# About Startlingly Starting A New Year

For three and one half years Architecture Minnesota, which had succeeded Northwest Architect, was published by Dorn Communications in Edina. The advertising, sales, subscription and production tasks were performed by the Dorn organization. With this issue, Architecture Minnesota becomes entirely a product of the MSAIA. All the production, advertising, subscription work will be performed by the staff of the MSAIA. The editorial direction will continue to be the responsibility of the Committee for Architecture Minnesota which in addition will concern itself with all aspects of this new publishing venture.

We all believe that this change while not a new beginning!—will enable us to strengthen the magazine, editorially, graphically and—not least of all, economically. To help guide the general focus and develop policy guidelines an Advisory Editorial Board will soon be announced. Represented on the board will be individuals deeply involved in varied aspects of the natural and built environment.

A number of regular features will be strengthened and expanded while new ones will be added or started soon. Architecture at a Glance will be expanded to include news from all the visual arts. A debut in this issue is the Interview conducted by Jim Cramer with Saint Paul's Mayor Latimer. Each issue will contain an interview with a prominent personality whose activities directly or indirectly affect the built environment. Starting shortly will be an Energy Update column which will continuously bring news of the developments in the energy conservation area. Another debut in this issue is the Neighborhood story. This will become a regular feature which will tell of the many neighborhoods which make up our larger cities. The return to the city and the interest in the inner city have made neighborhoods the focus of much research, political and planning activity.

Although self-criticism is best practiced by penitent sinners, we will editorially offer in-depth analysis and focus on significant buildings or groups of buildings or any other activities, decisions or manifestations affecting our built environment. Rehabilitation, renovation and restoration activities and techniques will also be reported periodically.

And to correct our course and cheer us on in time of need we will count on our readers' letters and comments. We will publish them all, deleting only the expletives . . .

Dorn Communications have been exceedingly helpful in this transition period and the Committee for Architecture Minnesota as well as the many friends of the magazine have given generously of their time. The staff of the MSAIA, under the leadership of Jim Cramer, the Executive Director, has worked energetically, enthusiastically and tirelessly to make this new beginning continuous of the past.

The awareness, appreciation and stewardship of our environment, the delicate and nearly impossible balance between desire and reason, self-assertion and altruism, ostentation and economy, require our constant and continued attention. As a magazine representing the architectural profession, we will attempt to help clarify, develop and dramatize meaningful standards and guidelines, for ourselves, our readers and our community.

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# A Look at the past

January/February 1954, 25 years ago: A letter from William Gray Purcell, AIA, Editor: "I was startled the other morning to hear my name mentioned over the air .... Seems that Iowa editors and politicians are incensed over my proposal for a new setting for the old Iowa State Capitol. It's not the worst capitol building in the U.S.A., and I'd say that there are not four architects now living in the U.S.A. capable of designing such a public building. Iowa citizens would be better to wait another hundred years. In the meantime they could enclose the capitol with a plastic dome .... Cleaned up, dolled up, brightly painted and gilded the old capitol building could then be nested in surrounding gardens of palms and flowers all winter long. Des Moinesians retiring would no longer find it necessary to pay their state income taxes in Long Beach.

The pedestrian "high street," the two-level city of the future, was discussed by Editor H. W. Fridlund in reference to a Harrison and Abramovitz' project in New York City. "The clogging of city streets with crawling motor traffic, while pedestrians try to cross through the asphyxiating stream, must be solved by architects and engineers or by social explosion."

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# January/February 1969, 10 years ago:

"That link with a more picturesque age, the old Federal Courts Building in St. Paul, is still in danger of being lost. The General Services Administration is conducting quiet negotiations with a St. Paul real estate firm to swap the building and its site for a new parking ramp to be built at 4th and Broadway."

Donald Hassenstab has succeeded James M. Fenelon as Executive Director of the Minnesota Society of Architects. Mr. Fenelon has joined the staff of the American Institute of Architects as assistant executive director of the AIA.

The St. Paul Chapter's February 1969 meeting featured Eckhard Schulze-Fielitz of Germany, who explained his theory of a space frame system for urban design.

Forecasts for 1969 by architects, engineers and manufacturers include these comments:

"One of the deterrents to a higher rate of building next year is the accelerated rate of inflation."

"There exists an acute shortage of skilled labor in the construction field."





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# ARCHINTECTIURE AT A GILANCE

Minnesota Department of Transportation landscape architect Dennis Adams received a nice feather in his cap recently when Gov. Rudy Perpich was presented with a plaque honoring the Albert Lea Travel Information Center and Rest Area as the outstanding facility of its kind in the United States. Designed by Adams, the center was awarded the federal Secretary of Transportation Award for Excellence in a national competition conducted annually by the Federal Highway Administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation. The contest recognizes highway-related projects that reflect concern for protecting, preserving and enhancing the highway environment. The first place award cites the threeyear-old facility for excellence of site selection, engineering and landscape design and architectural development. Comprising 32 acres, the center is located off the northbound lane of I-35. one mile north of the Minnesota-Iowa border.

Anderson Tollefson Architects, Inc., St. Paul, have completed plans for a project called the Nordstrand Office Building in Hudson, Wisconsin. The 4,000 square foot structure is actually an addition to and remodeling of an existing Texaco service station. The completed structure will serve as headquarters for the S.S.G. Corporation, a Hudsonbased independent oil company, while at the same time providing a computerized self-service pump operation. The steel frame, metal panel and glass block structure is scaled to present a clear commercial image to the adjacent I-94 freeway.

Using a combination of burnished block and wood decking to provide an interior atmosphere of comfortable earth tones, the Northfield firm of Sovik, Mathre, Sathrum and Quanbeck have designed a 400 seat, 8,000 square foot addition for the Christus Victor Lutheran Church in suburban Apple Valley. The \$340,000 addition, now under construction by Northfield contractor Marv Wilker, features a general architectural design of sweeping lines whereby the roof reaches a pointed angle and slants back to the meeting with the walls. The present worship center will be used for Sunday School classes and will be separated from the new structure by a courtyard. Office and classroom space will be included in the new facility.

The North Shore community of Two Harbors now has a plan to guide the future development of its waterfront area, following completion of a study by Architectural Resources, Inc., of Duluth. Called the Two Harbors Waterfront Economic Development Program, the plan has received the endorsement of the city council and now will be used to seek both private and public funds to complete various portions of the project. According to the architect's report, perhaps the most significant development opportunity for Two Harbors lies in capitalizing upon the North Shore tourist trade which has grown significantly from year to year. Other potential uses for the waterfront area which were studied include the movement of general cargo commodities, an analysis of future mineral shipments and processing and the shipment of timber resources. The Evolution of the design, by Anderson Tollefson Architects, Saint Paul. segment of the plan encourages the development of Paul Van Hoven Park along the shores of Agate Bay with viewing areas, picnic tables and a permanent mooring for the "Edna G.," a steam-powered tugboat now slated for retirement after many years of service in the Two Harbors port area.

Busy firms around the area include the Architectural Alliance of Minneapolis, who are currently working on schematic plans for a 97,000 square foot Vocational Technical Education Facility on the St. Paul campus of the University of Minnesota. Also nearing completion on the St. Paul campus is a new Continuing Education Facility which contains a series of various sized meeting rooms arranged along a spine which serves not only as overflow meeting area, but is used to connect the structure with other campus buildings as part of a master plan circulation network. Under construction in Mankato are five increments of new construction as well as various remodelings on the Highland Campus of Mankato State University. During the summer of 1976, the Architectural Alliance was commissioned to undertake a study based on a directive to consolidate the newer Highland campus with its nearby predecessor, the Valley Campus. As a result, a series of weather-enclosed connectors will link major buildings together, improving the flexibility of the campus.

Ground has been broken and footings have been poured on the new Ramsey County Nursing Home located behind the older building on White Bear Avenue in Maplewood. A \$4.2 million project, the 180-bed facility will replace the old Ramsey County Nursing Home. Designed by Buetow and Associates-Patch Erickson Madson Associated Architects, the new home will be a two-story brick building with three L-shaped wings sharing a central nursing station. There will be lounges for each wing of the home, besides recreational and craft areas, a beauty shop, a large dining area for residents and staff and laundry facilities. Walking paths will surround the building and courtyards will connect the lounges with the outside.

The Little Sisters of the Poor's St. Joseph Home, a well-known cluster of yellow-brick buildings at Broadway and 2nd Streets, NE, in Minneapolis, is being converted into a 71-unit rental apartment building. Architects for the project are Miller Hanson Westerbeck Bell, Minneapolis. The five-story main building will be adapted to contain 64 rental units, mostly of one bedroom size. An adjacent three-story structure will contain four apartments while a two-story carriage house will be converted to three town-house units. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the nursing home was built in 1895 and remained in use through 1977, when the Little Sisters of the Poor moved to a new facility in St. Paul.

The American Crystal Sugar Company Research Center in Moorhead was recently selected for an Honor Award in the 1978 North Dakota AIA Design Awards Program. Designed by Foss Engelstad & Foss, also of Moorhead, the \$8 million facility consists of two main structures, one which houses the three component research functions and administrative area while the other includes a seed cleaning and processing facility. The three component research structure includes agricultural research, chemical research and process research components. According to American Crystal Sugar's director of research, Stan Bichsel, the advantages of the new center to the sugar beet industry is that, "we can accomplish things at half the time and expenses because the three basic research components are under the same roof.'

The western Minnesota community of Pipestone is a step closer to realizing its dream of once again having an indoor movie theater following design of an attractive new facility located on the town's main street. Designed by Twin Cities architect Stan Fishman, the 500 seat twin movie theater will feature an arcade-type front with brick pillars to fit the theme of Pipestone's downtown historic district. The arcade will serve as an outdoor lobby and will feature arches of heavy wire material. The structure will be mostly constructed of concrete block. Each theater auditorium will have a capacity of 250 seats, with exits on the sides to lighted walkways.

Construction is underway on Ironwood Square, a four-story condominium office building in Rochester. Designed by the Architectural Design Group, Inc., also of Rochester, the building has a total floor area of 21,640 square feet with 15,640 square feet of office area. The structure is located adjacent to the Zumbro River and is supported on concrete columns with only two brick service cores extending to grade level . . . which keeps the office floors above the flood protection level and allows the area beneath to be utilized for parking. The mechanical system, designed by TSP Consulting Engineers of Rochester, will use radiant

Carleton College Campus Center Northfield, Minnesota Myers and Bennett Architects/BRW Edina, Minnesota ceiling panels and by-pass type variable air volume to control the eight zones per floor.

The Edina studio of Myers and Bennett Architects/BRW has recently designed a \$4 million retail center, called the Bonaventure Retail Center, located in suburban Minnetonka. The center is characterized by a unique two-level interior courtyard which is unusual for a facility of its size. The feature is in response to the topography of the site which requires access from two different levels, each at opposite sides of the building. The architecture of the courtyard is a composition of circular elements including a fountain, elevator stairs and dining "pods" overlooking the lower floor area. Also on the firm's boards this year was the conversion of the Sayles-Hill Gymnasium at Carleton College, Northfield, into a multipurpose campus center where the whole college community-students, faculty, administration and staff-can meet in an informal atmosphere. Design features include dining and meeting facilities, game spaces, a post office and the main campus bookstore. According to the architects, great care was exercised to promote energy efficiency through the remodeling of entries, windows, the exterior envelope and all mechanical/electrical systems.

Projects of the Minneapolis firm of Armstrong, Torseth, Skold and Rydeen, Inc., Architects and Engineers, include a new church for St. John Neumann Parish, Eagan; a new \$1,050,000 classroom building for Pillsbury Baptist Bible College, Owatonna, which contains 45,000 square feet of classroom space; and a new \$1.2 million church for the Minnetonka Baptist Church, Minnetonka. Other work includes the performance of maxi-audits to identify energy conservation measures for three Minnesota school districts along with a report on a free energy ice air conditioning system for a recently completed ESS facility owned by Northwestern Bell and located in Eden Prairie. Energy consultant on the study was Thomas P. Bligh from the University of Minnesota.

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# A Conversation with Saint Paul's George Latimer

The Executive Director of the Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects, James P. Cramer, recently talked with Mayor George Latimer of Saint Paul.



James Cramer: When elected in 1976, you energetically undertook the task of directing the renewal of the downtown area. Recent tasteful developments in Saint Paul have impressed people across the country. It seems that Saint Paul has avoided many of the development disasters that have afflicted cities in other parts of the country. Why is this so?

Mayor Latimer: One observer, probably me, said partly in jest that by virtue of our lethargy and conservatism over a period of time, we have avoided the mistakes many cities made in the massive clearances and the building projects that have resulted from intense activity with limited planning. The simple fact is that we did have a period of relative dormancy. It gave us an opportunity to know what we want the shape of our downtown to take. Another major reason for our ability to do things well is that we have an older stock of buildings built before 1939. This carries with it also a great opportunity, an opportunity for restoration and renovation.

Without being pejorative about the suburbs, I really think that the first and second ring suburbs that were built right after the second world war are going to have major problems in the next twenty-five years. How do you really renovate, rehabilitate and rebeautify housing stock which, to put it bluntly, does not in many instances offer sufficient substance or beauty to warrant major reinvestment?

J. C.: Where has this new momentum come from?

Mayor Latimer: You can't look downtown and enjoy the new buildings and the restoration of the older ones without first acknowledging the tremendous philanthropic efforts here. My friend the mayor of Lincoln, Nebraska told me the sad story of the beautiful Federal Court House that they wanted to renovate. They had a one million dollar bond issue that failed there, whereas in Saint Paul, we have the old Federal Court Building, the Landmark Center, which is a joy and which involved seven million dollars of private philanthropic investment. We are an incredibly rich city with many of our older families and wealthy citizens having a stake in the design of the built environment in this community.

We are, incidentally, home base for an awful lot of very exciting architectural firms and therefore they are not merely here professionally, but they are also here as important residents of our city. All the thinking and planning and design about the way that we use our built environment, our green spaces, and our neighborhoods happens with the assistance of creative architects.

J. C.: You make it sound very easy, as if all of these projects are just falling into place. What role does a mayor play in orchestrating a city's development?

Mayor Latimer: Well, I take all the credit I can get, but to be objective about it, I think the mayor always plays primarily the role of catalyst or honest broker between competing or collaborating interests. Also, he must take to the public the various programs that might require public investment and proceed to sell these programs.

I think these are two very important roles. If I couldn't play these roles I wouldn't have sought this job or taken it. But essentially it is not modesty but honesty that compels me to say that the mayor cannot create these forces, a mayor can only recognize the forces that exist. I do take some pride in spending time trying to play the roles effectively, but the forces have got to be there. I did not fund or create the Mc-Knight foundation. I did not create the plan for the Oxford development in the middle of our downtown. I did not initiate the Landmark Center Project, so part of it was just good fortune to be here when it's coming together and part of it is a little muscle now and again when it is needed.

J. C.: Let's talk about urban transportation and the people mover project. Do you see this as an important transportation system of the future or an experiment that may lead to other things?

Mayor Latimer: If the people mover project grows and succeeds, it will remake the entire future of our cities. It's hard to exaggerate the benefits that may arise from this. For the first time in the history of our area, we will be knitting together the state and local governmental offices, three hospitals, a medical center, a large retail hub, the banking center and now a growing residential base. Bringing them together with entertainment centers in a pollution free and energy saving way is quite an extraordinary opportunity.

On the other hand, I am also frank to say that this is a rather scary opportunity for us. What if this gets in the way of the great old buildings which are here, and of course what if the technology doesn't work? It is experimental. We have observed the technology work, but not in an already built inner city.

J. C.: With all of the renovation and new developments in Saint Paul, the people

mover project possibility and with the energy problems that we are facing, what are the prospects for more people coming back to the city to establish their homes?

Mayor Latimer: We have a whole generation of people with different lifestyles from past generations. There are more work opportunities downtown and the opportunity to live as well as work in an area that is as civilized and exciting as we are seems to be appealing to many people. I think that it could be of international importance to show what one can do with an older city in a cooler climate such as ours.

J. C.: What makes one city very livable while others project an image of being just the opposite?

Mayor Latimer: Some city environments are monolithic and dehumanizing. There are downtowns in America which, if you just took the signs away, you wouldn't really know that you were in any different city at all. So it's that kind of monolithic tendency in some of our central cities which I think has been so unfortunate. I think that somehow we can strike a balance between the new and the old. Saint Paul would just be a dead old town if we didn't integrate the new hotels, apartments, and shopping centers with our great old buildings.

J. C.: The Seventh Street mall project, now being referred to as Seventh Place has surfaced as one of your newest projects and construction is already underway. Along this mall will be the new Radisson Hotel, a new Donaldson's department store and a glass enclosure over Seventh Street....

Mayor Latimer: Yes, Seventh Place

Cramer, Executive Director of the Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects. will be capturing a large public stage that will accommodate programming of all kinds. We hope to have life going on in that public space at all times. The Seventh Place Project will knit together the existing Daytons and the new Donaldsons on the mall level, as well as in an enclosed manner with our skyways. With the completion of the new international Radisson Hotel, our skyway system will then be about three miles in length. Not too many years ago I was a profound skeptic of the skyway system just as I was about high-rise housing for senior citizens but in fact, they both seem to work beautifully. It's interesting that people will walk blocks and blocks within one skyway system. It's an interesting environment with all sorts of shopping opportunities. Soon you will be able to walk all the way from the other end of lower town straight into the retail center of Saint Paul. The economic viability of downtown Saint Paul has never looked brighter in part due to the Seventh Place Project, the skyway system development, and all the new buildings.

The Seventh Place is an exciting project, exciting to a large part because of the leadership that architects have given in the design.

J. C.: In your opinion, are the arts a major economic stimulus to a city?

Mayor Latimer: Yes. The arts are heavily service oriented, therefore a great employer and they also enliven our city.

# The Lake District

# The Calhoun-Isles Neighborhood

To the discerning eve, a landscape can be deciphered and read like a good book or map. We are surrounded by the story of our past, and the face of the land is our most important historical document. Every thread of a place's fabric, no matter how ordinary, has a story to tell. It is too easy to forget that each clump of trees, unusual slope, building or pathway provides visual clues to the sequence of change that gives character to a place. In a location as attractive and exciting as the part of Minneapolis dominated by Lowry Hill, Lake of the Isles and Lake Calhoun, the landscape sings. Here, generations of human occupants have augmented nature to produce one of the most delightful urban settings in North America.

Throughout its colorful history, the lake district, with its several distinctive neighborhoods, has attracted an unique mix of Minneapolis residents. Some came to make their fortune, others to live a splendid life in the manner of a country squire. Some came to establish comfortable family homes, while others to promenade or to revel in the most current fad in outdoor recreation. No matter the year or the season, the lake district has been center stage in Minneapolis.

These are the opening paragraphs in the prologue to a new history of the Calhoun-Isles neighborhood to be entitled The Lake District. Now in press and scheduled for release early in 1979, the book will be the second in a series of local history publications from the Living Historical Museum, a project of Macalester College professors David A. Lanegran and myself. Even within the scope of a book-length treatment, we were not able to capture more than the most significant aspects of the history of this astonishing part of Minneapolis. But let me mention three of our observations.

First, the Calhoun-Isles neighborhood is not really one neighborhood but six, seven, or eight. These distinct regions contrast strikingly with one another as they have ever since they were platted. Lowry Hill is prestigious but Kenwood seems more sure of its identity. Lake of the Isles is fashionable but the Wedge has more historic buildings and tradition. South of Lake Street, Carao and East Calhoun offer moderate priced housing in combination with the attractions of beautiful lakeshore and excellent shops, theatres and restaurants. On the south shore of Lake Calhoun is the quaint area called Cot-



tage City where can be found some of the smallest and most charming houses in Minneapolis.

Second, this landscape was not simply discovered and exploited by the first white settlers. On the contrary it was virtually created by them. In the nineteenth century hardly a soul lived by the lakes, which were swampy and pestilential. Through the work of the Park Board, the area became habitable: the lakes were dredged, the parkways laid out, the lakes linked by a channel. Only in the years just prior to World War I did lake shore property begin to acquire the value which it still possesses. This process continues today, as can be seen in this past summer's repaving of the Lake of the Isles drive.

Third, we have noticed that a sense of community has not always characterized the Calhoun-Isles neighborhoods. Sometimes one area has pitted itself against another, and frequently speculators have attempted to generate overnight identities for one part or another of the Lake District. Civic pride seems to have crested in 1911 at the time the lakes were joined, again in the 1920s when a great deal of building occurred, and, perhaps, in the 1970s when residents seem to be discovering afresh the variety, tradition, and beauty of the home place.

Ernest Sandeen was co-founder of the Living Historical Museum at Macalaster College in Saint Paul where he is also Tarnes Wallace Professor of History. His recent book "St. Paul's Historic Summit Avenue" was reviewed in the July-August 1978 issue of Architecture Minnesota.

# Selecting an Architect

Clearly, trust and compatibility are the two most important factors you must look for when interviewing various architects. Good communication is essential for budget and fee negotiations, establishing a plan and working out all of the intricacies of design and construction.

Note buildings in your area that you like. Talk to the owners about the architects.

Keep in mind that a local architect, in addition to being continuously available during design and construction, is familiar with local climate, local codes and the local construction industry.

When you have come up with names of 5 or 6 architects or firms:

1. Ask about their experience and qualifications and look at brochures and examples of their work. Be prepared to offer them some of your ideas about what you want, your budget intentions and time schedule.

2. Evaluate their previous work and performance (it may be helpful to contact past clients), and meet with several firms to discuss your project.

3. After selecting an architect, you will enter into a contractual agreement with that architect or firm. Standard AIA contract forms are used for most projects because they are adaptable to a variety of projects and types of services. It may be helpful to refer to these standard forms, available from your local chapter of AIA. (B141, Standard Form of Agreement between Owner and Architect; and B161, Standard Form of Agreeement between Owner and Architect for Designated Services; other helpful forms are B551, Statement of Architect's Services; and D200, Project Checklist.)

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects (MSAIA) is an association of architects and related professionals in Minnesota, with 750 members statewide. 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# To Care and to Plan 1979

Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects

To the People, the Legislators, and the Public Officials of Minnesota The architects of Minnesota and the members of the Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects have concerns and proposals which we wish to place before the people, the Legislators, and the governmental officials of the State of Minnesota.

We are deeply concerned and involved with the conservation of our environment, the need for adequate housing and health facilities, the conservation of energy, and the reuse and rehabilitation of existing buildings. We are also deeply concerned with such professional issues as registration laws, statute of limitations, etc.

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects is committed to assist those persons in government involved in resolving our immediate problems. We are equally anxious to participate in formulating the long-range plans necessary to meet the physical and social needs of the people of our state.

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects represents over 200 architectural firms that employ thousands of individuals who in turn are responsible for the design and construction administration of hundreds of millions of project dollars annually.

We believe that Minnesota's Legislature has been among the most progressive in the country. The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects stands ready to assist in the legislative process. We truly need To Care and To Plan.

# Statute of Limitations

A Statute of Limitations (Repose) is a concept of law which provides, barring fraud, that an individual or organization is only legally responsible for an act for a specified time period before such act is legally laid to rest.

Recognizing that the construction industry is unique in producing a product where the useful life is potentially perpetual, 45 states have enacted statutes of limitations.

The Minnesota Construction Industry Statute of Limitations has been negated by two court decisions. One decision declared the statute, because of a language flaw, applied only to actions in tort (Third party) not those in contract. The second decision found the statute unconstitutional on the grounds that the class of persons protected by the statute was too restrictive.

Opponents of efforts to reenact the prior statute with its flaw corrected have raised a number of Constitutional concerns. The most serious issue relates to the constitutional provision providing "Every person is entitled to certain remedy in the laws for injuries or wrongs which he may receive." The Minnesota Supreme Court has held that this section of the constitution does not preclude a statute of repose if based on sound public policy. In fact, in 1978, the Minnesota legislature eliminated the outdated tort of alienation of affection regarding this provision.

The argument for the appropriateness of a statute of limitations (or repose) lies in its obvious desirability as a matter of public policy to prevent perpetual liability in the construction industry.

# Our Concerns Are:

 Without a proper statute of limitations the economic viability of hundreds of architectural, engineering, contracting and subcontracting firms will be seriously jeopardized by perpetual liability risks.

 Industry professional liability insurance protection, which has already risen at a rate equivalent to that of the medical profession, will need to be carried not only by all existing firms but also forever by everyone in the profession who retires or purchases an ongoing firm since potential liability remains perpetual unless legally laid to rest.

Protection offered people, their families and heirs involved in the construction industry in other states is not now available to Minnesota citizens.

 The Statute which the Minnesota legislature in its wisdom originally enacted for the public benefit relating to the construction industry has been negated for technical reasons rather than concept or motive.

# We Propose the Following:

 That the language flaws in the present statute be corrected to insure the original intent.

2. That the statute be redrafted to respond to the constitutional concerns.

# Conclusion

We believe that a good Statute of Limitations (repose) which permits the design professions and construction industry to practice and work confidently within a reasonable legal liability environment is indeed in the public interest.

Continuing Education Facility University of Minnesota St. Paul Campus Architectural Alliance Minneapolis

Nearing completion on the St. Paul Campus, University of Minnesota, is the Continuing Education Facility designed by Architectural Alliance of Minneapolis. Housed in this 42,000 square foot facility are various sized meeting rooms for a wide variety of programs. The meeting rooms are arranged along a spine which serves not only as overflow meeting area, but to connect with other campus buildings as part of a master plan circulation network.

# State of Minnesota Public Buildings

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects is pleased that the architectural consultative assistance requested by the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee has been implemented.

The design professional in Minnesota is an important resource and can effectively contribute to the appropriation and physical planning process. The involvement of an architect is particularly significant at the appropriation level of the State Building Program and it is hoped that this involvement will be a continuing one.

# **Our Concerns Are:**

1. The contents and the preparation of building appropriations.

2. That facility investigations be completed jointly by the House and Senate with continued professional assistance.

# We Propose the Following:

1. That building appropriations be based on cost estimates prepared by professional consultants after they have completed comprehensive space planning and preliminary design. This will force early resolutions and eliminate many uncertainties in facility acquisition.

2. That the same professional consultant be retained to complete each individual project after it has been approved and appropriations made. This will assure project continuity and maximum benefit to the state. That the same professional consultant who assisted the state in the building appropriations process be retained to complete each individual project after it has been approved and funded.

 That a Long Range Planning Committee consisting of House and Senate members be reconstituted and that a professional consultant be retained to advise that Committee.



# Energy Conservation

# **Our Concerns Are:**

### 1. Energy Conservation

A strong National Energy Policy must be based on energy conservation efforts and the development of alternative energy sources. Conservation could have substantial effect immediately while alternative sources and new technologies will require at least ten to twenty years to effect overall energy use patterns. Conservation must be practiced by all energy users to prevent severe shortages of fossil fuels and a depletion of our natural resources.

State government efforts are necessary to achieve the efficient use of energy. Minnesota has already begun such efforts; however, there is much to be done if we are to achieve significant energy savings and maintain the national energy conservation leadership that Minnesota has earned. Minnesota must take advantage of all opportunities offered by the new National Energy Act.

2. Energy performance standards vs. Prescriptive Standards

Throughout the nation two types of standards are emerging. The first are prescriptive standards which Minnesota has adopted. The second type is performance standards for each building type.

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects views the prescriptive code as an interim solution. Performance standards establish the maximum energy consumption by which each building type must be designed, and does not specify the means which an architect and owner must use to achieve the desired results.

3. Energy and Land Use Planning

Intelligent land use planning is probably the most fundamental long-term key to energy conservation. Our current land use patterns, urban sprawl and development systems encourage the waste of energy—not only in the delivery systems required for their occupants, materials and services, but also in the energy required to provide hardware (roads, cars, pipelines, power plants, etc.) to structure these systems. Much current effort is directed to the extension of transportation and utility networks to service helter skelter developments, resulting in the unintentional encouragement of more fragmentary developmental patterns. Much of this is a result of the quest for cheaper land. Enlightened planning would eliminate the extension or minimize the level of services to fragmented developments. Land developed efficiently along with services, should strive to use our limited supplies by building a more condensed environment. This allows for efficient energy systems such as district heating, mass transit and a higher level of human services.

#### Visitor Center Oliver Hudson Kelley Farm Thorsen & Thorshov Associates, Inc. Architects/Planners Minneapolis

The Oliver Hudson Kelley Farm, located in Central Minnesota is recognized as the birth place of organized agriculture. This early farmers union called The National Grange of the Patrons of Animal Husbandry was formed in 1867 and exists today.

The Minnesota Historical Society purchased the site in 1931 and has preserved the original farm house built by Mr. Kelley. All of the original support structures barns, silos, etc., have been destroyed over the years and are presently being rebuilt.

The Historical Society wants to provide an orientation space for the public that come to the site. This space is approximately 6000 sq. ft. and is required to be anonymous in character. This center is to provide the complete orientation of the visitors using visual aids and multimedia displays.

The site is chosen as an interlude to the entry procession, a time lapse to transfer an auto culture back to a pedestrian, horse drawn era. After seeing the house from the first rise in the landscape the visitor is then brought into the center through a readjusted vista to the farmstead. The visitor completes the arrival on foot or through horse drawn cart, brought back to the original axial drive.

# We Propose the Following:

1. The continued strengthening of programs and impact of the Minnesota Energy Agency by stimulating additional research and development for energy conservation and alternatives to the conventional sources of energy.

 A continued emphasis on the collection and assimilation of data and information which can be used to refine an energy budget or performance code for new and existing buildings and the continued review and updating of the federal performance standards.

3. Tax and economic incentives to make it economically feasible for Minnesota building owners to retrofit existing buildings and design into new structures maximum energy efficient design technology.

Promote Minnesota residential standards enforcement.

5. State leadership assistance in obtaining State and Federal monies to determine energy conservation opportunities which are economically feasible in existing buildings. Energy surveys of existing buildings should be done by registered architects and engineers to preserve the life, safety and welfare of the occupants of buildings.

A requirement for a life cycle cost analysis on all new public building designs funded by the State of Minnesota. This would entail an estimation of the total energy costs of a particular building over a 10 year period.

Promote the conservation of materials through energy efficient building design, manufacturing process, transportation and construction techniques.

8. In order to facilitate the implementation of energy oriented land use planning concepts, the state should provide enabling funds to the appropriate governmental agencies (State Planning Agency, Metro Council, Energy Agency) to undertake the following actions:

a. Survey existing zoning, code, tax and other incentives that have misdirected the growth patterns of our urban and rural areas. Recommend changes in these incentives to encourage efficient development and appropriate directions of growth.

b. Survey existing energy uses in the delivery of persons, materials and services. From this survey, analyze which land use patterns minimize energy usage and still provide for a good human working environment and economic growth.

c. Investigate, in terms of energy efficiency and environmental impact, the relationship between the elements of certain utility and transportation services and their capacity to meet the needs of the area.





# Preservation of Historic Resources

The quality of life throughout the State is enhanced by the preservation of our built environment. This preservation should include not just the buildings of obvious architectural merit or associated with important persons and events; it should include engineering structures, prehistoric and historic archeological sites, and most importantly, neighborhoods throughout our cities which have developed distinctive qualities worthy of preservation.

# **Our Concerns Are:**

 Many features of our built environment are being irreversibly and unnecessarily altered or destroyed. In some cases, the destruction is a direct result of unfortunate tax considerations. In other cases, it is because there is little flexibility in meeting code requirements in the course of a rehabilitation project. In most cases, however, it is simply a lack of concern for and recognition of less distinctive buildings and neighborhoods.

# We Propose the Following:

 Revisions to the State revenue codes to encourage preservation of existing buildings and to discourage the demolition of significant structures. These changes could be similar to the preservation provisions of the Federal Tax Reform Act of 1976.

 Revisions to the State revenue code to encourage preservation of existing residential structures and neighborhoods, such as the bills introduced in the last legislative session relating to delayed increases in assessed value of rehabilitated properties.

 Significantly increased efforts by the State to use existing facilities of architectural or historic value to meet the needs for office space. Encouragement to county and local governments to do the same.

 Development of programs to insure that building projects undertaken by all levels of government do not have an adverse affect on either officially recognized historic properties or on the less recognized qualities of neighborhoods.

5. Development of special building code provisions so that officially recognized historic buildings can be excepted from some requirements and so that other rehabilitation projects can utilize alternative methods of providing for life safety, access for the handicapped, and energy conservation.

 Increased funding for preservation activities through the Minnesota Historical Society with an emphasis on preservation, restoration and adaptive use rather than reconstruction.

# Planning and Housing

# **Our Concerns Are:**

 The continued increase in suburban development to the detriment of established urban centers.

2. The high cost of housing and unavailability of mortgage money in the general market place.

 The stifling effect upon development and barriers to obtaining quality planning caused by non-uniform and inappropriate controls and reviews.

 The continued growth of inefficient transportation based primarily upon the automobile.

5. The loss of natural, recreational and agricultural assets.

6. Lack of responsible planning and development leadership to interact with local decision makers.

# We Propose:

1. Special incentives, financing mechanisms and other development tools to stimulate investment in established urban centers.

Innovative programs which team governmental and private funds in a cost efficient manner and support increased housing stock through effective planning.

 Uniform statewide procedures for processing development applications and continued technical assistance to communities for updating plans, policies, and controls.

4. Support for a statewide transportation plan and encouragement of similar comprehensive plans on the local level.

5. A statewide plan which inventories and establishes priorities on natural, recreational and agricultural assets. Open space planning and additional land acquisition both in the metropolitan area and statewide with grants to cities, municipalities and counties expressly for enhancing existing environments, and the continuation of the Critical Areas designation program and refinement of the Critical Areas Act.

 State and regional planning and coordinating agencies should quickly and efficiently develop regional growth and land use strategies as mandated in existing legislation.

 Continued funding and strengthening of the Minnesota Environmental Quality Council to ensure overall state coordination of environmental policy.

#### Fort Snelling Visitor Center Fort Snelling Myers and Bennett Architects/BRW Minneapolis

The Fort Snelling Visitor Center is a facility designed for the Minnesota Historical Society as part of the restoration of historic Fort Snelling and its site. The building is organized along a central concourse, with a historic Interpretive Center describing the Fort on one side and the Society's Historic Sites Division offices on the other. A lower level houses Archeological Division, some functions of which are on public view. Access to the Fort will be by a long gentle ramp along the Mississippi River gorge, through the Visitor Center concourse and along a pathway focusing the visitor's view on the Fort's round tower.

The building will be constructed largely underground to minimize its impact on the historic site reconstruction, provide unobstructed views of the Fort and incorporate several conservation and passive solar energy concepts.

Basic Medical Science Building University of Minnesota, Duluth Medical Facilities Associates General Architect Minneapolis Architectural Resources Inc. Associate Architect Duluth

The University of Minnesota School of Medicine, Duluth, is a new educational program with emphasis on primary health care for family practice physicians. The facility for this program is sited to complete the linkage of the science quadrangle with an enclosed pedestrian skyway appropriate to the inclement weather of Duluth. The School is organized in vertical levels for security and control. Most levels are subdivided as a series of zones; an exterior zone providing exposure to natural light for offices and general educational spaces, an interior zone of flexible laboratory space, and a service zone for animal resources and other support functions. The facility is expandable to the east utilizing support from the first phase service zone. The Minnesota Registration Law for architects, engineers, land surveyors and landscape architects was developed by the Legislature to assure that the public's health, safety and welfare are protected by allowing only licensed persons to design buildings, structures or works. Recent sessions of the Legislature have been faced with requests to raise the existing limit below which the services of design professionals are not mandatory. The last session mandated that the State Board of Registration adopt rules defining classes of buildings in which the public interest did not require design professionals. That rule making process is now in progress.

# **Our Concerns Are:**

The Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects continues to be concerned over attempts to permit increasingly complex design work to be undertaken by unqualified and unlicensed individuals.

The cost of work, related to buildings, structures or engineering systems, is not necessarily related to the degree of public jeopardy in their use by the public, and it is therefore not in the public interest to continue to expand the scope of work to be done outside the law, at the potential expense of the public, for the convenience of the unqualified.

# We Propose the Following:

Pending results of the rule making now in progress in response to the actions of the Legislature, the Minnesota Society American Institute of Architects will continue to work for and support measures which further define the public interest concerns in this area and will actively work for legislative action to control the unauthorized and illegal practice of design.

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# Contradiction of Scale and Style

Can a building form express contradictory intentions? For example, can a building look big—but really be small? Can it be one style here—but a completely opposite one there? And, most importantly, can these and other contradictions occur—not in gradual transition—but in abrupt or even violent juxtaposition?

These questions have intrigued me since participating in the "National Football Hall of Fame" competition some years ago. More recently, the same kinds of concerns came up in the "Energy-Efficient Dwelling" competition (sponsored by the Minnesota Energy Agency). Both competitions will be discussed here to illustrate some ideas on contradiction and heterogeneity in architecture.

The Football Hall of Fame posed a deep contradiction. On the one hand, its dramatic site and symbolic nature called for a grand gesture, a big statement, monumentality. On the other hand, its program and allowable volume demanded a relatively small, modest structure. How to achieve both? The winners all showed the tremendous struggle to resolve the "big-little" contradiction. All, that is, except one-Robert Venturi. The rest had manipulated building form in a variety of ways in attempts to make a little building look big. Venturi, however, was alone in resolving the big-little dilemma with truly contradictory building forms. For symbolism and monumentality, he created a large electronic billboard which flashed messages and images of classic games of the past. To meet program and volume requirements, he designed a small shed-like structure. These forms, contradictory in scale and style, were then joined abruptly together. Two very conflicting goals were thus met in one simple building design.

Venturi's approach is, of course, not new or unique. It has been done before in eclectic periods and, in more common terms, appeared in American town building of the past. False fronts were an expedient way for a modest building to have an appropriate scale and style along Main Street. Today that common touch is ever present along commercial strips where big signs dominate small, inexpensive buildings. What was new about Venturi's approach was a recognition that "heterogeneity"—or mixture



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of dissimilar and contradictory elements-had a place in the modern movement of arhcitecture. The modern movement, at least until recent times, has been more characterized by "homogeneity"-or continuity in design-where a building has a consistent and uniform architectural vocabulary throughout. This quality is inherent in Frank Lloyd Wright's organic architecture-the Robie house being a significant example. Singularity of expression obviously is valid for certain situations but heterogeneity may offer a greater range of design possibilities for projects like the Football Hall of Fame and the Energy-Efficient Dwelling.

The Energy-Efficient Dwelling competition offered an opportunity to further explore the concept of contradiction in architecture. As with the Football Hall of Fame, there was a paradox (at least for my situation). On the one hand, my site choices-narrow (40 ft.) lots in Saint Paul's historic Summit University area-demanded an infill house compatible with adjacent 21/2 and 3 story turn of the century houses. On the other hand, stiff budget and energy constraints pointed to a small, compact dwelling structure. To resolve this conflict, an approach using contradictory architectural expressions was used. For compatibility with flanking houses, the street image is a three story facade of traditional forms and expressions (reminiscent of Charles Rennie Mackintosh's houses of the early 20th century). To achieve a compact small mass, the house form is quickly stepped down at the rear in a cantilevered deck, contemporary style-which faced south. This form was also effective for plan arrangement (the small to large space components adapted logically to the three level stepped back form) and for maximum exposure of major spaces to the winter sun. The house is basically a passive energy system.

The Football Hall of Fame and energy house projects have been used here to demonstrate a heterogeneous approach, using contradictory elements, to the big-little problem in architecture. This approach is also applicable to other situations. For example, a building project may have highly diverse program requirements which can be expressed, architecturally, in contradictory terms. Locally, a notable building of this type is Orchestra Hall. A solid, "introverted" mass houses the performance activities where control of light and sound is critical. A light, glassy, "extroverted" structure houses office and foyer spaces where natural light, views and a sense of openness are important. The aggressive juxtaposition of these contradictory forms creates a tension which reinforces the expression of each. The Football Hall of Fame, the energy house and Orchestra Hall are but a few examples of an approach which is now gaining considerable attention. The possibilities, it seems to me, are endless-and very exciting.

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# Anno's Journey, by Mitsumasa Anno, Collins-World, 6.95.

Let me first say that I am so enchanted by this book that I have been showing it to everyone I know. Mitsumasa Anno is a superb illustrator who has produced two children's books in the past, Anno's Alphabet and Anno's Counting Book. Anno's Journey is a story told without words. Illustrated in minute detail it encourages the reader to create his/her own story of the journey. Anno includes references to several artists including Courbet, Millet and Beethoven. Part of the fun of the book is locating these references. Every rereading of the book will bring a new delight and a new discovery. This is a sophisticated, imaginative and creative children's book for both children and adults.

One indicator of the national up surge of interest in recycling old buildings is the steadily rising sales of preservation-related books published by the Preservation Press of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. During 1977 some 30,000 copies of the Press's 50 titles were sold through the Preservation Bookshop, requiring reprintings of a half-dozen of the most popular publications.

Another 35,000 copies of the Trust book America's Forgotten Architecture are in print following a third printing by the publisher, Pantheon Books.

Among the reprinted Preservation Press books is the first major publication to document the economic benefits of rehabilitating old buildings for new uses. Economic Benefits of Preserving Old Buildings has just been reissued with a new cover and a new clothbound edition (\$9); the paperback edition is \$6. The 168-page illustrated book presents rehabilitation cost figures and case histories on the recycling of scores of old buildings and neighborhoods. Topics covered include municipal action to encourage private investment in preservation, continuing the use of sound buildings and adapting them to new uses,

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Case studies in *Economic Benefits* include projects in Seattle, San Francisco, New Orleans, Savannah, Dallas, Denver, Boston, Chicago, Washington, D.C., Baltimore, among others. Special attention is given to such concerns as 19th-century commercial buildings, rehabilitation for office space and developing large commercial restoration projects.

Economic Benefits presents the contributions of 25 leading preservationists and public officials at a 1975 conference on the subject sponsored by the National Trust, city of Seattle and Seattle Preservation and Development Authority. Authors include Seattle Mayor Wes Uhlman, Dallas planner Weiming Lu, restoration architects Giorgio Cavaglieri and George M. Notter, Jr.; Wallace A. Wright, Jr., developer of Salt Lake City's Trolley Square; and Richard W. Freeman, Jr., of the Vieux Carré Commission, New Orleans. Analytical summaries are provided by New York Times architecture critic Paul J. Goldberger, Christian Science Monitor critic William Marlin and Dana Crawford, president of Denver's Larimer Square Associates.

Endorsing sponsors of the economic benefits conference were the American Institute of Architects, American Institute of Planners, National Association of Home Builders, National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials and Urban Land Institute.
