#### Luxury Flats and Offices in a Nash Crescent

A new block of luxury flats and offices will shortly be completed in Park Crescent, W.1—the lovely crescent near Regent's Park, famous for its fine Nash houses. The west side of the crescent was heavily damaged by enemy bombing during the war, and to preserve the character of the crescent the frontage has been rebuilt exactly to the original Nash design.

The block, which has been developed by Portland Estates Ltd., provides over 55,500 square feet of office space. There are also on the site 92 luxury flats of one, two, or three rooms, kitchen and bathroom.

In each bathroom there is an elegantly styled 'Standard' Lowline bath finished with high quality porcelain enamel. The Lowline has three possible tap positions and hand grips are optional. The wash basin is the 'Standard' Kingston mounted on chromium plated legs (although it can be wall hung or fixed on a pedestal) made




from durable vitreous china. The 'Standard' Kingston double trap siphonic low level closet suite, also of vitreous china, completes the sanitary fittings in these bathrooms. 'Standard' equipment has also been used extensively in the luxurious offices. Devonian wash basins, Vitural slab urinals and Sano wash down closet suites all made from vitreous china have been used in the washrooms.

The advantages to the planner of using 'Standard' equipment in offices and domestic dwellings are obvious.

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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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

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NOT QUITE ARCHITECTURE

#### Why So Shy?

The Editors, I suppose, have a pretty shrewd idea of what architects are like. They must know, for example, that we are all either shy or frantically busy (or get petrified when someone puts a pen in our hand and asks us to express ourselves in writing). How else do they explain why so few of their readers ever write them a letter? Architects must get steamed up about architecture sometimes. Why do they so seldom let off steam in the correspondence columns? Is it because they don't often read their Journals?

I must say that for some years I found the AJ unreadable. It was on account of my drawing filing system. Perhaps I should explain.

I am a methodical sort of bloke and like to organise things. I believe, for example, that drawings should be filed, and have done a good deal of research into the problem. Undoubtedly one of the three or four best ways to file drawings is to roll them. A factor which influenced my reaching this conclusion was my wife. She holds strong views on, amongst other things, housekeeping. One of these (the result, no doubt, of spending her formative years in the Outback) is that groceries should be bought in bulk. We don't get just one packet



### St. Anne's College, Oxford

The rebuilding of St. Anne's College, Oxford, to designs by Howell, Killick and Partridge, which were published last week, will be a long-term, phased operation covering perhaps 15 years, while the College authorities raise the cash. The architects propose to rebuild in a series of curved blocks with a highly modelled surface treatment, set in a wide oval round the College garden. Above, the garden front of the first block to be built shortly, adjoining the existing library building (left, behind the cedar). Future block on right and one tall block behind. Below, the entrance, fronting on Banbury Road. The right-hand block, lake, and romantic island with music room will come later. The buildings will be linked by a covered way. of flour, we get a sack of it, not just one bottle of peanut oil, a gallon jar, not just one can of baked beans, a carton. It was the cartons that beat me.

Burning them in the backyard was taking the easy way out. Filling them with garbage and putting them out with the tins was earning me a bad name with the local council. I tried burying them.

Then one day I got it!

What better method of filing drawings than rolling them and standing them on end in an empty baked bean carton? From this fortuitous discovery I proceeded to refine and perfect the system. One problem I came up against was that we were getting through cartons quicker than I made drawings to fill them. You will appreciate that it is generally only by coincidence that I had the right number of rolls of drawings exactly to fill a carton or that I happened to have a size of carton which exactly fitted the number of rolls of drawings I had at any one time. This is the point at which the system would have broken down if I had not made yet another fortuitous discovery. This was that the AJ came to me rolled. You can see what I did, can't you? I filled up the half-empty cartons with wrapped AJs, taking out an AJ as I had a drawing with which to replace it.

If you think I am straying from the point at which I started it is merely to show that I understand that there are probably many reasons why architects who get the AJ do not read it.

Even so, it does not seem to justify the lack of frankness with which architects, through the correspondence pages of their favourite weekly, are prepared to discuss the problems which bedevil their existence and make the practice of the Mother Art seem at times so trying and unrewarding.

What about all these floor screeds that curl. or tiles that lift? What about the efflorescing brickwork? Anyone who reads the BRS Annual Reports or who has occasion to talk to the boffins at the FPRL or any of the trade development associations, for example, will know that architects do have their problems. But how often do they write to their editors about them?

Maybe it's the approach that is wrong. If the AJ wants its readers to take an active interest and actually write their true confessions, it must go out and get them. It needs punch. The human element, you know: "Are You and Your Client Incompatible?" or "Sir Albert Richardson Tells All" or how about a feature on "What Went Into Your Mix?"

Must sell that idea to the Editors.

#### THE NEW RIBA COUNCIL

N Tuesday evening next week, there will be a special meeting of the RIBA to consider the draft revisions to the Institute's bye-laws, the most important feature of which is a completely new structure for the RIBA Council. The proposal is that the main body of membership should now be of two classes, thirty-three nationally elected and twenty-eight regionally elected members. Any member living or working in the regions defined in the byelaws will thus have a second vote, whether or not he is a member of the relevant Allied Society, provided that his name is on the register of the constituency kept up to date by the RIBA. Anyone on the register for the constituency can be nominated for election as a regional member, but with the important proviso that he is serving, or has served, on the Council of the appropriate Allied Society. What the change basically amounts to, therefore, is that the present twenty-four Council members who are Presidents or nominated members of Allied Societies are replaced by twenty-eight members elected by all RIBA members in those areas. This step towards democratisation is welcome, but it leaves the anomaly of those members living and working in London, who will still have only one vote. The other important change in Council membership, rather relevant to this point, is that the AA is no longer to be represented. This is a sad blow; gradually, bit by bit, the AA seems

to be losing its status in the profession. There can surely be a special electoral register on which AA members would be able to enter their names, to use their second vote for an AA representative. It is also a pity that the idea has not been adopted for some form of student membership of the Council, particularly for those who pay annual subscriptions. Some form of non-voting representation at least, should surely be possible. We hope that those who are concerned about the disenfranchisement of the London area, the AA and the students will JIM TANNER speak out at the meeting.



#### LIGHT FANTASTIC

I was interested, last week, to hear Dr. Harper-chairman of the drafting committee for the new IES Code -explaining its reshaping with demonstrations and film strip. But I was staggered to hear him say that this Code, which includes a general and marked rise in the recommended levels of illumination for artificial lighting. has received the official blessing of the BRS, and was intended as a standard for general recognition. If Dr. Harper is right it is surely a dangerous precedent for BRS to recognise a Code put out by a sectional interest rather than by BSI, who could have approached such interests as the architectural profession and building users. Just to make things more irritating, the Code (described in last week's AJ) is not A4 size.

#### NOT-SO-DAINTY TEES

A Teesdale reservoir has been built at Balderhead because it would have interfered with the growing of gentians at a more appropriate site. So said Alderman C. W. Allison, chairman of the local Water Board, when he opened the reservoir the other day—and he said it with some indignation. E. M. (pro-gentian) Nicholson hit back at the water boys, on behalf of the Nature Conservancy, by saying it was time the country trained scientists and

economists to produce a long-term budget of water supply and demand based on scientific data. We needed, he said, a national scheme which would tell us where we ought to place our water-demanding industries. This sounds good sense: apparently Teesmouth suffers from having two of the country's greatest water-consuming set-ups in one of the driest areas in the country.

#### LOOK, NO HANDCRAFT

"Daisy" is back after 97 years. "Willow Boughs" is back, too, not to mention "Christchurch," which looks to me like water crowfoot. These three wallpaper designs are being machine-printed by Sandersons as part of the Morris & Co. centenary celebrations (see my note last week). The price will be 15s. a roll plus purchase tax, and it will be interesting to compare them with the block-printed versions still in regular use.

#### KNOCKABOUT

It was certain that sooner or later we should get a Lady Chatterley sketch in a West End revue. But I never guessed it would turn up next to one about architecture. It seems that the scriptwriters of On The Brighter Side are anxious to make fun of unhappy storeys-so the show which opened last week hits mildly at the South Bank Shell shock as well as at Penguins. Quite a jolly song we had-by a demolition crew who were itching to get at something really big like St. Pauls. A cynical song, too. To hear it you would think the author (Alec Grahame) suspects that high office blocks are put up to satisfy the greed of speculator. The title, by the way, is "The House That Jack's Building." All madly up to date, and even theatre audiences seem to have noticed architecture now that its going up as well as sideways.

#### ALL BURNED UP

Just in case you didn't give enough anger to the recent demolition and conflagration of Rushbrooke Hall let me remind you, as a *Times* letter reminded readers the other day, that it was one of the great Tudor Houses of East Anglia and comparable to Long Melford Hall and Kentwell—and that although its structure was sound in 1951, it was in a serious state of deterioration by 1953, when the Historic

Buildings and Ancient Monuments' Act was passed. "One cannot blame owners," said a letter to *The Times*, "but there does seem a serious gap in our legislation which prevents them from demolishing their property until it becomes ruinous, but which gives no power to insist on even minimum maintenance, the lack of which can be equally destructive."

Like the writers (Lord Euston, James Mann, J. N. L. Myres and Ian A. Richmond) I hope that "such a disaster will never be repeated" and am surprised that no use could have been found for this hall, as it has been for so many others. Incidentally, isn't it odd that tourist-conscious Britain builds hotels "as modern as the morning milk" in London and yet ignores the appeal of lodging guests where Queen Elizabeth slept? Can't the preservation societies seek out and bully some suitable tycoons?

#### NOUS AUSSI?

If Sydney's Opera House looks like a sailing ship, Melbourne's projected arts centre (see opposite) is more like a rocket-launching site-at least to someone who has never seen such a thing. It started as a new home for the splendidly-endowed National Gallery of Victoria whose director has been consulted by architect Roy Grounds on a scheme which also includes an art school, three theatres (beneath the spire) a restaurant and assembly rooms (in it), offices and an underground car park. The whole thing will be surrounded by a "Pool of Reflection." Me, I'm just reflecting on our National Theatre fiasco.

If you want to see what is happening where the National Theatre won't be built after all, you may like to know that the LCC is taking its exhibition of the South Bank development to the Tea Centre in Regent Street on Monday next (2 p.m.) where it will remain until Saturday May 6 (1 p.m.).

But why do I write "won't be built after all" in that defeated way? Did not all contestants in the LCC election promise to build the theatre? A nasty exhibition of cynicism this—quite unintentional.

#### IUA FILM SHOW

The secretary of the RIBA Film Sub-Committee wants to be told about any film which is related to the IUA Congress theme of "New Materials and techniques: their influence on architecture." It is intended to show technical films in the National Film Theatre during the Congress and each nation has been invited to submit one.

#### SUNDAY BREAK FOR ARCHITECTS

Committee architecture, I hear, is going to get a boost from Denys Lasdun in next Sunday's "Monitor" programme on BBC television. I look forward to this even more than usual after all the things that have been said by me, Banham and others in the AJ recently. Let us hope our spokesman takes just enough of that thoughtfully-provided studio refreshment to forget our gimletty eyes without forgetting himself and betraying the secrets of the profession.

#### £3,000 AWARD



Applications for the £3,000 Fellowship should be submitted as soon as possible; and in any event not later than April 30. Here is a great opportunity for those who can grasp it.



#### Two Tiers

SIR: I have been reading with interest the spate of articles and letters on the subject of Education and the Two Tier Profession and would like to make the following points:—

The Memorandum on Technical Assistants should be given far greater thought by its authors than it appears to have received. It is a document which has all the appearance of being the minutes of a cosy chat over a glass of beer between a few principals. It seems to have the interests of a section of the profession in mind and not the interests of architecture as a whole. To begin with it seeks to provide a two level entry to the profession with a lower and much inferior standard of education for those not considered good enough to provide "potential officer material." Its authors then appear to have had a twinge of conscience by deciding to leave the door to qualification "narrowly open" to the exceptional man among the ranks of technical assistants.

Would the authors of the Memorandum please say why entrants to the profession should be sorted into sheep and goats as soon as they finish their general education? Why not set one standard for all entrants and leave each individual to work out his own salvation thereafter in whatever way he pleases?

Secondly the technical assistant is to receive his training in an office with time off for day release or evening classes. Are the authors of this Memorandum satisfied that sufficient schools or colleges exist within easy reach of all? Even in England I doubt whether such facilities are generally available within easy reach. They are certainly not in the Highlands north of Perth or Aberdeen, with the sole exception of Inverness.

Thirdly it is suggested that a modified RIBA Intermediate Examination is suitable

as a qualification for technical assistants. No indication is given of the modifications considered suitable. May the Memorandum's authors be asked why the Inter.RIBA should not be left untouched? If any official recognition for passing this examination is needed then the RIBA could surely award a certificate. If a student then wished to remain at this stage for the rest of his life it would be his own affair.

Fourthly the Memorandum suggests a lower standard of general education for technical assistants. This is surely wrong. If a technical assistant should be as skilled in technical matters as we are all led to believe then he ought to have as good a mental capacity as the man who is chosen as suitable for qualification. What is needed in my opinion is the same standard for all entrants to the profession with an emphasis on high standards of attainment in certain subjects of direct use to architects and assistants.

Turning now to the leader in your issue of March 9, the suggestion of a second skill sounds very attractive at first reading. If, however, this is intended to mean knowledge of an allied building subject at professional level then I feel it needs further consideration. If an architect wished to confirm his second skill in the obvious way by seeking membership of the appropriate professional body he may find himself in some difficulty. I understand that at least one allied professional body insists on potential members normally having worked in the office of one of its qualified members during training. If an architect or technical assistant is prevented from gaining diplomas for his second skill then his status therein could only be reckoned as "amateur" and may, in the last resort, be only of dubious value. Also after having qualified as architects. just how many could be expected to pursue a second course of study?

Finally it may prove a man's "second skill" to be so useful that his original profession would become overlooked. Would we then hear the cry that architects are not being used to the best advantage? It might be better to employ a tame expert in the office and leave the architects to their primary function.

The editorial in your issue of March 9, suggesting that the job architect be given responsibility for his work in the widest sense would, if carried to its ultimate conclusion, reduce any architect's office or department to a loose federation of small groups of individuals. One solution might be to admit all qualified architects in a private office to the status of partners. Just how that would work out is anybody's guess.

As for a public office the idea of a multitude of chief officers would be laughed out of existence by the councillors. It should be obvious that in any organisation somebody must be the boss and if this point is granted then he must be the one to "carry the can" and also the one to give the orders in the last resort.

On the subject of entry into the profession and subsequent training may I offer the following suggestions:—

(a) A uniform standard of general education for all entrants with emphasis on a high level of attainment in subjects of direct value in later training, such as Maths, Physics, Chemistry, Art and English.

(b) Standards of professional attainment to be fixed from time to time by the RIBA only, these standards to be kept under constant review to suit changing conditions.

(c) All entry to the RIBA and the Register of Architects to be via the Institute's examinations only.

(d) In order to achieve a higher standard of professional ability, and therefore to weed out all unsuitable candidates, those entrants having full time instruction be expected to pass the examinations at one sitting. All other entrants be given two chances.

(e) In order to ensure adequate practical experience all full time school entrants having passed the RIBA final examination be expected to spend five years in an office before election as ARIBA. All other candidates to spend two years in an office after passing the examination and before election.

As a matter of principle no professional body ought to divide its potential members into rigid classes. The organisation should, in my view, lay down its requirements and leave it to the individual to develop his talents as and where he likes. Only by so doing can each individual find his appropriate niche in the profession.

Just one last question. Why should it be considered beneath the dignity of a qualified architect (however newly fledged) to work under the direction of one of his qualified brethren?

#### Tin Mine at Zennor

SIR: Mr. Kirkbride's letter shows why we are always so confused in matters of preservation. The choice is simple. Industry or a beauty spot. In the matter of Zennor we are thinking in terms of centuries perhaps, not decades.

Unemployment in many mining areas is also above the national average (which isn't high) and has been much higher, but is this permanent? Incidentally it doesn't prevent skilled foreign labour being needed in the mines. Many consider bullfighting demoralising. The Mormons considered mining demoralising; the morality of tour-ism is quite irrelevant. There is nothing absolute about mining, mines are liable to be worked out. Zennor may have been a thriving mining town, so was Virginia City, Ostia was a great port, Epidauros a great medical centre, what of it? It is just because ore deposits are not confined to "the less beautiful parts" that we must decide sometimes between beauty and hard cash. If they were all in the black country it would be easier. If there were not technical reasons for selecting Carnelloe the choice would be sheer criminal folly. Kirkbride should look more closely at Malaya. It is true that many of the present mines are being worked out

but there are vast untouched deposits. Malayan tin production is kept down by international quota agreement, not shortage of ore. Tin prices may be high now but why should they always remain so? They haven't in the past. All this is ephemeral and irrelevant.

The real choice is between industry and amenity. I am an unrepentant conservationist because I believe Zennor is of greater value than a few hundred tons of tin. Can anyone really believe that the situation would be more than slightly alleviated by "good architecture"? Sunila is a bulky sprawling factory; a little better perhaps (I suspect mainly to architects) than many other factories and just fine-at Sunila. Schinkel designed a palace on the Acropolis. It was very elegant but would have been a disaster-in Athens. All the roadscape, wirescape (God help us!) in the world and all the beknighted architects in the Kingdom, even if given their collective head, cannot alter the fact that industry is industry is industry (apologies to Miss Stein).

In truth we all know that the economics of mining and the demands of social planning (i.e., space between buildings, road widths, etc.) would result in just another spoilt beauty spot. Kirkbride cannot fob us off with panaceas about visual control. We must choose, now and again, between beauty and coin-not absolutely but in each case on merit. Why not opt out of the 20th century once in a while? It makes the 20th century worth living in. We do it when we go to Salisbury or Delphi, the National Gallery or the theatre. Why should it always be left to foreigners to do the preserving for our pleasure?

#### Running a Job

SIR: Criticism is more vociferous than praise and, to vary the pattern, this is to voice admiration for the idea of publishing Mr. Green's serialised handbook on how to run a job. This may hail from an unexpected quarter, a sculptor, for whom the architect is often the client.

Recently, the Council of the Royal Society of British Sculptors launched a sub-committee to study this very problem as it applies to sculptors and subsequently compile a pamphlet on administration and business methods. This is something we were never taught at schools and the price of acquiring the rudiments of businessmanship is meandering, misunderstanding, frustration and besides the loss of time and energy often a loss of part of one's fees. Yet, the clerical function of a sculptor is likely to become more frequent.

Your buildings, due to the economics of production and style and reasons well known to yourselves, are looking increasingly standardised, universal and devoid of the human touch and an antidote may well come from the signs of a new symbiosis between architecture and sculpture, in other words from co-operation between an unbusinesslike sculptor and relatively well-organised and punotilious architects, contractors, committees, councils and corporations.

The RSBS hopes that its pamphlet will be of huge importance to sculptors and we shall closely watch your instalments for analogies which would help us,

#### Accessibility and Escalators

STR: Most people will probably agree with Mr. Blachnicki's statement that the pedestrian deserves a better fate than . . . etc. (AJ. March 9), and the writer cannot but regret that town planning projects and proposals of the kind of Barbican are never examined in the light of accessibility.

To take an example. If you suggest the installation of escalators you are told immediately: they are too expensive. It is just a pity not to ask the question what is accessible, what is inaccessible, what is more accessible and what is less and why? There is barely room to touch upon the subject here. The writer hopes to have shortly a 250-page treatise on accessibility published which, by the way, does not mention escalators. They might be costly, but they are the only means of making the pedestrian level almost as accessible as level +44 of Barbican. Does anybody realise that we are pitting here the muscle power of the pedestrian leg against the horse power of the engines?

We are employing many thousand horse power in the buses of Route Eleven (to say nothing of the Tubes), to establish a high accessibility of the lower levels (level + 44). Is anyone aware that without escalators we are keeping the pedestrian levels inaccessible?

# Traffic Segregation Scheme for City Council

This is the plan that edged Major Gagarin's little trip out of the headlines in the local papers last Wednesday. "On the day of man's supreme achievement," said the Newcastle Evening Chronicle, "comes news of the Space Age city." The plan does in fact provide the opportunity for showing that twentieth-century traffic flow and a magnificent medieval and early Victorian city can be harmonised. Whether that opportunity is realised depends, of course, on the architecture: all that we have here is a plan, made clear in the illustration below. But the remarkable thing is that this plan by Newcastle's planning officer, Wilfred

by Newcastle's planning officer, Wilfred Burns, in consultation with other departments of the Corporation, does not scupper the city's chances from the start, as many plans do (for example, on a rough estimate, almost any self-respecting inner ring road can be guaranteed to remove about 25 per cent of a town's good buildings). In what

must be one of the most difficult of cities, a complete system of urban motor roads has been fitted in, with only one intersection to worry about seriously.

Newcastle has the unenviable distinction that the Great North Road is its main shopping street. To deal with this two north-south roads would be built needing a new bridge over the Tyne (Redheugh) on the site of an existing one. These roads will be for motors only without any buildings fronting them, and will pass through hardly any areas that are not already derelict or decaying—a paradoxical reward for a good many years of lethargic administration.

Linking these two are a pair of east-west motor roads: the upper one will be underground, with one of the main new shopping areas above it: the lower will run about half way down the steep slope to the river which makes Newcastle such an exciting place. This seems a terrifying idea until one walks round the proposed route and sees that it is not only possible but, if well done, could add to the Newcastle riverside tremendously, by providing another element in the fantastic game of leapfrog that roads, railways and chases play on the Tyne slopes. The one point which will have to be watched is the intersection with

Sandhill, a street still in good condition (most of the riverside is like a Piranesi drawing—and contains some very good buildings). This is going to be a tricky job and it would be worth spending a lot of money to make sure that the road goes exactly where it ought.


Inside the motor road ring, pedestrian precincts, a few local roads, flats above new shopping centres, while the set piece streets and buildings are retained, the whole area around the Grey Monument is proposed as a pedestrian area, keeping the existing buildings and streets but creating a magnificent piazza.

The chance of fulfilment of the scheme will depend first on the successful acquisition of land at the city centre, or wholehearted co-operation by those wishing to develop it; then it is up to the architects, who, on the strength of this report, should have a free hand unhampered by too many pettifogging stipulations about sight lines, setbacks, and so forth.

The city and its officials evidently want an exciting new component added which will match the fifteenth-century and nineteenth-century parts of Newcastle, and make it work today: it is up to our profession to see that they get it.

#### **OBITUARY**

#### Professor Frederic Lasserre

Frederic Lasserre, who was killed on April 6 while climbing in the Lake District, was Professor and Director of the School of Architecture at the University of British Columbia, and was an authority on timber construction, on which he had done considerable research and lecturing. He visited Britain in 1955 at the invitation of the British Columbia Lumber Manufacturers Association to give a series of lectures on timber frame housing.

Professor Lasserre was only 50. He was born in Geneva and went to Canada in 1921. After graduating from Toronto University he returned to Switzerland to complete his studies and then worked as an architect in England from 1936 to 1940. He was a co-designer of the Mars Group exhibit of 1938 and a prizewinner in one of the pre-war housing competitions

organised by the Timber Development Association. During the war he served at Canadian naval HQ as a senior architect in charge of a number of projects.

At the time of his death Frederic Lasserre was in England on a year's leave. The accident occurred at Pavey Ark in the Langdale Valley near Ambleside, when he fell 300 feet down a sheer precipice. He leaves a widow, a son and a daughter.

#### HOUSING CENTRE

#### London's Housing and the Royal Commission

Sir John Wrigley, member of the Royal Commission on Greater London (and one time deputy secretary of MOHLG), gave a talk at the Housing Centre on April 11th on how the proposals of the Royal Commission would affect London's housing problems.

After skimming through the Royal Commission's brief, to examine each function of local government in Greater London, discover defects, consider how far these were due to the machinery itself and made recommendations for improvement, Sir John concentrated upon how housing—the most pressing social problem in the area—would be dealt with under the proposed reconstruction.

He explained that it was considered that all functions and services " of a personal nature, involving careful casework " should become the responsibility of the new boroughs, enlarged by amalgamations to be the size of county boroughs. Only those services requiring consideration of the area as a whole—Intelligence Department, revision of the Greater London Plan, and traffic and main roads—would be the responsibility of the Greater London Authority.

Outside London, the boroughs and not the county authorities were responsible for housing: Sir John maintained that the same system should now be adopted for London itself, because "historical reasons here have ceased to be operative." However, Greater London could not be dealt with entirely in that way, first because of shortage of land

and the need to plan concurrent movement of population and industry; second because of the great differences in availability of land between different boroughs. The New Towns and Town Development Act to enable overspill to be planned were designed to deal with this.

"Nobody can have worked harder than the LCC to bring such schemes about," said Sir John, "and with considerable success. Through no fault of their own they were responsible for only part of the area." A Greater London authority must be responsible for such large-scale operations.

When questions came they were largely concentrated round the problem of whether and how the prosperous, low density boroughs on the periphery of Greater London could be persuaded willingly to accept higher density to accommodate people from the overcrowded inner boroughs. To all these questions Sir John's reply was that there must be "mutual arrangements between those rich in land and those poor in land," but that finally, "if the boroughs don't play the game" it would for the Greater London authority to determine densities, under the Development Plant, and it might be necessary to have right of appeal to the Minister. He hoped Londoners would learn to "give and take."

The problem of depending on "mutual arrangements" however was clearly and unintentionally demonstrated at the end when the last question came from a lady from "an outer borough" who asked, "Why should we have these people? It sounds rather like dictatorship to me."

#### Nurse for Hospital Planning

The Ministry of Health has appointed Mrs. Jean Heyward, S.R.N., R.M.N., as a part-time temporary nursing officer to help on hospital planning and equipment. Mrs. Heyward was the nurse member of the Division of Architectural Studies of the Nuffield Foundation, and was closely associated with the planning, construction and use of experimental hospital units in Scotland and Belfast.

#### International Study Group

An International Study Group on the design and construction of penal and correctional institutions is to be held at the Architectural Association immediately after the IUA Congress in London, from July 10 to 14.

An exhibition is to be staged in conjunction with the study group to illustrate recently-completed institutions and future projects from the countries represented and a small section of this exhibition will be devoted to designs and projects prepared unofficially by private architects and students

#### ST. ANNE'S COLLEGE

#### A Phased Rebuilding Plan

St. Anne's College, Oxford's youngest and largest women's college, last week published its plans for the complete rebuilding of its residential accommodation in the course of the next few years, to a phased plan designed by W. G. Howell, H. A. W. Killick and J. A. Partridge. The College is to build on its present site, near the confluence of the Woodstock and Banbury Road, and the time taken will depend upon the response to the Appeal which is to be launched shortly. The first phase, however, is to start immediately, paid for by the gift of £80,000 from the Isaac Wolfson Foundation.

This is to be used to replace the first of the large Victorian houses on the site, in which 18 students and staff are accommodated at present, with a block of 45 study-bedrooms, two Fellows' flats, and two common rooms, thereby solving the decanting problem which will face the college throughout the rebuilding.

Two existing buildings will remain: the pre-war building by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott. which contains the library, common rooms and administration, rectangular, baronial and battlemented in a rather vellow stone already acquiring a period look, and the post-war dining hall by Gerald Banks. The architects aim to respect these buildings without imitating them by adopting a similar height and scale for their buildings, apart from one tall block of study bedrooms at a later stage of the scheme. Because of the unknown, and in any case long-drawn-out, time schedule necessary, it is planned to build each new stage as a separate block, so that each will be complete in itself, setting the blocks in an oval curve, to enclose most of the college gardens, and linking them together with a covered way, "like beads on a necklace"or a modern version of the cloister.

The fact that rebuilding may take 15 years has created problems, since it precludes any design which would commit the College years in advance to a rigid scheme which might be outdated by changing requirements or building techniques. The plan is therefore only an outline development plan, which has the approval of the RFAC and Oxford City Council, and future blocks can be modified at each stage of the work. The architects are using this fact positively, to treat St. Anne's as what they call "a miniature development programme," conducting stage by stage research into the needs of the undergraduates and feeding back the results in modification and improvement block by block, and a mock-up study bedroom is now being built in the grounds. where experiments in lighting, furniture arrangement, colour schemes, storage facilities, e.g. the problem of concealing fitted washbasins, will be made, and consumer reactions collected.

#### The Wolfson Block

Building of this block is to start this year, and will provide 45 study-bedrooms. two

flats for Fellows, and a large and small common room, which members of the College can borrow for parties-a necessary feature, since the studies are really too small for entertaining. These will be on three floors, grouped round a circular staircase, and the block will repeat the oval shape of the whole scheme.

The architects claim that this block shape solves the old problem of staircase or corridor approach, neither of which they consider satisfactory, since the staircase does not allow enough rooms to be grouped round it, and bathrooms are a problem, while the long corridor has a horribly institutional look. Here 14 rooms on each floor, with bathrooms, lavatories, showers, two kitchenettes, a laundry and a trunk store forming the central core, will be linked to the sweeping staircase by short, curved corridors. The curve of the building means that the side walls of each room will be slightly splayed, but the amount is so small that it is expected to be imperceptible within, and will not make furnishing difficult.

The architects plan to give the exterior of these buildings a highly modelled surface by the use of precast concrete units, which they claim will be in keeping with many of Oxford's buildings (and incidentally with the taste of this particular group of architects). with the idea of avoiding the "barrackblock feeling" of a wall of masonry pierced by little windows. Each study-bedroom will have a balcony made of one large pre-cast element and the building will be faced with pre-cast concrete units, from whose surfaces the cement has been removed to give a rougher and more congenial surface.

The building will overlook the fine existing lawn where a splendid cedar and copper beech will be retained, and on the other side. Howell, Killick & Partridge plan for a sizeable lake, filling the distance from the building to the Banbury Road boundary wall, with an island in it on which is to be sited a music room. Which suggests that swimming is to be added to climbing as an accomplishment of all spirited undergraduates.





# Registration of Association of Official Architects

The A.O.A., which was founded in 1958 to represent the interests of architects in local government and public services, has achieved success in two of its prime aims: the setting up of a new Grading Sub-Committee for the professions in the Local Government Salary and Services Negotiating Machinery, on which the Association is represented; and the certification of the Association as a trade union by the Registrar of Friendly Societies.

In its latest newsletter to members, the A.O.A. records its opinion that "the present shortages of architects in local government arise from (a) the failure of employing authorities to differentiate between the professional and administrative officer, (b) the inadequate salary level, and (c) the multiplicity of grades."

"The architect's problems, his general and higher education and general day to day interests, as well as responsibilities, are basically different from his administrative colleagues, yet none of these are taken into account to differentiate between them in conditions of service."

The A.O.A. demands separate negotiations for the professional officer and points out that "the recent award of the industrial court of salary increases in the hospital boards and . . . for the Civil Service are the most recent independent assessment of appropriate salary levels for architects in public employment."

While today there are 12 grades below the level of deputy chief officer in which architects may be placed—which leads to "the trek from authority to authority to achieve promotion"—the A.O.A. proposes only two grades for architects, a main grade to include all qualified architects, with a scale of £1.000 to £1,750 p.a., and a grade called principal architect, on two scales because of the varying size of local authorities: from £1,950 to £2,250 p.a., and from £2,250 to £2,500 p.a.

The election of regional members to the General Council is going on this month and the Annual General Meeting is to be held on May 13.

#### Fourth International Furniture Competition

For the fourth time since 1955 the Italian Ministry of Foreign Commerce at Cantu, the centre of the Italian furniture trade, is organising an international competition in furniture design, and this year for the first time an Englishman, Sir Gordon Russell, has been invited to serve as one of the judges, along with Professor Arne Jacobsen, Ignazio Gardella, Carlo de Carli and Professor Norberto Marchi.

The Selection Committee at Cantu, in inviting architects, designers and technicians to take part in the 1961 competition, points out in a Press statement that Cantu "produces furniture mainly by home industry" and therefore designs submitted for consideration should be for craftsman-built, not mass-produced, furniture.

The value of the prizes for selected designs is 12 million lire, and by a modification of previous rules of the competition, prizewinning designers may stay in Cantu to supervise the production of their designs. 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## Boston Hospital Competition

As we announced last week, the second stage of the competition for a new general hospital at Boston, Lincs., organised by the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board (Regional Architect E. F. Wilson), has been won by Design Partnership, who will receive the first premium of £2,000. The partners concerned were G. Grenfell Baines and John Wilkinson, in association with Brian G. Cobb. The remaining five finalists, who each receive a premium of £500, were Charles B. Pearson, Son & Partners, V. J. Sames, John R. B. Green, Charles H. Hyde and Clifford Kingstone. The assessor for the second stage. S. E. T. Cusdin, OBE, FRIBA, who replaced John Murray Easton for medical reasons, highly commended the entry by Charles B. Pearson, Son & Partners. This week the drawings are on show at Fydell House, South End, Boston, and they will be displayed at the RIBA from April 26 to May 13. The assessor's report has not been published at time of going to press.

Curiously enough, this country is now in the early stages of a large and longoverdue programme of hospital building at the very moment when the concept of the general hospital as a building type is undergoing a quite rapid change. This is in part due to the fact that it has only been possible in the last few years to test out on any scale the results of post-war research by such voluntary bodies as the Nuffield Trust and the King Edward VII Hospital Fund. At the same time, it is only much more recently that MOH have been able to start publishing recommendations to the architect in the form of Building Bulletins and Building Notes. More important, perhaps, from the architect's point of view, is the fact that a much clearer idea is beginning to emerge from the Health Service as to what the main features of a general hospital should be, not just now, but in 20 to 50 years' time. These are general concepts which can shape and determine the planning of a complex of vast, widely varying, and often conflicting requirements. Not that they have yet been very clearly or concisely stated, largely because research so far has concentrated mainly upon various sectors of the building, such as the operating theatre, the ward or the technique of central sterilisation, and has not thrown up into clear relief the issues which can tend to shape and make comprehensible the building as a whole.


Most important of these ideas is the concept that the general hospital should provide a balanced service to the community, treating the mentally as well as the physically ill, the chronic sick as well as those who will stay for only a very short period in hospital, and providing a much increased volume of outpatient treatment so that it can do more to augment the work of the general practitioner. At the same time by the use of new techniques, a far higher proportion of patients can now be treated in the outpatient department rather than occupy hospital beds.


This implies a building which is designed much more closely for the patients, rather than a mere place for medical treatment, a building which by its very design and layout is readily approachable and somewhat domestic in character. This is echoed in the more enlightened approach of some of the hospitals in this country, a recognition that there is a distinct advantage if the environment of the patients resembles as closely as possible their homes, so that there is not an excessive change between the two. The way in which the stream of visitors is handled is also important, that their impression too should be of a friendly. small-scale building.

This implies the disappearance of such things as vast, imposing tall blocks, cramped entrance halls, and the endless and incomprehensible maze of corridors.

This same concept also gives a broad indication as to the broad pattern of the planning, as two main areas for patients, the wards and the out-patient department, serviced by such ancillaries as X-ray, clinical laboratories, operating theatres and administration, which should all be readily accessible to both sectors. The remaining ancillaries such as kitchens, boiler house and stores have to be related to vehicle access, but it is obviously an advantage if they too can be readily accessible to the rest of the hospital.

A second concept emerging from the experience of the health service is that the






Winning Scheme by Design Partnership







Block plan above; sketch of typical "haspital street" left; ground floor plan, opposite page








East and south elevation of hospital, and (bottom) south elevation of residential blocks

Detail of typical ward planning (above), scale 25 feet to one inch, and (below) typical elevation and structure, scale 8 feet to one inch






#### Highly Commended Scheme by Charles B. Pearson, Son & Partners



Block plan, above, and ground floor plan of hospital, below




Site layout, below, and east elevation, above. This design has a series of five storey tower blocks for the wards, and an underground car park below the out-patients department





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

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## THE INDUSTRY

This week Brian Grant describes window walling, sash windows, sink units and a carport.

Window Walling and Cladding

A new publication from Morris Singer deals with Holoform window walling and continues to stress the advantages of using materials possessing similar coefficients of expansion so as to improve weathertightness. Their choice falls on steel and bronze, which have the same coefficient and which are also very strongly resistant to atmospheric corrosion. Standardised walling units have been evolved which are made in sizes up to 12 ft. high and 5 ft. wide. The side members are made to interlock and form a box mullion, the vertical joint between the units incorporating a labyrinth gasket filled at the front with a sealer. The framework is faced with pressed stainless steel conforming to the mild steel profile, and at the top of each half mullion is welded a stainless sleeve over which the half mullion off the unit above is secured. Opening lights for single or double glazing are made from mild steel universal sections or from bronze extrusions. The booklet contains a number of interesting drawings showing the arrangement of a number of recently executed jobs, including the new Vickers offices in Millbank. (The Morris Singer Co. Ltd., Forest Road, Walthamstow, London, E.17.)

#### Sash Windows

An entirely new double hung sash window operated by concealed gears has recently been introduced by Hills Glazing in conjunction with Geared Sashes Ltd. The window is in extruded aluminium with thin jamb and sill sections and is designed to accommodate double glazing if required. Both sashes of the window are operated independently by a single handle in the

centre of the sill, and no counterbalances are used. The necessary gearing is entirely concealed and will lift weights of up to 150 lb. per sash in overall window sizes up to 10 ft. by 5 ft. 3 in. The design also incorporates a new method of pressure glazing in neoprene channels not previously applied to double glazing units in this country. The illustration shows a geared sash window 8 ft. by 5 ft. 3 in. containing two 120-lb. sashes with Glaseal double units in ½-in. plate glass with ½-in. air space. (Geared Sashes Ltd., Chester Street, Birmingham 6.)

#### Sink Unit

The illustration on the right shows a new Easiclene sink type 42/18T, which is based on a 54 in. sink top with offset tap holes. This version gives an exceptionally large bowl to which taps can be fitted without loss of space. The drainer and surround are mirror polished and the bowl is in satin finish. Price for the complete unit is £26 10s., or the sink top only is £14 10s. (Easiclene Porcelain Enamel (1938) Ltd., Lord Street, Chapel Ash, Wolverhampton.)





The cover sheeting is Unilux resin-bonded glass fibre without horizontal joints, and is available in a range of colours. Since the design is sectional any length of parking space can be provided. and spans can be erected back to back on a common concrete base if required. There are also other obvious uses, such as open air exhibition stands or hangar type buildings with sheeted ends. Fascias can be supplied as name boards or to carry concealed lighting, and the manufacturers will erect the structures anywhere in the country. #### 7.81 practice TECHNIQUE OF ARCHITECTURE

Wendepunkt im Bauen by Konrad Wachs-

This, the first book of a projected series. introduces Wachsmann's thoughts on the industrialisation of building.

Involved, as we are, in an apparatus of inconceivable complexity, with a tremendous momentum of change, we shall be compelled to abandon traditional techniques and the thought processes appropriate to them. The situation demands not merely acceptance. but complete exploitation of the new techniques available to us.

There has, as yet, been only a romantically superficial realisation of the machine's potential. Complete mastery of its disciplines and an honest acceptance of its logic will engender a new aesthetic.

This suggests, as Gropius foresaw, the emergence of a new kind of artist-technician operating within a team.

Wachsmann deals authoritatively with the problems of training, drawing upon his extensive experience in various schools, and describes a number of team studies. He believes that if the members of the team are working together within the discipline imposed by technology, a harmony automatically takes place, since the question of conflicting caprice does not arise.

Technical Information must be readily available. Wachsmann proposes an information centre forming part of a research institute covering all fields of human activity. All information abstracted by research in any one department could then be easily coordinated with the information gained in other departments.



#### 9.69 design: general INTERIOR DESIGN

Interior Design. By Harry and Lilian Stephenson. Published by Studio Books (Longacre Press Ltd.). Price 35s. Students and designers in search of a guide

to the use of materials and approach to interior design, will find this book interesting. The section that covers exercises carried out at the Kingston School of Art and the fairly extensive information on structural and decorative finishes, textural materials and fabrics is well presented. However, the second half of the book which aims to cover furniture accessories (including cushions, pictures, sculpture, and plants), heating, lighting and national influences is sketchy and should be approached with caution. It avoids presenting formula "clichés," but at same time, after the authoritative first section, these later chapters could be misleading. It is disappointing to see no reference to the problem of renovation where the aspect of extracting existing architectural character is important. In fact, most of the illustrations are architects' interiors incorporated in new buildings. Nevertheless, the "case study" is well

set out and the book has a freshness and orderly quality that are pleasing.

Factory Building Studies 9. Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, Building Research Station. Fire Protection in Factory Buildings. By C. J. Langdon-Thomas, A.A.Dipl., A.R.I.B.A. HMSO 1960. Price 3s. 6d.

Until recently legislation and knowledge on this subject have grown piecemeal rather than systematically. This is reflected in the way legal requirements and recommendations are scattered among many Acts of Parliament, byelaws, Codes of Practice, British Standards and technical literature. Mr. Langdon-Thomas brings these independent developments together in a comprehensive guide and introduction to fire protection in factory buildings. He considers the principles involved and clearly shows the extent of the existing regulations and byelaws and draws attention to important aspects that are not covered.

The report deals with internal and external fire hazard. Materials and processes presenting "abnormal" fire risk are listed. The properties of materials and structures in relation to fire and high temperatures are considered including various methods of protecting structural steelwork. It deals with precautions to prevent fire starting or spreading, means of escape, planning for fire fighting, ventilation for processes liable to give rise to flammable dust or vapours and light relief panels required in the case of materials carrying an "explosion hazard." The present inadequacy of legislation concerning single-storey factories is particularly brought out, and suggestions are put forward to control the lateral flow of smoke and hot gas when divisions are not possible. In respect to the maximum cubic capacity for sections of multi-storey factories, it recommends adherence to the Fire Grading

Report as opposed to the Model Byelaws. It draws attention to certain cost considerations of fire protection, for instance, the balance of protection of steel against maintenance, sprinkler installation against the resulting reduction in insurance premiums. There are eight appendices covering technical points of interest, and a list of essential and relevant publications.

#### STEELWORK DESIGN

Steel Designers Manual. Crosby Lockwood & Son Ltd. 50s.

This designer's handbook was reviewed in the Journal in 1955 when it was suggested that it was a valuable addition to libraries at a price of only 50s. There have been in all five impressions and now with the revision of B.S.449 a second edition has been published, still at 50s.

The first half of the manual is devoted as previously to beam theory, frame analysis, etc., and consequently there are only two or three pages of revision in the first 500 pages. Thereafter there is major revision to deal with the new approach laid down in B.S.449.

B.S.4.B deals with standard section properties and has also been added since the early edition. The relevant properties of the new and old sections are given and the plastic modulus of beams and channels is included. Castella sections have also extended their range

A new standard for cold rolled sections B.S.2994 has been issued and extracts have been included. Ranges of steel piles have been extended over the last five years and these are also dealt with.

The book foreword claims that it is the only comprehensive work to present in one volume all data, formulæ, tables, diagrams and explanatory text for the design of steel framed buildings. This claim is in no way immodest.

P.V.C. (Vinyl) Asbestos Floor Tiles, British Standard 3260: 1960. Published by the British Standards Institution. Price 4s. 6d. This British Standard prepared under the authority of the Plastics Industry Standards Committee specifies the requirements for smooth surfaced homogeneous p.v.c. (vinyl) asbestos floor tiles. It covers the quality of the materials, colour and finish, colour fastness to daylight, dimensions, qualities of resistance. The appendices give methods of testing dimensional stability, volatile content, curling, indentation, deflection, impact and resistance. The indentation at 25 deg. C. (·015 in.) and the standard size of 9 in. × 9 in. is less than the equivalent flexible flooring tile.

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#### 10 DESIGN: BUILDING TYPES

#### Some aspects of housing for old persons, 1

This week Vere Hole, a social anthropologist working at BRS, reports on an enquiry into the way in which the occupants of 61 old people's dwellings in Edinburgh used their homes and what they thought about them. Among the conclusions reached by this enquiry are the need to consider the requirements of old people, not only in terms of physical disability, but also in terms of their way of life; also the need for housing management to think how to integrate old people into the community and to explain to them the workings and purpose of any unusual equipment or plan arrangements which have been designed to make their lives easier or more safe. This article, which is published by permission of the Director of Building Research, will be concluded next week.

#### INTRODUCTION

Now that the acute post-war demand for family housing has been in part met, more attention is being directed to the housing needs of other groups, and particularly of old people. A survey which was recently carried out in Scotland, although too small in scale to allow wide generalisation, has raised some points of interest in this field.

In 1957 the Department of Health for Scotland completed a demonstration housing scheme which provided accommodation for families and for old people on the same site. The Department had made an analysis

of the various stages in building, of the costs, and of the response of local authorities who visited the scheme. To carry the study further, the Building Research Station was asked to undertake a survey of tenants' opinions of the accommodation and amenities provided. This article is concerned only with the two types of accommodation for old people on the demonstration scheme, together with two other groups of old people's dwellings built for the Edinburgh Corporation, which were studied at the same time for purposes of comparison. Both of these dwelling types had been occupied for about the same period as the demonstration dwellings, and were of traditional design.

The dwellings included in the survey consisted of one group of flats for single persons (Type A) and another group of flats for two persons (Type B) both of which were designed on the plan of an open bed-sitting room, together with two groups of two person bungalows, one of which provided an open bed-sitting room and sun porch (Type C) and the other had a separate living room and bedroom (Type D). The open bed-sitting room and the plan with separate living room and bedroom have both, in the past, been recommended by the Ministry of Housing and the Department of Health for Scotland as suitable for old persons when they are housed in separate dwellings. In space standards the four dwelling types in the study conform, both overall and in the sizes of individual rooms, to the areas currently recommended by the Department of Health for Scotland for one and two person dwellings of these plan types. All four dwelling types were heated by means of an improved open fire with back boiler in the living room; all of them had individual bathrooms, though with equipment which varied from one dwelling type to another. All had separate kitchens, two of which (Types A and D) were designed as working kitchens, and the remainder as dining kitchens.

In all, 61 dwellings were included in the survey; five of Type A, 26 of Type B, seven of Type C and 23 of Type D. All of the tenants were old persons, with an age range of 60-85 years; they had moved to the houses included in the study about a year before the survey was carried out, and it is possible that, as a result of the process of selection for rehousing, the sample included fewer persons at the upper end of the age scale, or with severe disabilities, than might be found on an old estate. Three-quarters of the sample

In the new houses where the study took place, two-thirds of the households consisted of one person and the remainder of two, so that a number of dwellings designed for two persons were technically under occupied. The information was collected by means of an interview with each

#### USE OF LIVING SPACE

In examining the use made of available space for various activities, it is not surprising to find that more meals were taken in the dining kitchens than where the dwelling was provided with a small working kitchen only. It is of interest, however, that there was




Fig. 1. Plan of flatlet, type A, illustrated in Fig. 3

little difference between the one and two person households in this respect, and that a higher proportion of meals were eaten in the living room than is usual in local authority houses occupied by families.4 The decided preference for eating in the living room when entertaining was, however, the same amongst the old people as was found in younger households. For sitting and resting, the living room was almost invariably used. Even when confessing that a daily rest on their bed had been suggested by the doctor, the old people appeared to prefer a nap in an easy chair. In summer, some of them sat at their front door in the afternoon, but they did not make much use of

the large splayed window in the Type A flats, and the sun porch in the Type C bungalows, both of which were designed as a sheltered and sunny place to sit. Somewhat over a third of all tenants had had overnight guests since occupying their dwellings. The most usual provision for such guests was a bed settee or bed chair, either in the living room of the two roomed bungalow, or near the fireplace in the bed-sitting rooms. A few tenants shared their bed (usually a double one) with a visitor, although this was sometimes thought to be inconvenient. Tenants were, however, more prepared to accept these somewhat makeshift arrangements than might have been expected. A flatlet, consisting of bed-sitting room, w.c. and lavatory was provided on the demonstration scheme to be hired by any of the old persons who wished to accommodate guests. The housing authorities subsequently decided to restrict the use of this guest room to cases where, through illness, an old person required a nurse or relative close by. Since the old people felt, in such an emergency, that they needed someone in their own dwelling, the guest room had never been used up until the time of the survey.

All three dwelling types based on the bed-sitting room plan were fitted with curtain rails recessed into the ceiling to enable the portion of the room used for sleeping to be divided from the remainder. Somewhat varying use was made of the curtains by the group, comprising two-thirds of the occupants of these bedsitting rooms, who had installed them. Quite a large proportion (45 per cent) of tenants in the bed-sitting rooms did not like the idea of curtains used as a means of dividing the room, saying that they were unhygienic. stuffy, made the room cramped, and were expensive to install. Others favoured the curtains because they afforded protection against draughts, provided greater privacy, and were ornamental.

A large majority of tenants in all dwelling types found that the size of their bed-sitting room, or of the separate living room and bedroom, was quite satisfactory3. Of the two plan types, the one with two distinct rooms was the more popular; 80 per cent of those in bed-sitting rooms said that they would prefer two separate rooms, although they were not actively dissatisfied with existing arrangements. Not only couples but also single persons felt that two rooms gave greater privacy, particularly at times of illness, or if guests stayed overnight, and the greater separation of eating and sleeping was preferred. Although a bed-sitting room type of dwelling has been part of a very old tradition in Scottish housing, this tradition appears to have less influence nowadays: even the older generation appear to prefer separate arrangements.





Fig. 3. Flatlets for single persons. The splayed window of the bed-sitting room was generally thought to be too large by the tenants

#### THE BATHROOM

It is widely recognised that for old people, and particularly those living alone, the taking of a bath is associated with dangers such as slipping and fainting while in the bath. To combat difficulties such as these, the Department of Health for Scotland recommend<sup>6</sup> "sitz" type baths, which were installed in dwelling Type D, or "telephone" showers, with an anti-scald valve, which were fitted in dwelling Type A for single persons. The other two dwelling types had normal baths. As a safety precaution, a handgrip was attached to the wall in one of the dwelling types with a normal sized bath, and also in the type with the sitz bath; in the demonstration bungalows, which had slightly shorter and narrower baths than normally recommended,7 a movable seat was provided which fitted across the bath.

This group of old people did not appear to be particularly apprehensive about accidents when bathing, although a fifth of them preferred to have someone else in the house to help them when they took a bath. As the bathrooms on the demonstration scheme have been fitted with safety catches, which indicated when the bathroom was in use but enabled the door to be opened from the outside if necessary, the merits of safety catches as opposed to locks were discussed with all the tenants. About a fifth of the tenants, including some of those provided with safety catches, said that they would definitely prefer a lock. In this group, some

concern was felt for the arrival of a caller or tradesman while the bathroom was in use, in which case a lock on the bathroom door was felt to be necessary.

The other safety devices in the bathroom met with varying degrees of success. The handgrips to assist in getting in and out of the bath were used for this purpose by over two-thirds of the group which had them, but in other cases were disregarded or used as towel rails or for other purposes. The special seat provided with the baths in the demonstration bungalows was used when bathing by two of the fourteen persons occupying these dwellings, although others used it when washing feet, or to hold their soap. It was gener-

ally regarded by the tenants as unnecessary, possibly because its intended function was not always fully understood

The sitz baths, of a type mounted on legs, were 2 ft. 6½ in. in height from the floor to the edge of the bath. Partly because of this excessive height, 60 per cent of these tenants said that they definitely did not like this type of bath; although the local authority had subsequently provided stools to assist in getting in and out of the sitz baths, these were not always used. Another objection raised about the sitz bath was that it did not permit such complete immersion in hot water, a process which some old people regarded as beneficial

The showers in the demonstration flats, which were located in a recess with raised plinth for drainage, and provided with a slatted wooden tip-up seat for use when showering, were also unpopular. Most tenants went for baths to their daughters' houses and only one out of five tenants in the group used the shower regularly. It appears that the other tenants had only tried the shower once or twice, and were deterred from further use by excessive splashing of the bathroom (although they hung plastic curtains on the rail provided around the recess). However, unfamiliarity with showers as a means of personal ablution was the main difficulty, and a lack of any appreciation of the benefits they were intended to confer. Other tenants in the sample who were not provided with showers were also questioned about their attitude towards them: only 20 per cent were favourable, in contrast to 40 per cent of old persons with whom the question was discussed in the course of a survey carried out in 1950 in Hamilton

Tenants who were provided with the normal type of 5 ft, bath were the most satisfied of all with regard to bathing facilities.

Another special feature of the demonstration dwellings (Types A and C) was a w.c. two inches lower!" than the normal height which is highly recommended for old persons on medical grounds. The w.c.'s in the other two dwelling types were of normal height. When asked, only 4 per cent of those with w.c.'s of normal height said they did not find them comfortable, but two-fifths of those with lower w.c.'s found them rather low. In the demonstration dwellings handgrips, attached to the framework of the washbasin, were provided to assist persons using the w.c. Half of these tenants made use of the handgrips, those who did not use them saying they felt no need for such help.

Drawings should be prepared in basic form to illustrate sufficiently the principles of the design, including external works, landscaping, etc., to enable intelligent discussion with:—

- I. Client
- 2. Quantity Surveyor
- 3. Consultants
- 4. Sub-Contractors

and developed for formal submission for all approvals when agreed by client. Clients either want to go into every detail, or get it all over quickly on the assumption that you will deal with everything on their behalf. It is essential that the scheme you present is one about which you feel fully confident from a design and technical point of view. It must always fulfil these conditions and if not you should delay presentation and inform the client accordingly.

Drawings should be to scale with general dimensions only. They should be a clean statement, easily read by a layman unfamiliar with drawings, but taken to a point where the architect is prepared to discuss it fully with a committee determined to find the snag, (any planning or structural inconsistencies should be eliminated). They should be prepared around the information referred to in "Collection of Data" (22).


Before presentation: (a) discuss proposals with consultants and specialists to check any points on which you have any doubt,

- (b) if necessary check proposals again with local authorities.
- (c) prepare illustrative drawings and/or a supporting model.
- (d) prepare a collection of material samples or illustrations to establish the

principles and check beforehand that these will be available for use when required.

(e) prepare a concise report which will be read with reports from consultants and quantity surveyor.

This collection should represent firm design proposals based on an analysis of alternatives. Alternatives which have been discarded during investigation should be referred to only to justify the scheme put forward. It is important to arrange a meeting with your client at which these proposals can be presented and discussed fully and the recommendations amplified as necessary by you.



#### design report

Design proposals, when submitted, must be supported by a report and assessment of costs for the work. There should be enough copies for each member where the proposals are being considered by a committee.

The report should state clearly and concisely:-

- 1. The client's original brief.
- 2. Your site analysis related to the
- 3. Your approach to the problem.
- 4. Your recommendations and why.
- 5. An approximate assessment of cost,


including all professional fees and expenses (anticipating expenses in settlement of adjoining owners' rights, etc., where applicable).

6. A request for the adoption of the recommendations and for instructions to proceed in detail.

The information from the quantity surveyor, engineer or other consultants will be complementary documents to this report and all should be carefully cross-referenced to the design

For contracts on which a quantity

surveyor or consultants are not employed, the assessment of costs, as well as being calculated on a superficial area or cube basis, should be cross-checked by the same methods as contracts which are directly comparable, recently finished and on which completed contract costs are known (preferably on a building in the same locality).

#### 31.D1 ·TRICITY· BUILT-IN ELECTRIC COOKER

This Sheet describes the Tricity built-in electric cooker consisting of separate oven and boiling plate units for building into any cabinet arrangement. The drawings on the upper face show a typical arrangement and the lower drawings give details of the two units.

#### Material and Construction

The units are housed in 20 s.w.g. sheet steel casings. The front panels of the oven unit and the boiling plate hob are finished in acid-resisting vitreous enamel. A stainless steel surround is supplied for the oven unit to mask the joints with the surrounding fitments. A length of plastic extrusion is also supplied to provide a resilient seating for the hob of the boiling plate unit and to exclude moisture.

#### Oven/Grill Unit

Oven: The inside dimensions of the oven are: height, 1 ft.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  in.; width, 1 ft. 3 in.; depth, 1 ft.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  in. The oven door is hinged on the left (or right to special order) and has an automatic interior light and an inner glass door. The oven is fitted with a Smith's automatic time switch incorporating a one hour "minute" timer. A vitreous-enamelled meat tin and two bright nickel-plated shelves are provided. There are six shelf positions. The capacity of the oven is 3,600 cubic inches.

Grill: This is fitted below the oven and is controlled by a simmer control. A vitreous-enamelled grill pan with high and low runners is provided and the reversible grid can give four positions for grilling.

Hot cupboard: The internal dimensions of the hot cupboard are: width, 1 ft.  $6\frac{1}{2}$  in.; depth, 1 ft.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  in.; height,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  in.

#### **Boiling Plate Unit**

The boiling plate unit is made to drop into the working top of a suitable cabinet and is connected by a flexible metallic tube to the switch unit which is designed to fit into the front of the cabinet. There are four 7-in. radiant plates with simmer control.

#### **Power Supply**

The ratings of the units are as follows:

Oven: 2.4 kW. Grill: 2.2 kW.

Boiling plates: 8 kW. (2 kW. per plate).

The voltage range is 200/210, 220, 230/240 and 250, a.c. supply only.

#### Fixing

The units can be supplied in various proprietary makes of kitchen cabinet or they may be built into specially-constructed fitments. Full details are available on application.

Oven/Grill Unit: The overall width of the cabinet should be 2 ft. 0 in. minimum to give an adequate air space between the casing of the cooker and the timber sides, otherwise the heat may affect the finish on the cabinet. The depth of the cabinet should be 1 ft. 9 in. minimum and at this depth no back is required behind the cooker casing. A vent 2 in. wide should be provided in the back of the cabinet above the oven to allow for an airflow, e.g. by inserting a false back in the cupboard above. The oven is ventilated through a grille at the top front of the unit and it is recommended that any woodwork immediately above the grille be faced with laminated plastic. The base of the recess to take the oven unit is best placed about 1 ft. 9½ in. from the floor so that the bottom of the oven is level with adjacent working tops.

Boiling plate unit: The construction of the cabinet should provide suitable structural members on which the feet of the boiling plate unit can rest: this ensures that the weight of the unit is taken by the body construction and not by the vitreous-enamelled hob. The length of plastic extrusion should be fixed to the cabinet top so as to provide a resilient seating for the outer flanges of the hob and prevent the penetration of moisture. It is not advisable to use laminated plastic facing on the wall immediately behind the boiling plates.

#### Finish

The units are available in white or cream with the fascia panel and front of the boiling plate switch unit in blue or pink.

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

#### 42.C8 ·SPUR· SHELVING

This Sheet describes the Spur shelving system of steel uprights and brackets for industrial, display, library or domestic use. Wood or glass shelves can be supported on the brackets by various methods or the manufacturer can supply steel shelves. All shelves are adjustable. The shelving can be wall-mounted or free-standing. Shelf ends and book supports are available and the brackets can be adapted to take Spur bottle-racks. The uprights can, if required, be used to support rails of coat-hooks, etc.

#### Components

The uprights and brackets are manufactured from 14 gauge steel, bonderised and stove-enamelled.

Wall uprights: These are of channel section 1 in. wide by § in. deep with pairs of § in. by § in. slots to take the shelf brackets at 11 in. centres. Fixing holes to take no. 14 countersunk woodscrews are provided 1½ in. from each end and intermediately for lengths over 2 ft. 4 in.

Double-sided uprights: Double-sided uprights for freestanding assemblies consist of two flanged channel sections welded together by the flanges.

Floor and ceiling sockets: The floor socket is solid for loadbearing and the ceiling socket has a rectangular hole to facilitate fitting of the uprights. The flanges of the sockets are provided with four 1-in. Whitworth fixing holes and the uprights are held by four roundheaded metal thread screws.

Shelf brackets: The bracket is made in one piece as shown in the drawings, with counter-sunk fixing holes drilled underneath. Two types of bracket are available, the standard type at 90° to the uprights and the sloping type at 110° to the uprights,

Shelf fixings: The manufacturer can supply three types of fitting for fixing the shelves. For timber shelves, a steel strip is available which is screwed to the end of the shelf and projects below it. The strip slides into the slot in the bracket. Alternatively, a screw bush can be supplied which is inserted into the underside of the shelf and fits into the slot in the bracket. For jointing timber shelves a 1½-in. steel jointing plate is available which also fits into the bracket. Special chromium-plated clips are obtainable for holding glass shelves.

Additional fittings: The following fittings can be supplied, if required, for use with the shelving system: shelf ends, book supports, cross bars with a choice of adjustable coat hooks, bottle racks, cabinet brackets and special brackets to take storage rails.

Wall uprights: These are 1 in. wide by § in. deep and available in lengths from 41 in. to 7 ft. 101 in.

Double-sided uprights: These are 17 in. wide (excluding the flanges) by 2 in. deep and available in lengths from 1 ft.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  in. to 7 ft.  $11\frac{1}{2}$  in.

Shelf brackets: Standard brackets are in lengths from 5 in. to 2 ft. 0 in., as shown in the drawing and sloping brackets from 7 in. to 1 ft. 61 in. The larger sizes of both types of bracket span three sets of slots in the uprights, the smaller sizes, two sets.

Steel shelves: Steel shelves are obtainable in four widths 7 in.,  $10\frac{1}{2}$  in., 1 ft.  $2\frac{1}{2}$  in. and 1 ft.  $6\frac{1}{2}$  in., in lengths of 2 ft. 0 in. or 3 ft. 0 in.

The following table gives the load-carrying capacity of the brackets, standard and sloping:

#### Fixing

Wall uprights are fixed by no. 14 countersunk woodscrews 2 in. to 3 in. long, depending on the type of wall and the load to be carried by the shelves. If desired, the uprights can be recessed in grooves cut in the wall surface or panelled in with hardboard or similar material to give a flush finish to the wall. Both types of upright should normally be spaced at 3 ft. 0 in. centres but for heavy loads at 2 ft. 0 in. centres. Where a permanent fixing of the shelves to the brackets is desired, they can be bolted or screwed through the fixing holes in the brackets.

#### Colours and Finishes

The standard colours are grey and white but terra-cotta and black can be supplied to order. Zinc-sprayed galvanised, nickel or chromium finishes can also be supplied to order.


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






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
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
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


Timber Dome

This 75 ft. diameter dome, designed by Hume and Tottenham, has recently been completed at Stillington, Co. Durham. The outer dome is formed of two layers of 4-in. tongued and grooved boarding on laminated timber ribs, finished externally with patent waterproofing. The interior is lined with a plywood skin on a timber frame separate from the outer skin. The main structure and finishing of the outer dome was completed in roughly three months at a cost of about 16s. per sq. ft. It has been designed to meet design criteria laid down by the Timber Development Association.

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
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## DESIGNS IN CONCRETE 11



#### NORTH EASTERN GAS BOARD

The North Eastern Gas Board decided to concentrate their office accommodation. Part of this was previously in the area designated for re-development.

The New Office Block abuts up against the existing premises. It stands on a corner, and therefore, fronts on to two streets. The whole of the Block has a Pile foundation.

Although designed for three storeys, only two storeys are built on one elevation, and provision has been made, by means of stub columns, for this to be extended in a vertical direction, when the additional accommodation is required.

Under part of the two-storey structure, a basement has been formed for the storage of Refrigerators and Cookers. The main entrance has a distinctive stair-case, and leading off, are the two Administrative wings. The whole of the building is an insitu Reinforced Concrete frame.

The elevation consists of facing brick-work and Westmorland slate. Parts of the concrete frame to the main entrance have a mosaic finish.

The first floor, and subsequent floors of the three-storey block cantilever out at first floor level.

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
