


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

Soaring shell roof that lets the daylight through



Long span of concrete shell roof permits spacious, column-free interior, with ceiling 23½ feet high at the center. 21 skylights piercing the thin shell create dramatic light patterns.


They cast it in a single day for the new Mount Clemens Federal Savings and Loan Building. 52 truckloads of ready-mixed concrete placed in one continuous operation form the 96-foot-square roof of this spectacular new building. Four corner columns, flaring out to match the curve of the roof, provide its only support. The building rests on a raised platform faced with attractive precast panels made with white cement and exposed quartz aggregate. The spacious interior is enclosed by walls of aluminum and glass. Circular skylights molded right into the concrete roof admit complete daylight over the entire business floor.

The complete freedom of form possible only with concrete inspires architects everywhere to seek imaginative new designs for buildings of all types and sizes.


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

The property is eight acres of rolling treeless terrain in a rapidly growing residential community in the southeastern perimeter area of the city. It is bounded on two sides by streets which service the site. The three other sides of the property will be rear lot lines of single dwellings of a future residential development.

The program required the development of a Master Plan to accommodate an ultimate congregation of 750 communicants and the design of the First Construction Unit for immediate worship, fellowship, education and administration. The First Construction Unit is to be converted to educational facilities in the future. In three later stages, an Education Unit similar to the initial unit, a Fellowship-Administration-Education Unit and a Sanctuary-Chapel are to be constructed over a period of approximately ten years.

The congregation's desire to place equal emphasis and unity on all phases of the church's activities; worship, study, fellowship and service influenced the grouping of the units around a central landscaped court which serves as the focus and nucleus of the plan. This court is a place where the congregation can meet and mingle prior to, during and after services, plus special outdoor worship and fellowship.

While the Sanctuary and free-standing Celtic cross are located in a dominant position on the site, their forms allow each building expression within the complex. These two elements will be visible from all directions as you approach the site and will be visual symbols in the community. The chevron seating plan is used to give a feeling of unity and oneness to the congregation in worship and to focus attention on the communion table. The choir and its activities are located above the narthex and congregation and facing the communion table also but from the rear of the Sanctuary. The Sanctuary is designed for the entire congregation to worship as one body or group.



Separation of vehicular and pedestrian traffic was accomplished by perimeter parking. Wide walks can accommodate occasional emergency, special and service vehicles. Generous lawns and play areas separate the parking and buildings and give a landscaped transition from car to buildings. Provisions for outdoor recreation and play areas for children and adults were made within the site available for such activities. An active scout program is planned in addition to a weekday kindergarten school for the children of the church and community.

First Construction Unit: The square building plan was developed with worship and fellowship area in the center, ringed by education, administration and service facilities. This plan provides a compact grouping of functions with a minimum of perimeter walls. The central area will be converted into two large interior classrooms in the future, and most of the other classrooms will also be rearranged and circulation rerouted with the use of movable partitions that are to be used in this unit and the future education building. SAPPENFIELD NAMED DEAN

Charles M. Sappenfield, AIA, of Asheville was named recently as Dean of the College of Architecture and Planning at Ball State University, Muncie, Indiana.

Sappenfield will assume the post next year and will accept the first students for the new college in the fall of 1966. The college will begin with an architecture curriculum and will add departments of planning and landscape architecture.

Sappenfield has worked for architectural firms in Charlotte, Chicago, and Asheville and opened his own firm in 1961. He will maintain an architectural office and associates in Asheville.

As designer or architect for Asheville projects, Sappenfield has won a total of 10 state, regional, and national awards for design excellence. His work has been featured in several national magazines and will appear in "House and Garden" in September.

⁻⁻ Sappenfield graduated from North Carolina State College and was a Fulbright scholar in Denmark. He taught architecture for three years at North Carolina State and two years at Clemson University.

Sappenfield is president of the Asheville Art Museum and serves on the board of Memorial Mission Hospital. He is Urban Design Committee Chairman and a member of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Chapter of The American Institute of Architects. He is a member of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture and the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials. During 1964 and 1965 he conducted a series of Ford Foundation seminars on public housing design for the AIA, PHA, and NAHRO.

Sappenfield is married to the former Mary Frances McGowan of Asheville. They will move to Indiana next Spring.



-Dr. Herman Smith of Chicago, Ill., the consultant on the hospital.

-The North Carolina Medical Care Commission, which advised on planning and contributed about \$5.5 million in federal funds.

Harris Named in Who's Who

Harwell Hamilton Harris, recently elevated to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects, has been selected by the editors of WHO's WHO IN THE SOUTH AND SOUTHWEST to receive one of their second Biennial Citations because of his distinguished contribution to the field of architecture. The citation reads as follows: "Imparting his own freshness of spirit to the influence wrought by Frank Lloyd Wright and Richard J. Neutra, Harwell Hamilton Harris has made notable architectural contributions, most conspicuously in the residential field. He has adroitly adapted design to environment, made dramatic use of wood, glass and other materials, emphasized living patterns. Professor Harris is helping American civilization prove itself on a salient testing ground-architectural high-mindedness and imagination."

Mr. Harris is currently a professor at the School of Design, N. C. State University. He will address the annual conference of the Northwest Region of A.I.A. at Glacier Park in August.



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
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Architecture Featured On **Radio Program**

"Time For Margaret," a popular interview program featured on radio station WPTF, Raleigh, each morning at 9:35, will highlight architecture each Friday in a series continuing for six weeks.

The series began on July 9, with an interview with Betty Silver, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Chapter AIA. Mrs. Silver discussed the goals of the AIA as carried out on the State level and gave background information about architectural registration, and a brief history of the AIA Chapter in North Caroline.

On July 16, Cora Rice, wife of practicing architect Richard L. Rice, AIA, and president of the Architects' Auxiliary in Raleigh, discussed architecture from the viewpoint of the architect's wife. She also told of the work of the Auxiliary in Raleigh.

Architecture in general will be discussed on succeeding Fridays by William C. McGee, AIA, practicing architect and principal in the firm of McGee and Scovil, Raleigh; Ralph B. Reeves, Jr., AIA, of the firm of Holloway-Reeves, and President of the Raleigh Council of Architects; James W. Fitzgibbon, AIA, head of the firm, Synergetics, Inc., Raleigh; and Harwell H. Harris, FAIA, professor of architecture at the School of Design, N. C. State University.

General theme for the series will be the architect's role in a "War on Community Ugliness."

Of the seventeen major buildings on the campus of Lenoir Rhyne College, he served as architect for twelve.


Mr. Clemmer is the sixth Lenoir Rhyne alumnus to receive the Distinguished Alumni Award.
