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<u>Architect as</u> Patron: Zajfen in Laguna Beach

SAH/SCC Tour & Talk Saturday, July 26, 2014, 2-4PM

Architect as Patron is heading to the beach! The series—which focuses on issues and opportunities that designers face when building their own homes—goes to Laguna Beach on July 26th. Join us to experience stunning views from the lyrical home created by L. Paul Zajfen, FAIA, RIBA. Nestled in a hillside, this sustainable house blurs the line between inside and outside, lifts one's spirits, and connects you to nature, the ocean, and the sky.

Zajfen, a design principal at LA-based CO Architects, took a simple, volumetric approach to the design, exploring the transparency of the volumes, and how the building elements frame space and views that exploit the potential of the site. The steel-framed, multi-level home is broken into two masses, with the living room element pulled apart as a pavilion connected by a bridge to the kitchen/dining room element. Separating these two creates an outdoor courtyard surrounded by living spaces. The living room seen from the courtyard appears to be floating in space.

Designed to minimize energy consumption, the home's large glass walls enable both natural lighting and ventilation, eliminating the need for artificial lighting (during the day) and cooling. All the west-facing window walls have sensorcontrolled motorized exterior sunshades that block 86% of solar radiation, while maintaining views. Photovoltaic and solar hot water panels are located at the highest roof. The flat roofs are planted with succulents in a design pattern that connects them to the hillside contours when viewed from within.



The transparent layers of interior and exterior space create an atmosphere that evokes a sensation of spatial generosity, visual stimulus, and peace. "The house establishes a precedent in Laguna Beach for designing an appropriate, contextual, and sustainable dwelling," says Zajfen. "Quite simply, it feels wonderful to be in this house." Design Evangelist

In the past few President's Letters, I've thanked both Arline Chambers and Svetlana Petrovic for their contributions to keeping SAH/SCC humming and serving the membership. I would be remiss not to mention the longest-serving member of our team: our newsletter editor, Julie D. Taylor.

Some 18 years ago, Julie took over as editor of *SAH/SCC News* from Richard Rowe. Through her vision, leadership, and editorial skills, it became an award-winning publication filled with Chapter activities and the first comprehensive calendar of architectural events in Los Angeles.

Julie's contributions to the organization, however, have far exceeded her role as newsletter editor. Julie conceptualized and led the very first of our popular Modern Patrons programs in which we engage original owners of modern residential architecture in a meaningful dialogue about the experience of commissioning a noted Southern California architect to design a home for them. Julie was also responsible for our Members' Celebration at City Hall some years ago—a memorable event for all who attended. As principal of her firm Taylor & Company, Julie brings expertise and experience as a design industry publicist, marketer, writer, editor, and critic to the marketing and public relations efforts for her architecture and design clients. As author of the books <u>Outdoor Rooms</u> (Rockport, 1999), <u>Bars, Pubs, & Cafés</u> (Rockport, 2000), and co-author of <u>Spa: The Sensuous Experience</u> (Images, 2006), Julie has demonstrated that she not only talks the talk: she walks the walk.

Not surprisingly, therefore, she was awarded Honorary AIA/LA status by the American Institute of Architects and was recently named Public Director to the National AIA Board of Directors. The AIA California Council presented its Allied Achievement Honor Award to Julie for her "design evangelism."

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John Parkinson's Iconic Vision SAH/SCC Lecture & Walking Tour, Downtown LA Saturday, June 14, 2014

Mark your calendar for Saturday, June 14th, as SAH/SCC explores architect John Parkinson's legacy in downtown Los Angeles. Stephen Gee, author of the book *Iconic Vision: John Parkinson, Architect of Los Angeles* (Angel City Press, 2013), will share his research on this important, yet little known, contributor to our built environment. Attendees will be provided with a four-color self-guided walking tour brochure and will be encouraged to visit the locations on foot after the lecture.

Our hope is for those who are interested to meet up informally at a nohost cocktail hour event at a downtown watering hole at the end of the day to discuss their adventures and observations.

Although Parkinson is best known for his design of Los Angeles City Hall (Parkinson & Parkinson, with John C. Austin and Albert C. Martin, 1926-8) and Bullock's Wilshire (Parkinson & Parkinson, 1928), he designed dozens of important buildings in downtown Los Angeles. There are still several major intersections where all four (or nearly all) of the corner buildings were designed by this seminal figure.

Participants will also be encouraged to visit the Central Branch of the Los Angeles Public Library (Bertram G. Goodhue and Carleton M. Winslow, 1922-26) for a viewing of a new exhibit on Union Station (1934-9), another Los Angeles icon by Parkinson & Parkinson. Joined in practice by his son Donald to form Parkinson & Parkinson (during which time he was most prolific), he also had an earlier partnership with Edwin Bergstrom. After Parkinson's death in 1935, his son continued to carry on the firm's architectural traditions and name for 10 more years.

Gardens Are for Living: Design Inspiration for Outdoor Spaces

by Judy Kameon; Foreword by Jonathan Adler; Principal photography by Erik Otsea

Los Angeles-based landscape designer Judy Kameon is known for her naturalistic gardens and residential landscapes. Walking through her projects—as this reviewer has been privileged to do—is a sensuous experience, as the elements are beautiful, tactile, fragrant, and tasty. This book is not only a glossy showpiece of her achievements, but a platform to share her ideas and methods to fully enjoy a civilized life outdoors.



A Santa Monica native, Kameon immediately lays the groundwork for her approach by looking at mid-century outdoor spaces that exemplify the Southern California lifestyle. After the first chapter on inspiration, the following sections deal with more specifics: front yards, gathering and play spaces, flower and vegetable gardens, outdoor cooking, and entertaining. The final chapter imparts ways to incorporate "California Style" outside of the Golden State.

Numbered chapters are wittily introduced with clever photographs and brief intros. Lush photography is bolstered by detailed captions that comprise most of the text, along with how-to lists, as well as drawings of specific plant specimens.

Shingle Style: Living in San Francisco's Brown Shingles

by Lucia Howard and David Weingarten; Foreword by Daniel P. Gregory; Photography by David Duncan Livingston

Who knew a modest rectangular piece of wood would have such meaning and complexity? Before showing exquisite examples of "Brown Shingles" (as such houses are known) from the Bay Area, the authors trace a serious architectural and social history of the seemingly ordinary building material. Its East Coast use on summer mansions for the wealthy displayed traces of conspicuous consumption. In Northern California, however, shingles were representative of social

causes, poetry, and "bohemian rusticity."

Generous spreads of houses built from 1891 to 1913 show new photography along with, in most cases, an archival reference image. Detailed close-ups of the wood elements themselves could almost be considered "shingle porn" for their sensual appearance. A postscript chapter shows shingles used in homes from 1966 to the present, displaying both modernist idioms as well as idiosyncratic applications.

A touching last chapter pays tribute to the architectural historian John Beach (1935-1985), who pioneered the study of the Bay Region Style. Eccentric in both dress and behavior, he nevertheless communed with such architectural luminaries as Bruce Goff, Esther McCoy, David Gebhard, Charles Moore, and Charles Jencks. With this coda, the authors stress that "without historians, there is no history."

A 'Brand' New Library Awaits

Stay tuned for more details of SAH/SCC's July tour and discussion on the restoration of Glendale's Brand Library & Art Center. The original home of Leslie C. Brand was designed by Nathaniel Dryden in 1904, and has just enjoyed an exterior and interior renovation by Gruen Associates.
