Piece of the Action for Woman-owned Firn

Carrie Jeffers, vice president of Chicago Women in Architecture, reports that the State of Illinois has recently passed the Minority and Women Business Enterprise Act. Under this act, a goal is set to contract 5% of all the goods and services purchased by the State with Women Business Enterprises (WBE) and 5% with Minority Business Enterprises.

In order to take advantage of the act, women-owned firms must make their existence and status known. The state currently has no official record of women-owned architectural firms; therefore, the CDB has requested that women-owned firms identify themselves. Any firm not currently pre-qualified with the CDB is urged do so promptly in order to considered for architectur contracts to be awarded 1985. Any WBE firm now pr qualified should make its st tus known to the CDB. Conta Esther Opermeyer at the Cap tal Development Board, 31 793-6034, and ask for the pr fessional services form.

Limitation of Liability Discussed

Issues surrounding the profession's exposure to professional liability risks continue to be one of the central concerns of the architects in service to government, institutions, and industry, as well as architcts in private practice. The pros and cons of the concept of limitation of liability, its effect on the health of the profession and benefits to clients and practitioners alike will be discussed on October 19 at noon in the CCAIA Board Room. Albert W. Voirin, president of AVA Insurance Agency, Inc., a leading agency specializing in insurance for design professionals, is the program speaker.
