PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On December 28, 1979, architects in the State of Illinois were charged with implementation of accessibility standards for the handicapped in public buildings, including those owned by the private sector. Donald Glickman, Executive Director of the Capital Development Board, has issued the Standards written by the British Architect Michael A. Jones; the Standards have the same force as any building code in the State.

Standards Reach Beyond Legislative Intent: The 79th Illinois General Assembly mandated the Capital Development Board in House Bill 984 to research and revise standards of minimum requirements for facilities for handicapped persons in public buildings. The Legislative "Joint Committee on Administrative Rules", chaired by Sen. Prescott E. Bloom (R-Peoria), and its Assistant Director Ken Mitchell have found the Standards to go beyond the statutory scope of the Handicapped Facilities Act in that the Standards also apply to new and remodeled <u>private</u> buildings in the State.

Standards Are Poorly Written: The Standards are written like a B+ Master Thesis in a University project, exhorting the reader to do good things for the handicapped through better understanding and knowledge. The picture book offers comparative photographs of before and after situations; other photographs show the enactment of the wheelchair in conflict with the environment; there is even a photograph of an open bed sore intended to enhance further the poignancy of the issue. The Standards are conflicting and confusing and are an insult to the architectural and engineering professions which have developed language and methods of enforceable building code regulations throughout the nation. These unenforceable Standards will now have to be rewritten by communities across the State in decisive, legal language that can be understood and also enforced.

Standards Do Not Reflect Public Response: The CDB was asked to cut back on the requirement that all employee toilet facilities be accessible; to limit areas in health facilities subject to the Standards to those open to the general public; and to remove remodeling of privately-owned public buildings from the requirements. The CDB, instead of responding to suggestions, in 1978 revised the picture book with more sophisticated rendering techniques and issued the Standards to an even wider interpretation: that of every building to be built in the State of Illinois for the future, new or remodelled, with public or private ownership.

Clearly the CDB and its leadership have rendered the building industry in the State Illinois in 1980 an unnecessarily difficult and costly new set of game rules which could be called the CDB's "Inaccessible" Accessibility Standards Illustrated.

The Chicago Chapter AIA requests a 6-month moratorium on the implementation of these Standards for study and revision. Please direct your support of this position to: Julian Desposito, Special Legal Counsel, Office of the Governor, State Capitol Building, Springfield, IL 62706.

CHAPTER ORGANIZATION FOR 1980

GRASSROOTS 1980

The AIA held its Grassroots North in Washington, DC on January 16-17. Grassroots South and West (Birmingham, AL and Albuquerque, NM) will be held later this month. The meeting is composed of working sessions which give a chance for component leaders, chapter presidents, presidents-elect and other chapter officers who wish to attend to provide feedback to the AIA's officers and staff on issues, programs and problems, to continue the 1980 planning process for the National AIA Board of Directors and, for the components, to share programs and organizational ideas. The



schedule is arranged with an initial open session in which issues are discussed; the presidents and presidents-elect then have separate meetings followed by large and small component workshops and commission workshops to explain the different directions and major activities of the National AIA commissions. The salient issues which were discussed were the registration challenge regarding sunset laws that are being enacted in some states (affecting Illinois in 1989) and the status of the AIA Code of Ethics as it is now being tested by the Mardirosian case and the Justice Department.

Three options to revise the Code of Ethics were discussed: 1) minimize any anticompetitive effects and maintain enforcement, 2) repeal the Code and adopt a new Statement of Principles regarding professional conduct which would be mandatory and enforceable, or 3) repeal the Code and adopt a new Statement of Principles regarding professional conduct which would be voluntary. A consensus concerning which method is best was not reached at our Grassroots; #2 or #3, however, received equal favor. One option suggested was to reorganize as a union; this would eliminate many of the hassles we are presently having with the Justice Department. This option seems to have some support from a number of members and will be tested further as the NAIA goes into additional Grassroots meetings.

The large component meeting was immediately divided into Regional and Metropolitan Chapter sections; the meeting was well attended, and there was great interest in continuing these discussions. A half-day meeting has been requested during the convention; an agenda will be prepared to discuss further programs, services, projects, impact, etc. Chuck Schwing, FAIA, President, has established the theme of "Challenges and Opportunities for 1980". Randall Vosbeck, FAIA, First Vice President, has established the 1981 theme to be Design and, in particular, Energy-Conscious Design.

The delegation to Grassroots North included Gertrude Lempp Kerbis, FAIA, President; Ray Ovresat, FAIA, Illinois Regional Director; Ken Mullin, AIA, Vice President; Mary Jo Graf, Executive Director; and the writer.

We hope to have your ideas regarding any of the issues discussed above; we look forward to your comments.
