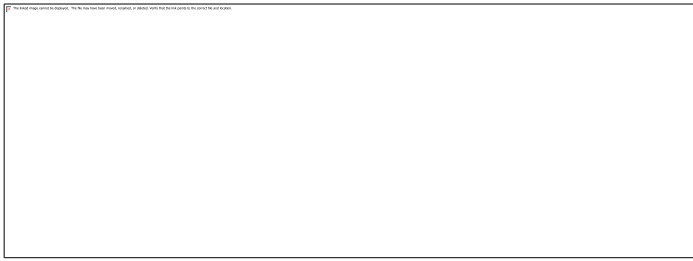

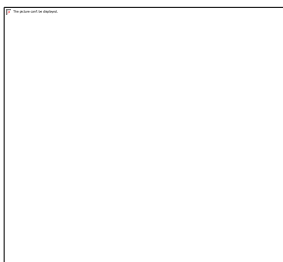
COMING EVENTS:

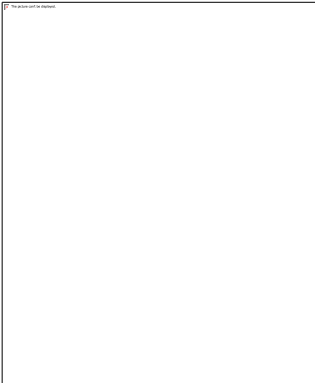

NEWS THIS WEEK:

- About 40 journeyed to Charlotte this past weekend for ModShopIII, TMH's latest Modernist house trip. We saw seven great homes, including the recently saved AG Odell house on Hempstead, three houses on Cloister, the Jones House on Knob Hill, Alan Ingram's 1961 house on Lynbrook (including Alan Ingram!), and a relatively new design by Stan Russell. - **Will Lambeth** has been accepted into the graduate program in Architecture at Harvard University's Graduate School of Design. For the past four years, Will worked for Frank Harmon Architect on variety of significant projects, including the NC Museum of Natural Science's Prairie Ridge Eco-station, the AIA North Carolina Center for Architecture and Design, and the Children's Learning Center at the North Carolina Zoological Garden. His most recent project, the Lath House at the JC Raulston Arboretum, NC State University, won a merit award from AIA Triangle in April 2011 and was published on ArchDaily.com, an international online magazine.

NEW ON THE MARKET

1968 - The Charles A. and Fannie Fountain Residence, 211 North Dudley, Greensboro NC. Commissioned 1967. Designed by Gerard Gray. Charles Fountain was Professor Emeritus of Landscape Architecture and a founding father of the Landscape Architecture Program at North Carolina A&T. Sold in 2001 to current owner Abigail Holmes. For sale, \$149,900, here.

PRICE DROPS

1955 - The Jim and Kelly Brandt House, his own at 122 East Drewry Lane, Raleigh. Built by Frank Walser. The original roof design was gravel with a series of arches set next to each other along the length of the house. It has been replaced with a traditional shingle roof. For sale, \$350,000 down from \$380,000, here. Open House June 5, 2-5pm.

1977 - The Vivian Lovell House, 104 Wolf's Trail, Chapel Hill. Architect unknown. Current owner Lani Cartier. Went on the market June 2009. For sale, \$375,000 down from \$525,000, here.

1989 - The Robert and Connie Shertz Residence, a Deck House at 7229 Blaney Bluffs Lane, Raleigh, right on Lake Wheeler. Two acres. Went on the market in August 2009. For sale, \$775,000 down from \$929,000, here. Virtual tour. Another virtual tour.

1990 - The Charles and Annette Kahn House, 25B Mount Bolus Road, aka 102 Weeping Cherry Court, Chapel Hill. Designed by Kahn upon his return to the Triangle from being Dean of the Architecture School at the University of Kansas. 3.37 acres. 5500 sf. The east end of the property abuts the Bolin Creek Park and Nature Preserve. For sale, \$910,000, down from \$1.25M, here.
