



The 1970 Mark Bernstein House, 5300 Hardison Road, Charlotte, has been destroyed. It was #1 on NCMH's Endangered Modernist Houses List. Designed by Lawrence Allen Bernstein, Mark's brother, and a student of Frank Lloyd Wright. Locally, Crutcher Ross was the project architect. The house was kept vacant by the owners since about 2007, and although over the years there were several parties interested in purchasing it, the owners decided to tear it down last week.
