Beyond the Bauhaus

The Legacy of Walter Gropius and Modern Boston

SAH/SCC Travel Tour October 10-13, 2003

This fall, the SAH/SCC presents a comprehesive three-day study tour exclusively for current members in good standing. Join Executive Board Members John Berley and Sian Winship, and former Board Member Rob Rothblatt, as we explore the roots of modern architecture in the Boston area.

The arrival in 1937 of former Bauhaus Director Walter Gropius to become Chairman of the Department of Architecture in the Graduate School of Design (GSD) at Harvard University, along with Marcel Breuer, marked the arrival of new concepts in architecture and architectural education. Their tenure at Harvard significantly affected the development of modern architecture in the region and the history of modern architecture in America. Gropius was a gifted educator and facilitator whose philosophy of collaboration, universal themes, and restrained functionalism influenced generations of Harvard graduates. More than 50 years later, the memory and influence of the work remains for students and historians to recognize and appreciate.

The program begins Friday evening with a reception and lecture by Gropius scholar, Jill Pearlman, Ph.D., professor at Bowdoin College. Along with a presentation by Rob Rothblatt, the evening will provide context on the architectural climate in New England, Europe, and California at the time of Gropius' arrival and set the stage for three days of intensive exploration.

The tour includes Gropius/Breuer collaborations: Gropius' own house ('38) in Lincoln and the Hagerty Residence ('38) perched on the rugged coast south of Boston. We will visit several residences by fellow colleague Walter F. Bogner and significant early work of G. Holmes Perkins and Hugh Stubbins, who would later achieve national and international recognition. Both Stubbins and Perkins graduated from the GSD prior to Gropius' arrival and were busy grounding their own ideas in the region. We will also have the unique opportunity to visit a remarkable building from 1934 by the often overlooked architect Eleanor Raymond.

President's Letter

Our June 7th event with "The Real Estate Architects," Brian Linder and Erik Lerner, at the Coop Himmelblau house in Venice, has prompted several provocative debates in our community about the Value of Architecture.

Brian and Erik are strategically working in a cultural margin. They have carved out a successful niche market selling houses designed by architects. Their basic message is that architecture does matter to a particular segment of the population. A market exists for design excellence. They have the statistics to prove it.

But there is an underlying paradox, or perhaps even a deep contradiction. A market exists for design excellence, but that market is astonishingly small. Embarrassingly small. Two percent of the total market, they say. Two out of one hundred prospective home buyers walk into an architectural house and "get it." Ninety-eight percent do not.

The truth hurts, and I applaud Brian and Erik for refusing to sugar-coat the simple reality that, despite some positive trends, such as the success of Dwell magazine, the larger culture is basically starved of a general education and appreciation for design.

I am not normally inclined to bemoan our cultural inferiority, but 2% is nothing compared to some of our European counterparts. What do you suppose is the equivalent percentage in England or Japan, 10%? Sweden, 20% or 30%? Holland or Switzerland, 40%?

The big issue that ought to be at the forefront of the dialogue is this: how do we reach out and connect with some portion of the 98%, to expand architecture's audience, and give design a greater position within the culture at large?

Is it a problem of taste? No, it is a matter of education. Of course, that's why we at SAH/SCC do what we do. The aim is public education. But we feel sometimes like a lonely voice. There is almost no support system outside of the community of insiders, who are frankly already part of the 2%. There is very little in the popular press, and very little on TV or radio that is specifically oriented to educating the public about design. How about the lumberyard or the hardware store? Not to mention the schools.

But the value of architecture is also a matter of deeper cultural values, which seem impossible to change. The American consumer culture resolutely favors the disposable sensation over enduring significance. Look, for example, at the household products we buy. We want it now, and we want it cheap because we will throw it away tomorrow. The American producer culture is driven by fear, not quality or craft. It aims for the lowest common denominator, and the cheapest price. Design quality rarely enters the equation.

Given this larger cultural context, Brian and Erik's strategy is especially interesting, I think, because they are trying to appeal to consumers in a language they understand: money. Architects often fail to communicate with a wider public because their language is hopelessly abstract. They speak of mass and void, planar relationships, composition. Brian and Erik, who are both trained as architects, have a different theory. It goes like this: the public should value architecture, because architecture actually commands higher prices on the open market.


For all of us, the 2% issue is a bruise, a tender spot, an exposed nerve-ending that we simply don't touch because it hurts too much, and we wish it would simply heal already. It will not.



"Greene & Greene: The Art of Architecture" was produced by Paul Bockhorst in association with SAH/SCC. Several members of SAH/SCC have been involved in the project, as have many people associated with The Gamble House. The screening on July 22nd is intended to thank members of the participating organizations and to celebrate completion of this historic project.

The one-hour documentary chronicles the lives and work of Charles and Henry Greene, from their early efforts to blend American, European, and Asian design concepts into a distinctive architectural vocabulary, through the creation of their "ultimate bungalows" of the years 1907 through 1910, to the independent projects that characterized their later years.

In addition to the famous Gamble and Blacker houses, the production examines a number of milestones in the architectural journey of the Greenes, including the Charles Greene and Arturo Bandini houses in Pasadena, the Adelaide Tichenor house in Long Beach, the Charles Pratt house in Ojai, the William Thorsen house in Berkeley, the D. L. James house in Carmel, and the Walter Richardson house in Porterville. In all, more than 15 are highlighted.

The production also examines the Greenes' passionate interest in interior design—in creating fully planned and integrated living environments. Woodwork, carvings, furniture, lighting fixtures, tile work, rugs, and art glass are all included. The documentary features illuminating comments by a number of distinguished observers, including Edward Bosley, Randell Makinson, Robert Judson Clark, Bruce Smith, Jim Ipekjian, Isabelle Greene, former SAH/SCC President Ted Wells, and Betty Patchin Greene.

"Greene & Greene: The Art of Architecture" was written, produced, and directed by emmy-award-winning producer Paul Bockhorst. It is narrated by Richard Doyle, and the original musical score was composed by Paul Morehouse. Funding for the project came from The Ahmanson Foundation, The James Irvine Foundation, The Ayrshire Foundation, the Joan Irvine Smith & Athalie R. Clarke Foundation, and Sidney and Alexandra Sheldon. Discussions are currently underway with KCET regarding local broadcast and national distribution of the documentary. Once airdates have been set, they will be announced to members of SAH/SCC and Friends of The Gamble House.

Also included is the work of The Architect's Collaborative (TAC) and founding members Sarah Harkness, Chip Harkness, Norman Fletcher, and Ben Thompson. TAC was formed in 1947 as a collaborative venture with Gropius after he retired from the GSD. For more than 50 years, TAC produced award-winning buildings both domestically and overseas, including the Harvard Graduate Center ('49) and an important experiment in community/communal living: the architects' own homes in Six Moon Hill (from '48).

Tour goers will also enjoy a rare opportunity to visit the 1942 courtyard house Philip Johnson designed as his GSD senior thesis, the extraordinary Barnet-Yanofsky residence ('58) by fellow GSD alumnus Paul Rudolph, Josep Lluis Sert's own Residence ('58), the work of Scogin Elam Architects, and the evolution of residential work by Marcel Breuer.

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

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
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
