SAH/SCC Lecture, Tour, Discussion Saturday, October 1st

Go back to school with SAH/SCC on Saturday, October 1st, 8:45AM-5PM, for an exclusive, one-day tour and study program exploring historical and contemporary relationships between architectural space and early childhood education. This day-long event, organized by SAH/SCC Executive Board members Sian Winship and John Berley, includes visits to some of the most cutting-edge new schools in Southern California.

The day begins on an historical note with a visit to Richard Neutra's University Elementary School/UES (Neutra & Alexander, 1957-8) at UCLA and a lecture by Barbara Lamprecht, author of Neutra: The Complete Works (Taschen, 2000). Lamprecht's lecture will examine Neutra's theories on the psychology of space, classroom relationships and adjacencies, and campus development during the post-war period.

After lunch, participants will be transported by shuttle bus to some of the most innovative new elementary school spaces in Los Angeles. Visits will include: Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (Daly Genik, 2000), Layfayette Park Primary Center (Rios Clementi Hale Studios, 1999-2002), The Accelerated School (Marmol Radziner and Associates, 2004), John W. Mack Elementary School #3 (Arquitectonica, 2005), and Dr. Theodore T. Alexander Jr. Science Center School (Morphosis, 1992-2004).

These schools feature a range of architectural approaches to contemporary issues of space and learning, such as the evolving programmatic elements required for today's elementary schools, the focus on urban vs. suburban sites, the demands of specialized curricula, and the need for enhanced campus security and technology. The featured schools also showcase a variety of design solutions ranging from new construction to adaptive reuse.

Tour-goers will have the opportunity to experience first-hand and participate in a discussion of how many of the principles of modern architecture in Southern California have been reinvented, reinterpreted, and are now contributing to the development of a new legacy in regional school design.

The day ends with a panel discussion by the contemporary architects. During the session we will explore common and divergent themes between the post-war school building boom in Los Angeles and today. Participants will include architects Frank Clementi, Kevin Daly, Leo Marmol, and others.

Tour-goers will drive themselves to the UCLA campus for our morning visit to UES, then to a central staging location for shuttle bus transport in the afternoon. A sack lunch will be provided to all tour-goers. The event lasts from 8:45AM to the end of the panel discussion at 5:00PM. Tickets are \$69 for SAH/SCC members and \$89 for non-members. Please note that UCLA Parking is an additional \$8 per car and payable to the attendant on event day. See order form on back page to reserve your spot.





Transitions are times of acknowledgement, and Tony Denzer, our outgoing president, well deserves our thanks and best wishes as he leaves for a new chapter of his life. He terminated an earlier career in television journalism because of issues of quality and integrity and returned to college to pursue degrees in architecture. He earned a Master's degree at the University of Kansas (1998) and then returned to California to pursue a Ph.D. at UCLA. While a grad student he joined the SAH/SCC Board, became vice-president, and then succeeded Ted Wells as president. He also worked for Tolkin & Associates Architecture in Pasadena from 1999 to 2004. He is proud of the work that firm produced. One of its most notable projects was the Saladang Song restaurant in Pasadena.



The year 2005 was a banner one for Tony: He completed his dissertation on the social commitment in Gregory Ain's work and received his Doctoral degree in June. He accepted a position as Assistant Professor of Civil and Architectural Engineering at the University of Wyoming, where he will be teaching courses in architectural history, as well as an architectural design studio this fall. His article on Gregory Ain's visionary, post-war Community Homes project in Reseda will appear in the Fall issue of the Southern California Quarterly. On July 8th he married Michelle Holly aboard the Queen Mary. We look forward to hearing news of a new architectural monument of significance in Laramie as Tony designs and builds their dream house!

When asked to identify his most memorable event or achievement as president of SAH/SCC, he says, "I would

say without hesitation that my highlight with SAH/SCC was not a particular event or 'achievement,' but rather the relationships I made among the other board members and the membership in general. Ultimately, I see SAH/SCC as a kind of cozy coffee shop where people of like interests will be welcomed and where they will strike up friendships with one another. To the extent that such an atmosphere was cultivated in my time, I feel successful.

We all wish Tony and Michelle every success and happiness!

One more acknowledgement: Sian Winship, board member extraordinaire for the past eight years or so, stands out as the creative mind, organizer par excellence, inexhaustible energy source, and tour designer and leader responsible for so many of SAH/SCC's memorable events of the past few years. Historic Photos For Researchers

The San Diego Historical Society has made two photograph collections, both important for understanding San Diego history, available for research at the Historical Society's Research Library, as well as searchable online. The thousands of images encompassed by the collections allow an in-depth examination of San Diego's changing economic, cultural, political, and social mores over a period of more than 100 years. The California Border Region Digitization Project is a virtual collection of 3,500 digital images in black and white, selected from more than 2.5 million images in the Booth Historical Photograph Archives. The photographs document the daily life, work, and activities of the residents of the California border region with an emphasis on San Diego County and Baja California between 1850 and 1940. The San Diego Union-Tribune Photograph Collection represents a portion of a much larger collection of photographic negatives donated to the Historical Society by the Union-Tribune. Its more than 150,000 images, taken by staff newspaper photographers between 1915 and 1957, illustrate a vast range of subjects. 



Authors on Architecture welcomes writer Kevin Roderick and researcher J. Eric Lynxwiler on Sunday, October 23rd, 2-5PM. They will discuss and sign their new book *Wilshire Boulevard, Grand Concourse of Los Angeles* (Angel City Press, 2005, \$40) at Hennessey & Ingalls, located at, appropriately, 214 Wilshire Blvd., Santa Monica; 310.458.9074. This event is free and open to the public.

In the pages of *Wilshire Boulevard*, Roderick and Lynxwiler tell the story of the boulevard's development from a dirt road through a barley field in 1895 to the bustling 15-mile central concourse of the City of Angels. The boulevard's style, architecture, and history are illustrated with 150 vintage images culled from private collections and archives. Looking at Los Angeles

this large-scale, richly illustrated book is a testament to the varied nature of the Los Angeles metropolis. Like anyone who ever tries and knows that it's futile, this book does

not dare to define LA in a singular vision. Instead, the editors have culled 225 photos from nearly 100 photographers to show what Stiller refers to as the dichotomies of LA. There are endless juxtapositions—parking lots and pools, mountains and freeways, colonial and contemporary—often in the same photograph. Images by well-known art photographers (Winogrand, Ruscha, Misrach, and the like) as well as by our beloved architectural chroniclers (Shulman, Mudford, Street-Porter, etc.) are at once poetic, quotidian, heartbreaking, and inspiring. The ultimate Los Angeles dichotomy—fantasy and reality—is woven throughout this exceptional book. A portion of the proceeds goes to the Los Angeles Conservancy, which also contributes an essay on the importance of saving LA's architectural heritage.

Form Follows Libido: Architecture and Richard Neutra in a Psychoanalytic Culture

by Sylvia Lavin.

This view of mid-century architecture uses Neutra's work as an example of how high modernism left its cool abstraction in favor of more mood-inducing environments. Lavin—chair of the architecture department at UCLA—bases her essays on Neutra's

designs and writings that she sets in the context of the culture of psychoanalysis. This dense read is divided into eight chapters: History by Choice; Reappropriating Neutra; The Empathic House; Birth Trauma; The Therapeutics of Pleasure; From House to Habitat; Pollution and Possibility; The Survival of Design. The book is typeset in the Neutraface font, giving the reader a total Neutra experience.




