






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




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editor's letter

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
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
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
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


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








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
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
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
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A Modern Jewel Box

Discover this authentic mid mod home in Alexandria, Virginia, designed by architect Charles Goodman.

With daring architectural lines and exciting design features, MCM homes tend to draw the eye. When the homeowners of this 1958-build located in the Hollin Hills community contacted Christine A Kelly, AIA, founder and owner of Crafted Architecture LLC, their goal was to return their classic mid mod home to its former glory. "The homeowners wanted to open up and update the interior floor plan as well as restore the exterior façade to its original appearance," Christine says.


With a flat roof line, walls of windows, a centrally located skylight and a rectangular layout, the home is a gem of MCM style.

Christine preserved the original siding and windows that had not been damaged by the passage of time to give the home an authentic feel. Windows were added to bring in more natural light, and the roof was replaced. "We refurbished the exterior of the home to return it to its original appearance, and we captured the recessed entry and enclosed it within the footprint of the house to enlarge the entry foyer," she says.

The result is a stunning exterior that pops against the wooded background. "The scale of the house gives it a jewel-box feel—the house really sparkles at night," she says.

NO MATTER HOW PASSIONATE you are about preserving Mid Century Modern design, kitchens that haven't been touched are usually in need of a few functional updates. When the homeowners of this 1962 ranch wanted to remodel their kitchen, they hired Beth Rhoades, owner of C&R Design Remodel, to help them achieve their vision.

"The homeowners loved the house and its structure and wanted to embrace that," she says. "Our motivation was to help these homeowners update their beautiful home in ways that stayed true to the original design and aesthetic."

BUILT TO BLEND

The home had many original features still intact, including an indoor barbecue grill. But because the homeowners needed a functional stove, it was one of the first features to go in the remodel. "We rebuilt the range wall's whole section," says Beth. But you'd never guess that the section is new when you look at the existing cabinets. "All the cabinetry was either existing or built to blend in with what was existing," she says.

They even duplicated the angled design found on the existing drawers on the range wall for consistency. The design allows the drawers to open, even with a smooth finish. "We didn't want to add hardware, because we didn't want it to look busy," says Beth.

Other original features were preserved, such as the sliding glass doors and the wood paneling on the walls and ceiling. "We had to patch some areas after the modifications to the lighting and plumbing, but it's all existing," says Beth.



TYPE OF HOME: 1962 ranch ARCHITECT: Unknown

BACKGROUND: The house was constructed on land that was once part of a homestead property. The modern design reflected Mid Century Modern concepts and included what were then cutting-edge features, such as a blender built into the countertop and an indoor barbecue grill.

COLOR SCHEME: Neutral and moody with warm woods and grays and touches of greenery to bring the outdoors in

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MID CENTURY MOODY

But preservation isn't solely about retaining existing features. It's also about preserving the original design aesthetic. In the case of this Salem, Oregon, kitchen project, they didn't want to add bright, retro colors to the space and completely change its character. "Living in the Northwest, we have a moody atmosphere," says Beth. "The wood-on-wood tone was part of the architectural design. That's something you would see everywhere, and it was something we needed to embrace with the new material selections."

The new quartz countertops and quartz backsplash are dark and complement the sophisticated kitchen palette, while the new heated limestone flooring adds a lighter foundation. "The windows with the sliding glass doors flow right through to the exterior, so we wanted to bring those colors into the kitchen," says Beth. "I kept the grays as warm as possible."

Because the kitchen has a neutral palette with mostly wood tones, it was important to highlight the textural elements to keep the features from blending together. Some of the original wood elements already had that contrast. "The ceiling paneling is a rough-sawn wood, but the paneled walls are smooth," Beth says. Other textures needed to be added, such as the backsplash tiles and the limestone floor squares, which helped balance the room.

With a few carefully chosen updates and a classic color palette, the owners and Beth were able to successfully transform the kitchen into a mid century time capsule that's fit for modern living.

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
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

Some love stories are meant to be. Such was the case with

Dan and Brandie Meis. The two met at Dan's office and quickly realized how naturally their talents and interests dovetailed. (Dan is an architect and owner of MEIS Architects, and Brandie is a designer—and both have a deep, abiding appreciation for Mid Century Modern furniture and homes.) They embarked on the grand adventure of marriage, and soon another love story unfolded: finding just the right residences to fall in love with and call home. "I have been practicing for 30+ years but specialize in the design of stadiums and arenas," Dan says. "Brandie graduated architecture school from University of Southern California. Our experience in renovation has grown from a shared love of mid century architecture and design."

A HIGH BAR

They relocated from California to New York in order to be closer to Dan's European projects. The move meant leaving behind an incredibly special Mid Century Modern house located near Malibu, so the couple were determined to find another place that they loved as much. Little did they know just what awaited: a historic home doomed and marked for tear down.

When they first toured the residence, it was in terrible shape. "We immediately knew it would be a big project if we decided to buy the home," Brandie says. Rain poured into the main bedroom, and the structure was afflicted by termite damage and dry rot. "I was a bit intimidated by how much we were going to have to rebuild," Dan says. "To her credit, Brandie was more the optimist and saw the opportunity in reconfiguring the plan to make it work perfectly for us."






Just before they closed on the house, the couple fortuitously ran into the now adult sons of the original owner/architect of the house as they were packing it up. Not only did the sons have loads of information about the home, but they also shared their stories of growing up there, tales which included their parents listening to classical music in the living room and reading aloud to each other at dinner, endless hours in the garden and an impressive feat of planting 1,000 pine seeds on the property. "Having access to the wonderful and fascinating history of growing up in the house was amazing," Dan says. "It convinced and inspired us to save what was surely a diamond in the rough."

MID CENTURY RESURRECTION

Over the next three years and in two separate phases, Dan and Brandie restored the home to its former self, while adapting it for their lives. "We were both very committed to rescuing it and modernizing it without losing the original magic of the design," Dan says. Originally, the bedrooms were tiny, and the main bedroom

was separated from the living room with only an accordion door. Another problem was that the living room didn't have a logical place for a television. "We literally removed the entire core of the house (roof, ceiling, floor and beams) and rebuilt. Now, the center of the home is the most robust!" Brandie says. "Losing the bedrooms initially was a tough decision, but we weighed that against how important family movie night is to us."

Aside from reconfiguring the home, there were other challenges, like matching the interior wood stain, which varied from one side of the house to the other due to age and fading. By mixing different stains, they worked to find just the right hue that paired perfectly with existing wood finishes. Overall, the project was a balance of salvaging as many historic details as possible and, when unable to, finding the most authentic way to replace and



match them. The couple also added to the heritage of the home by replacing the original skylights in the living area with stunning glass barrel-vault skylights.

Together, the couple poured their hearts and souls into restoring the home. "One of the great aspects of our partnership is that we balance each other out," Dan says. "When one has doubts, the other is there to remind what a special opportunity it is." In the end, they transformed a home on the brink of destruction into a one-of-a-kind place that's full of both history and love.



While the home is old, it has almost effortlessly managed to maintain both its beauty and sense of modernity with grace.

With 2,500 square feet, four bedrooms and three bathrooms, today it shines as an example of pure mid century design. Nestled in the hills of northern California's Bay Area, its natural surroundings and proximity to the city make it an absolute dream home. While Fishstein died before the home was completed and never actually lived there, the original owners resided there for 56 years and made only minor updates. "The home was a ship in a bottle," says Garrett Chow, who purchased the house in 2018.


UNTOUCHED BEAUTY

Because this home is without any of the major remodels that many other half-century homes have undergone, entering the stunning space feels a little like stepping back in time. "In preparation for the home's sale, the previous owner really only did cosmetic improvements like new paint, updating appliances, and some minor updates to the kitchen and master bedroom," Garrett says. While the home is old, it has almost effortlessly managed to maintain both its beauty and sense of modernity with grace. "It does not feel antiquated at all," Herman says.



Built into a hillside, the entry is at the ground level, and a spiral staircase, itself the main focus of the home, leads up into the main living space. "Fishstein's compression and restriction of the view as one enters through the garage-level entry and finally enters into the open, bright expanse of the main living space is masterful," Garrett says. The structure itself is a nod to the parallelogram and, within that concept, boasts all the well-known and loved features of a mid century home. Exposed beams blur the distinction between the indoors and out, as do the glass walls. "The whole of the west elevation is in essence a wall of floor-to-ceiling glass, capitalizing on the views across to San Francisco," Garrett says. Accordion doors open onto the deck, where surrounding flora and fauna create an idyllic setting.

ONE OF A KIND

While this home has received press attention and become something of a legend, not much is known about the architect, who passed away before it was completed. "This house may be a literal and figurative one-of-a-kind," says Garrett. Constructed at a time when building homes was about cheap mass production, the song of this house plays differently. It was built to last.

The robust ceiling beams, a staple from the architecture at the time, were actually recycled beams from an old wooden bay bridge that was torn down upon the construction of a concrete one. "Ben Fishstein had the foresight to collect and preserve some of the original, old-growth redwood timbers," Garrett says, "Fishstein's post-and-beam construction is comprised of some of the 600 original redwood piles." At the time it was built, the home even garnered a feature in the Italian design magazine, *Abitare*, which still publishes today.

THE FINISHED PRODUCT

At some point, the ground-floor workshop and storage area became its own in-law quarters with a private entrance. The main floor consists of the main living areas and two bedrooms, as well as the deck, and perched above it all is the master bedroom. "When you're in the house, you see all these beautiful geometric lines, and then when you step out to the outdoor space, you're under this huge panorama of blue sky surrounded by a carousel of greenery and foliage," Herman says.

When furnishing the home, Garrett sought to fill each room with pieces that would enhance the space. "It was my aim to give the home the breathing space it deserves," he says, "There is a mix of old and new, and stuff I've found off the street and in my travels alongside classics of the home's era scoured at bargain sales," Garrett says. Some prized pieces include a pair of vintage Hans Wegner chairs he purchased from Craigslist after 20 years of searching; an Ax chair by Peter Hvidt; and some vintage soft-pad recliners by the Eames Office. Artwork from friends and even a bike frame he painted himself complete the space. With a truly unique design, stunning location, impeccable detail and fascinating history, Fishstein's "M" house is truly a marvel.

Rebuilding Retro

After a fire, this Eichler-inspired home had to be rebuilt from the ground up. And though it takes plenty of inspiration from its original Eichler roots, it also has a few changes too.

This San Mateo neighborhood has one of the highest concentrations of Eichler homes in California. Atop one of its lots an original Eichler used to sit, built in the mid century. However, an unfortunate grill fire made quick work of this so-called "two-minute Eichler," a reference to how quickly its all-wood structure succumbed to the fire.



So, when later owners of the burnt-down lot reached out to Klopf Architecture to rebuild, they knew they wanted to include classic Eichler elements, while making the home work better for the homeowners than the original Eichler ever could have.

THE REBUILD


One of the biggest changes in the rebuild was the layout of the home. One of the homeowners wanted to include an additional primary suite for their mother, which presented a challenge for the already narrow lot.

"Your back wall is your connection to the outdoors," says architect John Klopf. "It can only be a certain number of feet wide, and [if] you have two primary suites back there, you don't have much space for a living room to connect to the back either."



DESIGN RECIPE FOR AN EICHLER

But it was crucial that the rebuilt home didn't lose its Eichler look. On the exterior of the home, many quintessential Eichler elements were re-added, like the low profile of the home, its overhanging roof and vertical siding. "[We wanted to] keep the house more private towards the street facade, and have it look more like a wood wall," says John.

Eichler colors were also used where possible, like the subtle orange front door and deep gray siding. Together these elements make the home blend in in its neighborhood full of Eichlers. But it almost wasn't that way. When they were building the home, it had to be reframed at the last-minute, as the original framing on the hilly lot made the home look two stories tall. "We didn't want to look like a two-story home from the street," says John. "It stood out, and we wanted to try to preserve the whole feel of the neighborhood ... It was well worth it [to change the framing] to prevent the house from looking like this two-story monstrosity."

Inside, the home's Eichler feel continues. One of the biggest ways it shines through is in the home's expansive wall of floor-to-ceiling windows. The windows look out onto a picture-perfect courtyard, which holds a pool, space to entertain and an outdoor kitchen.

INDOOR-OUTDOOR FEELING

Bringing the inside and outside together as one is a must for any mid century home, especially in California. And it's no different for this Eichler rebuild. One of the ways John and his team created the indoor-outdoor feeling was through the home's concrete slab flooring, which fills the interior of the home and is continued outside. "The floor slab is exposed concrete flooring with radiant heating, which is another typical Eichler element," says Klara.

And as the lot sits on a slope, the courtyard has a retaining wall. But rather than trying to hide or remove the wall, it's instead highlighted, covered in lush plantings and boulders. The home sits up against the wall, where it's highlighted through window placements, which, John says, create the feeling of the home being perfectly integrated into the landscape.

SETTING THE SCENE

When it comes to setting the table for a holiday gathering, I like to keep the holidays feeling warm, inviting and stylish, never stuffy or overworked. I have four design criteria I often use in creating an MCM-inspired centerpiece.

- VINTAGE TOUCHES: I've chosen this shallow, vintage brass vessel as the container for the arrangement. Its low profile, tapered legs and oblong shape mimic the architecture of the table.
- MOD STYLE: Red seed pods that resemble Space Age ball chairs add a punch of bold, mod color and interest.
- LIVING ELEMENTS: Live greenery is a centerpiece essential, and holiday arrangements are no exception. Don't be afraid to mix artificial with living items.
- ODD NUMBERS: Working in odd numbers creates visual interest, shown here with the incorporation of three Danish taper candles.

DINNERWARE

If I had to choose one obsession as a collector, mine would be dinnerware. I seldom need a reason to bring out the vintage plates and glasses. The arrangement of each place setting is casual but elegant. You may want to add a few pieces to your table, depending on the occasion and what is being served, but we're keeping things fairly informal this year.

Using a crisp, white cloth napkin is a great way to add sophistication to your table. I especially like this triplepocket fold, which compartmentalizes each utensil, leaving a nice opening for a sprig of holiday greenery repeated in the centerpiece. Plan your seating arrangement, and make your quests feel special by creating a place card on a simple gift tag.

prepared by my grandma (Me-Maw) at her home. Her signature baked ham, Southern-style green beans, deviled eggs and homemade pies always set the scene at the Christmas dinner. But the real star of the show (for us grandkids) was the holiday punch. This combination of tart cranberry, sweet grape juice and spicy ginger soda

TIP: Freeze cranberries and rosemary sprigs into a few ice molds and place in the punchbowl. The slow-melting ice keeps your punch looking beautiful and chilled without it watering down.



made for a colorful, fizzy concoction we couldn't get enough of. She would always serve the punch in a large crystal bowl, and we would ladle it into matching cups, which hung off the side of the bowl on tiny hooks. I was so drawn to the vibrant red-violet drink that I was continually scolded for ladling out my third, fourth ... seventh serving.

I still enjoy serving this delicious punch to guests, though I have modified Me-Maw's recipe to include some festive spirits for a little added ... punch! Here's to enjoying as many refills as you like without being reprimanded.

HOLIDAY SPICE FRUIT PUNCH

Yield: Approx. 50 4-ounce servings

INGREDIENTS:

30 oz. light rum

20 oz. spiced pear brandy

64 oz. white grape juice

12 oz. frozen cranberry juice

concentrate (thawed)

48 oz. (4 bottles) ginger beer

DIRECTIONS:

Gently stir rum, brandy, grape juice and cranberry concentrate into a large punch bowl. Add ginger beer. Serve with a ladle into punch cups.

Credenzas are one of my favorite pieces of furniture in any room design. I give mine special attention for the holidays with a little seasonal décor. Using surrounding artwork as the basis for a holiday display is an excellent way to make your room feel festive. I modified these black candlesticks from Target (no longer available) by sawing off the candleholder portion from the top. Varying sizes are staggered and accompanied by a simple pine branch and clusters of colorful, vintage glass ornaments. Do you cringe at boring holiday gift wrap? Use a solid color or bold graphic paper for a less literal approach to holiday packaging this year. 






The primarily industrial designer opened the door to a new kind of office that evolved into an artistic experience. "Knoll paired interiors with architecture, and in so doing, she both defined a clearer brief for the interior design profession and elevated its social and cultural status," writes Ana Araujo in her new book, No Compromise: The Work of Florence Knoll.

Knoll's roster of renowned corporate clients included media moguls, such as television executives, and business titans, such as the Rockefellers.

"I am not a decorator," Knoll stated in a 1964 interview with The New York Times. "The only place I decorate is my own house." Indeed, Florence Knoll did nothing less than turn the concept of the plain, practical office environment on its ear.

CREATING SOLUTIONS

Knoll believed the secret for producing good design was to identify what the problem was and solve it. A perfect example of how Knoll approached specific design challenges was her creative furniture at the office of the president of the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS), where one of her tasks was to conceal a sophisticated electronic control system that housed a phonograph, telephone, radio and televisions, Araujo explains. She says Knoll created "an ingenious storage unit to resolve the problem, which she detailed in an elaborate but concise sketch. It was one of the main hallmarks of the Knoll look: the articulation of a utilitarian problem with such a degree of care and artistry that it almost acquired, in itself, a decorative status."

The designer created her own version of modernism, Araujo says, explaining that "her style—consistent with her architectural training from mentors such as Eliel Saarinen and Mies van der Rohe and influenced by colleagues such as Charles and Ray Eames—combined the boldness and sleekness of the steel-and-glass aesthetic with a 'humanized' application of color, texture and comfort."



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

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Knoll's designs were nearly as minimal as Mies' buildings and interiors, yet they felt cozier and more tactile, owing these warmer qualities to the influence of Eliel Saarinen, the Eames couple and others, Araujo says. "Knoll's interiors combined visual precision with material fuzziness, calibrating these qualities in response to the particularities of each program, site and client."

Several of Knoll's interiors became iconic, including the offices of CBS headquarters, General Motors, Connecticut General, H. J. Heinz and Look Publications. Yet Knoll was unassuming about her furniture designs, Araujo says. "'Meat and potatoes' is how she described them. The most iconic interiors Florence Knoll designed resembled living rooms, even if most of them were located within the context of corporate, commercial or institutional settings."


CULTURE SHOCK

"Under Florence Knoll, the character of the office changed," Araujo says. "In the same way that Mies, through his artistic skills, had turned the steel structure, in principle dull and monotonous, into an iconic design feature, Knoll transformed the equally boring and standardized modern office into an image that was eventually considered to be cool and sexy." Her interiors glamorized the office space. "The Knoll look combined the image of efficiency that was required from a working space with the excitement and drama that is usually linked to leisure and entertainment, adding to the mix a cozy and intimate experience typically associated with the domestic. It was as if the office as a space, and work as an activity, now contained everything that a human being needed in order to feel happy and fulfilled."

Florence Knoll refined and glamorized utilitarian design, enabling her to create highly sophisticated and seductive working spaces, Araujo says. Her body of work transcended modernizing the ambience of the office; it transformed corporate culture forever.

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






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
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


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MINI ME MID CENTURY


Builder Michael Wray, owner and founder of MidCentury Custom Homes, LLC, and designer Christine Turknett of Breathe Design Studio have been collaborating to bring the vision of a retro, Mid Century Modern-inspired casita to life.

"It's punchy, vibrant and playful," says Christine. "With the help of vintage-inspired décor, classic patterns and iconic designs, this new build has all the charm of an authentic period home.

MULTIPURPOSE BUILD

Just off the main house, this casita can serve a few different functions. "It's more than just a guest house," says Christine. "Ever since Covid, Michael has been imagining it as a







work-from-home office too." The bedroom is outfitted with a desk, and the living room and bedroom both have daybeds that can be used for sleeping or simply relaxing with a book.

This hybrid office/guest house is small at 512 square feet, but the floor-to-ceiling windows and abundance of natural light make it feel more spacious. "Particularly for smaller spaces, floor-to-ceiling windows create a much more open living experience," says Michael. And, of course, they capture the indoor-outdoor relationship found in most mid century homes.

POST AND BEAM

But that's not the only nod to bringing the outdoors in. Michael added tongue-and-groove paneling to the underside of the roof's exterior as well as the interior ceiling to create that seamless transition. And he decided on a traditional post-and-beam structure inspired by the Cliff May Ranchos. "Black post and beam is a classic mid century look that happens to be fairly on trend," says Michael. "Where classic and trendy intersect, it's a good place to be."

The roof creates an overhang for the extended patio, where a number of materials are at play. The white stucco walls and black wood beams are a stark contrast to the warmth of the Thinline paneling from Eichler Siding surrounding the Escon front door. "I struggled with choosing a color for the front door," says Christine. "I ended up finding inspiration from a book by William Krisel and noticed a baby-blue shade that I liked. I don't normally associate that color with Mid Century Modern, but you see a lot of turquoise, so I thought I'd choose a color in between the two that hasn't been seen yet."

1950s FUN

Compared to the main house that has an MCM blend, the casita pulls from classic retro style, featuring iconic mid century pieces, patterns and colors. "We were trying to think about the use of the space and match that spirit and vibe," says Jickie Torres, editor of *Atomic Ranch*. "It was a fun opportunity to be more lighthearted, vibrant and fanciful, which felt like an appropriate direction for this kind of structure."

Committing to the idea of a more saturated color palette, they incorporated a bright yellow Womb Chair-inspired chair and a multicolored sideboard from Kardiel, robin's egg-blue kitchen appliances by Elmira Stove Works and a custom backsplash inspired by the George Nelson ball clock. And that line of thinking applied to the kitchen as well. "I thought about making all of the appliances blue, but I thought it would be too much," she says. "I wanted the refrigerator to be the star, and I didn't want anything competing with the tile."

Free Press

In 1938, famed Japanese-American sculptor, architect and industrial designer Isamu Noguchi submitted a proposal for a 22-foot-tall, stainless steel bas-relief sculpture to adorn the entrance of the Associated Press Building in New York City. The sculpture, to be called "News," would depict five journalists riding the newswire, wielding the tools of their craft: a notepad, telephone, camera and wirephoto.

Two years later in 1940, the frieze was unveiled and could not have been timelier. Noguchi's work honored the endeavor of news gathering and exalted American journalists as larger-than-life heroes and the protectors of an informed public. He depicted a free press as the necessary "fourth branch" of any democracy.


But in February of 1942, in the wake of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed legislation that created internment camps up

and down the West Coast designed to imprison over 125,000 Japanese immigrants and their descendants. This historic civil-rights injustice came about, in part, because of pressure from the American people fueled by anti-Japanese editorials and propaganda published by the American press.

For the next few years, Noguchi advocated for Japanese-Americans through protests, art and essays. He even voluntarily admitted himself to the Poston internment camp in Arizona, where he tried to better the living conditions of those imprisoned there. But in the camp, he found his efforts to be futile and his presence unsettling for all parties. When the camps closed in 1946, Noguchi moved back to New York to focus on his art, while still being monitored by the FBI.

Then, of course, in 1947, he went on to design the quintessential modernist coffee table.





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
