

Others tease me. My dear friend David used to sneak into my office and, forging my handwriting, add things to my lists. He fooled me more than once. So naturally, I love *Met Home*'s annual Design 100 issue, our ultimate list of 100 of the best products, people, places and principles from the world of design. On another, Ellen DeGeneres gently spoofs the lists—but invites readers to send in and share their own (Ellen.WarnerBros.com/show/lifelist).

I don't require a list to be revelatory. Or intellectual. Or even amusing. I like them all, from grocery lists and packing lists to to-do lists (my personal favorite). I think it's because of the sense of accomplishment I get when all the items are crossed off. Design 100 marries everyday lists with fulfill-the-dream lists, balancing, we hope, aspiration and inspiration: things you can go out and buy right now, things you might have to save up for, things you can do that might save someone else from poverty or homelessness or save the planet from exhaustion. It's not a list about checking things off but about expanding our world. And it's a list I love to share.

When a young Los Angeles family—including both children and a variety of pets—acquired a vintage Mediterranean-style villa, they opted to leave the home's sprawling architecture intact while transforming just about everything else: interior spaces, outdoor rooms devised for large-scale entertaining and any lingering fusty attitudes. "The owners wanted a clean, fun, modern look," says interior designer Marjorie Skouras, who spearheaded the inspired renovation. "They're young and hip," she says of her clients, "and I like things that are traditional but twisted."

At first glance, this 1920s property might appear to be just another American rendition of a stately European home. All the formal elements are neatly in place: a terraced entryway, arched windows, a red-tile roof, even a columned balcony. But on second glance, it's clear that there's a surrealistic, Edward Scissorhands sense of whimsy at play here: The topiaried boxwoods are plastic, and the window trim has been painted as blue as Cinderella's ball gown.

The front door opens into a grand but welcoming entrance hall with limestone floors and vaulted ceilings, a vestibule that takes visitors directly through the house and into the gardens. In the adjacent living room, the ceiling soars to 16 feet and the walls are an astonishingly vibrant hot pink.

"We like a lot of color," Skouras understates charmingly. The designer and clients had collaborated happily on previous projects, and Skouras knew she'd found in the wife a fearless co-conspirator. The husband, she admits, was a bit more conservative. "I made a balsa-wood model—complete with furniture—stained with all the colors," she explains, "and then he was convinced."

Although the house dates from the 1920s, it had been expanded and updated in the 1980s, meaning that Skouras had to do little in the way of demolition. She did have her way with the color wheel, however. The living room glows like light on a wall of bougainvillea. It's as vibrant as Matisse's famed "Red Studio." Art includes a pair of anonymous portraits the owners bought in China and a suite of Allen Ruppersberg drawings.

#### What the Pros Know

Pablo Picasso once asked, "Why do two colors put one next to the other sing? Can one really explain this?" For Marjorie Skouras, color constantly delivers drama and excitement. "Bold colors always elicit an instant reaction," she observes. "Most people are surprised at how much they like it." Skouras had long thought about designing a hot-pink-and-lime-green room; on this project, the client embraced the idea with great enthusiasm. "Usually there's a bit of compromise in choosing colors," she says. "We need to discover the comfort level for the client, who has to live with the final decision." Skouras chose a saturated pink inspired by nature: Think magenta bougainvillea in the midday sun. "I've also always wanted to do a room with the colors of plumbago—periwinkle blue and olive-y green." But greens, although favored by nature, can present tricky choices. "Green in a bedroom can be dicey; it can cast an unflattering light," she says. "But still, take a chance; it's only paint."

Although the house was originally built in the 1920s, over the years it grew like an architectural Topsy. The existing footprint of the house meandered and the flow between rooms was interrupted or nonexistent, but the overall building structure was sound. Skouras and the homeowners agreed not to alter the sprawling architecture in any way; instead, they chose to reinvent the house entirely from the inside out with design rather than demolition. Many of the countless rooms went entirely untouched.

Confronted with the daunting task of imposing continuity, Skouras came up with an imaginative solution. Instead of tying each room together with a similar palette or aesthetic, she made each room a little stage set dedicated to its own design identity—not surprising perhaps, since Skouras spent 17 years in the film business before opening her design firm seven years ago.

The hospitable dining room is neutral yet theatrical. Heavy silk drapes frame the doorways, an original parquet floor contributes to the room's old-world urbane ambience, and a collection of sculpted heads by Eric Goulder provides a fresh variation on an antique theme. Skouras, the daughter of renowned interior designer Patti Skouras (well-known for her classical style), designed the sideboards, constructed of stainless steel, white marble and wood, with 1940s French art deco in mind. A vintage lamp designed by Tommi Parzinger displays a jazzy mix of industrial materials and sophisticated flair. Skouras created the rock-crystal-framed mirror celebrating the intersection of art with nature.




"They really wanted to lighten things up here," says Skouras of her clients, and she was just the person to help them do it. French doors open from the house directly onto the patio. She painted the door frames blue. (Above the doors from the living room, hot pink Roman shades are visible to add another wink to the proceedings.) Throughout the lush green landscape of the gardens, blasts of purple occur: in the ruffled canopies of the umbrellas, flouncy as flamenco skirts, and the slim cushions atop delicately streamlined chairs. A neat canvas pavilion, with purple curtain tiebacks and trim, appears prettily gift-wrapped with a minimal touch of color. The deep blue water of the swimming pool reflects the tent's roofline, the sky and the silhouetted landscape.

"One of our main objectives here was to be able to accommodate as many people as possible," says Skouras, indicating the delicate balancing act basic to the overall design: how to maintain the private coziness of a family home while incorporating an expansive sense of hospitality for parties and frequent fully subscribed fundraising events. To that end, the great lawn, a perfect playground for the kids by day, provides a graceful open-air salon for the adults later in the evening.


Skouras created new outdoor furniture, with pure lines and periwinkle cushions, to mix amiably with a classic collection of sleek, steel-framed chairs and tables designed by Richard Schultz. In the evenings, the outdoor rooms are illuminated by Satori light sculptures, great minimalist lanterns that cast a magical radiance.

French doors lead out to the adjoining patio and a tented garden pavilion—a series of well-planned spaces designed for easy and wonderfully civilized entertaining. The Santa Barbara umbrellas, with their broad canopies, are modeled on utilitarian European market umbrellas; decked out in frills, they exert a madcap presence. "When the umbrellas are all open," observes Skouras, "it looks like a scene from Alice in Wonderland."






























There is it a single work of art hanging in Rose and Ewen Cameron's weekend house on the south fork of Long Island. And it's not for lack of space (their living room alone is about 20 by 50 feet). Instead, as the sun moves through the sky, trees cast sometimes playful, sometimes haunting shadows on the building's concrete walls. "That is the art," says Rose, who insisted that their surfaces be left to nature's interventions.

Her partner in restraint was William Reese, who attended architecture school in Virginia in the '60s, then moved to Southern California to design modernist houses. But after relocating to the Hamptons in the 1980s, he was disappointed to find that nearly all his clients wanted traditional buildings. When Rose and Ewen walked into his office, he says, "it was like a dream come true." John Welteroth, whose Otter Pond Construction built the house, says, "It was the best marriage of architect and client I have ever seen."

What the Camerons brought to that marriage was a love of the Japanese architect Tadao Ando, whose walls of sheer concrete form powerful, and yet surprisingly soft, volumes. Reese's contribution was a deep knowledge of Rudolf Schindler, the Austrian-born architect who worked in California from the 1920s to the '40s. It certainly didn't hurt that Rose herself has training in both interior design and architecture and an affinity for the Mexican architect Luis Barragán.

Together, they came up with a home where five long concrete walls extending beyond the footprint of the house frame rooms of Honduran mahogany that nestle like cliff dwellings against the concrete. "It's Ando and Schindler à la Reese," says the architect, who adds, "I've waited all my life to do this house."

Living room furniture, arranged around an Oriental rug from ABC Carpet, adds curves to the geometry of the architecture. Pieces include a dark blue sofa from B&B Italia, coconut-trunk barrels, ceramic side tables with a steel finish and oversize cylindrical lamps. Even the *Barcelona* chairs, by Mies van der Rohe, master of the straight edge, were chosen for the soft curves of their crisscross legs.



#### What the Pros Know

Because concrete "acts like a giant sponge," builder John Welteroth says, he had to ensure that it didn't make the house too cold in winter or get too wet. To accomplish the former, he poured the concrete over "inner" walls of metal studs covered in plywood. The space between the studs was filled with insulation. That was the only way to keep the house comfortable in cold weather (given that the walls extend deep into the ground). Once those "inner" walls were up, Welteroth built formwork for the concrete, using marine-grade plywood, then inserted steel reinforcing rods and poured the mix. To keep standing roof water from seeping into the porous material, he installed copper-coated lead flashing along the top of each wall. Then he covered the vertical wall surfaces with clear silicone, which causes water to bead off. The silicone also protects the walls from discoloration, which can come from unexpected sources, including iron in groundwater being thrown against the walls by sprinklers.





When the Camerons bought their lot, which overlooks a bay at the east end of Long Island, they weren't sure if they'd be allowed to build the house they envisioned. The area is full of faux-historical McMansions, and the neighborhood association was opposed to anything "too modern." Even after the plans were approved, neighbors who saw the concrete walls appear would come by to express displeasure, says the contractor. His approach was to take the skeptics on tours of the house. "When we were done," he says, "they wouldn't want to leave."


If so, it's because the rooms are serene and perfectly proportioned. Though the house is big—more than 6,000 square feet—the goal, Rose says, wasn't size but openness. The house has virtually no doors (rooms simply flow into other rooms), which, she says, "reflects the simplicity of how we live." At Rose's insistence, the architect struggled mightily to hide mundane items like light


switches, thermostats and vents. She also insisted that every visible surface be either steel, glass, concrete or mahogany. "I kept everyone focused on those four materials," says Rose, who is now putting her design skills to work on a beach house in the Caribbean.

Builder John Welteroth knew the house would take at least two years to build and that the kind of sand you use affects the color of concrete, so he bought all the sand he needed from one supplier at the beginning of the job. Thanks to his foresight, the walls are all precisely the same color, the kind of perfect consistency that the Camerons and their architect insisted on.



















FOr years, Rose and Ewen, the CEO of his own ad agency, spent weekends in a modest 1960s house made almost entirely of glass. But the house was too small for their growing family, and, besides, "it didn't feel that safe for toddlers," says Rose, who was born in the Philippines, moved to the United States at 13 and met Ewen when they worked for the same firm. Soon the Camerons (whose base is a loft in TriBeCa) were scouring the Hamptons for an architect who could help them build their dream house. But the houses they saw were "too fussy, trying to hard," Rose says. When they met Reese, they knew they had found a kindred spirit, and he felt the same way about them.

"It takes a rare client to let you do something this simple, much less to insist on it," says Reese gratefully.

Rose's drive for consistency went as far as covering the teak decks with the same stain that was used inside the house, which, she admits, requires extra maintenance. But it means that the outdoor rooms, where the family spends much of each summer, are just as "finished" as the rooms inside the house. They are also furnished just as elegantly, with curved pieces to "foil" the right-angled architecture. Looking at the chaises (this page), Rose says she chose them for their "S-ness," a word she invented to perfectly describe their gentle lines. But the gentlest lines are the ones nature creates. "Shadows," says Rose, pointing to a wall outside her living room, "make the house come alive."


- 1 Jack plays near the front entrance. 2 The pool continues under a concrete wall, where it becomes visible through the window at the end of the foyer.

- dows." 5 The upper terrace, with a custom-made table, is a favorite place for summer dining. 6 The concrete walls project into the backyard.













SS MASTER'S CACHE

Artistic success is usually measured in


accolades, not accordions. But for Dale Chihuly (above), arguably the best-known American glass artist since Louis Comfort Tiffany, acclaim has brought not just a steady stream of commissions and museum exhibitions, but the means to include a passion for collecting that's Smithsonian-like in its depth and nearly as eclectic.


"I like multiples. It doesn't interest me to collect just a few things," explains the artist, who took a shine to toy soldiers while growing up in Tacoma, Washington, and now collects everything from tennis rackets and transistor radios to the aforementioned accordions. Eighteen years ago, Chihuly purchased a 30,000-square-foot boat-building shop on the shores of Seattle's Lake Union and transformed it into the headquarters for his thriving glass business. The Boathouse, as the structure is called, contains the hot shop—where he supervises a team of artisans (Chihuly hasn't actively blown glass since losing an eye and dislocating a shoulder in the late 1970s)—and common spaces that illuminate the connections between his collections and his art.


Originally trained as an interior designer ("My heart wasn't in it"), Chihuly still enjoys arranging spaces, whether it's an exhibition he's planning for San Francisco's de Young Museum in 2008 or a veritable banquet hall installed atop the Boathouse deck. The site of numerous charitable events, the room is dominated by an 88-foot table crafted from a single slab of fir. Chihuly's signature chandeliers hang above, like Technicolor coral and sea urchins paying homage to the twinkling waters outside. A hallway around the corner leads to a breathtaking lap pool blanketed with glass shells.

Indian trade blankets line the walls of the Northwest Room, where they're joined by an Italo Scanga sculpture and a 1915 motorcycle from Indian—the company immortalized in the film *The World's Fastest Indian*. Most of the blankets were made by Pendleton, including a custom one (visible in the top row) bearing Chihuly's signature. He gave one of the limitededition blankets to each of his 90-plus employees for Christmas.




While Chihuly draws much of his artistic inspiration from nature, he acknowledges his debt to American Indian culture in the Boathouse's Northwest Room. Here, Indian trade blankets are stacked six high and displayed on racks in a riotous patchwork of autumnal color. "There's probably about two to three hundred in this room," the artist observes, "but I actually have about 850." The geometric designs inspired a series of glass cylinders Chihuly started making in the 1970s, while the slouchy vessels from the same period are a tribute to Northwest Coast Indian baskets—dozens of which line the room's shelves.

"Unlike most collectors, who really take pride in finding pieces, I prefer to buy a whole collection—and then buy another collection to go with it," says the larger-than-life Chihuly, who combs antiques shops when he travels and alerts friends and dealers whenever a new obsession strikes.

Another wall pays tribute to the work of pioneering Seattle photographer Edward S. Curtis. His haunting sepia-tone images of Indian women lend an air of hushed solemnity to the space. (Like the rest of the Boathouse, the Northwest Room is only open to the public by invitation or for private functions.) Vintage leather club chairs cluster around a massive coffee table crafted from an 1,100-year-old log. In a setting such as this (there's even an Algonquin canoe hanging from the ceiling), a vintage motorcycle might seem a little out of place—until you spy the manufacturer's name, Indian, emblazoned across the gas tank.

### What the Pros Know

Like many a 19th-century collector before him, Dale Chihuly displays his collections in every corner of his live-work space. To maximize their impact, he arranges the objects en masse by category, instead of distributed around a room, transforming even a shelf of old shaving brushes into a composition worthy of contemplation. (Collectors on a budget, take note: Damaged or inferior pieces are less noticeable when they're displayed as part of a group.) "Putting the collections out and seeing how they look helps me place my own glass in spaces," says Chihuly. To dispel any sense that you're touring a museum, the artist finds novel places to display objects: overhead, on the floor, lined up on bathroom walls and tucked into shelves above, below and even in front of windows. This technique doesn't just work with rarities: By removing an object from its expected environment, Chihuly manages to make something as prosaic as a rowing shell look like a work of art.

Chihuly maintains a private apartment above the glass studio (a pied-à-verre, if you will), where he lived until his 2005 marriage to Leslie Jackson. (The couple met 14 years ago on a blind date and have a 9-year-old son, Jackson.) A two-story library surveys Lake Union through a glass wall overlaid with rows of Medusa-like vessels from the artist's Venetian series. When friends come over to watch movies, a 20-foot screen descends from above. Overhead, dozens of accordions dangle from the ceiling, as if frozen in flight. "My father and brother both played," says Chihuly, who keeps hundreds of additional instruments in a Tacoma warehouse, along with collections of lunch boxes, canoes and some 1,600 chalkware figurines originally given away as carnival prizes.

Chihuly's obsession with Americana is balanced by an intense interest in art history. Hundreds of art books sit flush against the library wall on narrow steel shelves. "I like to see the cloth of a book," he says, adding that it's also easier to identify the subject when it's stamped in gold against a plain background. A desk designed by New York artist John Torreano occupies the center of the room—but not for long. "I designed a piano for Steinway and I'm going to put it where that desk is," Chihuly says. The instrument is chartreuse and features—appropriately enough—a translucent glass lid. At this point, Chihuly is getting only one. But he might want to clear some space on the ceiling... just in case. \*\*

Opposites attract in Kara Mann's world: The dark reaches of a long hallway, painted a self-invented shade of brown she calls bittersweet, gives way, painted a self-invented shade of brown sile cans bittersweet, gives way to the master bedroom, diaphanous in white. In the same hall, a vignette composed of a luminous Sally Mann photograph of a Yucatán ruin and a vintage antler-and-pine table that Mann dug out from under piles of junk at a funky L.A. antique store catch and reflect overhead light and add both history and drama to the heavily molded walls. the rarefied world of vintage Lake Shore Drive apartment buildings, where interior designer Kara Mann lives with her partner, Adam Heneghan, an interactive marketing entrepreneur, few of the units look like Mary Shelley and Edgar Allen Poe had time-traveled forward to reinvent the Gothic novel for the 21st century. But like the Phantom of the Opera, Mann, a romantic at heart, is attracted to the nocturnal. And to the pleasant aesthetic tension created by the juxtaposition of opposites: dark and light, old and new, hard and soft, refined and raw.

"Good design requires combinations that forge counterpoints," she offers by way of explanation. "You have to start with the basics, then add things that are surprising and curious to get an edge." In her own 2,200-square-foot top-floor home, she favors "the rebellious and unexpected." And there is no question that lamps made out of skulls and sideboards covered in graffiti—conventions in the world of rock music and even fashion, from which she draws inspiration—are new to home decor. "I'm a bit of a renegade," she says, though you might not guess it from her wholesome demeanor.

The apartment, however, shows a hint of heavy metal hedonism: Carved wooden crosses grace ledges and walls; the base of a table lamp is actually a bronze skull; ottomans are drenched in roughhewn hides; and the backrest of an ebony hall chair is one big heraldic flourish. You can practically hear the organ music.

Mann makes no bones about her attraction to "dark, murky colors, objects with heavy-duty Renaissance touches, leather, rock 'n' roll. They're all hard-edged," she concedes, "but I balance them with deeply sensual things that are softer and neutral."

In the richly detailed living room, Mann indulged her love of the theatrical by contrasting the high sheen of the dark walls with light furniture in matte fabrics, including dove-gray suede chairs by Christian Liaigre from the Holly Hunt Collection and wool-flannel *Apta* ottomans (by Maxalto for B&B Italia at Luminaire). The art over the fireplace is by Joseph Stashkevetch; the photo on the far right wall is by Alec Soth.






# "THE STRATEGY WAS TO PLAY OFF POSITIVES AND NEGATIVES," SAYS INTERIOR DESIGNER KARA MANN. "IF THE WALLS IN A ROOM ARE DARK, THE FURNITURE IS LIGHT—AND VICE VERSA."



#### What the Pros Know

Kara Mann modulated her black-and-white vision by rendering the dark side in a color she mixed from equal parts of Benjamin Moore's Night Horizon and Black. The new hue, which she calls bittersweet or bittersweet chocolate, is "richer than just brown and softer than pure black," she notes. The 50-50 formula informs many of the palette choices in the scheme. The walls, she says, are split "pretty equally" between dark and light (Benjamin Moore's China White, which is also used on the ceilings to balance the dark wood floors). For the floors, the formula was also 50-50, Dura Seal's Ebony and Antique Brown Penetrating Finish stains. Getting the right color on the floor was tricky. She replaced the oak floor ("too busy with its narrow boards and complex grain") with broader walnut planks, but the walnut's warm undertones gave the floors an unacceptably red tone. To get a floor color that matched the walls, they had to redo them, she reports, "bleaching them out and starting over."




In addition to the large living room and adjacent reading nook, the Mann/Heneghan apartment consists of a small entry hall, an efficient kitchen, formal dining room, guest bath and a bedroomsize space set up as a media room. Most of these rooms have direct access to a large roof terrace. In the center of the apartment is a long hallway that opens into the expansive master suite, which has a smaller, more private adjacent terrace.

"The strategy was to play off positives and negatives," says Mann. "If the walls in a room are dark, the furniture is light, and vice versa. So when you look from one space to another, a dark area will lead into a light one, or the reverse," she explains. Mann kept her palette limited: a dark, custom brown and Benjamin Moore's China White for the walls, and a lot of creamy near-white natural furnishings. And while the eggshell finish on the walls reflects light, most of the furnishings are upholstered in textured matte-finished fabrics.

Mann plays with proportion, too, to assist in the creation of her dreamscape. The dining room has a wall-size Studio H mirror leaning against one end and a huge Kevin Riley hanging fixture (from Holly Hunt). But where some might have gone overboard with elaborately carved Jacobean chairs in heavy tapestries worthy of a medieval castle, Mann provides austere (almost ritual) seating on a row of Douglas fir stools from Gulassa & Company.

The darkly neutral palette of the space "puts the focus on the people in the room," Mann points out, "and makes the dining experience incredibly intimate."

The dramatic canopy bed in the master bedroom "makes the room romantic and restful," says Mann, especially since she echoed the bed curtains with wall-to-wall drapes on the window wall that leads to the room's private terrace. Her deftness with soft goods may well have come from her post-art-school employment as a photo stylist in the fashion industry. She's particularly fond of her mohair Hermès throw. "The chunky, eight-inch tassels make this throw sexy without compromising its coziness," she says.

With softness implying vulnerability, Mann accented the white room with hard, dark pieces inspired by rock music and fashion. "Adam and I like these kinds of pieces because they're obscure," says Mann. "They're almost like collector's items, so we seek them out."

And now, thanks to the opening of her namesake showroom in Chicago's high-style River North, she represents them, showing off the fresh lines she has found. Among the pieces she sells are examples from Blackman Cruz (like her skull lamp in the dining room) and artful constraints by bad-boy English furniture designer Jimmie Martin (the gold graffiti chest). Another favorite is Richard Shapiro. His sofas, trimmed with decadently opulent bullion fringe, appeal to Mann's dichotomous sense of style. "I'm hoping to make enough from the showroom to afford one," she quips.


For now, she and Heneghan will just have to kick back and relax in new millennial elegance, enjoying the dramatic contrasts of their home while contemplating the music of the night. 



## SENTRAL PARK SUITE

IN A MANHATTAN HIGH-RISE, DESIGN STAR CELERIE KEMBLE DEFINES PLUSH FABRICS AND A WIDE-RANGING SAMPLING OF STYLES.



From David LaSaee's 69th-floor pied-à-terre, Manhattan looks like a Google earth map of itself: a gleaming metropolis of glass, steel and stone outlined by twin rivers converging somewhere beyond the green rectangle of Central Park and framed by infinite sky. It's a perspective that cries out for interior design capable of rising to the dramatic occasion.


Enter Celerie Kemble, a young designer known for her fresh, creative spin on exuberant Palm Beach style, as well as for her own widely available furniture line for Laneventure and her remarkable shopping talent. "That spectacular view can make you feel on top of the world, or it can make you feel small," she says. "It was very important here to create softness and warmth." LaSaee, a bicoastal investment banker and serious wine collector who loves to entertain, wanted his New York City home to be "light and bright, friendly and cozy" with an unobstructed park view and, in Kemble's words, "filled with furniture people can comfortably sit in and chat for hours until the cheese course arrives."

To warm things up, the once-white walls of the 2,800-square-foot apartment were swathed in pattern, texture and—one of Kemble's favorite words—sheen. Color was key. When designer and client, shopping together for the first time, came across an abstract wall sculpture by midcentury artist Curtis Jere, they knew they were on the same stylistic page. The piece, composed of copper scraps with earthy, jewel-toned patinas ranging from verdigris to deep purple, set the palette for the entire apartment. "It looked like a tetanus shot waiting to happen, but I was really excited he liked it," Kemble says. "That's when I knew this job was going to be fun."

"Unless you do something special with it," says designer Celerie Kemble, "drywall is never going to add depth to a room." Here, she used plain paint in utility spaces only; the rest is "utterly wrapped in fabrics and wall coverings for a softer feel." In the entry hall (below), a dusting of gold on silk creates a parchmentlike look. In the simply furnished guest room (left), grass cloth wallpaper makes the space feel enclosed and inviting. Grass cloth in the living room has several colors woven throughout, including pale silvery blue, cream and gray—"Minute variations that nevertheless add interest and dynamism," Kemble says. The battened fabric wall in the master bedroom (right) is made of chocolate-brown herringbone men's suiting fabric and creates enveloping quiet. An old-fashioned technique now made more flexible by technology, battened walls are created by tucking fabric into plastic strips nailed to plywood sheets. Metallic bronze paper on the bedroom's other walls cast an amber glow.



In nine months, Kemble knocked out a wall, eliminating a third bedroom and bath to create a river-to-river view from the north-facing living room; designed headboards, upholstered seating and built-in storage of cerused walnut throughout the apartment; chose side chairs and tables from her 60-piece furniture line; and shopped from Palm Beach's Dixie Highway to 1stdibs.com. "I shop by eye, not by provenance," she says. "I love art deco, French '40s and Chinese Chippendale. They're modern but sensuous."

The speedy job was facilitated by the trust of her client, who interviewed six designers before hiring Kemble, then went off to New Orleans to volunteer for three weeks in the aftermath of Katrina and left her to it. The two share an affinity for mirrored and lacquered surfaces, vintage accessories, luxurious fabrics and sunshine.


LaSaee's primary residence is on the beach in Southern California. Kemble grew up in Palm Beach, where her mother, Mimi McMakin, is a renowned decorator. Kemble majored in English at Harvard before realizing that she, too, was born to design.


Client and designer were so simpatico that when LaSaee imagined eggplant-shaped hanging light fixtures for the master bedroom and tossed off a sketch, Kemble found a glassblower to create them. "I would close my eyes and say, 'That's the way I envision it,'" he recalls, "and she would find something that worked perfectly." "See Resources, last pages.

"DISTURBED" AND "UNDISTURBED" ARE WORDS THAT LANDSCAPE DESIGNER LINDA IVERSON USES FREQUENTLY. "I ALWAYS TRY TO USE WHAT'S INDIGENOUS TO THE SITE, WHETHER IT'S SHRUBS OR TREES OR THE TERRAIN ITSELF," SHE SAYS.

And for this project—a sod-roofed house just outside of Bozeman, Montana—Iverson was able to realize her vision. "Long before we broke ground, the architects and I spent a lot of time at the site. During that period, I salvaged existing plants that might be disturbed by construction," she explains. Like any good steward of the land, Iverson wanted to "leave no trace," to leave the land, well, undisturbed.

Since she was part of the house project from day one—and because she and architects Dan Harding and Richard Charlesworth (then with Big Timberworks, both now with Intrisik) shared a similar vision—the result is an ecologically sound structure in sync with its surroundings. Instead of a McMansion perched on a ridge top, this cozy, fairy tale—like home is shouldered into the earth.

"I love that the roof is alive; the fact that there's growth on the rooftop makes the house less visually intrusive on the landscape," says Iverson. "Also, it provides a habitat for microorganisms; it's a home for insects and birds." And the roof is at the same angle as the topography, so if there's a severe storm the slight slope aids in the drainage, as does a thin layer of gravel that lies underneath.

Since grass was a major ingredient in the project, a year before installation Iverson hired a local sod company to "build" the roof. She chose 'Covar' sheep fescue seed, which is originally from Turkey but adapts well to Montana's arid, rocky terrain. "Plus, it's vigorous, establishes quickly and is thick and tufty. And the roof now is the same color as the surroundings," she points out.

In addition to leaving the site pretty much as they found it, the homeowners also wanted to conserve energy and husband water. Because sod absorbs water, it was a logical choice for roofing. "It's a great building material because the roots knit together to make a

tight fabric," says Iverson. (Sod roofs can be very heavy, so if you want to try this at home, talk to an engineer first.) And because the house is built into the earth, the roof provides natural insulation. Sod roofs are also somewhat fireproof, an important consideration in July and August, when the threat of forest fires can be high in Montana.


However, keeping the sod and the native grasses and wildflowers Iverson planted around the house moist requires some assistance. "It's a misconception that eco-friendly plantings are maintenance-free," she says. With that in mind, she had an irrigation system installed, and she uses fertilizer: "Organic, of course."

Iverson is committed to this kind of natural design. When she meets with potential clients, she gently encourages them to consider the impact of gardens on the natural landscape. "It's a challenge, though, because most of us still think we want that pastoral green lawn with colorful flowers. It must be a result of our own roots; it's something deep down in our genetics." While it may take time to convince people to opt for sod instead of shingles or native plants instead of exotic perennials, Iverson's example of serene, ecofriendly beauty just may cause a disturbance about what a garden can be. And a disturbance, in this case, is a good thing. \*\*

# Who's Vour Umarnia

Not everything great to eat is sweet, sour, salty or bitter. A fifth taste called unami is attracting attention. Discover it at your own pleasure.



the age of molecular gastronomy, the whole language of cooking is changing fast. Tradition-flouting chefs are throwing around such terms as "osmosis," "desiccation" and "sous-vide" (concentrating flavor by packing ingredients in what are essentially high-end boil-in-bags), all of which are fine and kitchen-scientific. But the most important new word is actually as accessible to home cooks as it is to wizards of foam: umami.

This tantalizing synonym for "delicious" is Japanese, but it is on its way to becoming as universal a description as sweet, sour, salty or bitter. Umami is literally the fifth flavor, one that is very difficult to describe but impossible to miss in seared steak, aged cheese, most seafood and many other foods. Sometimes translated as savory or meaty, it is the taste that makes anything feel hauntingly rich and full and rounded on the palate. It's in ingredients as disparate as soy

sauce and shiitake mushrooms, ketchup and French fries, truffles and squid, even though many people, chefs included, still have no idea what it is.

Umami was discovered and named in Japan a century ago, but it is only now being recognized in the West as a true phenomenon worthy of serious exploration. A Tokyo scientist in 1907 determined that this "deliciousness" was what gave the *kombu* (dried seaweed) used in soup stock a fullness and richness that was beyond mere saltiness. For decades umami meant only monosodium glutamate, the food additive that imparts intense flavor in small doses, but now it is finally being acknowledged as a taste in its own right.

Umami has especially caught the fancy of envelope-pushing chefs—names like Heston Blumenthal at the Michelin three-star Fat Duck in Bray, England, whose wildly inventive specialties,





including snail porridge and sardine-on-toast sorbet, use all the latest kitchen toys and techniques. He, like a growing number of chefs around the world, sees science as half (or more) of cooking, and lately he has been making news by studying the umami in ordinary foods like tomatoes and pizza.

You don't have to be a molecular gastronomist to experience umami, though. Just swallow an oyster, with its briny-fatty richness, or bite into a chunk of well-aged Parmigiano-Reggiano, a cheese with a flavor that takes you into a dimension beyond salty.


For a home cook, what makes umami especially appealing is knowing that it is impossible to overdo. Add too much salt to a soup, or sugar to a dessert, and the result is overwhelmingly one-note, if not inedible. But if you double up on umami, you get better flavor, not monotonous flavor. You can make a meal of it by combining aged cheddar with shiitakes in a strudel or oysters and pancetta in a classic pan roast. For maximum umami, dress lentils, which, like other legumes, have an earthy umami aspect, with truffle oil; the fragrance is so powerful you can detect the fifth flavor with a second sense, smell. Or marinate skirt steak in soy sauce and layer both sweet and white potatoes, which are packed with umami, in a gratin with Parmesan. For dessert, team carrots and walnuts with aromatic walnut oil for extra intensity in a rich and satisfying torte.

Despite all the serious study of umami, not everyone is convinced it actually exists. But tasting is believing and understanding. And if new planets can still be discovered, why not new flavors? 



## RECIPES

#### **Oyster-Pancetta Pan Roast**

- 2 oz. pancetta, cut into fine dice
- 1 tbsp. butter
- 2 shallots, minced
- 1/3 cup minced celery
- 1 tsp. coarse sea salt
- 1/2 cup dry vermouth
- · 2 cups heavy cream
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- Pinch cayenne
- · 36 blue-point oysters, shucked, with their liquor reserved
- · Freshly ground black pepper
- Crusty bread
- 1. Fry pancetta in butter in a wide, deep saucepan until translucent but not crisp. Add shallots and celery and sprinkle with salt. Sauté until softened, about 5 minutes. Add vermouth and cook until reduced to a glaze. Add cream, Worcestershire sauce and cayenne and bring to a high simmer. Cook until reduced by about a third, 10 minutes.
- 2. Strain oysters and add their liquor to the pan. Cook 2 to 3 minutes to incorporate. Slide oysters into the simmering cream and cook until edges just start to curl, 3 to 4 minutes. Season with pepper to taste.
- 3. Divide among six shallow bowls. Serve with sliced crusty bread. Serves 6 as a first course.

#### **Truffled Lentil Salad**

- 11/2 cups French green lentils
- 1 small onion, peeled
- 4 clove
- 1 carrot, peeled and cut crosswise into quarters
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 tsp. kosher salt
- 2 tbsp. sherry vinegar
- · 4 scallions, green part only, thinly sliced
- 8 piquillo peppers, seeded and diced (or 2 large red roasted bell peppers)
- 5 tbsp. white truffle oil
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Red leaf lettuce
- 1. Sort over lentils to remove any stones. Rinse well and place in a large saucepan. Stud onion with cloves and add to pan. Add carrot, bay leaves and salt. Add water to cover by 3 inches. Bring to a boil, lower the heat and simmer, stirring occasionally, until lentils are just tender, not soft, 20 to 45 minutes, depending on their age.
- 2. Drain lentils well. Discard onion, bay leaves and carrot.
- 3. Transfer lentils to bowl and add vinegar, scallions and piquillos and mix well. Add truffle oil and mix well. Season with pepper to taste and add more salt if needed. Serve warm or at room temperature, in a bowl lined with red leaf lettuce. Serves 6.

#### **Seared Skirt Steak**

- 3 lbs. skirt steak
- 3 tbsp. wasabi powder
- 3 tbsp. rice wine vinegar
- One 3-inch piece ginger, peeled and finely grated or minced
- 3 large cloves garlic, minced
- ½ tsp. cayenne
- 1/4 cup tamari or soy sauce
- ½ cup peanut or canola oil
- 1. Trim extraneous fat off skirt steaks with-

out disturbing marbling.

2. Lay steaks into a large shallow glass dish. Combine wasabi and vinegar in a small bowl and whisk to dissolve. Stir in ginger, garlic, cayenne, tamari or soy sauce and peanut or canola oil. Whisk to blend. Pour over skirt steaks and turn to coat well. Cover and refrigerate overnight, turning once or twice.

- 3. Heat two large heavy skillets over high heat until smoking. Sear steaks, 2 minutes on each side for rare, and transfer to cutting board. Let stand 5 minutes.
- 4. Slice steak against grain into thin slices. Serve hot. Serves 6.

#### Two-Potato Gratin with Parmesan

- 1 tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 lb. russet or Yukon gold potatoes (2 large)
- 1 lb. sweet potatoes (2 large)
- Plenty of sea salt and freshly ground white pepper
- 7 tbsp. freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano
- 11/2 cups heavy cream
- 1. Heat oven to 350°F. Butter inside of 8-by-12-inch baking dish. Rub with garlic.
- 2. Peel russet or Yukon gold and sweet potatoes. Cut potatoes into ½-inch-thick slices. Layer half of the sweet potatoes into prepared baking dish, overlapping. Season liberally with salt and pepper to taste and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon Parmigiano. Layer half of the russet or Yukon gold potatoes into pan, season with salt and pepper to taste and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon cheese. Repeat with the remaining sweet potatoes, then with the russet or Yukon gold potatoes, topping the final layer with the remaining 4 tablespoons Parmigiano. Pour cream evenly over.
  3. Place in the oven and bake 20 minutes.
- Place in the oven and bake 20 minutes. Using a spatula, press down on potato slices to raise the cream and coat the higher lay-

ers. Bake 20 minutes longer, then press down again. Bake until cream is bubbling and potatoes are soft when tested with a sharp knife, 20 minutes more. Serves 6.

#### Shiitake-Cheddar Strudel

- 11/2 lbs. shiitakes, stemmed
- 16 tbsp. (2 sticks) unsalted butter, divided
- 3 large cloves garlic, minced
- 3 shallots, minced
- 11/2 tbsp. tamari or soy sauce
- 11/2 tbsp. chopped fresh thyme
- 3 cups grated sharp cheddar
- 4 large eggs
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 10 phyllo dough sheets
- 8 tsp. fine dry bread crumbs
- 1. Wipe shiitake caps clean. Cut in half and then crosswise into thin strips. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and shallots and cook, stirring frequently, 2 to 3 minutes. Add 4 more tablespoons butter and shiitakes and cook, stirring constantly, for 5 minutes. Add tamari or soy sauce and continue cooking and stirring for 5 minutes. Stir in thyme.
- 2. Remove from heat and let cool completely, then stir in the cheese and eggs and mix well. Season well with fresh black pepper.
- 3. Heat oven to 350°F. Melt remaining butter, and brush work surface with 1 tablespoon. Lay 1 phyllo sheet out and brush with more butter. Sprinkle evenly with 1 teaspoon bread crumbs. Repeat with 4 more phyllo sheets and 3 teaspoons bread crumbs, omitting crumbs on the last layer.
- 4. Spread half of the mixture over the bottom third of the buttered phyllo, leaving about 1 inch exposed along the long side of the dough. Fold short ends in and roll dough up to enclose shiitakes in a cylinder. Lay onto a buttered baking sheet, seam-side down. Brush top with butter.
- 5. Repeat with the remaining phyllo, bread crumbs and shiitake mixture to make a sec-

ond strudel. Brush top with butter.

6. Bake until crisp and browned, 35 to 40 minutes. Cool slightly before cutting. (Trim ends for a nicer presentation.) *Serves* 6.

#### Carrot, Walnut and Mascarpone Torte

- 1 cup walnut halves
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- · 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
- 11/2 tsp. freshly ground cardamom
- ½ cup walnut oil
- 1/4 cup peanut oil
- 2 cups coarsely grated carrots (about 6 medium)
- 1 cup mascarpone
- 1/4 to 1/3 cup heavy cream
- Confectioners' sugar for garnish
- I. Heat oven to 300°F. Spread walnuts in a dry baking dish and toast in oven for 10 minutes. Cool, then coarsely chop.
- 2. Raise oven setting to 350°F. Grease and flour two 8-inch cake tins. Line each with a round piece of waxed paper cut to fit into the bottom. Set aside.
- 3. Beat eggs until light in a large bowl. Beat in sugar until well blended. Combine flour, baking soda, salt and cardamom in a bowl and whisk to blend. Add to egg mixture alternately with oils and mix well. Stir in carrots and walnuts, blending well.
- 4. Divide between prepared pans. Bake until no imprint remains when you press the top of each lightly, 30 minutes. Cool on racks, unmold and peel off waxed paper.
- 5. Beat mascarpone until smooth. Add cream until the mixture spreads easily.
- 6. Lay one cake layer on a serving plate and spread mascarpone mixture over. Top with second layer, top-side up. Dust with confectioners' sugar. Serve immediately or wrap tightly and chill. Makes I cake.

Elephant (Chronicle, \$45) is the South Africa-born photographer's love letter to the put-upon pachyderm, both African and Asian.
