Dear Chapter Member:

The accompanying bill for regular Chapter dues carries provision for a special contribution to implement the work of the Chapter in its enlarged scope for 1945, as approved by the Chapter at the Dec. 13th meeting. The following summary of the 1945 Budget, also as approved by the Chapter at the Dec. 13th meeting, is included for your information:

The balance is not even sufficient to cover expenses normally incurred by committees, such as the cost of printing and distributing reports, charges for incidentals at Chapter meetings, cost of memorial flowers, etc.

In addition to these normal expenses, you have authorized the retaining of a publicist, Mr. J. P. Lohman, to assist in publicizing the work of the Chapter by advising us which activities would have news value, by putting the news in readable form and by placing it at the disposal of newspapers or magazines. \$2500.00 will assure the continuance during 1945 of this service which has already resulted in news of the Chapter having appeared in the public press at the rate of once every two days.

If further funds were available for committee work it would be possible for the Chapter to expand the Oculus and restore the quality of its format, to put on exhibits such as that proposed by the Committee on Fields of Practice, and generally to increase the value of the Chapter to its members, to the public and to the profession. It is estimated that \$2000 is the absolute minimum that should be provided for this purpose.

The total needed is \$4500 or an average of \$10 per member. It is requested that you keep this in mind in determining the amount of your contribution.
