





# Deadline Design

Norman Mailer once wrote that deadlines are great liberatorsthat rather than burdening us with the fear of failure, they can actually drive us to free ourselves from the burdens we've chosen to bear. Not only do we do our best work under deadlines, but they release us from the illusion of being in control.

If that's the case, why can't we set deadlines for our home remodeling projects? And why can't we hit them? All the people I talk to about their own projects invariably go in optimistically and come out wizened and notably wiser, humbled by how long it took and how much it cost.

Why? Because design is not a science; it's an inexact art form that requires constant reinterpretation. Because we generally don't give it the amount of attention it needs, sweating each detail. Because we're often too close to it. And because we don't have the experience needed to predict when things will go wrong, which they inevitably will.


Such is not the case with magazine publishing. We live and die by deadlines. Though we habitually miss the noncritical ones, we don't miss our "closing," the monthly doomsday deadline after which there are no others.

Sometimes it's still necessary to push the limits of those deadlines. The issue you hold in your hands is a case in point.

Last April, Art Director Randy Dunbar joined our staff with a mandate to redesign the magazine, to rethink our approach to photography and to add some pizazz to the graphic treatment of the information we present to our readers. We felt that HOME was accomplishing what it promised every month, and that it was a great resource of creative ideas about home design, but it needed some spunk, style and new energy. It soon became clear that the Octo-

That didn't give us much time-less than three months, in fact, during which we also had to get the August and September issues out, continue shooting for the year's subsequent issues, redirect all our scouts, stylists and photographers, and, as always, hit our deadlines.

We assigned Associate Editor Steve Holley a new department, "Style File," that focuses on trends in the design and decorating fields (see page 52). We asked new Departments Editor Anne Colby to reorient the "Dollars & Sense" column with a broader selection of financial questions and answers. She also was

charged with making "Update" and "On the Market" livelier, and is seeing to it that the "Professionally Speaking" and "On the Scene" columns are harderworking than ever.

Randy Dunbar began working with our field editors to get a different look in our feature articles, to add texture and emotion to the information we were providing. We insisted on showing more people in the features, and Randy began diversifying the photographers we use, bringing in portraitists to photograph people in their homes. Associate Editor Deborah Smith captured this new spirit in the two stories she produced on lifestyle baths and kitchens (pages 64 and 69).

Freelance art director Donna Agajanian and Randy (shown above, hugging some tangible type) worked up a dozen type and format treatments for the front of the magazine, finally settling on the handsome approach beginning with our new table of contents (page 4). He also began hopscotching across the country organizing cover shoots with various stylists and editors.

All of these changes eventually worked their way through Margaret Foley, our wizard Assistant Copy Editor/ editorial production manager, who makes sure the magazine gets to the typesetter every month in a coherent fashion and that all the type and format changes are systematically worked in.

So, as I write this, we are just closing the October issue. We are in the dog days of August-the Northeast is sweltering, the Midwest is suffocating and the West is stifling under forest-fire fears. And the heat in this office, which has been building for the last three months, is finally beginning to dissipate.

I think Mr. Mailer was right; we all feel somehow liberated again, enough at least to take a short vacation. -C.L.D.





#### Tips for tiles

I have recently redone my kitchen floors and counters with ceramic tile. Although I clean it regularly, the grout in between the tiles is becoming spotted with food stains (I have four boys). Is there any way of removing these stains?

Camden Gooch Melbourne, FL

The Tile Council of America suggests attacking grease spots with sal soda and water, a commercial spot lifting agent, or a cleaning powder like Spic & Span mixed with water. Tea and fruit juice stains are a lot tougher, and may require careful treatment with diluted household bleach or hydrogen peroxide (make sure to try a small test patch first).

You might also want to apply one of the two types of sealer on your grout to guard against future staining. The topical variety is usually acrylic-based; penetrating sealers, often silicone-based, absorb into the grout. Both are effective and will need renewing from time to time. Your local tile dealer no doubt carries several brands of these dressings and should be able to advise you on the one they've had the best luck with for installations like yours.

#### Inspirational inlay

I am a remodeling contractor in Augusta, Georgia, and have had several occasions to lay hardwood floors, so I was pleased to see the article on the subject in HOME (November '87).

I was inspired by the French knot inlay featured in the article and created the table pictured in the enclosed photograph, using resawn oak flooring and solid walnut strips 1/4 inch wide. After drawing the "knot" to scale



In the December issue of HOME you asked for ideas that have been used to make living easier for the aging or disabled. I'm sure you are looking for more elaborate schemes than the simple one I am submitting to you. It did, however, solve our problem with only a small outlay of money.


A woodstove in the basement is our primary source of winter heat, making it necessary to leave the stairwell open so the warmth can circulate through the house. This was dangerous because my 90-year-old mother's balance was somewhat impaired and she was often disoriented about which room she was in, especially at night.

To let the heat up while ensuring that she wouldn't fall down the stairs, we made a lattice door. The frame is of white pine 1x3s (ripped at home), and ready-made interior lattice is attached to the back with boards. We finished the door with two coats of polyurethane. Our lattice door is decorative, inexpensive and safe. Friends have copied the idea to keep their tots from tumbling downstairs.





Held in this northeastern Italian town, Promosedia is the only exhibition in the world dedicated solely to chairs.

The region enjoys a centuries-old craft tradition, and the fair features mostly chairs designed in wood-primarily beech. But rustic offerings were few; this year's best designs were clean-lined and contemporary. Bold strokes included

the ingenious use of metal, leather, special wood finishes, curved lines and electric color. Function was also a prime design concern. Taking honors as Best Chair in Wood was the simply designed "Crazy" model by Calligaris (at right), chosen not only for its looks but for "ease of shipment and knockdown."







Akiko Busch, Floorworks and Wallworks (Bantam, New York, \$19.95 each)

Seems like it must have been another century-but it was only 16 years ago that the late decorating doyen Billy Baldwin wrote, "When it comes to floors for the rooms we live in, there are two things I insist on: They must lie down, and they must be quiet." Nothing could be further from the 1980s aesthetic-and design writer Akiko Busch is clearly not one to take her floors (or her walls) lying down.

In these striking 144-page companion volumes, Busch has collected an array of decorative floor and wall treatments that show off the amazing fecundity of contemporary design. Each book

includes chapters on color and pattern, trompe l'oeil and faux finishes, stencils and tiles. Wallworks also has sections on wallpaper, fabrics, hangings, screens and "working walls," while Floorworks replaces these with chapters on wood floors, paints and stains, rugs and floorcloths. 



#### **Measurements Made Simple**

Itrasound technology may soon nudge the yardstick and tape measure into obsolescence. New electronic devices transmit harmless sound waves (beyond the range of human hearing) that bounce off the first major obstacle they encounter. The instruments measure the time it takes the sound waves to return to the unit, then convert the results into linear feet. Left: The Estimator by Stanley measures distances up to 30 feet and rounds them off to the nearest tenth of a foot. A chart on the rear of the unit simplifies conversions; about \$30. Right: Sonin's electronic distance-measuring instruments feature two memories and a threefunction calculator. Three models measure distances to 60, 150 and 250 feet and cost \$99.95, \$134.95 and \$149.95 respectively.

## Remodeling Write-offs • Empty Nest Options • Buyer Protection Plans

An article on page 95 of this issue shows practical ways to remodel or outfit your current home to serve everyone's physical needs better—whether that be you, your elderly mother or another family member with physical limitations. We have invited readers to share their comments and queries on this subject. The question that follows was common to many who are considering such a remodeling project.

My wife must use a wheelchair, and we recently revamped the interior of our home to accommodate her disability. I'd like to know if the cost of remodeling is deductible as a medical expense on my income tax return.

In all probability, most of the money you spent revamping your home to meet your wife's special needs will be considered a medical expense, although your tax bill may be cut by less than you would expect. Assuming there's no doubt that the work was necessitated by a medical disability (the IRS is likely to challenge a wet bar, for example, or a sauna), only one major issue must be kept in mind: How much did the remodeling increase the value of your home? To arrive at your deductible medical expenses, you need to subtract the amount your home increased in value from the amount you spent.

Assessing this increase in value—especially if the project was a small one—can be difficult. Presumably the installation of a bathtub with built-in whirlpool jets (perhaps a \$1,200 investment for a modest unit) would increase the value of a home, but by how much? Probably not by \$1,200, especially if you remove a perfectly fine bathtub to install the new unit. The same problem might arise if a homeowner had an elevator installed.



While some improvements could require you to hire an appraiser if the IRS challenges your return, other expenditures will be accepted in full as a matter of course. These include installing handrails, enlarging door openings, installing ramps to the door and/or porch, regrading the yard for wheelchair access, replacing or repositioning hardware on doors, lowering cabinets, and adding chair lifts. And one need not be confined to a wheelchair to deduct home improvements that address a disability.

Remember, however, that just because a medical expense is deductible doesn't mean that your taxes will be cut. Add up all of your net medical expenses for the year (after insurance reimbursement): doctor bills, medicines, cost of medical insurance, tests, net hospital bills, and the expense for fixing up your home. Next multiply your annual "adjusted gross income" (line 31 on form 1040) by 7.5 percent—\$3,750 for a family with an annual gross income of \$50,000. Only those medical expenses in excess of this amount may be deducted; if your bills total \$5,000 this year, only

\$1,250 will be deductible.

How much will a \$1,250 deduction save the \$50,000 taxpayer out of pocket? Given a 28-percent tax bracket, \$350. And for the homeowner whose medical deductions add up to less than 7.5 percent of gross income, not a penny will be saved. While every little bit helps, the tax savings are unlikely to provide more than modest assistance for those revamping a home to aid a disabled family member.

If you would like more information, call your local IRS office and ask for Publication 502, "Medical and Dental Expenses."

#### Can I purchase an insurance policy that will protect me from anything going wrong with my home after I buy it?

I assume you're referring to one of a number of insurance plans that offer protection to buyers in the event that a major mechanical system fails soon after the house is purchased. Your question represents a common misunderstanding. These programs—a typical example is the Buyer Protection Plan offered by the ERA system of franchise brokers—don't protect you from literally "anything." They protect buyers of resale homes if a major mechanical system such as the furnace, air conditioner, electrical wiring, plumbing or certain kitchen appliances should fail. The plans do not protect against structural problems and are not intended as a substitute for an inspection by a building engineer.

A typical policy costs about \$300 and must be purchased before or at closing. Typically it is purchased by the seller for the buyer, to hasten the sale. Some real estate agents offer the protection plan as a housewarming gift to buyers. This may be looked upon as an act of

generosity, or merely as an assurance that the buyer will call the insurance company—not the agent or broker—in case of a problem.

Home buyers represent about a quarter of the plan purchasers. Would taking out such a policy be a smart move for you as a buyer? Ask yourself if you are likely to have more than \$300 of cov-

ered expenses in the first year of owner-ship; a home inspection report can help here. Further, can you afford to repair or replace defective mechanical systems so soon after purchase? If the answer is no, then this type of protection plan may be attractive.

What is a reverse mortgage? I've heard they're a great way for the elderly to tap their home equity, but I don't really understand them.

There are a number of different types of reverse loans, but their chief feature is offering a retired homeowner a fixed monthly loan for which repayment will not be required until the owner moves or dies. Reverse mortgages are very new, and only about 1,500 of them have been written in the country, according to Ken Scholen, the executive director of the National Center for Home Equity Conversion in Madison, Wisconsin. Next

spring, however, the FHA will start to test out the concept by providing insurance for 2,500 reverse mortgages through 1991.

The varieties of these loans range from options that will pay the homeowner a fixed sum monthly for up to 10 years to those that will pay a sum until the owner dies. In addition, certain loans require that when the loan plus accumulated interest is eventually paid, a portion of the increased value of the house (if any) be forked over. Other plans only demand repayment of the accumulated principal and interest.

These programs should only be considered if it is very important to the



I've spent several thousand hours on major do-it-yourself home projects over the years. Now I'm selling and wonder if I can ascribe a value to my labor to increase the cost basis of my home.

Your question indicates a pretty savvy understanding of the tax laws. To oversimplify a bit, the cost basis of a home roughly consists of what you paid for it plus what you've added to it in capital improvements. Increasing the cost basis has the effect of reducing your taxable profit when you sell. But even though you have contributed labor-something

that has increased the value of your home—you can't impute a value to that labor to increase the house's cost basis.

You could understandably be irritated that your labor is counted as nothing by the U.S. Tax Code. But consider the alternative: If your labor were considered to have value, then the IRS might argue

that the value added represented income, in which case you would have to pay income tax on it. So what you had gained with one hand would have been snatched away by the other.

But I suspect that for the IRS there is an even better reason for excluding unpaid labor from the computation of the profits on the sale of a home: How would they ever audit such a return?

My retired neighbor claims that he has worked out a plan with the city by which he never has to pay property taxes—the city will just collect from his estate after he dies. This sounds too weird to be true. Why doesn't the city take over the house for back taxes?

It sounds as though your neighbor has signed up for a property tax deferral plan. Basically, the taxing body is loaning your neighbor the money to pay his taxes—charging 6 or 8 percent interest on the loan—and the debt will be paid when the man dies or moves. These plans have been offered statewide in California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, Oregon, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin. In addition, local programs exist in Connecticut, Florida, Iowa, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Tennessee and Virginia.

Eligibility for the plans varies widely, and usually there is an income threshold—participants must receive no more than a certain income to qualify. Moreover, the local taxing body places a lien on the home, so it can't be sold until the taxes are paid off.

The effect of these programs is to increase the amount of spendable cash participants have on hand. Deferring tax payments is most helpful to those persons with a lot of equity in their homes and high tax bills.

My husband and I are in our late 50s and have a 2,500-square-foot house to ourselves now that our children have moved out. The house is situated in a desirable area and we own it free and clear. We're

thinking of moving to a smaller home but wonder if we should hold onto the property, sell it or borrow against it. What are our options?

Your options are nearly infinite. Do you wish to increase your current income or invest for future growth of capital? Is building an estate important? Such factors must be considered before you can decide on your best strategy.

It sounds as though you are psychologically ready for a move into a smaller




house or condo. If so, consider a sale and purchase the smaller unit. It's quite possible that the price difference will equal or exceed the \$125,000 one-time exclusion of profits from the sale of a residence granted those over 55. Since you won't need more current income before you retire, and you're thinking of moving, reverse mortgages that would offer you an annuity or equity loan wouldn't make much sense.

## When you're filling out loan documents, why do they ask you if the loan is for a primary residence?

Lenders typically experience a higher default rate on second homes and investment properties than they do on primary residences. Therefore, you can usually buy a primary residence with a lower down payment and/or better loan terms than you could a second home or investment property.

Lenders must ask the question to establish which set of qualifying standards to apply to a particular loan applicant.



# When Pests are Guests

When my husband was offered a job in another city, we put our house up for sale and began planning our move. We knew that a termite inspection would be required before escrow could close, and that termite infestation is uncovered in most cases. But we were certain that in our case the inspection would be merely a formality because our home had been given a clean bill of health when we purchased it just one year earlier.

We were in for a surprise. According to our inspector, the house had not been properly inspected before we purchased it, and in fact, may not have been inspected at all. He estimated it would cost \$2,000 to fumigate our house and repair

the appreciable damage done by termites.



In relating our experience to friends, we found we were not alone. They also had horror stories of inspections paid for, but done improperly or not at all.

Two million homes require termite treatment annually, according to a national pest control association. Most of us have our house inspected only when forced to, as the result of a sale or when we actually find termite damage. Then we scramble to find a pest control company, probably selecting one at random from the Yellow Pages. But while the majority of termite control companies do a professional and thorough job, some are less than reputable. In Californiathe state with the most stringent regulations-1,400 consumer complaints are received each year. The state pest control board estimates that 70 of these cases go to the attorney general's office for investigation every year; as a consequence, 20 licenses are revoked.

In order to select a company you can

rely on, it's important to know something about termites and how best to deal with an infestation.

#### **Termite detection**

Termites are found throughout the United States and Mexico, and in parts of Canada. Heaviest infestations occur in the Southeastern region and the Sunbelt. Two varieties-subterranean and drywood-are most often found. The insects are social creatures, living in colonies of several hundred to several thousand members.


The termite feeds primarily on wood, but also appreciates cardboard boxes, books, furniture and plastics. Even a home with masonry walls is not immune; subterranean termites,

the most common type, construct mud tubes up walls to reach wooden window frames, cabinets and shelving. Any home is a target, whether built with a slab, basement or crawlspace foundation.

Subterranean termites can enter your home through openings as small as 1/32 inch. Typical points of entry include expansion joints, cracks around pipes, crawlspaces, cracks in the slab, and wooden supports that are in contact with the ground, such as those used for decks. You may have seen evidence of the insects' mud tunnels in crawlspaces or along the exterior of your house.

Because they live in the ground, treatment for these termites involves digging a trench or drilling a hole through the slab or basement floor, then injecting a chemical barrier directly into the soil around the foundation to prevent their access to the house. You do not have to vacate your home during treatment.

Drywood termites are harder to detect because the entire colony lives within the house, usually in the beams of the attic or garage. Although these

termites live in smaller colonies, rarely numbering more than 300, they can do a great deal of damage. Left undisturbed, the bugs can consume the entire inner portion of a board, leaving only a thin outer shell. A clue to their presence is scatterings of tiny sawdustlike pellets.


The treatment for this type of infestation depends on the extent of the damage. Although direct application of a liquid, paste or dust pesticide may be enough, this method will not destroy any undetected infestations in other areas of the home. Tenting and fumigating the building is more thorough, but requires that people, pets and plants be out of the house for eight to 48 hours.

#### Selecting an exterminator

You should spend as much time choosing a pest control company as you would any professional service. The best place to begin is by asking neighbors, friends and relatives.

Before you sign a contract, get a second opinion. Most states have a governmental office that both licenses pest control companies and handles complaints, Look in the phone book for the structural pest control board, health department or consumer protection department of the district attorney. Call the regulating agency and ask for in-

Whether you hire a local company or one with a national affiliation, make sure it has been in business for a number of years in the same location. The company should be a member of either the National Pest Control Association (NPCA) or a state or local pest control association, suggests Dr. George Rambo, director of research, education and technical resources for the NPCA. Such associations require their members to adhere to a code of ethics. They also keep them informed of the most up-to-date chemicals and application technology.

Don't be afraid to ask a firm about its inspection process, employee training policy and safety procedures. If you can't get straight answers from one company, call another. While the chemicals used in fumigation are repeatedly tested by the EPA and others, it is up to each company to use them correctly.

#### Inspection

It's vital that the inspector have easy access to all areas of your home, including the attic, basement and garage. In our case, the inspector was not the only one





at fault. The former owner of the home had a great deal of furniture and boxes stored in the garage, and the inspector was unable to do a thorough job.

Depending on the size of your structure, the inspection should take at least an hour. If no infestation is found, you should be given a written report that says so. If treatment is necessary, the inspector will make a drawing of the floor structure of your house, indicating the infested areas. Accompanying the diagram is a written report of the work to be performed. The inspector should also tell you if there is any structural damage, what repairs are necessary and whether his company can do the work.

Do tell the inspector about the location of wells, cisterns or septic systems on your property to prevent possible chemical contamination.

The written report should itemize areas that were not inspected because they were inaccessible. These might include wall interiors, attics without adequate crawlspace and slab foundations.

Lastly, the report should spell out the guarantee—if any—for work done, the

length of the guarantee, and what you must do to maintain it. Make sure you thoroughly understand what is and what is not covered. In cases where the damage is excessive and the repair bill high,

get a second opinion from another company; this extra effort may save you money in the long run.

The written report, plus a work com-

pletion report, must be filed with the state agency overseeing pest control companies. California requires the inspector to post a tag in the attic, sub-area or garage listing the company's name and the date of the inspection. A similar tag is posted after the company completes the work, indicating what pesticides were used. The location of these tags also appears in the written report, as would any other inspection or fumigation tag that was less than two years old.

#### **Preventive measures**

If you live in an area of the country where termite infestations are common, add an annual or biannual termite inspection to your ongoing home maintenance schedule. You can help protect your home by keeping crawlspaces well ventilated, repairing leaky pipes promptly and providing good drainage around the foundation, according to Judith Donner, spokesperson for Orkin, a national pest control company.

There should be no direct wood-tosoil contact; wood supports for patios should be on concrete blocks. Other no-



nos on Donner's list are firewood stacked directly against the house, wooden trellises leaning against exterior walls, and old stumps or logs in the yard.

For new construction, most building codes require that wood which comes in contact with the ground or is less than 10 inches from the ground be pretreated chemically. Double-check this with your builder or contractor, and also discuss applying a termiticide to the ground

before the foundation is poured.

Above all, when selecting a company, don't be forced into a contract with which you feel uncomfortable. Although termites can be a serious problem, it's very unlikely that your house is about to fall down. If the inspector says you have termites, don't sign a contract on the spot. Shop around. By taking the time to educate yourself, you can make a decision based on facts, not fear.

#### Chemical-free Treatments

Just how safe are the chemicals used in termite control? The answer depends on how they are applied, says Chuck Shenk, chief of the pesticides section in the Seattle office of the EPA.

"If label directions on termiticides are followed, you have reasonable assurance that the product is safe, but no absolute guarantee," says Shenk. "In some cases, products do pose limited risk, but the need [to rid the house of a serious infestation] is greater."

What choices do you have if there is a need for termite removal, but even the "limited" risk of chemicals seems too high? Kevin Thorpe, staff entomologist for the National Coalition Against Misuse of Pesticides, maintains that there are many effective alternatives.

For drywood termites, says Thorpe, an electrogun is frequently used. Once the infestation has been pinpointed, a hole is drilled in the wall and an electrical probe is inserted, capable of zapping the insects with 90,000 volts.

Another approach now being tested uses corrugated cardboard—a favorite food of termites—as bait. "The cardboard is rolled into artificial logs," explains Thorpe, "and then placed in the ground. The log acts as a trap and, once the termites are inside, it is removed."

Walter Ebeling, professor emeritus of entomology at UCLA, has determined that sand of a specific-size grain, placed around the foundation of a house, acts as a natural barrier: Termites are unable to gain access because the sides of their tunnels cave in.

Not surprisingly, California—the state with the most stringent laws governing both pest control and consumer protection—is also the state where alternative techniques are most widely used. For the past 25 years, Long Beach-based Tallon Termite and Pest Control Company has advocated nonchemical methods. It currently has a patent pending on its Blizzard System, so called because it literally freezes the termites to death. Once a thorough visual inspection of the house is done and drywood termites have been located, liquid nitrogen is pumped into the wall, dropping the temperature to –20°F.

For control of subterranean termites, Tallon recommends nematodes, a natural termite predator. These microscopic roundworms are injected into the soil in a water solution; they track down termites by the carbon dioxide the insects give off. Several applications may be required for full effectiveness.





sofa cover with this enticement: "What a world of happy hours you'll enjoy in your pleasant living room


with these decorating dreams of slip covers!" So what gives? Are slipcovers something old or something new?

Actually, both. There's the contemporary haute couture version, like Eva and others with a draped silhouette, often Italian-made or custom-styled by interior designers; there's the tailored look, with its roots in the traditional slip-cover; and then there's the new "ready-to-wear" slipcover that is the affordable offspring of the two styles.

"Slipcovers are back because graceful styles have returned," says Michael Wrusch, a California designer who has

updated the covers with Velcro closures. Slipcovers fell from grace when the slim contours of modern '50s furniture rendered them hopelessly old-fashioned. They've remained a mainstay, however, in traditional "deco-


here is an undeniable magic about built-ins. Few of us can resist the cozy allure of the cushioned window seat at the end of the upstairs hall, or the clever convenience of a tilt-out hamper that retreats to the anonymity of the wallpaper after gobbling up its daily quotient of dirty clothes.

Made of equal parts practicality and elegance, built-ins marry the concerns and skills of the architect, interior designer and cabinetmaker. They are like custom-tailored suits—personally fit to the homeowner and the home. There is no need to compromise in dimension, function or style: One strategic part of your library can be designed with special shelves and a pull-out book rest for oversize volumes, while another cradles your collection of miniatures just out of reach of small fingers.

And the choice of materials and finish is yours as well. As you can see from these pages, built-ins are not limited to one era or style. Instead, they carry out the intent of the interior architecture, helping rooms strut their stuff. Originally a carpenter's project, today's built-ins are usually executed by a cabinet shop, either independently or as part of remodeling.

But maybe most important is the reassuring permanence of built-ins. Be they beds or buffets, display shelves or dressers, niches or nooks, they make an appealing statement about home and hearth in a world where nothing seems to hold still for very long.









omehow a rococo master bath in pink, peach and fake marble just doesn't do the trick for a coolly contemporary Southwestern home. When the room also suffers from awkward space planning and poor installation (witness the thronelike but uninsulated tub that didn't retain enough heat for a 15-

minute soak), a radical revamping is in order.

For Frank and Karen Lewkowitz of Paradise


Valley, Arizona, the solution lay in commissioning interior designer Paula Berg and architect Alan Christensen to create a sleek his-and-hers bath. Frank, an avid biker and basketball player, wanted a steam shower big enough to accommodate a few buddies after a group workout. Karen asked for a whirlpool tub with a bit of privacy. And she also had some design ideas—among them, using glass block in the bathroom as she had in renovating the front of the house.

The remodeled space is built around a muted palette of tile (incorporating threedimensional handmade accents), native flagstone and whitewashed pine. Glass block divides the back-to-back vanity sinks, screens the whirlpool tub, brings daylight into the shower and forms two dramatic columns, each enclosing a fluorescent tube. The architect also used overhead fixtures, wall sconces and a domed skylight with concealed uplights, making possible a great array of effects—from a soft evening glow to a blast of brightness for instant wake-up.





really spacious steam shower," says New Orleans homeowner Ann Barnett. The couple also liked the idea of dual dressing rooms, vanities and toilets. After much discussion with architect Steven Bingler, a plan took shape: Howard and Ann would have, in effect, separate bathrooms, linked by a big steam shower.

Having bought an old house "in terrible disrepair" with the intention of gutting it, the Barnetts were starting with a blank slate. A skylit 151/2'x25' space off the master bedroom now accommodates a pair of dressing rooms, which flank mirror-image vanity/toilet areas (each appointed with a few favorite art objects), a walk-in linen closet and the 5'x101/2' shower. Even the shower is customized: Each end has a tiled bench, and there's an extra showerhead over Howard's-but not Ann's, since she showers standing up.



# JESIGN For IVIG

solo style and empty nesters' new freedom.



oday's kitchens are the personalized heart of the home. Domesticated designs better suited to the way we live now are replacing cookie-cutter kitchens and old recipes for work triangles. When Thomas and Jo Anne Steiner purchased a family home in Chappaqua, New York, tired oak cabinets and countertops of frayed yellow laminate occupied most of the kitchen's small space. Only the slimmest of two-somes could sit at the corner table, lit by the glare of fluorescent office lights.

The original dark, desultory layout was rearranged with a 16'x20', \$65,000 southern addition. A new



circular island meets the demands of a family of five: Mom uses the vegetable sink for food preparation, while the boys play with stuffed animals stored underneath, watch the Mets on the TV above, and mix up fruit, oatmeal and wheat germ for breakfast. White laminate counters and cabinets (\$13,000) scrub up easily and echo the light, airy feeling of the wall of windows.

The Steiners spent \$35,000 constructing the new wing, laying kidproof Spanish tile floors and tucking electrical outlets under cabinets to put them out of view and out of youngsters' reach. Work surfaces 3 inches higher than average prevent the kids from making mischief with countertop knives and appliances.






hough he's part of the baby boom generation, Joel Shapiro's solo style isn't a pinstripe suit, a health club membership and Caribbean getaways. A doctor, he stores his exercise equipment in a spare room and relaxes in his own Southern California backyard. And he's used to making his own decisions-like buying his first house and gutting its '70s-style kitchen.


Joel personally took out layers of the disco decade, removing dark, cheap cabinets and prying up green tile counters that looked moldy even when clean. He substituted casual, lighter oak cabinets and floors-"I prefer the warmth of wood to more monotonous laminate"-and added a built-in can opener and food processor/blender between the sink and range, to be used by both work areas. The kitchen was upgraded with top-of-the-line appliances-in part for resale value in case he marries or moves.

The new kitchen was an \$18,000 investment, with \$2,000 splurged on granite counters; Joel was impressed with the way their elegant surface takes abuse. "He told me that he's a slob in the kitchen, spreading everything out when he cooks," says designer Cheryl Casey Ross, adding, "He didn't want grout to clean, surfaces that stain easily or those you have to be too careful with." Next to the oven is a pull-out slab of butcher block meant for resting hot pots, so there's no risk of a carelessly placed casserole cracking the cool granite. Counter-to-cabinet granite is easier to keep clean than a typical 4-inch backsplash ending in a painted wall, and a polyurethane coating on the floors prevents grooves from inviting debris.










Far left: Granite counter in fore-ground extends I foot, providing an eating bar or a place for guests to sit and chat with the cook.

his is my adult kitchen," declares Ellyne Ladden, a liberated parent now that her three children are grown and out of the house. She and husband Ronald traded in their suburban roost for a new life as empty nesters in a condominium on Chicago's tony Lake Shore Drive. "I spent 30 years cleaning-I felt like the FBI, always wiping fingerprints," says Ellyne. "Now that it's just my husband and I, my kitchen can be glamorous."

The room wears lustrous finishes—glossy gray laminate that gives cabinets sophistication, speckled countertops of smooth stone. "Granite and mirror dress up the kitchen, giving it a more luxurious feeling than laminate counters and a painted drywall backsplash," explains architect Richard Gibbons of Madel/Gibbons. The mirrored backsplashes create the illusion that the room continues beyond the cabinets. They reflect under-cabinet, track and spotlights that illuminate tasks at hand and add nighttime drama.


Before bringing in the bright lights, the Laddens faced a cramped condo kitchen with five-and-dime '50s wallpaper and broken wood cabinets. A decor of turquoise and green gave way to more grown-up grays. Working within a \$20,000 budget, the couple opened the kitchen to the dining/living room. "Panels of sandblasted glass act as a curved shoji screen, filtering in sunlight to a kitchen miles from windows and serving as a sculptural element for the dining room," notes the architect. A powder room was merged into today's kitchen; a new corner sink replaced the tub, and the powder room door is now the kitchen entry.

"Instead of scheduling meals around when the commuter train pulls in, we eat when we want," says Ellyne. "And I keep lipstick in the drawer instead of Handi Wipes."





Now, on their tenth anniversary, they've braved the barn once again—this time with a cultivated country style that is at once sophisticated and comfortable.

ountry. It's more than a trend; it's what decorators call a "theme" in American design. We all know what the country look is, we know that it is here to stay and, quite frankly, we're a little weary of the comfy brown calico sofa with cute duck pillows. Right?

Wrong. Gear, Inc. is in the business of country, having spent a decade identifying, refining and explaining the movement, and principal designer Raymond Waites reports that country style has "grown up"—in the same ways that he has—over the past decade. "My taste, my design—and, alas, my person—have matured in the past 10 years. Where before I wanted to lounge on modular pillow forms on the floor, I now want real chairs, tables and rugs. I have more money, and a greater interest in spending time at home—so my environment is at once more opulent and more comfortable, relaxed."






anniversary, HOME asked to go back to the barn for a demonstration of how Gear is interpreting the movement to-day. Licensee Guild Hall joined in, donating the Hunting Lodge line of coordinated furniture, lighting, fabrics, rugs, bedding accessories and dinnerware, and designer Mark Abrams was asked to pull the decor together for photography. The result is displayed on these pages, along with a vintage shot of the original project.

"The biggest difference between country style today and 10 years ago is a broadening of the concept," offers Raymond Waites. "For example, we used to have a few chintzes and coordinated solids, and now we show stripes, florals and a whole range of textures. And we show them all together for a richer complexity. We've also identified strains of the look, and can manipulate it for a romantic, urban or even a tech feeling." The Hunting Lodge line



In preparing the barn for the anniversary project, a nugget of the Gear philosophy was unearthed along with a decade-old assortment of tables and pillow fabrics (and a few pillbugs). The crisp lines and warm colors of the '70s pieces were completely compatible with the new designs, and some of these older items were even thrown in as occasional accents and to make a point: At Gear, country means ever-changing evolution-but the roots hold fast.










# WISUAL feasts

Designed with spirit,
two formerly lackluster
kitchens are proof that
there is life beyond laminate.

he kitchen that San Francisco interior designer Lou Ann Bauer's clients wanted to remodel sported a harvest gold linoleum floor and shellacked plywood cabinets. It also had an awkward floor plan and 30-year-old appliances. Having so little to work with, Lou Ann decided to "take the room down to the studs" with the goal of creating a more workable kitchen for her clients.


Since the couple preferred traditional design ("a clean version of French country without crude stonework or tile counters"), Lou Ann replaced the worn linoleum with oak and installed Corian counters and classically simple Allmilmö wood cabinets.

By removing a wall separating the unused maid's quarters and existing kitchen, the designer created a narrow sitting room adjacent to the dining area. The sitting room's focal point is a fireplace, installed in a spot once occupied by a window.

The project is distinguished by thoughtful finishing touches: the fireplace surround of handpainted tile, the dining room's oakframed windows. Lou Ann notes that "many clients overlook the finish budget, which includes such items—but happily, this couple recognized its importance."


The designer also advised the homeowners on colors, furnishings and accessories. "Having worked with these clients in the past, I'd learned to sense their likes and dislikes," she explains. "I usually offered the couple a variety of materials or furnishings to choose from. But by the end of this project, I knew them well enough to show just one fabric or chair and it would be right-that's how close we became. It's always nice when clients turn into friends."



here wasn't much room to grow in this Chicago townhouse remodeling, as the roof of a garden apartment below precluded any expansion beyond its perimeter. After fitting a snug 100-square-foot breakfast area into this space, architects Kathryn Quinn and Linda Searl focused their talents on transforming the all-too-typical galley kitchen.

Eleven-foot ceilings were at once maximized in effect and tamed in scale with glass-front cabinets that reach a height of 9½ feet. Topping these, uplights are concealed by a deep crown molding. The gentle wash of light and the angled molding relieve the cavernous quality that dominated the old kitchen.


The homeowner had already chosen wallpaper for the room, and the architects balanced its dense, swirling pattern with a simple Shakerstyle design for the poplar cabinetry. The wood's greenish hue complements the paper, as does plain green tile.

Conceived and crafted with intelligence and elegance, the new kitchen is perfectly suited for both family and entertaining needs.





Meet the well-mannered garden: Though refined, it's anything but stuffy.

hether it's the uncertainty of life these days or a general longing for order that's drawing people to formality in gardens, one thing is sure: Today's formal garden is different from those that came before. Often the contemporary approach involves nothing more than adding a jot of geometry to an otherwise natural space. Clipped hedges, topiary and ornaments are appearing in ever more clever incarnations. Nowadays, formal gardens reflect their owners' and designers' wish to control the environment a bit, expressing their individuality rather than creating a textbook copy of a French estate.


San Francisco interior designer Paul Wiseman made a blackberry pie with the yield of his original garden, then proceeded to spend nine years creating an oasis. After consulting local landscape designers Stephen Marcus and Stephen Suzman, he went to work, planting eugenia hedges to block his view of a neighbor's laundry and commissioning a trompe l'oeil bust in one corner to create an impression of greater space. Heavy watering and applications of buttermilk helped create a blanket of moss on brick and terra-cotta surfaces. The resulting garden includes a formal sitting space as well as the quiet nook shown.




Above and right: Local artist Robert Cassilly created all the terra-cotta work in this St.

t was important to the new owner of the historic—but sparsely landscaped—St. Louis home to have a garden with a pool rather than a pool with a garden. He had two 45-foot sweetgum trees removed, replaced them with the pool and raised planting beds and then enclosed the garden with a stone wall. The homeowner turned to landscape architect Matt Moynihan to create a private, formal setting in keeping with the turn-of-the-century house's gracious style.

he neatly clipped parterres (ornamental areas where flowerbeds and paths form a pattern) fronting this Menlo Park, California, home were designed by Thomas Church (1902–1978) before World War II as part of a plan for the whole neighborhood. Northern California landscape architect Jack Stafford was commissioned to update the garden in the early 1980s. He left the original parts intact, adding a back garden in keeping with the formal theme.








he owner of this Houston, Texas, garden wanted a little bit of her native Charleston to call her own. Landscape architects Gary Schalles and Susan Fischer cleared out an enormous, badly damaged pecan tree and patches of sparse grass, replacing them with a contained little garden surrounded by decorative wrought iron. Camellias, azaleas, and magnolias round out the Southern charm.

This Charleston-inspired Houston garden gets a fresh lift from plantings of white tulips and azaleas. Brick paving is interplanted with sedum and alyssum.





#### TOPIARY: LEARNING TO LOVE LITTLE GREEN ANIMALS

ver since the ancient Greeks and Romans invented the art of topiary, it has inspired love or loathing in the hearts of its beholders. French and English gardeners perfected topiary in the 18th and 19th centuries, creating vast arrays of painstakingly shaped hedges and strange green animals.


Today's practitioners still carve out the traditional forms: hedges, cones, cylinders and parterres. Added to these, however, is the almost purely American art of preformed topiary-created not by pruning, but rather by shaping a wire frame, filling it with moss or soil, and planting. The plant material grows over the frame, creating nearly instant topiary in a mind-boggling array of shapes from paramecia to turtles. Then, of course, there are always store-bought models, usually consisting of herbs or citrus trees. Many catalogues offer either full-grown specimens or starter kits. -D.J.E.



an Francisco landscape architect Topher Delaney designed this detail-rich garden to complement a historic Berkeley home. Arched mirrors in the walls (one positioned outside a glass door, reflecting the garden for interior viewers, and one on the garden's central axis, creating the impression of a gate) echo the shape of the arches supporting a deck and the lines of the raised reflecting pool.

hen you were 5 years old, it was a challenge to turn on the hot water without getting scalded—if you could reach the sink at all. At 75, if arthritis doesn't keep you from turning the knob, you're still burned because your sensitivity to temperature has diminished. As children, we did not fit in a world designed for adults. As aging adults, we do not fit in a world designed for younger people. And if we happen to face additional physical challenges, we are disabled by a world designed only for the fittest. Fortunately, inventive products and home plans are beginning to bridge the gap.

From adjustable-height sinks to faucets that sense your hands underneath and flow at a preset temperature, innovative design is slowly creeping into the marketplace. It comes in many forms: homes that are meant to empower individ-

uals, not set up barriers; appliances and tools that amplify abilities rather than handicapping them. Universal design strives to make every place and product work better for everybody. It brings great ideas home.

#### **WHO NEEDS UNIVERSAL DESIGN?**

Hard-working, ergonomically designed spaces and products benefit everyone; however, universal design is more than just a convenience for many Americans. Out of the 243.4 million people in the United States:

- 42.6 million are 11 years old or younger.
- 26 million are 65 or older. More than 40 percent of this older population say they experience problems preparing meals, using the telephone or doing housework.
- Almost 16 million are visually impaired or blind.
- 21 million are hearing impaired or deaf.
- 2.4 million have a speech impediment.
- 3.5 million Americans report that their activities are limited owing to chronic mental or nervous disorders. Of this group, 407,000 suffer from senility.
- More than 14 percent of the population—32.5 million people—report that chronic health conditions limit their activities.

While we are changing and remodeling homes to fit our needs like never before, most of us still put up with a lot of inconvenience. Our showerheads are mounted too low or too high, kitchen cupboards are unreachable, light switches are inaccessible and there's a narrow door frame or a poorly positioned counter that we constantly sideswipe. We have to work harder because our houses don't work hard enough.

Universal design represents a new approach for home builders and remodelers while challenging inventors, architects and interior designers to rethink the old rules. It calls for

creativity and a sensitivity to individual needs in the search for better answers to ever-present problems.

Many HOME readers are already putting universal design ideas to work. In Tennessee, Walt Buescher designed his own retirement house with a deck, widened doorways and lowered windows to take in dramatic views of the Smoky Mountains while making painting and cleaning easier. Walt, in his 70s, is still active and healthy; but by building in wheelchair-accessible living spaces and an accessory apartment for a possible future caregiver, he staves off moving or remodeling if he or his wife face medical problems as they grow older.

"If you build your dream house at 55, you'd better think about what you want to be doing in it when you're 70," advises designer and gerontologist Pat Moore, who lived as an 85-year-old (for more of her ideas see page 104).

#### CREATIVE KITCHEN REMODEL

For 18 years Ron Branam struggled even to enter his West Des Moines kitchen.

At one end, a narrow doorway blocked his wheelchair; after he had traveled through the living room to the other end, Ron was thwarted by the kitchen's high cupboards and inappropriate design. Before the kitchen was remodeled, he couldn't pop an ice cube into a cup-both the cabinets and freezer were out of reach. "I would have to remember to put a glass on the counter before I left the house," says his wife Sandy.

The Branams took their remodeling needs to architectural designer Ann Patterson, and the result is comfortable, attractive universal design.

Now Ron can grill at his peninsula work area while Sandy cooks at the higher counter. The KitchenAid refrigerator's narrow doors and bottom freezer let Ron get drinks and ice with ease. while the cabinet above his work area holds dishes within reach. The bar sink features single-lever control for both water pressure and temperature. A microwave is set low-beneath the television and oven-and has a pull-out shelf underneath.

#### **RESOURCES FOR SPECIAL NEEDS**

Until universal design erases barriers and truly provides products and spaces for everyone, people with special needs must search for devices that can make the difference between dependent and independent living.

The National Rehabilitation Information Center (NARIC) offers help. Funded by the National Institute on Disability and Rehabilitation Research, part of the U.S. Department of Education, NARIC has access to a vast library and to computer data bases listing thousands of aids and devices for anyone with a disability.

NARIC's internal data base, REHABDATA, is a computerized listing of more than 13,000 references. In addition, information from ABLEDATA, a data base containing thousands of listings about products and manufacturers, is accessible through the center.

Professionals from NARIC's information team are available by telephone for consultations from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Eastern time, Monday through Friday. They charge \$10 for the first 100 bibliographic or product citations and \$5 for each additional 100 citations.

#### DESIGN FOR ALL

"All people, able or disabled, young or old, should have the opportunity to fully express themselves in their personal environment," says interior designer Tony Torrice, whose award-winning interiors for children emphasize

universal design.

Convertibility, in the form of movable furniture and reversible fabrics, is part of his overall scheme. "Convertibility provides children with a chance to change and rearrange their living space as they grow up and out of things," he explains. The movable modular

unit shown above was part of Torrice's design for 10-yearold Scott, who is deaf. The convertible chest's rolltop opens to reveal Scott's computer work area.

Although Torrice began his career by creating universal design for children, his practice has evolved to encompass others with special needs, including the handicapped and elderly. "As people age, they are confronted with frustrating problems that can turn their own homes into prisons," he says. "Fixtures should not be unmanageable for an individual stricken with rheumatoid arthritis. Counter heights should be adjustable. We need designs that account for a person living alone and that provide emotional and physical stability in one's home.

"By building houses flexible enough to accommodate clients' changing needs, we will be able to adapt their environments so that they can live independently as they grow older."

Universal design, according to Torrice, provides spaces in which people of all abilities can function and feel comfortable. Through his seminars for professionals and classes for budding interior designers, he hopes to enlighten others.

"The end user is too often overlooked by design firms," he believes. "We tend to design only for the fast and the affluent. Innovative universal design can give people much more control over their environment."

reparing for the future propels the Skirvins as they build their retirement home in Seattle. By designing a house within a house, they make it possible to restrict their living to one accessible floor if their future needs demand it. "It will be a place where we can live with artifacts from our grandparents and drawings from our grandchildren," says Elice.

Universal design also benefits the young. Andrea and Dennis Kahn, of North Brunswick, New Jersey, had toy shelves that look like blocks securely mounted on the wall of their son's room. The blocks have handholds that encourage 5-year-old Justin, who has cerebral palsy, to stand and walk. The Kahns had their home designed to meet the needs of both Justin, who uses a scooterboard to get around, and his 8-year-old sister Danielle.

Juliann Walter wanted a stylish but functional home for

her teenaged son George, who also has cerebral palsy. He cannot walk very far without support, so architect Herschel Parnes used painted steel pipe creatively throughout the house in Kirkland, Washington. The pipe pops up as everything from the necessary handrails to decorative wall sconces and useful pot racks.

Mark Russell's family built a 1,500-square-foot addition full of universal design ideas onto their 200-year-old Cape Cod-style house in West Harwick, Massachusetts. They also remodeled the original house, paying careful attention to its historical character. Narrow Colonial doorways were notched at the bottom to accommodate Mark's wheelchair. "While the adaptations have been essential for my independence, I was pleased to find that the changes didn't mar the home's beauty—in fact, they often enhanced it," says Mark (see his indispensable home on page 102). (Continued on page 103.)

#### MORE THAN A POOL

An appealing sunlit grotto shelters a spa and pool in Loren Greenhill's redwood solarium. His creative arrangement of rocks and shelves acts as steps, enabling Loren to lower himself into the spa from his wheelchair.


Swimming in the pool,

which he reaches from the spa by lifting his legs over a tiled shelf, keeps Loren in shape for whitewater rafting and snow skiing in the local Sierra Nevada range with his two sons. "Every time I'm able to do something like swim on my own it gives me

a feeling of freedom," says Loren. "The fewer architectural barriers I encounter, the less I feel different—and the more I feel like I can do anything. I relish good design."

The solarium also acts as a heat sink for the house's solar heating system. Fans circulate sun-warmed air under a tile floor in the adjoining living room, while solar panels heat water for the pool.

Sliding doors surround the room, permitting Loren access to redwood decks overlooking the mountains in Cool, California.

#### **CULTIVATING UNIVERSALLY**

Planting in containers and raised beds makes any garden easier to maintain. A universally enjoyable garden takes the details a step further:

 Wide paths of cement, wooden decking or similar materials, with a continuous raised edge, help the visually impaired and provide support for wheelchair riders and older people.

• Scented herbs like lavender and bergamot will perfume the air if planted where they will brush against wheels. They can also act as scented markers for the blind.

 Dwarf fruit trees grow to only 4 or 5 feet at maturity, making harvesting fun for gardeners of any age and size. Many dwarf trees grow well in containers.

• Low-maintenance ornamental grasses and succulents fill out areas that are hard to care for.

• A low-hanging trellis of grapes, or of more exotic fruit like kiwis, makes picking easy from a chair.

Benches around raised beds give a gardener a place to sit while weeding, harvesting—or just reading.


#### ACCESSIBLE GARDENING

#### OPENING DOORS WITH STYLE

Universal design does not necessarily provide a single solution for every challenge.

The Desipro door handles (above), designed by Attilio Marcolli for Valli & Colombo, use different transformations of the same design to ease door opening for people who face a variety of physical challenges. "It is our view that being disabled should not deprive people of their desires for aesthetically pleasing designs," explains Carlo Valli, president of the company.

After studying various body movements and the abilities needed to open a door, the designer created a set of handles, in a variety of bright colors, that fit any existing door. While each handle is designed for a specific physical challenge, they make opening a door easier for everyone-young or old, short or tall.

The various handle grips provide support for arms that lack motor coordination and precision, have impaired strength, are spastic, have only a light grip, or are capable of movement but cannot rotate a handle.

Universal design doesn't impose solutions for only the fittest over the needs of the less able. It transcends ability with innovation. It's design that works for everyone.

#### **HIGH TECH OPTIONS**

Computers, infrared sensors, voice-recognition programs and talking appliances are all more available and less expensive than ever before-and they are on the cutting edge of universal

The common telephone has evolved into a machine that understands your voice, writes notes to you, talks to your friends and goes almost anywhere.

Entrepreneur David Hunt uses the phone to open windows, draw drapes, adjust the heat and turn on lights and appliances at his Southern California home. Smart systems make life easier for everyone, but they are especially important to David, a victim of retinitis pigmentosa who is slowly losing his sight.

Other computer-driven systems like The Home Manager can be programmed to run security checks, control the temperature, manage appliances and turn on lights.

Even at the low end of high tech, universal design abounds. The Big Button Phone (page 95) is easier for everyone to read. AT&T provides it and additional supportive telephone equipment from their Special Needs Center.

Voice-activated, the Freedom Phone from Southwestern Bell (right) stores up to 63 telephone numbers that can be dialed by simple



voice commands: "Call Mary" is as easily done as said. For those unable to physically dial a phone, and for others who cannot remember phone numbers, the Freedom Phone may be a lifesaver.

Computer users have an assortment of both hardware and software to choose from. The IBM National Support Center for Persons with Disabilities acts as a clearinghouse for computer information.

Another source of special programs and equipment is ComputAbility. Their plastic keyboard templates provide support and a resting place for the hands of typists with wayward fingers

A Personal Emergency Response System (PERS) signals for help from a base station during an emergency. PERS provides independence and quickly summons assistance for victims of heart disease, women with osteoporosis, stroke victims and the frail elderly. A variety of models are now available. See the Buying Guide on page 108 for further information.

At 7 this morning, my alarm went off in an ungodly combination of bleeps, buzzes and clangs. After a series of yawns and stretches, I managed to clamber from my cozy bed into a hot shower, and eventually found myself facing a glass of o.j. and a piece of jellied toast.

No big deal, right? Wrong. Oh, I'm sure my a.m. routine, plus or minus a cup of coffee, is common among millions, but my house is not. Without it, this would all be impossible.

Three years ago I found myself in a wheelchair. Since that time I have developed a new and higher regard for my home. While its special features are hardly noticed by the common eye, to someone on wheels—and I don't mean roller skates—they are obvious.

Take, for example, my kitchen table. An antique trestle, it is extra-high to allow for chair and leg room—a point many restaurants neglect. Another often unnoticed feature is that the thermostats are conveniently placed at my eye level.

The intricacies of universal design and accessibility go beyond the usual ramps.

Consider my bathroom sink. It's shallow and stylishly mounted in an overhanging counter with the drainpipe below angled away from my incoming knees. Everything is within my reach, an impossibility with most vanities. Seamless vinyl flooring allows free wheeling into my spacious roll-in shower.

Everyone who has searched frantically for a spatula in a friend's kitchen while the eggs burned realizes why home isn't just the place you park your car at night. In my home I'm independent and free of any structural barriers. In a world of stairs and deep pile rugs, I know how truly indispensable my home is.





rofessionals are also awakening to the power of universal design. The American Society of Interior Designers (ASID) and the National Kitchen and Bath Association (NKBA) both offer seminars and classes full of universal design ideas.

"I have quite a few clients who can't see themselves clearly unless they're close to the mirror," says interior designer Gay Fly, a teacher for the NKBA program. "In my bathroom designs, I scoop out the counter in front of the mirror so the client can stand closer. And for better task lighting, I put in another 100 watts for every five years over age 40."

The National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) presented universal design ideas in an adaptable house that was open to the public last summer. Constructed as part of the 1988 Portland, Oregon, "Street of Dreams" project, it was designed with removable base cabinets in the kitchen and bath, lowered light switches, a roll-in shower and a raised whirlpool. While the NAHB adaptable house looks like any other, it works much harder (see Home Plans section).

Members of the American Institute of Architects are beginning to strategize an approach to the future with their "Vision 2000" survey. The study identifies a major demographic shift in our aging society, and universal design will become part of

the Institute's plan for addressing it.

Working with rehabilitation therapists, architects and other professionals, The Northern Trust Company in Chicago uses universal design ideas to make homes work for clients who are in guardianships administered by the company.



More than 10 million older Americans have difficulty with daily tasks at home.

## Simple Green

Like the glisten of an old oak banister, polished for decades by warm hands, natural patinas create a sense of history. Perhaps this is why verdigris—the green and blue hues that copper and brass take on from years of aging—is a favored finish for hardware and detailing in contemporary design.

But who has the patience to wait for Mother Nature and Father Time to turn copper green? Fortunately, you can speed up the verdigris process with a chemical solution; it is available premixed or you can mix your own. When applied to copper or brass railings, frames, hinges or similar hardware, the solution "antiques" the metal.

Michael Kramer of Kensington, Maryland, who teaches faux finishing and gilding at the Smithsonian, has taken verdigris a step further. He showed us how to verdigris surfaces other than

copper and brass by first applying a layer of copper leaf—extremely thin copper that comes in sheet form. The process involves priming any porous surface, brushing on size, adding leaf, applying verdigris solution and varnishing.

You'll need ammonium chloride and cupric nitrate, which you can buy at a jewelry supply store or school science supply outlet. A little goes a long way; a 2-ounce jar of each will handle most jobs. Though the solution isn't highly caustic, it's still a good idea to wear rubber gloves.

Copper leaf, adhesive size, brushes and spray varnish are available at art stores and crafts outlets—but copper leaf is not always stocked, so call first. Other resources for copper leaf are frame shops

and signmakers (also see the Buying Guide on page 108).

The working procedures are shown on the facing page. Here are a few more tips:

- Consider tinting the primer a bluish-green color so that any small spots you miss won't show.
- Let the adhesive size "tack up" for about an hour before applying the leaf. It should be slightly tacky but not sticky.
- Working with the copper leaf is a fairly easy—but delicate—job. It can tear under the strain of a misdirected sneeze. If you rub too much or too hard when applying the antiquing solution, the leaf will disintegrate.
- Wear gloves when you handle the leaf, since natural skin oils repel the verdigris solution. Work the leaf into all nooks and crannies using a soft brush; overlap adjoining edges at least ½ inch. Practice before applying it to the final surface.
- Consider testing various solution strengths—each will yield a slightly different result. For the chair rail shown here, we used 2 tablespoons each of cupric nitrate and ammonium chloride, dissolving each separately in ½ cup water and then mixing the two solutions together. If you apply a second coat, use the same solution diluted with an additional cup of water. Watch carefully during application; if the solution begins to eat through the leaf, stop.
- To protect the finished leaf, spray on at least two coats of matte varnish.
   Scribe along the masking tape's edge with a sharp blade before removing it.

I. Sand an already painted surface. If surface isn't sealed, paint with two coats of oil-based primer, sanding after each.




2. Mask off section to be treated. If working on a wall, catch drips with a paper dropcloth (let it extend across the floor).




3. Brush on a thin coat of size, using a disposable bristle brush. Let this become tacky, not sticky, before applying the leaf.



Dissolve chemicals completely in water (dilutions discussed at left). Shake solu-tions together in a glass jar.



5. Wearing gloves and working very deli-cately, cut the spine from the bound cop-per leaf book. Slightly fan the sheets.



6. Lay copper leaf, supported with paper interleaf, on sized surface. Pull out paper, gently pressing leaf down with dry brush.




7. Press fragments of copper leaf onto any missed spots. Gently brush back and forth to remove loose edges of copper leaf.



8. Dab on verdigris solution with cotton. Stop when chemical begins to etch. Let dry; repeat with dilute solution if needed.



9. After surface has dried completely, spray on two (or more) coats of clear matte varnish. Remove masking tape.

The home plans on the previous pages reflect the work of architects and designers across the nation. They cover a variety of architectural styles and sizes and are available as working blueprints that you can actually build from.

Most plans conform to the Uniform Building Code, a national standard for residential construction in various states, in effect at the time they were drawn

Remember that modifications and the assistance of an architect or professional building designer are usually necessary, either to comply with local and state regulations or to accommodate your personal taste or building site conditions. In fact, most of the homeowners who buy and build from our plans make some changes in them.

Home plans packages vary slightly with each designer, but most of them include the following elements:

Exterior elevations, which show the way each side of the house will look when it's built.

Foundation plans, which include drawings for a full, partial or daylight basement, crawl space or a slab foundation, depending on the plan you order. Some designers routinely include drawings for more than one type of foundation; others require you to specify the foundation you want.

Detailed floor plans, which show each level of the house and provide dimensions for rooms, doors, windows, stairways, walls and so on. Interior elevations, which show cabinets, built-ins, fireplaces and other specific features.

Cross-sections, which show details of the home's framing, construction and insulation.

In addition to the blueprints, some designers include other helpful elements, or provide them for a nominal fee. Available only if specified in the plan description, these items inlude:
