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
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
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
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




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
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GROUNDED IN PRESERVATION

Hillier Architecture's 10-year-old historic preservation studio has restored a broad range of iconic buildings and adapted others to creative new uses.

fter climbing up several levels of scaffolding into the magnificent rotunda of the Virginia Capitol in Richmond, George Skarmeas, AIA, seems oblivious to the cacophony of construction noise far below. Designed by Thomas Jefferson in 1785, the landmark building is undergoing a restoration so complete that it is difficult to find a spot not covered in scaffolding or drop cloths. Workers fill every corner, cleaning, repairing, and replacing elements - pounding, sawing and shouting as they go. Up in the rotunda, however, with the ceiling close enough to touch, Skarmeas is lost in the exquisite detailing, noting how each painted flourish will be painstakingly reproduced.

Skarmeas may be more invested in the success of this restoration than anyone. As the founding principal of Hillier Architecture's 10-year-old historic preservation studio, Skarmeas has made it his personal mission to pursue the most challenging and complex restoration projects, usually involving the nation's most historically and architecturally significant structures. The Virginia Capitol is just one project in an impressive roster that includes the U.S. Supreme Court and the Lincoln Cottage in Washington, DC, the New Jersey State House Annex in Trenton, and the St. Louis Public Library. Other projects are an eclectic mix, ranging from one of the studio's earliest efforts—the restoration of the Undine Barge Club, a Frank Furness masterwork on Philadelphia's Boathouse Row—to one of its most recent, the development of a master plan for the Cincinnati Museum Center, an Art Deco building known for its 1930s murals.


Although Skarmeas extols the depth of his team's credentials and acknowledges his own exacting standards for restoration, he always defers to the guidance offered by the buildings and sites themselves. When presenting the firm's winning proposal for the Virginia Capitol restoration, for example, Skarmeas admitted that they could not yet prescribe a complete solution without spending far more time investigating the bones of the structure, its relationship to site topography, and its historic connection to the city. That deference to the building and its history won Hillier the job.

"It is Jefferson's capitol, not George's," Skarmeas says. "We were clear that we didn't have preconceived notions about the restoration. The building has evolved and stood the test of time, so I can't be so arro-


gant to say that we'll come up with the solution in two weeks. I would want Jefferson to approve of our work. The historic fabric, the evidence, the truth, the authenticity are timeless."

A Practice Emerges

In his native Greece, Skarmeas was exposed to thousands of years of building tradition, but like many young architects he was more interested in the future, and that primarily meant new design and construction. Only after Skarmeas traveled to the United States did his nascent ideas about historic preservation coalesce into a career. Skarmeas has master's degrees in architecture and city planning from Ohio State University and a Ph.D in architecture from the University of Pennsylvania. After a stint teaching architecture

at Ball State University, Skarmeas began working on large-scale historic buildings with the Vitetta Group. When Hillier came calling in 1996, Skarmeas had a finely honed sense of what a preservation practice should be.

"I was interested in the way people deal with environments, the process that enables you to understand the important dimensions and subtle things that people see or don't see in the built environment," Skarmeas says. "As a society, we don't often have long-term values; we tend to consider certain aspects of the built environment disposable."

Skarmeas views preservation as a pyramid, ranging from widespread adaptive reuse projects at the bottom to the most exacting, demanding conservation work, like that at the Virginia Capitol, at the top. "We want to avoid doing 'commodity work,' bottom-line-driven conversions," he says. "The higher you go on the pyramid the more challenging and complex it becomes, and your design freedom is limited. At the same time, there is not a single architectural expression. You can do a glass box or a Classical house if it is done correctly. But throwing on columns or a pediment is not necessarily the correct expression for any given building."

J. Robert Hillier, FAIA, who founded Hillier Architecture 40 years ago in Princeton, NJ, hails Skarmeas and his team for giving the firm a national presence in the preservation field. The 300-person firm has primary offices in Princeton, NJ, Philadelphia, and New York City and produces a widely diverse catalog of projects, from Modern, glass-sheathed office towers in

Shanghai to the sustainably designed American International School in Chennai, India. In addition to preservation, the firm's other practice specialties are architecture, interior architecture, urban design and planning and graphic design.

"We're not part of all the noise that's created by the celebration of certain architects," Hillier says. "We're no Frank Gehry because of the way we're structured. We're a service-oriented firm. But what we have done that is different from most service firms is we have established these centers of excellence, such as in preservation, graphics and urban design."


Each studio is allowed to operate with surprising autonomy, although collaboration between practices is easy and encouraged. Although Bob Hillier admits that some potential clients don't know quite what to make of the firm's diverse portfolio, he says that a commitment to top-shelf design and a collaborative, service-oriented approach unify the firm. "I could see that America was starved for a heritage," Hillier says. "More and more buildings were getting older and needed preservation, so I could see it was a growing market. If you take the right people and you give them an entrepreneurial opportunity, they can do wonderful things."

Serving Jefferson and Lincoln

A hundred years have passed since the last major changes occurred at the Virginia Capitol. Between 1904 and 1906, two compatibly designed wings and the steps on the south portico were added to Jefferson's main building. Over time, interior spaces were divided or walled up, decorative paintings

were covered, and mechanical systems deteriorated. Today, the capitol restoration includes both an exterior and interior renovation, including the restoration of the roof, elevators, and stairwells, the complete replacement of the heating and cooling systems, and the abatement of water leakage and moisture. Perhaps most significantly, the project entails the construction of a 27,000-sq.ft. extension beneath the south lawn, which will serve as the capitol's new visitor orientation center.

Because the capitol grounds will remain the greensward they have always been, preserving the traditional "temple on the hill" appearance of the main south entrance, visitors will be funneled into the capitol via an underground passageway. Although dwarfed in size and significance by the capitol, the visitor entrance draws on the Classical vocabulary, with columns and a dentilled cornice. Inside, however, the space will be streamlined and modern, though deferential in its way, as it leads visitors through a series of ascending rooms and exhibit halls until they complete the journey into the capitol itself.


"The conscience of the design is very minimal and contemporary, with elegant materials such limestone and granite, almost a Jeffersonian idea transferred to today," says Sonja Bijelic, AIA, an associate principal. "What excites us a lot is creating a new piece that is in concert with historic places. Every historic building has its own life and way that it is approached. So, always pulling the inspiration from the historical pieces is very important to us."

At the Lincoln Cottage in Washington, DC, the architecture is far more modest, but the historical significance is no less great. The Gothic Revival cottage was the summer retreat of President Lincoln and his family during the Civil War – as important to Lincoln as Camp David is to current presidents. The house was later used as a dormitory and an office building, with industrial green carpet, linoleum covering floors, pocket doors and other architectural features dismantled. After naming the cottage one the nation's most endangered places, the National Trust for Historic Preservation selected Hillier Architecture to prepare a master plan that would include the restoration of the deteriorated house and the creation of a new Lincoln research center.

The complex restoration, which involves removing later additions and restoring details, is made more so because of the dearth of historic documentation. Initial thoughts about the restoration were altered and updated as the team learned more about the building. "Initially, they thought they'd like to operate as a house museum, exhibiting borrowed collections or some of Lincoln's papers," says Richard Ortega, PE, AIA, Hillier's director of preservation technology and project manager for the Lincoln Cottage. "Unfortunately, to be able to borrow those things you have to provide an appropriate museum environment, which would have required a certain level of relative humidity and temperature controls in the building. We

basically came to the conclusion that that was a bad idea. The building is the major artifact in this case, and if we choose to turn it into a museum and impose those kinds of mechanical systems on it, you're going to ruin the building, for a variety of reasons."

Because photographs or descriptions of interior spaces haven't been uncovered, the designers created "period appropriate" rooms that do not necessarily display original furniture or artifacts. But using documentation where it existed, the team was able to restore the cottage's porch to its Civil War-era appearance and undertake a meticulous restoration of all the windows. "I have to give high credit to the National Trust for taking a realistic and conservative attitude and not sacrificing the building for exhibits or programmatic needs," Ortega says. "I think the building is an accurate representation of what it was in Lincoln's time. It's a journey of discovery in many ways."

A Future for the Past

Although Hillier's preservation studio continues to target what some might call "pure" preservation projects, as the nation's infrastructure ages, the firm is increasingly tasked with adapting historic buildings to new uses. Even at the Virginia Capitol, the new visitor extension is a statement more about modernity than antiquity. "What makes that project so interesting is that the capitol itself is done in period design, and there's a transitional zone that goes to the addition, which is very contemporary," says James Garrison, AIA, an associate principal who specializes in adaptive reuse. "It's got a nice mix of new and old."

Both Skarmeas and Garrison note that a vast array of renovation decisions, some more successful than others, can be applied under the forgiving banner of adaptive reuse. "My own approach is very thoroughly grounded in preservation and architectural history, projecting it forward, instead of backward, in terms of pure restoration and mimicry," says Garrison. "I want to use traditional design elements as they were really intended and not as a veneer, while keeping the essential qualities of the building. The whole reason you want to adapt a building is that it has certain qualities that are worth keeping."



One such structure is the Parc Rittenhouse, a 1927 hotel in one of Philadelphia's most historic neighborhoods. The 17-story structure, which was first built as the Penn Athletic Club, is replete with architectural features such as iron railings, arched windows and terra-cotta ornaments. The firm is now tasked with converting the building into condominiums above ground-level retail spaces, adding three new stories that will be set back from the original façade to distinguish old from new.

In Somerset County, NJ, the firm is now transforming an early 20th-century country estate once owned by a member of the Macy family (of department store fame) into a boutique hotel and spa for Sir Richard Branson. The main building will be restored to its original appearance wherever possible, with major additions taking their cues from the historic structure.

"It's a challenge to design the additions in a way that is compatible with the house and yet distinct, allowing the main portion of the house to be the visually dominant element," says Robert Hotes, AIA, a senior preservation architect with the firm. "While this house is certainly beautiful, and it is significant for its period, it's not a truly landmark structure. We're creating a

very interesting dialog between the old and the new. The new pieces will take the old pieces as a starting point and perhaps exaggerate them and play up this luxury aspect, which is part of its program and purpose. It's a more fun response to the historic context."


One of the firm's most intriguing adaptations involved the reuse of the Chester Waterside Power Station, a massive Industrial-Age structure in Chester, PA. Inside the 100-year-old Neoclassical building, the firm designed the sleek, utterly modern headquarters for Synygy, a software development company. At first glance, the cold, gray aluminum and glass boxes that organize the space appear incongruous with the building's warm, cream-colored stone and elegant columns. In a way, though, the fact that a building that once housed the technology of its time now houses the technology of ours is fitting.

"There are so many young companies that are intrigued by these old buildings," says Sonja Bijelic, who led the project. "The building then becomes almost a learning lesson for other young companies, showing the continuation of the ideas about technology over the centuries. The idea was to show technology and to respect the existing building."

Skarmeas gives high praise to the Synygy project, even if he might prefer to restore those buildings that remind him of the Greek temples of his youth. What he appreciates is the thoughtfulness and intelligence behind the Synygy design – and the fact that the interventions rest lightly on the historic structure and could be easily removed by future generations. "George and the rest of the studio are committed to historic preservation by the book – doing it the right way or not at all," Hotes says. "And that goes for the projects that fit into that premier landmark category as well as anything else."

"Every year more buildings will be deemed historically significant," Skarmeas adds. "From a social point of view, preservation is about more than architecture; it is an important activity that allows people to do the right thing." ◆



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ENERGY EFFICIENCY

More architects and designers are turning to geothermal heating and cooling systems for historic buildings, as well as for new construction.

eothermal systems are being used more often these days, as clients and architects discover the advantages. They use less energy than conventional HVAC systems, so they are friendly to the earth as well as to the pocketbook, providing energy savings over the years. At the same time, geothermal systems are often easier to install into historic buildings because they have less of an impact on the structure.

Notable restorations such as Trinity Church in Boston and a Motherhouse in Monroe, MI, have incorporated geothermal heating and cooling systems and are giving them good grades. Unity Temple in Oak Park, IL, is gearing up to start installation of its geothermal system. At the same time, new construction projects such as the K.C. Irving Environmental Science Centre at Acadia University in Nova Scotia, Canada, are installing geothermal from the beginning.

Geothermal systems rely on the earth's natural thermal energy, a renewable resource. At approximately six ft. below the earth's surface, the temperature of the ground and groundwater remains stable at approximately 55 deg. F. Heat pumps draw heat from the earth to provide heat in the winter; in the summer, they draw excess heat from the building and transfer it back to the earth.

There are two basic types of geothermal heat systems: closed-loop and open-

loop. The open-loop type uses groundwater from wells or surface water from lakes or ponds. The closed-loop type uses a plastic piping network installed either (1) vertically in drilled boreholes or (2) horizontally in trenches or excavations or (3) submerged in lakes or ponds. Vertical systems go deeper and are used on urban sites where land is limited. In horizontal systems, the pipes are closer to the surface (usually 4 to 6 ft.).

While the major advantage is significant energy and money savings over time, other advantages often cited include the fact that geothermal systems require considerably less equipment attached to the building, are quiet and require very little maintenance. The primary disadvantage is higher initial installation costs, but proponents are quick to point out that the energy savings over time more than compensates for this. Another problem is a lack of awareness among the population in general and in some cases, it's still hard to find an installer who's knowledgeable about geothermal.

Statistics from the Geo-Heat Center at The Oregon Institute of Technology, Klamath Falls, OR, show that sales of geothermal systems are growing 10% to 20% a year, according to Andrew Chiasson, research engineer. "About 40,000 units are sold each year," he says. "The technology started in the residential market, but it has slowed down there. Schools and office buildings, especially schools, are the fastest growing segments now. Geothermal has gotten very popular for historic buildings because there is no visible equipment. The pipes are buried underground and the heat pumps can be hidden in closets. There is no outdoor equipment, which means low maintenance and no noise."

He estimates savings in kilowatt hours can amount to 50% - 75% for heating and 30% for cooling. "The translation into dollars is a little different because heating uses fossil fuel," Chiasson says. "One of the barriers is finding contractors who can do the work. There are more people trained in it every year, but that is still a barrier. The cost of installation is usually higher because of the piping, but the payback is usually 5 to 10 years."

The Geothermal Heat Pump Consortium in Washington, DC, says there are more than one million installations in place in the U.S., saving 14 million barrels of crude oil a year. This website points out that the technology has been around for years, but recent improvements in materials and installations, efficiencies of compressors, pumps and other equipment have made it more appealing. This group estimates that sales are growing 20% a year and that geothermal lowers utility bills by 25% to 75%, while producing fewer greenhouse emissions. "It is especially good for historic buildings because

there is very little impact to the building," according to this web site. (www.geoexchange.org)


Recently renovated by Boston-based Goody Clancy & Associates, Boston's 1877 Trinity Church decided to use a very deep vertical system. Six holes were drilled 1,500 ft. into the bedrock., 45 to 75 ft. apart on the southern and western sides of the building. The system includes 13 heat pumps housed in an underground mechanical room and is designed to heat and cool the 14,000 sq.ft. renovated space below the sanctuary as well as the adjoining 15,000-sq.ft. parish house. The cost of installation was approximately \$800,000, plus \$400,000 for the pumps and piping.

"We used a standing-column well design," says Stefan Knust, AIA, Associate, Goody Clancy. "This type of system is used where you have sound bedrock, which serves as the container for the 1,500-ft.-high column of water. By inserting a narrower 'straw,' the water is drawn up from the bottom and moves through the heat-pumps within the building before returning to the top of the well. Overall, the water circulates along a 3,000-ft. path, moving slowly, gathering and delivering heat along the way. The quantity of wells was based on how much heating and cooling was needed, and the system's modular design allows for both demands to be met at the same time. The depth of the wells is almost twice the height of the nearby 793-ft. Hancock Building."

"We did look at other options, but this was the clear winner," Knust adds. "Geothermal systems are almost a no-brainer for historic buildings because they don't touch the building or introduce noise or vibrations. In this project, the estimated cost of putting in a conventional system was very high, comparable to the cost of installing the geothermal system. Plus it uses 40% less energy than a conventional system."

Trinity Church spokesperson Patricia Hurley says that the church is very pleased with the geothermal system. "It was a significant decision and we are particularly pleased with how invisible it is," she says. "We also felt very strongly that we wanted to work with the earth rather than using the resources of the earth. We have only been using it for a year, but our life-cycle analysis showed us it would pay off over time both ecologically and economically."

Another high profile restoration that made the decision to use a geothermal system is Frank Lloyd Wright's Unity Temple in Oak Park, IL. Designed in 1905 and opened in 1909, the Prairie-style building is undergoing a multimillion-dollar restoration that includes the addition of a geothermal system.


The new system is expected to cost \$2 to \$2.5 million, about 40% to 50% higher than installing a conven-

lion, about 40% to 50% higher than installing a conventional HVAC system, according to Keith Bringe, executive director of the Unity Temple Restoration Foundation. He expects for it to pay for itself in eight to nine years. "Our incremental payback might be much sooner than anticipated because of the rising cost of fossil fuels," he adds.


"This is a win-win situation," says Bringe. "The building will be both historic and green. We think this will be an important model for the state and for other historic buildings throughout the country." He added that Frank Lloyd Weight designed as a file of the first form.

that Frank Lloyd Wright designed one of the first forced-air electric system for the building, but it never worked. "Now we will be able to go back to that system and integrate parts of it into the new geothermal system."

Meanwhile in Monroe, MI, the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHM) incorporated a very large geothermal system when they



renovated their Motherhouse in 2003 because they wanted a system that was earth friendly. Built in 1932, the 376,000-sq.ft. building was converted into a retirement home for 240 sisters. It also serves as headquarters for the IHM congregation. Because of the harsh winters, they needed a system that provided an 80/20 heating-to-cooling ratio.

It took about eight months to install the Motherhouse's closed-loop system, which includes 232 boreholes, each 450-ft. deep, connected by 47 miles of pipe. There are also 466 fan coil units in the house, along with 10 miles of piping and 6 miles of ductwork, also in the Motherhouse building.

The initial installation of the outside portion of the project cost about \$1 million, says Danielle Conroyd, project director, Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. "We think the payback on the initial investment will be six to seven years. It has already significantly reduced our heating and cooling costs. We found that we reduced gas consumption 58% and water consumption by 49% (from the graywater system) in the first year, for a savings of \$187,000," she says. "A large portion of that was from the geothermal system."

The biggest challenge was drilling the holes, Conroyd explains. "The engineers estimated it would take nine to ten hours for each hole, but it actually took 18 hours. Initially we had four drill rigs on the property and about a million gallons of water was displaced every day. We created ponds to store the water and after the sediment had settled out, we pumped it into the local storm system.

"Sometimes the air pressure from the drilling would push the ground water into previously drilled holes and that would push the pipes right out of the ground. With all of these rigs working at the same time, there was a tremendous amount of air pressure going into the ground and water being displaced. Because of these problems, the installers decided to pull two of the rigs off the site and keep two going."

She also stresses that the boreholes are holes, not wells. "We were not tapping ground water to use for our system," say Conroyd. "It's an important distinction. We would have needed a permit for wells."

The system is a huge success, providing not only energy savings, but also comfortable heating and cooling. "Every sister has a thermostat in her room," says Conroyd. "It's a very quiet system. It's an alternative that is benign and is very comfortable. You don't have to sacrifice any comforts. The sisters love it." She also points out that the system is invisible. The

geofield in hidden under a parking lot and the front lawn and the manifold vault is set into the ground.

Ronald Staley, vice president of The Christman Company, the construction manager for the Motherhouse project, points out that geothermal systems must be incorporated into a project during the early planning stages. "From a construction planning and implementation standpoint, the logistics of

laying out the geothermal field must be considered early in the project planning and design," he says. "Water and slurry retention ponds, impact to historic trees and working around known or unknown underground utilities can have a significant impact on the cost and ability to install a suitable system within the project site."

Geothermal systems are also appearing in new construction. Completed in 2002, the 65,000-sq.ft. K.C. Irving Environmental Science Centre and Harriet Irving Botanical Gardens at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, Canada incorporates a geothermal system for cooling only. There is a steam generation plant that heats all of the buildings on campus.

This system takes advantage of a large, nearby aquifer. Water is drawn from the aquifer, pumped up a hill, sent through the heat exchangers and is then gravity-fed into a recharge well and slowly drained back into the aquifer. "The temperature difference between the supply water and the refill water is only a few degrees, which is very important," says Preston J. Gumberich, AIA, associate partner, Robert A.M. Stern Architects. "The initial motivation for this system came from our client, the Irving family. They are very interested in environmental issues and since this is an environmental science center, they wanted to incorporate the latest technology to create a more sustainable building."

"We are very happy with the system," states Peter Romkey, director of the science center and botanical gardens. "We are an environmental science center, so it made sense from the perspective of savings in electricity and from the perspective of conserving the earth's resources. We needed a robust cooling system for the research environments. The cost to cool the research facility alone using conventional system would have been significant, and you would have had condensers running outside of the buildings."

He adds that other buildings on campus are investigating geothermal technology for both heating and cooling and the community is watching to see how it affects the aquifer. Romkey also cites low maintenance as an advantage. "We think it will be 25 years before we have to replace or service the pump," says Romkey. "It's a very robust, reliable system for cooling." •

The Palladium

The Palladium is the cast-bronze trophy awarded each year to the winning firms in the Palladio

Awards design competition. The trophy is based on a motif that has been in continual use as an architectural enrichment for more than 2,500 years: the Greek anthemion. The anthemion, a highly stylized version of the Greek honeysuckle or palmette plant, has been used through the centuries to decorate everything from the Parthenon to contemporary Classically influenced furniture.

To create the trophy for the Palladio Awards program, the design studio at Historical Arts & Casting, Inc., West Jordan, UT, took the traditional anthemion form and adapted it to create a new ceremonial sculptural shape. The Palladium trophies were then cast from the model in architectural bronze using the traditional lostwax method.

In creating the Palladium, the artisans at Historical Arts & Casting, Inc. exemplified the basic goals of the Palladio Awards program: They've given us a dramatic example of how historic forms can be adapted and used to create beauty in the modern world.


esigned by Wilder & White of New York City and built between 1922 and 1928, the Washington State Legislative Building in Olympia, WA, has been described by Henry Russell Hitchcock as the "climax" of the American Renaissance of state capitol construction. It sits on a hilltop overlooking the southern tip of Puget Sound and the Olympic Mountains and is said to be the state capitol that is closest in design to the U.S. Capitol in Washington, DC.

One of the distinguishing features of this grand, four-story, 300,000-sq.ft. structure is its 287-ft.-tall central circular drum tower with a dome and cupola, the fourth tallest masonry dome in the world. "The first three are St. Peter's in Rome, St. Paul's in London and St. Isaac's in St. Petersburg, Russia," says Patricia McLain, project director, Washington Department of General Administration.

The brick-and-stone building is adorned with hand-carved friezes and is the centerpiece of a group of buildings that make up the capitol. Among the many outstanding features are the

six cast-bronze doors – each weighing five tons and each bearing a different scene from Washington's past – that open into a sumptuous interior. A large chandelier designed and built by Louis Comfort Tiffany hangs in the central rotunda and polished marble and decorative plaster are found throughout the building.

Time had taken a toll on the building and by 1999 it had fallen into a state of disrepair. The state was planning a 5½-year restoration of the building, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, when the 6.8-magnitude Nisqually earthquake hit the area on February 28, 2001. (M.A. Mortenson actually signed documents naming them contractor/construction manager on that morning.)







The earthquake caused considerable damage, making the building unsafe. Plaster delaminated, lights fell and the 33-million-lb. dome was actually lifted and rotated, leaving its unsupported stone columns out of plumb by up to six inches. Forced to evacuate, lawmakers decided to accelerate a complete restoration along with seismic upgrades and earthquake repairs. They also asked for the work to be done in a shorter timeframe – $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. The complete restoration included the scope of the work prior to the earthquake plus earthquake repair.

The \$120-million restoration, led by SRG Partnership of Seattle, WA, and Einhorn Yaffee Prescott, Architecture & Engineering, PC, (EYP) of Albany, NY, included \$16 million in earthquake repairs and has put the building

back in order, restored its historical integrity and added new modern systems. "The combination of earthquake repairs with the restoration and renovation added to the complexity of the project," McLain notes. "It was both an opportunity and a challenge to bring the building up to 21st-century standards, add access for people with disabilities and achieve sustainability goals while maintaining the sensitivity to the historic fabric of the building. EYP was able to incorporate energy conservation and sustainability principles and integrate accessibility. When it was finished, all of the historic elements were preserved, yet all of the modern amenities are included."

"The Legislative Building is a truly unique building in Washington," says Ralph Belton, AIA, principal in charge, SRG Partnership. "A 75-year-old building is very old by Washington standards. The basic challenge was to introduce up-to-date seismic, mechanical, electrical, plumbing, fire sprinkler and communication/data systems into a building that was built in a time when air conditioning didn't exist and when office equipment was a manual typewriter and 40 phones.

"All of this needed to be done without affecting the historic fabric of the building. The careful insertion of new systems into the building is the opposite


of how we build new buildings, so it was a challenge to the builders. We also required trade skills for plaster, painting and stonework that aren't widely available. The design of this project required a much more collaborative process that included the builders from the beginning." Throughout the project, the ornate marble, bronze and oak finishes were protected and workmen were educated before they were allowed into the building.

"One of the biggest challenges was getting all of those systems into the building," agrees Mark Thaler, AIA, principal in charge, EYP. "Fortunately, the columns around the building actually provided a shading factor that cut down on the needs of the cooling system. Also, there were some existing pathways that we could utilize." An interesting feature of the building is that the original design took ventilation into consideration. In fact, the original mechanical systems were "intricately interwoven into the structure," according to an article in the November, 2004, issue of *Columbia Magazine*, A Legislative Building Commemorative Issue, by Christopher Tavener of Einhorn Yaffee Prescott. EYP was able to take advantage of the original systems when incorporating modern mechanicals.

In addition, more than 12 miles of new hydronic piping and four miles of new heating ducts were installed behind walls and in ceilings. Ten miles of new plumbing piping were tucked behind the walls. Concrete floors were opened so that more than 1,000 miles of new wiring for computers, phones and wireless technology could be installed.

Late in the project, it was discovered that some of these ducts were wrapped in asbestos. Mortenson solved this problem by lining the ducts with epoxy, rather than removing the asbestos. Removal would have cost an estimated \$2.4 million and would have delayed the project by four months. At the same time, embedded roof and balcony drains and piping could not be removed and replaced without causing significant damage to the historic sandstone façade, so they were also lined with epoxy to restore them.

In one example of using space wisely, EYP inserted conduits in the clay tiles in the ceiling instead of lowering the ceiling. "The clay tiles were hollowed out so the space could be used for pathways for new fire protection systems and electrical conduit," says McLain. "This meant that the ceilings didn't have to be lowered to make room for the conduits. EYP found many ways to fit the new systems into the existing structure of the building. They were able to tuck new work into the building so you can't see it. It's seamless."

Stabilizing the 16 exterior columns at the base of the dome that had shifted during the earthquake was the first phase of the project. Because it was impossible to put them back into position, the architects and engineers devised a solution that involved drilling 60 ft. through the gutter of the dome, the center of each column and the base of the dome to anchor the columns. Hollow, reinforcing steel was inserted into these holes and more than one million pounds of concrete were pumped in to tie the dome, columns and base together.

In addition, fiber wrap was placed behind ornamental marble paneled walls to keep them from delaminating and any damaged stonework, masonry or plaster finishes were either replaced or repaired. The building is now reinforced to withstand an earthquake with a magnitude of up to 8.2.

"We all collaborated on how to strengthen the building," says Belton. "Mike Wright, the engineer with Swenson Say Faget [Seattle, WA] modeled the building on the computer, using finite element analysis, and he told us the columns needed to be pinned in place. So we brainstormed and came up with the idea of drilling the columns and adding cement and then we found someone who had experience with that kind of drilling." During the drilling, the architects and engineers noticed that water and brick dust was pouring out of the holes. To solve this problem, grout was poured into the holes whenever they reached a joint. This sealed the leak and they were able to drill through the grout. "It was interesting," he adds. "Many people worked together to make this work."

The building also needed an egress route that met code requirements. Instead of adding new stairways, EYP improved and protected the existing egress system by enclosing the north rotunda stairs in a fire-resistant glass and bronze wall. This solution maintains the visual openness of the stairway while also providing safe exit in case of a fire. "After we had a timed-egress study done by Rolf Jensen & Associates of Chicago, we took two stairwells that were unenclosed and provided glass enclosures," says Thaler. "They are fire-rated glass in bronze-finished steel structures. This kept the openness of the stairs and created a fire-rated egress that would bring people all the way through the building."

Securing the five-ton "Angels of Mercy" Tiffany chandelier posed another problem. Originally the engineer recommended steel cable to reinforce the 101-ft.-long chain holding the chandelier 25 ft. above the rotunda. However, they realized that a typical steel safety cable wasn't pliable enough to be woven into the original chain. The engineer, Mike Wright, an avid sailor and ship builder, recommended kevlar rope, the same material used in sailboat rigging, and this proved to be both strong enough and flexible enough to hold the chandelier without being obtrusive. In fact, it worked so well that kevlar rope was used to secure all of the major chandeliers in the building.

A number of specialty contractors were brought in to work on the project, including Master Millwork of Puyullup, WA; Architectural Grille of Brooklyn, NY, and Architectural Reproductions of Seattle, WA. Pioneer Masonry Restoration of Seattle, WA, repaired the exterior stone; Western Tile and Marble, Bellevue, WA, repaired the interior stone work, and D. L. Henricksen, Tacoma, WA, repaired the extensive plaster damage. The decorative painting was restored by EverGreene Painting Studios, Oak Park, IL.

This project became the first state building in the country to apply LEED standards to the preservation of a state capitol. The design team documented the challenges of applying LEED standards to historic preservation and met with the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) in Washington, DC, to

encourage the development of specific standards for historic preservation. The primary focus of these efforts included reusing the existing building, improved energy efficiency and recycling building materials. For example, Alaska Tokeen marble salvaged from the renovation of Smith Tower in Seattle, WA, (once the tallest building west of the Mississippi) was used to replace marble damaged by the earthquake in the legislative building. In addition, 85% of the construction waste, more than 8,000 tons of demolished material, including wood, concrete, paper, bricks, dirt, metal and drywall, were recycled. "Typically, 25% is recycled or reused," says McLain. "In other instances, EYP and Western harvested marble from one room and used it in another."

Another energy-conservation facet of the project was the addition of energy-efficient lighting, compact fluorescent lamps that last eight to ten times longer than conventional light bulbs. In addition, photovoltaic cells were incorporated into the rooftop. They generate enough electricity to light the dome at night. "This is the largest array of photovoltaic cells on any state capitol in the country," Thaler notes. "It was installed so it is only visible from the air."

"It's even larger than the array of photovoltaic cells on the White House," McLain adds, "and it's totally integrated into the building facade. We wanted to show people that it is possible to use solar energy on an historic building, to be a model for others."


One change in the floor plan was opening up some of the areas on the first floor. "This transformed what people called the basement into a lighter, more open space and provided much-needed public gathering space," says Belton, "including an area for visiting school children."

Essentially, the building was taken apart, and infrastructure, safety and security issues were resolved. Then as it was put back together, historic materials were restored or repaired. "Everyone felt indebted to the original architects," says McLain. "They left us a magnificent building and they set high standards of craftsmanship. All of the workers were inspired by their work and rose to the occasion."


"The building has a vintage look with high-tech equipment just below the surface," Belton adds. The restored landmark reopened to the public in December of 2004 and is once again a source of pride for the citizens of the state. – Martha McDonald

Now the Bells Toll

he Sacred Heart Church in Dallas, TX, now the Cathedral Santuario de Guadalupe, was designed in the 1880s by noted Galveston, TX, architect Nicholas J. Clayton with tall towers on the south façade. It was completed in 1902, but the spires were not built at that time, presumably for financial reasons. The bases were there, but they were capped with simple wood-framed hipped roofs.

A later, simpler design by Clayton incorporated one tall tower and a shorter one, and a still later third design in 1907 featured a Beaux-Arts tower with a clock. Now, after more than 100 years, the church has finally completed the towers, the tallest housing a 49-bell carillon and clavier, thanks to a \$4.7-million project and the design efforts of Architexas of Dallas, TX.

"The new design is an adaptation of Clayton's second version," says Jay Firsching, preservation specialist at Architexas. "We felt like the middle design most closely matched the style of the building as it was intended to be constructed," he explains. "These are also the more detailed and developed of Clayton's drawings, so they were interpreted and adapted in designing the new towers."

This project presented a number of design and engineering challenges. First, the towers had to be compatible with and enhance the original historic building. Secondly, the taller of the two had to support the new quite-heavy carillon requested by the diocese. The new spire adds 135 ft. to the original base to reach a height of 219 ft. from the ground floor (224 ft. from grade) and supports the 49-bell carillon system weighing 49,000 lbs. and a clavier (keyboard) to play the bells. Manufactured in the Nether-




lands, this particular carillon includes 45 static bells, the largest weighing 2,200 lbs., and four swinging bells, the largest weighing 9,400 lbs. It was quite a challenge to hoist these bells into place, with the largest and highest bells located 146 ft. above street level.

"We had to interpret the original ¹/s-in. scale drawings based on the existing detailing of the cathedral," says Gary Skotnicki, Architexas' principal in charge, and the person charged with adapting the historic design. "The original structure is load-bearing solid masonry with interior timber framing. We had to determine the best way to detail and construct the new tower addition to fit within Clayton's intentions while meeting today's building codes."

To accommodate the massive weight of the bells as well as the new 224-ft. west tower itself without adding stress to the original 106-year old building, Architexas and the engineers determined that the structure would have to be supported from the ground up. "The base of the tower is about 20-ft. square, with 28-in.-thick load-bearing masonry walls on a corbelled masonry foundation extending 4 ft. below grade," Skotnicki explains. "The design team decided that


the new tower extension should stand independently from the existing masonry base, but appear to be part of the existing structure, as if the building had been originally completed all the way up to the spire and cross."

These goals were accomplished by excavating a 35-ft. square around and inside the existing structure to the bottom of the footings. Four piers, each 18 in. in diameter, were then drilled to a depth of 56 ft., protruding 8 ft. into the underlying limestone substrata. Two 24x54-ft. slots were cut through the corbelled footings and each face of the tower base. Reinforcing steel cages made up of #11 rebar were placed around and through the existing masonry footings. Seven thousand pounds of concrete were then poured, integrating



the old and new foundations. The resulting pad contains 90,000 lbs. of steel and was designed to carry four 14-in. square columns to support the new tower extension above.

Once the foundation was in place, the steel inner frame was inserted into the tower, which had been gutted. The roof was removed and prefabricated steel structural sections were hoisted, one at a time, over the top of the existing masonry walls and lowered carefully down into the tower. There was only ½-in. clearance from the existing walls.


The fourth of these sections brought the structural frame above the existing masonry and the fifth section formed the 36-ft.-tall bell chamber. The final prefabricated steel section was erected and welded on the plaza and hoisted as one assembly to form the dormer level. The last piece was the aluminum-framed, copper-roofed steeple. It was constructed offsite by Campbellsville Industries of Campbellsville, KY, shipped to the site and lifted into place.

"Most of this work was done at night because we weren't allowed to close any of the major streets during the day," says Richard Martratt, project architect, Architexas, "and we had to use large cranes to lift the sections into place. After each section was lifted into place in the tower, we would work on it for a few weeks. It took quite a while to weld those sections in place and to get ready for the next ones. Plus you had the interior elements - several bell levels and various support brackets and also the stair itself - that had to be welded in place."

Hoisting the bells into place was another challenge. The contractor, Andres Construction Services, Dallas, TX, used a combination of systems. A hydraulic platform scaffold system capable of supporting 16,000 lbs. with a climbing speed of 100 ft. every 50 min. did part of the heavy lifting. The platform scaffold was also equipped with a material hoist with a lifting capacity of 2,500 lbs.


and a travel distance of 80 ft. A cantilevered trolley beam and pneumatic trolley hoist with a lifting capacity of 10,000 lbs. was installed above the upper bell chamber. These systems were used together to carefully lift the bells into place in the two bell chambers.

"Hoisting the bells was difficult because we had to snake them through the steel structure," says Martratt. "Lifting a nine-ton bell and snaking it through the structure is quite a feat. We built some lifts on the outside of the tower that were used to transport them to a certain height, then we used a system of levers and pulleys to get the bells into exact position." This work could be done during the day because it didn't require cranes and the streets didn't have to be closed. Those same platforms were used when cladding the building and doing other exterior construction.

At one point, Martratt points out, the vibration of the bells was a big issue. "When we got the bells installed and began to ring them for the first time, the whole frame began to sway," he says. "We were getting about ¾-in. vibration. We got the engineers involved again to take another look at it. We figured out that the frequency of the vibration was the same as the steel frame, so it excited the steel frame, causing it to move when the bells rang."

The problem solved itself when the building was loaded with masonry. The primary materials used to clad the new section of the spire were red hard-fired brick, cast stone and copper. These were selected to blend with the historic structure, according to Skotnicki, "to fit seamlessly into the historic building. It was a bit of a challenge to match the original brick, but we came close."

The shorter tower was a simpler project. It also had a hipped roof, which was removed and replaced with a copper-roofed steeple from Campbellsville Industries. This added almost 41 ft. to the tower, bringing the height to 102 ft. "We did some exterior repair work, but we didn't have to do the foundation work because the tower was not increased in size," Firsching notes.


Construction started in June of 2005 and was completed in November of 2005 without disrupting the normal services and operations of the cathedral. The new spire more than doubles the height of the building and it finally fulfills the goals of the original design of the cathedral. In addition, it allowed the church to add the massive carillon, fulfilling the diocese's goal of bringing a level

of prominence to the cathedral. Skotnicki points out that this is the largest carillon (by one bell) in Dallas and the second largest in Texas, second only to the one at the University of Texas in Austin.

The Cathedral Guadalupe serves one of the largest cathedral congregations in the United States, with an average Sunday mass of almost 10,000 parishioners. The new towers are just one phase of a comprehensive set of improvements being undertaken for the cathedral and its surrounding buildings and plazas. "We began working with the diocese in 1995," says Skotnicki, "when Architexas completed a master plan prioritizing the work into manageable phases that minimize the impact of construction on daily services."

Previous work included the integration of new mechanical systems into the building, redesign of the altar and exterior restoration of the building's two primary entry bays. Future phases will focus on the plazas, restoration of the sanctuary, and completion of the exterior restoration.

"This is the most dramatic of the work so far," Skotnicki says. "Nicholas J. Clayton would have been very happy with the new addition. His grandson and great grandson participated in the groundbreaking and the dedication. Everyone is happy with it." – Martha McDonald

Gateway to the Past


hen Rollins College sought to transform the nondescript main entrance of its Winter Park, FL, campus into a more formal public face for the school, it turned to Coral Gables, FL-based Chael, Cooper & Associates. The resulting McKean Gateway and Rinker Building both reflect the college's predominant Spanish-Mediterranean architecture and realize its long-standing desire for a formal entrance to its campus.

Rollins was founded in 1885, making it Florida's oldest recognized college. Located a few miles north of Orlando on the shores of Lake Virginia, its 70-acre campus is lined with oak trees and characterized by stucco and Spanish tile-roofed buildings inspired by the work of renowned Florida architect Addison Mizner. Notable additions over the years have included Ralph Adams Cram's Knowles Chapel (1932), James Gamble Rogers' Olin Library (1986) and the Cornell Campus Center (1999), which was designed by Boston, MA-based Shepley, Bulfinch, Richardson & Abbott. For years, the college's de facto main entrance – where the campus meets Winter Park's main north-south thoroughfare, Park Avenue – had been identified by nothing more than a low marker that college Vice President and Treasurer George Herbst describes as "resembling a tombstone."

So, in 2002, in conjunction with a city-wide beautification program that included the enhancement of Park Avenue – which was being orchestrated by the town-planning firm with which Chael, Cooper & Associates is affiliated, Dover, Kohl & Partners – Rollins set out to turn its inconspicuous front door into a grand entryway.

"The college, throughout all its years, has never had a formal entrance," says Herbst. "So this project was the result of our desire to have an appropriate point of arrival at the college. We considered numerous options. Years and years ago there was some thought that it should arch over the roadway, but that just seemed inappropriate. Then the question becomes, 'What do you do on either side?'"

In order to come up with a satisfactory answer to that question, Chael, Cooper & Associates presented the college with multiple design concepts, including obelisks, trellised pavilions and a three-story building with a corner tower. "Our approach was to give them several alternatives," says Maricé Chael, AIA, principal in charge. "It began with two small obelisks


and ranged to the more ambitious, which was a substantial building on the corner. What actually came out in the end was a hybrid of those two ideas."


After reviewing the architect's proposals, Rollins opted for a pair of triumphal arches and an adjacent building to house administrative offices. In order to ensure public consensus for the design, the college went so far as to commission a full-size model of one of the arches. "That was quite fascinating for people – that a college would actually construct in advance, out of wood, what it was going to build," says Herbst. "A few things came from that – we set it at a slightly different location and we increased the size a bit, because it was difficult for two people to walk through the arch."


"From looking at drawings alone, a lot of people thought it was too big," says Chael. "What we wanted was a scale that wasn't overpowering but still terminated the axis to Park Avenue – yet intimate enough so that two people could walk side by side and not feel overwhelmed. The initial model made it clear that even though everyone thought it was overly monumental, it actually had to be slightly bigger in order to feel right – taking into consideration the scale of the avenue and the pedestrian scale."

In conceiving the arches, the design team looked both to the Rollins campus and to campuses beyond Winter Park. "We took it out of the architectural context of the campus – the use of finials, the use of scrolls," says Herbst. "But we also looked at a number of other college campuses – one similar to this, although it's made out of a totally different stone, is on the campus of the Indiana University."


Like Indiana University's Sample Gates, the McKean Gateway is composed of two asymmetrical triumphal arches topped with finials highlighting the center axis. The McKean Gateway finials are also abutted by scrolls that, moving away from the finials, are extracted to a single line. The color and dimensions of the marble were meant to be in


keeping with the stone of Knowles Chapel. Stonework was provided by Barbara Tattersfield Design, of Winter Park. Each arch is adorned with two light fixtures from Ball & Ball Lighting, of Exton, PA.

The arches were completed in the first phase of construction. The second phase turned the focus to the Rinker Building, which would rise on a site adjacent to the McKean Gateway that had previously been occupied by an automobile repair shop. The biggest challenge in its design was a limited timeframe; the program and design had to be produced within a fourmonth period. "Marshall and Vera Lea Rinker made a quick completion date imperative for giving the college the funding," says Chael. "In order to do the quick turnaround, I did a lot of the detailing myself and incorporated the hand drawings into the more technical CAD drawings. Based on my hand drawings, I worked together with Castlestone [Orlando, FL], which produced 3-D drawings as their shop drawings. It was done in a very compressed period of time."

Today, the 10,000-sq.ft. Rinker Building houses the school's admission and financial aid offices. Laid out in an L-shaped plan, it features stucco walls, a Spanish-tile roof and Romanesque arched windows. The building's decorative cast-stone elements were fabricated by Castlestone. Along with the arches, the Rinker Building acts as the gateway to the college – where prospective students get their first impressions of the college. So far, thanks to Chael, Cooper & Associates, those impressions have been decidedly positive. – Will Holloway



round at a downtown Atlanta, GA, brownfield is slated to be broken this summer for the nation's largest Classical monument since Jefferson's domed colonnade opened on the Washington Mall in 1943. At the Atlanta ensemble, called the Millennium Gate, two bronze Greek goddesses already rest on pylons. Between them will soon rise a limestone arch and four allegorical bronze figures with iconography summarizing the past 2,000 years of human aspiration and peaceable achievement.

Bringing forth this rare Classical landmark has required years of negotiation and collaboration among architects, engineers, landscape architects, developers, donors, city officials and the Scottish sculptor Alexander Stoddart. Orchestrating the players is Classical designer and philanthropist Rodney Mims Cook, Jr.



The pylons flank a 150-ft.-wide avenue and help ennoble a 138-acre brownfield development that has replaced a shuttered steel mill. At the feet of the Greek goddess of Justice, Dike (DEE-kay), stands Harpocrates, the shushing god of restraint of judgment. 

As the founder and president of an Atlanta nonprofit called the National Monuments Foundation (NMF), Cook has been shepherding the project for seven years. Originally conceived for a barren traffic island in Washington, DC, the gate's plan has been gracefully adapted to its Atlanta berth, largely because of Cook's watchful eye and impassioned commitment. "He has tremendous reserves of compassion and kindness, and he never gets discouraged, he keeps going great guns," Stoddart says. "Rodney is in fact officially a miracle."

Cook has deep Atlanta roots. Among his Confederate and Union-sympathizing ancestors are two Atlanta mayors, both design patrons. In the 1850s, Mayor John Mims commissioned Atlanta's first citywide map, and in the early 1900s, Mayor Livingston Mims funded major park expansions including an Olmsted Brothers' scheme. Cook's bloodlines and in-laws also include clients of Atlanta's renowned Classical architect Philip Trammell Shutze. As a teenager in the 1970s, Cook led preservation picketers who saved the city's Fox Theatre, a 1920s Moorish fantasy then slated for demolition. Cook was a founding trustee of the Prince of Wales's Foundation for Architecture, which helped organize a competition for a monument commemorating Atlanta's hosting of the 1996 Olympics. On an Atlanta traffic circle stands the competition winner: bronze atlases and limestone columns, designed by Russian-born architect Anton Glikin.

Locals determinedly cross busy lanes to reach the sculpture. "People leave bouquets, flags, and candles there whenever there's a world tragedy to mourn," Cook says. "The monument speaks to their souls." Atlanta can use more such meditative gathering places, he adds, partly because so few were built there in the late 19th and early 20th centuries: "Citizens here were still recovering from the Civil War and rebuilding their homes, while the rest of the country was benefiting so greatly from the Beaux-Arts City Beautiful movement."

Atlanta's Millennium Gate arose out of a now-stalled endeavor to ennoble Washington, DC's Commodore Barney Circle, a snarl of traffic islands and highway ramps. In 2000, Cook organized an international monument competition, open to architecture students and recent architecture school graduates and sponsored by the University of Notre Dame. The jurors were Léon Krier, Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk, Robert A.M. Stern, Carroll William Westfall, and Michael Dennis. Daniel G. Parolek (of Opticos Design,



Berkeley, CA) won first place among ten winners. The other nine were Lisa Schmitt Bergman, Marianne Cusato (who recently designed a prototype cottage for Hurricane Katrina recovery zones), Olympics monument designer Anton Glikin, Shelley Hoenle, Luis Pedro Vásquez Lobos, Abdul Muzikir, Silvia Neri, Milan Petkovic and Joseph Matthew Smith. They participated in a charrette (except for Vásquez Lobos, a Guatemalan who was tragically killed in a car accident), and their collaboration led to a four-sided arch that politicians praised, muddled over and then shelved.

Cook promised the city that his group would raise the entire \$50-million construction budget, but still couldn't convince bureaucrats to move forward. He found far more receptive audiences in Atlanta's private sector, notably Jacoby Development. The company has cleaned up 138 downtown acres, the former home of Atlantic Steel, to make way for \$2 billion worth of offices, residences, stores and hotels. A walkway elevated across a 21-lane interstate connects the property, called Atlantic Station, to the rest of the city. A few industrial relics have been preserved onsite, including a sooty smokestack. Cook persuaded Jacoby to reserve an acre for a Classical monument that would set a sophisticated tone for the development, while eye-catchingly terminating an avenue vista and providing an irresistible gathering spot.

The parkland, along a 150-ft.-wide thoroughfare, cost Jacoby some \$1.25 million to give away. The NMF is raising its own \$18 million to build the Gate. (On the foundation board serve such luminaries as Colin Amery, Richard H. Driehaus, Susan Eisenhower, Anne Randolph Hearst, Priscilla Roosevelt, Thomas Gordon Smith, and Tom Wolfe.) Cook brought in Hugh Petter, a director at Robert Adam Architects, to adapt the Barney Circle design into a 70-ft.-tall arch flanked by 24-ft.-tall pylons. Petter was one of three scholars at the Prince of Wales's Institute who'd helped Cook organize the Olympics-monument competition, along with Dr. Richard John and Victor Deupi (now the Arthur Ross Director of Education at the Institute of Classical Architecture & Classical America).

The arch's many precedents, Petter explains, include London's Wellington, New York's Washington, Paris's Carrousel near the Louvre, Munich's Siegestor and Rome's Titus. Petter, along with local architect Sandy Cooper of Collins Cooper Carusi, chose Indiana limestone for the cladding. "At Bybee Stone," Cooper recalls, "we looked at buff and variegated samples, and the variegated stood out because of the striations and the sense of depth." The pylons and arch will have concrete substructures, yet not look veneered. "We'll use huge blocks," Petter says, "so it will appear massive, enduring and timeless."

Stoddart's sculptures will mark the past two millennia of time's passage. On the pylons already stand figures of the Greek goddesses of Peace, Eirene (pronounced eye-REEN-ee), and Justice, Dike (DEE-kay). Each weighs 1.5 tons and was cast in 360 moulds. Eirene sits behind Ploutos, the god of wealth and bountiful harvests, and at Dike's feet stands Harpocrates, the shushing god of restraint of judgment. Dike wears an Egyptian headdress and holds a sistrum, a sacred rattle used by priestesses devoted to Isis, the first goddess said to represent justice.

The Morris Singer foundry in Hampshire, England, shipped the eight-ft.tall ladies to Savannah last fall. From there, Melanie Faser, the project coordinator for the NMF, arranged for a Percheron-drawn caisson to carry them to Atlanta. Brass bands and bagpipers led the way. Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue (a Republican) and Congressmen Jim Marshall (a Democrat) and Jack Kingston (a Republican) were among the notables driving the caisson.

Stoddart is now sketching the first of four female figures for the arch base. Each will represent 500 years: the Hellenistic period, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance and modern times. They will stand 14½ ft. tall, just shy of the roof beam in Stoddart's studio in Paisley, Scotland. The Hellenistic woman will carry a broken column, "signifying the moment when Classical culture came to a rich and virtuosic maturity," the sculptor explains. Around her will also be arrayed a model of Alexandria's Pharos (referring to the empire's extensive trade, and serving as a sign of hope) and two scrolls symbolizing the era's destroyed libraries and lost knowledge. Stoddart has not yet finalized the other three designs, but he expects to evoke everything from the first charitable hospitals and first declarations of universal enfranchisement to the ambitions of space exploration.

The Morris Singer foundry in Hampshire, England, shipped the bronzes to Savannah, GA, where they were loaded onto the caisson for the road trip to Atlanta.

The backdrop of Atlanta high rises somehow suits Stoddart's bronzes. "We found the statues' scale is even more impressive than we expected," Petter says. "They really hold their own in the context. And the arch will be as tall as the smokestack." Stoddart adds that Eirene and Dike "look glorious in that Atlanta sun, especially in the morning. Sculpture wants a strong, high-up, raking light."

A park will be planted at the ladies' feet, designed by landscape architect Spencer Tunnell, of the Atlanta firm Tunnell & Tunnell. An elliptical lawn will be framed by what Tunnell calls "a pierced retaining wall with pilasters and blind arches forming an architectural container, and completely festooned in climbing roses. We're also planting crabapple and cherry trees, to create the same lushness and abundance you see in gardens in Rome, which has a similar climate to Atlanta's." The groves will eventually serve as waiting areas for visitors entering the arch.

Galleries inside will cover Atlanta history, and conference rooms and the roof terrace will be rentable for events. Cook has commissioned a series of period rooms as well, either copied from landmarks or fashioned from architectural salvage. Gate-goers will be able to stroll through a forest of Corinthian columns that held up an 1810s stairwell in Savannah, a 1920s Italian Baroque living room designed by Shutze for the family of Mrs. James D. Robinson, Jr. (Cook's grandmother-in-law), and a 1930s paneled office used by Atlantic Steel industrialist Thomas K. Glenn.

The arch is scheduled to open in the fall of 2007 with the names of all contributors etched into its flanks, including the Barney Circle competition

finalists. Cook is already planning his next Atlanta project. He won't reveal the site, just the program: "a monumental column on the scale of Nelson's or Trajan's, to commemorate Georgia's founder, James Oglethorpe." Cook is also researching potential parade routes for Stoddart's arch figures, which will arrive annually over the next few years. Eirene and Dike, Cook says, "look absolutely majestic, even better than we'd imagined. They're exactly what's been sorely needed in Atlanta, and they look perfectly appropriate. Even in this Modernist-inclined city, people are telling us they're thrilled to have something this magnificent built, finally." – Eve M. Kahn




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
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
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
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


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
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
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


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
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AHEAD OF THE CURVE

A Brooklyn-based glass studio produces traditional bent glass for both restoration projects and new light fixtures.

orking with the medium of glass has been a guiding passion throughout Charles Flickinger's career. At first, his attraction to this indispensable material led him to the field of stained glass, and during his early years in New York City Flickinger worked as a stained-glass craftsman, restorer and designer for various glass studios, including the prestigious Rambusch Decorating Company. It was while working at Rambusch during the mid 1980s that he had his first serious involvement with bent glass. The project was no less a feat than the restoration of the torch held aloft by the Statue of Liberty. "We spent three to four months out there," Flickinger recalls, "taking the work boat out to Liberty Island and working on the bent-glass sections that were in the original flame. It was a very satisfying job."

The satisfaction of that job also marked a bend in the road of his professional life, leading him to the art of bent glass. Beyond the techniques and beauties of the medium itself, Flickinger was attracted to the greater independence offered by this less-practiced discipline: "I wanted to work for myself. I didn't want to compete against quite a number of stained-glass firms that were in Manhattan, but I still wanted to pursue some kind of specialtyglass work. So by happenstance and other ways, I met four oldtimers who taught me the trade, and I spent many years working for them and with them, learning how to do glass bending. They're my Glass Benders Hall of Fame [a feature of the company's website: www.flickingerglassworks.com]." This apprenticeship with such expert bent-glass craftsmen as Sydney Cash, Hans Deutsch, Maurice Heaton, and John P. Morgan led to the inception of Flickinger Glassworks in 1985. However, the demand for the firm's unique product soon outstripped its modest loft facility in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, and in 1990 an expanded Flickinger Glassworks relocated to its current home, a 7,000-sq.ft. shop in Brooklyn's Red Hook neighborhood, overlooking New York Harbor.


The only all-around glass-bending facility in greater New York, Flickinger Glassworks is today internationally recognized as a leader in the design, creation and restoration of bent glass. The firm specializes in a variety of applications, from architectural curved glass to bent glass for the display cases of museums, libraries and retail stores; providing bent glass for lighting fixtures, however, has become one of Flickinger's most valued services. Considering the likelihood of damage to this fragile material over the decades, the restoration and replication of antique bent glass has been a constant for Flickinger Glassworks. But the growing enthusiasm for new lighting fixtures in traditional designs has also generated a market equaling that of restoration. Flickinger describes the demand as "definitely half and half. And that's been very consistent, both with the design aspects - that is, recreating the stencils or the silk screens, enamels and paints - as well as the balance between lighting restoration and new lighting."

Although the balance in the type of light-fixture projects has been consistent, their number has steadily grown. "Business has definitely increased," Flickinger says, "and I think that's just a function of more people finding out about us over time. In the past two weeks we've started dealing with some lighting for a client in California - custom and restoration - who just learned about us. This is our twentieth year, and they're just finding out




restoration of this cast-glass fixture: "They were restoring the lobby of a co-op building in New York City, which still had its original Art Deco decor: the woodwork, the doors, the desks. They also had several of these lighting fixtures, and we totally redid one of them after making a two-part bronze mold from one of the existing fixtures."

about us! Also, as far as new custom work is concerned, I think that there are a fair number of new companies, new designers and architects who are doing lighting. They find out about us, either through word of mouth or by our advertising. And many times, it's been students from a design school like Parsons or Pratt who come through and tour our shop; when they're out practicing, they remember us."


Keeping Flickinger Glassworks at the forefront of bent-glass production is the firm's extensive collection of molds for bending glass, of which Flickinger is justly proud. "We have 6,000 steel molds here," he says, "and far and away the majority came from my mentors: I either bought them outright or I inherited them. We have so many, and we're also constantly making new ones. And even more often, we're reshaping the old ones. We have some molds for bowls that are from the 1830s and 1840s. And we still use them - in fact, projects like that make up a lot of what we do."

Unusual challenges are frequent in the replication of glasswork for vintage lighting, but Flickinger Glassworks inevitably meets them all. "I think that we do a very good job of matching the glass," Flickinger notes. "That really isn't so difficult. What can be the most challenging aspect of restoring old lighting fixtures is matching the paint or stains or very fine filigree stencils. And we do the silk-screening, we do the etching, we do the enameling – all kinds of surface-design applications. Recently, we did the lighting restoration for a bank in California, where the original fixture was 100 years old. It had some very fine filigree work that had to be re-created, and some very difficult bending and blowing work that had to be done. It was one of our most challenging jobs, and in the end, one of the most satisfying."


For a little more than two decades, Charles Flickinger has provided quality bent glass for projects both monumental and intimate. From the torch of the Statue of Liberty to the subtle detailing of a bank's interior lighting fixture, he has mastered this demanding art form in a wide variety of applications. Through a combination of the traditional techniques of slumping sheet glass into steel molds and the latest infrared technology for custom kilns, Flickinger Glassworks has been able to produce extraordinary bent glass of every shape, color, and texture, mirroring the past while meeting the demands of contemporary usage. •





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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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IPTW 2006 - Rebuilding Hope in New Orleans

ince 1997, the International Preservation Trades Workshop (IPTW), sponsored by PTN, has been the only annual event in North America that brings together the foremost practitioners of all of the traditional building trades to share knowledge and


skills through hands-on demonstrations and community building projects.

This year's IPTW will be unlike any other. In response to the Katrina disaster, the PTN community will gather in New Orleans to work together with residents of the historic Holy Cross District, one of the hardest hit neighborhoods, to "Rebuild Hope and Reclaim Heritage." Our goal is to bring the community of the trades together to help make a tangible difference in a neighborhood that is struggling to rebuild. Following the landfall of Hurricane Katrina on August 29, 2005, the neighborhood of Holy Cross was flooded by the breach along "Mr. Go," the Industrial Canal in the Lower Ninth Ward. The historic wood buildings of Holy Cross were subjected from two to

four feet of water for as many as 30 days. Today, most of the buildings remain empty and suffer wind and flood damage ranging from leaking roofs to mold to structural destabilization. Additional damage has been done to vacant homes by well-inten-

tioned untrained volunteers stripping and discarding salvageable architectural details and finishes.

Located adjacent to the Mississippi River in New Orleans' Ninth Ward, Holy Cross, named for the school built there in 1879, was the site of several waterfront plantations established in the eighteenth century. By 1900, the area was populated



with German and Irish immigrants and African-Americans, and filled with farms that provided produce, poultry and dairy to the city's markets. In the 1910s, the swamps north of St. Claude Avenue were drained and the Industrial Canal was constructed in 1923, resulting in the development of the residential neighborhood known as the "Lower Ninth Ward." Architecturally, the neighborhood is defined by 19th- and early 20th-century shotgun houses and vernacular Creole cottages.

PTN and the World Monuments Fund (www.wmf.org) are working in partnership with

the Holy Cross Neighborhood Association to establish a continuing presence in the community with a mobile Preservation Assistance Center, and a series of "hands-on" Field School sessions for homeowners, tradespeople and others, united in the belief that preservation is as much about people and community as it is about buildings. To learn how you can join the PTN teams working with local residents in the Holy Cross Neighborhood, visit us at www.ptn.org or contact the PTN office. Tradespeople with skills in historic roofing, carpentry, masonry, painting, and plastering are especially needed to help teach and facilitate workshops starting in June 2006. Donations of tools, materials and money are also

needed to help sustain this long-term effort. With your help we can make a difference.

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
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
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
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
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
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BACK TO BASICS

Restoring the original hip wood roof at James Madison's Montpelier required extensive framing repair before period-style cypress shingles could be added.

'n 1901, industrialist William DuPont purchased Montpelier in Orange, VA, formerly the home of President James Madison and his first lady, Dolley. Times had changed in the 75 years since the Madisons entertained Jefferson and Lafayette on their columned veranda overlooking the Blue Ridge Mountains. The straightforward Georgian manor house that had originally been built by Madison's father around 1760 had sufficed for the president of a young republic, but it was inadequate for a scion of the Gilded Age. DuPont doubled the size of the structure by expanding Montpelier upward and outward.

Another century passed, and DuPont's daughter donated Montpelier to the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Restoration of the mansion to its Madison era appearance began in 2004 under the architectural direction of Mesick, Cohen, Wilson, Baker Architects of Albany, NY. After careful deconstruction of the DuPont additions, our company, Mustard Seed Master Builders, of Sperryville, VA, was called in to spearhead restoration of the roof.

The challenges were formidable. Original cornices had been sheared off to interface with the DuPont additions, and the Madison-era hip roof had been fundamentally altered. Timber trusses had begun to fail at critical points due to problems

inherent to the 18th-century design, and leaky roof valleys had caused advanced structural decay. Once the framing was restored we would face the task of removing the existing copper roof and replacing it with periodauthentic cypress shingles. We set up shop in the attic and went to work.




A varied regimen of framing repairs was prescribed by structural engineer Dave Fischetti of DCF Engineering of Cary, NC. Where the cornice had been removed we used lag-bolted scarf joints to extend truncated ceiling joists. In the attic we replaced missing rafters in their entirety, but in some cases the DuPont carpenters had retained portions of the original common rafters to serve as shortened jack rafters. To restore these to their full length we spliced on new wood of the same species - mostly heart pine, but in some cases, oak or poplar.

Instead of scarf joinery, we connected the old and new rafter sections with internal steel knife plates secured by self-drilling steel pins. The knifeplate system was originally developed in Germany as a fire-resistant alternative to surface-mounted timber framing hardware, but we focused on another advantage: the plates required only light end-trimming of the antique timbers, whereas scarf joints would have meant cutting away a substantial amount of original fabric. Also, slotting for the plates could be done in situ, whereas fashioning scarf joints in mid-air would have been onerous at

best. Our onsite testing confirmed the strength of the knife-plate system, and we used a Mafell chain-type mortising tool to plow the ¼-in.-wide slots.

Montpelier's classic 18th-century roof frame consists of heavy king-post trusses interspersed with purlins and light secondary rafters. Another antique feature is Montpelier's dragon beams - heavy diagonal ceiling beams that run directly below each of the roof's four hips. This system is elegant but impractical because it concentrates extreme loads at a few key points. A serious problem occurred where both dragon beams and kingposts had been tenoned into lower chords at mid-span. This traffic jam of converging timbers resulted in a cluster of mortises that had weakened the lower chords to the point of failure. A later hand-forged iron staple had only made matters worse. To remedy the situation, Fischetti designed custom steel hangers, which we had fabricated by a machinist. We provided the machinist with a custom-fitted wooden pattern for each location to cope with the vagaries of hand-hewn framing members.


Longstanding leaks caused our biggest headaches. Water had seeped into wall plates and truss chords, turning them to mush. One of the principal tie beams connecting Montpelier's Tuscan portico to the house had rotted clean through. Repairs required extensive shoring before the ailing timbers could be operated on. After trimming back the decayed areas to sound wood we incorporated new timber by means of keyed scarf joints reinforced with through-bolts. In some cases the surgery had to be performed from within the portico entablature - a narrow chamber barely wide enough for a worker

Reviving Lost Shingle Techniques

Montpelier's original shingle roof was extended twice before being replaced by standing-seam metal around 1850. Fortunately, for posterity's sake, these alterations left behind a sampling of shingles that were either recycled as shims or left behind as debris hidden in the attic.

Mark Wenger, the project's lead architectural historian, was able to infer the shingle detailing of the 1825 Madison roof based on the various shapes of the recovered shingles. He compared them to photographs of time-frozen 18th- and 19th-century roofs that had been found encapsulated within later roof expansions. He also consulted with Peter Post of Richmond, VA, the restoration contractor who ultimately supervised the shingling at Montpelier.

Post has been shingling antique roofs in the Tidewater region of Virginia for more than 30 years, including such notables as Bacon's Castle (1663) and Bowling Green (1743). The Bowling Green house has an encapsulated dormer that Post was familiar with, and it turned out to be a "Rosetta stone" that informed the shingling at Montpelier. A peculiar beveled edge on one of the recovered Montpelier shingles was identical to a type found on the

Bowling Green dormer, suggesting that Montpelier's hips had been capped with a narrow tear-drop shingle. The evidence was persuasive and the detail was adopted.

In addition to the tear-drop feature, the hips at Montpelier are "fanned" – a typical southern shingle detail of the period. Fanned hips feature progressively canted side-joints, which create a pagoda-like effect. Roof valleys of the period were fanned like the hips, but in reverse; the width of a valley shingle narrows toward the butt rather than the feather end. The technique is called "sweeping" the valley.

To research the subject of swept valleys and fanned hips, Montpelier's restoration director John Jeanes turned to the internet. He hit the jackpot when he located a technical brief describing the recent re-roofing of the Chowan County Courthouse in Edenton, NC. The brief's author, architect John L. Willers, confirmed our misgivings about the swept valley detail: though historically accurate, it seemed doomed to early failure by the geometry of its tightly spaced joints. The remedy Willers employed, and which we also resorted to, was a metal flashing woven, or interlaid, into each course at the valley. Whether this option was employed by 18th-century builders is uncertain, but the horrendous damage caused by leaky valleys at Montpelier made us unwilling to proceed without the backup protection of flashing.

To physically rehearse the details at Montpelier, Post shingled a 12-ft. mockup that included a hip and a valley. To ventilate the shingles, we removed the 1850s solid sheathing and replaced most of it with spaced battens, but a 40-in.-wide strip of solid sheathing at the eaves was lined with EPDM rubber as a defense against ice dams. Rubber was also installed beneath valleys as further backup protection against leakage. The entire roof was underlaid with Roof Shield, a highly vapor-permeable, self-sealing membrane that lasts longer than felt. Cedar Breather was used under the shingles throughout as another way to promote drying.

All told, Montpelier's roof took over a year to restore. With her bones braced and her cap feathered with cypress, James and Dolley's home should last another 250 years. ◆




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
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


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HONORS FOR GREENBERG & MORTON

Allan Greenberg and David Morton were awarded prizes for their contributions to Classicism.

he 2006 Richard H. Driehaus Prize was awarded to architect Allan Greenberg in honor of his commitment to progressive ideas that advance traditional architecture. The prize is awarded each year to a major contributor in the field of traditional and Classical architecture. The University of Notre Dame School of Architecture presented the fourth annual prize to Greenberg in a ceremony on March 25 at the University Club of Chicago, IL. Greenberg received \$100,000 and a model of the Choregic Monument of Lysikrates, created by Chicago artist Michael Chupich, to honor a career of beautiful, influential and enduring work.

The first American to receive the Driehaus Prize, Greenberg also received an honorary doctoral degree from Notre Dame in 1997 in conjunction with the dedication of the University's Bond Hall of Architecture. His most celebrated works include the Humanities Building at Rice University, for which he won an American Institute of Architects 2001 Design Excellence Award, and the Tommy Hilfiger flagship store in Beverly Hills, which was named the best commercial building of 1998 by the Precast/Prestressed Concrete Institute.

Among Greenberg's other notable designs are a Greenwich, CT, farm-house that won a 1990 Arthur Ross Award from Classical America, and renovations of more than 30 spaces within the Department of State in Washington, DC. George P. Schultz, former Secretary of State, noted that Greenberg enhanced the setting "to embody the noblest ideals of American life," and the interiors, including the main foyer, the offices of The Secretary of State and Deputy Secretary of State and the ceremonial Treaty Signing Room, reflected "the character in which Thomas Jefferson, the first Secretary of State, would feel at home."

Through his teaching, writing and public lectures, Greenberg has furthered both architectural scholarship and practice. He has written several books and many articles on the relationship between the U.S. Constitution and American architecture, as well as on the dynamic and enduring qualities

of traditional architecture and design. A monograph of his work was published in 1995 by Academic Press. His book *George Washington, Architect* was published in 1999 by Andreas Papadakis Publishers, and his most recent work, *The Architecture of Democracy: American Architecture and the Legacy of the Revolution*, published by Rizzoli International Publications, will be released this year. 
television series based on the book is also in progress.

Greenberg's contributions to civic, commercial, educational and residential architecture prompted George Hersey, author and professor of Art History at Yale University, to call him "the most knowing, most serious practitioner of Classicism currently on the scene in this country."

In conjunction with the Driehaus Prize, David Morton received the second annual \$25,000 Henry Hope Reed Award for the promotion of Classical art and architecture. As a senior editor at Rizzoli International Publications since 1987, Morton has been responsible for acquiring and developing architecture-related titles. A member of the Institute for Classical Architecture & Classical America, he has overseen titles such as Samuel White's *The Houses of McKim Mead & White* and *Masterpieces of Chicago Architecture* by John Zukowsky.

Richard H. Driehaus, the founder and chairman of Driehaus Capital Management in Chicago, endowed both awards through the University of Notre Dame School of Architecture because of its reputation as a national leader in incorporating the principles of traditional and Classical architecture into the task of modern urban development. Previous Driehaus Prize laureates are Léon Krier, Demetri Porphyrios and Quinlan Terry.

The 2006 selection committee included Richard Driehaus; Thomas Beeby, principal at Hammond Beeby Rupert Ainge, Chicago, IL, and former dean of the Yale School of Architecture; Elizabeth M. Dowling, author and professor at Georgia Tech's College of Architecture; Anne Fairfax, principal at Fairfax and Sammons, New York, NY; Paul Goldberger, dean of the Parsons School of Design and architecture critic for *The New Yorker*; Léon Krier, architect, urbanist and inaugural recipient of the Richard H. Driehaus Prize; and Michael Lykoudis, dean of the University of Notre Dame School of Architecture. ◆

2006 ARTHUR ROSS AWARDS



he Arthur Ross Awards were established in 1982 by Classical America President Henry Hope Reed and Board Chairman Arthur Ross to celebrate excellence in the Classical tradition. The awards are comprised of 11 categories: architecture, artisanship, community design, education, history and publishing, landscape design, mural painting, patronage, rendering, sculpture and stewardship, with a maximum of five being awarded each year.

The selection committee that chooses recipients of the awards is made up of members of the Institute of Classical Architecture & Classical America's board of directors, advisory council, fellows and distinguished members of related professions. Nominations are submitted throughout the year.

The 2006 winners were selected from more than 150 nominations submitted to a jury chaired by Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk, dean of the School of Architecture at the University of Miami and founding principal of Duany Plater-Zyberk & Company. The jury included painter and educator Jacob Collins; educator and designer Christine G.H. Franck; interior designer and journalist Alexa Hampton; architect and builder William H. Harrison; Susan


Henshaw Jones, president of the Museum of the City of New York and former head of the National Building Museum; author, journalist and Traditional Building editor-at-large Clem Labine; scholar Henry Hope Reed; and architect Gil Schafer III, who serves as chairman of the ICA&CA's board of directors. The jury coordinator was architect and Institute Fellow Phillip Dodd.

"This year's awards recognize five outstanding individuals and organizations whose work has contributed to public appreciation and engagement with the Classical tradition in painting, architecture, community design, history and stewardship. In this auspicious 25th anniversary year of the Arthur Ross Awards the jury chose to emphasize achievements that have had broad public influence by their scale, location, or dissemination," Plater-Zyberk says. This year, the award for architecture went to Hartman-Cox Architects, Washington, DC; The Mississippi Renewal Forum, Biloxi, MS, won for community design; William R. Mitchell, Jr., Atlanta, GA, won for history/writing/ publishing; Leonard Porter, New York, NY, won for mural painting/painting; and The Central Park Conservancy, New York, NY, won for stewardship.

ARCHITECTURE

Hartman-Cox Architects, Washington, DC

he Architecture award this year recognizes Hartman-Cox Architects for its broad range of work with historical tradition - from the preservation of Classical icons to the conception and construction of new institutional buildings. The firm's willingness and ability to engage the full history of design has long empowered it to bring traditional design to contemporary buildings of civic scale and use.

MURAL PAINTING/PAINTING

Leonard Porter, New York, NY

his award recognizes Leonard Porter's incomparable conceptual rigor and skill in the creation of paintings and murals. The thoughtfulness and beauty of his work brings sophistication and dignity to representational painting that embellishes the public realm as well as private spaces.

COMMUNITY DESIGN

The Mississippi Renewal Forum, Biloxi, MS

This award recognizes the Mississippi Renewal Forum, a remarkable collaboration of more than 100 architects, planners, engineers, environmentalists and civic leaders producing a plan for rebuilding the Mississippi coast after its destruction by Hurricane Katrina. Eleven city plans, as well as suggestions for regional infrastructure, and a pattern book to guide the design and construction of individual buildings were produced and published within weeks of the storm and continue to guide the interaction of state and national architects with the communities most in need.

STEWARDSHIP

The Central Park Conservancy, New York, NY

The Central Park Conservancy is recognized this year in its 25th anniversary as a not-for-profit organization with the Stewardship/Good Manners award for its ongoing work preserving, protecting and maintaining an icon of the American public realm, New York City's Central Park. The conservancy provides a majority of the park's annual operating funds and sets a standard of quality control, ensuring its continuation as a national model for cultural and environmental stewardship.

HISTORY/WRITING/PUBLISHING

William R. Mitchell, Jr., Atlanta, GA

he award for history/writing/publishing celebrates the long and illustrious career of William R. Mitchell, Jr., historian. His numerous publications documenting the historical architecture of several southern states has served as an indisputable foundation for the preservation successes of communities throughout the South, including his native city of Atlanta, where his Southern Architecture Foundation has its headquarters. Mitchell's work underlines the importance of recovering and documenting knowledge that can serve as a bulwark for preservation efforts in the political arena.

A "MASTERPIECE" 40 YEARS OUT

here remain a handful of early Modernist buildings that maintain their masterpiece aura despite the decline of their kindred ilk in public esteem, and due to the rough justice of the wrecking ball, a decline in number as well. The Seagram building, Fallingwater and Washington Dulles International Airport might be grouped in this diminishing herd of sacred cows. Alas, after several recent months of flying in and out of Dulles Airport, I'm convinced it's time to lead this old heifer off to the abattoir.

Let's begin by acknowledging that on one level architecture is entertainment. And every successful entertainer, whether a novelist, playwright, film director, composer or architect, understands that you have to "hook them" right at the opening. So what is Dulles's opening act? If one arrives by shuttle bus from Washington or remote parking lots, one is confronted by a battered wall of crudely faceted concrete, with periodic unadorned tunnels allowing access into some kind of subterranean space, the nature of which the exterior furnishes not a clue. These concrete greeting walls resemble nothing so much as overgrown "Jersey barriers," about which the only thing entertaining is that they bear a striking similarity to the

menacing gun emplacements depicted in one of the favorite movies from my youth, The Guns of Navarone. This was roughly contemporaneous with the design of the airport and is perhaps an instance of life imitating art, except that the movie's happy ending had the Allied commandos dynamiting the

gun emplacement.

But the more important opening act is how the building is perceived when one arrives by air, for this is a visitor's entry not just to the airport, but to our nation's capital and, for many, to the United States. The approach from this concourse to the terminal is by "Mobile Lounge," which might best be described as an oversized RV full of plastic seats. As the Mobile Lounge approaches the masterpiece in question, one notices that the front of the white, wing-shaped roof is beset with numerous unsightly streaks, which traditional buildings avoid through the use of cornices. Then there's the black goo oozing from the wing roof's exposed expansion joints. So what if airplane wings, ostensibly the roof's inspiration, don't have cornices or expansion joints? Heroic Modernists were never ones to allow practical concerns to muddy a metaphor.

At last the Mobile Lounge lurches up to the terminal and one is greeted by a row of truck loading docks, complete with torn and tattered rubber gaskets. No windows, doors, articulation, ornament or anything to suggest that this might be a place for people. Confronted by what appears to be a cargo

terminal, one half expects to be greeted by a forklift.

Feeling a bit worn from the rigors of contemporary air travel, one enters the main terminal to the welcoming embrace of exposed aggregate poured-in-place concrete walls - the kind that will take your skin off should you accidentally brush up against one. And if the tactile hostility of the concrete walls isn't aesthetic offense enough, there's the niggling problem of the inevitable cold joints between the concrete pours, leaving unattractive random seams hither and yon. These seams, combined with unrelieved splotchiness due to uneven aggregate separations and the excellent dirt-catching capability of the rough aggregate, make for truly repellant interior spaces, the much-celebrated draped wet sheet of a roof/ceiling notwithstanding. It's astonishing to realize that the architect actually intended for these crude surfaces to be seen.


In an age of rapid technological change such as the 1960s, when Dulles was conceived, surely being able to gracefully accommodate change should have been a programmatic requirement. Yet moving partitions, signs, electrical outlets and the other multitudinous changes required in the life of a building are costly and, from a cosmetic standpoint, virtually impossible in an exposed concrete wall. Surface-mounted electrical conduits and various unsightly patches spattered about resemble the varicose veins and age spots of not-so-graceful aging. A less obdurate finish material such as, say, plaster, could have economically and gracefully accommodated all these changes,

but then plaster wasn't modern enough for the 1960s.

But enough about aesthetics, let's look at function. Due to its current ongoing renovation and expansion, a thorough analysis of the current functional mess that is Dulles would be unfair. So instead, let's just examine the functioning of the Mobile Lounges, which epitomize the bold conceptual rethinking that characterizes this building, and the deficiencies that have resulted from such a design approach. Imagine, if you will, standing in line to enter the Mobile Lounge, then waiting for it to fill, then for the driver to come and lock himself in his cabin, the time for it to lumber across the runway, then dock, then unload, and all the while your watch is ticking towards takeoff, and you'll get a sense of the entire building's nerve-wracking disfunctionality.

The lounges were originally to have cocktails served in them, which would have at least taken some of the sting out of missing your flight. Yet

this building was a creation of Modernism's "best and brightest." The highly celebrated Eero Saarinen of Cranbrook and Yale was its chief architect, in collaboration with Charles Eames and Norman Bel Geddes, possibly the greatest two polymath designers of the Modernist age. So, to return to the Mobile Lounges, the problem with these ex nihilo gizmos is the problem with the whole building, and indeed all of Modern architecture. Modernism was an effort to reinvent the wheel, ignoring the fact that the wheel had already been invented, and that all wheels have to be round. After 40 years, this one particular bold leap into the future is having to undergo a lengthy and expensive radical makeover. Revered as a Modernist icon, a sensible proposal to raze Dulles and simply do it right this time would be, I suspect, strictly out of the question.

Yet, as a traveler and taxpayer enduring the many months of massive reworking and rebuilding, I wistfully reflect on New York's Grand Central Terminal, a twice-as-old icon of another kind of architecture, and recall that its recent restoration required not much more than a thorough cleaning and some fresh paint to have it good to go for another century of transmuting travel's tedium into the sublime. •

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
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
