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# Authors on Architecture: Hess on The Palm **Springs School**

Much more than a resort destination, Palm Springs has served as a laboratory of the Modern, where so much architectural innovation and design took form. From the steel-and-glass boxes of Richard Neutra, FAIA, to the earthy organic homes of John Lautner, FAIA, and everything in between, the solutions of architects and designers-including notably William F. Cody, FAIA, E. Stewart Williams, FAIA, and Albert Frey, FAIA—were diverse and are ever more relevant in the face of contemporary challenges.

These architects addressed questions that still hold urgency: How to design sustainably in harsh climates? How to use technology efficiently and creatively to meet those challenges? How to build affordable and high-quality mass-produced housing? How to reflect a region's culture, economy, and distinctive atmosphere?

The book establishes the definitive record regarding the specific contributing factors in the development of the Palm Springs School and adds powerful new insights about desert architecture.

Hess is an American architect, author, lecturer, and advocate for 20th-Century architectural preservation. This is his 22nd book on the built environment.

First Merry Ovnick Fellow Luke Leuschner

SAH/SCC is delighted to announce that the first Merry Ovnick Fellowship recipient has been selected: Luke Leuschner. Luke is currently pursuing a Master's degree in Architecture at the University of California, Berkeley.

Luke was the lead researcher for the exhibition "Albert Frey: Inventive Modernist" at the Palm Springs Art Museum's Architecture and Design Center in 2024. He is currently writing a manuscript on Rudolph Schindler's architectural works in the Southern California desert. Luke, himself, grew up in Palm Desert.

In his own words, Luke defines his study interests as "the desert itself and which architects have utilized, defined, or denied the qualities of the frequently misconstrued landscape." He has engaged in projects that seek to expand the typical knowledge base of architectural history, always attempting to imbue them with a critical lens. Luke's work on R.M. Schindler, FAIA, arose not because he was interested in the work itself per se, but because it exposes a different chapter of the desert's cultural history, from eugenics to Queer history.

The Fellowship honors SAH/SCC Past President and longtime Board Member, Merry Ovnick. It provides \$1,000 annually to support graduate student travel to the SAH Annual International Conference. In 2025, the Conference will be held in Atlanta, GA.

Merry's love and appreciation for Southern California was palpable. Of the several applications we received, Luke's best reflected Merry's legacy.

# Authors on Architecture: Treinan on Canyon Country Club

SAH/SCC Zoom Presentation Sunday, April 27, 2025, 1-2:30 Pacific

Join SAH/SCC author and SAH/SCC Patron Member Steve Treinan discusses his new book, Canyon Country Club: History and Design of Palm Springs' Garden of Eden (Palm Springs Preservation Foundation, 2025). Now known as the Indian Canyons area of Palm Springs, Canyon Country Club was the city's answer to the 1950s expansion of golf-driven real estate development in the eastern end of the Coachella Valley.

It was also the first substantial development on land leased from the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians, representing a transformational moment in the city's history.

The architectural exploration of the neighborhood includes both well-known names from the "Palm Springs School" of architecture as well as lesser-known individuals, offering an introduction to a new group of Palm Springs architects and designers.

Treinan serves on the board of directors of the Palm Springs Preservation Foundation. His research and writing focus on Southern California's contribution to mid-20th-century art, culture, and the built environment. He holds a BA in English from Loyola Marymount University (Los Angeles) and an MFA in Creative Writing from the University of San Francisco.

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

# Authors on Architecture: Mandelkern on Electric Moons

## SAH/SCC Zoom Program Sunday, April 6, 2025, 1-2:30 PM Pacific

Join SAH/SCC for a fascinating look at something we see every day and probably give little thought to: the street lights of Los Angeles. In her book, Electric Moons: A Social History of Street Lighting in Los Angeles (Hat and Beard Press, 2024), India Mandelkern examines the art and politics of street lighting in LA from the 1880s to the present.


Flitting between social history, cultural anthropology, urban studies, and the history of design, Electric Moons illustrates how street lighting helped frame larger debates about civics and surveillance, infrastructure and traffic, the definition of public space and who should have access to it. Through her own conversations with politicians. planners, preservationists, artists, and dreamers, Mandelkern argues for the streetlight's vitality to urban life: a totem for the modern era.

Mandelkern is a Los Angeles native and a graduate of Middlebury College (Vermont). She received a Ph.D. in History from the University of California, Berkeley. Since then, she has worked as a curator, consultant, and critic, and has written on various topics—from food and wine to art and design-for many publications. A certified sommelier, she is currently writing a book about wine.

# Authors on Architecture: Ackerman-Shaw on Ackerman

## SAH/SCC Zoom Program Sunday, June 1, 2025, 1-2:30 PM Pacific

SAH/SCC welcomes Laura Ackerman-Shaw, who will give an overview of her parents' influential work based on the new book Evelyn and Jerome Ackerman: California Mid-Century Designers (Pointed Leaf Press, 2025). Jerome (1920-2019) and Evelyn (1924-2012) were the (other) prolific artist-couple central to the development of mid-century design in Southern California. They presented modernist craft-in weaving, carving, ceramics, tapestries, and mosaics-and made it accessible to the middle class.

Their works were celebrated for the combination of bright colors and craftsmanship, with an artisanal attention to detail. Ackerman-Shaw, having discovered new material in her parents' archives, expands their legacy and impact on post-war design in America. In the fall, their work will be featured in the exhibition "Material Curiosity by Design: Evelyn and Jerome Ackerman, Mid-Century to Today" at Craft Contemporary in Los Angeles.

Ackerman-Shaw spend 35 years in publishing prior to establishing Ackerman Modern to steward her parents' design legacy through exhibitions, publications, and licensing. She sits on the advisory board of Manitoga/Russell Wright Design Center (see Page 5 to order a video about Manitoga). On May 29, 2025, she will be doing a book signing in West Hollywood at CB2. Ackerman-Shaw received both BA and MA degrees in English literature from Stanford University (Palo Alto, CA).

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

Join SAH/SCC as we celebrate the reissue of Los Angeles Before the Freeways: Images of An Era 1850-1950 (Angel City Press, 2025) with its author Nathan Marsak. The book gives a lush, visual tour of a Los Angeles that no longer exists—one of elegant office buildings and stately mansions that were razed in the name of "progress." Featuring stunning black-and-white photography from Arnold Hylen that captures a forgotten era, the book contains an original essay by the photographer that provides historical background and context for the time period. This new edition contains additional, never-before-seen photographs from Hylen and newly unearthed information from historian Marsak on these lost architectural treasures.

Marsak on LA Before the Freeways

Originally published by Dawson's Book Shop in 1981, Los Angeles Before the Freeways has become a cult classic among LA's architectural historians. Now fully updated in a larger, more elegant format with expanded captions that provide additional context for Hylen's essay, Los Angeles Before the Freeways will be a treasured read for Angelenos of all stripes.

Marsak studied under the eminent historian of Los Angeles, Reyner Banham, at University of California, Santa Cruz, and completed his graduate work with noted Sullivan/Wright scholar Narciso G. Menocal at University of Wisconsin (Madison). He worked on the curatorial staff of Los Angeles Museum of Contemporary Art and served as historian for the LAPD Museum archives. He is also the author of Bunker Hill Los Angeles: Essence of Sunshine and Noir (Angel City Press, 2020) and Los Angeles Neon (Schiffer, 2002).

#### The Aluminaire House

By Jon Michael Schwarting and Frances Campani

A chronicle of obsession, a testament to perseverance, and a fairy tale of luck, the story of the Aluminaire House is beautifully presented in this book by the architects who spent 37 years championing the 1931 house by Albert Frey and Lawrence Kocher. They take us through the history of the building from an idea, to demonstration house, country weekend home, endangered treasure, teaching tool, and finally to an appropriate resting place in Palm Springs. (After a 10-year process, it went on display as part of the Palm Springs Art Museum in 2024.) Exhaustively illustrated with an impressive amount of photographs, sketches, and plans, the book details every aspect of the house. The authors place the house in the wider context of issues about prefabrication, affordable housing, and modernism.

#### The Palm Springs School: Desert Modernism 1934-1975 By Alan Hess

This extensive and well-researched history sets Palm Springs in a wide context of architectural history, looking at the work done in the desert from viewpoints on modernism, preservation, culture, and influence. It looks back, historically naming a "Palm Springs School," as at the time, even though most were steeped in modernism, there wasn't a cohesive movement. Different from other "schools," Hess notes: "They had no charismatic leader, no dominant personality ... like Frank Lloyd Wright was for the Prairie School or Paul Rudolph was for the Sarasota School. They were a college of equals addressing the same basic issues in their own individual ways." Even so, while concerning itself with the vast range of modern architects throughout the area, the book zeroes in on the Mount Rushmore of Palm Springs architects: William F. Cody, Albert Frey, E. Stewart Williams, and Donald Wexler (I would have added William Krisel). Essays by additional historians-including SAH/SCC President Sian Winship's "From Reservation to Real Estate Empire"—investigate various aspects of history and context.

## Palm Springs Tiki: Polynesia in the Desert

Combining two fun themes of mid-century delight, Palm Springs Tiki taps into the vast knowledge of Kirsten on Tiki (this is his fifth book on the subject) and Moruzzi on Palm Springs (his third). The book is so richly illustrated with historic ephemera (menus, matchbooks, ads, newsclips) and photos (luau revelers, exotic food and drink, expressive buildings) that the mid-century good times jump off the pages. The authors convey the fertile setting for the craze to emerge: Southern California's historic penchant for "early escapism" mixed with "America's postwar opening to foreign cultures". This tale of Tiki acknowledges such purveyors of Polynesiania as Don the Beachcomber, Chi Chi nightclub impresario Irwin Schuman, and designers Clif and Lou Sawyer, among many others setting the trends in music, fashion, food, and design.
