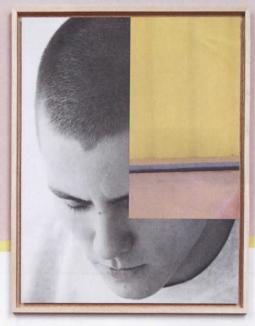

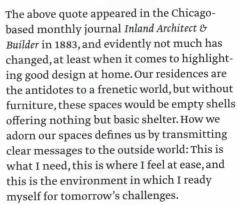

## Many Voices, Many Rooms

"Manufacturers are vying with each other in the production of beautiful shapes...artistic talent and mechanical skill shape the furniture that make our homes the center of the world, the haven of rest, and the place of comfort."



But there is a clear difference between the thoughtful selection of furnishings and the heedless accumulation of "stuff." Good furniture at its best is the intersection of art, craft, and industry. The "right" pieces address the needs dictated by our behavior and predilections. That's the lofty ideal. Of course, complications arise when one starts calculating the pesky realities of space, time, and budget. And so begins the tradeoff.

This issue is a celebration of furniture. In the pages that follow we present homes in which the decorative objects take center stage, and whose residents exhibit obvious delight in the hunting, gathering, and arrangement of pieces. We include an intriguing apartment in Brussels that doubles as a gallery for an ever-changing roster of high-

design furnishings; a charming Parisian flat that functions as a creative director's laboratory for decorative ideas; a young couple's first fully realized adult abode stocked with vintage finds and quirky contemporary pieces; and an original Eichler transformed by a meticulously acquired design collection.

Even something as maddeningly simple as buying the right sofa stymies the best of us, and we help untangle this universal problem by inviting a few design experts to share aesthetic advice and buying tips. We also offer favorite finds from this year's Salone Internazionale del Mobile in Milan and a glimpse of pieces that will be on display at our annual Dwell on Design conference in Los Angeles in June. We round out the issue by profiling two pairs of furniture designers representing opposite sides of the spectrum—one young enterprising duo, La Chance, is just beginning to make waves in design circles and another, Ludovica+Roberto Palomba, dominates this year's international fairs with their creations.

Good design is for everyone, and the pursuit of good furniture needn't be a fetish for unattainable pieces. There are simple rules to keep in mind: Acquire only objects that are well made, and don't buy things that suit a temporary need. Pieces that serve dual purposes will suit your life for a longer period of time. Quality is always worth the wait.

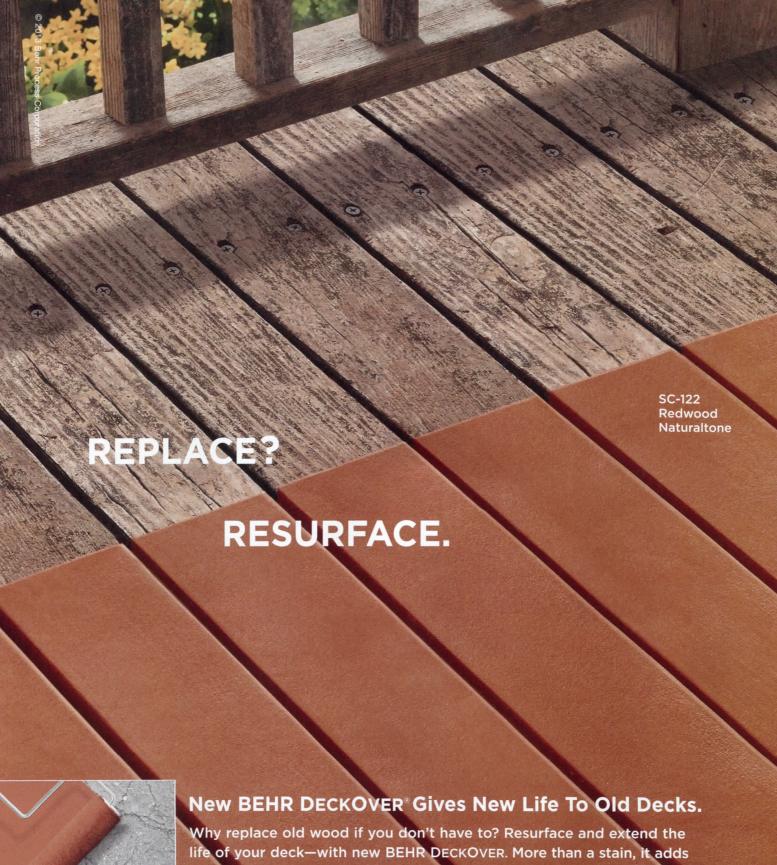

While I have searched my artistic influences, I did not look as far back as the architecture of my first school. Thank you for bringing the Muthesius aesthetic to my attention.

I was looking for the name of the mastermind behind the whole design and didn't find it anywhere in the article. I can't imagine that it was just put together by the Department of Transport and they happened to luckily choose the leading people to create the architecture, mural, furniture, Mondrianesque floor design, sculptures, etc. I feel that someone deserves credit for that.

Editors' Note: According to the airport's marketing department, Stanley White was in charge at the Department of Transport, and he was responsible for remaking "a host" of Canadian airports during his tenure.

A letter in the March 2013 issue continues the myth that the L.A. Dodgers were responsible for the forced removal of families from Chavez Ravine in order to build Dodger Stadium. I direct your attention to Thomas S. Hines's book, Richard Neutra and the Search for Modern Architecture (Rizzoli, 2005). Mr. Hines details the events from 1949, when the area was designated by the Federal Housing Act as the proposed site of a large public housing project, to 1953 when, after most of the families had been relocated, the project was finally canceled. The site then sat vacant. Only after that did the Dodgers, following a land swap in 1957 with the city of Los Angeles, become the owners and start construction of the stadium in 1959.

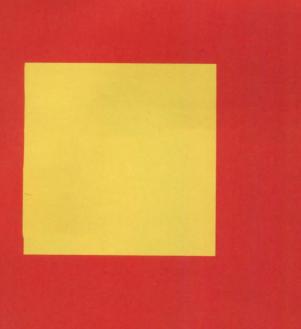

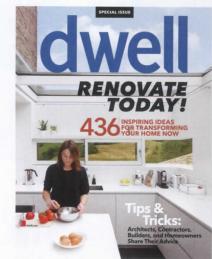

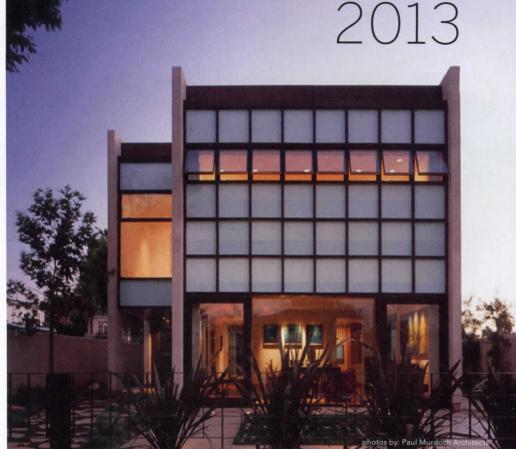

#### HOW TO SHOP FOR A SOFA

Down cushions? Hardwood frame? New York City interior designer Timothy Brown gives us a quick tutorial on what to inspect when you're inspecting.

#### **Cushion the Blow**

I prefer foam-wrapped cushions with some down. The down is soft, and the foam retains the shape of the cushion. With pure down, the cushion needs to be fluffed every time you get out of your seat and it looks sloppy.

#### Frame Game

Skip plywood or particleboard and look for a hardwood frame with eight-way hand-tied springs (all the springs are tied together, more evenly distributing the weight of the sitter).

#### **Going Vintage**

The shape is what really matters here. The fabric, in 99 percent of cases, will be changed, and the insides will be replaced with fresh down and foam. If the shape is good, a little work and the sofa is like new.

#### Up with Upholstery

Natural fabrics are best, and I also prefer neutral fabrics on sofas. This purchase will stick around for years, and the last thing you want is to be saddled with a pink floral sofa to work around.

## Togo or Not Togo

Love it or hate it, the distinctive silhouette of Ligne Roset's most enduring sofa model celebrates 40 years of booming business.

In the realm of frequently featured settees, there's a certain caterpillarlike modular sofa system you've seen over and over again-for four decades, in fact. In 2013, the Togo sofa, designed by Michel Ducaroy for Ligne Roset. celebrates 40 years of influence. One would be hard-pressed to think of another piece of distinct, groovy, polarizing design that's experienced the unmitigated success of the Togo. Ducaroy was known to describe his creation as a "tube of toothpaste folded over on itself like a stovepipe and closed at both ends;" this low-slung, cocooned style of seating helped usher in a new mode of sofa that is still fresh today. Ligne Roset president Pierre Roset says that the "creative, anticonformist, and comfortable" Togo was far ahead of its time, forging a typology that fits into a variety of modern homes. "It offers much flexibility," he continues. "It's easy to move, robust, amazingly comfortable, and looks timeless." ligne-roset-usa.com

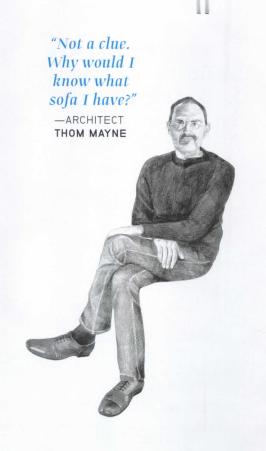

Antonio Citterio's 1997 design for B&B Italia is now well into its second decade of popularity, with a pair of successful updates—2003's deeper Charles Large and 2010's polypropylene Charles Outdoor—already on the books. "I try not to copy but to perceive and assimilate aspects specific to the

work of great masters," says Citterio of the Charles's nod to the Eameses, but he notes that the similarities between his sofa and the couple's mid-century designs "are more in spirit than in fact."

Citterio has designed scads of sofas at this point, not only for B&B Italia but for storied brands like Vitra and Flexform as well. Though he was already decades into a glittering career of sofa design, Citterio confirmed his mastery of the form with the Charles's slim, strong frame, long seat cushion, aluminum corner supports, and suite of free pillows.

Today, the Charles remains one of B&B Italia's best-selling pieces—so much so that its inevitable mate, the Ray, arrived in 2012. "Like Charles, the Ray is a modular system, which starts with a linear element that can be extended to include chaises longues, end pieces, and ottomans," Citterio reports.

## **Pacific** Catch

A pedigreed mid-century home tailor-made for its inhabitants and environs joins the Spokane Register of Historic Places.

Project: Ferris Residence Architect: Bruce Walker Location: Spokane, Washington

Seeking a house that would exemplify their design-oriented lifestyle (together they ran a modern housewares and furniture store), Joel E. Ferris II and his wife, Mary Jean, hired Bruce M. Walker in 1955. A promising young architect, Walker studied at Harvard under Walter Gropius.

Walker delivered a warm home attuned to its surroundings. Many of the exterior materials—red brick, white stucco, a black post-and-beam systemare used throughout the interior. He enlisted noted

landscape architect Lawrence Halprin, who added a fieldstone wall, Japanese rock garden, and brick terraces to the yard.

"Growing up, my siblings and I knew we lived someplace special," says Sam Ferris, Joel and Mary Jean's son, who recently helped get his childhood home inducted into the Spokane Register of Historic Places. This marks the first time a landscape was added to the Register. "The house has aged gracefully and looks more beautiful today than it did when it was brand new."

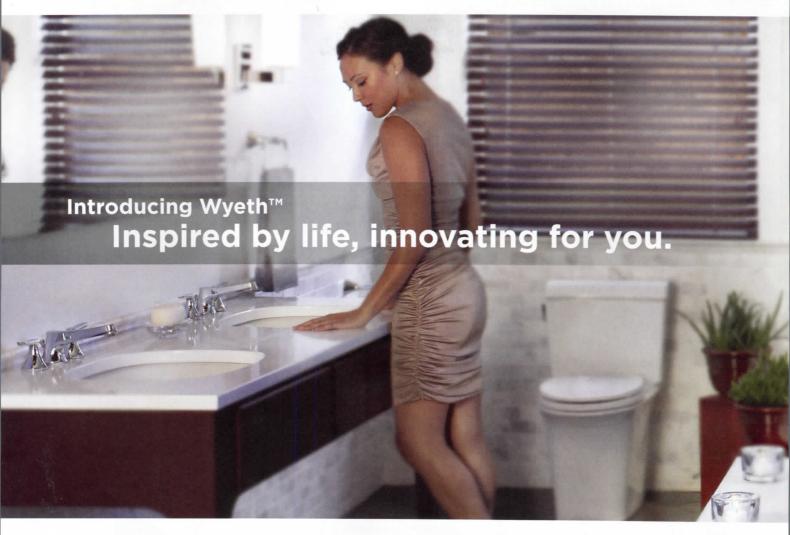

residential apartment in an early modernist building in Paris—is crowded with latter-day La Chance pieces: Pierre Favresse's Magnum tabletops (Jekyll), a shiny yellow coffee table by Luca Nichetto (Hyde), and a pair of Note Design Studio Tembo stools (one Jekyll, one Hyde) are framed by a marble fireplace, lofty fabric-draped walls, and an aging wood-paneled library. This mix of classical and avant-garde, timeless and timely, isn't Manichaean, however; it speaks to the coherent, mutually enriching duality that the two are assuredly creating.

These polar qualities are more subtle in La Chance's second collection, shown at Salone in April: The Jekyll version of Paris-based Pool's Vulcain lamp is sophisticated, with a Carrara marble body topped by a perforated copper shade. In the lamp's Hyde incarnation, color is used with restraint: A yellow switch and blue cord accent an otherwise entirely white object.

Breguet is an architect. Souletie, ostensibly a businessman, once did an after-hours interior redesign of the London brokerage firm where he worked, and, in the end, was given the budget to complete it. The two, who are distantly related, share creative direction, giving designers precise briefs on materials, production constraints, dimensions, and some style elements. "The more constraints, the better the outcome," explains Souletie.

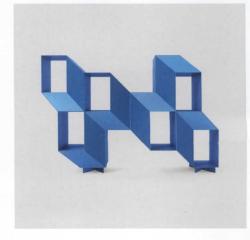

## **Basket Case**

The contemporary design scene is rife with reclaimed-timber furniture and reawakened cottage industries. Now weaving is about to have its moment in the spotlight. Fear not; this isn't a wicker retread. Instead, industrial designers are devising ways to update even the most traditional of fabrication methods by picking up the mantle of Hans Wegner (who modernized paper-cord construction) and Thonet (of the classic caned-rattan seats). ### Peanuts Gallery

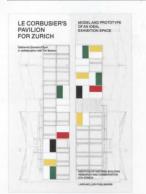
In a comic strip that appeared March 1, 1953, a Knoll Hardoy butterfly chair and an Eames LCW occupy a living room—the first appearance of midcentury modern furniture in *Peanuts*. Though author and illustrator Charles Schulz did not own these classics, the drapes are based on a pattern from his own home.

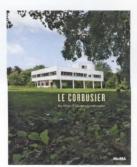
Charles Schulz's Peanuts comic strip won the hearts of countless readers during the almost 50 years it appeared in newspapers. Through his cast of plucky children, a dog named Snoopy, and a bird, Schulz commented on current events and social mores. And though

Schulz never explicitly addressed the influence of the mid-century aesthetic, he found ways to weave a handful of now-iconic furniture pieces by Le Corbusier, Harry Bertoia, and Charles and Ray Eames into his cartoons. Mid-Century Modern, a new exhibition on view until October

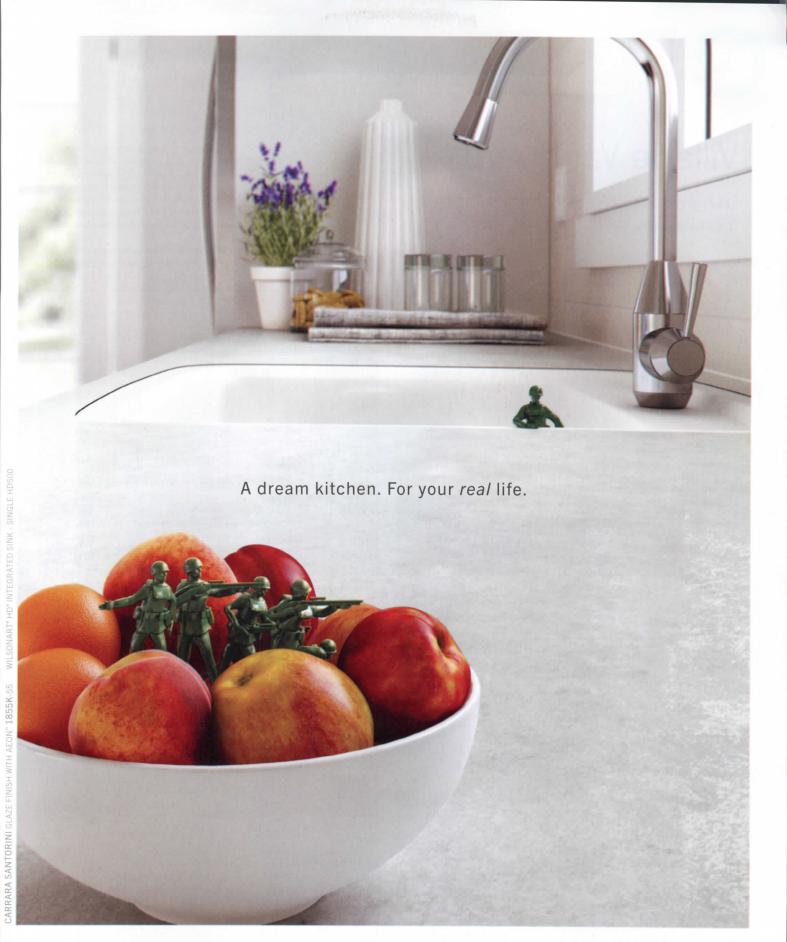

Graphic designer Mark Neely and gastroenterologist Paul Kefalides had spent years collecting furniture for their apartments in Chicago and New York before a career opportunity for Kefalides materialized in California. Neely was game but had one stipulation: "I told Paul, 'We can move out west if you can find a modern house that the furniture can go into," he remembers. It was 2005, during the market frenzy. Kefalides lucked into a connection with Eichler expert and real estate manager Catherine Munson. She showed the couple a house that had only two owners since its construction in 1966; both were architects who had made the home's conservation a priority.

After painting the sitting room Kendall Charcoal from Benjamin Moore's Aura line, Neely wanted a sculptural element that would show up against the dark hue. So he assembled his white Algues set, designed by the Bouroullec brothers for Vitra, on the wall behind the sofa. Neely and Kefalides soon found themselves the new owners of the roughly 1,700-square-foot postand-beam house, designed by architect Claude Oakland for developer Joseph Eichler's 500-plus-home Lucas Valley neighborhood in San Rafael, California. The pair had found their modern house, but the ongoing journey of furnishing and preserving it had only just begun.

Neely: I remember walking into this house, and thinking, This is perfect. It felt like we had walked into the '60s. It fit the furniture and still had all the original bones. Sometimes older houses are in states of decay and disrepair, but because the original and second owners of this house were architects, they maintained it very well.

Kefalides: We were attracted to it because the setting was beautiful and the house proportions were smaller and more intimate. It had a warmth not always present in modern homes. It seemed like it had once been a cherished home. Once we moved in. we learned a lot about Eichler. He was trying to make elegant, simple modern homes accessible to the middle class. That was one of the things he did that was pioneering: democratizing design and architecture.

Neely: Initially, we had grand ideas to do some renovations or extensions, and then the recession hit and everything sort of flatlined. In a way, Im-

it turned out to be a good thing because it made us sit back and appreciate what the house had to offer as it was. We saw it in a new light and turned our focus to the furnishings.

We brought a lot of things to this house from Chicago—I started collecting mid-century modern and Danish when we lived there in the early '90s. I got many pieces from Knoll, Herman Miller, and the Merchandise Mart, and the antiques shops were filled with stuff at the time. The Danish chest in the living room is from Chicago, as are the Hans Wegner oak Sawbuck chairs—those are from Wright, the auction house. No one was bidding on them, so I did.

Kefalides: When we were in Chicago, it was a time of discovery. We were so excited about purchasing some of those things, like the Raymond Loewy buffet, which also came from Wright. We rented a truck from Home Depot and moved the buffet ourselves to our apartment—it's really heavy. It's spectacular and has a lot of sentimentality for us. I tend to get attached to things

that were real aspirations at the time we acquired them.

Neely: Many of those pieces work so well in these rooms, like the Paul McCobb table, which I found when we were living in New York. When I placed it in our living room here, I realized it's basically the structure of our house. The travertine top looks like the roof, the drawers resemble the house itself, and the negative space, the carport.

Kefalides: There's a dilemma with these houses—on one hand, we realize we don't need a lot of space and can live comfortably with furnishings from the same era, which were designed to fit in a small space. But some areas, like the kitchen and bathrooms, really do need updating. We are sensitive about changing the footprint of a home that has specific sight lines and light entry points, and we would never alter it in a way that disrupts those features. We've talked to a lot of architects, and the back-and-forth usually leads to more indecision, actually.

Neely: Our general approach has been to keep the house up and bring areas to life by putting up a new wall covering or adding furniture. The integrity of the architecture depends on the details Eichler put in, which should remain. I'm on the architectural review committee for the Lucas Valley neighborhood, and we have an ongoing debate in the community: What would Eichler have done, and what would he have thought of this or that? The whole modern idea was always to move forward and not feel constrained by the rules-that's what modernists were revolting against when they came up with the modern ethos. I like to think Eichler would have wanted this neighborhood to evolve in a modern way.

Kefalides: We have to retain elements of Eichler's mid-century modern aesthetic but still make sure that the house is functional for 21st-century life. It's like two kinds of modernism coming together. I don't think Eichler and his fellow modernists would have wanted their homes entombed; instead, they would rather have them grow and develop organically.

# Made In House

#### In the rarefied world of Milanese

design, high-profile stars usually work alone. Partnerships between husband and wife are even scarcer. Ludovica Serafini and Roberto Palomba may be the exceptions that prove the rule. Since 1994, they have collaborated on an amazing number of projects: designing bathroom equipment, kitchens, furniture, and lighting for an almost endless list of companies, including Boffi, Cappellini, Salviati, Foscarini, and Zanotta, and winning several prestigious awards, including a Compasso D'Oro—Italy's highest design prize—in the process.

When the couple decided to look for a vacation home, they turned their gaze far from the hectic world of Milan, their home base, and started house hunting over 600 miles away in the southeastern part of Italy, in Salento—sometimes referred to as the high heel in Italy's boot—a sub-peninsula in Puglia. "This part of Italy is beautiful," explains Palomba, adding that the family had

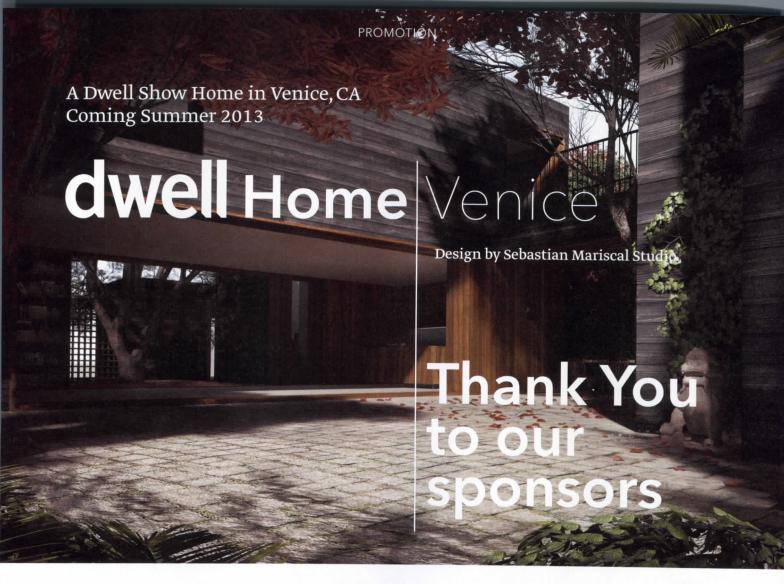

including all the fixtures, doors, and some iron lamps commissioned from local craftspeople.

Furniture that Serafini and Palomba designed for Zanotta dominates the living room. Pianoalto, a modular seating system, which was just introduced in 2012, is arranged in various configurations throughout the space. Ninfea and Loto—two indoor-outdoor tables created from a composite material of polyester and acrylic resins called Cristalplantare easily moved to the outdoor patio or upstairs terrace. In one corner, the couple took one of their classics, the Lama chaise longue, and transformed it from city-slick steel and leather to countrycozy straw and red metal. Stone floors throughout the house are punctuated with Karpeta rugs, not of their design.

In the kitchen, the couple artfully adapted to the existing space,

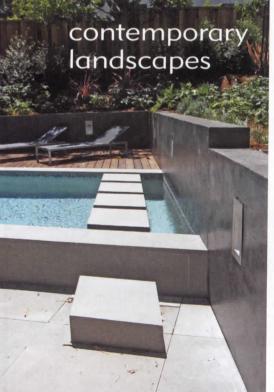

Driade, but they easily command the space. The overscale seat, dubbed the Grand Plié, accommodates four people comfortably-it's almost eight feet long. It's paired with the Piaffé table. (All the objects in this collection are named for dressage poses, and not coincidentally-Palomba is an avid rider.) Upstairs, the terrace is furnished with pieces that the pair designed for Exteta.

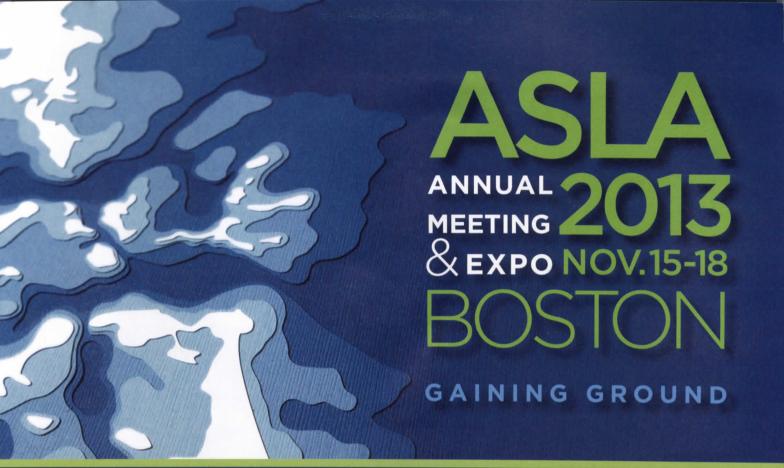
The stark bathrooms masterfully exploit the existing spaces and are fitted with Palomba designs—hardware fixtures for Zucchetti and washbasins for Kos. The one exception is the oversize stone bathtub from Pimar, a company located in Lecce, a neighboring town in Puglia. "As stone is a key element in this building, we preferred to have a bathtub that was in key with the environmentwe thought that this one was perfect," Serafini explains.

Although the house is rather far from Milan, that doesn't present a travel problem. "We spend a few weeks there during the summertime," says Serafini. "But we go often on weekends during the year. It's our buen retiro."

## A Family Affair

Green Orchard, the home Paul Archer designed for his parents outside Bristol, England, sows the seeds of an active retirement.



Architect Paul Archer has made a career of adapting and extending historic English houses for dozens of clients in and around London. But when his mother and stepfather decided to move out of their 17th-century stone farmhouse, they wanted him to start from scratch to achieve, as he puts it, "something modern and low-maintenance." Making a tall order more vertiginous still, they also wanted zero-carbon energy demands and to have plenty of space to garden.

Doing their bit, Fred and Edna Wadham found a peaceful site in a wooded village outside Bristol, in southwest England. There, Archer elected to put the house at the center of the lot and to place large windows facing the surrounding landscape in every direction. With the advice of his sister, Sally Merrett, an environmental scientist, and the engineers at Downie Consulting, Archer also installed a range of energy-saving solutions like thermally efficient glass for those big windows, specially designed shutters, heavy-duty insulation, a wood-burning

and electric stove, thermal and photovoltaic solar panels, and a heat-recovery ventilation system. Now the Wadhams, though still connected to the grid, give back more energy than they use.

The most prominent feature of the house is its striking exterior, covered in shining aluminum panels. This skin, though initially quite polished, will eventually weather and dull and is meant to help the house blend with the landscape by reflecting its leafy environs.

Now installed in their new home, the retired Wadhams are busy planting seven types of garden (from bog to floral to vegetable patch), as well as entertaining friends and family in their light-filled, open-plan, indoor-outdoor spaces. "This was our dream house," says Edna of the design that takes best advantage of the natural setting while also working to preserve the environment. That it was a family effort makes it even more satisfying. As Fred puts it, "If you have clever children, you might as well put them to good use."

Sliding aluminum panels on the facade of Green Orchard not only mirror the local flora, they also allow residents Fred and Edna Wadham to control how much sunlight enters their 2,150-square-foot home.

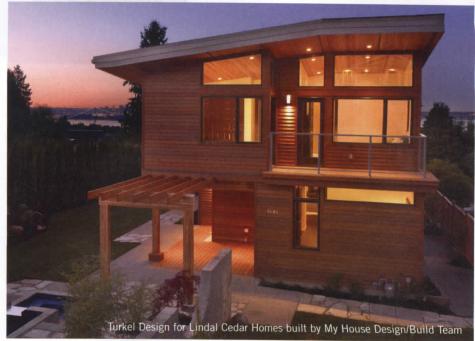

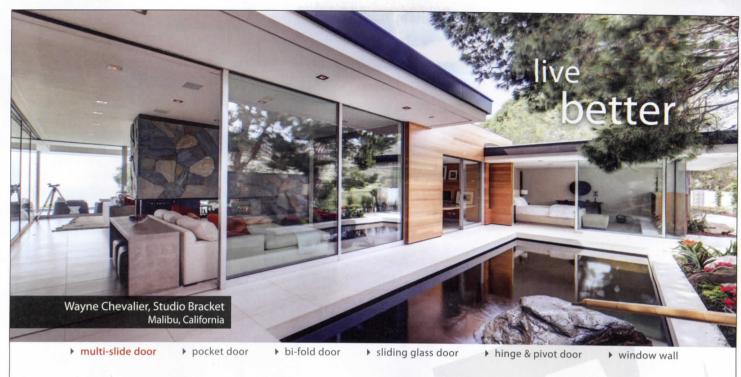

Using wood for heat and energy keeps the Wadhams' environmental footprint small and helps avoid the use of coal- or nuclear-powered electricity. Come winter, the couple relies on an Esse wood-burning stove for cooking, heating, and feeding a set of small radiators. In summer, they use the stove's electric component, which is powered by solar energy. esse.com

#### **Going Underground**

The site the Wadhams found for their home was designated as "green belt" land, which meant that there were restrictions on the size of the structure's footprint. Because it's critical for the pair to live on a single floor, especially as they grow older, Archer tucked the home's three guest rooms-vital for four visiting children and eight grandchildren-all belowground. Not only does that keep the home's layout trim, but with the living spaces and master bedroom at ground level, the couple will be able to stay in the house for longer, getting more use out of the energy and resources expended to build it.

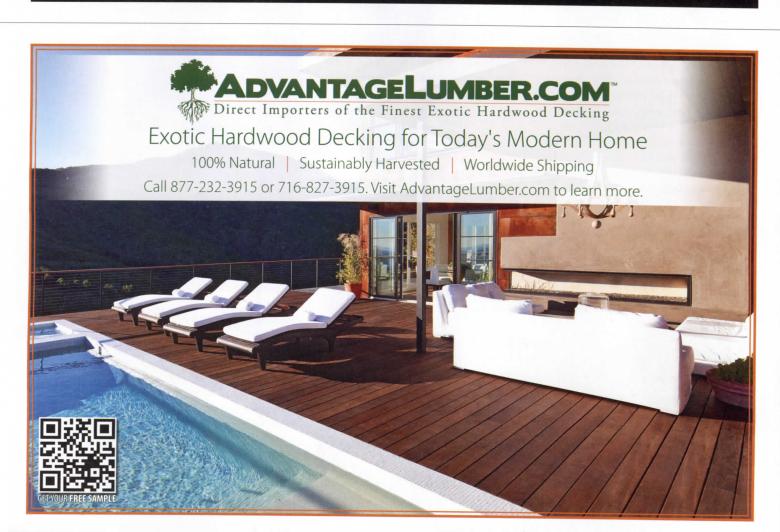

"We installed our first one some years ago," says Archer of heat-recovery ventilation systems, "and it was an enormous box the size of a small shower room. Nowadays, you can get a mechanism that is only slightly bigger than a toaster and is very costeffective." Here, Archer installed a rooftop heat-exchanger mechanism by Vent-Axia that transforms heat from the stale air being drawn out of the house into fresh air, which is then distributed inside. vent-axia.com

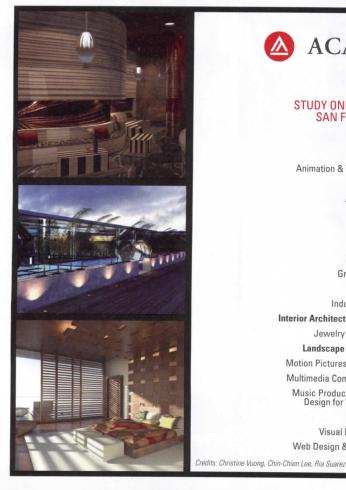

## East Side Story

#### After nearly a year and a half of house hunting,

Jayma Mays and Adam Campbell decided to make a Los Feliz abode in need of an overhaul their first home. By paring the 1920s Spanish colonial house back to its essentials and adding a well-selected group of mid-century and contemporary furniture, the couple created a showpiece of Southern California living.

"We literally had no furniture so we were starting from scratch," says Campbell. "We thought: Let's give it a go ourselves, and if it looks disastrous then we'll think about using an interior designer."

The medley of vintage and contemporary furniture, design-shop purchases, and lucky Internet finds occupying the four-bedroom, three-and-a-half-bathroom, 3,200-square-foot residence renovated by architect Mike Jacobs is indicative of the couple's casual sensibility.

"We wanted to find things that caught our eye and, more than anything, weren't boring," says Mays, who currently stars as guidance counselor Emma Pillsbury on the TV show Glee. The residents furnished the great room—newly created after knocking down a few walls—with a mid-century Danish sofa, a rug by Scholten & Baijings for Hay, a Pure dining table from CB2, and Verner Panton chairs found on Craigslist.

Just as surely as aesthetics guided their furniture purchases, so did a limited budget. "Once you've done a remodel, you feel particularly exhausted in terms of 'Wow, that's the most expensive thing we've ever bought in our lives," says Campbell. "If we could find some really nice vintage pieces, we were totally happy to throw in some Ikea pieces."

"We needed furniture that was practical. Delicate, highly valuable pieces just wouldn't work for us as we're constantly moving things around to make room for parties and boisterous friends," says Mays, who frequently entertains and is an avid chef.

"There was one new couch that Jayma was obsessed with," says Campbell. "It was probably the price of a car. And she kept looking at it and thinking, Do we buy this? The budget forced us to be a bit more creative. I think ultimately it worked out much better than if we had spent a lot of money on high-end stuff because it would look a bit less 'us."

The pair scoured vintage shops and flea markets for furniture, lighting, and accessories. "It was a lot of trial and error," says Mays. For example, she and Campbell initially selected lounge chairs for the newly hardscaped patio but soon realized that they needed a place to eat more than they needed a spot to recline in the sun. An old beer garden-style table and benches, purchased from local store Potted, allows for dining alfresco.

In the master bedroom, Mays splurged on a custom bed from Croft House, which has become part of the retailer's furniture line and is now called the Jayma Platform Bed—"My claim to fame," jokes Mays. She covered the wall behind the bed with designer Erica Wakerly's Angles wallpaper in cream and gold, which "became the focal point. I found that by doing little things like that, the room didn't need as much stuff in it," she reports.

Just as the furniture is a mixture of past and present, so is the house that inspired the collection. "Mike created an open space with clean lines, so ▶







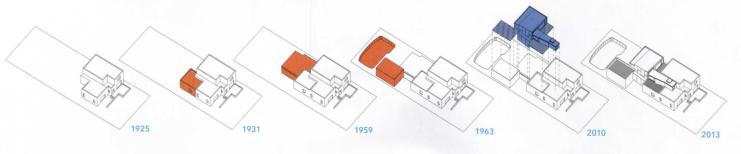

we selected furniture that wouldn't disrupt that," says Mays of how she and Campbell unified the interiors and the architecture.

The couple gave Jacobs few guidelines for the renovation—add a bedroom, find a way to let in more natural light, and reconfigure the downstairs—and relied on the architect's eye to coax out the structure's best elements. "We asked Mike: 'Can you try and make this house less schizophrenic and give it an identity?'" says Campbell.

"It read as a big puzzle," says Jacobs of the dim, disjointed layout. The house was built in 1925 and had three decades worth of additions stitched on. He preserved key architectural details of the original house—the heavy plaster moldings, the cast-iron handrail leading to the second level—and in the more recent sections, he removed walls to hollow out an expansive living-dining-kitchen area, increased the size of the second story, and added a raft of roof decks.

Though the journey of searching, buying, permitting, renovating, and furnishing the house took years, Mays and Campbell now have a place that pays homage to its history but is tailored to their tastes and lifestyle. "I feel that our furniture reflects the marriage of both old and new," Mays offers, "and hopefully does so with a bit of levity and color." IIII

Even the quickest visit to Jean-Christophe Aumas's 10th-arrondissement flat in Paris immediately divulges a pulse-quickening array of influences: Here it's flashy interior designer David Hicks, there sunbaked California, there Gio Ponti. Whatever whimsical drama Aumas has conjured in his home, a fun house of carefully curated bric-a-brac, splashes of unexpected color, and rare vintage furniture, he's come by it honestly. As the artistic director of the creative agency Voici-Voilà, he designs store windows

and special events for the likes of Louis Vuitton, John Galliano, Lacoste, Céline, and others. For Galliano, he once filled a window with a gigantic wave of shredded paper, and a display at the French department store Printemps involved live birds and sheep. The woolly quadrupeds were apparently well-behaved. "The only problem was they left the droppings absolutely everywhere," he recalls.

Though Aumas's kaleidoscopic 1,023-square-foot apartment may lack the scale of his professional projects, the surprising unity of the space's design and decor, done entirely by Aumas himself, reveals a master's hand—and the blurring of his professional and personal design pursuits. A number of colored cubes, created for a Sol LeWitt-themed Louis Vuitton display, are scattered across the living room floor, not far from a vintage Swan sofa by Arne Jacobsen.

A Brick screen by Eileen Gray for Aram hides a tiny office. Color abounds almost everywhere







you look. In the living room, Aumas has painted one wall black with three blue triangles in the top right corner. Another wall is adorned with a pink rectangle underlined in yellow, a complimentary work of art by Aumas, and an eyeliner stroke of black that runs just beneath the cornice. "I like it when things are framed," he explains. "It's a trick I use a lot in my window displays."

Ten years ago, Aumas was walking past and saw a for-sale sign out front of the building that once played home to royal stables under Louis XVI and that sits across the street from poet Paul Verlaine's old abode. "A lady had lived there all her life," he recalls. "There was carpet on the floor and really horrible wallpaper." Still, he was immediately attracted by the generous ceiling height and the space's typical Parisian charm. He promptly set about preserving as much as possible of the latter while giving the space a makeover. Doing the design and much of the work himself, Aumas opened up the apartment to allow natural light to flood the rooms and replaced a solid wall in the bedroom with a glass partition. He also sought to preserve the herringbone parquet floor and original terra-cotta tiles (a number of which were simply painted black or replaced with geometric cement substitutes). The present-day kitchen was largely etched out of a guest room, and a former corridor became a walk-in closet.

The entry leads directly into the kitchen, where Aumas has created an installation of vine-like light fixtures, which he compares to a spider's web. Move into the living room and find just the sort of playful vignette that abounds here: A stuffed fawn stands in front of the fireplace next to a disco ball and a pile of logs, whose ends the designer has randomly painted a host of

bright hues. The photos on the walls are works by Aumas himself, and little knickknacks seem to get the same care as the oh-so-1970s brass dining table and chairs. A truly omnivorous design fan, Aumas ultimately places far less weight on boldfaced-names and storied manufacturers than on the piece itself. "I don't care whether something is from a well-known brand or not," he insists. "I can just as easily be drawn to something I find in the street as to something that costs a lot of money."

Perhaps the most fertile ground for Aumas's whirling collection of stuff is its owner's travels. In the living room is a coffee table acquired in Palm Springs, California; a rock crystal from Los Angeles; a resin apple he picked up in Tokyo. More than anywhere else, though, Aumas loves the hunting in Belgium. The Charlotte Perriand stools in the kitchen were unearthed in Antwerp, the dining chairs are from the showroom Dune 234 in Brussels, and a giant photographer's lamp comes from the Jeu de Balle flea market in the same city. So as not to live entirely in the past, Aumas has added into the mix more recent designs, like Tom Dixon's Slab coffee table and a golden, Formica console table of his own devising in his office area.

"I look upon my apartment as a laboratory," Aumas says. "I can buy a new piece of furniture and rearrange everything around it." Ever in a state of transforming his home, Aumas recently ordered a minimalist

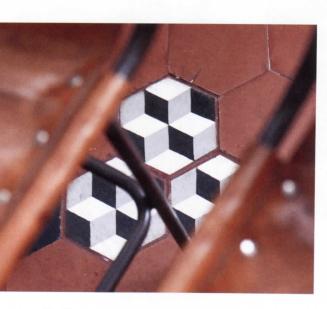
black leather sofa from the Italian brand Progetto Domestico and is even contemplating a more serious overhaul. "I want something more conceptual and pared down," he reports. Just how spare the result will be is anybody's guess. As Aumas himself admits, "The problem is that I really love objects!"

Aumas outfitted a vintage steel-frame sofa by George Nelson in navy blue fabric from Kvadrat and hung one of his own photos just above it (opposite). The lamp to the left of the sofa is a 1960s design found at a Lisbon flea market, and to the right of the sofa is a Two-Arms rotating sconce by the mid-century French designer Serge Mouille.

Another pair of vignettes (right and above) shows off what Aumas does best. In one, he takes advantage of the apartment's tall windows, and in the other, he pairs a stuffed fawn from the Parisian store Design et Nature with a disco ball he used in a window display. Aumas added a few new cement tiles to shore up the kitchen floor (below).





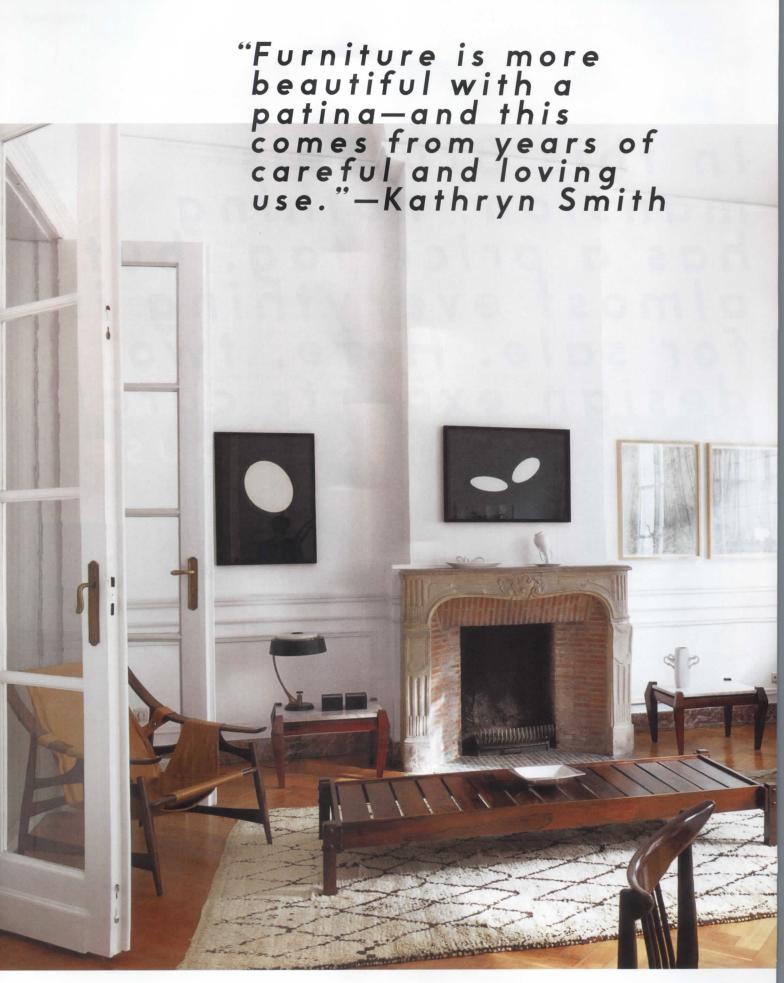

Project: Ampersand House Location: Brussels, Belgium In this Brussels mansion, nothing has a price tag, but almost everything is for sale. Here, two design experts curate their fantasy house.

In 2010, Ike Udechuku and Kathryn Smith moved into a neoclassical house in the Saint-Gilles district (opposite) and set out to create what Udechuku calls "a gallery of the living experience." Several times a year, they partner with European galleries in presenting rare and choice furniture, objects, and art in their home. They live with the items they borrow—eating breakfast at a one-of-a-kind Danish dining table, sipping wine on an iconic sofa—and welcome collectors and visitors into their home to experience (and purchase) design icons in situ. "These pieces are intended by their makers to be used, not to be in a museum," says Udechuku. Here, Smith sits on a vintage rosewood bench designed by the Swiss-born British architect Richard Seifert.





Udechuku and Smith used to work in law and finance, but they now primarily serve as design advisors, chasing down unique vintage pieces and creating "eclectic personalized looks" for clients' homes all over Europe. Their own residence, Ampersand House, epitomizes their aesthetic and approach, but Udechuku is quick to point out that it is foremost "a place to live, work, and entertain—not a showroom or shop. It seems almost incidental that we routinely sell the pieces around us."

The couple changes out the furnishings, objects, and artwork in their home up to three times per year, sending purchased items to collectors and returning pieces that didn't sell to the partner gallery that loaned them. A recent exhibition, <code>Brazilian Modern: Masters of Style</code>, paired masterpieces of mid-century Brazilian furniture design, borrowed from the Milan gallery BE Modern, with some of the country's most exciting contemporary art and design. On view in the soaring atrium (<code>below</code>) are a jacaranda high board from the 1960s, a chrome and glass lamp from Italy, a black leather chair and footstool by Sergio Rodrigues, a Berber rug, and a pair of photographs by the Brazilian artist Luiz Braga.

The drawing room (**left**), the couple's principal entertaining space, contains many highlights of the exhibition, including two Tonico lounge chairs by Sergio Rodrigues; a jacaranda bench by Alberto Reis; a leather-and-rosewood sling chair fabricated by Liceu de Artes e Oficios de São Paulo; and drawings by the contemporary Brazilian artist Paulo Climachauska.

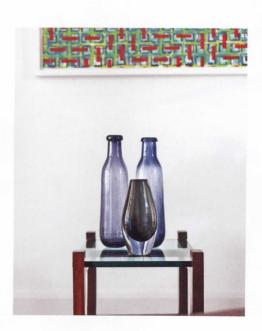




"Mid-century Brazilian furniture is a revelation," says Smith. "Many of the influential designers of this period emigrated from Europe to Brazil, seeing it as the land of the future. They encountered distinctive materials, techniques, and traditions, and through these particular circumstances evolved a coherent new school of design."

When curating the rooms throughout their house, Udechuku and Smith mix borrowed pieces related to the temporary exhibition—such as the playful sculptural lamps crafted from found materials (opposite) by Brazilian artist Rodrigo Almeida—with vintage American and European classics from their personal collection, such as a Florence Knoll sofa designed in 1954 and newly reupholstered in a yellow Kvadrat fabric; a stack of 1955 Grand Prix chairs by Arne Jacobsen (left); glass pieces by Gunnel Sahlin for Kosta Boda (below left); and a 1959 teak-framed nine-foot-long SW 50-4 sofa by Illum Wikkelsø for the Danish furniture company Søren Willadsen (below right).

This September, Ampersand's focus will shift to Belgium and the Netherlands, and the house will showcase select objects and furnishings made since World War II.  $\Vdash$

# Prouvé Passion

An exhibition showcasing the ins and outs of Jean Prouvé's industrial design aesthetic is the final word on the French master's legacy.



# French designer and engineer Jean

Prouvé self-identified as a factory worker rather than as an aesthete. The elegant lines of his chairs, tables, desks, shelving, and lighting, which he produced in mass quantities from 1929 until the early 1950s, are testaments to his innate skills in furniture design.

Prouvé's reputation as a master of everyday furnishings experienced a renewed interest in the late 1980s, when Parisian gallerist Patrick Seguin began snapping up and selling his pieces, initially produced for schools and factories. His first Prouvé purchase was a set of Standard chairs, and he kept collecting out of respect for the designer's visionary modernism, which unites form and function. "The essence of his work consists of an almost crude structural logic that's beautiful in its simplicity," says Seguin.

Lauding Prouvé's legacy and Seguin's foresight is an exhibition at the Pinacoteca Giovanni e Marella Agnelli in Turin, Italy, which runs through September 8, 2013. A Passion for Jean Prouvé highlights 40 rarities from Patrick and Laurence Seguin's personal collection, along with the prefabricated Maison Aluminium Métropole, which was assembled on-site over six days. —Kelsey Keith IIII

# "There is no difference between building furniture and building a house." —Designer Jean Prouvé

After World War II, the Ateliers Jean Prouvé reinvigorated their research into "demountables," a new type of assembly-required chair akin to what we might call "flat pack" today. The Demountable chair CB22 (above and near right) resembles Prouvé's Standard chair from 1930 (far right) quite closely. Gallerist and

collector Patrick Seguin relates this era of industrial design to Prouvé's similar efforts in prefab architecture: "Like his houses, kit-manufactured and ready to be inhabited, this piece [CB22] seemed utopian back then. Today it looks like an ideological, social, and political future."
