masons may have used materials for repointing which look great in the sample box, but are a disaster when you're looking at ten stories of the stuff. A patched brick wall or addition to an existing brick structure can stick out like a sore thumb if it doesn't match the color of the original.

But help has arrived, in the form of systems now available — one to make new brick or masonry, or any porous material, look old enough to have been put there by Thomas Jefferson, the other to specifically "age" mortar. The two companies that have specialized products, systems and skills to offer in this field of restoration technology were consulted for this article. Following is a discussion with each in which we explore the features, advantages, and limitations of their products.

Nawkaw Corporation, headquartered in Athens, Ga., is a full-service company that has for fifteen years been providing a service in which it applies proprietary custom-made masonry stains that, according to the company, "can change, highlight, enhance, blend, tone down, or add dramatic new dimension, charm, or character to any brick, block, stone, mortar, or other masonry product or material."

Nawkaw got its start in this field, according to Peter Woodworth, the company's Vice President, by working with manufacturers of brick and block to solve the problem that sometimes occurs when two or more runs or lots find their way into the same building, resulting in an unaesthetic appearance. The company still answers this need, going to a site and matching the wrong or off-colored masonry to the right color, but it has also moved strongly into the restoration/renovation area.



Tinting of mismatched brick and mortar is provided on a full-service basis by Nawkaw Corp. They use a water-based stain, which is mixed on site by Nawkaw personnel and can be thinned and continually color-adjusted as needed during the course of the job. Write in No. 206

The product is a water-based stain, which is mixed on site by Nawkaw. It can be thinned and continually color-adjusted as needed during the course of the job. This work is skilled and labor intensive, Woodworth cautions, and the application can only be done by Nawkaw itself or one of its licensees. Stain is applied unit by unit - one brick at a time, or one stretch of mortar at a time. Care must be taken to avoid overlapping brick color on the mortar, and vice versa. Application techniques include brush, sponge, rags, or whatever else is suggested by the tested skills learned through the experience of the craftsperson doing the job. It all depends on the application. Colors can be varied to mimic the actual effects of aging on the surrounding masonry work. The stain dries in about a half hour — it won't wash away in the rain — and cures completely in one month. Once in place, it will age along with the adjoining untreated masonry. The stains are permanent and guaranteed for 25 years. In addition to color matching, the stains can be used to apply decorative elements to existing structures - for example, adding decorative quoining (the color highlighting of "quoined" corners). The product cannot be used on glazed materials. Nawkaw has licensed operators in the U.S., Canada, and Australia. Mr. Woodworth estimates costs ranging from about \$1 per sq.ft. for a simple job of toning down new mortar up to \$5 to 7 per sq.ft. for more elaborate jobs where several colors are required. The work can often be simplified, Mr. Woodworth suggests, if the client will consult with Nawkaw before the restoration job for advice on selecting the types of mortar and/or brick that will enhance its ability to achieve the best match possible for both color and texture.

The company has many notable projects to its credit, Mr. Woodworth notes. Examples include the restoration of the Osceola County Courthouse in Kissimmee, Fla., and the Margaret Mitchell House in Atlanta, which required extensive restoration after being severely damaged by fire. A particularly big job was the Evanston Hospital in Illinois, which had accumulated five or six additions over its 100 years of existence. Extensive modifications and repairs had been made over the years, in-

cluding many bricked-up windows. After the treatment by the Nawkaw Masonry Coloring System, the whole place looks uniform in color, according to Mr. Woodworth, and appears as if no additions have ever been made.

Cathedral Stone Products of Jessup, Md., as its name implies, supplies a whole range of masonry and stone products. However, it's also now offering a new product known as Epochrome S, a liquid chemical toner for restoration mortars that "ages" them to match older work. This material was developed by a Columbia University scientist, Norman R. Weiss, who was working as a consultant to the New England preservation firm, Monument Conservation Collaborative.

The product is specifically designed for cement-containing compounds only, according to Keith Matney, Cathedral's Marketing Director. The product is a clear water-borne chemical toner that deposits colorants by controlled precipitation, creating a patina that simulates the visual effects of aging. It is not a paint or pigmented glaze; it contains no iron oxides, Mr. Matney notes; and it will not stain brick or tile adjacent to the mortar being treated. The product is said to be odorless, contain no volatile compounds, and to be safe to handle, except for normal precautions related to a low pH. The toner penetrates the cement material and provides a permanent color change without altering the physical nature of the joint. Epochrome S acts on new concrete or mortar by accelerating the actual aging process. It can be used in applications where colored cement exists, such as terrazzo or patching mortars.

The toner is available in three colors only, Matney notes — a warm gray, a yellow ocher, and a light brown. Cathedral supplies a sample kit of the three colors for \$45. Once the color is selected, the toner can be purchased in a one-liter container for \$48, or two liters for \$78. Used in a 1:1 dilution, a 2-liter container of Epochrome S will treat about 3,000 to 4,000 linear feet of a 3/8-in. mortar joint with a single coat — about 490 to 655 sq.ft. of surface on a typical brick wall. Where the material is used on areas of composite repair, 2 liters of toner, undiluted, should cover 60 to 65 sq.ft. in a single coat. Application is by brush, according to Mr. Matney, and one or two applications are usually sufficient.

Epochrome S is to be used on mortar surfaces that have cured for at least seven days, according to the company. All finishing procedures on the masonry, including acid washing, must be completed before the application; the surfaces to be treated must be free of oils, evaporation retardants, and the like. On older walls, the mortar must be free of soil, construction debris, biological growth, and must be dry.


While no special skills are needed to apply Epochrome S, Cathedral Stone urges that careful testing be done beforehand to determine the right color, the degree of dilution and the number of coats required. Testing is done by means of small applications of one or more colors and dilutions, and should be repeated if field conditions vary from one area to be treated to the next. The company warns that, depending on the condition of the mortar and the particular color formulation, the test applications can produce an immediate and sometimes startling color. For example, the gray toner can temporarily produce a purple hue on a light-colored mortar, which will change considerably in two to three hours and will become stable in about 24 hours. If the result is too dark. the toner should be diluted, usually 1:1, but sometimes 1:2. If the result is too pale, a second application should be made. All results should be evaluated after the 24-hour stabilization period. The different color formulations should not be mixed, although one can be applied over the other after proper drving. While the product is formulated to avoid discoloration of adjacent stone, brick, and terra cotta, there may be a slight reaction with some materials, such as finegrained limestone. This should be tested.

SPECIAL REPORT NATURAL BUILDING STONE

DESIGNING WITH NATURAL STONE: IMPORTANT ELEMENTS IN DECISION-MAKING

For centuries, natural stone has graced much of the world's greatest architecture because of its ageless beauty, strength, and durability. It continues to be a key element in architectural design — both commercial and residential. In the '90s, cost effectiveness, discipline, and value engineering are key elements. What happens during the early design stages of a stone project can spell the difference between success and failure. The information you gather, the questions you ask, the people to whom you pose the questions, the stone quarries, and distributors with whom you work to acquire your stone are crucial aspects of your project. Here we review some critical areas and make some suggestions for easier specification.

Project Design

Image and Design goals. Usually the design team has a clear concept of the overall look they are trying to achieve (e.g., modern, conventional, historic, bold, etc.). Once this concept is established, the selection of building materials begins. If stone becomes part of the palette options, the purchaser will start a creative and challenging process of narrowing down the stone options. What follows are key design elements that must be carefully considered before finalizing the stone purchase. (Note: The term "stone" is being used to cover a broad range of materials: granite, marble, limestone, sandstone, and slate.)

Asking questions. Before selecting the stone, ask certain questions prior to and throughout the selection process: Do I prefer domestic or imported stone? Do I want to deal directly with the quarry, or do I prefer a distributor? Do I have sufficient information to make that decision? If not, how do I get the information? What kind of stone do I want for the exterior and/or interior, and is what I want suitable for those applications? Do I want exterior pavers, veneers, etc.? Will there be stone in the lobbies, public areas, elevator cabs, restrooms? What about stone vanities, bars, countertops, step-treads, and risers, or heavily travelled interior floor paving? Is my stone type and color available at a price within my budget? Is it available in the desired quantities? Will it be available when I need it? Does this stone vary significantly in color, and if so, is that appropriate for my use? What kind of finishes do I want? Has this stone been used on a similar project; if so, where? How thick should the exterior stone be? How sensitive is it - and its finish - to various elements, such as high traffic, acid rain, freeze-thaw conditions, staining? Is it easy to clean and maintain? From what quarry does it come, and is that quarry reliable? Does the stone have any inherent fabrication-sensitivity problems? Does it meet the minimum technical (ASTM) standards required for the intended use?

Color range. Stone is available in a huge selection of types, textures, and colors. After choosing a particular color, remember that stone, as a product of nature, is subject to color variation within the same stone type. Depending on the type of stone you select, the variations can range from subtle to extreme. Granite tends to be fairly consistent; marble may show color inconsistencies within a single slab; and limestone and sandstone may remain color-consistent throughout the quarry after many years of quarrying.

Finishes/textures. "Finish" is the final surface applied to the face of the stone during fabrication. There are a wide variety of finishes available for dimensional stone, and you should know where and how you plan to use the stone before making a final decision. The location of the stone, along with its intended use (walkway, countertop, cladding, etc.), can determine its recommended finish and thickness. Each finish produces a distinctly different look, as well as a variety of maintenance considerations.

There are many finishes that can be utilized on stone; the most common are: • Polished - finest and smoothest finish available, characterized by a high luster (gloss) and strong reflection of incident light, generally only possible on hard, dense materials. •Honed - superfine smooth finish, although not as fine as polished. •Flamed - rough finish obtained with a controlled torch and water, generally used on granite; it may also be used on some limestones. •Sandblasted - matte-texture marble surface finish with no gloss, accomplished by exposing the surface to a steady flow of sand under pressure. •Sand-sewn surface left as the stone comes from the gangsaw; moderately smooth, granular surface varying with the stone's texture and grade. • Smooth - description of finish produced by planer machines plus the removal of objectionable tool marks. Also known as "smooth planer finish" or "smooth machine finish." •Split-face - finish in which the face of the stone has been broken to an approximate plane. • Brushed finish - obtained by brushing the stone with a coarse rotary-type wire brush. • Chat-sawn - rough gangsaw finish produced by sawing with coarse chat. Relationship to surrounding materials. Stone is often selected to complement or match the color, texture, or overall image of other materials on the same building or adjoining buildings. Combining stone with metal, ceramic, fabrics, and wood can create a wonderful interplay of textures. Piece sizes. Stone experts can tell you whether specific piece sizes are going to be cheaper based on a particular quantity, and many architects feel that unit-size should be determined even prior to the design development process. Smaller pieces do not necessarily mean that the project will be cheaper. It may take just as long to install a small piece as it does to install a large one. On the other hand, large pieces can be more difficult to handle. Some stone selections are not available in certain sizes, while other sizes are not desirable due to inconsistent color variations. Available piece sizes are determined directly by the size of the blocks coming out of the quarry.

of origin, whether the stone is dimensional (cut to precise specifications) or non-dimensional (random sizes), the stone price, installation methods, special fabrication, number of pieces, consistency of slab thicknesses and piece sizes, architectural design, availability, and popularity of the stone. If you have selected an imported material, variations in international economics may be an issue. Many of these factors are taken into consideration in what is commonly referred to as "value engineering." Although cost minimization is always a major consideration, budgets don't always reflect the least expensive options. For example, for major commercial projects in public places, it is not unusual to increase the budget to accommodate more expensive stone options if the designer feels that such options are critical to the project.

Sources and Selection

When beginning the stone-selection process, you should thoroughly research your supplier options. Generally, these are:

1) Quarry-direct source. For many projects, quarry-direct sourcing can be a cost-cutter, as you are bypassing agents, distributors, etc. (Note: Some quarriers will not sell direct, and will refer you to a regional sales rep.) If you are seeking a local and/or domestic stone but don't know what's available, a good source of information is your local and/or state government (usually the Department of Natural Resources - Mines and Minerals), which can provide you with a list of stone quarriers in your area, contact information, and possibly details on their materials and a color sample booklet.

If you have difficulty getting this information from the government, use the yellow pages to locate stone distributors and/or contractors, and try to find those that carry locally quarried material. Many distributors carry primarily imported materials, but may buy from local/domestic sources if specified.

If you are seeking stone for a major commercial project, an excellent worldwide quarries listing can be found in the Annual Buyers Guide published by *Stone World Magazine* (phone: 201-599-2378) or *Dimensional Stone Magazine* (phone: 818-704-5555). They list stone-industry members by category and provide contact information and usually product information.

Depending on their size and setup, some quarriers will offer fabrication services (cutting, polishing, etc.). If not, they may have a relationship with a fabricator and/or installer or can refer you to appropriate sources for these services.

When dealing directly with a quarrier, ask for project and/or client references, make certain they can meet your production and delivery requirements, and have them provide any required test data. The extent of technical services available from a quarry will depend on their size, level of expertise, the market in which they specialize, and whether they have an independent sales rep.

(2) **Distributors/importers.** These are companies that represent one or more stone quarries and may also serve as stone contractors/installers. They can range in size from small local offices to huge international companies with extensive service and grand showrooms. Many of these companies specialize in imported material and have little knowledge of local or domestic stone.

When stone shopping through such companies, try to deal with a knowledgeable representative who is thoroughly familiar with his product line and able to provide you with written technical and test data, as well as a list of previously completed projects (at least some of which you should try to visit). This project list should include contact references (owners, architects, etc.) The supplier should have access to a large showroom where you can view many different colors, finishes, and types of stones. The sales rep needs to know about availability (quantity and schedules), technical characteristics, product limitations, reputation of the quarry, etc. He should be able to quickly provide samples and offer free estimates.

When acquiring stone samples, it is preferable to get at least three samples of the same material for each finish that may be utilized on your project. This will provide you with a more extensive and realistic idea of the color variation you can expect from different finishes.

A caution about stone names: Many suppliers have a custom of renaming well-known stones in order to confuse their competitors. You may therefore find it difficult to compare prices on the same material from among various distributors and/or have difficulty in locating a particular stone. I was once

Budget Considerations

A wide variety of factors can affect the cost of a stone project: the stone's country

contacted by a major construction company soon after they had fired a granite installer from one of their projects. There remained a lot of granite to install. The name of the specified granite was "Brazilian Brown." The general contractor was having a very difficult time locating what they thought was "Brazilian Brown" granite. After inspecting the project, I recognized the granite as "Nero Africa Impala." The contractor was then able to locate matching granite and finished the project.

Technical

Test data (ASTM guidelines). Test reports are often required for certain minimum standards of characteristics such as Absorption, Compression, Abrasion, Density, and Flexural Strength. Not all applications will require the same minimum standards, and you should have a copy of the ASTM guidelines on stone testing.

Test reports are frequently required on major commercial projects but can be utilized whenever an individual wants assurance that the material selected is appropriate for the intended use.

Technical characteristics can vary within the same material and/or from

location to location within the same quarry. For major commercial projects involving large quantities, it is advisable to have the testing done at an independent testing laboratory and have the test results made available directly to you from the laboratory itself rather than through the supplier. This assures you of getting the most current data available.

If selecting large amounts of stone for a major commercial project, visit the quarry with a highly knowledgeable rep, and have the quarrier identify the section of the quarry and/or the blocks from which the stone for your project will be extracted. Ask for slab samples to be taken from blocks from within that section. The samples and the corresponding blocks/slabs should be marked specifically for your project. If you decide to select this stone, you should require that all stone be taken from the blocks set aside for your project. In large jobs, it is very common to have periodic testing done throughout the fabrication process.

Mock-ups. For major commercial and/or residential projects, having mock-ups designed is an excellent way to determine how the stone will look in a variety of lighting conditions and in relationship to surrounding or adjacent materials.

Fabrication. This refers to the processing of stone to meet specific design requirements (e.g., cutting to specific shapes and sizes, finishes, etc.). Generally, fabrication is not a major issue for projects needing only non-dimensional stone (e.g., general landscaping or fireplaces utilizing rough, irregularly shaped stone, etc.).

Fabrication needs are dictated by design requirements of the project, and for this reason it is highly advisable that a designer obtain the valueengineering services of a stone expert during the preliminary design phase.


A wide variety of factors affect fabrication cost, including stone type, piece sizes, pattern intricacy, finish types, need for specialized cuts, and many others. (Due to the highly technical nature of this topic, it is impossible to go into extensive detail here.)


Maintenance and Repair


Maintenance and repair issues should always be taken into consideration, as they can affect the longterm cost aspects of stone use, not to mention aesthetics. These factors are very important when considering where to use stone in your project, what type of stone to use, finishes, etc. The method by which the stone is maintained is determined by the type of stone, the finish of the stone, how the stone is used, and the physical properties and characteristics of the stone. Without diminishing the importance of maintenance and repair factors, it is helpful to know that in the high-tech and competitive nature of the stone industry, a huge variety of excellent maintenance and repair products, techniques, and services are available.

THE COLUMN AS BODY-DOUBLE

The classical column has proved an amazingly popular and enduring architectural motif — even in buildings that show no other evidence of being influenced by the Classical Orders. Because of this growing interest, suppliers are now providing columns in every material — from traditional stone and wood to high-tech polymers and composites.

A column holds the power to transform a space — the ability to impart personality and *gravitas* to an otherwise ordinary setting. In testimony to this power, an interior designer of our acquaintance asserts that, in setting up an interior, "one can't have too many columns!" In another homage to the classical column, Architectural Historian David Garrard Lowe declares that the column is one of the three great symbols of civilization (the other two being the arch and the dome).

It would take a Jungian psychologist to fully explain humankind's persistent fascination with the mythic power of the column. Certainly, a part of the classical column's attraction is that it's more than an inanimate post; it is a stylized interpretation of the human body. The column has an identifiable head, shaped body, and foot. Turn a classical column upside down and, unlike a steel porch post, it is instantly apparent that it's topsy turvy. Some writers have gone so far as to assign gender and maturities to the various column types (Doric — the mature male, Ionic — the mature female, Corinthian — the young girl) and to regulate their architectural functions accordingly. (While we can't explore the anthropomorphic basis of the column adequately in this space, we refer readers interested in the topic to the book, *The Dancing Column*, reviewed below.)

A quick glance at the marketplace shows that the public's interest in traditional architectural forms has had a most salutary result for sellers of columns. In the past 10 years, not only has the number of vendors increased dramatically, but so have the materials options for specifiers. In addition to classic wood and stone columns, you can now get architecturally correct columns in stone-resin composites, FRP, cast stone, a variety of foamed polymers, aluminum, and other metals.

To assemble the accompanying *SourceList* of column suppliers, the Editors surveyed 133 column vendors in our database. From their responses, we selected 53 that provide our professional readers with a wide diversity of materials, geographical availability, and stock-vs.-custom options. — *CL*




THE BEST BOOKS ON COLUMNS Understanding The Column's Psyche

For designers who want to learn more about the history, significance, mythology, and subtleties of the column, the best reference is *The Dancing Column: On Order in Architecture*, by Architectural Historian Joseph Rykwert. The book is a wide-ranging treatment of the system of column-and-beam design we know today as the "orders of architecture." Rykwert takes as his central thesis the ancient relationship between architecture and the human body ... a relationship that many "modernists" have ignored, to the disadvantage of us all. The book traces the rich and historically persistent body-column metaphor through the writings of Vitruvius, Alberti, and many authors of the Renaissance and later.

What makes this volume noteworthy is that *The Dancing Column* is the first book to do this huge subject full justice. It provides a new critical examination of the way the classical orders, which have dominated Western architecture for nearly three millennia, were first formulated. Rykwert traces how these forms were shaped by the sacred rites of antiquity, and then shows how they have reappeared throughout the centuries, being reinterpreted by leading architects and theorists right up through the 20th century.

To develop his central theme of body-column metaphor, Rykwert reviews archaeological material from Egypt, Asia Minor, and The Levant, as well as from Greece - and includes the latest historical work on Greek society and religion, including recent archeological discoveries. Most important, however, is the author's exploration of the value of the metaphor to contemporary views of architecture. The body-column metaphor helps show how buildings should be conceived, and how physical forms relate to the fabric of human groups, to communities, and to society. Building, after all, is the ultimate group activity.


As Rykwert concludes: "I have presented Greek architecture as the most entrancing and forceful, the exemplary art of building, an architecture which still invites dialogue and touch, which requires physical contact across the millennia. It cannot teach us — history never can. But we may learn from it."

The Column Handbook

For the designer who wants a handy introduction to the layout and manipulation of the Classical Orders, the best available book is The American Vignola, by William R. Ware. Ware, who founded America's first schools of architecture at M.I.T. and Columbia University, was at the beginning of the 20th century, this country's leading teacher of the art of designing classical buildings. His textbook on that art contains a wealth of practical information, covering everything from the proportions of the elements in the canonical orders, to the layout of arches, vaults, roofs, and domes.

SPECIAL REPORT STOREFRONTS & FACADES

A "TIN BUILDING" RESTORATION PROJECT

Through lack of maintenance, cornices are usually the first exterior ornamental element to deteriorate. The restoration of the Landmark Fulton Fish Market shows how replication can be made in a modern material while maintaining the historic aesthetics.

When a fire of "mysterious origin" destroyed the top two floors and most of the exterior of the Tin Building at the Fulton Fish Market at New York City's South Street Seaport, an important restoration criterion was that nothing could interrupt the market's operations. One of the world's busiest wholesale fish markets, it operates like a beehive daily from before midnight to mid-morning.

The Landmarks Designation Report states, "the present 'Tin Building' market, the fourth market building to be located on this site, was built in 1907 and designed by the Berlin Construction Co. of Berlin, Conn. It is similar in form and plan to the earlier 1869 market, after which it is directly modeled. The building, designed in the neo-classic style, is an impressive commercial structure. The name 'Tin Building' refers to the corrugated metal facade, ornamented with two-story high paneled pilasters of sheet metal and surmounted by an entablature with an ornate cornice carried on console brackets. The cornice is handsomely crowned by three large pediments above the three projecting bays of the facade. The large, open ground floor is the sales room with the mezzanine offices looking over this floor and the old boat landing in the rear."

The fish market buildings, along with the rest of South Street Seaport, are now owned by the City of New York and administered by its Economic Development Corp. The Seaport area has been declared a Landmark District by the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission (LPC).

Design Process

The functional plans for the rehab of the building did not require any of the space on what was once the third floor. To accommodate the economic need and the restoration requirements of the LPC, a constructive compromise was arrived at whereby the exterior walls, including all ornamentation, were retained or rebuilt while a new roof was constructed above the second floor. The result is that from the street the building looks just as it was, while a bird's-eye view shows the upper floor to appear more like a ing maintenance cost of periodic painting, motivated the construction managers to seek a more durable and cost-effective substitute material option.

Turner Construction Corp. invited us to meet with WASA Architects, N.Y.C., and present the case for replacing the cornice with fiberglassreinforced plastic (FRP). A full-size sample of a similarly shaped cornice, photos of past work, and a history of several miles of installed New York City cornices (including a large 27year-old seaside installation, which still looks great), convinced them. FRP is maintenance-free (doesn't need to be painted), durable, and easy to install; elements can be cast into modular units, need no support framing, and have an attractive bottomline installed cost.

Scope

The 200-ft. front (west) elevation contained three large triangular pediments (36 ft. wide x 8 ft. high) with raking cornice, all separated by 28-ft. runs of full-size main cornice (48-in. ht., 29-in. projection). Each pediment contained a highly decorative tympanum (the flat, triangular center area) and was joggled forward from the adjoining cornice. The 380 ft. of the North, East, and South elevations consisted of a reduced-size (36-in. ht., 22-in. projection) rendition of the main cornice.

Sizing

Molded unit size is predicated on ornamental bracket and pattern spacing and handleability (must be something comfortable and safe for two workers either in the shop or on the installation scaffold to move without special equipment).

With molded-in modillion brackets spaced 24-in. o/c, the optimum handleable module for the 48-in.high main cornice was 72 in. long (less 3/8-in. typ. caulk-joint allowance) and weighed 120 lbs. The smaller nobracket profile of the side and rear cornice allowed for an 8-ft. 0-in. module weighing 99 lbs. per unit.

Typical of both ends on all molded units are full, flat, closed-end return walls. These ends act as structural vertical gussets to support the cornice roof, they reinforce and "freeze" the end profile (insuring unit-to-unit match), provide an effective class-1 fire stopping, and give a land for the installation of a foam backer rod and sealant caulking.

As in many historic preservation projects, the ultimate desire of the preservation architect is to "retain the fabric" of the original structure. This means not only faithfully replicating shape and appearance, but also using whenever possible, the same materials and processes as the original.

Since the Tin Building is located on a pier over the East River and adjacent to a heavily used highway in downtown Manhattan, it is exposed to a corrosive atmosphere of salt water, auto pollution, city smog, and direct sunlight. These environmental concerns, combined with the difficulty of recreating these complex shapes in sheetmetal, plus the ongo-

Shop Drawings

The key to success on a complex project like this was the creation of shop drawings on a CAD system. Some of the elements, like the compound, joggled "knuckle" at the juncture of the pediment rake, pediment horizontal, and the adjacent wall-mount cornice are extremely difficult to accurately depict with a hand-drawn print. Another common headache in restoration work is that precise field dimensions are not obtainable until

the scaffold is in place to do the installation. The easily modified CAD drawings allowed us to get started using preliminary field dimensions and were readily updatable as information became available. The precise final drawings then became our fabrication and installation guide. Tooling (Patterns & Molds) The first step after drawing approval is the creation of a full-size replication (pattern) of the original item. To insure accuracy, sections of the original sheetmetal cornices were brought to our shop for direct templates and measurements. (The unmistakable fish smell permeating these large samples overshadowed the styrene bouquet typical of an FRP shop. This new aroma made us wonder if there is an OSHA PEL for dead-fish odors.)

To insure fit, appearance, and compatibility, all the various required shapes were derived from the largest common unit: the main wallmount cornice. Before proceeding with moldmaking, this pattern was approved in the shop by the customer.

The resulting family of molds included the "minor" cornice, a reduced-height and -projection version of the "main," used on the sides and back of the building. The pediment rake was made from the upper main cornice, excluding the frieze and architrave, but containing provisions

for angled modillion brackets, dentils, and ends. The pediment horizontal was the same as the main, but without the top cyma curve.

Patternmaking for the tympanum presented different challenges. Since most of the original units were totally consumed in the fire, and meaningful pre-fire photos were nonexistent, we had to sculpturally recreate in modeling clay the elaborate bas-relief decorative scrollwork and shield. All of this totaled over 30 ft. long x 7 ft. high, and essentially flat. A five-part hard mold was made for ease of handling and modular installation.

All the molds for the project were made of fiberglass to assure good indexing and repeatability. Typically, tooling gel-coat was backed by a sandwich-type laminate with some additional bracing and then mounted on individual carts for ease of movement around the shop.

Parts Construction

Since this is a high-profile Landmark project, with exposure to a corrosive atmosphere, sunlight, and constant scrutiny, durability was a major factor in our choice of materials. To resist fading and weathering, we chose the best premium-grade gel coat we could find, and which was verifiable by the manufacturer's weatherometer testing data. Even though considerably more expensive on a cost-per-pound basis, the difference in actual cost between a standard, high-quality UV-stable NPG ISO and the ultra-premium grade is only about \$0.15-\$0.20 per sq.ft. — and worth it. The gel coat was color-matched by the supplier to eliminate any in-shop inconsistencies and drum-to-drum variations. The tympanum was made in a contrasting-shade gel coat to highlight its detailed ornamentation.

Typical cornice laminates are nominally 3/16 in. thick molded by spray-up and supplemented by additional sandwich-core reinforcement in the horizontal roof areas. All resin is fire-retardant ISO-polyester with a Class-I flame-spread rating per the ASTM E-84 test method.

Installation

With its unitized roof, end walls, and articulated face, each cornice unit is essentially a self-rigidized structural box. For a wall-mount type installation, these attributes of stiffness and inherent laminate strength can be capitalized on to eliminate the need for internal frames and armatures. Attachment to the building can be accomplished simply onto horizontal bands of treated wood blocking (or structural FRP or metal angles) at the top and bottom.

Whenever possible, the fastenings should be made downward into the top blocking and upward into the bottom blocking. This orientation takes advantage of the great shear strength of the fasteners and the bearing strength of the laminate while avoiding unsightly and ineffective face fastening. The top fastening should always include a stainless-steel/neoprene-rubber combination sealing washer to spread out the load and resist water penetration.

All cornice units are made with an upturned flange along the back edge of the roof. This detail helps to structurally reinforce that long edge and allows for effective counter-flashing to assure a watertight installation.

As with most large architectural projects, the actual molding portion usually has the least headaches. With three large pediments and the associated peaks, joggles, corners, transitions, and other unique, non-repetitive do-dads, the post-molding fabrication presented the greatest challenges. As a rule, all special conditions are shop-mitered. This means that the field installers do not have to invent cuts and joints or do any on-site laminating, which is messy and difficult.

Key to the successful completion of complex restoration projects (or any rehab for that matter) is the close coordination, communication, and cooperation between the fabricators and the installers. Functional working CAD drawings, accurate field dimensions, well-made fiberglass units, and careful installation with attention to detail were combined to produce the accurate recreation of this Landmark.

SECRETS OF GILDING'S NEW GOLDEN AGE

Over the past twenty years, the art of gold-leaf painting has experienced a resurgence. Here, a Chicago-based sign painter illustrates how to specify gilding the lily.

The "Golden age of Gilding" was approximately from the 1860s through the 1920s. Within those seventy years, gold-leaf signage - particularly glass-window signs - were commonplace. By the Great Depression, glass gilding drastically declined, and so did the need to pass on the tradition. With the advent of neon and electrical signage, gold leaf was considered old fashioned.

Today the craft has experienced a great revival, mainly because of a small group of young Denver, Colo., sign painters who, in the mid 1970s, became interested in rediscovering and learning the lost sign techniques. They created an informal organization called the "Letterheads," which has grown from its original seven, to more than 5,000 sign artists worldwide.

Gold leaf can be applied to a variety of materials, such as wood, metal, and stone, but as a substrate for gilding, glass can offer many beautiful effects that cannot be achieved on any other surface. These effects include the very ornate,

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such as etching, embossing, and glue-chipping, or the more common techniques, as in matte (satin) or convexed centers. It's important when specifying gold leaf to have a basic understanding of some of these techniques used to create interest and increase the effectiveness of the signage. All too often, gold is specified only as another color option, and not used to its full potential.

The basic process of glass gilding is applying gold leaf to the backside of glass with a sizing (adhesive). There are two types of gold sizes used today: gelatin water size, which produces a mirror (burnished) finish; and a synthetic varnish size that produces a satin (matte) finish. After the gold is applied and dry, it is backed up either by hand painting or screen printing on the gold to create the image. Screen printing is used to reproduce very fine or intricate lettering or images including halftones. The backing paint or ink color is usually black because of its opacity and durability. After the backing paint is dry and the excess gold washed off, a final coat of clear spar varnish is applied to protect the image from window washing. A typical gold-leaf job should last many years without any maintenance; the only real enemies are condensation and window washers armed with squeegees.

Gold leaf is available in different varieties of karats, including 23 karat, the most commonly used on glass, 18 karat (lemon gold), 16 karat (pale gold), and 12 karat (white gold). They can be used in combination with one another or individually to match the architecture. In Chicago, the traditional gold letter is a two-tone 23-karat single gild with a black outline. The outline is added to protect the edge and visually bring out the gold. There are two versions. One is a satin (matte) center of the letter which leaves a small area of mirror gold between the center and the outline. The other is a convexed effect that is achieved by the satin area creating a highlighted portion that is usually the top and right side of the letter. These techniques are used primarily for the exterior windows and transoms to increase visibility.

If the letters were a plain mirror finish, reflections of dark objects, such as buildings, could cause the lettering to appear dark and disappear into the background, but the satin (matte) portions of the letter will appear bright and catch light from different angles as a person passes by. Usually a plain mirror letter is only visible as a silhouette against a bright background.

Some of the more ornate and elegant glass-gilding effects are texturizing the centers of letters using etching, glue chipping, and embossing.

Glue-chipping is one of the more interesting. It involves lightly sandblasting the glass surface to be chipped and applying a hot animal-hide glue to the etched area. When the glue dries and shrinks, it chips the surface creating an organic fern-like pattern. Then the letters are gelatin-water-gilded, usually with 23-karat gold.

The gold is slightly extended beyond the chipped area to create an outline or glowline. The only disadvantage to this process is that it can't be chipped on

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



site as the glass surface has to be horizontal to chip. Damar embossing is a great alternative to etching and chipping on glass; it can be formed on site and does not permanently alter the glass surface.

The traditional style is a 23-karat mirror outline with an 18-karat embossed center. This is achieved by gelatin-water gilding and hand painting or screen printing the gold outline first, then filling in the center with a heavy damar varnish and texturizing a relief pattern with an embossing tool. After it's completely dry, the centers are also gelatin-water-gilded. There are many other



embellishing techniques that can be used with glass gilding, the possibilities are endless. But whether it's a simple understated look or a flashy and dramatic image, gold's brilliance and reflective quality gives all signage an unequaled distinction. The pricing of goldleaf signage can vary among sign companies, but most competent sign gilders are aware of the market and give the best possible product at a fair price. There are two common ways a company can quote a project. One is charging by the upright inch of the letter, usually





practical only for a simple gilded letter. The other pricing method is based on time and materials.

The sign industry is extremely diversified, beginning with larger electrical and neon companies, to the majority of the industry, comprised of small commercial sign companies with a handful of employees who offer a wide variety of sign services. Within this second group are sign people who have the necessary hand-lettering skills and knowledge of the medium to execute a decent gold job. Fortunately, there is more information available to the sign artist than ever before, such as sign publications, sign-related books, and also workshops and gatherings sponsored by the "Letterheads."

The old attitudes of keeping trade secrets have greatly diminished. The biggest challenge in our industry in the last decade is all the new technology. No longer is it necessary to have the traditional skills to produce a sign, but without the knowledge of good sign design and letterforms (to name a few), the sign's effectiveness and quality will be greatly compromised. When used by a skillful artist or designer, a computer is a wonderful tool. Some of the most talented sign people I know have incorporated technology with traditional skills to create the finest signage of our time.

HELPFUL HINTS FROM A SIGNMAKER

Specifying signage in a historic district can be frustrating and time-consuming. Here, a seasoned New Jersey signmaker offers hard-learned tips for securing a proper downtown sign.

Making signs has been my forte for over 20 years. I seem to have a natural ability to conceive, design, and produce signs that convey a historic feeling. But I have a problem, and so does much of smalltown America. As shopping habits shift, "service businesses" are taking over much of the heart of downtown — the Lily and the Lamb Florist is now Active Enviro, Inc., with a much more corporate-looking sign.


At the same time, the Historic Districts that were named in the 1980s and the Review Boards that were set in place to supervise the mission have sometimes become too restrictive. For example, some area ordinances run as follows: "No sign shall be freestanding. No sign shall project more than 6 inches from the facade. Signs for professionals shall be no larger than 200 sq.in. Lettering shall be no larger than 8 inches and be Roman in style." On and on they read. In many cases, at the end of this line sits the Review Commissions Attorney (to protect

the township and interpret these cumbersome rules) who finally says, "You'll need a variance." Just the application and escrow fees for a variance in my county seat of Mount Holly, N.J., (pop. 11,000) is \$750. This is a heck of a way to welcome a new merchant who may have a unique and interesting idea for his new sign program.

Having said that, here is my road map to successful sign approvals: (1) Visit the Township's Buildings Department, and quietly seek out the Secretary for the Historic Commission. Be sure to avoid the Building Inspector, as they are usually humorless and wicked, and they will not provide you with the information you are looking for. Smile as you meet the Secretary - usually an overworked, underpaid woman. She may be your biggest help in feeling out the whims and taboos of the "Hysterical" Commission. Tell her exactly what you are doing and where. Get a copy of the ordinance governing your project, and ask if there are any incentives, like grants for signs and facades...many times there are. In well-equipped offices, they may have a binder showing photos and styles of signs that the Commission wants to encourage. Don't be shy; ask to make a copy (smiling and charming all the while) of a style or two you think might fit your client. Also ask if and where old photos of the town might be displayed. All this fun cannot be had over the phone; it is worth the time to get "into the mind" of the Township. Before you leave, make sure you get the Board Secretary's direct phone extension, and ask if the Board Chairpersons' numbers might be available for questions you are sure to have later on.

(2) Shoot a roll of film showing every angle and interesting detail of your subject building. Having digested the sign ordinance and your perimeters, measure the areas where signs could be located. Gather other dimensions that may be helpful later; I always suggest to my clients that they include all changes and additions on one plan and seek total approval, hopefully, covered by one permit. Additions could be period doors, shutters, light fixtures, awnings, etc.

(3) I usually submit an overall photo of the building's facade with the proposed sign drawn and spliced into the photo itself - to scale and listing materials, color chips, etc. My drawings are all in pencil, with sign lettering greeked in. I'll indicate a font sample and typeface name on the side with any logo to be used. Bring all the photos to the Commission, but don't display them unless you need to. If all goes well, the Board may have just a few questions, then hopefully move to approve. Be prepared for a compromise or two. The key to success really centers around the drawing. If you are not providing the drawing or producing the sign, take time to visit a few sign shops in the area and examine samples and portfolio photos. Ask to see a few of their sign drawings. Be up front and indicate that you are seeking a design drawing to purchase outright. This you will use to obtain Township approvals and then fax around for at least three quotes for production. A sign-shop drawing is usually under \$100. Be aware that many shops design totally on computer. In my opinion (and as a "pencil" man), the sign shape and design is often limited by the ability of the computer and its operator.

Designing the Sign

Some aesthetic issues to consider when designing signs for the downtown are: How will the sign integrate itself into the facade? I feel the sign shape, materials, and color should be compatible with the building's style. The sign colors can be a notch or two brighter than the building's colors to help the sign "pop" off the facade. I like to borrow a building detail and include the motif into the sign shape, paying as much attention to brackets, posts, etc., as to the sign itself.

The content of the sign, lettering, logo, etc., belongs to the business/shop and the products being offered for sale. The first priority of any sign is to be readable and quickly understood from a distance. Cutesy graphic tricks can render a sign useless.

The sign industry is no exception to the use of revolutionary products like foam, epoxies, plastics, etc. Designing sign elements in foam allows the sign to

It is very helpful to have a rough sketch of your own or a photo of a sign you've seen to set the designer on his course. An excellent source of sign ideas is *Signcraft* magazine and their booklist. (Their phone number is 941-939-4644.)

If purchasing the building, indicate all ideas for facade change and signage on the site plan so that all will hopefully be approved at one time. Finally, my best advice is to consider the importance of the signs at the *beginning* and to provide adequate money in the budget. A quality sign that "hooks" the customer right off the street is worth its weight in gold. have great dimensional qualities without excessive weight. A favorite trick of mine is to use epoxy putty to create thick, ornamental, faux iron to enhance simple metal sign hangers.

The word "plastic" usually sends the Historic Commission into orbit (although unless a sign is stone, slate, etc., it will usually have some kind of coating). The traditional sign is always stained, painted, or gilded, so when using plastic letters, indicate them as painted or gilded "dimensional" lettering. Present samples to the customer and commission for approval.

Almost all of my sign coatings are latex and begin with two penetrating coats of a new waterproofing product called Seal-krete. Next, I apply two coats of an elastomeric primer and two top coats of top-quality gloss latex house paint. I will often use latex metallic coatings with applied acid for a rich and antique effect. A clear, non-yellowing latex can be used to glaze and add an aged appearance. An exterior latex size for gold leaf is also available to keep all coatings compatible. The permeable and elastic qualities of latex can't be beat when using a wide variety of materials as are often found in interesting and unique signs.



SPECIAL REPORT **BIRD CONTROL**

TACKLING TROUBLE ON THE WING

Professionals have learned that there's no single "silver bullet" for bird control. In fact, many successful installations involve a combination of two or more devices or systems. Here's a review of the leading products in the market today.

Perched in a tree or soaring in the air, birds are delightful. But once they colonize a building, they present a flock of problems, from structural damage to medical risks. The following companies can help you put avian visitors to flight. For best results, try to launch your efforts early in the season, before your feathered foes - and your difficulties - have started to multiply. While methods and prices vary, all the experts will urge you to begin by taking a bird's-eye view of the situation. You'll need to determine which species are on site and what attracts them. Is it warmth? Access to food? Seclusion for nesting? The next step is to clean the building thoroughly. Birds are drawn to their own scent, and old droppings suggest that a particular location is open for business. And finally, be sure to treat all available surfaces, lest your antagonists simply migrate from one ledge to another.

"Bird control is turning into an exact science; it's becoming more specialized," says Jack Wagner, vice president of Bird Barrier America, Inc., a Redondo Beach, Calif., firm that recently merged with Birdbusters in Alexandria, Va. For courtyards, overhangs, and other wide areas, Bird Barrier sells StealthNet exclusion netting in different mesh sizes, from 3/4 in. (for starlings) to 5 in. (to screen out gulls). Made of rot-proof polyethylene twine with about a 10-year lifespan, the netting comes in four colors: black, stone, white or translucent.

To protect ledges from pigeons, Bird Barrier offers an array of devices. BirdPoint and Bird-Flite are examples of porcupine wire, the industry term for a flexible base imbedded with blunted stainless-steel spikes. By giving surfaces an unstable appearance, porcupine wires prevent birds from landing and roosting. The stainless-steel loops of coil have a similar effect. These deterrents, which target large species, can be mounted with either screws or glue. Birdwire, a less-visible pin-and-wire system, deploys nylon-coated stainless-steel wire at alternating heights, requiring some installation skill. Smaller birds will be repelled by the electrified version, which uses either 110 voltage or solar power to give intruders a non-lethal shock. Apart from aesthetics, Bird Barrier's ledge choice hinges on what the company describes as "pressure," or the degree of infestation. At a heavily populated, high-pressure site, BirdPoint is the company's recommendation over the other products, although the spaces between the spikes are too broad to discourage the littlest pests.

Otherwise, "the biggest developments are audio-visual," notes Wagner. This category includes rotating screech owls, battery-operated squawkers, and even kites that look like osprey and eagles. Because birds tend to get used to these gadgets, none of them will do the job alone.

Nixalite of America, Inc., based in East Moline, Ill., manufactures Needle Strip, tightly spiked stainless-steel needle strips containing 120 points per ft. At this density, insects are the only winged creatures that can wedge themselves between spikes. The stainless steel is weather resistant, says president of operations Jon Gellerstedt, reporting that "we've got installations that have been up for fifty years." If the basic silver-toned wire doesn't meet your needs, Nixalite can match colors. Nixalite also has a complete line of additional pest-bird and



climbing-animal products that are both humane and environmentally friendly: bird netting, sticky paste and taste repellents, visual deterrents, climbing animal barriers, and even snake repellents and traps.

Ledge products made by Ecopic, in Birmingham, Mich., feature polycarbonate plastic bases that can be glued into place. Specific porcupine wires have been designed for pigeons and seagulls; a third model, the Xlarge, covers wider areas with a V-shaped prong configuration that should repel some smaller birds as well. Ecopic Volt, an electric fence, shakes up intruders with a mild shock accompanied by unpleasant vibrations. The company also carries predator balloons, iridescent foil tape, and nylon netting with a two-inch mesh.

Richard Selzer, president of Avian Flyaway, Inc., in Rockwall, Tex., calls his firm a service company that provides custom solutions for all bird problems. Electric barriers give a "punishment signal" to nesting and roosting species, while wire grids keep soaring species on the wing. For migratory flocks, Avian Flyaway creates individualized procedures.

Baltimore-based Birdproof, Inc., another service firm, primarily works with commercial and institutional clients. "We use a lot of different techniques," says owner Dodd Delph. Urban settings present extra challenges, he continues, because "birds that are habitutated to human beings are hard to control." Does the building in question boast a lot of ornamentation? This adds appeal for many two-legged species, with and without wings. "It's not the product, it's the understanding that matters," concludes Delph. "If I wanted to keep birds off a narrow ledge and didn't want to use porcupine wire, bent tableforks would do the same thing."



"Nothing is a magic wand," observes Mona Zemsky, marketing manager at Chicago-based Bird-X, Inc. From customers, she has learned that two complementary products used in tandem are usually more effective than any single item. Bird-X's stock of fifteen products falls into three categories. The first is audial devices, which rely on sounds - like the distress call of the target species - to evict unwanted guests. "Ultrasonic works great in enclosed areas, where it reverberates," Zemsky explains. "Sonic is better outdoors." The second category is visual, such as deterrents constructed of heavy-duty vinyl that have a more life-like predatory appearance, thanks to spring mountings and lenticular, three-dimensional light-reflecting eyes. The third group comprises physical roost inhibitors, from sticky, non-toxic chemicals, which have to be re-applied annually, to the ubiquitous

polycarbonate plastic-needle strips.

Each spike in the porcupine wire sold by Cat Claw, Inc., of Johnstown, Pa., ends in a miniature trident, suggesting a scaled-down hayfork rather than the paw of a three-toed feline. However it's described, company president Jack Shaw says, if the onepiece, stainless-steel device is properly installed on roosting sites, "it's unbeatable" for larger birds. The claw is best suited to ledges, windowsills, pipes, and air conditioners. The cheapest

style is uncoated, but white, gray, black, beige, and inconspicuous PhantomKoted versions are available, as are custom colors.

Principal engineer Lon Martin says that Wildlife Control Technology, Inc., based in Fresno, Calif., concentrates mainly on the agricultural market. But residential and commercial customers may be interested in pigeon and swallow/woodpecker netting and bird-repelling spikes. A wide range of audiovisual devices, from flash tapes and scare-eye balloons to propane cannons, will put many problems to flight — at least temporarily.


The Library Of Congress

The Art And Architecture Of The Thomas Jefferson Building Edited by John Y. Cole and Henry Hope Reed New York: W.W. Norton & Company, 800-223-4830 320 pages; hardcover; \$60; ISBN 0-393-04563-3

In 1980, the Library of Congress building in Washington, D.C., was given the name of its principal founder, Thomas Jefferson — a change which helped distinguish the original 19th-century structure from its more recent, neighboring annexes, the John Adams Building and the James Madison Memorial Building. Six years later, restoration began on the historic building. Because of the need to keep the Library in operation throughout the renovation, the undertaking took some eight years; not until 1994 was the building returned to its original condition. This book, published in 1997, celebrates that extraordinary effort, along with the history and character of the building itself.

This oversized 9x12 volume weighs in at a hefty 320 pages, and is filled with breathtaking color photographs (mostly by Anne Day), as well as numerous historic photos and illustrations. But far from being one more coffee-table trophy, *The Library Of Congress* is also overflowing with learned yet highly readable essays from a variety of perspectives. Librarian of Congress Emeritus Daniel J. Boorstin and critic Brendan Gill contributed introductory essays; museum curator Richard Murray examines the building's murals; art historian Thomas P. Somma discusses the sculpture and painter and author Pierce Rice looks at the building itself as a work of art; Herbert Small's 1897 guide to the then-just-completed Library is reprinted; and Barbara Wolanin, who managed the mural restoration, details the extensive restoration process. John Y. Cole documents the history of the Library's design and construction, and co-editor Henry Hope Reed provides an overview of the building's principal decorators, as well as a glossary of terms and a biographical dictionary.

Together, pictures and text bring to life the crucial importance of this historic structure. Too much of today's civic architecture seems built more to intimidate than to serve, and contributes not to the involvement and uplifting of people but rather to a belief in our own insignificance in the face of monolithic authority. The Thomas Jefferson Building, however, is at every turn defined by its function: to preserve, expand, and make available our nation's heritage of written wisdom in all subjects. This consecration to intelligence and service is embodied in the building's unparalleled success at uniting architecture, painting, and sculpture into a single vision that celebrates and inspires the individual.

"Great architecture rises above the ordinary into a special category when boasting splendid sculpture and splendid mural decoration," writes Henry Hope Reed. The meaningful convergence of these disciplines, regarded as the underlying principle of Classical architecture, is a human aspiration that transcends era and geography. Its realization requires the careful design and execution of a seemingly endless series of interdependent details, great and small. This impressive book offers some idea of the complexity of such a task, as well as the timeless value of doing the job right. The Thomas Jefferson Building is a gift not just to America but to the world, and The Library Of Congress by John Y. Cole and Henry Hope Reed will help make that gift all the more appreciated

— and thus, all the more valuable.

THE WORLD ATHLETES MONUMENT


Monuments serve a dual purpose: They pay tribute to a person or moment in history while providing an artistic focal point in a public arena. Both contribute to a sense of civic pride.

Rodney M. Cook, Jr., a founding trustee of the Prince of Wales's Foundation for Architecture, with the help of local businesses and individuals, has completed Atlanta's newest landmark: the World Athletes Monument on Peachtree Street, in Midtown Atlanta. The 43-ft.-high, 50-ton monument is a tribute to athletes and the spirit of international athletic competition realized by the Olympic Games.


A competition for the monument's design was organized by Dr. Richard John of The Prince of Wales's Institute of Architecture in London, and the winning design was by Anton Glikine of St. Petersburg, Russia. Marking the resurgence of Classical forms and involving New Urbanism, Glikine's visionary and romantic scheme invested the monument with the Olympic fivefold symbolism without using the official five interlocking rings. The base has five rusticated bands, the tholos consists of five columns, and the illuminated globe (which surmounts the monument) is supported by a sculptural group of five figures. Initially it was thought that these figures might exhibit diversity in terms of gender and ethnicity, but for reasons of economy it became apparent that they would have to be identical. They were therefore envisaged as representations of Atlas, taking the form of idealized males. This would justify their role in supporting the globe, emphasizing the links between the modern and ancient Games. The illuminated globe further reinforces the international nature of the Olympic movement shining light from every continent, while the eternal flame symbolizes the Olympic torch. The base, which was carved by local stone masons, Architectural Limestone Works, Inc., contains two aedicules with polished black marble plaques that commemorate the project patrons and contributors.

The monument sits on a triangular parcel of land granted by the Georgia Department of Transportation at the convergence of West Peachtree and Peachtree Streets, between two of Atlanta's most important museums - the High Museum of Art and Rhodes Hall Museum. This intersection was once the home of a number of historic buildings that were razed to accommodate the construction of an interstate highway ramp and, for over a decade, has not been redeveloped. The site was chosen in accordance with the concepts of new urbanism: create both a work of art that could bring people back into the area and a sense of place where none had existed. Special attention was paid to improving the existing sidewalks and adding new ones to provide easier access to the monument. The result has been a success, with increased pedestrian traffic along Peachtree St.; a new development of apartments, a restaurant, and a theater are being considered for the adjacent vacant property.

Victor Deupi of The Prince of Wales's Institute of Architecture assisted in detailing the original artist's concept while the Architect of Record, Peter Polites, AIA (Polites Cook, Atlanta), produced construction documents and working drawings. The sculpture was produced in Atlanta, with assistance



from renowned British sculptor Dick Reid. The project was supported by former Mayor Sam Massell of the Buckhead Coalition, Wayne Shakelford, D.O.T. Chairman, and Fulton County Commission Chairman Mitch Skandalakis. The monubeing ment is maintained by the Midtown Alliance, and 1/3 of its cost was met by local and international donations and gifts in kind, with the remaining 2/3 borne by the Foundation. This was due to His Royal Highness's wish that this not be perceived as cultural imperialism, rather that there was considerable local financial support. The cost was in excess of \$1 million, and local (U.S.) contributions were raised in just a few months. A temporary wood and plaster monument was completed and unveiled three days prior to the closing ceremonies of the centennial Olympics, and the permanent Indiana limestone monument was dedicated and the cauldron flame lit in May, 1997. Since that time, it has been visited by over 20,000 people, making it the most beloved monument in the region.













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
