If you belong to a group that needs a lot of money for a worthwhile cause, you can profit by looking at the phenomenal success of a group of gals from Missouri. Christmas no longer means a social whirl for members of Delta Gamma Sorority Alumnae in St. Louistheir pre-holiday season means days of hard work, often in the vilest weather, staffing a Christmas tree lot. All this, of course, is in addition to the countless chores everyone has to do during those three busy weeks before Christmas.

Last year, the net profit from the "Shop at One Stop Christmas Convenience" was $\$_{14,707}$. The lot sold 6,500 trees; two miles of pine, balsam, and laurel rope; and close to 2.000 pounds of holly. Sales of thousands of wreaths, door pieces, light strands, bulbs, safety fuses, handmade candles, and elaborate ornaments helped swell the till. And customers certainly get their money's worth.

Record keeper of the hundred and one details involved in this mushrooming project, and its first general manager, is Elizabeth Kohl (shown, above left, with her Sales Chairman Pat Gilbert). Her husband, Bill, dreamed up the appealing idea of "The Shining Light Christmas Tree" back in 1951, when the Delta Gammas needed to raise a great deal of money in a hurry for the newly-established Pre-School Visually Handicapped Foundation in St. Louis which provides guidance for parents of blind children under the age of six. As a result of these successful Christmas sales, the Foundation is able to send trained workers into homes to help parents adjust to the terrible shock of realizing that their children cannot see.

Businessman Kohl not only decided on a feasible plan, but drew up an imaginary operating statement based on the sale of 1,000 trees, and thought up the slogan: "Buy a 'Shining Light Tree' to Make Your Christmas Brighter and Help Us to Help Blind Children."

Although experienced nurserymen warned the enthusiastic planning committee that, because of unpredictable weather, a Christmas tree lot is a risky business, they voted to take a chance for sweet charity. When one wary nurseryman, A. A. Gunther, donated a large lot, his two Delta Gamma daughters were pleased as punch!

Everyone joined in. Husbands, Mothers, Dads, boy friends, and local firms with the most far-fetched connections imaginable contributed everything from pot-bellied stoves to insuranceand of course, back-breaking labor.

Then Old Man Winter presented the gals with the worst December weather in 20 years. Freezing rain, sleet, hail, with temperatures down to zero, meant that the 3,400 perishable trees had to be covered and kept free of ice every night, and uncovered in the morning. Two hundred and twenty women, who a season before had only known the tree-trimming arts, became roustabouts, CONTINUED ON PAGE 89

It was Christmas Eve. Isobel and Frank were happy. They'd started their shopping early and were satisfied their judgment had been good. They'd started really early, in fact. For they realized that a mistake could be serious-a living, breathing mistake the family would have to live with for a long time.

The twins had been asking for a dog almost from the day they could say "dog." Knowing how they'd felt about it themselves as children, Isobel and Frank were aware that they could not put off the growing demand indefinitely. Nor did they want to. Now the twins were five, well behaved, and willing to listen to reason.

The Parkers knew that any ball of fluff that came into their house would become a permanent fixture. They had to be sure it would be the right ball of fluff, so they asked the opinions of friends who seemed to know dogs. The Parkers considered the opinions carefully and came up with some sound conclusions.

First, they decided to ignore the opinions expressed by friends who showed definite preference for one breed. These people might be prejudiced for one reason or another.

The next bit of advice that seemed pretty sound was that there are good, fair, and poor dogs in every breed. After determining the breed they wished, they must pick a good representative.

There seemed to be a consensus on the subject of what to look for in a pup-the friendly, forward fellow or gal that was not shy and had experienced no fear. Such a dog was less likely to react in self defense, which even the best-intentioned dog might do if taken by surprise, stepped on, or cornered.
"Start with a dog that has no psychoses," one friend said, "and do your best to see that he always has confidence in you and no reason to fear physical harm-pick a happy pup-one at peace with the world."
Size had been their next consideration. They learned this lesson fast when they wanted to buy one of the cute little toy poodles.

The breeder was very patient, but very clear. "Not for small children," he said. "Older children, perhaps, and adults, but toys of any breed are too delicate for the unthinking, unpredictable movements and moods of little children. Toy dogs can't be fallen upon, tumbled about, or hugged too tightly. Once hurt, it is only natural that they take a stand in self defense.
"Get a bigger dog," he advised, "one that can't be easily hurt by healthy, enthusiastic children. Everyone will be happier."

double-coated dogs like the various sheep dogs, the Newfoundland, keeshond, Norwegian elkhound, and Labrador, can live indoors or outdoors with simple housing even in cold weather.

This could be an advantage, but on the other side of the ledger the longer hair presents a greater cleaning or grooming problem if the dog is to live with the family. Short-coated dogs shed just as much, but the shorter hair is less troublesome and carries less dirt. Then too, it is much easier to keep a short coat clean.
"How about the breeds that don't shed?" the Parkers asked. They were told that all dogs shed. Poodles, Bedlington terriers, Irish water spaniels, and some other woolly-coated dogs shed their dead hair into the living coat where it is held until the dog is combed, stripped, or clipped. This reduces housecleaning but increases the necessity for regular grooming of the dog.

Temperament, they learned, varies greatly from the placid

"He doesn't have any boots"
bulldog or basset hound to the highly active terriers.
The more active dogs require more exercise. Failing to get it, they bubble over in the house or feel inhibited in the kennel. A 65 -pound basset or bulldog, therefore, fits more readily into a quiet existence than a 20 -pound fox terrier. On the other hand, some folks like the rollicking terrier. They are willing to spend sufficient time with their dog to wear off the excess steam.

It is logical to select a dog that fits the temperament and the way of life of the people with whom the dog will live. Their tempo will be more compatible.
"What do you want a dog for?" was the first question most people asked. In the Parkers' case, the dog was to serve only as a companion. But it soon became clear that if they'd had any other purpose, such as rabbit or bird hunting or guard duty in mind, it should be given proper consideration so the dog could serve as many purposes as is logical.
"Buy from a reliable dealer," was an oft-repeated recommendation. "Buy from a man who can show you grown stock. See for yourself what the pup will become when mature."

They thought this good advice and followed it. It gave them confidence that, when the man said the pup had been fully immunized, they could depend on it. In fact, they had been given a card record of inoculations and dates to turn over to their veterinarian for the dog's medical history, and a feeding chart.

Yes, it was Christmas Eve, Isobel and Frank were happy. Tomorrow morning the twins too would be happy. It would be the very best Christmas of all!

## KNIT A SOCK OF

## CHRISTMAS CHEER

- When Kay Travaini of Phoenix, Arizona, designed this tiny Christmas sock, it delighted her friends. Since it takes just about an hour to make the sock, she ended up knitting several

Then came another good idea-Kay Travaini decided to share her Christmas sock pattern with A. H. readers. She suggests you knit the sock in pastel colors, too, and tuck in money to start a savings account for a new baby.

To make Christmas socks, you will need two balls of fine yarn, one white and one red, and a pair of size I knitting needles. This is the key: k (knit), p (purl), st (stitch).

Work the sock back and forth on two needles. Start at top of sock, and cast on 20 sts with white yarn. Work in garter st ( k all rows) for six rows.

Break off white yarn and tie red yarn in first white st. You will use the stockinette st (k I row, p I row) for the rest of the sock. Work 16 rows. On 17 th row, $\mathrm{k}_{13}$, turn, p 6 (center of foot), turn, k across these 6 sts, leaving remaining sts on needles. Work 7 rows in this manner on the 6 sts.

Break off yarn and tie on where the sts were divided to start center of instep. Pick up 7 sts evenly on the side of vamp. K across the 6 center sts and pick up 7 sts on the other edge. K to end of row, and p back across all sts.

K two sts together at the beginning and the end of next row (heel), and $k$ the two center sts together (to round off toe). Continue to decrease in this manner on k rows only. Work six rows. Bind off, leaving yarn enough to sew up sock. THE END

0f the two sublime holy days of Christians, that of the Nativity celebrates Jesus the Son of Man and that of the Resurrection worships Jesus the Son of God. Christmas is joyously human; Easter is joyously divine.

Since the first Christmas and the first Easter, composers have sung the humanity of the first and the divinity of the second. Humanity is easier for human composers to celebrate: man understands man better than he understands God.
And the hundred aspects of the Christmas Birth are wonderfully susceptible to musical treatment of the fundamental and decent conditions and

Adeste Fideles and Away in a Manger. But there are many others as good or better which have been neglected.

More than 100 are available on long-playing records, drawn from a dozen countries and sung in a dozen styles, with or without accompaniments. They offer a panoramic Christmas festival.
One of the most comprehensive of these records is Haydn Society 150, The First Christmas in Carols, sung in excellent English by the Societas Musica Choir of Copenhagen. The carols are drawn from the 14th through the 19th centuries. Half are not well known, and the earliest have a naive literalism of belief ir-
resistibly touching.
Two records (RCA Victor LM-1112 and LM-1711) cover a very wide range of type, time, and folk in the polished discipline of the Robert Shaw Chorale. Two others (Westminster 5100 and 5200 ) offer 39 carols, nearly half of them rare, in the highly stylized singing of the Randolph Singers. This small group specializes in madrigals.
The harmonic and polyphonic worldliness of some of these arrangements may excite some prejudices at first hearing. But the skilled smoothness of the delivery here makes it possible that their intricacies may be more
emotions: compassion, hope, love, faith, generosity, humility, tenderness, devotion, couragewhat is there in this Event that cannot move us?
The diversity of the participants-a carpenter and his wife, a newborn child, grooms, three kings, shepherds, travelers, an innkeeper, cameldrivers, legionaries-are these not symbolic of the universality, the classlessness of all within the true Christian faith? And what a background of characters, scenery, and sentiments for composers!
People are inclined, when thinking of Christmas music, to think of carols. A carol was originally a round dance, then the music sung to the dance. finally a song, no more, but usually one intended for a specific occasion.
Christmas carols are songs for Christmas, and the ones we use have been in the process of creation during the last 600 years. Some of these have a great charm of simplicity and others are highly organized works of sophisticated art. A large number are as familiar in one Christian country as another.

Most of us have heard or sung many traditional songs like these: Joy to the World, O Little Town of Bethlehem, The First Nowel, God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen, Good King Wenceslas, In Dulci Jubilo, Hark! The Herald Angels Sing,
 lor 19 popular carols by Canterbury Choir, conducted by the late Macklin Marrow, on M-G-M E E306r.
An extreme of lovable simplicity is reached in American Children Sing Christmas Carols (Westminster 5328). Five choirs of children pipe 24 carols, a third in English, the rest divided among Bohemian, German, Spanish, and French.

The dean among these singers is 14 , the junior four. Every listener will enjoy the supreme musical effort of earnest sopranos not yet old enough to have learned how to give offense.
In the phalanx of other recordings of carols, two additional discs have persuasive value. One, by the St. Luke's Choristers on Capitol H-9012, is agreeably traditional in feeling. The other, called Christmas Around the World, is performed by soloists. chorus, and the orchestra of the Théâtre des Champs Elysées of Paris, conducted by Marc Honegger. A rich-sounding Westminster record (5372), it is sung in French.
Only two of the songs are of French origin, but printed translations are furnished to clarify the sentiments. The 14 songs are from as many Continued on page 37

provinces in II nations, and the prevalent tone is enchanting simplicity. Few are well known to us in America.

Almost all of us can participate in carols, but there is a more formal Christmas music that contents us without our joining in. A Concerto for Christmas Night, by the 17 th century Italian composer, Arcangelo Corelli, was written for string orchestra and harpsichord. In its abiding melodies and provocative, sensitive rhythms, it alternates joy and tenderness in a way delightfully appropriate to the season, with a pastorale as touching as the Pastoral Symphony in Messiah.

This music has a dryer title for official designation: Concerto Grosso in G Minor, Op. 6, No. 8. Of several recordings, the best for Christmas use is RCA Victor LM-1776, where it is played by the orchestra of the Società Corelli along with four other of the composer's Concerti Grossi.

The delight of this Christmas Concerto, as it is most frequently called, does not end with Christmas, but like Messiah goes on forever.

Handel's magical oratorio may not be ignored at Christmas or at Easter. It connects the two great days with a variable commentary of equal but dissimilar benignity. Records are rich with it, with eight versions complete or nearly complete. (Recorded excerpts are not recommended because it is impossible to say that one part is less worthy of inclusion than another.)

Three, all made in England, are particularly praiseworthy in different ways. That with orchestra, soloists, and chorus conducted by Sir Malcolm Sargent in Angel album 3510-C is a vigorous statement of the music in its most common concert-hall form. The orchestration is beyond that provided by Handel, and a number of items are omitted.

The London (LLA-19) edition conducted by Sir Adrian Boult is complete and the engineers have given it the best sound. The Westminster set (WAL-308) under the direction of the extraordinary Hermann Scherchen is at once the most imaginative and the most studious of all. It depends on the original instrumentation but reveals some daring tempos and phrases sure to shock traditionalists. The Angel and Westminster sets each contain three records, and the London set contains four.

The existing records of Bach's great Christmas Oratorio have enough faults to justify our waiting a year or two for a version on the level of the music.

The exuberantly fantastic Frenchman Hector Berlioz composed an oratorio, The Childhood of Christ (L'Enfance du Christ), suffused with melting passages of haunting, descriptive devotion. Berlioz in his daily life did not display a devotion like this, but the magic of the narration enthralled him to write a music nearly as commensurate as man can come.

The oratorio has two recordings which, in purely musical terms, I hestitate to commend entirely. But both give a pretty good semblance of the composer's temporary piety, so either is worth having, perhaps as an illumination of early Christian sentiment.

Both editions contain two records. That of Vox, PL-7122, conducted by the leading French conductor Andre Cluytens, is more penetrating. Columbia's, led by Thomas Scherman with the Little Orchestra Society of New York, has a more realistic and impressive sound (Columbia SL-I99).

In the same exalted field we find the venerable Christmas Story of the 17 th century Heinrich Schutz. In this cantata for soloists, chorus, and orchestra, joy is blended with solemnity with fascinating archaic skill.

There is more church than open air here, and the north-German sobriety is at curious but not entirely incompatible odds with more southern rejoicing. But the sturdy belief is more comforting than many of the more familiar carols. There is an excellent all-around projection, in German, by the choir of the well-named Dreikönigskirche in Frankfurt, with soloists and orchestra conducted by Kurt Thomas, on Oiseau-Lyre 50020.

You'd probably not guess it to look at them, but the punch cups are really large size egg cups made in tones of brown and green. Look over what you have and seek out Christmas decorating novelties.
- Here's view of the mantelpiece in living room at the Trumms'. Those brilliantly burning candles look all the more impressive because they're set up on an oval steak board. A drop of melted wax on the board holds each candle in place. And the Madonna similarly gains stature by being placed on a small cheese board. In the background is a pewter trencher. And the finishing touch is the pewter bowl holding branches of holly, evergreen.

- In daughter Dorchen's room is this small Christmas tree of plastic. The unique feature of the tree is that a single light at the base illuminates the lights on the rest of the tree. Decorations in this grouping include a train plus painted and unpainted wood figures from many foreign lands.

JEAN AUSTIN, The Editor, has no big tree in her home nowadays, for she's off to the grandchildren's of a Christmas morning. And there stands a tree big enough for all. In her own home, there's plenty of evidence that Christmas is in the air. Those miniature tin trees are from Mexico. The bases they stand on are made simply by wrapping kitchen bowls of varying heights with tinsel. When the trees are hung with Christmas fixin's, they enliven the piano and make it a right merry place for all to join in on the Christmas Eve caroling over at "Grandma's" home.

HERMAN E. BARTEL, Visual Editorial Director, and his wife use Christmas decorating ideas that take full advantage of the usual decorating scheme of the living room. Lights above their fireplace, for instance, occupy permanent spot. For Christmas, a few rolls of Christmas wrapping paper, plus copper-colored paper taped up, turn the fireplace into unusual beauty spot. Safety factor is that paper is kept back away from fireplace opening. The lamp shades are covered to repeat design on wall. Icicles top lamps. Evergreen boughs grace the room's mantel.

Beautiful star you see on right-hand page is made of these materials : 5 small imitation Christmas trees with bases removed, styrofoam ball, heavy wire, bit of "gold dust," 3 cans of snow, plastic spray, Sobo adhesive, tiny ornaments.


Your first step is to form the five trees into the basic star shape. Use the heavy wire to bind the "trunks" of trees together so the star is rigid.


Use Sobo adhesive to fasten miniature ornaments close together as possible over all foam-plastic ball. In small spaces between, go tinier ornaments.

To cover hole at center of star, use white foam-plastic ball. Since ball is soft, you can easily shove wires through to hold ball firmly in place.


Now dot each point of star a bit less heavily than center with the colorful miniature ornaments. Then spray everything lightly with the plastic.

After wiring ball to center of star, spray entire setup with canned "snow." Be generous, but don't get too much in one place at one time.


Before plastic has a chance to dry completely, sprinkle the star lightly with "gold dust" for extra sparkle. To hang star, fasten wire back center.

THE WILLISES (Managing Editor Jeannie, and Promotion Manager Weldon) have two young Willises, Clyte and Gil. And the whole family has a fetish: the Christmas tree. It has to be tall enough to almost poke a hole in the ceiling. Ornaments vary widely in age and type. Some are as "ancient" as the parents, and at least one beautiful new ornament is added every year. There are paper ornaments from back in newlywed days when these were all the budget would allow. And the kids have made other ornaments in school. No part of the tree can escape decoration. And no room in the Willis home escapes Christmas spirit. In fact, spirit begins right at the door with the merry mouse (page opposite). In the formal parlor hangs a beautiful star (above) that's in keeping with the room. Tiny Christmas balls were twisted together, then twisted around candlesticks. No matter what the period of a room, the Willises say, you can decorate it pleasantly for Christmas. In their dining room, for instance, the decorations have a Mexican flavor.

To make leaves for the pear tree, you first get two sheets of metallic paper. Rubber cement them back to back. Trace leaves with pencil, cut out.


Make the pears themselves from modeling clay. Try to make all the pears about the same size, scaled considerably smaller than genuine pears.


Clay fastens flower pin holder to container. Arrange white-painted branches as desired. Base and holder may be covered with glass beads.


Short pieces of fine wire bent as shown make a good way to hang pears. Straight wire end goes up through bottom. Spray pears with gold paint.


Rubber cement leaves to twigs. Hook on pears by means of wires. Finally attach a bejeweled pink "partridge" with wire at strategic spot.

Jolly snowman you see, right-hand page, is made from flexible cardboard, rubber ball, wrapping paper, small boxes, tape, dowels, miniature ornaments, cork, wood base, paint, cotton, clear glue, some map pins.


Bowl of his pipe and most of hat are made from flexible cardboard. Staples fasten "stovepipe" crown; and the, glue holds crown to brim. Burlap, tape, ribbon, trim hat. All is sprayed gold. Pipe stem: dowel.


Paint base black, then let it dry thoroughly. Make snowman's body by stapling cardboard into "volcano" shape. Dowel glues into hole in the base. Glue tabs at three spots inside cone. Fold tabs; glue to base.


Head is rubber ball painted white. Dowel passed through body formsthe arms. "Sleeves" are cotton, "hands" go in slots. Nose is cork. Paint mouth. Glue on tie, hat, boxes, and ornaments as on snowman at right.


WILLIAM LANYON, Associate Art Editor, and family have a Christmas tree like this one (left) on their hall door. In the living room they have a lot of other decorations such as the snowman (far left) for which you're provided a full set of how-to instructions on the left-hand page. To make the Christmas tree, you cut the outline from shiny red cardboard. Across the center goes a strip of white, and heavy white yarn that's glued in place forms the lettering. Bells are the ro-cent-store kind that you normally open up fully, but here they are opened half way and glued onto the tree.


If you'd like to create your own Christmas decorations but have reservations about starting from scratch, one happy solution is to do as Pattern Editor Dorothy Trumm does here with inexpensive decorations, custom tailoring them. These expensive looking decorations were very economical to make; started off as 10 -cent-store items. Page opposite shows how they got this way.


GERTRUDE BROOKS DIXSON, our Home Furnishings Editor, has a tiny apartment she insists is barely big enough to turn around in. So there's not room enough for a big tree or lots of decorations. The result is that "Dixie" settles on a sort of compromise that takes little space but still has plenty of Christmas spirit. This window is the decorating focal point. Artificial poinsettias from the ro-cent-store were sprayed gold. Some "grow" on Christmas-green cellophane strands while others are "planted" in jardiniere of brass. Angel at left has shown up for many years. Italian box in the center holds Christmas cards. The Christmas cookies were a gift.


1On the left-hand page you see a custom-tailored Christmas tree you can make for yourself from an inexpensive ro-cent-store artificial tree, and a few inexpensive materials. That's how this good looking tree was made, and you see (above and right) the simple steps that produce the end result. Materials you'll need are: artificial Christmas tree, "snow" spray, plastic spray, Sobo cement, garlands of tiny Christmas tree balls, inexpensive neck beads, and artificial flowers. "Gold dust," known either as "flitter" or "glitter," will add a nice touch but isn't absolutely necessary. You start by spraying tree thoroughly with canned "snow" so that you build up authentic looking white coating on all branches. Then, using Sobo cement, you fasten to tree the small balls from unstrung garlands, and the artificial flowers. At this point the tree looks like step shown top right. Use strings of tiny neck beads as garlands for tree. Spray all with plastic spray to set. Before spray dries, sprinkle on the "gold dust."



3The beautiful Christmas candles you see at top of page opposite are made from plain candles and standard ro-cent-store wares. Directly above here are the simple steps that transform ordinary candles into beauties with a special look. In addition to candles, you need plastic spray, garland balls, sequins, thread, "gold dust," artificial gold or silver colored leaves, and half a plastic foam ball for each candle. Thread balls, spaced as shown, and wrap them around candle, fastening balls to candle with Sobo. Spray with plastic, sprinkle with "dust." Insert leaves in foam ball, make candle hole.


2Luxurious looking wreath, at top center of opposite page, is made simply from a few inexpensive materials: a ro-centstore wreath of artificial type, three sizes of Christmas balls (a good source of two smaller sizes are the balls sold in "grape clusters," for their stems make them easy to glue into place), plastic spray, Sobo glue, metal foil ribbon, and "gold dust." At immediate left you can follow steps from top to bottom to see exactly how to do the job yourself. First step shows you materials you will need for the job. Start off by carefully fastening the three sizes of Christmas balls to the wreath, using Sobo cement to hold them in place firmly. Note the space left to tie ribbon on later. When wreath is covered full as you like with the balls, spray all thoroughly with a coating of plastic which will hold balls together solidly and, while still wet, acts as base to hold the "gold dust."



The lady-apple swag (left) and the wreath (below, left) are two beautiful decorations that you can make for your own home. Those shown were arranged for the American Home by Betty B. Merriam. For the swag, make simple wood frame (above). Size depends upon where you'll use it. Tack on 1 -inch-mesh chicken wire, doubled.
"The holly's up, the house is all bright,
The tree is ready, the candles alight:


The "skeleton" of your wreath consists of two wire rings, one just a bit smaller than the other. You fasten one inside the other as shown, using fine wire. Other main materials: lots of evergreen, boxwood, lady apples, nuts, pears, juniper berries.


The next step in making the swag is to build up a background for what's to come later. You make this background by using fairly long pieces of cedar, Japanese yew, or balsam. Wind these pieces on, using florist's spool wire. The idea is to completely hide the chicken wire and the wood frame. Then when this background is complete, insert clumps of juniper, coned spruce.


Cut all greens equal length, and wire them in clumps, keeping each kind separate. Plan a sequence and repeat it around the wreath. Attach clumps with fine wire; continue around in one direction till skeleton's covered.


Now your handiwork's beginning to look like something. Your next step is to spiral red plastic weatherproof ribbon around the wreath as shown. You then fasten on a luscious bow of the same material. Even at this stage your wreath looks beautiful, but there's still one final, glamorous step.


With the greens all in place on the swag, you go ahead and add shellacked lady apples, crab apples, cones, or even clumps of gilded peanuts. Then at each of the four corners you add southern magnolia foliage that you've previously sprayed white and then sprayed lightly with gold. Add bows for glamor. Use swag over doorway, sofa, mantel, mirror, or a picture window.


Stick florist's picks into fruits, then wire fruits into clumps. Pears only should be stuck on pick and handled individually. All fruits should get shellacking for added gloss, longer life. Wire fruits, nuts to wreath.


Lay your wreath on some disposable material such as newspaper or wrapping paper, and make certain that the material extends well beyond the limits of the wreath. Then take a can of gold spray and put the finishing touch to wreath by spraying all outer edge. When paint dries, that's everything!

1o make this beautiful wreath-crèche, start with wood circle (top right). One third of way from bottom of this circle nail cleat, and above that nail a semi-circular wood shelf. Around edge of circle, tack crumpled r -inchmesh chicken wire, and wire it crisscross to tacks in front and back of wood circle. Blue-
green metallic paper covers background. Half an orange juice can shades a single Christmas tree bulb. Gold spray can and right side of paper. Add greens, cones. Glue or tape figurines to face Infant. Add soft green satin bow. Wreath requires less material than a "regular" wreath. Arrangement is by Betty B. Merriam.


BOB HOUSEMAN, Merchandise Editor, gets a big effect at small expense. He performs fascinating sleight-of-hand tricks with inexpensive gold wrapping paper. Folded gold paper is a main ingredient of decorations, bottom half of the opposite page. The wreath, swags, snowflake stars, and the shining tree all owe their sparkle to gold paper. The three steps immediately below show you how to fold and mount the wreath and swags. To make the conical tree (far right, opposite page) take a piece of the gold paper shaped like a wedge of pie, then fold it into a cone and hold it with cellophane tape.


Join inside edges of fans with cellophane tape. You turn every other fan in length to get effect you see in finished job. Wreath takes 12 fans. Procedure's same for swags at sides of wreath. Two fans make the rosettes at the end of swags.


Make wreath by laying length of 12 fans joined together over foam-plastic ring. Expand fans evenly, attach with straight pins. And pin a cluster of ornaments tied with gold ribbon to five points. Big cluster, streamer at bottom.

KNUTE HEINZ of the Art Department had the problem of wanting a Christmas tree and yet having practically no spot roomy enough to set a tree up. What did he do? He flattened his tree against a wall. The way he got the results you see at right was to start by trimming off all branches of just an ordinary tree. Such a tree needn't be perfect. On top of a cabinet Knute set the base of the tree, then fastened the trunk to the wall with cellophane tape. Then he "built" a flat tree by fastening branches up with tape. To left of tree is bird cage that's made of two cardboard circles and alternating red and green strings. Bottom of cage, lined with cotton, resembles nest.



JOHN LIPPERT, Associate Decorating Editor, has no trouble at all in generating the Christmas spirit in his apartment. The ornate wreaths against the natural wood shutters are in keeping with the season. And a pink felt table cloth gives a shock of color against the white walls. Gifts stack around candlestick.


EDITH RAMSAY, Home Equipment Editor, spends her autumn week ends stashing goodies away in her freezer. This is in preparation for shipping off a plum pudding to many a faroff friend, and having many others at her festive board come Christmas Eve. For those who come for the Christmas Eve dining and carols, there's roast goose and all the trimmin's. And there's a wreath apiece, all saran wrapped and tied with a gold ribbon to the gilt chicken-wire "tree." Guests take the wreaths with them when they go home.

LUCKY CLOVERS-Place dough balls in greased muffin pans. Cut balls in quarters, almost to bottom. Brush with butter.


CHRISTMAS BRAID LOAF-Here's how to braid a Christmas loaf that's easy to make-once you know the secret. Divide dough (see recipe, page 67) into three equal parts. Roll each piece in 18 -inch strip.


BUNS-Roll dough into 12 -inch square. Brush with melted butter. Put 3 tbs. of mixture of 1 cup sugar, 1 tbs. cinnamon on center. Fold, sprinkle again.


Then braid these three strips just as shown in the step above. Brush top of the braided loaf lightly with melted margarine or butter. Top it with delicious (and pretty) pineapple filling (page 67).


Fold remaining dough over. Cut in 1 -inch strips, using a sharp knife. Hold each end of a strip and twist tightly in opposite direction. Seal ends.

## PASTRY FOR PÂTÉ FORM:

- Blend to a smooth paste 3 egg yolks, $3 / 4$ cup soft butter, and I tbs. olive oil. Combine with 3 cups flour, $1 / 2$ tsp. salt, and $1 / 2$ cup cold water to make a firm dough. Cover and let dough rest for one hour.
Reserve $1 / 4$ of pastry dough for top crust. Roll the remaining pastry into large oval sheet. Fit the dough into $9^{1 / 2}$-inch-long pâté form, carefully pressing the pastry down against the bottom and into all the indentations of the form. Trim edge evenly, leaving a $1 / 2$-inch overlap. Moisten the rim and fold pastry back under itself, pressing firmly against rim. Bake in hot oven $450^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. for 10 minutes to set the pastry. Cool. Fill form with alternate layers of veal and ham. Adjust pastry over the filling. Make a small hole in the center of top crust to allow steam to escape. Moisten top edge of lining and press cover firmly together with tines of fork.
Decorate the top with leaves cut from leftover pastry. Brush with beaten egg. Bake in $375^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. oven for 45 min . Add beef stock through the vent and bake 15 min . more. Serves 6.

Divide and roll, part at a time, on a well floured board to $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ thickness. Cut and bake on greased baking sheet, $10-12$ minutes at $375^{\circ}$ F. Cool. Add icing if desired. Makes about 3 dozen cookies with average cutters.
Drop Cookies: to the other half of dough, add $1 / 4$ cup milk, and your choice of: (1) 1 to 2 tsp. almond extract, $1 / 2$ cup chopped shredded coconut - or (2) 1 to 2 tsp. lemon extract, $1 / 2$ cup each chopped dates and walnuts-or(3) 1 tsp . cinnamon, $1 / 2$ tsp. nutmeg, $1 / 4$ tsp. cloves and $3 / 4$ cup seedless
(4) raisins -or- $1 / 4$ to $1 / 2$ tsp. peppermint flavoring, $1 / 2$ cup chopped pecans and 3 tbsp. cocoa, stirred into 3 tbsp. warm water.
Drop by teaspoons on greased baking sheet, bake as above. Makes 3-31/2 dozen cookies.

## To Lach His Own Christmas Tree

1. Your four-to-six-year-old will be thrilled when you invite him to trim a tree all his own. Show him how to cut his tree out of green construction paper. He can glue it to white cardboard to hang in his room. Decorations? He'll be happy to turn to seals, gummed looseleaf reinforcements, paper chains from school, paints, crayons. To him, this may be the most beautiful tree in the whole house!

2. Cut two or three trees from heavy cardboard, and slot them so they'll interleck. A youngster will like decorating this three-dimensional tree. Let him work out the trimmings-put his imagination to work. He'll surprise you.

Your older boy can saw this tree out of plywood. He'll paint it and keep it to trim again next year. Attach small ornaments with tacks or transparent tape.
3. Children will marvel at this tree, and it will remind grownups of delicious oldfashioned ribbon candy. To make tree, get several yards of I -inch ribbon. (Two colors back-to-back make it smarter yet). Zigzag the ribbon back and forth on a big window or mirror to shape an impressionistic tree. Glue or tape in place, and decorate with gold or silver foil paper cutouts or tiny bells.

4. Does your teenager pride herself on her modern ideas? She'll be delighted to make this tree for the hall table, and it will turn out to be sugar-plum pretty. This is just a big white paper cone, rolled dunce-cap style. White tarlatan or lace cover gives it texture. Your daughter will probably spiral tree with narrow velvet ribbon and use treasured pins and earrings for the baubles.
5. Did you "deck the halls with boughs" or trim branches from your big tree? Then you have two or three small evergreen branches to make a clever miniature tree. Put them in a pin holder in a heavy bowl of water, then trim to suit your whim. One of the children may vote for this tree, and whisk it away to his room. When it turns up again, the tree will just glow with ideas.

6. Leave it up to the head of the family to add the whimsical touch with the most unusual tree of all. Like as not he'll pop up with a jaunty tree bedecked with bright seed packets and garden gloves, or decorate tree in high style with nuts, bolts, bits of copper wire, radio tubes.

Dad may get so wrapped up in this project that he paints the nuts and bolts gold, silver, or gala colors. It's always clever-and therefore fun-to make use of odd items around the house when you decorate an "extra tree." THE END

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## MAKE CHRISTMAS

 MERRYAND MAKE IT<br>SAFE

Let's start by making the house just as safe from fire as possible. Begin with the Christmas tree, for unless properly cared for this festive item can become a real fire hazard.
The best policy is to allow your tree to remain outdoors until the last possible minute-this keeps tree from drying too rapidly. Then:

- Water the tree. Cut off the trunk at an angle a few inches from the original cut. Then stand it in a container holding sufficient water to cover the lower few inches of the trunk -and be sure water is added each day to keep end of trunk covered.
- Keep the tree far away from fireplace, radiator, or other heating device. If there's a fireplace, be sure the fire screen is always in place and in good condition, and don't use the fireplace as an incinerator for gift wrappings.
- Don't let the tree remain in the house too long. As soon as the holidays are over, take it outside. How about using a small living tree in a pot? Then plant it outdoors.
- Use only fire-resistant ornaments on tree and other decorations.
- Be extremely careful about the use of candles. Use only electric ones and don't let them touch needles.
- Check over all decorative electric lights and be sure the lights and their cords and sockets are in good working order. Be careful not to overload the house circuits. If you use lights outdoors be sure they are of the weatherproof variety.
When it comes to decorating a room-be sure to use a good sturdy ladder and have another person help you-don't risk a fall.
- Be sensible about toys. Be sure that trains and other electrical equipment carry the Underwriters' seal of approval, and don't let kids handle them with wet hands.

veteran saleswomen, electricians, truck drivers, even pecan shell spreaders! Yes, four truck loads of pecan shells were delivered free by a local company, dumped in huge mounds, and spread over the lot to keep the ground dry.

To achieve the miraculous financial results, Mrs. Gilbert, Chairman of Sales that first year, had to organize a volunteer sales force to cover eleven selling hours each day. And to inform the public, Marilyn Pryor, Publicity Chairman, got the necessary free backing from local papers, radio and TV stations.


Now, with organizational problems licked, each committee functions smoothly. The twelve couples who make up the Property Committee begin their work in June when they order carloads of the finest balsam, fir, and pine available in Nova Scotia. Early in December, all available friends and relations help to prepare the lot. They build display racks, string lights from temporary poles, and see that the stock is kept healthy and fresh.
Another important factor towards success is Eloise Skilling's contribution. Members call her the "artistic brain"-and she's proved it. Early each fall she sets up workshops where eager though untrained members slave long hours making every type of Christmas decoration.

This December, General Chairman Marjorie McFarland and her assistant, Alice Knibb, will devote at least 14 hours a day to the lot. Their sales staff is responsible for three-day work stints, and on weekends it takes as many as 45 people per day!

To man the lot on Christmas Eve looked like a big problem, for, other than a night watchman, there just didn't seem to be anyone to take charge. Who should volunteer but a Zeta Tau Alpha Alumna, Ann Stein, who had good friends among the Delta Gammas. "There were no small children at home waiting for Santa, and I just felt like helping a worthwhile cause," Ann said. This Christmas Eve, Ann plans to be at the lot with her new husband-along with Poiteaux Browne, a grandmother of seven, and anyone else who will sell "A 'Shining Light Tree' to make your Christmas brighter and help us to help blind children.'

## ROSEMARY <br> THE CHRISTMAS HERB

## GEIETRUDE IB. FOSTEIE

Rosemary, a fragrant, evergreen plant, makes a most appropriate Christmas gift. "That's for remembrance," as Shakespeare said.
Rosemary's a half-hardy European perennial herb. Its dark green, needle-like leaves resemble those of a fir. The plant has a rich scent. To perfume an entire room with it: just brush a branch with warm hand.
For a handsome table Christmas tree that needs no ornaments, paint a florist's wooden tub white and gold, and plant a two- or three-year-old rosemary specimen in it.
To keep this plant in good condition, be sure the soil is well drained and not allowed to dry out.
Rosemary is rarely bothered by pests, but the herb does need a light, cool shower once a week. Spray early on clear day so it dries by night.
After the holidays, return the plant to a sunny (south or southwest) window. Keep from artificial heat.

If the ground doesn't freeze in the winter in your part of the country, you can keep your rosemary plant in a tub outdoors when not using it as a decoration.
Use the branch tips as seasoning, fresh or dried, all year long.
Rosemary is a graceful plant, with upward curving branches. This spicyleaved plant has become a traditional decoration in England.

Three slender figures at left (1, 2, 3 ) are of carved balsa wood, two of them $8^{\prime \prime}$ tall, and tiny one in folding triptych only $31 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ high. Note lovely lines on center carving and impressionistic horizontal folds in robe of figure at right. All Italian imports. Single bust (4), also Italian, wears tranquil expression, has violet robe and gray hair. In trio below, exquisitely simple modern head is American, and center figure is classic Italian study distinguished by beautiful detail in modeling of face, hair, crown, and hands. The last, and most lifelike figure, is German model of Mother and Child reminiscent of the abundant quality of Renaissance painting.


0f all symbolic figures, the Madonna is among the most beloved. She has represented not only Mary, mother of Christ, but also universal motherhood. And artists of all centuries have painted, written, and composed music about her beauty and serenity. At this season, it is particularly appropriate to show these lovely Madonna figurines from the collection of Mrs. Ralph Wallace of Smoke Rise, New Jersey.

Mrs. Wallace's collection started with a Christmas present. Several years ago her mother asked what she wanted for Christmas and Mrs. Wallace replied, "A Madonna." From this first one, the collection grew until it now numbers 65 Madonnas from all over the world. All are modern and completely individual, and the figures are executed in such varying materials as wood, glass, china and other ceramics.

With the white or ivory figures, Madonna blue or another shade of blue is the most prevalent color, but pink and gold are also used frequently. Even green and touches of red appear, as in the green trim on the dress of the Pennsylvania Dutch lady and the red flowers in the hand of the French figure. Mrs. Wallace says her Madonnas are "not a hobby, but a joy" and a daily inspiration. She uses them for accents and in flower and table arrangements, especially at Christmas and Easter. THE END
