
STYLE-TESTED COLORS FOR HOME AND INDUSTRY

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

When dining at home try a trick we picked up at Horcher's Restaurant in Madrid—tuck a pair of small footstools under the table for sheer comfort.





DON'T TAKE A VACATION FROM BEAUTY

Whether you're off to your own summer place until Labor Day or to the cottage you always rent for two weeks or are touring America's beauty spots by car or pitching a tent on a campsite, there are certain basic beauty techniques which apply to all of them.

Your skin, hair, hairdo,

makeup, and bathing techniques all

demand a switch from your usual routine, to meet the special conditions of heat and humidity, salt water and wind. And your vacation will be a lot more fun if you look extra pretty during same.

If your hairdo is certain to collapse on the first muggy day, don't struggle with the impossible. Have it cut manageably short or give yourself a home permanent. Wear it brushed back and tied with a bright scarf or headband or invest in an inexpensive synthetic braid or hairpiece.

If your hair becomes oilier or dryer in warm weather, and especially if it is tinted or lightened, shop for the shampoo aimed at that special condition, and step up your use of conditioners and cream rinses. Protect your hair from direct hot sun in any case.

Your skin, if oily, may need a lighter cleanser than you use in winter, and a more tingly, pore-tightening astringent, tonic, or skin conditioner. If your skin is dry, you may need a richer cleanser, and, because in hot weather even dry skins enjoy the refreshment of a skin tonic, a mild astringent formulated for dry skin. Of course you need a moisturizer, no matter what. And a sun screen.

SUN AND HEAT PROTECTION

About sun screens. Surely nobody needs to be reminded of the danger of sunburn, but did you know you need protection even after you're beautifully tanned? Long exposure to the sun toughens, leathers, and ages your skin even after burning is no longer a threat. And remember that you don't need to be stretched out on a beach to be affected by the sun—the sunny side of the car exposes you too.

Your hands will benefit from sun protection too to help ward off those distressing spots—called freckles when

se on a you're young and age spots later on. And hand cream or lotion as usual, or more so.

Your bathing and grooming techniques obviously have to go on daylight saving time too. Deodorants become more important—and you can choose from creams, sprays, spray powders, roll-ons, or saturated pads. Perhaps you'll want to try an antiperspirant deodorant for extra protection. To keep your arms and legs smooth, you have a choice of cream depilatory, wax, an electric razor especially for women, or a hand razor used with a shaving foam and an after-shave moisturizer for women, such as Lady Gillette's.

And now is the time to let yourself go in the way of colognes, toilet waters, spray mists, and stuff you splash on after the bath. Jean Nate's famous Friction pour le Bain with its light lemony fragrance comes in a full quart size—the better to cool off deliciously. As your skin takes on more color from outdoor living, you can perhaps skip a foundation altogether, and you may not need a blusher. Your summer face might be prettiest wearing nothing more than a dusting of powder, one of the new clear,

vivid lipsticks, a minimum of eyeliner, and a touch of white highlighter on lids and cheekbones. Max Factor's new Erace White is lipstick-size and both highlights and banishes shadows. Colorless, translucent.

You also want everything to be light, small, and portable. So first look for the many cleansers, lotions, and fresheners that come in saturated-pad or towel form, individually wrapped in foil, or in jars—and naturally choose purse and travel sizes of anything and everything. But if your favorite creams and lotions don't come in travel sizes, it's no trick to transfer a small amount to empty plastic jars and bottles you buy in the dime store.

Also pack into the car, since it won't fit in your kit, a thermos of hot water. You'll never know how glad you'll be to have hot water until you find yourself far from a source.

So plot your summer good looks, collect all the cosmetic and grooming stuff you'll need in advance, and then positively cadge the time to use them. If you're making a rest-room stop, herd the children in, process them, and herd them out again in your husband's care. Then open your kit and get to work. You'll emerge with the vacation spirit bubbling up again, ready and eager, feeling—and looking—great.




PLASTICS, PERIOD. It's taken a full century but plastics have finally made it—and we're glad. Wherever you look these days when you're shopping for home furnishings, there they are, the plastics. The look to look for? Shiny, slick, translucent or see-through shapes like never before . . . folded, curved, round-angled . . . strictly today. Since

plastic also means sculptural, that's only fitting. Plastics used to be just mimicry materials, and too often cheap, shoddy substitutes. (Not plastic's fault, but the manufacturers' and designers' mistake.) Today plastics, on their own merits, are the "Now" materials, the everywhere materials, the new innovators of contemporary design. They're a big hit in lamps like Raymor's colorful cube that lights up or their interlocking Lucite base (Ed Whiting, designer); like Terrence Moore's see-through ginger-jar lamp



or Robert Sonneman's curved base (comes in five see-through colors); or Luminiere's half-globe light or Van Dow Fenton's imported (from England) tongue-in-cheek Tiffany lamps.

Plastics are a natural for occasional pieces. Past master of the art is Neal Small who works in acrylic plastics. Tyndale also makes hand-




Magazine rack by Tyndale

some pedestals, tables, magazine or log racks of clear Lucite. Plastic furniture, of the blow-up variety, includes chairs, sofas, hassocks. Interior designers have discovered plastics. Schule-Mc-Carville wraps painted pieces in clear plastic they get from a slip-cover man for a shinier-than-lacquer sheen. Carl Steele of Kunzig and Steele makes his own plastic sculptures.

Design Media, a new firm, will introduce its Urethane System (seating pieces) at D/R and Macy's. System consists of strong plastic-

foam forms that add up to sofas (with wedge-cushion backs), boxy armchairs, corner units, and large slabs that make tables for modular arrangements. In the planning stage, toy cubes brightly colored, lettered, or numbered. A variety of finishes from leatherlike to velvety are the specialty of the house. Also at Design Media a clear plastic drum table with solid plastic top and bottom surfaces. Selig imports a blow-up chair that looks as if it were made from stacked life preservers and comes with its own foot pedal pump and repair kit.

And this is only the beginning. According to Home Furnishings Daily, a trade paper, the plastics industry is currently using 47 billion pounds per year, expects to

use about 80 billion in the near future. So the most exciting and versatile applications are still to come.

HOW TO FRAME A DECK

There are many ways to do it, but the ones shown here are within the skills of the average carpenter or an advanced do-it-your-selfer. Don't follow the design slavishly, but adapt the details to your own design.


The trickiest part of the job is laying out and pouring the concrete piers. Let a contractor do this. He will also place the metal beam anchors into the wet concrete. Other areas for professional help are selecting sizes and spacing of beams, flooring, etc., plus waterproofing the points where the decks meet the house.


Best woods to use are redwood and cedar, both of which naturally resist termites and decay. Other woods may be impregnated with a chemical called pentachlorophenol to achieve those advantages. Lumber so treated may be ordered through a lumberyard. Creosoted wood is not suitable and can be harmful to children.

The various metal devices used at the joints are big work savers. Most are fastened with smaller nails than normally used for house framing but give stronger joints. In some cases, these devices are merely steel braces or connecting plates, available at most hardware shops. In other cases, they are specifically made for connecting house-frame timbers, and must be ordered through a lumberyard. There's no one name for them, which is why we've merely labeled them "framing connectors." Show the drawings to your dealer when buying.

While we can't say that building your deck will be simple from this point on, we can assure you that the pleasures of having a deck are well worth the effort of building it.



THE MOST FROM YOUR AUTOMOBILE

By WILLIAM J. TOTH

THE IMPORTANCE OF TIRES AND YOU

Your car floats down the road on little more than a square foot of rubber Each of your tires contacts the pavement in an area of about five by eight inches or 40 square inches. This times four for the tires on your car means 160 square inches or just over a square foot.

Since this is the only road contact your car has, it becomes quite important. In fact, in order to just move your car initially, the tires must have sufficient contact with the road or you don't move. From there on, moving, turning, steering, and stopping are controlled through your tires. Your safety, comfort, and control of the car is directly involved.

With well over four hundred million tires rolling on vehicles in this country, you can see that tires are an important factor in traffic.

HOW DO WE STAND TODAY?

A recent study conducted by a leading university indicated that flat tires contribute to less than three percent of the automobile accidents on expressways. This is comforting news since tires have long been thought of as a major factor in car accidents. Apparently our tires have improved over the years and then again, we probably are taking better care of our tires.

Even so, you cannot let your guard down where tires are concerned. You must still insist upon adequate tires, buy them and care for them. But how do you do it when you go looking and find virtually a jungle of brands, sizes, materials, and designs each of which is advertised as the ultimate in tire construction and safety?

This need not be so difficult

if you are armed with some basic knowledge and guidelines. In fact understanding some tire terms will help.

DEFINITIONS TO KNOW

Ply: The plies of a tire are layers of textile cords—such as rayon or nylon—that determine the strength of the tire. Each layer of cords lies under the outside visible rubber on top of each other and at various angles. A two-ply tire has two layers of fabric, a four-ply has four.

Bias ply tire: This is the conventional type of tire. The cord layers run at an angle to each other. This layer design has been in use for over 50 years.

Radial ply tire: This is one of the newer type of tire. The cords or plies run straight across the tire with additional fabric placed between the plies.

Bias/belted ply tire: The cords run across at an angle similar to the old conventional tire. In addition there is a continuous belt of fabric between the outer ply and the rubber tread which completely circles the tire.

Tread. This is the actual rubber part of the tire that contacts the road.

THE DIFFERENCES IN TIRES

The newer tires are constantly being improved to give you increased handling control, longer wear, and greater insurance against blowouts.

Radials tend to give all of these but a harder ride since most American car suspensions are not designed for them. They cannot be mixed with bias tires, meaning you must install four at once. And basically they cost more. Radials do give a better grip and hold the road on curves better.

The bias/belted tires are similar to the radials in wear, handling, and safety. They tend to give softer rides, and of course, can be mixed and they cost less than radials.

ORIGINAL EQUIPMENT TIRES

The car manufacturers believe that the tires that come with your car are the best for wear, riding comfort, handling control, quietness, and traction as a whole for all kinds of driving. If you feel that you need more of any of these qualities, then you can naturally expect that you will have to sacrifice some of the others. For instance, a traveling salesman may feel he needs more wear or a stronger tire for the load he carries, while a vacationer might want a softer ride. In each case you can get what you want, but some of the other qualities will have to be sacrificed.

One of the best ways to insure that you are using proper tires and pressure for your car and the load you want to carry is to obtain a free copy of the Consumer Guide to Tire Care and Safety published by the Rubber Manufacturers Association, 444 Madison Avenue, New York, N.Y. 10022.

FEDERAL CONCERN

The Department of Transportation is presently formulating standards for tire safety performance and testing. Some of these are in effect while others are planned. An important standard to the buyer is the one providing proper selection and rim size for new cars to prevent overloading.

Another standard presently in effect provides that the following information appear molded into both sidewalls of all tires:

- · Size and maximum load.
- Maximum permissable pressure
- Manufacturer identification.
 Composition used radial if
- Composition used, radial if applicable.
- Number of plies; tube or tubeless
- DOT symbol indicating conformity to federal standards.

The government is also requesting a placard be placed in the glove compartment or thereabouts showing:

- · Vehicle capacity weight.
- Recommended tire size and designation.
- Cold tire pressure for maximum load.
- Designated seat capacity.

Also as of August 1st tires will be required to have tread wear indicators that will become visible when a sixteenth of an inch of tread remains.

THE CONSUMER

You must still make judgments. Government regulations will not eliminate all poor tires, but they will force them into the open. Using the information that tire manufacturers are supplying, you can become a much more intelligent buyer.

And don't be misled just because a tire meets government standards. The standards are minimum and you should shop for tires for your particular needs and particular car. Remember, too, you can't afford to gamble with quality. You can save a few dollars by comparison shopping, but don't risk your life with a cheap bargain.







I think it's very unfortunate that many women with real writing talent bury it under a mountain of dishes.

Actually, writing is one of the ideal professions for women. You don't have to go to an office, you don't have to be away with half your mind on your household . . . wondering, if it rains, did you close the windows? And for the woman who is tied down to her home, writing provides a wonderful means of emotional release and self-expression, to say nothing of the extra income it can bring.

Why, then, don't more women write? It certainly can't be for lack of material. There are many things that *only* a woman can write about with the knowledge that comes of firsthand experience.

Perhaps that's why — unlike many other professions — the welcome mat is really out for women in the writing field. Here, we have something special to offer — our own point of view. Take the best-seller, *Please Don't Eat the Daisies*. No man could have written that book!

Don't say, "I don't have time"

Saying you "could write" if you "had time" is no excuse. The fact is that I've had a house to run for most of my life. I was lucky in that I had some help with the housework and the children, but there are always the "days off" and also unexpected illnesses. I think I've spent

more time in hospital waiting rooms than almost anyone else.



In recent years there have been great scientific advances in the preparation, preservation, and inspection of fresh, frozen, and canned foods and beverages. However, food poisoning remains a major threat to health, and can sometimes jeopardize life itself. Summer, with its high temperatures and abundance of wild plants, brings additional hazards that can lead to poisoning by ingestion.

PREVENTING FOOD POISONING

Regardless of the time of year, never eat or serve anything that does not look or smell right. Fish, meat, eggs, and foods that contain milk or milk products should not be allowed to remain at room temperature for more than an hour before serving, especially in the summer months. Among such foods that are quick to spoil are mayonnaise, cheese, ice cream, whipped cream, custards, puddings, and any creamfilled bakery goods. Be particularly sure on picnics or car trips to keep perishables iced.

Bacterial or toxic contamination can be reduced to a minimum by broiling, boiling, frying, or by pressure cooking for a minimum of 15 minutes. Frozen foods, once thawed, should never be refrozen. Sodium nitrite, a commercial color preservative used in the pickling or salting of meats, should not be used in the home.

Canned foods processed at home should be prepared according to definite government standards. Pamphlets may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20025.

SYMPTOMS OF FOOD POISONING

Food poisoning produces a wide range of symptoms, depending upon the specific cause. Symptoms can vary from mild abdominal discomfort and diarrhea to chills, fever, severe nausea, vomiting, intense abdominal pains, watery or bloody diarrhea, extreme general weakness, and even weakness and paralysis of muscles.

If you think that you have eaten contaminated food, call a physician immediately. If he cannot be reached right away and you suspect you have eaten spoiled food within the past four hours, take first-aid measures-make yourself vomit if you have not yet begun to do so. The old-fashioned methods still work: Place your finger or the handle of a spoon at the back of the throat or drink a glass of warm water containing two tablespoons of ordinary table salt. A third method is to drink warm soap solution.

POISONOUS PLANTS AND MUSHROOMS

There are tremendous numbers of plant hazards to which people are exposed. Mushroom poisoning alone results in over one hundred fatalities every year in the United States. Swallowing even part of one mushroom of a deadly species can prove fatal. Since poisonous mushrooms may grow where nonpoisonous grow, you should never pick or eat wild mushrooms. The same applies to wild plants, some of which may be mildly toxic, while others can be fatal-even if only a part of the plant is ingested. Never eat wild plants unless you are absolutely sure of what they are.


Symptoms of mushroom poisoning vary depending upon the particular type of poisonous species eaten. Some symptoms come on in a matter of minutes; others may not begin for an interval of 6 to 24 hours. Eating a poisonous mushroom may produce such symptoms as severe nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, salivation, wheezing, muscular shaking, and profound mental excitement, confusion, delirium.

In the case of possible mushroom poisoning, call a doctor or get the victim to a hospital as quickly as possible. Until the person receives medical help, induce vomiting by one of the three methods described in the previous section.

sure the items to be stored (garbage can, hose, tools) and design a bin to accommodate them. This one even has a rack for drying bathing suits.

To protect the wood from ground moisture, set it on concrete blocks or on bricks set in sand.



A neat trick (top left) if you're building a deck, is to include a trapdoor compartment that keeps the garden hose from straggling all over after you're through using it. Put it where it's handy for hosing down the deck as well as watering shrubbery. You already have a deck or porch? Well, get out your saw and make a trapdoor in it. If necessary, run a new water line from the house. Then forget the worst part of watering chores—dragging the hose out from the garage and reeling it in again.

Ideal for leapfrog, among other things, these "stepping-stones" are nothing more than segments of telephone poles buried in the ground. You can sometimes get old poles from your local power company, from alongside railroad tracks, and from waterfront areas that are being renovated. You can also use old railroad ties left along the tracks. Ask permission before you salvage them. Or get new pressure-treated wooden poles from a lumber supplier. (Plain logs will rot, in time.) In any case, bury sections two to three feet in the ground and, when installing, hose the earth



down frequently as you're

packing it in. It will dry almost as hard as



A survey conducted for *American Home*, however, indicates that certainly it is possible to pick up a mortgage—at a price. That may appear heartening but there are variables. Much depends on where you'll live, your state, your down payment, the kind of lender you approach.

In tight-fisted states some banks may deign to grant mortgage loans only to depositors of at least a year's standing. Significantly, in states with high ceilings on the interest charged, little if any shortage of mortgage money is apparent.

Comments from lenders in other

states seem to fall into a pattern: "We are being selective, sticky, and cautious." "We do have money for a mortgage but on an allocation basis." "There's no great problem—if all requirements are met." "We're looking at every application with a searching eye." The frustrations you may face reflect this increasing conservatism by lenders.

In other ways, lenders are uncommonly choosy. In a general sharpening up of evaluations, professional appraisers are relied on more often. If you'll settle for a 15- or 20-year term instead of 30 your chances are bound to be better.

Whether or not you're given a mortgage depends on other factors besides down payment, appraisal value, and the repayment period. Your income, age, family, and credit standing, as well as the future trend of the property's worth, are important. So is the locality and appear-

ance of the house. High local taxes and the distance to schools and transportation might also affect the terms—or price—of the loan.

THE PRICE YOU PAY

Effective interest rates vary like a zigzag throughout the nation and are clues to where mortgage funds are more or less obtainable. In recent months the national average on conventional loans (not VA or FHA) has been at a record level of 6.8 percent. They are slightly lower in the East (if you're lucky), somewhat more in the Midwest, and highest on the West Coast. The average on a VA or

FHA mortgage, excluding the government insurance premium, is 6.83 percent on new homes.

These are reported averages that can delude you. Actually, in California, Florida, or Texas, you may have to pay 7½ to 8 percent. That's chiefly because lenders in these states are permitted by law to charge as much as 10 percent. Understandably, lending institutions located in any of the few states with a limit of only 6 percent send excess funds for mortgages to wherever higher interest rates prevail.

Clearly it's harder to get a mortgage in low-limit states, easier in states like Connecticut and Massachusetts. For this reason, some states have raised their interest limits. Others will probably follow.

ADD POINTS TO YOUR COST

Rarely will you pick up a mortgage these days without having to ante up cash for points, sometimes referred to as a premium or commitment fee. A point is equal to \$1 for every \$100 on the face of the loan. On a \$20,000 mortgage, three points would come to \$600. It's legitimate. Lenders regard these fees as a way of making up the difference between the legal maximum interest and what they view as a fair return.

Theoretically, and under FHA regulations, the seller or builder is supposed to absorb the premium. In

practice, the home buyer usually pays it in cash to the mortgagor. When a builder, especially in a development, provides the mortgage, he generally includes the points in the price.

TERMS AND EXTRAS

Besides points, mortgage lenders add sundry charges. To start with, there's an origination fee, known in some parts of the country as an initial fee. Just what this comprises hinges on the mortgagor's interpretation and the practice in his area. As a rule it covers the cost of processing the transaction—the paperwork it takes to put the loan on the lender's books. In some places, an "initial fee" just means "points."

Nationwide, the average origination charge today is 0.93 percent of the principal on a conventional mortgage for a new home. It ranges, however, all the way from 0.16 when a mortgage is taken through an insurance company, to 1.21 percent from a savings and loan association. FHA allows a 1 percent initial charge but this can go up to 2.5 percent if inspections or partial payments during construction are made.

Count on service charges too. These include the exact costs of appraisal, survey, title search, credit check, the lender's lawyer, title closing, and state mortgage tax. These "closing costs" can run from \$360 to \$630 on a \$15,000 mortgage.

The average repayment period on new-home conventional loans granted has run to about 25 years. You can probably get a few more years through an insurance company, less through a commercial bank. For existing homes, the average term has been under 22 years. During this tight-money year, however, shorter terms on all home loans will be demanded by lenders.

On an FHA or VA mortgage, the legal maximum for new homes is 30 years, but seldom granted.

DOWN PAYMENTS GO UP

In line with their highly selective policy, lenders look for blue-chip loans, preferring as large a down payment as the home buyer can bear. Often a high down payment (perhaps half) will get you a lower interest rate as a prime loan. Nationwide, the average cash required on a new house is about a quarter of the appraised value (which is usually close to the purchase price). Generally, you will need somewhat fewer dollars with a savings and loan association but more-about 32 percent-on a loan from a mutual savings or commercial bank.

A VA mortgage permits a 100 percent loan with no down payment if you have the rare fortune to uncover and charm a willing bank. FHA offers this sliding scale: A loan can't be more than 97 percent of the first \$15,000 appraised value, plus 90 percent of the next \$5000, plus 80 percent of the remainder. Thus on a new \$30,000 home you could be given a \$27,000 mortgage by a private lending institution, paying \$3000 cash. But what really happens?

FHA AND VA LOANS

Particularly in states where mortgage funds are short, lenders are in no mood to set up FHA or VA loans. On both new and existing homes, these have been fixed at a 6¾ percent interest limit. With FHA, the home buyer must add a 0.5 percent insurance premium which becomes part of the monthly payments. In many sectors, you have to be an exceptionally good customer of a lending institution—and even then tack on 8 or 9 points—before your application is seriously considered.

Currently, mutual savings banks are the largest FHA and VA lenders. Commercial banks customarily shy away, partly because they prefer a higher down payment than FHA and VA permit. Rigid FHA requirements, federal scrutiny, red tape, and complicated paperwork discourage many lenders, especially in small towns.

Fewer VA home loans, than ever have been advanced in this stringent money market. But if you can convince a lender, by all means take out a GI mortgage. You need not pay a 0.5 percent insurance premium, as on FHA. VA guarantees up to \$7500 of the loan (to protect the lender) and a bill before Congress proposes to raise this to \$12,500.

Vietnam veterans are eligible. Veterans of World War II, Korea, and post-Korea should check with their regional VA office to see if they are entitled to a Certificate of Eligibility.

THE PIGGYBACKS

Families with little cash but in a sound economic position have lately been attracted to an innovation known as the piggyback on a conventional mortgage for a newly built house. Essentially, this means that on top of a first mortgage—for which you are given 75 percent of the appraised value—you take on a second mortgage of 15 percent for the same terms as the first. Your down payment becomes 10 percent (in cash) of the value of the lot you own or from the trade-in value of your present home,

The second mortgage, from \$2000 to \$10,000, is arranged by a lumber dealer or builder. The interest rate—based on what prevails in the area—is the same for both mortgages and you make a single monthly payment. Your house can be worth as much as \$60,000, the term as long as 30 years, initial fees about 1.5 percent.

Piggybacks, which can't be applied to FHA or VA mortgages, may be acquired (continued on page 82)

PICK THE PAVING THAT'S BEST FOR YOU



The weary threats of frustrated gardeners to the contrary, it seems very doubtful that many backyards will ever be paved from end

to end. But driveways and parking areas are growing larger, terraces are being expanded, areas in which grass is difficult to grow are being graveled, and each new swimming pool is bordered by a deck. Paving, in short, is becoming almost as important as trees, flowers, and grass.

In selecting a paving material, think about the shape and contour of the paved area, cost of the material, and the kind of use the material will be getting.

Shape and contour are dictated by practical and aesthetic considerations. You must design to suit conditions—perhaps with the help of an architect or a landscape architect. And remember that a small terrace looks larger if paved in a continuous material or many small units such as brick than if you use large flagstones.

In considering cost, think in terms of the installed cost. Get an estimate from a local paving contractor mason or masonry-supply dealer.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Is the material durable enough to withstand the weather, the wear and the weight it will be subjected to? Any material can be used on a terrace because it receives light wear, but fewer materials are suitable for driveways.

Will the material be simple to maintain? In a given location, one or two may be far superior—or inferior—to others.

Does the material create annoying problems? For example, when some materials are used in the shade in a humid climate they become treacherously slippery. Dark paving stores up heat. Light paving creates glare. Rough paving makes mincement of children's knees.

Is the material comfortable underfoot? Is it fairly cool in the sun? Does it get in your shoes?

Can water sink through the material or does it flow off in sheets? If you are installing paving over the roots of a tree, it is essential that you use a permeable material that will allow water and oxygen to reach

the roots. And on a slope in a dry climate or a very wet climate it pays to use a material that water sinks through.

ASPHALT

Asphalt is installed either by applying a layer of blacktop (a factory-made mixture of asphalt and crushed stone) to a prepared base, or by treating a prepared base with alternate applications of asphalt and sand. The surface-treated paving is more or less gray. Blacktop is black, though a lighter color can be had by mixing the asphalt with crushed dolomite instead of the stone usually used.

Pros and cons. When properly laid, asphalt paving stands up well under heavy wear and is easy to repair. The paving is sometimes strongly textured, not slippery, and very resilient. It does not show stains. Water flows off rapidly. If asphalt is poorly laid it is likely to become soft in hot weather, although this is less of a problem today than it used to be. All asphalt paving, however, soaks up and holds the sun's heat.

Where to use. Asphalt is sometimes used for walks but it's outstanding for driveways.

It should not be applied over tree roots or in places where runoff of rainwater may cause problems.

Installation. Packaged, do-it-yourself blacktop is on the market but for any sizable installation, call a reputable paving contractor. A common installation fault is the formation of large surface "dents," that cause rain puddles.

BRICK

Bricks are now available in various new shapes—hexagons, octagons, squares, even something that looks very much like a fleur de lis.

Pros and cons. Brick's beauty is its chief asset but strength and durability rank a close second. Anyone can lay it on sand. Used this way, water can sink through to plant roots and the rate of runoff is retarded. Under normal conditions the surface is skidproof but brick in shade quickly acquires a slippery coating of algae or moss (that can be removed but it's a nuisance). The surface is easily stained unless treated with a masonry sealing compound. In winter, untreated bricks soak up moisture that may cause crumbling or spalling, and often forms a thin skin of ice.

Where to use. Brick can be used in all areas where appearance is important, but you should not use it where its slippery tendencies can cause trouble or where it may be

subject to unsightly staining.

Installation. Laying bricks without mortar is by far the best method. You can lay the bricks (continued on page 114)



There are so many kinds of health-insurance policies and plans available it is possible—through a well-thought-out combination of them—to have sufficient coverage for practically any accident or illness.

Our statistics show that about 75 percent of you with health insurance will have group coverage of one kind or another. Your group insurance policy may have been provided through your employer but there are other kinds, Labor unions provide group insurance as do professional and other associations,

If you are not in a group plan perhaps it would be wise for you to seek one. Group plans offer many advantages and most of them include protection for your dependents as well as yourself. Premiums are low because such plans can be administered economically. Your employer often pays a part and sometimes all of the premium costs. Other advantages are that you are covered immediately and are eligible no matter what your physical condition at that time.

If you leave your job it is often possible to convert your group policy to an individual or family policy. However, find out the details before you leave a group plan. If you wait too long you may not find another that offers immediate coverage.

Before you take steps to augment your group plan insurance, read your policy with care. Many people, to their dismay, discover too late the limitations of their policy. Or they neglect to take full advantage of the benefits they're entitled to through a misunderstanding of the terminology. Policy writers use many catch phrases as-

suming you will know what they mean, If you don't—ask.

KNOW YOUR TERMINOLOGY

Here are a few of the terms you may find in a policy issued through a group plan. Each has a definite meaning in insurance parlance.

There are two kinds of deductible provisions for group policies. If yours has an integrated deductible it means you cannot realize any benefits from the policy until you have used the benefits from any other group policies you own. This may help you decide what kind of other policy to buy. For instance, if your group policy has a \$500 integrated deductible provision and you receive a \$600 benefit from another policy, the group plan benefits start at the \$600 figure. not at the \$500 level as indicated in your policy.

If you have a corridor deductible provision, the group plan benefits will not start until (a) you have received all the benefits from other policies and (b) you have paid the deductible amount. Taking the same figures, you receive \$600 from another policy, then you pay a corridor deductible (usually \$50 to \$100), and then the benefits from the corridor deductible policy are effective.


There may be an antiduplication clause in your policy and it is important that you be aware of it before you purchase additional insurance. This means that if you have two group policies and they cover roughly the same hospital/surgical expenses, you may not collect from both policies. It is possible to collect from both but not if there is an anti-duplication clause. In that case you might consider converting one of the policies into a major medical or a comprehensive coverage policy.

Your policy may pay service benefits or indemnity benefits and they should be studied carefully as they may have a bearing on the purchase of another policy. If you have a service benefit policy, it means the company pays for the service itself-the hospital room, the xrays or whatever. Blue Cross is a service benefit policy. If your policy pays indemnity benefits, it will pay you a flat amount or up to a stated sum toward the cost of such services. Indemnity policies are usually issued by insurance companies.

The renewability of your policy is another important factor to consider. Some policies are optionally renewable—renewed (continued on page 75)



A SNUG HOUSE FOR TWO

The house Larry and Gigi Green live in is a small, personal house in Belvedere, California, filled with the things they've carefully collected to make a home for themselves. It is an expression of their life together and their eclectic taste. The house, which has a dramatic glass-fronted exterior, is tucked away on a wooded site and although small (the owners figure it's about as big as 12 telephone booths) is airy and open. Actually containing less than 1000 square feet, it's snug enough for young marrieds, yet large enough for children, since it has three bedrooms. Large decks provide entertaining and play space. Careful selection and placement of furnishings add to the illusion of space. The rooms are unencumbered and uncluttered. Consistent use of white background unifies, thus enlarges space.

REFRIGERATORS: THE FAMILY APPLIANCE

By Virginia T. Habeeb

The decisions involved in buying a new refrigerator are based on not only how well it will serve you but also your family. What do the children head for as soon as they get home from school? Where does the man of the house go to rummage for his midnight snack? And what meal could you prepare without at least one trip to the refrigerator? So do keep the whole family in mind when you're shopping for one. Examine the storage features, consider the refrigerating points, and plan just what you need to fit into your kitchen and your family life. To help you plan, here's a rundown on refrigerators for 1968.

WHICH MODEL FOR YOU?

The four basic refrigerator models differ distinctly in storage. Compare them in terms of what you need,

The side-by-side combination is the newest and usually the most deluxe of the models. It combines a full-length refrigerator with a full-length true freezer (maintains a minus 5 to plus 5° F, temperature range to store frozen foods and freeze fresh foods). It measures anywhere from 30 to 48 inches wide. The big bonus is the convenient, ample freezer storage. If you want room for large casseroles, platters, and the like, examine the fresh food area to be sure it's sufficient for your storage needs.

The bottom-freezer combination also offers ample true freezer storage. The full-width fresh food storage area will generally handle large casseroles and platters with ease. Freezer may be a roll-out drawer, or have a side-opening door with shelves and baskets that move out.

The top-freezer combination is a popular model widely available in a medium price range. Of the three combinations with true freezers, the top-freezer model usually has the smallest freezer capacity. It's good for a small family, a family who needs a minimum of freezer storage, or a family who owns a separate freezer but also wants freezer space in their refrigerator.

The conventional one-door refrigerator is the least expensive and usually has the least in the way of convenience features. (The exceptions

are the one door "all refrigerator" refrigerators designed and sold as freezer mates.) The freezer compartment is not a true freezer as it is in the combination models. It stores frozen foods for a limited time but will not freeze them properly.

STORAGE FEATURES

If you haven't shopped for a refrigerator lately, you may be amazed (and confused) by the proliferation of storage features. Consider them in terms of what they will do for you.

To let you rearrange refrigerator space the way you want it you'll find:

- Cantilevered shelves attached to and supported at the back, can be adjusted to any position; cantilevered half shelves are even better.
- Full-width shelves adjust up or down to one or two positions,
- · Adjustable or cantilevered door shelves.
- · Cantilevered fruit basket, egg tray.
- A shelf that adjusts up or down to one or two positions without the food being removed.
- · Adjustable crisper.
- Removable shelf in top-freezer of combinations.
- · A removable door shelf in freezer section.

To add convenience in storing and removing food, you'll find:

- · Slide- or glide-out shelves.
- Deep door shelves that hold half-gallon milk containers,
- Egg storage that is removable or glides out or tilts out (or molded in doors, in budget models).
- Butter and cheese keepers (with temperature control for butter).
- Removable door shelf becomes a tote tray.
- Removable covered compartments in door for storage, leftovers, snacks.
- · Tilt-out juice can storage in freezer section.
- Freezer door shelf deep enough to hold half gallon ice cream container or to store frozen foods in bookshelf style.
- Slide-out or swing-out baskets in bottom freezer combinations.
- · A lift-out basket in bottom-drawer freezers.
- An electric door opener that works when both hands are full (just a touch with the elbow).
- Automatic door closer assures door is always closed tightly.
- · Foot pedal opens bottom-freezer combination.

To make refrigerator cleaning easier:

- Wheels or rollers so refrigerator can be moved out for cleaning.
- · Drain on refrigerator floor for defrost water.
- · Rounded corners; removable shelves.
- Tempered glass shelves in top-of-the-line combinations that never form frost.
- · Removable door shelf fronts.

REFRIGERATION FEATURES

If you want the luxury of a refrigerator-freezer combination that never forms frost, here are a few facts to keep in mind and some features to look for:

- This type of cooling system uses cold air circulated by a fan. Food must be wrapped to exclude all air or it will dry out. Some manufacturers have incorporated moist sections in their refrigerators—a cold mist crisper, a fresh-food section with a separate humidity control.
- Combinations that never form frost will cost more to buy and to operate. (To many, including ourselves, this additional cost is well worth it.)
- Most operate on a timer control that activates automatic defrosting at timed intervals to prevent frost buildup. One newer model uses a humidity control—the defrost cycle starts when the control senses frost in the freezer. (Because it is not on a regular timed basis, this system could save some operating cost.)

Additional specialized refrigerating features on top-of-line models:

- Separate controls for the refrigerator and freezer.
- Quick-chill sections or shelves in refrigerator and/or freezer.
- Extra-cold meat keeper (sometimes with a separate, adjustable temperature control) with its own supply of extra-cold air (in some cases this is directed around, not through, the meat container so as not to dry out the meat).
- Humid-dry controls save some operating costs.
- A convertible section which may be used as a freezer or for fresh food.

Defrost features in lower priced models:

- Two-door combinations are frost free in the refrigerator area, only freezer needs defrosting.
- One-door models with dial or push-button defrost. If you don't let frost build up too much, this method can be satisfactory. The freezing compartment must be cleared and defrosting takes a while. For fast defrosting, hot water is still the best method for these models.

STYLING FEATURES

Color is big this year. In addition to the classic white and coppertone, there are soft avocados and golds, bright mod hues, and simulated wood grains. Or, you can buy one of the models with interchangeable door panels. It will generally hold any material an eighth- to a quarter-inch thick—laminated plastic, woven materials, even chalkboard or your own designs.

In wood grains there are simulated walnut, pecan, cherry, rattan, even three-dimensional carved fronts.

Other styling features include: wood-grain trims and handles; a center-opening, French-door design on refrigerator part of a bottom-freezer combination; a choice of door handles; and decorator interior colors,

COMPACTS: SECOND REFRIGERATOR

A popular trend now taking hold is the addition of a second, compact refrigerator in the den, family room, or bedroom. As a result, there is now a varied selection of compacts available.

They range in size from approximately two cubic feet to six cubic feet. Most are conventional one-door refrigerators with a freezing compartment for ice cubes and short-term storage of frozen foods. Storage features include door shelves, adjustable refrigerator shelves, vegetable crispers even some cheese and butter keepers.

Small models may be set on tabletops, on accessory legs, under counters, or on accessory carts. One is available with a remote control condenser so it can be built in for furniture styling. Some will operate on batteries or can be adapted to operate on the car cigarette lighter. These also may be used on a standard 110/115 volt outlet.

Larger models are usually free-standing, often with a work-top surface. They may also come in combinations, as with a sink or range.

Many are designed specifically for bar use—look like furniture. Built-in locks are commonly available on these. One has an automatic ice maker.

BUYING AND INSTALLING


The actual installation of a refrigerator (unless it is built-in) requires no more than setting it in place and plugging it in. However, it is the setting it in place (or how well it fits) that we would like to cover here.

The width is the most important—but not the only measurement to consider. Capacities vary within the same widths due to differences in height and depth. If you have room to spare in the depth or the height, buy the largest capacity

you can fit. (We've never heard anyone complain about too much refrigerator space.)

Also to be considered in space requirements is ventilation. Some require a specified amount of space at the top or sides to operate properly. Refrigerators may come with right-

or left-hand opening doors. Be sure to get the one that works in your kitchen. There are also models with reversible doors (handy if you move).

PRICE

Refrigerator prices range from less than \$200 to over \$1000. In general, expect to pay: for a side-by-side combination—from around \$400 to \$700

(or even as high as over \$1000 for a highly styled built-in); for a two-door top or bottom freezer combination—from around \$150 to \$500 (or as high as just over \$1000 for a highly styled built-in); for conventional one-door models—from just around \$100 to \$300. Simple compacts run from under \$80 to around \$200. Highly styled, furniture-type compacts or combinations

run higher-\$500 to over \$1000.

Price is determined by convenience features, capacity, and styling. Above all, buy quality—a good brand name from a reputable dealer who promises service.

USING YOUR REFRIGERATOR

Before you use your new refrigerator read your instruction book from cover to cover. It will point out all the new features and how to make the most of them. It will tell you how to make sure your refrigerator is properly leveled, where all the important parts are, and how to care for the refrigerator. Remember, manufacturers' warranty terms are dependent upon the owner using and caring for the refrigerator properly.



annually only if the company wants to renew; the premium rate may be changed upon renewal. A guaranteed renewable policy may be renewed at your option and any change of premium must apply to all policies in your classification. Noncancelable policies are guaranteed renewable with no change of premium costs.

Certain accidents and illnesses may not be covered by your policy. These are called exclusions and are usually listed in the policy itself. Be sure you understand what they are and whether they apply to your family.

THE RIGHT COMBINATION

Once you have read and understood your present policy, you are ready to shop for additional coverage if you need it. If you do, remember these points.

The first benefits paid by a policy, the so-called early money, is expensive money. If you have small children to whom anything could happen, you may need the expensive early-money benefits. If, however, your children are grown and as a couple you are facing middle age, perhaps another kind of policy would suit you better-one with the first money deductible and/ or paid by a different plan. Major medical issues such a policy designed especially for serious accidents or prolonged illnesses.

Perhaps a disability income insurance policy is right for you. This is designed to help replace income lost because of long illness or disability as the result of an accident. Be sure to read this one carefully. Every insurance company has a different definition of disability, and perhaps varying waiting periods before benefits begin. There are also exclusions and limitations written into each policy that must be considered.

There are other things to consider too before you invest in additional health insurance. For instance, you may qualify for Workman's Compensation, which pays benefits for illness or accident. And Social Security pays benefits for total or permanent disability-find out how much before you invest in any other disability policy. Your own life insurance policy may have liability and disability provisions. There are many states today that offer similar benefits to which you are entitled

because you are contributing to them as you work.

PLAN A PROGRAM

Understanding each policy—the benefits, the advantages, the limitations, and the exclusions—is the best way to plan an intelligent program. And remember these basic principles:

Review your present policy and all other sources of income and compensation before you decide,

Shop for the best buy, Investigate all kinds of policies available. Ask questions, Compare one against the other.

Make certain that the company you choose is duly licensed in your state.

Comprehensive policies give you a

lot for your money so investigate them. Once restricted to group coverage, they are now available to individuals as well.

DECORATING CLINIC

Question: We are redecorating a 15x15-foot family room that is pan-

eled in pecan. Carpet and sofa bed are olive green and a recliner rocker is covered in gold leather.

Since the ceiling is 9 feet high, I would like to paper it with a small apricot-andgold Provincial print and use matching curtains Will the room be too dark?

Answer: Papering the ceiling would be a serious mistake. A ceiling height of 9 feet in a room this size is in proportion and we see no reason to lower it.

The small apricot-andgold print sounds fine and doesn't have to be confined to the windows. Why not bring it into your room —perhaps in pillows or on a bench or small chair?

Question: The only words to describe our dining room are small and uninspired. The furniture: an oval table and six chairs, Early Salvation Army style, now painted pale green. The carpet is the same color, walls are white.

Because of the room's shape, we keep the table off-center, and I'm not sure whether an area rug or wall-to-wall carpeting would be better. We can afford to replace the rug and change the window treatment but need some good ideas.

Answer: Not every room needs a rug and this one sounds as though it would have more character without one. Stain the floors a very dark, rich brown, paint the furniture deep blue.

Use double-hung louvered shutters, painted white, or simple sheer white curtains (washable) with a shirred heading at the windows.

A bright painting, a few small indoor plants in white wicker containers clustered in a corner are all you need to have a sparkling room.

Question: Would colored venetian blinds (dark brown or green) be appropriate in an Early American living room instead of shades or shutters? They would be used with solid color tieback draperies hung from wooden poles and trimmed with braid. Answer: Venetian blinds would be quite authentic with your furniture. Surprisingly enough they are not a modern invention and were used extensively in Early Colonial houses. In fact Williamsburg, Virginia, had its own venetian-blind maker and today venetian blinds are shown in most of the restored buildings there. These blinds are made of wood, painted or stained to match the woodwork.

We think the room would look pretty and fresh if you papered it in a bright green-and-white plaid. Wallpaper should be plastic coated for easy maintenance. Or investigate the many good-looking vinyl wall coverings available.

Use deep pink accessories: place mats, towels, pot holders, canisters.

Question: An archway connects our

What can I do to create the right setting for these pieces?

Answer: Why not wallpaper? If your furniture is formal, a blue silk paper would create an elegant background. Or choose from a variety of wallpaper borders to simulate a paneled room.

If a more rustic look is desired, select a blue-and-white Provincial print, perhaps with a touch of mustard.

Question: Our living room has one large picture window and three single windows, I'd like to use draperies at the large window and Austrian blinds with swags in a contrasting color for the others. Must they all match?

Answer: Your room sounds too broken-up for this kind of treatment. Instead of drawing attention to mismatched windows, minimize them. Use simple draw draperies for the one large window, and tailored Roman shades instead of Austrian blinds for the others. Preferably the same fabric should be used for all, in the same color as your walls.

Question: Our dining table looks lovely when it is set for company with fresh flowers and candles but what do I keep on it between meals? Many of my friends have arrangements of plastic fruit or artificial flowers but that's not my taste

Answer: As we've said many, many times, the next best thing to real flowers are real plants—the kind that grow year round and require a minimum of care. Especially good are ferns (the fluffy ruffle type is great looking), grape ivy, and piggybacks. Group four or five together in a low, shallow basket fitted with a tin liner.

Always attractive are an odd number of candlesticks, some matching, some not, in an informal cluster.

If color and/or texture is what you are seeking, an arrangement of silk flowers in a low silver bowl, dried flowers, or fresh fruit would all be preferable to a plastic arrangement.

Other ideas: shafts of wheat massed in a glass cylinder, a round smoky tinted glass bowl heaped with clear glass balls.



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
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
DRESS UP THAT OLD DOOR

The ubiquitous flush door—once considered very smart and contemporary—now seems a little dated. But if your house has one, you don't have to replace it in order to dress it up. Here, we show how two such doors were updated by the imaginative application of wood molding strips. In one case, the door retains its original contemporary feeling, while the second seems more classic in design. The logical time to do this face-lifting is just before the door, or the whole house, is repainted. Otherwise, of course, the new moldings will call attention to the faded paint surrounding them.




Besides merely dressing up the door, eight vertical strips of molding make this door more consistent with the vertically slatted privacy screen to its left. In addition, they create eye-catching shadow lines that make the door stand out visually from the plain walls. Strips are applied with brads and waterproof glue.





Here the moldings were mitered, then fastened to the door in pictureframe pattern that gives an effect similar to that of traditional panel doors. Each molding actually consists of two narrow moldings glued together before mitering. This trick is often used to vary stock patterns and sizes, or when a wide, intricate molding is required.

ADVICE FROM EXPERTS

In the face of the obstacles inherent in a tightmoney economy, should you postpone buying a home? Not at all, say most mortgage authorities, Many builders are finding it hard to sell houses so it's as good a time as any to dicker and buy. Also, the cost of land and houses has been soaring at the rate of about 10 percent a year. According to the National Association of Home Builders, in the last two years the cost of an average new home has risen \$2500. A mortgage can be had if you're able to pay the price. For the best possible transaction, the experts suggest:

- · Shop around. First try your own savings bank or your life insurance company. Local real estate agents and FHA or VA offices may know which lenders in your area are currently most active.
- Don't accept the first offer, but compare terms particularly the relationship of points and interest.
- · Don't be fooled by a low interest rate with high points. A point roughly equals 0.15 percent in interest, so a 6 percent loan plus 10 points would give an effective interest of 7.5 percent.
- · As you probably know, the most economical mortgage is one in which you combine a large down payment with a small loan at the lowest interest rate not too long a term.
- Ask for an estimated list of closing costs in advance. Sometimes you can persuade the seller to absorb some of the fees or even some of the points.
- Don't choose a house beyond means. The price should be no more than two-and-a-half times your annual income and payments no more than a week's take-home pay.
- It's usually a good investment to retain a knowledgeable lawyer. Remember that a mortgage will probably be one of the biggest financial moves you'll ever make.

mixture onto ungreased cookie sheets. Use a small spatula or a rubber one to help push mixture off spoon, Work carefully with a small spatula and spread the mound into a strip 4 inches long and 1 inch wide. Round the sides and pile the dough on the top. Repeat with remaining dough, leaving 3 inches between each strip.

13. Carefully cut tops from eclairs with sharp knife. Remove any pieces of soft dough. Just pull them out gently with vour fingers.

14. Spoon ice cream into bottoms of eclairs, filling them generously. Re-



place tops. Place on trays or cookie sheets. Freeze. Makes 12 eclairs.

15. When you are going to serve eclairs, take them from the freezer and let them stand in the refrigerator 20 to 30 minutes. Serve with Fudge Sauce or Butterscotch Sauce, whichever complements the flavor of your ice cream.

preparing the chow southwest style

Our barbecue chef, Martin Jetton (below right), learned the ways of the barbecue from his father, Walter, who was nationally known for his barbecue skills. Marty taught us all about barbecueing, from the building of the pits to the serving of the food.

The pits (right): To build a professional pit use four pieces of sheet metal to form a pit measuring 20 inches wide by 24 inches long by 24 inches high. (You can make a smaller one by varying the width and length, but be sure to keep the 24-inch height.) Attach them at corners with hooks or pieces of wire. Use 1/8-inch expanded metal for a good sturdy grid. Count on 25 pounds of charcoal for a pit this size, and a log or wood chips for smoke. Good idea: a propane torch to start the fire. The biscuits (two photos at right): Biscuits in the coals were Marty's first project. He mixed them on the spot and baked the biscuits in a greased cast-iron Dutch oven, using aluminum foil to cover and seal the edges. Hot










coals were placed on the foil, then the Dutch oven was lowered into the pit, and set on the glowing coals. The biscuits were left there for three minutes, quickly removed (with asbestos gloves!). Grid was placed over the pit and biscuits finished baking on top. (Great as they were, we suggest baking your biscuits in the oven and bringing them to the barbecue for warming.)

The beef ribs (two photos below): Once the grid was in place, we were ready for the ribs. Joe Dial, Marty's assistant, deftly seasoned them and layered them on the grill. (Important tips: keep meat the prescribed height over the coals at a cooking temperature of about 200° to 250° if you have a grill thermometer. Be sure meat covers the entire surface of the grid so that smoke is not allowed to escape, or use foil or utensils to cover any open areas.) Once the ribs were started, things quickly took shape. Water was heated in a huge kettle for the corn; preroasted brisket was placed on the grill for heating and smoking.

The pies (top right): Fried pies sizzled in hot oil till a crisp, yummy brown.

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
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barbecued beef brisket and spareribs, made peppery hot with all kinds of dry seasonings, then slowly cooked and smoked. They were crispy and crunchy on the outside-but at the same time,

juicy and tender. (One bite and the memory will linger, we assure you.) Then on to the spicy beans (almost like chili) and tender, hot, fresh-baked biscuits. Still room for the other goodies-potato salad and coleslaw, nibbles such as green onions and dill pickles. An extra cup came in handy for the corn, a buttery-soft treat not to be missed. And the perfect ending: those great, hot, sweet, fried apple pies. Once everybody was comfortably settled around their bale of hay (used for tables) you could hardly hear a word. No wonder—who talks when

food is so satisfyingly delicious? Try your own version of this great outdoor feast. For backyard and oven variations of the barbecue and recipes turn to page 104.

BACKYARD BARBECUE

The secret of a great barbecue, as we learned in Texas (see page 98), is long, slow cooking, smoke, and seasonings! Armed with these secrets and scads of recipes, we came back to our Test Kitchens to find out how you could have a barbecue at home, in your backyard or wherever.

In addition to the pit method, there are two other ways you can prepare a barbecue: 1) The oven method. You can prepare the ribs and beef from start to finish in your oven to serve indoors or out-the tang of the smoke will be missing but we guarantee it will be delicious. 2) The combination oven-outdoor method. This is the method we heartily recommend for weekend barbecuers. You slow-cook the ribs and beef in your oven, take them to your outdoor grill for smoking and warming. (Even the experts prefer this combination method for the beef brisket because cooking time is so long.)

USING YOUR BACKYARD BARBECUE EQUIPMENT

The barbecue grills that come nearest to approximating the slow, even heat of the pit are the smokertype or covered barbecue grills with deep fireboxes. These have a top cover that can be closed for oventype cooking. With this kind of grill, your meats might be completely cooked outdoors, following the grill manufacturer's directions for cooking-or they can be combination oven-cooked and grill smoked.

The more common backyard grill, the simple brazier, usually has a very shallow firebox-the coals are too close to the meat to slow-cook it completely over your grill. For this grill use the combination method. (Instructions with barbecue recipes.)

THE FIRE AND SMOKE

You should have enough charcoal so that the bottom of the grill (or pit) will be completely covered when the coals are spread out in a single layer. If more charcoal is needed as cooking progresses, it can be added then.

An electric fire starter or a small propane torch makes a fast and efficient fire starter (be sure coals are in a mound when you're igniting them). Once the coals are hot, use a rake to spread them in a single layer; then sprinkle the coals with non-resinous wood chips.

OUTDOOR COOKING ACCESSORIES

We suggest: long-handled, twotined fork or tongs for turning the meat and a new dishmop for basting. For serving, a good sharp carving knife and cutting board for the beef (slice it on the bias) and another knife (or scissors) to cut the ribs.

Have plenty of large kettles or skillets, ladles and serving spoons, tin or aluminum foil pie plates, mugs and towel-wrapped tableware.

BARBECUED RIBS

Barbecue Sauce

1/3 cup salt 1/3 cup sugar 21/2 tablespoons black pepper 2 tablespoons monosodium 1 tablespoon paprika 11/2 teaspoons bottled dry lemon peel 1/4 teaspoon ground thyme 6 pounds lean spareribs Mop Sauce

To cook in the oven: Heat oven to 275° F. Combine salt, sugar, pepper, monosodium glutamate, paprika, lemon peel, and thyme; mix well. Coat ribs well on all sides with mixture. (Any seasoning mix left over can be stored in a covered jar for use another time.) Place ribs in shallow roasting pan, Bake 3 hours or until done as desired, turning once. Brush with Mop Sauce as needed to prevent ribs from drying out, Remove from oven. Cut into single rib portions, Serve with Barbecue Sauce, Makes 10 to 12 servings.

To cook by the combination method: Prepare and bake ribs as directed above. Remove from pan. Have grid far enough from coals to prevent burning of ribs (overlap thin rib ends). Place ribs on grid over hot coals to which wood chips have been added to create smoke. Turn frequently, brushing with Mop Sauce, until heated through. Serve with Barbecue

To cook on the pit or grill: Coat ribs with dry seasoning mix as above. Have grid far enough from coals to prevent burning of meat. Place ribs on grill over hot coals to which wood chips have been added to create smoke. Overlap ribs to prevent burning, Cook 11/2 hours or until brown and crisp. Brush with Mop Sauce when ribs start to brown, Brush again if ribs seem dry. Serve with Barbecue Sauce.

To cook in smoker or covered grill: Prepare meat as above and cook according to manufacturer's directions.

BARBECUED BEEF BRISKET

Buy choice brisket to have enough fat on the cut to keep meat from drying out. The secret of the meat's flavor is in the dry seasoning mix used to coat it.

1/3 cup salt 1/3 cup chili powder 21/2 tablespoons monosodium glutamate 11/2 tablespoons black pepper 1 tablespoon garlic powder 5 to 6 pounds beef brisket Mop Sauce **Barbecue Sauce**

To cook in the oven: Heat oven to 250° F. Combine salt, chili powder, monosodium glutamate, pepper, and garlic powder: mix well. Place brisket in shallow roasting pan, Coat well on all sides with dry seasoning mix. (Any seasoning mix left over can be stored in a covered jar for use another time.) Bake 1 hour; brush with Mop Sauce, Bake 4 hours longer, brushing with Mop Sauce every hour. Remove from pan. Slice and serve with Barbecue Sauce, Makes 10 to 12 servings.

To cook by the combination method: Prepare and bake meat as directed above. Remove from pan, Have grid far enough from coals to prevent burning of meat. Place meat on grid over hot coals to which wood chips have been added to create smoke. Turn frequently, brushing with Mop Sauce, until beef is heated thoroughly. Serve with Barbecue Sauce.

To cook over pit: Coat meat with dry seasoning mix as above, Place on grid of pit. Cook 5 to 6 hours, turning every 30 minutes. Brush with Mop Sauce when meat appears to be dry. Serve with Barbecue Sauce

To cook in smoker or covered grill: Prepare meat as above and cook according to manufacturer's directions.

MOP SAUCE

This is used as a basting sauce for barbecued meats. The easiest way to apply it is with a small kitchen dishmop or a cloth that has been soaked in the sauce.

1 can (101/2 ounces) beef consomme 11/3 cups water

3/4 cup Worcestershire sauce 1/3 cup cider vinegar

1/3 cup pure vegetable oil 11/2 teaspoons monosodium glutamate

1/2 teaspoon paprika

COUNTRY POTATO SALAD

5 pounds potatoes, pared 1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/2 cup chopped green onions

1/2 cup chopped pimientos

1/2 cup sour pickle relish

1/2 cup prepared mustard 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cook potatoes in boiling, salted water about 15 minutes or until tender. Drain. Cool. Slice potatoes 1/4 inch thick into large bowl. Mix remaining ingredients in small bowl. Pour over potatoes. Toss gently. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

SPANISH COLESLAW

1 large head cabbage, shredded (10 to 12 cups)

FRIED APPLE PIES

Filling:

1 can (1 lb., 4 ounces) pie-sliced apples, well drained

1/2 lemon, coarsely chopped (rind included)

1/2 orange, coarsely chopped (rind included)

1 cup sugar

1/4 cup butter or margarine

Pastry:

4 cups sifted all-purpose flour

teaspoon salt

teaspoon baking powder

1/4 cup sugar

3/4 cup shortening

3/4 to 1 cup milk

Pure vegetable oil

Combine apples, lemon, orange, and 1/2 cup sugar in medium-size saucepan. Bring to boiling; reduce heat, Simmer 8 to 10 minutes or until citrus rinds are tender. Remove from heat, Drain, Stir in remaining 1/2 cup sugar and butter or margarine. Stir until butter or margarine is melted and sugar is dissolved. Cool, Chill.

Sift flour, salt, baking powder, and sugar together in large bowl. Add shortening; cut in with pastry blender until mixture resembles cornmeal, Stir in milk gradually until dough clings together. Press dough together gently. Roll out, a quarter at a time, on lightly floured board to a 10-inch rectangle, 1/8 inch thick. Cut into four 5inch circles, Put about 11/2 tablespoons apple filling in center of each circle. Moisten edges of dough with milk. Fold dough over to form semicircle, Press edges together with fork. Turn pie over: press edges again with fork, Pie must be tightly sealed.

Pour enough oil into skillet or saucepan to make depth of 2 inches. Heat to 375° F. on deep-fat frying thermometer. If you don't have a thermometer, drop a small piece of dough (from leftover scraps) into hot oil. When it starts to pop up, oil is hot enough, If oil smokes or browns in splotches, it is too hot-let the temperature drop. Fry pies until golden brown on both sides. Remove with slotted spoon. Drain on paper towels. Sprinkle with sugar, if desired. Makes 16.

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SECRETS OF THE SHRIMP

From the shores of the Gulf of Mexico to the rocky coast of Maine, from the English Channel to the Bay of Biscay, shrimp are one of the great delicacies of the world. But if you limit these tender, pink shellfish to the usual salad or cocktail you're missing a whole new world of wonderful eating. They can add scope to your menu and come to the rescue of many a predinner hour as tasty tidbits. They also can be a first course or an elegant main dish. Here Chef Jacques Jaffry reveals some of his secret ways with shrimp. Have you ever tried poaching them in beer, court bouillon, or clam juice? Ever tried serving them icy cold with a dill, cucumber, or andalouse sauce? Shown below are two hors d'oeuvres and two main dishes. All are excitingly different. How-tos for peeling, deveining, and butterflying shrimp, and recipes begin on page 108






Shrimp in Beer. Shrimp are cooked in beer or court bouillon and served with six sauces: cucumber, herb, cocktail (bottled), dill, andalouse, and avocado.



Batter Fried Shrimp. Shrimp are dipped in pancake batter and fried. Sauces are aurore and curry (shown), mustard and tempura.



Scampi, Shrimp are broiled in butter and garlic.

COOKING LESSON NO. 10 SECRETS OF THE SHRIMP (continued)

Fresh shrimp can be purchased either chilled or frozen. The head and thorax are removed and all you need do is to wash them under running, cold water, shell them, and remove the one small vein along the back. Shrimp may be shelled either before or after boiling. Either way, remember—don't overcook them.

To shell and devein raw shrimp



1. Slip your thumb under the shell between the feelers and lift off the shell segments. Take off as many as you can at a time, then repeat until all have been removed.



3. Make a shallow cut along the outside curvature down the back of the shrimp with a small, sharp knife.



2. If the recipe calls for leaving the tail on shrimp, peel

off all the segments down to the tail. Otherwise, just

4. Lift the exposed vein either with your fingers or with the point of your knife. Remove the vein and discard it.

To devein cooked, shelled shrimp




1. Lift out the strip of meat along the back curvature of shrimp. Start at head and pull it gently toward tail.



2. Scrape out vein with the point of a small knife. You can do this under running, cold water, if you wish.

To butterfly shrimp



1. Make a slit on the inside curvature of the shrimp with 2. Place the shrimp, cut side down, on board or counter. a sharp knife, being careful not to cut all the way through. Flatten shrimp slightly with the flat of your knife blade.



SHRIMP IN COURT BOUILLON

1/4 cup lemon juice

- tablespoon salt
- teaspoon peppercorns
- sprigs parsley
- cups sliced onion (2 large)
- stalk celery, cut in pieces
- bay leaf
- whole cloves
- quart water
- pounds medium-size shrimp, shelled and deveined or 2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen, shelled, deveined shrimp

Combine all ingredients except shrimp in saucepan. Bring to boiling. Simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Add shrimp, Bring back to boiling. Simmer 2 to 4 minutes, according to size of shrimp. Or, add shrimp to boiling court bouillon, Bring back to boiling. Remove from heat. Let stand until cool. In either method, strain liquid; discard vegetables and spices. Chill shrimp. Serve with any of the sauces below. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SHRIMP IN BEER

- 2 cans (12 ounces each) beer
- cups sliced onion (2 large) stalk celery, cut in pieces
- sprigs parsley
- tablespoons lemon juice
- bay leaf
- tablespoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 pounds medium-size shrimp, shelled and deveined or 2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen, shelled, and deveined

Combine all ingredients except shrimp. Bring to boiling. Simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Add shrimp. Bring back to boiling. Remove pan from heat. Let stand until cool. Strain. Discard all vegetables. Chill shrimp. Serve with any of the sauces below. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Andalouse Sauce

Mix 1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing; 3 tablespoons tomato paste; 2 tablespoons finely minced onion; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; and 1 can (4 ounces) pimiento, drained and diced. Cover. Chill. Makes about 11/2 cups.

Dill Sauce

1/4 cup orange marmalade 1/2 cup sliced, blanched almonds Bottled kumquats, drained Candied violets

Grease and flour 1-quart mold. Combine warm water and sugar in large bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir to dissolve. Stir in butter or margarine, milk, salt, eggs, and flour. Beat until smooth and bubbly. Pour into mold. Let rise in warm place (85° F.) away from draft about 45 minutes or until doubled in bulk.

Heat oven to 375° F. Set mold in oven carefully as this fragile dough falls easily. Bake 25 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

While cake bakes, prepare syrup: Combine water, tea leaves, sugar, lemon, and cinnamon in small saucepan. Simmer 5 minutes, Strain, Stir in rum, Turn cake out onto serving plate. Pour hot syrup slowly over cake. Cool. Brush cake with marmalade, Sprinkle with almonds, Garnish with kumquats and candied violets.

Cut eggs in half lengthwise, Remove yolks; press through sieve. Mix yolks, pimiento, parsley, onion, salt, mustard, and sugar. Stir in enough mayonnaise or salad dressing to make smooth and creamy. Add hot-pepper seasoning to taste, Refill whites, Chill. Makes 12.

TACOS SALADS

1 dozen packaged prefolded tacos shells or 1 dozen corn tortillas Pure vegetable oil Fruit Salad Guacomole Salsa Fria

Use packaged tacos shells as they come from the package. To make tacos from tortillas, pour 1-inch depth of oil into small skillet; heat. Heat each tortilla in hot oil 15 seconds. Fold over with fork; fry 15 seconds or until slightly crisp. Drain on paper towels, Cool, Carry tacos and fillings separately to picnic, Fill tacos with one or a combination of mixtures. Garnish with bottled pepper relish and shredded lettuce, if desired.

FRUIT SALAD

Combine 2 cups shredded iceberg lettuce; 1 can (81/2 ounces) pineapple tidbits, drained; 1/2 cup diced green pepper; 1/2 cup diced red pepper; and 1 tablespoon French salad dressing mix. Toss lightly. Makes 3 cups.

GUACOMOLE

Rub bowl with split clove of garlic. Mash 2 peeled and seeded avocados into bowl. Stir in 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon minced onion, and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Pack in jar; spread with thin film of mayonnaise or salad dressing to prevent darkening. Just before using, stir well. Makes about 11/2 cups.

SALSA FRIA

Paprika

Peel 4 medium-size tomatoes; chop coarsely, drain, Combine with 1 bunch green onions, diced; 1/2 small chili pepper, finely chopped; I teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon leaf oregano, crumbled, 1/4 teaspoon pepper; and 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar. Correct seasoning. Chill. Makes 2 cups.

MEXICAN FRIED CHICKEN

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 4 teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 tablespoon chili powder 12 large drumsticks with thighs (about 6 pounds) 4 eggs, beaten 1/2 cup pure vegetable oil or shortening 1/2 cup butter or margarine

Shake flour, salt, pepper, and chili powder in large paper or plastic bag. Shake chicken, a few pieces at a time, in flour mixture. Roll each piece in beaten eggs, coating well. Heat oil or shortening in large skillet or use 2 skillets, if chicken will not fit in a single layer in one. Cook chicken 30 to 40 minutes, turning often, until tender, well browned, and no juices run out when leg joint is pricked. Sprinkle generously with paprika. Drain on paper towels. Cool, Makes 12 servings.

EGG-PAINT COOKIES

4 cups sifted all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup butter or margarine 2 cups sugar 2 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla **Egg Paints**

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together. Cream butter or margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Knead in flour mixture until dough holds together. Chill at least 1 hour.

Heat oven to 375° F. Roll out half the dough at a time to a little over 1/4-inch thickness, Cut out 5-inch cookies (an empty 1-pound coffee can is good to use). Transfer cookies to ungreased cookie sheets with broad spatula, placing cookies about 2 inches apart. Bake 15 minutes or until slightly brown around edges. Remove cookies to wire racks. Split bread lengthwise. Spread with mayonnaise or salad dressing. Stack cheese on bottom half of bread. Cover with alternate slices of green chilies and pimiento. Top with lettuce and top of bread, Makes 2 submarines.

STRING OF FLATS

6 slices sandwich bread Bottled sandwich spread Prepared mustard

1 package (6 to 8 ounces) your favorite cold cut

WHAT YOUR AIR-CONDITIONING CONTRACTOR SHOULD DO

You should know enough about home central air conditioning to ask your contractor important questions.

Let's assume that you've received a written proposal from a contractor, that your home already has a ducted warm-air heating system to which cooling can be added, and that the contractor has recommended a "split" system in which the condenser-compressor is located outside the home and the blower and evaporator coils inside.

How can you tell if the contractor will use efficient, dependable equipment and make a good installation?

Don't settle for a vague answer such as, "All houses like yours take three-ton units." The fact is that the size of equipment needed in identical houses can vary because of orientation to the sun, size of the family, trees and shrubbery around the house, etc. The contractor should be able to show you the "cooling-load estimate" he has worked out for your house on standard forms available from the Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute or other sources. You may not understand the calculations, but at least you'll know he followed standard, recommended procedure.

The contractor's written proposal should specify the name of the manufacturer and the model number of the recommmended equipment. To verify the unit's cooling capacity the contractor should show you its listing in the "Directory of Certification" of the Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute. Capacity ratings shown in the directory are arrived at by means of a rigid inspection and testing program that also checks dependability.

SOUND CONTROL


The contractor should minimize sound inside and outside the home.

The best way to control sound from the condenser-compressor outside your home is to place the unit where it will be as far as possible from neighboring houses, and where it does not feed sound back into your home. If there's no satisfactory location, the contractor should erect sound deflectors or employ baffles that will block or break up some of the sound.


Inside your home, the objective should be to prevent sound generated by the blower from being transmitted into living areas. The contractor can place a flexible canvas or plastic sleeve between blower and ducts, and plan the layout so every duct makes at least one 90 degree bend before it reaches a room outlet.

MOVABLE REGISTERS

If the contractor plans to use a single-duct system for both heating and cooling, make sure that he will

install movable registers—and that the registers are placed so large windows and glass areas will be covered by a flow of cool, conditioned air.

Movable registers cost very little and will enable you to direct warm air down in the winter (it will rise) and cool air up in the summer (it will fall).

GUARANTEES AND SERVICE

The time period covered by guaran-

tees varies somewhat, but since most manufacturers now warrant their equipment for one year, most contractors guarantee their installation for the same period. Nearly every central system will need some adjustment. The contractor should make these call-backs without charge—and he should agree to do so in writing.

Is your contractor set up to provide quick, competent service? The best way to check this out is to talk to some of his previous customers. Ask him to furnish you with two or three names. Ask him to provide a telephone number for you to call when you need emergency help at night or on a weekend.

If the contractor's service record doesn't measure up or if he's uninterested in your questions—consider another contractor.

on three or more inches of fine gravel topped with an inch of sand, or on four inches of crushed stone. Jam the bricks tightly together and brush a little sand into the joints

CONCRETE

Concrete's reputation for severity and ugliness is unfair. Used properly, it is quite attractive.

Pros and cons. Concrete is the strongest, most durable, and most versatile paving material we have. Its surface can be either polished smooth or textured. It can also be colored. However, it speeds the runoff of water and prevents moisture and air from reaching plant roots underneath. It is very glary in its light-gray state.

Where to use. It can be used anywhere except play areas, around trees and other plants with large root systems, on hillsides, and in sun-swept locations.

Installation. Concrete is generally bought in readymixed batches and poured right from the mixing truck into wood forms. Ideally, it should be laid over a gravel base and reinforced with wire mesh, although some contractors try to omit one or both of these steps.

EXPOSED AGGREGATE

The concrete itself is a conventional mix, but the surface is covered with marble chips, granite screenings or other rock materials up to three quarters of an inch in diameter.

Pros and cons. Exposed aggregate concrete is as durable as ordinary concrete and creates the same water problems. On the negative side, it's uncomfortably rough if you are barefoot—on the positive side, it is less glary and does not show stains.

Where to use. It is especially recommended for ter-

races and walks but not for play areas.

Installation. Let a professional make the installation. It is generally the same as ordinary concrete and is often poured in giant squares separated by strips of redwood or cypress.

CONCRETE PATIO BLOCKS

These are solid concrete rectangles about one and a half inches thick and up to 16 inches square. Some have the texture of ordinary building blocks, others are covered with stone chips or pebbles and resemble exposed aggregate concrete.

Pros and cons. Patio blocks can be laid in sand and are easy for the doit yourselfer. Individual blocks can be lifted out to make plant pockets, and water penetrates readily between blocks into the soil below. Various colors are available.

Where to use. They are particularly appropriate for terraces, walks, and pool decks.

Installation, Handle like brick.

that is hard to sweep, not too comfortable underfoot, and not the steadiest support for table legs.

Where to use. Cobblestones, being hard to walk on, should be used only around trees and perhaps in driveways. The other cut-stone blocks are for rather informal terraces, walks, and driveways, as well as around trees and planted areas.

installation, Handle like brick.

Where to use. Terraces and walks. Installation. Select stones with smooth, flat surfaces—but not shale which wears very badly. Heavy field-stones can be laid directly in the ground as steppingstones but they would be hard to mow over or to keep grass from creeping over them. It's best to dig out the soil six to eight inches deep and pour in a good layer of gravel. Lay the stones on this foundation and trowel cement

dation and trowel cement mortar into the joints. Level all stones. Mortar joints should be filled almost to the tops of the individual stones.

FLAGSTONES

Flagstones are thin, rather large sandstones in various colors. They are sold in cut rectangles and squares and in irregular slabs. Stones can be cut to your specifications.

Pros and cons. Because of the variety available, flagstone surfaces can be as distinctive as you choose. They are attractive, flat, and have relatively few joints. The stones are easily stained—but skidproof and durable.

Where to use, Flagstones are good for all kinds of terraces, walks, and pool deck areas.

Installation. Unless you love jigsaw puzzles or are using flagstones of a single size and shape, let your masonry-supply dealer give you a numbered plan for arranging them. It will add to the total cost but will save you time and exasperation. If using irregular stones, select and fit them very carefully to avoid a jumbled, fragmented look

For a perfectly flat, rapidly draining surface, you can lay one-inch-thick flagstones in mortar on a three-inch concrete subbase. For a less rigid surface that lets rainwater seep through, lay one-and-a-half-inch stones edge to edge on sand or on crushed stone, as you do brick,


Where stones are laid in sand around planting beds, install a thin, vertical metal or wood curbing to keep the stones from moving.

Flagstones are often used as steppingstones, or in a walk in which the stones are separated by an inch or two of grass. This is an easy and cheap installation but the grass will grow over the edges.

GRAVEL, CRUSHED STONE, PEBBLES, MARBLE CHIPS

Included here are all small stones or stone bits free of dirt and sand.

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CUT-STONE BLOCKS

Cut-stone blocks of granite, sandstone, limestone, etc., come in various sizes, colors, and textures, depending on how they were split or sawed at the quarry.

Cobblestones, with somewhat rounded tops, are also available.

Pros and cons Strong, durable, and extremely handsome, they can be set in charming curved patterns if very small cubes are used. The main problem with all but the sawed blocks, which are smooth, is that they produce a rough (though level) surface

FIELDSTONES

Attractive terraces can be made of fieldstone, but use of this material elsewhere is rare. The stones are literally picked up in the field and used essentially as-is.

Pros and cons. Irregular fieldstones, well laid, make an attractive, natural-looking, durable surface and a very inexpensive one if you have a home-grown supply of stones. However, the surface is usually very rough and it is difficult to sweep. It traps puddles after a rain and stains are hard to remove.

Pros and cons Using gravel, you can have paving with a pleasantly natural look or a very precise, dramatic look at low cost. Gravel is also a fine foil for other paving materials. It does not stain or reflect light and it retards runoff water and lets it soak into the ground.

On the other hand, gravel has its hazards and drawbacks. It must be

raked to look its best and even so, it is likely to become fouled with twigs, leaves, cigarette butts. Large gravel is unpleasant to walk on-small gravel gets in your shoes. Weeds are difficult to eliminate. And gravel is easily scattered into adjacent borders and lawn areas where it may damage or be thrown dangerously by your lawn mower-a particular problem in the North because of snow blowers.

Another problem with gravel, of course, is active children who find it hard to resist the temptation to throw it, plow furrows through it, and rearrange it into piles.

Where to use, Even though it becomes clogged with trash, brown or gray gravel is one of the best materials to use around trees and shrubs in shady areas where grass and groundcovers do poorly. But gravel is second or third best in areas occupied normally by people or automobiles.

Installation Loose gravel should not simply be spread on top of the ground unless the area has no traffic or unless the soil itself is full of rock or coarse gravel. On fine soils - especially clay—the gravel topping will soon sink out of sight. To prevent this, excavate six to 12 inches, depending on the composition of the soil, and pour in a thick subbase of fine gravel. In clay soil and some loams, you may have to start with a bed of big rocks and/or rubble.

To keep out weeds, spread heavy polyethylene film on the ground before applying gravel. The film must be slit at frequent intervals to let water pass through. An alternative is to treat the soil, before applying gravel, with a soil fumigant such as Vapam or Myione. The treatment gives weed control for several months. Thereafter, treat the area once or twice a year with Ammate.

To keep gravel from scattering, surround the paved area with curbs one or two inches higher than the gravel surface, or with very wide mowing strips of concrete, stone, or brick.

GRAVEL WITH SOLID PAVING BLOCKS

Large, variously shaped blocks of stone, concrete, or wood can be arranged in an area spread with gravel.

Pros and cons. The problems normally encountered with gravel and the problems normally encountered with a second paving material remain. The main advantage of combination paving is that the blocks enhance the

appearance of the gravel as well as serving as stepping-stones—which minimizes the need to rake the gravel.

Where to use. Combination paving is good for walks and formal areas where gravel is used instead of grass for maintenance reasons.

Installation. Usually it's best to put in the other material first, then fill in the gravel around the edges. However, if you plan to lay a thick subbase of fine gravel beneath the top layer, prepare the subbase first, then place the stepping-stones, then spread the top layer of gravel around.

SLATE

Slate is available in sawed rectangles and squares and in irregular pieces. There are numerous colors.

Pros and cons. Natural-surfaced slate is a handsome material with a

variable but slight texture that is more or less skidproof and nonabrasive. It is reasonably stain resistant, strong except under heavy weight, and very flat. However, the surface occasionally deteriorates in cold weather, and, like all stone, slate can be tiring to stand on.

Where to use. Slate is good for terraces, walks, and around pools.

Installation. Handle slate like flagstone. Set oneinch-thick slates in sand, thinner ones in mortar.

QUARRY TILE

Quarry tile is a heavyduty ceramic material for exterior as well as interior use. (Tiles known as pavers are similar but made by a different method.) The tiles come in squares and rectangles from a little less than three-by-three up to nine-by-nine inches, and also in many special sizes and shapes. Besides the familiar red, the tiles range in color from off white to blue green. Some have fired-in designs or lightly textured surfaces.

Pros and cons. If you don't go around whacking them with a hammer, they are durable. They are also stain resistant, easy to sweep or mop, flat, and smooth. They are a little slippery when wet, Light-colored tiles glare.

Where to use. Terraces, walks, and pool decks. For pool decks, use more textured or smaller tiles to assure better footing.

Installation. Tiles are best laid in mortar but the largest can be laid in sand

like flagstones.


WOOD BLOCKS

Redwood and cypress are preferred because of their natural decay resistance, Round sections cut from tree trunks are the most common shapes.

Pros and cons. Wood blocks blend nicely into the landscape, and are quiet, nonreflecting, and cool. They can be very slippery when damp.

Where to use. Use squared blocks on a terrace or walk, tree-trunk sections as stepping-stones.

Installation, Like brick,

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

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

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THE FAMILY PET By PATRICIA O'KEEFE

FIRST AID FOR PETS

Home remedies cannot take the place of the expert advice and care of a veterinarian when your cat or dog is injured or ill. However, first aid helps relieve pain quickly-and may even save his life if he's involved in a serious accident.

Minor cuts and bruises can be treated at home much the same way you soothe skinned knees and bumped heads. When the skin is broken, cleanse the wound with soap and water or with mild antiseptic such as peroxide or boric acid. Other antiseptics should not be used unless a veterinarian prescribes them. An animal will lick his wounds which usually aids healing but examine him every day to be sure that an infection does not set in.

Burns can also be treated at home if they are not extensive. Wet packs of a strong tea solution or diluted baking soda relieve the pain. Grease or ointment should not be used.

Insect stings can make a pet miserable in summer. Keep flies and mosquitoes away with a repellent spray. Caution: use only those sprays made especially for animals; others are poisonous when inhaled or licked off the coat. Unless the pet is stung near the eye or-this happens sometimesswallows a bee, a bee sting is not too serious. A paste of boric acid or ice packs will reduce pain and swelling. Stings on the head or in the mouth need the attention of a veterinarian.

SERIOUS TRAUMAS

Auto accidents are probably one of the most common causes of death and serious injury. When an animal is hit, there may be broken bones and internal injuries. Keep him quiet and warm and take him to a veterinarian as quickly as possible. To avoid further injury while traveling, place him very carefully on something rigid and flat and wrap him in a towel or blanket. Give first aid to stop external bleeding.

If you discover your pet eating a poisonous substance, call the veterinarian immediately for an antidote, If help isn't immediately available, induce vomiting with salt or peroxide mixed with equal parts of warm water.

Puppies will chew practically anything, including electric cords. Electric shock can daze him or knock him out completely. Whatever you do, before you touch him unplug the cord, using rubber gloves or a thick pad of cotton material.

If a whiff of ammonia doesn't revive him he may need artificial respiration. Stretch him out on his right side with head and neck extended and press down suddenly but gently on his ribs. Keep pressing and releasing at a rate of 20 or 30 times per minute until he begins to breathe.

CONTROL YOUR PET-AND YOURSELF

When a dog is in pain, he may be excited and hard to handle. You can improvise a muzzle for a dog with a long strip of material. Wrap the bandage around his jaws and tie the ends at the back of his neck. To re-

strain a cat, wrap him securely in a small blanket or bath towel, Fasten the wrapping with safety pins,

After any kind of accident, a cat or dog may go into shock caused by pain and fear. Numbness, dazed expression, shivering, weak pulse, and shallow breathing are the symptoms. Without prompt treatment, shock may cause death. Keep your pet warm and lying down with his head slightly

lower than his body. A little strong coffee or whiskey can be given as a stimulant providing he is able to swallow. Don't try to force liquid if he is partially unconscious.

Above all, when administering first aid, keep calm. Animals are particularly sensitive to the mood around them. Speak softly and soothingly Assurance that help is at hand is good medicine too.



HOW TO REFRESH TIRED LAMPSHADES

Do you have a lampshade that's perfecty scaled for a particular lamp base but soiled enough for the trash can? If so, take a look at our suggestions for rejuvenation and hold on to that shade, it can have a new life.

FABRIC SHADES

If the shade is fabric stretched on a frame you can dry-clean it with a good cleaning fluid, Brush off all loose dirt and clean the shade with a toothbrush dipped in the cleaning fluid, (Clean the brush as you go along so it won't soil the shade further.) Then wipe with clean cheesecloth dipped in clean fluid. When all soil is removed, wipe the shade gently with a clean, dry Turkish towel to absorb the moisture.

If by any chance the metal shade rims have left marks on the fabric, cover the discolored areas with fancy tape, braid, ribbon, or fringe.

If you have fabric shades that are only lightly soiled, rub over soiled spots with the kind of powder stick used to clean white felt and fabric hats. Allow powder to set, then brush off with a clean brush. Repeat if necessary. As a final touch, go over the shade lightly with the stick; let it remain on 20 minutes; brush off.

Small fabric shades can be cleaned by dipping into a pail or bowl of cleaning fluid. Be sure to do this outdoors and away from any open flame. Dip up and down, and brush very soiled areas with a clean toothbrush. When soil is removed, pat dry with a towel; use an electric fan for drying.

Want to change the color of a fabric shade? Dip a small shade into a bucket of liquid dye. To help the dye dry evenly, use the same method of patting with a Turkish towel and using an electric fan for final drying.

PAPER SHADES

To clean paper shades brush off all loose dust, and wipe off soil with a cloth dampened with cleaning fluid. Allow to dry. If shade requires more treatment to extend its life, here are some ideas.

Spray-paint the shade. Spraying will make the shade opaque, but if you spray the inside white, enough light will be

Painted shades can be decorated with paste-on trims, braids, ribbons. Rayon bias tape can be stretched flat and glued around the shade.

Try stenciling also, Or apply masking

tape to line off a plaid design, and paint between the strips of tape. Dry, then peel off tape gently, from side to side. This method will prevent ruining the newly painted background.

Spatter a shade. You can practice first on a piece of cardboard. First spray on background color; dry. Spray on a light mist of a contrasting color. Just once over lightly, so very fine dots of color spatter on shade; dry. Place shade on its side. Spatter on larger spots of color by dipping a clean old whisk broom into paint, and shaking it quickly so spots will fall onto shade. Again practice on cardboard, Dry. Cover outside of shade with wax paper. Spray the inside white

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
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COMMON SENSE AND TABLE **MANNERS**

The boss's wife has invited you to tea at her private club? You and your husband plan to entertain your daughter's future in-laws at dinner? Perhaps now is the time to review a few of the basic rules of eating conduct, which are considered good table manners at home or in public.

HOW DO YOU USE YOUR NAPKIN?

You should open your napkin when you sit down at the table. Usually the hostess will unfold her napkin first and you follow her lead. If you fold a large dinner napkin in half before you place it in your lap, it is easier to manage. Smaller, luncheonsize napkins can be opened entirely.

A napkin should be used sparingly. It is not used to clean your face from ear to ear. It is not used to remove food from your mouth or to wipe your silver. Remember that your napkin should be almost as clean at the end of a meal as it was at the beginning-and almost as unwrinkled.

Nothing is more unsightly than a used napkin scrunched into an untidy ball in the middle of leftover food on a plate. Keep your napkin in your lap until your hostess places hers on the table, then put yours at your place. It is also more pleasing to the other guests at the table. This is also true of the large paper napkins that are widely used today.

HOW'S YOUR TABLE POSTURE?

You should keep your arms and elbows away from the place setting. In a restaurant it is difficult for a waiter to serve properly if the table is cluttered with parts of you. Never keep your elbow on the table while you lift a fork to your mouth. And don't curve your arm around the plate. Instead, sit comfortably straight in your chair and bring the food to your mouth-not your mouth to the food. Do take care to keep your elbows close to your sides to avoid bumping your neighbor.

BUTTERING BREAD-SERVING YOURSELF

Rolls or bread should be broken, not cut, before being spread. Break off one bite-size piece at a time and butter it on your bread plate. This will avoid leaving a large, partially consumed piece on your plate.

When you have finished with the butter knife, place it across the side of the bread plate or place the blade in the center of the plate, but don't rest the handle on the table.

Often you are expected to serve yourself from a food platter which the waiter takes around to each person in turn. When he offers you the platter, always to your left, take the serving spoon in your right hand, the serving fork in your left. Serve yourself with the spoon, steadying the food with the fork.

IS YOUR GLASS OR PLATE UNSIGHTLY?

You can prevent unsightly marks on your glass or cup if you gently wipe or pat your mouth before drinking.

You should not leave unfinished food or inedible material on the rim of your plate. Fish bones, potato skins, and any remaining food should be placed to one side of the plate below the rim so they won't fall on the tablecloth. The rim is for decoration only and should remain clean.

ARE YOU FINISHED WITH YOUR PLATE?

To indicate that you are finished eating and that your plate may be removed, place your knife and fork together in the center of your plate.

If you merely wish to pause occasionally while you are eating, place the fork tines-down across your knife so that they form an X on the plate. Or place your knife across the right side of your plate and the fork in the center-either method is acceptable and generally understood by waiters.

But whether you are to continue or have finished eating, no part of your knife or fork should touch the table-keep them on the plate without resting the handles on the table.

When you have finished eating you should not push your plate away from you. Not only will the empty space tempt you to lean on the table, but the person near you does not want your used plate in front of him. And of course, it is more difficult for the waiter to reach into the center of the table in order to remove the plate.

AFTER DINNER

Today in most restaurants finger bowls are a thing of the past. Even at many formal dinner parties in private homes they are not often used. But in some restaurants, clubs, and private homes, finger bowls are still used, particularly if boiled lobster or other finger foods are served.

If a finger bowl is served it will come between the main course and the dessert. If it is presented on a plate with a doily, and a dessert spoon or fork, place the doily and the finger bowl to the left of the plate. Put the fork on the table to the left of the plate, the spoon to the right. Now you are ready for the dessert to be served to you.

After dinner, before you leave the table, push your chair quietly out of the way. If you don't do it someone else will have to.
