

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Authors on Architecture: Suisman on the Boulevards

SAH/SCC Lecture & Book Signing Saturday, January 31, 2015

Take a journey down LA's boulevards with architect, urban planner, and author Doug Suisman, FAIA, at SAH/SCC's Authors on Architecture. Suisman will discuss the new edition of his book *Los Angeles Boulevard: Eight X-Rays of the Body Public* (ORO Editions, 2014). First published 25 years ago, the book was a response by "a 32-year-old architect (born and educated on the East Coast) trying to make sense of the urbanism of Los Angeles," according to the author's updated introduction.

The first part of the book originally appeared as a "pamphlet" published by the LA Forum for Architecture and Urban Design. Eight chapters—with names that take the term "body" public to heart ("Umbilical," "Girdle," "Suture," "Pathogen")—explore how the boulevards establish the framework for the public realm, and how architecture and urban design play critical roles in place-making along the boulevards and in the districts and neighborhoods that line them.

Following is "Boulevards in Practice," new text that shows projects from Suisman's firm, which is known for designing the LA Metro Rapid bus system and The Arc, an award-winning scheme for the West Bank and Gaza. These 10 projects range in location from Atlanta and LA to Copenhagen and Pittsburgh. The most recent project, The iQuilt Plan, brought Suisman back to his home town of Hartford, CT, where, as a 10-year-old kid riding the bus, he first started making sense of urbanism.

Los Angeles Times architecture critic Christopher Hawthorne, who also undertook a massive journalistic exploration of LA's boulevards, contributed the foreword.

Following the presentation, the book will be for sale and signing by the author.



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Postcard From La Jolla

Three dozen SAH/SCC members enjoyed a triple treat (talk, exhibition, tour) on a beautiful August day in La Jolla. We gathered for goodies on the lawn in front of Wisteria Cottage, a little house with a long history. It started as a simple beach cottage in 1904. In 1907, heiress Virginia Scripps hired up-and-coming architect Irving Gill to enlarge and remodel it for use as a guest cottage. He also added the namesake wisteria arbor.

Throughout the years, the cottage housed a private school and a popular bookstore before the Revelle family donated it to the La Jolla Historical Society (LJHS). In May 2014, LJHS completed a rehab of the cottage as exhibition space, opening up ceiling and walls and adding museum lighting and climate control. Architect Ione Stiegler, FAIA, talked about the preservation standards and rehab challenges. SAH/SCC Life Member Diane Kane shared her research on the history of the house and Gill's work.

LJHS director Heath Fox conducted a tour of the space and its current exhibition, "Climate Change: Midcentury Modern La Jolla." The show presented new ideas in the arts, design, and architecture that emerged from La Jolla during the 1950s and '60s.

To top it off, docents took us on a walking tour around the neighborhood to see other Irving Gill works, including La Jolla Women's Club (1912-13), the La Jolla Recreation Center (1914-16, with Louis Gill), Ellen B. Scripps House/Museum of Contemporary Art SD (1908), and George Kautz House/Inn at La Jolla (1913), among others.

We finished with another gathering for coffee and fruit. It was a beautiful day in a charming space, graciously hosted by LJHS.



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Village Green Day

The 2014 SAH/SCC Members' Celebration at the Village Green apartments in Baldwin Hills started in the Community Building, which is original to the 1941 complex. We heard a presentation that focused on the history of the development and of the movement that led to the planning of the complex. We learned about the "Radburn Idea," which was a new way of thinking about urban design. It proposed that buildings be arranged around large landscaped green belts, and that pedestrian and automobile circulation be separated.

This started out in Radburn, NJ, where developments of this type were first tried in the US. The planning principles were brought out to California, where versions of this type of development were built. The design has a very open and spacious feeling. The apartments themselves are also very large, even by today's standards. Patios and balconies provide outdoor living space and add variety to the straightforward design of the buildings.

We toured three units, two of which were two-story townhouses. These were side by side and it was interesting to see the differences and similarities between the two and see how the different families lived. The other unit was a one-story bungalow on the end, affording it exposure on three sides, which let a lot of light into the apartment. All of the units had hardwood floors, fireplaces, and tiled bathrooms.

The speakers at the presentation were very knowledgeable about the project and its design and history. What I didn't realize is that they were also residents of the complex. They obviously were very proud of where they live and I was thankful that they were kind enough to allow us into their homes. So, all-in-all, a great afternoon seeing and learning something new.


