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
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# This special issue is devoted to finding, giving, and appreciating design objects.




# **Finnish Lines**

Design enthusiast and Alvar Aalto expert Juhani Lemmetti has transitioned his love of vintage Finnish furniture into a thriving shop in Helsinki.

### Nestled in a Helsinki basement lies

vintage furniture shop Artek 2nd Cycle. With worn corners, chipped paint, and overflowing piles of Alvar Aalto stools greeting the visitor at the entrance, Artek 2nd Cycle is a bit rougher than its polished counterpart, Artek. The 2,400-square-foot concept store, which opened in October 2011, specializes in midcentury wares, much of it purchased at estate sales around Finland. The store is located just around the corner from the Artek flagship showroom. Many of the items at Artek 2nd Cycle originate from designers such as Ilmari Tapiovaara, Arne Jacobsen, and Charles and Ray Eames, with special attention

to selections by Alvar Aalto, who founded Artek in 1935 along with Aino Aalto, Maire Gullichsen, and Nils-Gustav Hahl. The shop also has glass, silver, ceramics, and lighting fixtures. Led by seasoned vintage collector and Artek development director Juhani Lemmetti, Artek 2nd Cycle aims to refurbish classic designs for a new generation to enjoy. "One of the best parts of Artek 2nd Cycle is that we see young couples come into our shop, and they want to buy the exact same furniture that their grandparents used to have," Lemmetti says. He discusses how Artek 2nd Cycle originated and the importance of good design beyond the home.

# How did you discover your passion for vintage furniture?

Lemmetti: I traveled extensively when I was younger, and after visiting countless museums abroad, I realized the importance of Finnish design in the larger context of history. I began collecting native Finnish 17th- through 19th-century furniture. All of those original pieces were well designed—but they were created by craftsmen, shaped by function and experience, not necessarily by "designers." I am a very aesthetic person. I have only a good eye and a good singing voice. The rest is destiny.

What is the goal of Artek 2nd Cycle? Lemmetti: To extend the life of products. Our philosophy is about sustainability and timelessness, which is shown through our items that have served many generations well. Not everyone comes in for the sole purpose of buying something. Some people know everything about design and furniture, but we like to help enlighten the regular folks, who can influence the world a bit with their choices.

### What is the criteria?

Lemmetti: Since the very beginning, Aalto's pieces have been accessible and affordable for the masses. It was part of his philosophy to make everyday life better for regular people, and he was a pioneer for sustainability before everyone was talking about it. We sell very high-quality pieces, and many architects and interior designers come to us





asking for 100 units of the Aalto Chair 69. If the chairs are newly manufactured, they feel cold. But after a fresh coat of paint, these chairs are warmer and feel like home.

You have a strong personal connection with Aalto's work. Is there a specific piece that's important to you? Lemmetti: In terms of architecture, I must say Aalto's Villa Mairea in Noormarkku, Finland, because it mixes Bauhaus functionality with pure Finnish nature. As for furniture, I have two favorite pieces. At first it was the Paimio armchair in birch. But now I am starting to enjoy the three-legged Stool 60 more. It's so simple, and you can use it as both a stool and a table. If you want the Spartan lifestyle, all you need is a bed, a candle, and a three-legged stool.

How do you define good design? Lemmetti: Good design is not snobby. Good design is about function. People often speak of design as a big, impossible, unbelievable concept. Many designers today think only of novelty, instead of concentrating on designing better environments. We have too much stuff nowadays, and no one cares if you design the most unique, expensive teacup in the world. The design industry is clearly competitive, as evidenced by the thousands of new chairs on the market every year. But why aren't there enough viable solutions to traffic, housing, and holistic life issues? Designers have a lot to give in those areas.

How has Artek 2nd Cycle evolved? Lemmetti: We feel that we give the tools to the public, and the public makes the decisions. Our space is not small, so when people come, they can spend a few hours here. We hold some programs, including lectures about furniture history, Aalto, Tapiovaara, and sustainable development. We aim to grow, yet continue to maintain a connection to our Finnish roots.

# **Continuing Education**

Business as usual for ReForm School founders Billie Lopez and Tootie Maldonado means far more than simply managing their popular Los Angeles shop.



Whether exploring thrift stores for vintage finds, hosting workshops, or planning field trips to test out a new DIY-canoe kit, Tootie Maldonado and Billie Lopez successfully share their passion for unique goods with local (and loyal) customers and artists. With the addition of an online store, class is now in session for the rest of us, too.

# What are your criteria for selecting an item to sell?

**Lopez:** We want to agree on all the items, but there have been a few occasions where...

Maldonado: ...one of us has to nudge the other one.

**Lopez:** We try to look for things that really merge art, craft, and design.

How do you source your products? Lopez: We go to design and craft shows, but online is where we have the most luck. The Internet is a treasure trove. We'll find one artist's website, and they'll link to other artists they like, and then we just keep clicking through from link to link.

What's your most recent purchase? Lopez: We just bought these amazing Amish-made scooters for the shop. They're functional and look great.





Tootie Maldonado and Billie Lopez have been friends since high school, but it was their years of shopping trips together after graduation that inspired them to open ReForm School (far left). Now that browsing and buying are part of the job, they're able to stock the shelves with items that they would love to own.

Building a community around design was important for Maldonado and Lopez, and ReForm School has become a neighborhood institution promoting craft and artisan goods, such as a textile mobile from Hillery Sproatt (near left), Tanya Aguiñiga's Soft Rocks (below), and a scooter made in Pennsylvania using traditional Amish methods (bottom).

Maldonado: We can envision our customers scooting by on their way to the farmers' market.

What's your favorite item you sell? Lopez: When people buy the *We Are* So Good Together print, it means that they're in a nice place in their life.

# Is there an object that changed the way you think about design?

Maldonado: I grew up with handmade design. My aunts made dolls for my cousins and me, and when I was young I'd sit with my grandmother and watch soap operas—her "stories"—and we'd crochet to keep me busy and quiet.

# Why is Silver Lake a good place for a design store?

Lopez: We could not have picked a better location. A lot of the artists we work with started out as regular customers. It's a very close-knit community and has probably inspired us more than we even realize.

# What young designers or artists are you watching?

Maldonado: Tanya Aguiñiga is on the verge of something huge. This girl is incredible; she's known for her furniture, but we carry her Soft Rocks.

She can do anything. And Esther Derkx makes wonderful repurposed crockery. Lopez: Maxine Sutton, an artist from the UK, is making some little trinkets and kits that we're very excited about. I love Ayumi Horie's pottery, and Lorena Barrezueta does cool ceramic take-out ware. Mixed-media artist Hillery Sproatt pays such close attention to detail in every single thing that she makes, no matter how small the item.

# How has the market changed since you opened the store?

Lopez: There's a better understanding of the whole concept behind handmade goods. People appreciate the work that goes into the products and that sometimes it might cost a little more than something mass-produced.

# What's next for ReForm School? Lopez: We have always wanted our shop to have an interactive community feel, with more layers to it than the basic retailer-customer connection. Maldonado: We have got so many little

crazy ideas. □





# **The Cheap Seats**

A good chair needn't cost an arm and a leg. Read our dispatch on the best picks in the house.

There are lots of handsome chairs out there, but sitting beauties that cost approximately \$300 or less are a rarer breed. Our picks run the gamut from traditional (the wooden, Shaker-inspired Salt) to the downright futuristic (we're looking at you, oddly anthropomorphic Dr. Yes). We sat, swayed, shook, stacked; we hefted them into the air; we typed, ate, and made grand conversational hand gestures. Here's how they stood up in our sitting showdown.>

Salt by Design Within Reach, from \$109 dwr.com

lends an impression of solidity without adding heft: The chair weighs fewer than eight pounds. The slim profile and footprint makes it ideal for small spaces.

piece comes to a sharp point; wild gesticulations may result in dented triceps. And, despite the seat's carved-out imprint, those on either (rear) end of the spectrum may be bummed out.



Dr. Yes by Philippe Starck for Kartell, \$440 for a set of two kartellstorela.com

Pros The Dr. Yes is no shrinking violet; the bold, sweeping profile makes a big statement in any room. We love the contrast between the glossy exterior and matte interior, and the texture of the seat keeps

spindly, tapering legs give the chair a fair amount of torque and swivel. It's also oddly tall: Despite the dip in the seat rim, shorter people's legs will dangle.

your glutes glued.



Real Good by Blu Dot, \$149 bludot.com

means it's cheaper and more environmentally friendly to ship. Plus you can fit a whole set in your car. Assembly is a DIY-ers dream: Fold the powdercoated steel along perforated laser cuts.

cons Though 16 pounds doesn't sound like much, its angular shape is unwieldy. The downside to hands-on assembly: When the paint chips, there's no one to blame but yourself.



Era Chair by Michael Thonet for the TON Factory, \$165-\$189 dwr.com

bentwood chair, evoking romantic visions of Paris sidewalk cafes. It comes in brown, white, and black, as well as a gutsier fire-engine red. It's super lightweight—it's fewer than eight pounds!

EONS From a distance, Era looks great, but close up, some of the details feel crude, namely a flimsy seat with a ridge along the edge and exposed screw heads. Did value-engineering price out wood plugs?

encourages good posture without compromising comfort, and the 25-inchwide seat is generous. In addition to red, white, and black, it comes in a transparent version—a smart way to add seating without cluttering a room.

EONS The high-gloss finish is a magnet for dust and will easily scratch. Due to their shiny, sharply curved profiles, our elbows kept slipping off the armrests.

polypropylene-and-glass-fiber chairs are ideal for outdoor use; they're stackable and each has a cutout that ensures the seat won't gather puddles. They come in ten colors, from fuchsia to beige.

all: The low back hits short folks right below the shoulder blades, discouraging reclining. They only come in sets of four—a bummer if you seek a singleton.

it, we'll say it again: It costs \$49. The lightweight aluminum chair is stackable, and holes in the seat allow water to drain off.

cons Aluminum isn't the cushiest selection when stuck at an hours-long family barbecue. While we are biased, lkea instructions, though fairly simple for this chair, could benefit from a word or two.

high and tapers toward the top, providing clearance for your elbows—useful if you're at a computer or a worktable. It's stackable and "gangable"—you can clip them to create rows.


propylene plastic is environmentally-friendly, but it lacks the tactile appeal of a fiberglass seat. The new eco-fiberglass version will patina beautifully, but has a hefty price tag of \$400.

and more than 80 different Knoll fabrics for the cushion, this baby is extremely customizable and comfortable, thanks to the padded seat and gently curved back. It's also available without a seat pad.

CONS The seat pad isn't removable or retrofittable, so pick your pattern wisely: There's no changing it out when you get bored—or tipsy with your red wine. □



# How to Shop for a Sofa

Down cushions? Hardwood frame? New York City interior designer Timothy Brown gives us a quick tutorial on what to inspect when you're inspecting.

### **Cushion the Blow**

I prefer foam-wrapped cushions with some down. The down is soft, and the foam retains the cushion's shape. With pure down, the cushion needs to be fluffed every time you get out of your seat and it looks sloppy.

### Frame Game

Skip plywood or particleboard and look for a hardwood frame with eight-way hand-tied springs (all the springs are tied together, more evenly distributing the weight of the sitter).

### **Going Vintage**

The shape is what really matters here. The fabric, in 99 percent of cases, will be changed, and the insides will be replaced with fresh down and foam. If the shape is good, a little work and the sofa is like new.

### **Up with Upholstery**

Natural fabrics are best, and I also prefer neutral fabrics on sofas. This purchase will stick around for years, and the last thing you want is to be saddled with a pink floral sofa to work around. >

One would be hard-pressed to think of another piece of distinct, groovy, polarizing design that has experienced the unmitigated success of the Togo. Ducaroy was known to describe his creation as a "tube of toothpaste folded"

over on itself like a stovepipe and closed at both ends." This low-slung, cocooned style of seating helped usher in a new mode of sofa that is still fresh today. Ligne Roset president Pierre Roset says that the "creative, anticonformist, and comfortable" Togo was far ahead of its time, forging a typology that fits into a variety of modern homes. "It offers much flexibility," he says. "It's easy to move, robust, amazingly comfortable, and looks timeless." ligne-roset-usa.com>

The canon of modern couches already has a pair of Eameses, but it took a small clutch of Italian furniture mavens to create the Charles. Antonio Citterio's 1997 design for B&B Italia is now well into its second decade of popularity, with a pair of successful updates-2003's deeper Charles Large and 2010's polypropylene Charles Outdoor—already on the books. "I try not to copy but to perceive and assimilate aspects specific to the work of great masters," says Citterio of the Charles's nod to the Eameses, but he notes that the similarities between his sofa and the couple's midcentury designs "are more in spirit than in fact."

Citterio has designed many sofas at this point, not only for B&B Italia but for storied brands like Vitra and Flexform as well; standouts include the Suita (2010) and the Wing (2014), respectively. Though he was already decades into a glittering career of sofa design, Citterio confirmed his mastery of the form with the Charles's slim, strong frame, long seat cushion, aluminum corner supports, and suite of free pillows.

Today, the Charles remains one of B&B Italia's best-selling pieces—so much so that its inevitable mate, the Ray, arrived in 2012. "Like Charles, the Ray is a modular system, which starts with a linear element that can be extended to include chaises longues, end pieces, and ottomans," Citterio says.

# **Austria Hungry**

Two Viennese expats open a New York City shop stocked with furniture, lighting, and accessories from their home country and beyond.

Austria, Germany, Switzerland, and the Czech Republic, lies one block south of New York City's bustling Canal Street. The store and gallery, which opened in the fall of 2013, is a welcome addition to a city saturated with pieces from Italy and Scandinavia. Proprietors Anna and Michael Trubrig moved to Manhattan from Vienna in July 2013, she leaving a career in marketing and fine art importing, he a job in hedge fund management. The couple has since corralled a short list of historic manufacturers who are reinvigorating their inventories by enlisting fresh talent. We asked them how the new, vintage, and customizable wares they sell embody Austrian design.

# How would you characterize furniture design coming out of Austria and Germany?

Michael: It has a tendency to be a bit more "lean." The pieces begin with manufacturing techniques, seeing what's actually possible, then going toward the design. The designers and manufacturers we work with are interested in the whole process.

Anna: The focus is on functionality and sustainability. It's a very Austrian thing to work with natural materials like wood, stone, glass, and silver.



## How do the manufacturers reflect the present day while still holding true to their heritage?

Anna: People our age have taken over the family-owned businesses and manufacturers, like J. & L. Lobmeyr [a glass company] and Mühlbauer [a hat maker]. Augarten, a nearly 300-year-old porcelain manufacturer, had a tradition of introducing young designers. Back in the 1920s, young designers at the forefront of Germany and Europe made all of the china.

**Michael**: It's a business decision. People are not interested in buying the same things. You have to stick with your roots, but you have to change with the times.

What pieces represent this new take? Michael: Austrians like to use traditional materials but incorporate something new and experiment with the process. The Tram armchair by [Austrian designer Thomas Feichtner for Czech manufacturer] Ton is one of my favorites [below, right]. Its shape—a combination of bent and molded wood—is reminiscent of seats on the tram in Prague.

# How do you select pieces—both vintage and new—for the store?

Michael: We're drawn to pieces that strike us as special and beautiful. A home has a very different character if you have vintage pieces instead of all-new furniture. Anna: Aesthetics are one point, but we really like to have as much solid wood as possible in our furniture.

## Why is solid wood important?

Michael: It's durable. Take the Flaye table by Team 7—if you spill something on it, you can sand it down [to remove stains]. This is a table you can have for 50 years [below].

# How does the shop's look complement what you sell?

Anna: We worked with Nikolas Heep and Mia Kim on the ceiling. They are based in Vienna and have collaborated with Augarten and Lobmeyr. It's CNC-milled MDF painted gold, and it resembles the caning on the Viennese coffee chair. Michael hung it himself. People come in just to take pictures of it.

# Hecho en Oaxaca

An experimental shop in Oaxaca, Mexico, is resuscitating the region's ancient crafts traditions and bringing indigenous artisans' designs into the 21st century.

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According to Gustavo Fricke (standing, with Rosario Martinez Llaguno, center, and Roberto Vega, right), what distinguishes blackbox, the design shop he founded, is that "we have lots of soul. Many shops in Oaxaca buy goods cheaply and resell them for four to 20 times the price. That's exploitation. We want to be respectful of the makers."







Located in a colonial house on a cobblestone street in Oaxaca, blackbox (top) beckons with intriguing objects in the window and street art on the outside wall. Among the shop's best sellers are these woven wool bags (above). Industrial designer Gustavo Fricke

opened blackbox, a design boutique in downtown Oaxaca, in 2006, inspired by indigenous communities who "have inherited craft traditions that are older than Columbus." Fricke and other designers collaborate with local artisans to create stylish, contemporary objects in time-honored ways. By spotlighting native talent—from cities and villages alike—Fricke and shop managers Roberto Vega and Rosario Martinez Llaguno hope to provide a sustainable livelihood for Oaxaca's underemployed artists and craftspeople and, as Fricke says, "push their work forward."

## Why did you open blackbox?

Fricke: Each village outside Oaxaca has a crafts specialty—making black pottery, weaving wool, carving alebrijes [fantastical wooden figures]—and the artisans pass their skills down through the generations. But to cater to tourists' tastes, they started producing the same designs over and over again. I thought it would be interesting to collaborate with these artisans to use design as a tool for social improvement.

What's your overarching goal?

Fricke: To build trust and working relationships with these communities and give them a new channel for their work. I want the younger generation to feel proud of their skills, to realize: "Shit, man, this is cool and I made it. I learned this from my grandpa, and now this is giving me my bread."

And what's the biggest challenge?

Fricke: The indigenous people in Mexico have been betrayed all their lives. It takes time to prove we're worth their time. They still call me *güero*, or "blondie"—meaning an outsider.

### How has the shop evolved?

Fricke: It started with 12 products that I designed in collaboration with hand-crafters. Now it is open to more local designers, artists, and artisans. I moved to San Francisco in 2008 for graduate school, so Roberto and Rosario, young artists who founded the Lapiztola street art collective, have been running the shop day to day.

How do you define good design?

Fricke: Good design is when you strip all the designer BS away and you are able to experience the soul of an object.

# Can you give an example of a successful collaboration?

Fricke: I met my favorite artisan, Sergio Lazo, when he was in the city selling his woven wool bags. I went to his village, Teotitlan del Valle, and sat with his family in a circle; it was like having a meeting with a Cherokee chief. I pulled out a blueprint for a rug design—I had traced the shadows from a tree on a big piece of paper-and asked, "Can you make this?" I told him I was promising a relationship. They started talking in their indigenous language and then said okay. We've been working with his family ever since. Today he's so proud of his work that he signs every piece he makes. The challenge for us is to create more stories like that.

### What's next for blackbox?


Fricke: I want to establish a cooperative model of management, to open the responsibility and profit of the store to more people. I'm also designing two lamps made out of *carrizo* [a bamboolike material] for a crafts community in Papalutla, and I'm looking for more ceramic and glass objects to sell. □



The hallmark of a well-designed product is the big reveal.

## **A Creative Outlet**

With clever packaging, Bocci turns a humble electrical outlet into a design statement.

As a designer, Omer Arbel strives to express a pure idea in the architectural spaces and products he creates. The 22 series outlet by Bocci, the Vancouverbased design and manufacturing house for which Arbel is the creative director, arose from the challenge of introducing light switches, outlets, and other protrusions that he says degraded his spaces. "The outlet was the most aggressively ugly and offensive one," Arbel says. Unlike conventional outlets that have faceplates mounted on a wall, the 22 series sits flush with the surface. With the packaging for the 22 series Starter Kit, Arbel sought to challenge assumptions about what an outlet should be. "We hoped to establish the preciousness of the objects inside [the box]," he says. "Even though an outlet is a mundane and ordinary object, perhaps we ask the question, Maybe it isn't? Maybe it's actually a very worthwhile and precious thing, just like all the other elements that go into a good design."

Inspired by the considered way Japanese confections are boxed and presented, Arbel and his team created a package that gives users the feeling of opening a gift. The glossy white cardboard cube features a circular cutout on the lid that reveals a printed silhouette of the outlet, mimicking its appearance when installed. Inside, each component is neatly set into black foam cutouts. "The goal was to show the ultimate minimalist simplicity of the piece," Arbel says.

Arbel envisioned the 22 series fitting in among displays of Bocci's designs, which are typically sold in high-end shops. "In retrospect, it was a naive thing to do," he says. "Electrical contractors buy outlets. We were hoping that people would come directly from the construction site and burst into these perfect gallery-like spaces to buy this excessive starter kit. Our efforts fell on deaf ears." Recently, Bocci released a tamperresistant version of the 22 series, which is available through its website. bocci.ca >





## Well-Rounded

A Bluetooth speaker's cylindrical packaging communicates a 360-degree design message.



"We focus on emotional relevance," says Branko
Lukic, cofounder of the San Francisco-based product
design and branding studio Nonobject. "Beyond
satisfying functional needs, at the end of the day, no
matter what we tell ourselves, emotions determine
what resonates with us." Nonobject developed both
the product concept and packaging for Boom by
Ultimate Ears, a portable, water-resistant Bluetooth
speaker. It delivers sound in 360 degrees, an important quality that sets it apart in today's hypersaturated
small electronics market.

When it comes to packaging design in general, Lukic believes that his role is to focus on creating the right amount of protective elements to ensure that a product makes it from the manufacturer to your hands damage free, without using unnecessary materials. In the case of Boom, the additional challenges were making it a lust-worthy product and telling its story in the "most brilliant, most simple way," he says.

Like the speaker itself, the packaging is cylindrical in shape, a move that expresses the product's form and also gives it shelf appeal. Lukic finds the out-of-box experience—what designers call the process of unpacking a product—for most electronics to be a frustrating ordeal. We've all struggled with shrink-wrap, styrofoam peanuts, and confounding boxes that require special tools to open. Unpacking Broom's container is an entirely different experience. Lukic sought to remove all the barriers that typically come between people and their new electronics. "In some ways it appears like a jewelry box, where you open it and immediately see the product," he says. "You'd laugh if there was bubble wrap around a piece of jewelry." After the box is opened, it can be reused for storage instead of being tossed in the recycling bin. ultimateears.com>

#### Rebecca Finell started her namesake company

after earning her stripes in the baby products industry. Now she's focused on housewares and decorative objects geared toward a slightly different set: home entertainers who want modern, stylish, and unfussy items. Finell's hunt for a durable material that could withstand the hard knocks that often come with entertaining, but also boasts a luxurious feeling, led her to silicone, a material she uses for many of her products. It has a supple, velvety surface, can withstand heat, and won't break.

To reflect the products' materiality, Finell's boxes are coated with a substance that replicates the tactility of silicone. "Everything is considered, and we're always thinking about how to accomplish that 'wow' factor when you open the box," says Pearl Schenkel, Finell's graphic design manager. "We think about the senses and what you experience. Touch is very important. Upon immediate introduction to our product, we want to have the buyer really experience that. It's an important component of our packaging."

Many of Finell's products have multiple utilities, such as place mats, vessels, trays, and serving boards. Misfold, a hanging origami decoration shown here, acts as a sculptural accent or as a room divider. Schenkel and Finell sought to highlight its collapsed shape in the box and wrapped it with a black band and nothing else. "We always ask ourselves, 'Do we need this component on the layout? Do we need that element?" Schenkel says. The vessel itself is square, which offers room around Misfold to make it easier to pull out. The top lifts off like the lid of a hatbox. "You're waiting for the suction to release and the box to fall," Schenkel says. "Having that bit of tension as you're pulling the lid off is really important to us. It creates that sense of excitement." finell.co >

## That's a Wrap

For Vitsœ, the 621 side table and its packaging reflect the brand's ethic.

#### There's an old German saying that translates to

"Something has a hand and foot"—meaning it is thoroughly thought-out and developed. Vitsæ, the company Niels Vitsæ and Otto Zapf founded in 1959 to bring Dieter Rams's designs to market, embodies that philosophy, from its furniture to its packaging and its promotional materials (which often feature a hand and foot symbol designed by Wolfgang Schmidt). "In our experience, packaging holds more importance in communicating our service rather than our products," says Mark Adams, Vitsæ's managing director. "It should speak of care and attention to detail."

When Vitsœ introduced the 621 side table in 1962, Rams and Schmidt codesigned its box. The cardboard wrapped snugly around the table's form, and a carrying handle made it easy to transport. For the 2014 reissue (a vintage box is shown at right), the company simplified the design and made it more consistent with the rest of the present-day packaging. Vitsœ's designers filmed company employees unpacking the tables so they could identify potential problems and develop solutions. Made from recycled corrugated cardboard, the new box features a form and approach that mimics the original. Held together by a clever series of folds and tabs, the box conforms to the table's shape and needs no tape or staples, making it simple to reuse. "It conveys care, thoughtfulness, and accessibility," says Adams. "The 621 can be picked up from our shops and carried home. And a round cutout allows you to choose the correct color without the need for a label." There's less type on the new box, but all text is rendered in Univers font, which Vitsœ has been using for more than 50 years. On its top, a lone crimson hand symbol points to the first tab someone should open when unpacking the table. "Good packaging is self-explanatory, robust, and reusable," Adams says. vitsoe.com >

## What a Pill

A medicinal metaphor adds a dose of intrigue to a Bluetooth speaker's design.

"You could argue that music is like medicine—it makes you feel good," says Brett Wickens, a partner at Ammunition, the San Francisco firm that designed the Pill, a portable Bluetooth speaker by Beats Electronics. Ammunition's relationship with Beats began in 2006 when it developed the branding, identity, and products for the music company. Packaging was part of the initial conversations. "It was all thought about as one experience, an extension of the industrial design," Wickens says. "Good packaging design sets the expectations about a product."

For its small size, the speaker produces a robust sound—a quality Ammunition sought to convey. Its signature pill shape sparked the pharmaceutical connection, and Ammunition carried out the concept from the product design to the highly choreographed out-of-box experience. The speaker comes in a matte box that "brings a sense of depth and luxury to the color saturation," Wickens says. "In the retail environment, where you have pretty harsh lighting, reflective or glossier packaging could look cheap and distracting." Maintaining consistency with the brand's identity, Ammunition used Beats' red, black, and white colors and a custom typeface.

Upon removing the packaging's outer sleeve and lid, one is presented with a speaker suspended within a plastic blister pack. "Just like with medicine, you get the sense that you're liberating something very powerful," Wickens says. The cords and electrical cables are neatly coiled and wrapped with a simple black band featuring graphics that explain what the cords are for. Wickens points out that electronics packaging is often a letdown. "You open it up and there's a plastic bag, cardboard, or accessories floating around," he says. "We've always really studied the out-of-box experience and made sure it was a very well-understood process from a user's point of view." Beats' holistic approach has yielded a strong response from consumers and has caught the eye of Apple, which acquired the brand in August 2014 for \$3 billion. beatsbydre.com >





## **Just My Type**

Heath's latest collaboration with House Industries yields a clock whose box hints at the typographic treat inside.

#### Step inside Heath Ceramics' showrooms and

there's no mistaking what the company is known for: minimalist pottery that celebrates everyday moments such as drinking coffee, eating cereal, and, now, telling time. After a successful collaboration with House Industries on a series of address numbers, Heath began a conversation with the Delaware-based type foundry and design studio on a line of clocks.

"There was a great back and forth about what we could do with clay, what they could do with type, and finding the sweet spot in the middle that sings to both of those things," says Megan Sanguinetti, a graphic designer at Heath.

"We ended up keeping it very simple—letting the clay, glaze, and forms do all the talking," says Andy Cruz, House Industries' cofounder and art director.

Packaging was an early part of the design process, as Heath knew there would be a challenge in getting the seven-pound piece safely through shipping, stocking on retail shelves, and eventually travelling home with a customer. After testing various scenarios and experimenting with materials, including mushroombased foam, Sanguinetti and her team selected cardboard because it's recyclable, cost-effective, and sturdy. The box top is on a hinge and lifts up to reveal the clock. Little tape or glue is used, so buyers can repurpose the package. "The simplicity and the functionality immediately give you a sense of what our values are at Heath," Sanguinetti says.

To adorn the exterior, House Industries chose a pattern of numbers and punctuation marks rendered in Yorklyn Stencil, the custom typeface that House Industries developed for its clockfaces. "The box will rarely be seen after the clock goes up, but if it's found down the road, we wanted people to be excited about seeing House Industries' work on there," Cruz says.

Cruz also designed the poster-size hanging guide tucked inside every box—another element that speaks to the designers' meticulous attention to detail. "The whole experience—from the very moment of seeing it on store shelves to opening it to pulling it out and hanging it on the wall—needed to feel representative of the clock itself," Sanguinetti says. heathceramics.com >

## **Enough Said**

For the Finnish furniture company Artek, packaging is a medium for its message of enduring design.

Alvar Aalto designed the Stool 60 for Artek in 1933, and it's been in continuous production ever since. Its persistent appeal represents Artek's values of long-term durability, high-quality manufacturing, and clean formal language in furniture design. To relay those tenets, Artek worked with 358, a Finnish creative agency, on a branding campaign that extended to its packaging and marketing materials.

"When purchasing a product, it's the whole experience that matters, and packaging has a big role to play in this," says Marianne Goebl, Artek's global director. "Creating packaging that also functions as a medium was our goal."

The company ships its wares internationally, and flat-packing the stools fulfills many logistical requirements from the macro scale down to how people take them home. "It's the modern way of buying furniture," Goebl says. "The carry-away philosophy is about accessibility, and having a handle in the box was a very important part of the package." Artek opted to use cardboard as the main material because of its robustness and ability to be recycled.

One of the slogans the company developed in concert with 358 is emblazoned in black lettering on the white box, the monochromatic scheme being at the core of Artek's brand identity. One of the company's mantras, "One Chair Is Enough" is about being conscious of what you buy—a concept Goebl refers to as "a 'less is more' kind of thinking." When the campaign was developed, "you already started sensing that people were getting tired of fast consumption and started seeking more authentic design experiences," she says. This ethos is carried through to the type, which is Futura, a sans-serif font developed in the 1920s. "A new cut of Futura is popular today, but we insisted on keeping the original, paying tribute to Alvar Aalto, who used it in the first Artek logo," Goebl says.

One encounters few bells or whistles while unpacking the stool. Goebl points out that the first thing one sees when opening the box is a certificate of authenticity signed by the person who packed the product—a telling element of Artek's governing ethics. <a href="mailto:artek.fi">artek.fi</a>  $\square$

## Got Mjölk?

This Canadian duo searches out top Scandinavian and Japanese designs and brings their best finds back to their Toronto shop.

#### Juli Daoust and John Baker broke

the cardinal rule of retail when they opened Mjölk in 2009. "You're supposed to pick a name people can pronounce," Daoust says. Instead, the couple chose a moniker that pays homage to Nordic traditions and describes both the Scandinavian and Japanese design aesthetics the shop specializes in. Pronounced "mi-yelk," *mjölk* means "milk" in Swedish. "Sweden's Arla milk packaging has won a number of awards, and its design really stuck with us," Baker says. "The words that characterize milk are the same ones that describe

the two regions' design aesthetics: pure, simple, sensual." The store echoes those sensibilities with its crisp interiors and carefully curated items by artists that Daoust and Baker met on scouting trips to Japan and Sweden and its neighbors. Though it may seem a stretch at first, the items from abroad feel perfectly natural in the Toronto shop. "The climates and experiences in Japan and especially in Scandinavia are so similar to ours in Canada," Daoust says. "It's easy for us to connect with them." So while the name may be foreign, Mjölk's wares feel right at home.

#### What inspired you to open the shop?

Daoust: We're not painters, we're not makers. We are people who are creative in other ways, like being able to curate a shop. Plus, it's in John's blood. Baker: My grandpa had a hardware store


and a camera store. My dad manages a car dealership.

#### You opened in 2009 during tight economic times.

Baker: There's always a second coming of modern design in response to a recession: Alvar Aalto bent wood because steel became too expensive. Iittala simplified its designs because it was too costly to be ornate. We knew people were either going to buy the cheapest things possible or start looking at disposable products as unsustainable and begin investing in products for the long run.

#### What drew you to Toronto's Junction neighborhood?

Baker: Downtown became so expensive, and that pushed people either east or west. In the past several years, this area has really become a destination. A lot of young, independent businesses have popped up, starting with reclamation

stores Smash and Post and Beam. There's also Crema Coffee Co., Pandemonium Books & Discs, Junction Fromagerie (a Quebecois cheese shop), and Bunner's gluten-free vegan bakery, to name a few.

#### How do you select an item to sell?

Daoust: I'll be making something or getting dressed and wish I had a better can opener or a better shoehorn. Then I try to find the best one there is. Everything we put in the store is something we would want in our house. It all ends up upstairs in our apartment at some point.

#### How do you grapple with the common perception that foreign design costs more?

Daoust: We made our shop look too slick; everyone thinks everything is really expensive...

Baker: But we recently counted all the things in the store under \$100, and there are hundreds. It actually surprised us!

#### You worked with Christine Ho Ping Kong and Peter Tan of Studio Junction on the interior design; how was that collaboration?

Baker: A lot of our ideas for the store were things they had already executed. We wanted a curved wall, and they had

recently created one for an exhibition at the iconic Gladstone Hotel. After the show they said, "Why don't we use it in the store?" Christine and Peter are master manipulators: If you're seeing something that's not quite right, they'll help nudge you in the best way.

#### Why do you host exhibitions in the space?

Baker: Everything has a story. By having an artist come in during the exhibition, walk around, and talk to people, customers know if they buy one of his pieces, they're supporting this great designer who can continue to work. Japanese artist Oji Masanori signed the backs of plates for people when he was here. It was amazing.

#### What's next for the shop?

Baker: We went to Japan twice in a row to source products, and we also visit the Nordic countries-Iceland, Denmark, Sweden, Finland-often. Norway Says was one of our favorite design firms; we were so sad when they split in 2009. But from that split came two other companies—Andreas Engesvik and Anderssen & Vollthat are both doing amazing things. You can see it all on our redesigned website and online shop. □

## **Utah Bound**

At his shop in Salt Lake City, collector Ron Green supplies locals with a welcome, and well-priced, dose of modern design.



#### Despite its geographical separation

from midcentury hotbeds such as Chicago and Southern California, Salt Lake City has long been connected to modernism in the United States. After working closely with Frank Lloyd Wright as a draftsman, architect Taylor Woolley brought the Prairie style back to his native Utah in 1917. In 1952, John Sugden, who studied under Ludwig Mies van der Rohe and Ludwig Hilberseimer at the Illinois Institute of Technology, started his firm in Salt Lake City—bringing with him a new modern aesthetic that influenced local architects and homeowners for years to come.

As the movement gained a foothold in Utah, residents busily filled their homes with furniture to match. Years later, as the furniture faded in popularity, Ron Green frantically bought up as much of it as he could, reselling it to locals who shared his appreciation for midcentury design. That was nearly 15 years ago. Today at his shop, The Green Ant, Green continues to "try to keep stuff circulating in Salt Lake as much as possible. I've had the exact same piece come through my door four times, sold and bought and resold. It's all about spending locally, keeping our little economy going." That also means Green sells his finds for far less than do shops in bigger cities. "I try to match furniture prices to the cost of living here. I look at prices in L.A. and I just laugh."

#### You founded The Green Ant shop 16 years ago, long before modern made a comeback. Why?

Green: When I was in college, I bought and sold used furniture to supplement my little income. After I completed my degree in film, I spent five months without work. I thought to myself, What do I love more than anything in life? I had \$500 in my pocket and spent the next couple months buying vintage furniture and filling up a small retail space. I didn't even know the term "midcentury modern" back then, but I loved the lines and the look. It was only later that I learned about the designers.

#### What's great about used furniture?

Green: I love when furniture has a story to tell. My favorite question to ask people selling me furniture is "How did this get to Utah?" One of the LCWs I have in my house came from a woman who bought it in a small Utah town called Parowan in the '50s. She knew nothing about Eames or modern furniture, but she was short and small and liked the way it fit her. She paid \$56 for it, which she said was more than she had ever spent on a chair.

## What is one of your favorite pieces? Green: The coolest is probably the Warren Platner coffee table with four matching chairs, mostly because I don't

matching chairs, mostly because I don't see a full set very often. I have the table at home, and if I had room, I'd keep





the chairs. I think they are phenomenal, especially the evenness of the spacing on the wires. They are so intricate, they look like a CAD drawing.

#### Can you share some furnitureshopping advice?

Green: First, don't hurry—wait for the right piece. Second, when you see the right piece, buy it. If you hem and haw, it will be gone. Third, buy what you love, not what's popular. Get what speaks to you.

#### Do you have a favorite designer?

Green: There are two who are equal in my mind: Jean Prouvé and Poul Kjærholm. I couldn't say who I like better; they both trigger my brain differently. Prouvé was a very industrial designer, a workingman's designer, and his pieces are about function. The way that Kjærholm blends metal and leather is brilliant. On his PK22 chair, he makes metal look so elegant and thin, it nearly disappears. The proportions and scale are so right on.

## Where do you see The Green Ant in ten years?


Green: Honestly, not much will change. People are always asking when I'm going to open another store. I'm not. The simpler I can keep the business, the better it is for me. I like my lifestyle, and I don't want to make it more complicated than it is now. I'm not business oriented, I'm happiness oriented. □



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
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
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## **Bright Minds**

Renowned midcentury outdoor furniture designer Richard Schultz and his son, Peter, expound on how to best light the night. TEXT BY

The first real advances in the field of outdoor lighting came in the 1790s, when Scottish engineer William Murdoch figured out how to control ignited coal gas, thereby inventing the gaslight. Typically housed in a glass lantern, the gaslight brightened the thoroughfares of the 19th century. Beforehand, cities had relied on candles to offer nocturnal visibility, often enacting laws requiring those who lived in street-front houses to keep a flame burning through the evening. Later, electricity quickly rendered coal gas obsolete when Pavel Yablochkov introduced his Yablochkov Candle to the Parisian elite in 1878. Electric street lamps were born and promptly became de rigueur.

Stateside, arguably the greatest moment in the history of outdoor illumination came on May 24, 1935, at Crosley Field, then the home of the Cincinnati Reds. President Roosevelt flipped the switch from the Oval Office 600 miles away and 1,090,000 watts crackled to life, lighting the 632 lamps that kicked off the era of night baseball. By the mid-1960s, the majority of Major League games were played at night. The Chicago Cubs were the lone holdout, playing only day games at Wrigley Field until August 9, 1988.

While illuminating a ballgame is a feat few of us will ever undertake, America's backyard culture demands serious lumens. We enlisted a giant in the realm of outdoor furniture, Richard Schultz, and his son, Peter, to weigh in on a few sleek outdoor lighting options. They shed some light on these designs' aesthetics, luminosity, and materials, as well as on just what should be replacing that tiki torch. >

2005 to showcase old-school letterpress and screenprinted design. It's a gallerylike place that celebrates the tactile and the visual-displays are textured and eclectic, and the gigantic Ingo Maurer Zettel'z lamp is a commanding focal point. Greer's motto—"civility is not a sign of weakness"—also translates to her passion for correspondence. "We like to think of ourselves as a lifestyle store grounded in stationery. We're not interested in "what sells"; we're interested in what allows our customers to express themselves and to make deep, personal connections in the most lovely, distinctive, and powerful ways possible. There's a lot in the world that can bring people down. We want to lift people up."

#### What led you to start Greer?


Greer: I'm a former advertising executive enchanted by creativity. I learned much about design and communication and, perhaps most important, I was deeply influenced by my firm's late founder, Leo Burnett, and his ability to richly articulate a vision and broader purpose for what we were doing. It inspired me to create a company based on my own sense of what I want to put out into the world.


#### Who are your customers?

Greer: They tend to be thoughtful, appreciative, intelligent people with a strong aesthetic sense. We serve some of the nicest people in Chicago.

#### Where do you find designers?

Greer: We receive about a dozen submissions a month, and we attend the





National Stationery Show in New York, which is the industry trade show. We're also active on Twitter and Facebook. I don't pursue blogs or shop other stores' inventories because I like to keep our vision pure, and those sources tend to have particular points of view.

# Can all of your wares be purchased online as well?

**Greer:** Almost. It's very difficult to have everything up there. The drawback of the website is that you can't feel what you're buying.

#### What's your favorite card?

Greer: It's a card from Blue Barnhouse featuring an image of a pretty young Muhammad Ali and the greeting "I hear you're talkin' around that you can whup me. Well, here I is." Ali has a defiant, gentlemanly, yet authentic charm, and we'll keep buying that card as long as they keep printing it.

That it's letterpress-printed in silver on heavy black stock makes it that much more ironic. Plus, it just makes me laugh.

#### Do you dabble in letterpress?

Greer: Currently, anything we design for letterpress is printed by professional artisans. However, I recently purchased a small press, and once we learn how to use it, look out!

# Tell us about your monthly column on Felt & Wire, Mohawk Paper's blog. Greer: It's called "On the Wire," and it's about little-known but extremely talented stationery designers. It came out of my belief that people should take a chance on the small guys. If I find someone and they're talented, I don't care if I'm the first store to carry them. That's the purpose of my column, to sort of nudge other people in that direc-

# **Ladles Not Labels**

When fashion design lost its luster and took the form of fleeting, regurgitative styles and overconsumption, British menswear veterans Rachel Wythe-Moran and Simon Watkins traded trends for timelessness by opening Labour and Wait.

Rachel Wythe-Moran and Simon Watkins filed papers to launch Labour and Wait in 2000 and were selling goods the next year. The store name is derived from a poem by Longfellow. "We liked the idea of two words; it sounds like two people's names," Watkins says. "Plus, the shop's about doing work and waiting for the results."



In their East London shop, business

partners Rachel Wythe-Moran and Simon Watkins offer goods for the home, kitchen, and garden, each designed to last a lifetime. "We sell everyday classics," Watkins says, "products that almost don't look as though they've been designed at all, but have just evolved into the most practical form they could take." Now, 14 years since they sowed the first seed for their store, Wythe-Moran and Watkins have accumulated a substantial stock of wares that will never go out of style.

## What are your criteria for selecting an item to sell?

**Watkins:** We both have to like it; that's number one.

**Wythe-Moran:** And it has to have a function; we don't sell anything that's just for decoration.

What's your most recent purchase? Wythe-Moran: A brown bread bin made especially for us by our enamel manufacturer in Austria.

What are you currently longing for? Watkins: We're always being asked about wooden ironing boards, but we just can't find anyone who makes them for a reasonable price.



The shelves of Labour and Wait are filled with finds from across Europe—and, of course, the Internet. "We're endlessly looking online, but we also have customers who come into the shop who make things or know someone making things we might like to sell," Wythe-Moran says. "Ideally we'd like more time to travel to find goods."



### What are your favorite items to sell?

Watkins: The aluminum dustpans. They look great, work really well, and are substantial. We had a customer buy one and then come back needing a new one, because he had had work done and the builder loved it so much he took it!

Wythe-Moran: I spent hours trying to find a nice wooden toilet brush and a container to put it in. We finally found a set, and it sells incredibly well. Customers also used to inquire about our enamel pendant lamps, so we developed them into a product.

# Has the store influenced your personal tastes?

Watkins: The store has always been within us. Lots of things we sell are things we've had ourselves for years but couldn't replace, and now we are trying to find the people who make them.

# Why is East London a good place for a design store?

Wythe-Moran: We wanted to be somewhere near a weekend market. Now the area is becoming much more popular. There are a lot of buildings going up and the train is being extended here. In some ways we're sad because we were off the beaten track and people had to make a journey to get here, but from a commercial angle, it's good.

#### Who are your neighbors?


Watkins: The shop next door is called Mar Mar Co. and specializes in Scandinavian-inspired design. Nearby are a jewelry designer, T-shirt shop, and vintage-clothing store.


What's next for Labour and Wait?

and laundry supply area. □




Ceramics are having a moment in the current trend cycle, but let's be honest: When has pottery ever been out of style? Here are two options to add to your grandmother's collection of 19th-century creamware and your mother's midcentury studio pieces.


The new wave of potters are applying cutting-edge techniques to time-tested materials. Cody Hoyt, a designer and painter based in Greenpoint, Brooklyn, combines different earth-toned clays into striped and marbled sheets, then handforms the planes into geometric vessels (opposite). Dana Bechert, a sculptor based in Baltimore, riffs on Native American Acoma Pueblo motifs. She throws vitrified English porcelain on a wheel, then applies dark gray slip clay to the unglazed exterior before carving away the slip to reveal the white underneath (this page).




# 33rd Anniversary: Iron
