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
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
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
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


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
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The RESTORATION Shows: A Big Hit

Following on the success of RESTORATION 93, RAI/EGI Exhibitions are already working on the next Exhibition & Conference: Boston, February 26-28, 1995. And coming up in October: RESTORATION 94 in Amsterdam.

The RESTORATION 93 Show and Conference in Boston in December was billed in advance by its organizers as "The largest preservation event ever held in North America." And it turned out that's exactly what it was.

Registration for the RESTORATION 93 Show and Conference was an impressive 7,665 — with visitors from as far away as Equador, Russia, and Australia. The 251 exhibits included numerous live demonstrations by skilled craftsmen, artisans, and conservators at work displaying skills such as paperhanging, leatherworking, gold leafing, and stained-glass restoration. Among the vast array of products on display were cast iron ornament, historic hardware, roofing materials, architectural woodwork, wallcoverings, . . . just about every product and service one could think of for preserving not only buildings, but just about every other type of cultural artifact.

The entire staff of TRADITIONAL BUILDING was on hand in Boston at RESTORATION 93, greeting old friends and meeting new ones. And, of course, we were distributing copies of our official SHOW ISSUE of TRADITIONAL BUILDING. We found it an exhilarating (albeit exhausting) experience, and plan to be at RESTORATION 95 in force — along with our new official RESTORATION 95 SHOW ISSUE.

A two-track Conference program, which included over 50 panel discussions, workshops, and cross-disciplinary roundtables, addressed the needs of homeowners and professionals. The visitors and exhibitors that we spoke with seemed quite enthusiastic; most felt that the show exceeded their expectations.

Next Year in Boston: RESTORATION 95

The next North American event, RESTORATION 95, will be held February 26-28, 1995, at the Hynes Convention Center in Boston. The show organizers have booked larger exhibit space on the upper level of the Hynes Center because, based on early bookings, it seems certain that RESTORATION 95 will be considerably bigger than RESTORATION 93 . . . and will include even more exhibitors from abroad. The show is also being scheduled to overlap a weekend, so as not to conflict with office commitments, permitting many proprietors and employees of small companies to spend more time at the Show.



Now Disney Transforms The Past Into Utopia

With their well-honed sense of what makes tourists happy, Disney designers rely heavily on historically inspired streetscapes. But their interpretation requires historical accuracy, innovative materials — and a little sleight-of-hand.



he architecture of Disney theme parks sends academicians into paroxysms of emotion both pro (Rosemary Haag Bletter: "A future generation may want to landmark Disneyland") and con (Michael Sorkin: "a true technocratic postindustrial utopia...the weaving of ever more elaborate fabrics of simulation"). And it is Disney's deft interpretations of historic architecture, its culling and improving upon past iconic streetscapes until they surpass even the most wistful memories, that bring on some of the most heated reactions (Sorkin: "propelling its visitors into an unvisitable past").

What is it about Disney's c.1910 Main Streets and c.1930 Hollywood Boulevards and c.1940 Sunset Boulevards that even skeptics cannot resist writing about, that brightens moods and that rings with primal familiarity? I recently visited the offices of Walt Disney Imagineering (the Disney subsidiary responsible for theme-park design and construction) in Glendale, California, in search of aesthetic and technological secrets. One crucial factor in Disney's success, I discovered: Scholarly levels of attention to detail, sometimes lavished upon surprisingly humble structures.

PIXIE DUST

The offices occupy rows of flatroofed, low-slung buildings on side streets, indistinguishable from the neighboring light industries except for a cloud of starry pixie dust painted on every Disney street-number sign. In offices lined with photos and working drawings of park installations around the world, I met with director of architecture Carl Hagelman and senior show producer Ron Chesley (all of us wearing pixiedusted name tags). The goal of every Disney attraction, Hagelman explained, is "telling a story through creating an environment, so that as a guest you can randomly experience — as you can't in, of course, a movie

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
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

Terra Cotta Replacement: Is It Real, Or Is It GFRC?

A goodly amount of the architectural terra cotta in the U.S. is approaching 100 years of age. As this material deteriorates, specifiers face the crucial question: Do you replace with real terra cotta, or do you opt for a substitute material?

Anyone who has ever been to the Natural History Museum, a part of London's South Kensington museum complex, knows what a wonderful, long-lasting architectural material terra cotta can be. The Natural History Museum, designed by Alfred Waterhouse, R.A., was built in the 1870's and is clad inside and out with terra cotta. More than 120 years later, the building still looks great.

Not all architectural terra cotta installations are as long-lived, alas. The use of poor clays, faulty manufacturing methods, inferior glazes, poor design of steel anchoring systems, shifts in building loads, inappropriate repairs, or bad maintenance practices can all cause terra cotta — and, more importantly, the steel terra cotta anchors — to deteriorate. In most cases of failure of terra cotta and/or its steel anchors, water in some form is the culprit.

If a terra cotta installation is failing, and after a thorough analysis of the material and its anchoring system, the choice usually comes down to repair or replace. And if the decision is to replace, the knotty question of what replacement material to specify arises (more on this below). Of equal importance is the selection of the fabricator for replacement units and the contractor who will install the material. Both should be experienced with work on historic buildings.

Another major reason for terra cotta restoration/replacement these days is to undo damage or removal that occurred during misguided remodelings over the past few decades.

Terra Cotta Restoration

The mildest and gentlest form of terra cotta restoration is cleaning. Sometimes water, detergent, and a natural bristle brush are sufficient to spruce up terra cotta. There are also proprietary terra cotta cleaners, such as the "environmentally friendly" materials supplied by Dominion Restoration. When cleaning terra cotta, some of the things to *AVOID* are: (1) all abrasive cleaning methods; (2) the use of strong acids; (3) high-pressure water cleaning; (4) metal-bristle brushes.

Repointing loose mortar joints between terra cotta units with a *soft* mortar (softer than the adjacent terra cotta units) will keep water out, and will permit outward migration of water vapor. Sealing these joints with a waterproof caulk or sealant could cause water to become trapped inside the facade, with dire consequences—

especially to the steel anchors. Some architectural terra cotta facades were designed with drainage holes to permit trapped water to escape. Cases are on record where over-zealous maintenance workers carefully caulked all of these drainage holes to "waterproof" the building, and thereby caused catastrophic failure of the terra cotta anchors when water got trapped inside.

It is sometimes possible to repair cracks, spalling, and small missing terra cotta elements if the damage isn't too extensive. Patching materials, such as those supplied by Edison Chemical or Cathedral Stone Products, have been used successfully for terra cotta restoration. It is essential that such patching materials be carefully formulated to match the physical properties of the original terra cotta, such as coefficient of expansion and vapor transmission characteristics.

Replacement Materials

There are a variety of materials that can be used to replace architectural terra cotta, ranging from true terra cotta to high-tech thin-shell composites. Making the specification that is best for your particular job involves a complex balancing of availability, durability, appearance, quality, installation considerations, delivery time, and cost. There is no single "right" answer. Architectural Reproductions, Portland, Ore., a fabricator/installer experienced with all of these materials, has used most of them on various projects, and has even combined several within a given project. "It all comes down to what works best in a specific spot," says David Talbott, president of Architectural Reproductions.

Unlike true terra cotta, which has fired-in color and finish with an indefinite lifespan, most of the substitute materials listed below will require some sort of applied coating or finish to achieve the correct color match and texture. These coatings can range from a simple brush-on acrylic coating that is vapor permeable and easy to apply, to two-part catalyzed urethane coatings, which have poor vapor transmission and require more application skill. The life expectancy of an acrylic coating can be 10-15 years, while the urethane coatings can go 15-20 years before re-coating.

Here is a thumbnail review of the pros and cons of some of the possible replacement materials:

☐ TERRA COTTA — True terra cotta is the architectural conservator's first

choice: "replacing like with like." Though not many terra cotta producers remain in the U.S., those that are left, such as Boston Valley Terra Cotta, Orchard Park, N.Y., have accumulated quite a bit of experience in historic preservation. True terra cotta captures architectural detail with great crispness, is completely fireproof, has expansion/contraction compatibility with any remaining original terra cotta units, is very durable, and the color or finish is integral and extremely weather resistant. In addition, recent production advances have brought down the cost. Among the drawbacks: It is generally more expensive than other substitute materials. Much hand labor is involved in terra cotta model making, production, and glaze matching, so lead times can be longer than for substitute materials.

□ PRECAST CONCRETE — Precast concrete has been used as an economical terra cotta substitute when weight is not a factor. It is easily cast in rubber molds taken directly from original terra cotta elements. It can be load-bearing, and fasteners can be cast in. Limitations: Has to be installed by masons; matching of original color and texture can be difficult; may require a surface coating to get a terra cotta match; color is not as durable as with true terra cotta.

□ CAST STONE — A highly refined precast concrete, the production of true cast stone requires more careful control of the aggregates, cements, and air bubbles. The dry-tamp production method can produce an outer surface closely resembling natural stone. Other than allowing more surface control and being somewhat more expensive than precast concrete, cast stone has similar advantages and limitations as precast.

☐ GFRC — Glass Fiber Reinforced Concrete (GFRC) is generally fabricated as a thin-shell panel (generally 1/2" to 3/4" thick). Light weight permits long panels of ornament, often combining what originally were a number of separate terra cotta units. Various aggregates and surface treatments can replicate a wide range of stones and terra cottas. Original ornament can be used for a casting model. Limitations: Regular GFRC has a relatively high coefficient of expansion (6 to 12 x 10-6 in./in./deg. F.) Regular GFRC also has relatively high water absorption rate, but water absorption can be controlled by polymer loading; it is possible to get GFRC with low water absorption (around 5%). Because of movement, GFRC anchoring systems have to be flexible with properly engineered joints; the will have different expansion/contraction rate than adjacent historic material; surface coatings or color additives may fade with time; non load-bearing.

□ POLYMER-MODIFIED GRG — Forton-modified Glass-fiber Reinforced Gypsum has been finding increasing use as a terra cotta substitute. The polymer that makes the gypsum suitable for exterior use also allows a wide range of pigments and aggregates to be added to the matrix, making possible a dazzling array of colors and finishes. You get the sharp mold detail associated with gypsum, along with high strength, light weight, high impact resistance, and short molding cycles. Can be panelized using the same design concepts as GFRC (i.e., stud frame and flex anchors). Limitations: Usually requires a surface coating for terra cotta matching and weather resistance in areas with severe winters.

□ POLYMER CONCRETE — A wide variety of materials can fall under the term "polymer concrete." A pure polymer concrete, normally used for patching, is a mixture of an aggregate, such as sand or stone chips, plus a binder resin — usually a two-part epoxy. (There is no cementitious material in "pure" polymer concrete.) However, there can also be a wide range of other mixtures (usually proprietary) of polymer admixtures, aggregates, cements, and glass fibers that can also be called "polymer concretes." Limitations: Polymer concretes tend to be vapor impermeable and normally require surface coatings in terra cotta applications.





Early European Sources: A BRIEF HISTORY OF ORNAMENTAL IRON

With the growing interest in architectural metalwork, many designers and craftspeople are looking to historic patterns for inspiration. In this article, an experienced restoration metalworker reviews the rich tradition of ornamental iron.

There is no more fitting finish to a building than the proud battlements of historically accurate ironwork — setting off the architecture with a clear statement of style. The cultural lineage of fine ironwork is so intricately interwoven with the sweeping panorama of invasions, revolutions, and conquest that a building wearing the jewelry of period metalwork claims its proud place in history.

Armed with a little knowledge, the modern ironwork detailer often thinks in generic terms when specifying style. Whole regions are clothed in attempts at "French style" or "Italian iron," when in fact the history of ironwork design is far more interesting and complex. With so much expressive iron enriching our cultural heritage, it is a loss to limit new work to a monotone of cliched scrollwork.

The Early Sources

In contrast to the abundance of magnificent European ironwork, there is no surviving masterpiece of the Roman era. To the Roman eye, iron was a practical ore suited for the military-industrial complex, and bronze was the medium for architecture. The gods of the forge — Hephaestus to the Greeks and Vulcan to the Romans — were symbols of the mastery at the forge, but it was the smithies of Europe who invented the vocabulary and skills for working architectural iron.

In England, the earliest surviving examples of ironwork are the highly decorative iron door mounts of the Danish invaders. Great crescent-shaped strap hinges, like those in the Staplehurst Church in Kent, were enlivened with incisions punched into saw-tooth detailing along the flat surfaces. Door handles and hinges terminated in expressively primitive animal heads, suggesting a marriage of iron and mythology. Animal heads were fashioned in the round, standing free, or springing from stylized leaves. Early English churches honored Thor with their dragons and aquatic creatures forged into the sturdy hardware. Early French work also showed the honest effect of the hammer and anvil, with chisel and punch marks for surface decoration, but with a charm that one would expect from France.

The first remaining fragment of grillework, from about 1093, is the great screen at St. Swithin's shrine in Winchester Cathedral, with its robust C-scrolls collared on a series of verticals. The screen is probably indicative of other vanished English works of the time, with its collared construction. Here, the scroll endings, always an indicator of date in ironwork, wrap back on themselves to form simple flower outlines.

French grillework of the 1100's and 1200's used the same construction of C-scrolls, but with the scrollwork terminating back on itself in tiny circles. The grilles of Conques, Aveyron are among the best remaining French work of the time, with C- and S-scrollwork combined to produce nine separate screens—an early monument to iron's talent for combining protection with beauty. In Spain, the Santa Cruz grille, dated about 1225, used C-scrolls in very similar construction, with iron said to have come from Moorish tent chains. Other Spanish grilles of the period had C-scrolls collared back-to-back in an elegant linked construction, without benefit of a central vertical support.

Meanwhile, south of the Alps, the Italians were slow to shed their prejudice toward iron as the inferior metal. When they did begin to forge iron architecturally, they worked it in an entirely different manner. The Italians set about the task of perfecting the more difficult quatrefoil, which they proceeded to work on for three centuries — from the 13th to the 16th. At first the quatrefoil grille was chiseled from a single hammered sheet of iron set into an iron frame. Rival smiths competed by cutting from thicker and thicker sheets of iron and by creating ever-more complex punched designs. Sheets of chiselled iron were


laminated to superimpose dimensional design. The Scaligeri Tomb Rails in Verona (1380) are an excellent period example: Built up of very large panels with individual quatrefoils linked in the manner of chain mail, so that the entire rail panel sways when touched. As ironwork gained architectural acceptance, the Italian quatrefoil blossomed in rich variety.

A New Process Creates New Language

In the 13th century, an entirely new process was developed to work iron. Perhaps some master smith, laboriously driving his chisel into the hot iron, had an epiphany that saw the chisel transformed into a complete die. The nationality of the originator is unknown, but the process was a well-guarded secret among master smiths. Similar in process to today's "swage" work, the technique allowed white-hot iron to be impressed with hammers or chisels bearing the reverse image of the desired ornament.

Suddenly, a whole new decorative vocabulary was introduced with fine leaves, six-sided rosettes, flowers, and even fruit. Vine-like plant forms supplanted the previous scrollwork, suggesting the influence of the rich illumina-

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

tions in monastic manuscripts. The increased control over design led to flowing tracery in grillework with a fine sense of grace. On freestanding grillework, a second stamping was added to the reverse of the grille, and the two were pressed together under heat to form a single two-sided ornament. The eleven-panel freestanding Eleanor Grille in Westminster Abbey shows a sophisticated use of the new terminations. Stamped leaves curve over to cleverly conceal the points of forge-welding, without a break in the

delicate curve of vines.

Even hinges took on a new look. Decoration was developed at the expense of utility, and the massive strapwork that was once functional became primarily ornamental, divorced from the actual function of the hinge. The vine blossomed in profusion across the planks of 13th-century doors.

In a 13th-century fashion statement, the French ripped out and destroyed most of their C-scroll choir screens, replacing them with the new style of vines stamped with rose-like flowers and leaves. The French also discovered the cinquefoil and trefoil (five-sided and three-sided respectively), and applied them to grillework. A telling motif of the time was the termination of two unequal scrolls with a tongue between them. The French style was imitated in England, Belgium, and especially, Germany.

In the 14th and 15th centuries, the Black Death cast a pall over the forge: The great hinges of the 12th and 13th centuries were never again equaled, and the medieval abbeys, once the source of commissioned works, couldn't afford elaborate architectural constructions. Gradually, as the cathedral's alabaster shrines and lavishly appointed tombs increased in value, the focus of important architectural ironwork moved to protective grillework.

In England, simple vertical bars showed off the iron constitution for security, with heavy molded cornices, square-forged standards, and battlements surmounted by large prickets or candle holders. In France, grilles were made of members threaded vertically or diagonally in the German style, and the quatrefoil and foliage patterns were imported from Italy. But the real focus of 15thcentury French metalwork moved away from the forge to intricate chiselling of locks, keys, jewelry caskets, and other small objects. Rivalry centered on the creation of complex chiselled work, with locks of such complicated movement carved from solid-iron stock that some required several keys to open.

Spain, the Reign of the Raja

In Spain, the three-quarters of a century from the mid-15th to the early 16th century was a time of prosperity, adventure, and the success of foreign conquest. Spain's infamous exploitations in the Americas brought home wealth expressed in the development

of the great rajas, or cathedral screens. Competitions were held for the building of cathedral screens, requiring full-size wood models and elaborate drawings. These were events of national importance, in which many design problems were posed and solved.

Beginning with crude ingots, the Spanish smiths hammered out 12- to 15-ft. lengths of perfect square and round bars for the monumental altar screens. The competitions brought out the full range of possible design: First, through alternating straight and twisted uprights; then, using all conceivable twists in cross-sections and incised ornamentation; and finally, bars with molded caps and bases so expertly forged they appear to be cast. In what became a telling Spanish motif, the uprights were split in two and, after a graceful curve of Gothic tracery, rejoined to become a single bar again.


Pilasters from one- to four-in. wide were enriched with carved or applied arabesques; Corinthian-inspired capitals sported fanciful details. Portraits in repousse, luxurious foliage, and finally a crown of figures or floral crestings set off the rajas in a glorious achievement of iron. As the rajas rose in height, they were interrupted by pierced horizontal supports, increasingly rich Gothic tracery, and decorative intermediate and cresting bands. The bands began as single sheets of beaten plate, chiseled into lively designs of figures, inscriptions, and foliage, and installed freestanding or riveted to one or more back panels with a skill that made them look like a single plate. Background plates were sometimes dressed with vermilion or gilt or even stretched with textile to show through the pierced front panel.

Betrayal or Breakthrough: A Gothic Tale

What took place next in the history of iron was a wholesale abandonment of authentic work and a betrayal of the nature of iron — or, depending on one's point of view, one of the highest achievements in the working of iron. To the connoisseur of the forge who knows how iron comes alive to fire and the hammerblow, and who appreciates the honest look of worked iron, the massive ironworks of the 16th- and 17th-century cathedrals appear artificial and strained. To the native tourist stumbling through the medieval monuments, the chiselled

and gilded latticework could be easily mistaken for wood or stone. To the critic admiring the perfection of technique and work transcending material, the ironworks of the Gothic cathedrals are sublime.

What took place in the 15th and 16th centuries between artisan and architect is a cautionary tale for modern times. At the direction of the cathedral architects, smiths traded in their traditional tools for those of the carpenter: The saw, drill, file, and chisel. Sheet-iron was used in conjunction with forged members to suggest Gothic tracery, battlements, and flying buttresses. Metal was worked without so much as a marking hammerblow. Once gilded, the iron could not be differentiated from stone or

RICHLY ILLUSTRATED... A HISTORY OF DECORATIVE IRONWORK

All the illustrations for "The History of Ornamental Iron" were culled from Dover Publications' *Decorative Antique Ironwork: A Pictorial Treasury*, by French scholar, Henry Rene D'Allemagne. It's a re-publication of all the plates in the 1924 French catalog of the collection in the Musee Le Secq des Tournelles a Rouen, originally published in Paris, 1924. This book depicts 4,500 objects, which illustrate the variety of decorative ironwork from Roman times to the early 19th century.

The book is divided into two parts: Architectural Ironwork (grilles, door hardware, locks, keys and padlocks, and signs and brackets) and Small Iron and Steel Objects (jewelry, small boxes, sewing accessories, religious symbols, clocks, furniture, lighting fixtures, tools, and more). Richly captioned, the text was translated by Vera K. Ostoia, of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

wood. Consequently, the ironworker became a fitter and joiner of considerable skill; iron was constructed with mortise-and-tenon joints, and even dovetailing. What was gained was ironwork pushed to the limits of the material. What was lost was the smith's traditional vocabulary of joinery techniques - and the structural integrity of forged iron. If the Gothic gift to ironcraft was an invitation to become an integral part of the grand architectural design scheme, it was a gift that removed the smith from his primary role as craftsmandesigner.

Tomb rails, however, continued to demonstrate mastery at the forge, with square forged bars set diagonally for interest, expertly transiting to flats which might end in alternate fleur-de-lis and tapered spike. The cable twist, which was to be so well explored in the next century, was used especially for standards on the corners of the rail. The French, meanwhile, were finding a preference for repousse over chiseled works, which was to lead to the refinement of the acanthus leaf in the 16th century. Looking for new design ideas, Henry II sent artisans to Italy.


At the same time, the Italian smiths were adding stiles and rails with dentils that divided the quatrefoil panels into rectangular panels, giving an architectural formality to the large cathedral screens. Above the quatrefoil panels typically was a raised crowning frieze of finely imagined repousse crested by spikes, flowers, or animal heads. Venice especially developed its own style, dropping the use of pierced platework for quatrefoils made of Cscrolls banded together with spear-headed accents. Smiths rivalled one another in building filigree fanlights in door archways, displaying a Venetian fondness for interrupted scrolls.


In Spain, the transition from Gothic to Renaissance also introduced a more formal architectural vocabulary into the raja, with cornices molded of solid iron, or iron veneered over wood. Here, too, the ironwork suffered in borrowing the idioms of carpentry; double-curved moldings do not spring naturally from the anvil and could not match the delicacy of the raja spindles or the liveliness of the panels and cresting. What was lost in the attempt to forge iron moldings was gained in the turn to repoussed cresting panels filled with lively figures in full relief. At their best, two repoussed panels were riveted together, back-to-back, to form a single unit, in a lost art called "moving the iron along."

Spanish ironwork took to the street in the form of window grilles and balconies, with all the variations and motifs found in the cathedral screens. The many variations on spindle design lent an easy grace to Spanish ironwork, showing that even simple variations in spindle treatment can contribute to graceful design. The effect on the streetscape of Spanish cities was to bring the buildings into harmonious proportions with the human scale and to give a finished look to the architectural facade, in the same way muntins finish a Georgian house.

The Devil in the Details

If medieval superstition held that






Openwork iron guichet (wicket; grille for a door opening) shown with its own shutter, Spain, 15th c.

masterful forging was accomplished with the devil-as-collaborator, then the devil was in the details of Renaissance ironwork. Finials for England's tomb railings explored the fleur-delis from exquisite 4-in. high stampings, through the flattened Flemish style of chiseled profile, to four-sided petals converging into a finely carved acorn. The twisted cable was now explored outside of Spain in all its delightful profiles and variations. In Germany, fantastic masks, heads, and animals sprouted at every possible juncture. A superstition about the Virgin and the thistle plant had the "holy thistle" marking German work as clearly as any historian could wish.

The Italians, whose skill in working plate iron began with the quatrefoil, moved on to stair bannisters of cutout scroll ornaments. The celebrated English smith and architect, Inigo Jones, studying in Italy from 1613 to 1614, brought back the plateiron scroll for the Queen's House balustrade in Greenwich. He chiselled ornamental flat scrolls from hammered plate iron, varying from 1/4in. thick in the centers to a fine 1/8 in. along the edges, creating a design interest impossible to capture in a stencil-cut copy. Working from hammered sheet, English smiths carved out plate-iron variations on the scrolls and foliage of existing forgework.

The logical next step was to attach ornamental details, especially the classical repoussed acanthus leaf and the new English forged water leaf. Ironwork, which had lagged behind the classical architecture of the 17th century, was ready to blossom into the forms of the high Renaissance.

In England, on Februrary 13, 1689, William III of Orange and Mary II of England ascended the English throne. Queen Mary discovered a new design passion across the channel in Versailles. But that, and how iron has carried its lineage into modern times, is a whole other story.

The Hand Of Inspiration

Sculpture and handcarved ornament can infuse a space with vitality and add layers of meaning. But some clients balk at the cost of hand-carved work. The crux of the issue: What do people choose to value?

On the following pages, we present the most complete survey we've seen in print of carvers, sculptors, and casting services who are attuned to architectural work. In looking at the portfolio of their work on pages 28-32, it will be apparent that these artists and studios are working at the highest skill levels.

It is the editors' contention that hand-sculpted architectural ornament, shaped by a person of vision and skill, is the highest expression of the builder's art. The dilemma arises, however, when the bill is presented. Handwork, by definition, is labor-intensive and therefore expensive. How does a designer make room for architectural art in an era of tight budgets?

The role of the carver and sculptor in architecture is dictated by the designer's — and client's — view of ornament. Does the person footing the bill see carved and sculptural work as an art form that helps transform construction into architecture, and which will lift the spirits of every person who enters the space? Or is the client imprisoned in 20th-century utilitarianism, and therefore sees sculpted ornament merely as a useless expense?

Some classicists insist that the proper role of a building is to serve as a pedestal and framework for sculpture, murals, mosaics, and other fine arts. In this view, sculpture and ornament mark the difference between a meanly built shed and humanist architecture in the great western tradition. Admittedly, there aren't many pure classicists around today... but their viewpoint assigns architecture a more ambitious and glorious role than current conventions.

For most of the 20th century, as everyone is aware, the reverse imperative was in force. The prevailing shibboleths held that ornament was superfluous, that less was more, and that buildings were merely machines for living and should reflect the machine ethic.

The success of the historic-preservation movement has been one of the major factors leading to a reappraisal of the role of ornament in architecture. Many of the 19th- and early-20th-century buildings that have been restored to public acclaim have been structures in which ornament is integral to the design . . . not a tacked-on afterthought.

The William Morris Paradox

The "problem" with handcrafted ornament has always been one of expense. In the 19th century, the moral superiority of handcrafted work was declaimed by aesthetician John Ruskin from every podium at his command. Ruskin's preachings led to the Arts & Crafts Movement, the work of William Morris, and the founding of Morris, Marshall, Faulkner & Co. — with the goal of providing beautiful handcrafted work for every home in England.

But William Morris inadvertently ran up against the William Morris Paradox: When he had to pay all the artists and craftsmen a living wage, he found that only the wealthy could afford the goods his firm so handsomely produced. (One of the reasons Morris spent his final days crusading for the Socialist League, which he organized in 1884, was to promulgate economic reform; that way, the average person could afford the beauty of handcrafted goods.)

Working Around The Morris Paradox

In an ideal world, all ornament and decoration would be hand-created by talented artists and artisans. But, as William Morris learned, we don't live in an ideal world.

How does a designer resolve these conflicting truths: Sculpture and handcarved ornament are labor intensive and therefore fairly costly; most projects are not blessed with deep-pocketed clients; yet sculpture and handcarved architectural ornament enrich a project in numerous unmeasurable ways.

The long-term answer (not much help with today's project, unfortunately) is to wait for current trends to make a deeper impression on clients. There's no question that the success of historic preservation and the renewed interest in humane architecture is engendering a new respect — and demand — for skilled craftsmanship.

A short-term answer is to adopt the strategy of carefully selecting an outstanding piece of handwork and making it a focal point and theme-setter, surrounding it with less-expensive, complementary elements. A typical example is the designer who acquires an expensive, handcarved mantel, and builds the rest of the room around it, using all the other room architecture to set off and emphasize the mantel.

There's also a middle ground between pure handcarved ornament and mundane machine production: The realm of the caster. Casting allows the skill of the sculptor or carver to be replicated over and over again . . . at lower cost. Granted, purists (such as Ruskin) insist that a casting doesn't have the fire and soul of a hand-sculpted original. But tell that to the hundreds of people who stop daily at Grand Army Plaza in front of New York City's Plaza Hotel to admire the heroic equestrian CAST bronze figure of William Tecumseh Sherman, by Augustus Saint-Gaudens.

Casting has an essential role in making the art of the carver and sculptor available to a wider audience. Each time cast material is poured into a mold, silent homage is given to the gifted hands that created the original model from which molds and castings flow.

THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS: Ultimate Union of Architecture And Sculpture

Donald Martin Reynolds, in his stunning new book, *Masters of American Sculpture* (see below), presents the modern case for the figurative tradition in sculpture and its relation to architecture. As Reynolds points out, figurative sculpture has a special place in the Pantheon of the arts because "... since the Middle Ages, the human body has been a metaphor for the universal community of mankind."

The Beaux Arts tradition, which influenced much American public architecture between 1890 and 1914, was founded on the classical belief in the unity of architecture and the other fine arts. Nowhere in the U.S. is that unity more eloquently expressed than at the Library of Congress, Washington D.C. The Library's comprehensive plan of sculpture, murals, and mosaics was created by the building's original architect, Paul J. Pelz of the Washington firm of Smithmeyer & Pelz, Architects, and was completed by Edward Pearce Casey. The Library program of sculpture and other fine arts is certainly the most elaborate of any library in the U.S. — and probably of any American public building. When one is in the Reading Room of the Library of Congress, one would have to be emotionally short-circuited not to feel that one has entered a temple of rarefied knowledge.

Reynolds devotes several pages of his new book (and a companion article in SCULPTURE REVIEW, XLII, No. 4) to the sculptural and artistic riches of the Library of Congress. And a full description of the Library's treasures have been made accessible once again by Classical America's re-publication of Herbert Small's original Handbook of the Library — with an insightful new introduction by Henry Hope Reed (see below).

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



HISTORIC SHUTTERS special report

Wood Shutters & Hardware: Avoiding Shutter Disappointment

In the days before storm windows, to quote a modern manufacturer, "Every valley had a shutter mill."

This means that there was a great variety of historical shutters. And that can present problems for clients seeking to match original designs. You can certainly find custom manufacturers happy to reproduce shutters from a sample or specs, but the cost and production time may be prohibitive for your project. In that case, there are two other options: Buying off-the-shelf stock shutters is a quick and economical solution, and by trimming the sides and tops, some nonstandard sizes may be accommodated; or you can order semi-custom, where one of the manufacturer's standard designs is produced to your dimensions. This second option is generally less expensive and has a shorter manufacture time than full custom work.


However, the choices don't just end there. As one homeowner/subscriber discovered, some manufacturers offer more than one grade of shutter and various grades of finishes. Her story illustrates the problems that can occur when a contractor, client, and supplier don't communicate well. Factors to clarify before purchase: Location of shutters, weather considerations, budget, compatibility of shutter design with existing style, durability, building schedule, finishes, thickness/weight, and operational vs decorative.

The \$1,000 Problem

The homeowner's contractor ordered primed, standard grade custom-shutters from a manufacturer. When half of the order arrived, the homeowner was distraught over what she saw. As she put it, "They look like they're made out of balsa wood." She had her contractor call the company to complain, and they sent a sample of a heavy-duty shutter, which turned out to be what the client had envisioned. However, since the shutters were custom sized, the company refused to take them back or give credit. They felt they had filled the order as requested. The home owner had paid for and received half of the order which she didn't want, and the company was holding the other half of the order waiting for the balance. That's the way things stand to date.

This deadlock could have been avoided with better communication. Contractors frequently have to bear the blame for others' mistakes, but in this case it seems valid to point the finger in his direction. As the go-between, it was his job to assess what the client's expectations were and find a suitable manufacturer and product to fulfill them. Samples should have been requested before placing the order. The client, who had also complained about the roughness of the finish, should have been forewarned about the differences between a primed finish and a painted finish. Priming wood raises the grain and requires a second sanding before applying paint. The manufacturer couldn't be expected to know what the client wanted, especially when the order came from a building professional, but he could have inquired whether the shutters were going to be operational or ornamental and then suggested the heavier product.

The Editors contacted 42 companies and, from those that responded, chose the 20 most appropriate for the needs of our readers. Also included is a portfolio showing a sampling of interior and exterior shutters and the accompanying hardware these companies offer. — SG



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




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
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
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


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
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ENTER: THE DOOR

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Install a polystyrene medallion on a 15-ft. ceiling (one that has good detail and relief), paint it, and take bets on how many people assume it's plaster. Or install a GRG pilaster in a hotel lobby and challenge anyone to identify a better material for highly trafficked areas. However, consider the visual importance of the door and entryway on the facade of a building and the intimate relationship between a door and the person who pushes it open and closed.

Doors may be fabricated in metal or FRP and, from a security and safety standpoint, meet the necessary standards. But approach a house or restaurant or hotel and what you will perceive is the warm welcome presented by its door and entryway. According to Steve Dean at Chautauqua Woods, stamped-out doors "look dead. No other product can match the aesthetic appeal of wood — the quality, elegance, and workmanship." And of course, says Hank Bishop of Woodstone, "The door surround is also important; it sets off the door."

And then there is the door as art. Look at an Oak Leaves Studio creation (see pg. 46) and see a piece of "functional sculpture." For that part of the market willing to spend serious money, there is a handful of studios with the engineering skills and the artistic virtuosity to accommodate special requests.

When it comes to the garage door, Scott Hahn of Hahn's Woodworking sees it as an extension of the house. "It's a large architectural statement. If you spend time and money constructing your house, don't skimp on the final stage, which is often the garage. It brings in the architecture of the entire house and

helps one element flow into another." The great benefit of customized wood garage doors (and the justification for spending more than twice as much than on a stock wood or steel door) is that its style can be modified in many ways; for example, stiles, rails, and panels can be arranged to blend in with the style of the house and its doors.



Bedecking Doors: Where to Hobknob with the Past

Visitors entering your building may not consider whether your period door is half opened or half closed, but as they pass through, they'll certainly notice the hardware.

Choosing the right functional accessories for your traditionally styled door usually involves more than a trip to your local hardware store. To this end, we are offering a compendium of historical door hardware companies that address the wide range of mechanical and stylistic needs of our readers.

The 49 manufacturers and suppliers on the following SourceList were selected from 142 companies we canvassed. Some offer original antique wares, others have their own lines of period reproductions, and a number offer custom and restoration capabilities.

Besides the 10 commonly sought after items we list, these companies offer er related products, such as metal house numbers, door grilles, mailbox slots, keyhole escutcheons, vertical dead bolts, and cast iron surface-lock receivers, to name a few. The styles represented range from Spanish medieval to French Moderne, with heavy representation of Early American and Victorian styles. You will also find services like retrofitting and refurbishing of hardware for contemporary contexts.

Something to look for when shopping for reproduction hardware is the total design accuracy. William Ball, of Ball & Ball, notes that some manufacturers produce pieces that look historical in terms of materials and ornamentation but make no attempt to reproduce accurate internal mechanisms. Because of this, the knobs and locks may be positioned in the wrong places, following the dictates of the new design rather than history.

This concern with quality prompted Cirecast to formulate their own specifications for historic hardware, which they feel architects and designers should demand of any manufacturer.

Another concern is outfitting entries with hardware that complies with the new Americans with Disabilities Act. For a professional's perspective on meeting the challenges ADA poses for traditional styling, we refer you to an article by Andrea Rideout of Hardware Plus in the January/February 1994 issue of Traditional Building. — SG

Historic Hardware Quality Specifications

By CIRECAST, Inc., Restoration Hardware Specialists

- 1) All pieces shall be the exact size of the original in length, width, and thickness.
- 2) All pieces shall be made in the same way as the original, so as to produce a part that is historically accurate; i.e., where knob escutcheon plates are made from two separate parts, they will be fabricated in the same fashion.
- 3) Metal alloy and color shall match original exactly.
- 4) Surface finish shall match documented examples of historic pieces or those designated by the historian, project architect, and/or manufacturer.
- 5) The manufacturer shall have a minimum of seven years experience in the manufacture of historic hardware or other
- 6) The manufacturer shall be able to show a minimum of ten different examples of completed jobs demonstrating historic accuracy, high quality detail, and artistic skill.
- 7) Castings shall be manufactured by the lost-wax investment casting process or such other process which will yield as smooth and detailed surfaces as those in the originals.
- 8) No substitutions in size, shape, or color of metal shall be allowed in the reproduction of builders' hardware, sculpture, or other decorative metal work, except by permission of the architect.
- 9) Where modifications to antique trim are needed for interfacing with modern lock sets or other apparatus is necessary, such changes must not destroy or cause distortions that would interfere with the artistic quality of the original pieces.

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





CONSTRUCTING ATMOSPHERE

An Artist and Former Bartender Assesses the Trends in Hotels, Restaurants, and Pubs

BY SHARON GARBE

I feel like I'm from the George Plimpton school of journalism, editing this special report on Hotels, Restaurants, and Pubs. Besides being an avid traveler and diner, I've worked in all three areas: I was a teenage chambermaid for a summer; I tended bar in a London pub on a lark after high school; and, after getting a degree in sculpture, found myself managing a restaurant for six years. (Should Traditional Building ever do a piece on traditional kennels, my credentials as a former assistant dog warden might come in handy.) Despite these experiences, I must admit I hadn't realized that these businesses belong to the "hospitality industry." Nor, despite my familiarity with construction, did I know the extent to which manufacturers and suppliers of historical building products are in demand by the design professionals working in this market. Once I began looking for them, I found that period and traditional furnishings and fixtures are, in fact, the norm. These days, hospitality looks an awful lot like "those days" only things work more efficiently.

Dining, beverage, and lodging are highly competitive markets that have not been doing well of late. Ho-


tel analysts, however, are predicting an upswing in profits due to a steady rise in occupancy rates, a recent boom in meetings and conventions, the restructuring of debts, and the general paring down of waste that began in leaner times. Restaurants are reacting to America's rising health consciousness mainly through menu changes and in the trend to build smaller bars to allow for larger dining areas, as one bar manufacturer I spoke to noted. Despite the risks new facilities are being built, and to keep up with competition major renovations are being carried out.

Durability and aesthetics are key words in hospitality design. While heavy traffic is desirable from a business standpoint, the visible signs of use must be minimized. Traditional materials like tile, stone, wood, and glass not only offer longevity over vinyl, Formica, and plastic, but transcend rapidly changing fads. Used in a historical context, they tend to be a safer bet than in cutting-edge design concepts that might go out of fashion sooner than a renovation budget allows. Happily, the current trend of culling from historical styles — the tried and true — does not have to mean tired and blue installations.

"I went a hundred miles north to the Berkshires. It was April... Was I in England? Almost, but not quite. That was again and again to be my sensation, and in the Arizona desert I was to feel that I was almost but not quite in India, and in the Yosemite valley that it was not quite Switzerland. America is always throwing out these Old-World hints, and then withdrawing them in favor of America." -E.M. Forster, "The United States"

The slippage Forster experienced travelling around America is sort of how I feel when I go out to eat or imbibe. Only the sense of displacement includes time as well as place. Victorian mahogany bars; gilded, glazed, and marbleized walls; Art Deco railings; etched-glass dividers; schoolhouse pendant lamps; and enamel advertising signs are appropriated as props, turning wining and dining into a form of entertainment.

Design objectives for restaurants are often effected in a theatrical manner: The layout, lighting, and decor are chosen to communicate moods, create fantasies, recall other eras, locales, or epitomize certain social values. While

splashy Big Concept restaurants are still being built (like two recent New York entrants: T. Rex, which features a 3-D denizen of the Jurassic period breaking through a wall; and the Harley Davidson Cafe, replete with full-sized motorcycles-as-ornament), a great many more subdued statements are being made that transport customers to less raucous milieux.

After the decadence of the 80's, it seems that caution, subtlety, and sophistication have been set loose in the culture at large. Fashions at this year's Academy Awards recalled the glamour of Old Hollywood. The 80's frenzy for collecting contemporary art is being supplanted by a mania for acquiring antiques. It's the tighten-your-belts-or-there'll- be-another-recession 90's and the design of new restaurants reflects this narrowing of the public's economic comfort zone. Customers want to feel that they're spending time and money that's not wasted. Tying into traditions through design schemes can make a restaurant seem less of a speculative venture. (It also disguises the fact that the restaurant is new and has not yet stood the test of time.) Creating a cozy atmosphere does not mean just serving up button-tufted banquettes from the family-friendly restaurants of your childhood. It can mean quoting a French bistro or an Italian espresso bar, flaunting a Gothic abundance of fabrics and rugs, or recreating the atmosphere of a country home or gingerbread bandstand. Taking a cue from the last turn of the century, where ornamentation from diverse cultures commingled eclectically into the Edwardian style, we are now creating our own movement of historical pastiche.

Even New York's East Village, which used to spawn places like King Tut's Wawa Hut, is falling into line. An offbeat example is the Tenth Street Lounge. Once a modernist parking garage, its readaptive design gives one the feeling of an old library/monastery. The envelope is a dark, high-ceilinged space. The designers didn't try to conceal the cinder block walls and steel ducts, but rather softened them with an antique wood bar, old oak reading tables, sturdy low-design wood chairs, simple black iron floor and table lamps with fabric shades, and massive candles burning on a ledge ten feet above the floor.

A different kind of theater is in play in the restaurants of the Nordstrom's Department Store chain. They are designed to recall an English pub — a quick place to stop off between floors. The pub look is conveyed through Tudor-style furnishings, and the feeling was reinforced by specifying Aged Woods' antique recycled lumber for the floors and bars. The bars were then resin coated to preserve history and cut down on maintenance. This follows the maxim of a successful restaurateur I spoke to in Atlanta: "If the customer can touch it, I

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make sure it's the real thing. If it's going to be seen from ten feet away, I replicate." This principle goes for facades as well. I recently asked the owner of a new restaurant (which looks like it's been around in some incarnation or other for years) about the extent of the renovation work he had done. I was surprised to learn that the space had never housed a restaurant, and that everything was new, from the raised-panel wainscotting and Victorian-style bar to the facade. The owner installed a vernacular front window to match others on the block. Another example comes from a contractor I know who was asked to build the facade of a new restaurant out of plumb, so that it would blend in with the adjacent stores. The identity of a place is a fundamental marketing tool, and belonging is the current strategy.

A View from the Bar

Bars serve complex functions as well as concoctions. Alcohol consumption may be on the decline, but the idea of a bar as a gathering place is firmly fixed in our minds. (Even the *Enterprise* on "Star Trek: The Next Generation" has a bar, where, on occasion, Whoopi Goldberg guest-serves synthahol.) As a concept, bars are not going out of fashion. There are juice bars, snack bars, and milk bars, as well as bars that Al Capone patronized. And while there are any number of styles, the platonic ideal seems to be, simply, a wooden front and back bar with traditional detailing.

Styles of bars vary, but their purpose is singular. "Bars are income-producing machines, and efficiency of design has a direct bearing on profits," notes Tom Hinz, of Wallace & Hinz, an Arcata, Calif., firm that makes modular bar systems. The company also sells bar components, like carved capitals and columns, arch and cornice moldings, arm rails, and raised panels.

Hinz gave a persuasive example of how lucrative efficient bar design can be. After a Wallace & Hinz English pub-style bar was installed in the remodelled club bar of the Fort MacArthur Air Force Base in Long Beach, Calif., profits increased by 300 percent. The previous bar had been poorly designed making it cumbersome for the staff to service customers.

The company's long experience has shown what layouts work best in terms of profit potential. Fourteen basic bar styles, including classic linear bars, curved and angled configurations, and island types with four-side accessibility, are available. All of the configurations coordinate mixing stations, liquor displays, cooler boxes, floor-staff pickup stations, drop-off areas, and entrances to the bar, so that these "machines" are geared for optimal working efficiency. The bars come with a "critical" bar die drawing for the plumbing and an electrical one for the wall where the bar will be installed. Also, a stainless steel trash can is mounted in a cabinet lined with plastic laminate under the workstation top. The bars are shipped in crates ready for installation by a general contractor or by the company itself.

Another company that specializes in bar building is Harbour House, in Stamford, Conn. Jeff Watkins, the millwork company's president, is a man with strong opinions about bar building. Because of his company's extensive experience, they know what will and will not fly. The company turns down jobs for designs they think won't be successful. Watkins, a wood purist, noted with some despair, "Designers always want fabric and stone." Shaking his head at the mention of unconventional materials, he cautioned "You often run into trouble with metal, and marble will chip and stain," though he says the company will subcontract granite and Corian tops. But he's got a point on an aesthetic level as well. On a relatively busy night recently at The Old Town Bar in Manhattan, a friend and I went to grab a quick bite to eat. The only seats available were at its new extension, a pink marble-topped bar. The other customers were two and three deep at the original wood bar, leaving us no choice but to settle at that cold outpost. In the world of bar physics, wood has magnetic properties.

Harbour House crafts everything off site, and installation is accomplished in one day. While every job is different, Watkins says that a 16-foot bar is a good size for today's market. Ninety-nine percent of the work Harbour House does is mahogany, which has an elegant durability and a "clubby, vintage look." An average-sized bar 16- to 18-feet long with two eight-foot returns costs between \$20-25,000. Harbour House will also design and produce host stations, booths, tables, chairs, wall facings, columns, and other interior millwork products.

A Southern Spectacle

Another option for outfitting a bar or restaurant is to buy old. And to find out more about what's around, I attended the 34th auction at Red Baron's Antiques in Atlanta, GA., where 21 bars were going under the hammer.

"So what's this auction like?" I asked a passenger beside me in the shuttle van from the hotel to Red Baron's. "Have you ever been to a circus?" was his response. He was wearing a checked flannel shirt and jeans, and had spent the night in his truck because the hotel was booked. Seated on my other side was a woman wearing the most incredible beaded dress I'd ever seen, and whom I later found out was the owner of John Lennon's white Phantom Rolls Royce, which she bought at the last Red Baron's auction. I realized I was in for an evening of extremes.

We were on our way to the preview which, I was informed, is not a time for serious assessing. For that you come days ahead, and take serious notes and measurements. Both of my van companions were professional dealers and knew exactly what they were there for. Tonight we celebrate, for tomorrow we buy.

Drinks were served at bars that were going to be on the block that weekend, and food was laid out on tables with price tags still attached. (In between auctions, Red Baron's is a retail antique store.) There was a mind-boggling assortment of merchandise — over 2,000 lots — that Bob Brown, the owner, assured me would be sold by Sunday evening.

Red Baron's is a family business that started as a clothing boutique run by Bob's wife and mother. When it became obvious that customers were more interested in the antique furnishings than the clothes, the Browns switched focus. Today, 22 years later, they have over 24 employees, including their son Paul, and five buyers that scour the world for architectural antiques and oddities.

The attendance of 1,200 at this auction — one of several held each year — attests to Bob Brown's proficiency at mixing business with pleasure. As one bidder who's been attending for ten years put it, "Bob takes care of you." This care includes a bounty of free food and drink, tight security, a shipping company representative on premises, and a knowledgeable staff to answer questions about the condition of the merchandise.

As for the inventory itself, a restaurateur who attends regularly described Red Baron's as his "one-stop shop." Obscuring the ceiling was a dazzling array of lighting fixtures from every period. Tiffany stained glass windows were coming and going quicker than I could keep track. There were Wurlitzers and other juke boxes, coats of armor, British telephone booths, statuary and planters, as well as an endless parade of furniture: Credenzas, mantels, tables, chairs, armoires, and the aforementioned front and back bars. Here's the fate of two of the bars (see figures A and B.). One (Fig. A), a 16-foot Brunswick triple-arch back bar, with four Corinthian capped columns, dentil molding, egg-and-dart details, and carved ribbons went for \$16,500 to the Chatham Bar Inn, in Chatham, Mass. The other (Fig. B), a 27-foot mahogany back bar with a scrolled floral crest on top, egg-and-dart molding, two Ionic capped columns, and cut-glass lamp shades, was sold to a new Atlanta restaurant for \$13,200.



These prices for bars seem competitive with new construction, and in fact, it would be impossible to replicate them in this price range. However, there are additional auction expenses. The house charges a ten-percent buyers' fee, and shipping can run an additional five percent. A six-percent Georgia sales tax is added unless you have a resale number. An additional cost incurred might be customizing an existing bar to fit your space.

The admission fee for attending an auction at Red Baron's is \$100. This money is applied as cash toward purchases. Food and drink are included in the admission fee.

Even if you're outbid on every item and come home empty-handed, you'll no doubt find a Red Baron's auction richly informative and entertaining. A small number of people I met were there essentially to watch, having heard from friends that it was a great way to spend a weekend.


Who's In This Report

Initially, this special report was to focus on eating and drinking establishments. We expanded it to include hotels after seeing how much they overlap with the restaurant industry, as reflected in the responses to our survey. Our questionnaire was mailed to 351 companies chosen from our database of 6,100 that offer period or historically influenced products. The names of the companies we selected as most interesting to our readers can be found in the Index on pp. 62-64, which is divided into 25 headings. Some are specific to restaurants and pubs — bars, bar backs, bar rails — most others are applicable to the needs of hotels as well, such as suppliers of lighting, wallcoverings, millwork, metalwork, art glass, etc. Contact information and a brief description of a company's specialties follow on the *SourceList* on pp. 66-70, and a portfolio of photographs, pp. 72-80, wraps up this section.

I would like to extend my thanks to Tom Hinz of Wallace & Hinz and Jeff Watkins of Harbour House for their input on the bar-building trade, and to Red Baron's for their hospitality. Contact information for all three of these compa-



what you want to see, and at what rate."

Which means, he added, "everything has to hold," no matter where a guest wanders. Walt Disney himself imposed that demand on the company's earliest historical interpretation, the 1955 Main Street, U.S.A., at Disneyland in Anaheim (which, Hagelman points out, long predated mainstream interest in preserving Victoriana, and may even have opened a few eyes to Victoriana's charms). Along every park's vintage street replicas, the upper stories are never false fronts; typically, they're used as storage rooms for the vendors below. Window panes are glass, doorknobs are metal and reasonably hefty, light poles are metal and concrete "so people can thump on them and hear they're not fake," said Chesley. "We're real sensitive to that kind of thing. I've sometimes spent weeks tapping on surfaces that people are likely to touch, to make sure the sound is right."

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ARTFUL DODGING

But Disney is not, of course, a museum; the subtle variations on history are innumerable. "Our intent is to study the past, know the past, but not to recreate it verbatim," Hagelman said. Take, for example, some of the Art Deco strips built to evoke early Hollywood. Hagelman pulled out photos of real buildings and of Disney's versions. A swoopsided obelisk, a landmark sign on Los Angeles' Sunset Boulevard, lost all non-Disney lettering at the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park in Orlando in 1989 and gained a Mickey atop its spherical pinnacle. To reproduce Grauman's Chinese Theater on the same Orlando "block," Disney made measured drawings (a first for the tacky monument) and analyzed old photographs to determine

what features are now buried behind signage. They then replicated Grauman's cement plaster walls in less costly GFRP and the copper roof in plaster, complete with verdigris-colored paint. Other techniques for inducing a premature look of age include sandblasting, acid-washing, and distressing with chains; other cost-saving measures include aluminum windows in place of steel, and plaster ornament instead of terra cotta.

Climate and local culture also determine Disney's shifts away from literal replication. The goldand-aqua terra-cotta facade of a Wilshire Boulevard Deco department store gained pink Miami-esque highlights and extra chevrons when interpreted for Orlando. The colors of Main Street, U.S.A., at Euro Disneyland are particularly bright, based on Impressionist paintings and designed for France's sometimes overcast skies. A roof protects the Main Street Victoriana at Tokyo Disneyland from harsh weather.

LESSONS LEARNED

At many of the parks, Hagelman told me, the architectural scale of the vintage buildings is reduced. "That way, narrower streets don't seem like dark caverns with high walls. It's a subconscious thing: You feel good, but you probably couldn't explain exactly why." And with every new park and park renovation, Chesley added, the staff learns more about materials. "The Main Street at Euro Disneyland, from 1992, is the best of the best. There's a mix

of GFRP, plaster, metal, wood, and GFRC. The bricks, for instance, are cut plaster, and you might


see a column of fiberglass and steel with steel gingerbread. We've learned to use foam in places where weight is a problem and where we used to use GFRP. We've learned to use GFRC in places exposed to guests' feet, where in the past we might have used foam. We've renovated Anaheim's Main Street, adding more ornament, and we've had to restore or remove some plaster ornament in Florida because we've found it doesn't tolerate tropical heat very well."

But what *is* it about the results of all this meticulous planning and incessant upgrading that draws tourists by the zillions and drives academics into frenzies? The Disney parks are not just cute or corny; they're not that simple. If they were, they would be much easier for scholars to explain or dismiss (and for tourists to ignore).

"You don't want to overintellectualize Disney," Hagelman gently cautioned. "It's not meant to be an intellectual experience. You're meant to be entertained, to enjoy, to feel comfortable, to feel nostalgic or amazed. And how it works is indefinable, and it's not any one thing." Chesley, for his part, advised thinking of Disney as simply great at being Disney, a four-decades-old architectural category and standard all its own: "Disney is very, very good at adjusting reality to make it look like reality, to make the experience as authentic and powerful as possible," he said. "And Disney's architecture has the same goal as any architecture — even the finest. To make people feel good. To entertain. To be related to by human beings."

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
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As architecture becomes more and more intertwined with computer technology (its sophisticated perspective-drawing programs, as well as landscape and interiors software, etc.), it seems a natural next step to have research material also available on an electronic database. Kevin Matthews, director of the Design Integration Laboratory and an assistant professor in the School of Architecture and Allied Arts at the University of Oregon, has created *The Great Buildings Collection on CD-ROM*, an interactive multimedia encyclopedia of architecture for architects, designers, and students.

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Matthews feels he has filled a critical need. "Students were constant running to the library to get their hands on background information . . . The now have the contents of an entire library right on their desktops." M Matthews is already working on an expanded version — nearly 1,000 sites.

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
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
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
